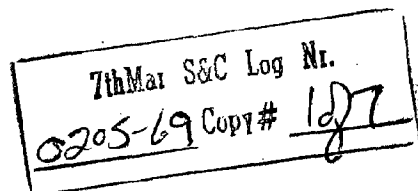

PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. The 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines was participating in Operation OKLAHOMA HILLS on the first of April. The operation had begun the previous day as the battalion moved out from Hill 22 and HILL 10 into the Sherwood Forest and Worth Ridge areas. The following days of the operation took the battalion through Hills 270, 310, 502, 785, 2025 and the surrounding vicinities.
2. Enemy activity was sporadic and disorganized, and amounted to contact with small groups of transient NVA as well as contact with well entrenched enemy positions. The enemy, firing at close quarters and then fleeing, accounted for 8 friendly KIA, while the NVA forces suffered 59 KIA.
3. The most significant events involving the 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines included Echo's discovery of a large NVA Base Camp complex in the vicinity of AT811639. The complex consisted of an excess of 300 huts, bunkers, fighting holes, classrooms, mess halls, weapon repair facilities, etc. Captured in the complex, was a considerable amount of NVA equipment including clothing, individual and crew served weapons, munitions, etc. Golf found a similar, though not as large, complex in the vicinity of AT793637.
4. The remainder of the duration of Operation OKLAHOMA HILLS, 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines continued to exploit and destroy NVA installations and caches. By 21 April, the mission having been successfully completed, the battalion was ordered to DAI LA PASS (LZ ROCK CRUSHER), to assume duties involving the security of the old TAOR and also the TAOR previously assigned to the 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines.
5. At 0700 on 23 April, 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines chopped OPCON to 26 Marines, assumed OPCON of Mike 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines and assumed their new mission. The various units deployed to their assigned areas of responsibility and continued to maintain these until 30 April, with only minor enemy activity reported.

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PART TWO

SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS1. Topicsa. Personnel and Administration

(1) During the reporting period 1-30 April 1969, the Battalion joined 3 officers, and 232 enlisted men. No officers and 62 enlisted men were processed for rotation.

(2) Promoted by grade were 1 to Sergeant Major, 3 to Gunnery Sergeant, 2 to Staff Sergeant, 16 to Sergeant, 3 to Cpl, 55 to 1Cpl, and 1 to ETC.

(3) Awards recommended during 1-30 April were 3 for the Silver Star, 6 for the Bronze Star, 13 for the Navy Commendation Medal, and 17 for the Navy Achievement Medal.

b. Enemy, Weather, and Terrain

(1) During the period 1 April to 30 April 1969, 43 incidents occurred in the battalion areas of operation. Of these, 29 were initiated by the enemy as follows:

(2) The most significant event took place on 11 April, when Echo Company uncovered the 31st NVA Regimental base camp, vicinity AT 813637. The 31st NVA Regiment has long been a threat to the DaNang vital area. Even in light of the defeat it suffered during the Post-Tet Offensive of 1969, the Regiment still had the capabilities of regrouping and resupplying in the haven of its base camp. However, after

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"Echo" uncovered and destroyed the 31st NVA Regiment's capabilities as an effective combat unit were greatly reduced. Also, Echo and Golf Company, who discovered the western ordnance, uncovered numerous weapons, ammunition, documents, and assorted gear in order to be further exploited; the base camp area was occupied by an ARVN Unit. Surely, the 31st NVA Regiment must not locate a new haven before it can conduct operations in the DaNang vital area.

(5) Contact with the enemy was still on the decrease since the Post-Tet Offensive of 1969. Even when the enemy's base camps were threatened, he declined to commit a strong force. Rather, he chose to employ small, harassing forces to allow the bulk of his troops to withdraw.

(6) Due to the intense heat and frequent daytime fog, weather had an adverse effect on operations during the reporting period. Heat casualties increased over the previous reporting period and medevacs and resupply were hampered. Rainfall was negligible during the reporting period.

(2) Fire Support

(a) During the month of April, 771 fire missions were fired in the TAOR and on Operation OKLAHOMA LULIS with a total of 3,121 HE and 201 WP rounds, and 1 CS round expended.

(b) There were also 973 E&I missions fired using a total of 4,670 rounds.

(3) Air Support

(a) The battalion submitted a total of 50 helicopter requests during the month of April with 51 of these being completed. There were 41 medevacs. The 7 incomplete missions were due to difficulties of terrain, weather and enemy activity, which made it necessary to resubmit or consolidate them the next day.

(b) During the same period, 97 OAS missions were flown, dropping a total of 145.5 tons of ordnance, utilizing D1's, D2's, D3's and 2.75" rockets. 29 AG sorties were flown, as well as one photo-reconnaissance mission and 13 night illumination missions.

(c) EBA's reported averaged 94 percent of ordnance on target, covering 88 percent of target areas, including 20 large secondary explosions, 4 minor explosions, 2 structures destroyed and 4 EBA.

d. Plans

(1) The 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines will continue to aggressively patrol and ambush within the TAOR, and will continue to defend those fixed positions and facilities assigned by reference (d).

(2) The battalion will remain ready to deploy a reaction squad on fifteen minutes notice, and a platoon on thirty minutes notice.

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(3) WASHINGTON, D.C. 20380 CAP's within our TAOR is planned to continue as in the past.

(4) The Battalion S-2 Scouts are being brought back up to full strength. It is planned that they will soon be conducting long range, extended patrols.

c. Training

(1) During the period 1 thru 30 April 1969, training in formal classes was sharply reduced due to participation in Operation OKLAHOMA HILLS. Some informal classes were held at the squad level however. Prior to patrols and sweeps, classes (primarily review, questions and answer periods) were held.

(3) There were also a total of 3 Marine officers and 232 Marine enlisted indoctrinated during the month of April.

d. Logistical, Equipment and Supply

(1) General. During the period of 1 April to the 21st of April 1969, the battalion was committed on operation OKLAHOMA HILLS, general logistic support was provided by the Logistic Support Area at Hill 55, 7th Marines Regimental Headquarters. The following representatives from the battalion were responsible for providing repairmen, ammunition technician, radio technician, motor transport personnel and assigned working parties. There was a total of 185 lifts provided for Operation OKLAHOMA HILLS. During the period of 22 to 30 April 1969, the following resupplies were provided by external helicopter lifts upon request from using units:

(3) Transportation: The battalion at the present time is experiencing no significant problems with organic vehicles; however, there is a problem in the 5 TAD housekeeping trucks assigned to this unit. Since the battalion has assumed responsibility for two (2) TAOR's, it is imperative that three (3) additional trucks be assigned for the battalions use. Although two (2) trucks have been made available on a day-to-day basis, this is inadequate due to the fact that commitments cannot be made on a permanent basis. To give the required support, this unit is in need of three (3) additional housekeeping trucks on a permanent basis.

(4) Embarkation: The embarkation situation is constantly being improved by updating of Mads Data Cards and unit cargo manifests being submitted and updated by organizational units.

(b) Hand Distribution. Hand distribution was conducted by 2nd Battalion, 26th Marines during the month of April.

i. Communications.

(1) Towards the end of March, communications in support of Operation OKLAHOMA HILLS was provided in an efficient manner. All nets were initiated without any difficulty. A battalion rear net was established using the alternate Bn Tac frequency. Relay was necessary on the Bn Tac on occasion and the Bn rear was utilized for this function. Limited internal wire communications was provided when the command group was in a static position or extended halt.

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(2) Wire radio relay communication was maintained with the Battalion Command Post while the "A" Command was in the field. The PCC-1 multichannel relay system was utilized to link telephone communications to 7th Marines, providing four voice channels.

(3) The teletype cable was patched over to a TRC-97 channel to provide more reliable service from the 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines to the 7th Marines. The TRC-97 multichannel system allowed for a stronger and more consistent signal output.

(4) Communications during the displacement from the field to the Battalion Command Post at DAI LA PASS was continuous and efficient. A buried 25-pair cable to 26th Marines provides all land line service to the regiment. A wire pair from the buried cable was utilized for teletype traffic to 26th Marines. The message center has the circuit capability installed to transmit and receive cryptographically covered teletype from 7th Marines and also from the 26th Marines. All tactical radios are removed from Hill 44 with the exception of the cryptographic net to regiment.
