## 1. SITUATION

## a. Enemy Forces

- 1) Elements of Local Force Company is located in the objective area. This company is designated either the 119th Local Force Company or the 1-19 Local Force Company. Additionally, one Main Force VC Company operates in the THANH TRA-BINH YEN area and elements of this unit, designated the 120th Main Force Company, may be encountered in the objective area. Unconfirmed reports place the 192nd Main Force Battalion in the objective area, at vicinity BS 576920. The existence of this unit at this location is considered to be possible.
- 2) Total estimated enemy strength in the objective area does not exceed 300. The enemy is armed with adequate small arms, to include sub-machineguns, BAR's, and light machineguns. They possess a 60mm mortar capability, and an 81mm mortar capability is reported, but not confirmed. 57mm recoilless rifles are also reported to be in the hands of the 192nd Battalion.
- 3) Punji traps, booby traps, and mined artillery and mortar rounds are located on likely avenues of approach throughout the objective area. Caves and underground shelters will be encountered as well as prepared defensive positions. Barriers, in the form of wire fences and water-filled ditches, augmenting the natural hedgerow vegetation which exist throughout the area, are reportedly very heavy in BS 5691.
- 4) There is a possibility that VC elements of the 192nd Battalion are located to the southeast of the objective area in grid squares BS 5391, 5491, 5390, 5490, 5389, and 5489.
- 5) Enemy forces within the objective area possess the capability to defend prepared positions within the objective area, as well as the capability to infiltrate under the cover of harassing/screening elements in contact with our forces. Due to the amount of friendly combat power available and the proximity of the objective area to ARVN and USMC reserves, it is felt that VC units will adopt the latter capability. Additionally, some attempt to mingle with the local populace is likely to be encountered.

Upon reaching Phase Line ~~OCTOBER~~, establish blocking positions as indicated in Annex C (Concept of Operations Overlay) and be prepared to deploy on order.

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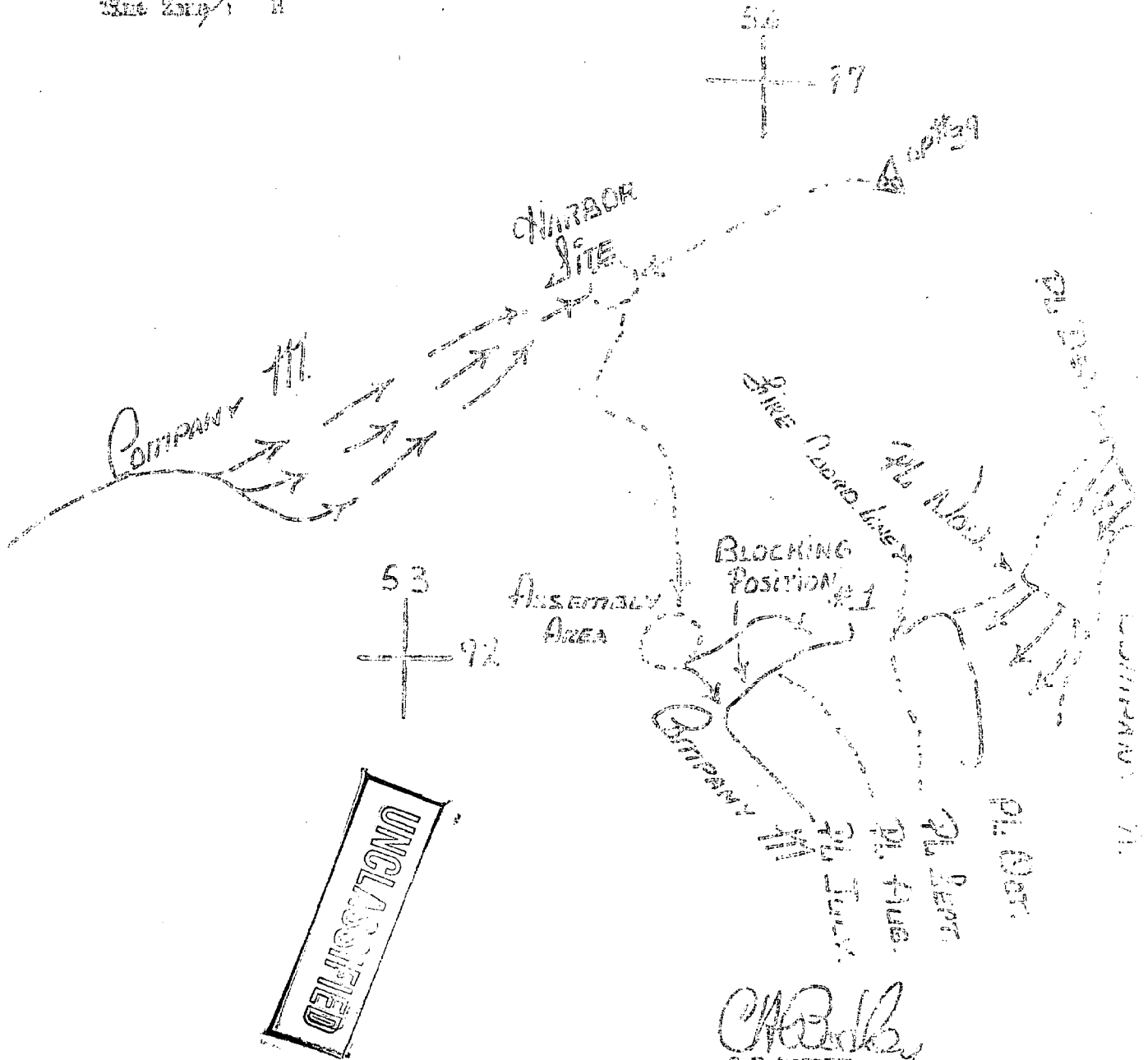
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Annex I (Conceptual Diagram Showing) to Operation Order 11-65

# Task Organization: Area 4 (Task Organization)

## 1. INTRODUCTION

a. Air Safety and Security

1) Air contacts will be positioned at artillery units and will check fire when friendly aircraft are observed approaching target areas.

2) Artillery forward observers will check fire when it appears that the trajectory of artillery will endanger friendly aircraft.

3) During special coordination missions are provided, fires on battle positions in the are restricted to observed fires when the element is capable of insuring the safety of helicopters.

## 6. SAFETY OF GROUND FORCES

a. A Fire Coordination Line has been established as shown on Annex C (General Operations Overlay) and coordinated under coordination in forward area.

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No fires will be placed across this line without the approval of this Headquarters. This approval must be voiced -- Silence does not mean consent.

- b. It is imperative that this Headquarters be kept informed of the front line positions of all units at all times. Front line position reports will be submitted by forward observers to the 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines, FSCC as soon as practicable after each unit displacement.

7. COMMAND AND COMMUNICATION ELECTRONICS

- a. Primary means of communication will be by radio.

1. SITUATIONa. Enemy Forces

b. Friendly Forces. No change.

2. MISSION. Elements of 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines and elements of the Provisional Battalion will conduct a joint search and clear operation of the village complex of LONG PHU (1) vicinity coordinates BT 512030.

3. EXECUTION

- a. Concept of Operation. The mission will be accomplished by controlling the village complex prior to dawn on D-day, and on first light conducting a four platoon search and clear operation by sweeping to the north and east.

- b. Provisional Battalion. Provide blocking force/security element on the northern sector of sweep area extending from BT 503030 to 511030, to be in position no later than 130545H. On order, be prepared to encounter elements in search and clear operation. Direction of sweep will be east. Prevent all personnel, regardless of age and sex, from leaving the village complex. All villagers will be directed to move to a collection and clearing area for processing in vicinity of coordinates BT 515030. The Provisional Battalion will also provide observation to south and north from OP #21 with tanks and gathens ordered to interdict all routes of egress from which the VC attempt to escape.

c. Co K (-)(Rein)

- 1) Provide one platoon (Rein) in position on Line A by 130545 (See Annex A (Rein) for details).

- 2) On order, conduct a coordinated sweep with platoon of Company I in a northerly direction to Phase Line B (See Annex A (Operation Overlay)).
- 3) Upon reaching Phase Line B, on order, be prepared to maneuver unit on a magnetic azimuth of 090 from Phase Line B to Phase Line C conducting a thorough sweep in your zone of action (See Annex A (Operation Overlay)).
- 4) Be prepared to continue sweep on a 090 azimuth from Phase Line C through Phase Line D to Phase Line E.
- 5) Continue to occupy positions on assigned sector of FABA.

d. Com I (-)(Rein)

- 1) Provide one platoon to be in position on Phase Line A at 120540H as shown in Annex A (Operation Overlay).
- 2) On order, be prepared to conduct a coordinated sweep with one platoon of Company K in a northerly direction to Phase Line B.
- 3) Upon reaching Phase Line B juncture with platoon from Provisional Battalion. On order, maneuver unit on a magnetic azimuth of 090 from Phase Line B to Phase Line C conducting a thorough sweep in your zone of action (See Annex A (Operation Overlay)).
- 4) Upon reaching Phase Line C be prepared to continue sweep on an azimuth of 090 degrees from Phase Line C through Phase Line D to Phase Line E.
- 5) Continue to occupy positions on assigned sector of FABA.

e. Plat. Onton. Establish blocking position along road extending from BT 514023 to BT 506023. Prevent all personnel, regardless of age or sex, from leaving or entering village complex. All personnel apprehended will be taken to the civilian collection point vicinity coordinates BT 515027 for processing.

f. Detach. H&S Co. Provide security for civilian collection and processing area. Provide civil affairs team, interrogation, interpretation, and translation team at civilian collection point.

g. 3d Plat. Co C. 1st Regt. En. Attach one squad to Companies I, K and Provisional Battalion. Utilize mine detection equipment extensively throughout the zone of action.

h. Plat. LVT. Establish blocking position vicinity BT 515026

i. Coordinating Instructions

- 1) H-hour - 0645
- 2) D-day - 13 December 1965

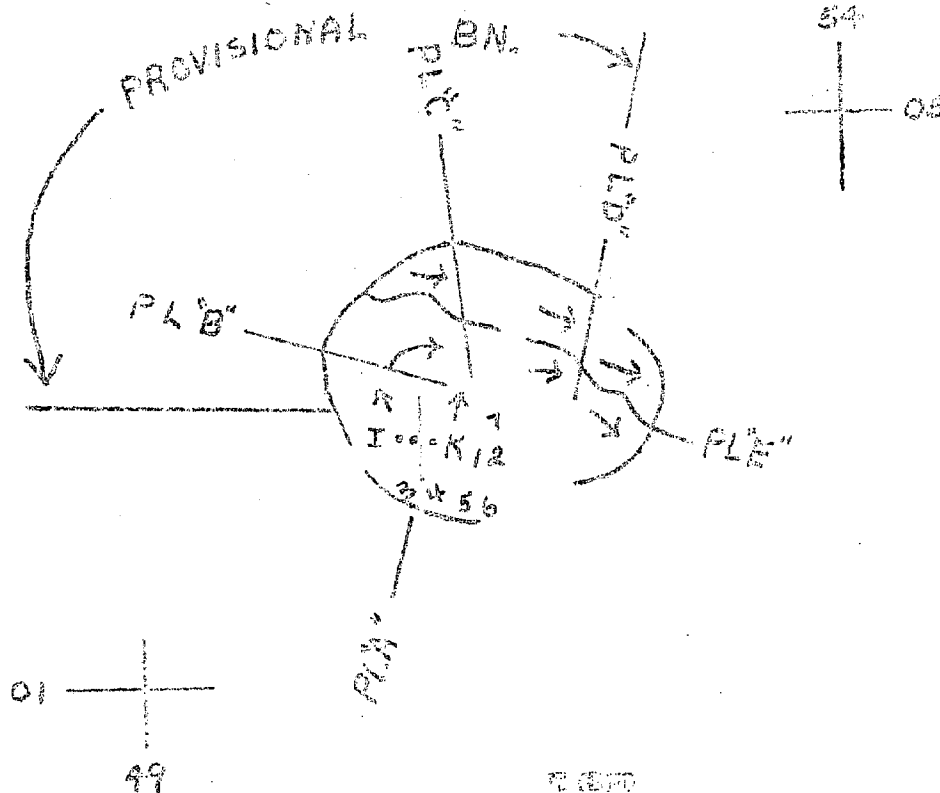

- a. Chronological Utilization
  - 270700Z - F4C(1) (2 UH1H's) arrived on station.
  - 270800Z - Eight UH-34D's landed 56 Company II troops in Landing Zone GREEN and eight UH-34D's landed 56 Company II troops in Landing Zone YELLOW. There was no landing zone preparation due to the landing zones being secured.
  - 270900Z - Eight UH-34D's conducted a faint landing into a landing zone at coordinates BT 580913. The zone was lightly prepared by two UH1H's.
  - 271000Z - F4C(1) aircraft secured due to fuel shortage.
  - 271100Z - Requested two UH-34D's to evacuate 29 VCS to the Chu Lai Compound.
  - 271200Z - Two UH-34D's evacuated 14 VCS from coordinates BT 580913.
  - 271300Z - Two UH-34D's evacuated two VCS from coordinates BT 580913.

b. Artillery. Battery I, 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines displaced to coordinates BT 570955 to be in direct support of 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines (-)(Rein). No rounds were fired. The battery left at 271430H to return to the Chu Lai firing position.

c. Engineers

1) A detachment of the 3rd Platoon, Company G, 1st Engineer Battalion consisting of nine men supported the Battalion (-) on the operation. This unit was divided into three teams, one to accompany each rifle company and one to remain with the Command Group. This detachment was attached at 261945H.

2) At 270735H the engineer team attached to Company M was helilifted into the objective area. The team was used to destroy one cave and utilized its mine detector, AM/PBS-3, to search for weapons and other contraband materials.

3) At 271445H the team attached to Company K was reinforced with the Command Group team and together they assisted Company K in the search of hamlets in their zone of action. The engineers destroyed three caves by demolitions and set additional charges designed to locate other caves and tunnels, along the river bank. This use of demolitions was an essential element in the capture of some twenty-four VCS. The method employed was to blow the cave top off thus exposing the entrance. The caves which were dug in the river bank with their entrance below the waterline were otherwise inaccessible. The engineer personnel were further utilized to search by entering numerous smaller tunnels, to sweep with mine detectors for weapons and ammunition, the river bank and surrounding area. The use of mine detectors allowed for a more rapid search of the several hamlets in the area of operation. The engineers assisted in guarding of prisoners.

6. Intelligence

a. Prior to D-day, the following enemy units were believed to be in the objective areas:

1) Elements of one Local Force company, designated either the 119th or L-19 Company.

2) Elements of the 120th Main Force Company, which normally operates in the THANH PHA-BINH YEN area, and which apparently reinforces the Local Force company in the objective area.

3) The 192nd Battalion, reported to be centered at BT 570920. The existence of this unit at this location was considered to be possible.

b. Total estimated strength in the objective area was thought not to exceed 3000. Their arms were estimated to be of the type usually found in the hands of Local Force guerrillas, i.e., carbines, bolt-action (Chinese and French) rifles, submachineguns, and a few automatic rifles and light machineguns. Previous patrols conducted by this Command on the periphery of the objective area had been fired at by 60mm mortars; however they were not encountered during this operation.

c. Enemy capabilities in the order of their probable adoption were thought to be:

1) To combine exfiltration from the objective area with secreting of small groups of individuals in prepared hiding places within the objective area. The capability would be supported by harassing/screening snipers to gain time to fully exercise the capability.

2) To defend prepared positions in place.

4. The intelligence estimate of enemy forces, disposition, and armaments proved quite accurate. Intermittent sniper fire was received nearly all the way through the operation, though it was significantly heavier in the first two hours. Booby traps were anticipated to be quite heavy, but proved to be rather light for this area. All of the captives taken on the operation were found to be hiding in caves or other shelters.

6. Seven VC were killed on this operation. One was shot fleeing through cane fields, three were killed by small arms fire while attempting to escape across a tributary of the TRA BONG River, and three others were killed by a single rifleman who fired from a boat into their hiding places along the bank of the river.

2. A technique known to be used elsewhere in Vietnam but encountered for the first time by this Command, was the VC use of caves with underwater entrances. One cave of this type was found when a VCS located in the cave came out and re-vealed himself above water long enough to give an indication of the fact that he had a covered hiding place. This cave entrance was blown open on the bank and nine VCS were removed.

46. Thirty-six captives were taken on this operation. Thirty-one were initially classified as VGB. Two were classified as VGB through the on-the-spot work of an FBI team of two interrogators and two interpreters. These two were a VC for collector and his assistant. Subsequent interrogations have established the authenticity of the remaining three.

4. One M-1 carbine was captured on this operation as well as four cartridge belts containing American and Chinese grenades, M-1 carbine magazines, and two .45 submachinegun magazines. No weapons were observed in the hands of the VC shot by the Marine in the boat. However, their hiding place was destroyed by explosives in an effort to open the entrance, and there was not sufficient time in the objective area to dig out the resulting earthslide. No M-79 grenades were also captured.

...and the ...

18. During the operation civil affairs teams were attached to Companies I and M. Each team consisted of an NCOIC, one interpreter, and two Marines. The civil affairs teams were augmented by PRT members attached to the Battalion plus Filipino Nardo members from BINI SON.

2. Civil affairs teams entered the hamlets of THUN DAO (BT 535918), PHUOC THUAN (1) (BT 576917), PHUOC THUAN (2) (BT 559114) and administered medical aid to 80 villagers. One bottle of vitamins was issued along with 50 bars of soap. The hundred 8-gram pamphlets and posters were distributed among the three hamlets.

30. At 271500H two VC were killed at FUSOC THUAN (1) (BU 372921). The ARVN officers then turned the bodies over to the hamlet for identification. At one of FUSOC THUAN (1) knew the VC. The villagers stated that they would bury the bodies.

5) The village chief and other villagers reported that the soldiers did not seem particularly interested in the villagers and did not seem scared or worried about the Marines' presence.

5) At 271300H in PHUOC THUAN (1) (BT 572912) six Vietnamese women were waiting and they asked the Marines not to take the prisoners that were just apprehended. However, this appeared to be a front and not a sincere attempt to have the prisoners released.

9. Mission. At H-hour on D-day, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines (-)(Rein) conducted a search and destroy operation in the northcentral section of the BINH SON District, north of the SONG TRA BONG.

10. Concept of Operations. Two companies (-)(rein) conducted sweeps converging on a similar axis. Upon reaching a designated phase line, one company held and blocked while the other company conducted a search and destroy operation.

11. Execution (See enclosure (1)) (Continuation Overleaf)

a. Prior to Operation "HUM BUG" on D-1 Patrol "Leopard", a reinforced platoon from Company K, and one composite platoon from H&S Company moved to an assembly area in vicinity coordinates BS 547954 by 262300H to link up with Company M on D-day.

b. D-day, 17 December 1965. At 270600H Company K and the Battalion Command Group departed, by motorized convoy, from 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines CP. The convoy moved generally south over Route #1 to dismount point at vicinity coordinates BS 572945.

c. At 270630H Company K, composed of Patrols "Panther" and "Leopard" and H&S Composite Platoon, established blocking positions on Phase Line JULY (See enclosure (1)).

d. At 270700H Company K and the Battalion Command Group crossed the Line of Departure at Phase Line OCTOBER (See enclosure (1)).

e. Company K received two rounds of small arms fire vicinity coordinates BS 585937 from two VC at 270705H. VC broke contact and melted away into the cane-fields. While maneuvering towards Phase Line NOVEMBER at coordinates BS 583937 Company K pursued seven VCS by fire. The VCS were halted, four were released and the other three apprehended. Company K with the Battalion Command Group following in trace reached Phase Line NOVEMBER.

f. At 270725H Company M departed Landing Zone (BT 538023) by helicopter. Company M completed landing in Landing Zone YELLOW, elements of Company M were dropped 500 meters north of Landing Zone YELLOW (See enclosure (1)). The 1st and 2nd Platoons of Company M moved to the SONG TRA BONG to take up blocking positions along Phase Line JULY.

g. While Company M was deploying along Phase Line JULY, Company K reached Phase Line OCTOBER. As Company K reached Phase Line OCTOBER they apprehended eight VCS vicinity coordinates BS 583922 at 270735H. As the 3rd Platoon of Company K approached Phase Line JULY they received small arms fire from vicinity coordinates BS 556907 at 270815H.

h. At 271030H Company M was deployed on Phase Line JULY and commenced its sweep towards PHUOC THUAN (1) (BS 558915).

i. 1st Platoon, Company K deployed to vicinity coordinates BS 577916 and linked up with 2nd Platoon and commenced search of stream bed at 271215H.

j. At 271300H Company M apprehended six VCS in village of PHUOC THUAN (1) (BS 558915). Simultaneously Company K conducted search of river bank (BS 573912).

k. At 271315H Company K discovered cave at water's edge (BS 573912). Cave was occupied by an undetermined number of VCS. VCS were instructed to come out. Instead they choose to attempt to fight their way out. One was armed with a carbine and two with grenades. Three VC were KIA in the river and 18 VCS liberally dug out of the cave by elements of Company K.

# 1. Chronology of Events

At 270600H Skeptic 6, Skeptic 3, and Company K departed the Battalion CP by motorized convoy to Phase Line DECEMBER.

At 270650H Skeptic 6, Skeptic 3, and Company K arrived at Phase Line DECEMBER.

At 270700H Skeptic 6, Skeptic 3, and Company K crossed Phase Line DECEMBER.

At 270705H Company K received small arms sniper fire from coordinates BS 585937 from approximately two VC and returned the fire. Contact was lost.

At 270707H Company K spotted five VC heading out of CHAU TU (1) area (BS 588937). Company K pursued by fire. Seven VCS stopped. Four were released as civilians and three were retained as VCS.

At 270715H Company K reached Phase Line NOVEMBER.

At 270725H Company M departed Landing Zone ROBIN.

At 270735H Company M landed in Landing Zone YELLOW and 500 meters north of Landing Zone YELLOW.

At 270735H 1st and 2nd Platoons, Company M moved to river to take position on Phase Line JULY.

At 270735H Company K was one Phase Line OCTOBER.

At 270735H Company K captured eight VC in the vicinity of TIEN DAO (1) (BS 583922).

At 270750H Company K and Skeptic 3 were on the move.

At 270800H Skeptic M-3 and M-4 arrived at Landing Zone YELLOW.

At 270810H 2nd Platoon, Company M destroyed fences at coordinates BS 574921.

At 270815H 2nd Platoon, Company M received fire from village southwest of Phase Line JULY.

At 271030H all Company M units were in position on Phase Line JULY and commenced sweep towards PHUOC THUAN (BS 558915).

At 271114H Company M was 400 meters southwest of Phase Line AUGUST.

At 271150H Company M found cave at coordinates BS 577923. The cave was destroyed.

At 271200H Skeptic 3 established CP at BS 577916.

At 271200H Company K arrived at Phase Line OCTOBER.

At 271215H 1st Platoon, Company K moved to BS 577916 and tied in with 2nd Platoon, Company K. One squad conducted search of stream bed.

At 271300H Company M apprehended six VCS at PHUOC THUAN (2) (BS 558915).

At 271300H Company K conducted search of river bank at coordinates BS 573912.

At 271315H 1st Platoon, Company K had first encounter with VC. Eighteen VCS were apprehended in cave and three VC killed in water at coordinates BS 573912.

At 271330H 1st Platoon, Company K, patrolling near stream at BS 573912, found tunnels underwater at BS 577913. Five VCS were apprehended and engineers destroyed the tunnel.

At 271400H 1st Platoon, Company K at BS 577913 apprehended one VCS.

At 271400H Skeptic 3 issued Frag Order.

At 271400H 2nd Platoon, Company K saw one VC fleeing BS 577918, fired three rounds and killed VC.

At 271445H 1st Platoon, Company K Marine swimmer recovered one M-1 carbine in water at coordinates BS 573912. Two VC were spotted and killed. Engineers blew top of cave along river bank. After blowing the cave one VC was spotted hiding in bushes. The VC was killed.

At 271510H Company M was in position, sweeping towards river.

At 271605H Skeptic M-4 discovered two VCS in canefield at BS 569573.

At 271620H Company M and Skeptic 3 departed for Phase Line DEC MEER. Company M was following in trace.

At 271700H Company K and Skeptic 3 boarded trucks for retraction.

At 271735H Company K and Skeptic 3 arrived at the Battalion (Rear) CP.

At 271900H Companies L and M boarded trucks for retraction.

At 271945H Company M and Skeptic 6 returned to the Battalion (Rear) CP.

At 271945H all units had returned to the Battalion (Rear) CP. Operation "HUM BUG" terminated.

8) Two pouches full of assorted papers were found during the course of the operation, one by Company M and one by Company E. The documents contained VC songs and poems, some VC rosters, reports and what appeared to be minutes of meetings. The documents were evaluated on the spot by attached ITT personnel and were forwarded to ITT for complete evaluation.

13. Administrative Matters. Logistically this operation was routine. Those elements in the field prior to D-day were resupplied on D-1. On the morning of D-day Company K and the Battalion Command Group were trucked to the line of departure. All units carried sufficient supplies and equipment for the operation. Resupply was not required. The Battalion suffered no casualties. Most captives were evacuated by helicopter; however a few remained to be taken out along with the Battalion. Retraction was made by truck and required one turn-around. The retraction commenced at 271700H and was completed at approximately 272000H.

a. Communications. During the operation, the following problems were encountered:

1) The coaxial cable with the RC-292 broke at the connector. This caused the entire antenna to become useless and greatly reduced communications range. In future operations two cables will be carried with each RC-292 in the event one breaks.

2) Several radios failed to function during the operation. Due to the fact that no radio repairman was with the CP group, local repair was impossible. In future operations a repairman will be with the CP group.

3) During the initial operations there were at least ten stations on the Battalion Tactical Net. This caused a great deal of confusion and unnecessary delay. The solution to this situation is to have all aircraft activate on the TAGP local net. This will allow the aircraft to communicate with the Battalion CP without tying up the Battalion Tactical Net.

14. Special Equipment and Techniques. No special equipment or techniques were employed by this Command during the operation.

#### 15. Commander's Analysis

a. As a result of a number of previous VC contacts and continuous intelligence evaluation of the objective area, Operation "HUM HUG" was executed. The timeliness of execution was considered to be good and the results excellent. Because normal operational commitments required the presence of one of the major tactical units on the Battalion FEBA, sufficient time to conduct a thorough and detailed search of all of the objective area was not permitted. As an example, because of insufficient time, a complete excavation of a blown cave which positively contained at least two dead VC with grenades and weapons could not be accomplished. These two VC resisted apprehension and chose to fight rather than surrender. Demolitions were used to speed excavation and subsequent extractions. Forty-four VC were an-

tracked in this fashion.

b. The tactics employed were standard search and destroy techniques with the exception of utilizing a boat and swimmer to locate underwater cave and tunnel entrances along the river bank. This tactic proved fruitful and resulted in the capture and destruction of a number of VC. Marines utilizing boats were responsible for locating at least three VC along the river bank who otherwise would have been by-passed due to the heavy vegetation and nature of the terrain immediately adjacent to the river.

c. Interpreter/translator teams were able to provide timely intelligence by accompanying the Battalion Command Group in the trace of the lead elements.

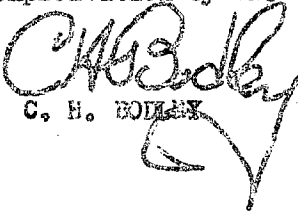
#### 16. Recommendations

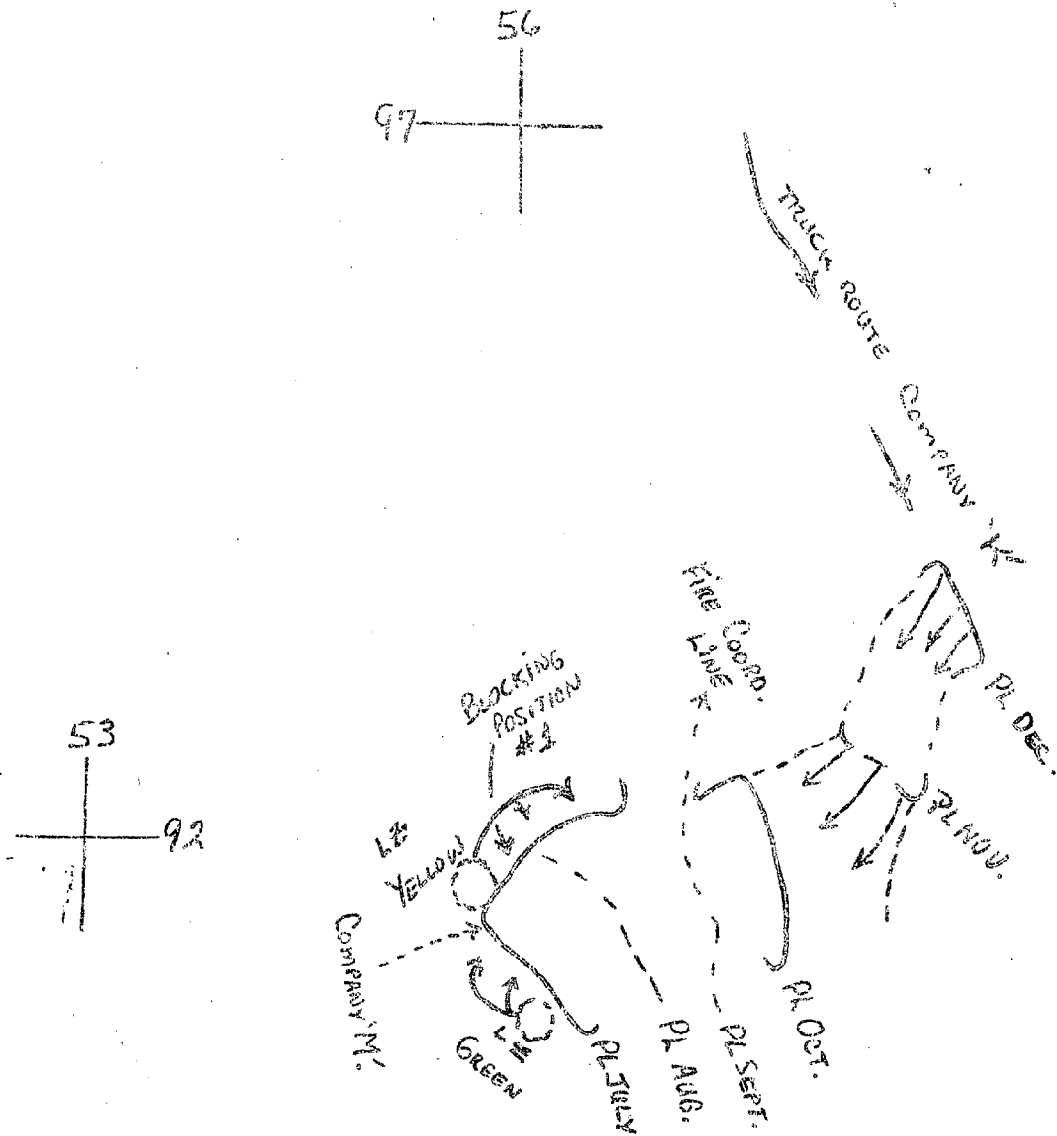
a. That the Government of Vietnam in conjunction with this Battalion conduct a thorough search, clear, and destroy operation of the area adjacent to and extending north of the TRA DONG River six to eight thousand meters and inland from BS 490828 to BS 490886. Upon completion of this search and clear operation the Government of Vietnam should dispatch sufficient troops to the area in order to secure, establish and maintain government authority throughout the area on a continuing basis.

b. That the authority to use CS and CN agents by subordinate units be delegated to the Battalion Commander in order to have it available on a permanent basis without the necessity of requesting special authority for specific operations. The utilization of CS and CN agents would continue to be a controlled item and close accountability and incident reporting would continue.

c. That on operations where streams and rivers are located in the zone of action reconnaissance personnel with a SCUBA/LCR capability be made available so that a thorough search can be conducted along the banks for possible underwater caves and tunnels. The extraction of twenty-four VCS from caves with underwater openings during this operation clearly indicates the desirability for a thorough search by SCUBA qualified personnel.

d. That on operations in areas known to be heavily infested or controlled by VC, Interrogator/translator personnel should accompany the sweeping elements to insure a rapid processing of VC and VCS in order to disseminate the intelligence on a timely basis for immediate exploitation by the tactical units.

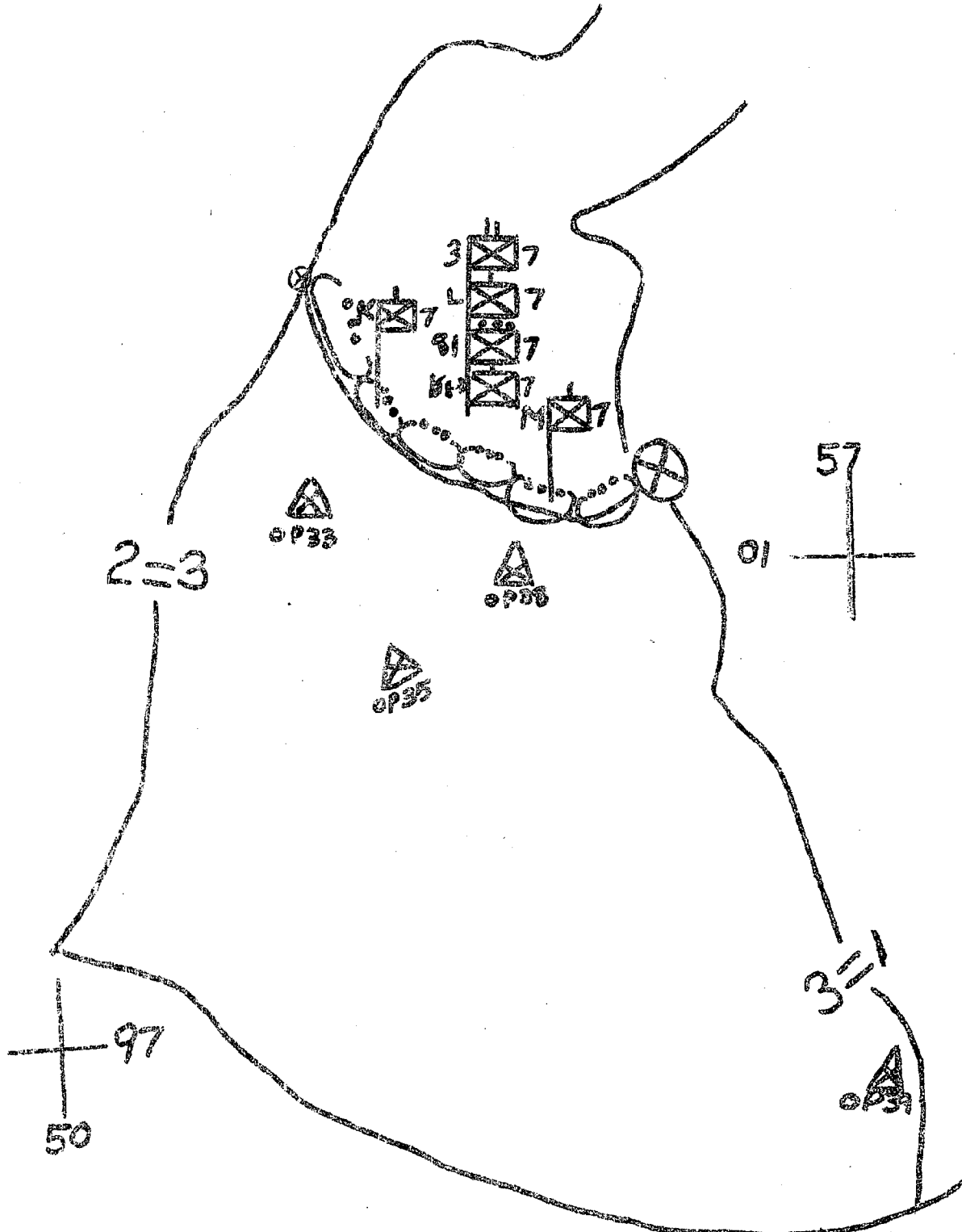

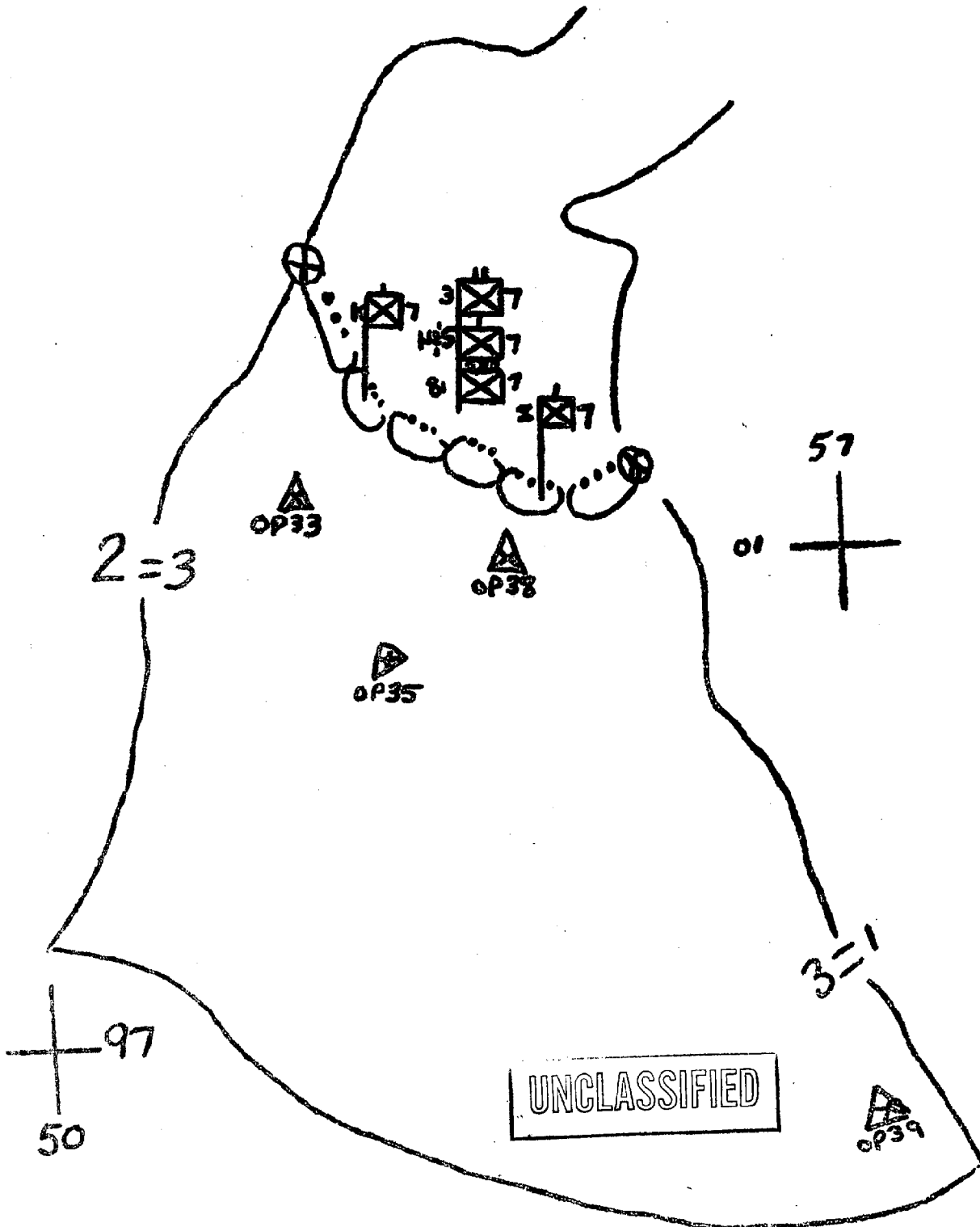
3/7 OVERLAY OF BATTALION POSITION 1 (1 - 4 December 1965)

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OF BATTALION POSITION 2 (4 - December 1965)



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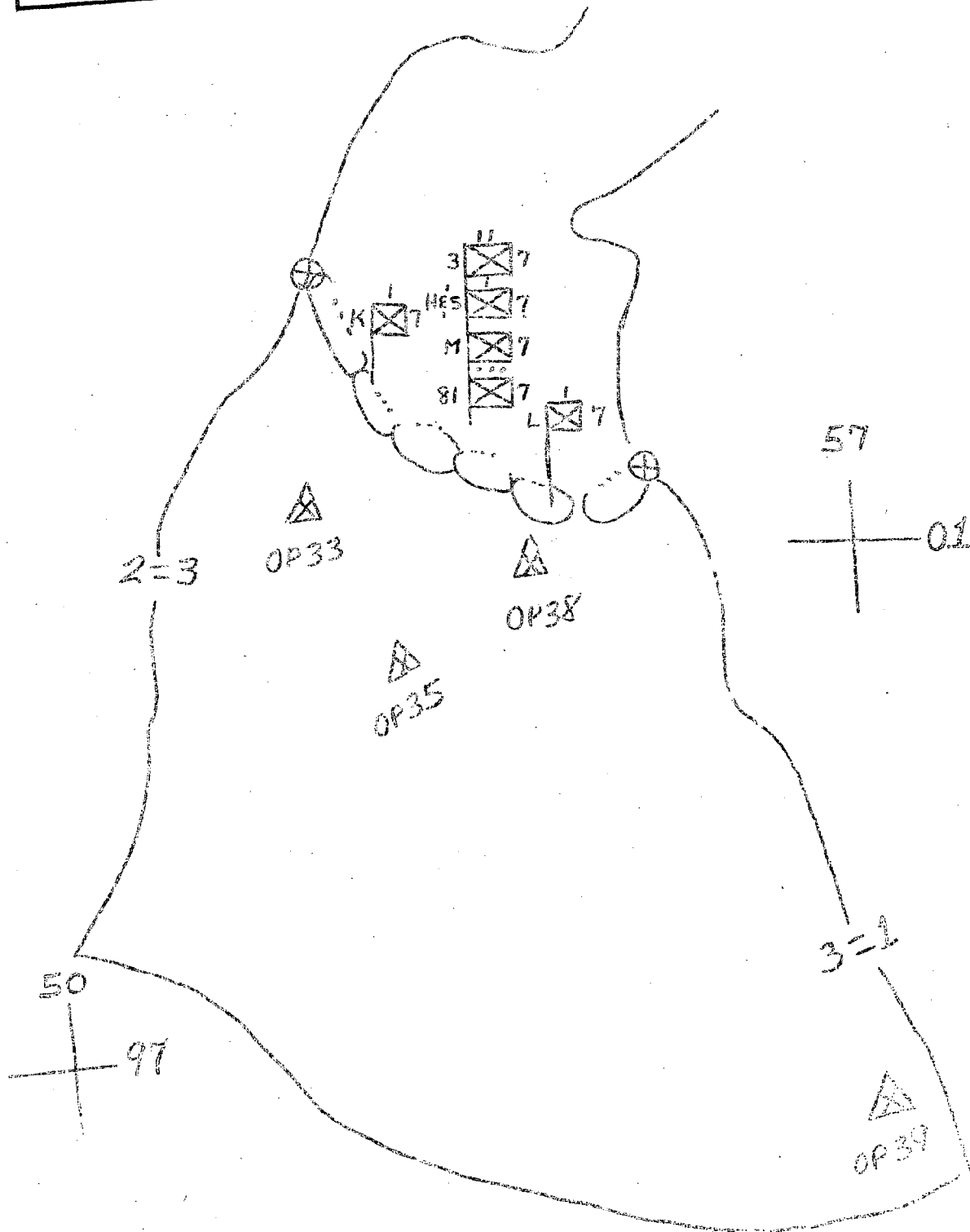

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APPENDIX OF BATTALION POSITION 3 (14-21 December 1965)

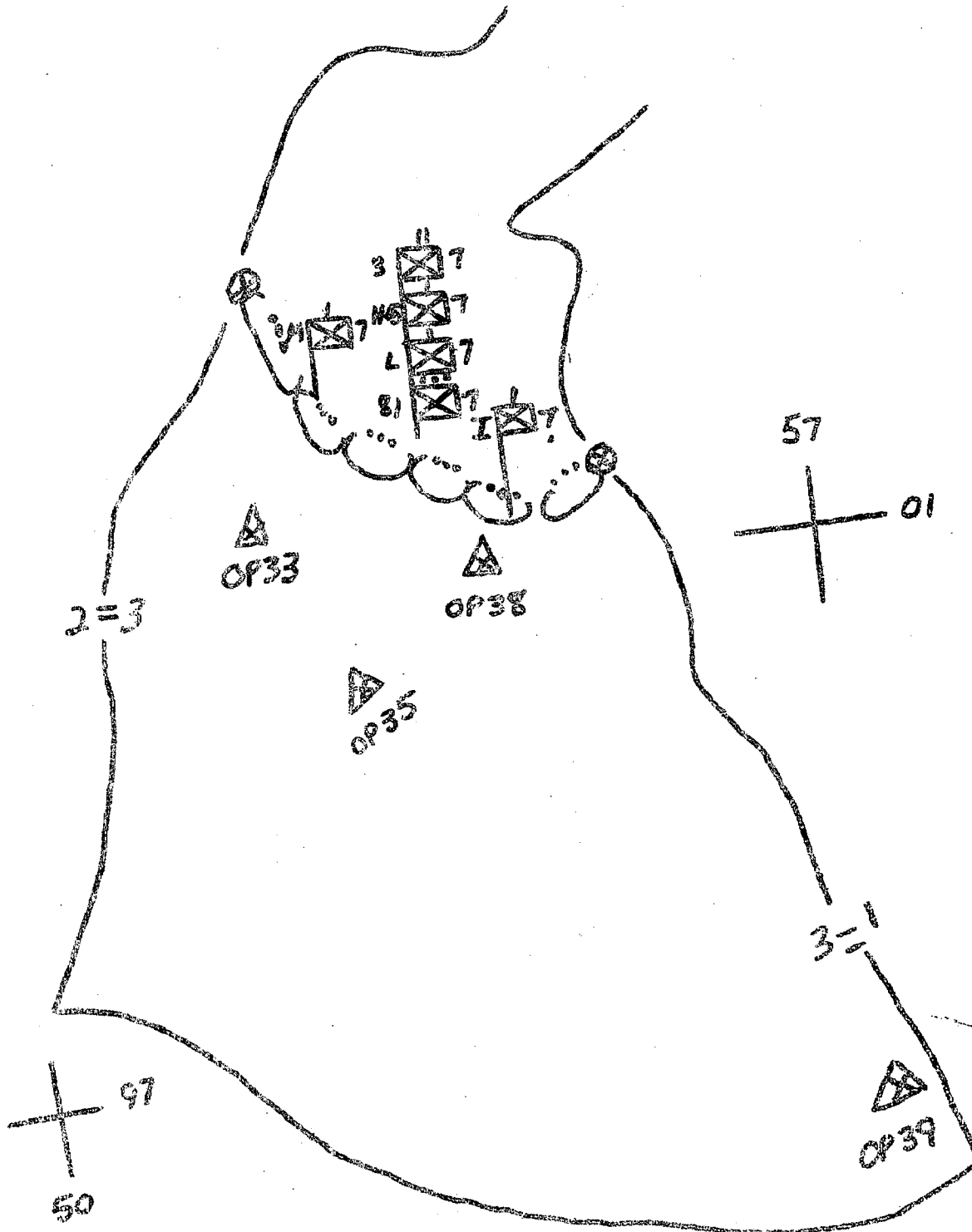
