PART II

NAMERATIVE SUMMARY

- 1. The 3d Bn, 7th Marines continued operating in their TAOR to find, fix and destroy the enemy.
- 2. Company K went under the operational control of the 1st MarDiv on 5 August as an additional security force in the Danang area due to the threat of a third enemy offensive. Company I remained on Hill 65 as fire base security and conducted heavy and wide ranging patrols in their assigned AO. Company I also had the additional responsibility of sweeping and securing Route 14 west to Hill 52 on order. On 21 August, while searching the north bank of the Song Vu Gia, 1st Platoon, Company I found one VC KIA from a previous night ambush. They also found assorted clothing and a rice cache.
- 3. From 3 August to 8 August, Company L worked as a Sparrow Hawk/Bald Eagle with A/1/9, 1st Air Cavalry. The Sparrow Hawk was inserted twice, resulting in W/NVA confirmed killed. The Bald Eagle was on standby but was never inserted. On 9 August, Company L went under the operational control of 1st Bn, 7th Marines and operated in their TAOR. Company L returned to the operational control of the 3d Bn, 7th Marines on 21 August after conducting operations south of Liberty Bridge with 3d Bn, 5th Marines. On 22 August, Company L established their CP at Seabee Bridge (AT 913587) and began extensive patrolling in that area. Company M remained at Golden Gate Bridge (AT 967605) as bridge security and conducted extensive patrolling in that area. On 23 August, Company M ambushed an enemy force that was attempting to destroy Golden Gate Bridge. The result of the ambush was one VC/NVA KIA and 401bs. of C-4 captured.
- 4. On 29 August, Companies M and L were tasked with setting up a blocking force in the southwestern Dodge City area, vicinity AT 975575. While moving into position, they became engaged in heavy contact with a well entrenched enemy force. A sweep of the area resulted in 42 VC/NVA KIA, 4 IWC and 3 CSWC. The operation is continuing.







DECL SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. Topics

- a. Mission Assigned. Occupy and defend assigned Tactical Area of Resopnsibility (TAOR); conduct unilateral offensive operations and aggressive day/night patrolling and ambushing throughout the TAOR and with approval, in the RZ; maintain maximum surveillance and interdiction of waterway access/egress routes into TAOR and of possible rocket sites located therein; prepare to conduct combined and coordinated operations with GWN forces within and beyond TAOR; provide alert forces and convoy escorts from squad to commany size, as a reserve/alert force for operations anywhere in RVN; launch counterattacks against enemy penetrations in TAOR; conduct concentrated and sustained Civic Action and Psychological Warfare programs in Revolutionary Development; coordinate with GWN officals to organize, train, advise and, as necessary, initially provide combat skilled leadership to the Popular Forces in the form of Combined Action Units; maintain security of vital lines of communications in coordination with GWN forces within TAOR.

d. Logistics

(1) Construction

- (a) Four (h) engineer assistance requests have been submitted.
- (b) Nine (9) tent decks were completed.
- (c) A new trash pit was excavated.
- (d) One (1) ammo bunker is under repair and two (2) new ones are being built.

(2) Supply

(a) Supply status remains satisfactory.



(b) Starters, carburetors, oil seals and magneto repair kits for the M274A2 are on the critical shortage of repair parts list. Gas masks and AT-892 antennas are also in short supply.





(3) Motor Transport

(a) The Motor Transport status is satisfactory.

(4) Mess Services

- (a) Screening of the mess hall was initiated and is 75% complete.
 - (b) Rewiring of the mess hall is 40% complete.

e. Civil Affairs


(1) Materials Distributed

- (a) Tam Hoa (h), 3 coils of barb-wire.
- (b) Tam Hoa (h), 30 8 foot stakes.
- (c) Tam Hoa (h), 1 truck load of wood for school construction.
- (d) Tam Hoa (h), 400 lbs. of rice.
- (e) Cap 2-2-4, 2 truck loads of lumber to be distributed.
- (f) Dai Loc, I truck load of wood for church repair.
- (g) Dai Loc, 1 trailer load of dunnage for school repairs.
- (2) Serious Incidents. One Serious Incident Report was filed during this reporting period, the result of a fire mission in close proximity to a friendly village.
- (3) <u>MedCaps</u>. MedCaps increased significantly this month due to reduced field commitments. The MedCaps were held on a regular basis four times per week. A total of 625 people were treated. MedCap personnel also distributed 1,000 sanitation leaflets.
- (4) Projects. No new projects were initiated during the month of August. There are still three projects progressing in the CAAOR:
 A well located at Dai Loc is 35% completed; a market place at Tam Hoa
 (h) is 45% completed; and a school house at Tam Hoa (h) is 70% completed.
- f. Administration. Administrative support is satisfactory.
- g. Personnel. The battalion's category of readiness is C-2/C-1 for personnel. Total strength is 32 Marine Officers, 1104 Marine Enlisted, 3 Navy Officers, 55 Navy Enlisted.

h. Formal Training

(1) Orientation. All newly arrived personnel received intensive orientation and indoctrination, which included instruction in care, maintenance, safe handling, familiarization and firing of the M-16 rifle.

1. Communications

- (1) Communications for the month of August were satisfactory with minor radio interference. The primary cause for less radio interference this month is contributed to a change in the primary an dita frequency.
- (2) The problem with Radio-Relay operations still exists and is attributed to the overheating of generators. The loss of Radio-Relay causes this command to be without teletype capabilities.
- (3) Communications Platoon convened a three day school for the purpose of training company personnel in radio prodecures and operations.

Weather

- (1) General. Weather conditions during the month of August did not hinder logistical support. The temperature during the month did not make troop movement difficult. Sporadic thunder showers in the late afternoon helped keep the water level relatively constant.




Intelligence

(1) Enemy Situation, 1-31 August. Numerous low level agent reports indicate one battalion of the 31st Regiment, 341st Division operating in the foothills of the Charlie Ridge area to the west of Hill 65. A large contact involving "M" Co and "L" Co of 3/7 indicated the 1st Battalion of the 36th Regiment, 308th Division is in an area south of Hill 55 and north of Go Noi Island. It is also believed that the 38th Regiment and the rest of 36th Regiment are in an area southeast of Hill 55 and north of Go Noi Island. A POW indicated the R-20th Battalion is now located in the




- (1) Sunday and Weekday Worship Services were conducted in the battalion and throughout the 7th Marines TAOR. Attendance at these services was 58h.
 - (2) Eight Memorial Services were conducted with 250 attending.
- (3) One hundred and nine (109) personnel were visited while hospitalized.
- (4) Six (6) lectrues on Customs and Culture of the Vietnamese were given with 150 people attending.
 - (5) The Chaplain attended four (4) Division Chaplair's Meetings.
 - (6) Last Rites were administered to 9 USMI KIA.

p. Psychological Operations

- a. During the month of August the battalion has stressed the "Neward for Ordnance" there. A total of 7,500 reward leaflets were passed out by S-5 personnel, the rifle companies and vehicles traveling on Liberty Road and Route 5 North and South. The results of the reward program have been good as the following ordnance has been truned in to this command: three 60mm illumination rounds, two 60mm HE rounds, five 105mm rounds, six M26 grandes, one Claywore mine, one montar fuze, 100 rounds 5.56mm, 400 rounds 7.52mm, one U.S. gas mask and one U.S.
- b. Sixty-two (62) PsyMar air sorties were requested during the month in order to widely distribute Chieu Hoi leaflets throughout the TAGR.
