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PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. The 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines continued to conduct its normal saturation patrolling throughout the assigned TAOR for the subject period. The battalion took part in three short operations during the month. Companies H, M and L 3/5 (OpCon 3/7) took part in Operation NUTCRACKER. Their mission was to set up a blocking force for Americal Division units pushing northwest. An operation involving Companies K and M also took place, their mission was to conduct a search and destroy mission in the vicinity of a downed helicopter. In response to intelligence reports and enemy sightings a two day operation was conducted in "Charlie" Ridge, Companies H and L participated.
2. During the period Company M was moved from Hill 52. Their base of operations became Hill 37, however, they spent the better part of the month under the operational control of 1st Battalion, 7th Marines. Thuong Duc CIDG Camp assumed responsibility for a sector of 3/7's TAOR west of the 81 grid line. Early in the month the Phu Loc (6) combat base was also disbanded. This base, however, was remained later in the month as a platoon patrol base.
3. Significant contact took place while the enemy continued its TET offensive and during their retrograde movement early in the month. On the 7th of February, Company L came in contact with a company of NVA. The action accounted for 32 enemy KIA and numerous weapons captured. Company M came in contact, on the 13th of the month, with what was believed to be a reinforced platoon, 17 enemy KIA resulted.
4. During this period, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines was assisted in its TAOR by Company L, 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines which operated out of the Company K combat base. Company L also took part in Operation NUTCRACKER. Company G, 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines manned the Company H combat base while Company H took part in an operation in the "Charlie" Ridge area.
5. Mine and booby trap incidents increased noticeably during the latter part of the period. Large enemy sightings were observed in the "Charlie" Ridge area and Company H reported scattered sightings of small enemy units in the FOSTER area.

SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS1. Topics

a. Combat Mission Assigned. Occupy and defend assigned Tactical Area Of Responsibility (TAOR); conduct unilateral offensive operations and aggressive day/night patrolling and ambushing throughout the TAOR and, with approval, in the RZ; maintain maximum surveillance and interdiction of waterway access/egress routes into TAOR and of possible rocket sites located therein; prepare to conduct combined and coordinated operations with GVN forces within and beyond TAOR; provide alert forces and convoy escorts from squad to company size, as a reserve/alert force for operations anywhere in RVN; launch counterattacks against enemy penetrations in TAOR; conduct concentrated and sustained Civic Action and Psychological Warfare program in Revolutionary Development; coordinate with GVN officials to organize, train, advise and as necessary, initially provide combat skilled leadership to the Popular Forces in the form of Combined Action Units; and maintain security of vital lines of communications in coordination with GVN forces within TAOR.

d. Logistics(1) Construction

(a) Bunker Positions. Sand-bagged roofs were constructed on all bunkers.

(b) Ammo Bunkers. Company H and H&S Company installed partitions in their ammo bunkers to separate different types of ammo. Separate WP pits were constructed for all 81mm mortar pits.

(c) An Hoa. Improvement of the defensive positions of the An Hoa combat base progressed steadily. Special allowances have been requested to fill their needs.

(d) Trash Pit. A new trash pit was dug for this battalion to insure proper sanitation in this area.

(e) Water Tank. A new water tank will replace the old, inadequate tank on the water tower.

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(2) Supply. The supply situation remains satisfactory. The battalion supply support continues to include Company H and the An Hoa area which are included in the battalion's TAOR.

(3) Motor Transport. Two housekeeping trucks had accidents during the past month. One truck was involved in a head-on collision on Liberty Road and has since been repaired and is now in use. The other truck which overturned on Route 5 has been replaced.

(4) Mess Service. A new G.I. house is being requested through an Engineer Assistance request. The new G.I. house will improve the sanitation standards of this battalion's messhall.

(5) Command Material Inspection. The reinspection was held on 17 February. The reinspection was satisfactory with discrepancies.

e. Civil Affairs

(1) Refugees. During this month we have distributed materials to the refugees to help build their hamlets.

(2) Materials Distributed

(a) Two truckloads of ammo boxes for terrorist victims.

(b) One truckload of dunnage to refugees for local use.

(c) Three boxes of clothing distributed to Dai Loc (V).

(3) Serious Incidents. Serious incidents have decreased this month, there have been only four reported.

(4) Medcaps. Medcaps have been steady during the past month, 1,217 Vietnamese people were treated during the month of February.

(5) Projects. There were no projects initiated during the month.

f. Administration. No significant problems other than continued lack of MOS-trained clerical personnel.

g. Personnel. The battalion category of readiness is C-2. Total strength is 38 Marine Officers, 1155 Marine Enlisted, 3 Navy Officers, 57 Navy Enlisted.

h. Formal Training

(1) Orientation. All newly arrived personnel received intensive orientation and indoctrination, which included care, maintenance, safety instruction, familiarization and firing of the M16 rifle.

i. Communications. Radio Communications during the month of February were considered excellent, with the exception of mutual interference and a minor amount of enemy initiated deception. The main problem of interference stems from Army units operating in adjacent areas and tracked vehicles using stronger power output, which causes an override on frequencies. The minor amount of enemy deception that has occurred recently has in no way impaired the communications efficiency of the command. Security consciousness, strict adherence to radio procedures, and use of authentication successfully countered enemy deception.

j. Weather

(1) General. The weather conditions during the month of February continued to be favorable for military operations. The small amount of rainfall during the month was not significant to hamper logistical support. Rivers have receded and water standing in rice paddies is now shallow enough to allow tracked vehicles to maneuver in many sectors of the TAOR.

k. Intelligence

(1) Enemy Situation. 1-29 February. The enemy TET offensive continued into the early part of February. Units of this battalion continued to make significant contacts during this early period. Enemy retrograde movements took place through the "Charlie" Ridge area. Large sightings of the enemy along "Charlie" Ridge were observed between the 10th and 20th. It is believed that large VC/NVA units are regrouping and resupplying for another large offensive in the Danang area. In the meantime, local guerrillas have increased activity and have carried out

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the preponderance of the enemies activity within the 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines TAOR. It is believed that the B-20th Bn was reduced to 30% of its strength after the Danang offensive, and is presently located in the Go Noi Island area. There were continued reports of a battalion size unit located in the north central FOSTER area. The Q-14 Company and the Dai Loc Committee are also reported to be in the northeastern FOSTER area. The 402nd Sapper Battalion was reported to be in the southwestern portion of "Charlie" Ridge near Hill 52. The possibility of an attack on Dai Loc still exists.

(2) Since local guerrilla units have taken over the majority of enemy activity in the TAOR, a significant rise in guerilla tactics (i.e., mines, boobytrap and sniper/ambush) have been noted. These activities can be expected to continue until larger NVA/VC units have regrouped, resupplied and are able to support another large offensive in the Danang area.

(5) Terrain. The terrain of the 3rd Bn, 7th Marines TAOR is primarily flat, laced with open rice paddies throughout the eastern, central and southern sectors. The northern and southern limits of the

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TAOR are mountainous with heavy secondary vegetation and steep foothills. The two main rivers which flow through the central and southern sectors of the TAOR are the Song Vu Gia and the Song Thu Bon respectively. The principal terrain features of the TAOR are Hills 55, 37 and 65.

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m. Medical
