## PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

**General.** The 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines continued normal operations in their Tactical Area Of Responsibility (TAOR). This TAOR underwent two major changes during the month of January. Effective at 1600 on 18 January 1969 the northern boundary of the TAOR was revised to follow a trace along the Song Tuy Loan from Cobb Bridge west to the 72 grid line. At 1200 on 20 January 1969 the eastern boundary was extended to a trace 500 meters east of the Song Yen running north-south from the Song Tuy Loan to the 67 grid line. As a result of these boundary changes Co I, 3/7 was relocated on Hill 10, and assumed responsibility for the platoon combat base, Tug Boat, in vicinity AT969689 and the extended portion of the TAOR east of the Song Yen. Co I, 3/7 continued to provide security for Cobb Bridge and in addition one platoon patrolled the Lau Chau's. Co K, 3/7 remained on Hill 41 and continued their aggressive patrolling of the Duyen Son's, the Phu Son's and the foothills of Charlie Ridge. Co L, 3/7 operated from Hill 10 and patrolled the area south of the Song Tuy Loan, An Tan Ridge, the Dong Bich's, and also provided the CP security platoon for the 7th Marine Regiment from 1-15 January 1969. Co M, 3/7 operated from Hill 10, constantly patrolling the Bo Bans and the Duong Lam's, and also manned Mike Tower. Elements from Co I, Co K, and H&S Company provided security for daily road sweeps within the TAOR.

**Specific.** On 1 January 1969, Co M, 3/7 in conjunction with a platoon of National Police Field Forces (NPF) conducted a coordinated sweep in vicinity AT924683. While searching a suspected VC bunker they received small arms fire and ChiCom grenades from a hidden compartment within the bunker. Elements of Co M, 3/7 returned fire resulting in 02 VC-KIA. A continued search of the area revealed 06-82mm rounds, 05 ChiCom grenades, 01 AK-47, and a pair of NVA field glasses. Later the same date a squad patrol from Co K, 3/7 uncovered a rice cache totaling 1000 pounds in vicinity AT948660.

Early in the morning of 4 January 1969 a squad patrol from Co K, 3/7 observed a group of enemy moving southwest in vicinity AT949650. The squad set up a hasty ambush and engaged the enemy with M-60 and M-16 fire, and called an artillery fire mission on the enemy position. The enemy broke contact and was observed fleeing in all directions. A search of the area netted 09 NVA packs filled with rice plus numerous drag marks and blood trails.

Also, on 4 January 1969, Co M, 3/7 in conjunction with a platoon of NPF conducted a coordinated sweep in vicinity AT937678. The results of the sweep were 1500 pounds of rice captured and 04 tunnels destroyed.

On 5 January 1969 a squad ambush from Co M, 3/7 observed 04 enemy moving through the barrier in vicinity AT919679. The squad engaged the enemy at close range with M-16's and M-79's resulting in 01 NVA-KIA.

ENCLOSURE (1)

On 8 January 1969 a squad patrol from Co L, 3/7 observed 03 VC moving west at grid AT888704. The VC were well camouflaged and moving away from the patrol. The patrol immediately engaged the enemy with M-60, M-16, and M-79 fire resulting in 01 VC-KIA.

On 10 January 1969 and 12 January 1969, Co K, 3/7 in conjunction with a platoon of NPFF conducted coordinated sweeps in vicinity AT952673 and AT956666. The two sweeps resulted in a total of 4000 pounds of rice captured.

On 14 January 1969 a squad ambush from Co K, 3/7 opened fire on 03 enemy, resulting in 01 NVA-KIA and 01 .45 Cal. pistol captured. Later the same day a squad patrol from Co K, 3/7 was conducting a search in vicinity AT929672 and uncovered an enemy cache containing 2000 pounds of rice.

At 1400 on 15 January 1969, the Third Platoon of Co L, 3/7 returned from their assignment as OP security platoon for the 7th Marine Regiment and reverted to OPCON of 3/7.

On 17 January 1969 Co K, 3/7 in conjunction with a platoon of NPFF conducted a coordinated sweep in vicinity AT944637. The sweep resulted in the capture of a K-44 sniper rifle with a 3 power scope and 1800 pounds of rice.

On 18 January 1969 Co I, 3/7 was relocated on Hill 10, and effective at 1600 3/7's northern boundary of the TAOR was revised to follow a trace along the Song Tuy Loan from Cobb Bridge west to the 72 grid line.

On 19 January 1969 a squad ambush from Co K, 3/7 observed a large enemy force moving northeast in vicinity AT948640. The squad engaged the enemy with M-60's and M-16's, and called in an 81mm fire mission on the enemy position. The enemy broke contact and fled to the northwest where they were ambushed about 30 minutes later by another squad (K22) from Co K, 3/7. K22 engaged the enemy at close range with M-60's, M-16's, M-79's, and hand grenades, and also called in 81mm and 105mm fire missions. Once again the enemy broke contact and were observed fleeing in all directions. The results of a search of the two areas of contact were 06 NVA-KIA, 02 NVA POW's, 03 140mm rockets, plus numerous blood trails and drag marks.

On 20 January 1969 the eastern boundary of 3/7's TAOR was extended to a trace 500 meters east of the Song Yen running north-south from the Song Tuy Loan to the 67 grid. A platoon from Co I, 3/7 was relocated on the platoon patrol base, Tug Boat, and assumed responsibility for patrolling the new portion of the TAOR east of the Song Yen.

On 20 January 1969 the road sweep security from Co K, 3/7 detected a wire running from Route 5 in vicinity AT935630. While investigating the origin of this wire the Marines spotted 03 VC and immediately engaged the enemy pursuing them to the foothills of Charlie Ridge killing 02 VC, and capturing a carbine rifle.

Also on 20 January 1969 while conducting a sweep in vicinity AT925675 a squad patrol from Co M, 3/7 observed 04 VC running from a hootch. The patrol engaged the enemy with small arms resulting in 01 VC-KIA.

On 22 January 1969 a squad ambush from Co K, 3/7 observed 12-15 enemy moving north in vicinity AT945648. The squad waited for the enemy to come into the killing zone then triggered the ambush with M-60 and M-16 fire. 81mm and 105mm blocking fires were called in to prevent the enemy from escaping. A search of the area resulted in 03 NVA-KIA, 01 AK-47, 03 ChiCom grenades, and 03 60mm rounds captured.

On 24 January 1969 a squad ambush from Co M, 3/7 observed 02 enemy moving toward their ambush site. They opened fire with M-60's and M-16's killing 01 VC. A sweep of area turned up 01 B-40 rocket round.

On 24 January 1969, Co M, 3/7 in conjunction with a platoon of NPFF conducted a coordinated sweep in vicinity AT925685. The sweep uncovered an enemy arms cache of 07 B-40 rocket rounds, 09 60mm rounds, 10 ChiCom grenades, 01 box of blasting caps, and 01 box of blasting powder.

Later on 24 January 1969 a squad ambush from Co M, 3/7 observed approximately 15 enemy moving east in vicinity AT921677. The squad engaged the enemy at close range with M-60's, M-16's, M-79's and called in an 81mm fire mission on the enemy position. A reaction squad from Mike Tower was dispatched to aid in a sweep of the kill zone. The results of this contact were 05 NVA-KIA and 03 AK-47's captured.

On 27 January 1969 a platoon ambush from Co K, 3/7 observed 10 enemy moving east to west in vicinity AT922630. The platoon aggressively engaged the enemy at a distance of 10 meters with small arms, claymores, LAAW's and hand grenades. The results of this action were 03 NVA-KIA, 02 NVA-POW's, 01 AK-47, and 01 NVA pistol captured.

On the morning of 31 January 1969 the flank security for a platoon ambush from Co K, 3/7 observed 02 enemy moving south in vicinity AT918637. They engaged the enemy at a distance of 50 meters with M-16 fire killing 01 NVA and capturing an AK-47.

In the afternoon of 31 January 1969, Co M, 3/7, in conjunction with a platoon of NPFF, conducted a coordinated sweep in vicinity AT930675. This sweep discovered an enemy cache containing 12 60mm rounds, and destroyed 39 enemy bunkers.

Later the same afternoon a squad patrol from Co L, 3/7 while sweeping the area in vicinity AT893698 uncovered an enemy cache. This cache contained 24 60mm rounds, 06 fuses, 01 ChiCom grenade, 04 AK-47 magazines, assorted NVA equipment and medical supplies. The same patrol spotted 06 VC moving NW in vicinity AT888702. 81mm and 105mm fire missions were called on the enemy position resulting in 01 VC-KIA.

#### SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

##### 1. Topics

a. Mission Assigned. Occupy and defend Tactical Area Of Responsibility (TAOR); conduct unilateral offensive operations and aggressive day/night patrols and ambushes throughout the TAOR and with approval, in the RZ. Maintain maximum surveillance and interdiction of waterway access/egress routes into TAOR and of possible Rocket Sites located therein. Locate, capture, or destroy enemy forces attempting to move material or rockets into the Rocket Belt. Prepare to conduct combined and coordinated operations with GVN forces, within and beyond TAOR; provide alert forces and convoy escorts from squad to company size, as a reserve/alert force for operations anywhere in RVN; launch counter attacks against enemy penetrations in TAOR; conduct concentrated and sustained Civic Action and Psychological Warfare programs in Revolutionary Development; maintain security of vital lines of communications in coordination with GVN forces within TAOR.

##### d. Logistics

###### (1) Construction

- (a) Four Engineer Assistance requests were submitted this month.
- (b) The new Battalion Aid Station was completed.
- (c) Thirty-nine urinoils were delivered to this command by the 1st Engineer Battalion.
- (d) The Battalion Laundry was repaired and made fully operational.
- (e) Twenty-one SEA Huts were constructed for this Battalion on Hill 10.



(2) Supply

(a) The supply situation remains generally acceptable; however, items for motor transport, and office supplies are in short supply with long periods existing between time of requisition and delivery.

(b) The Division Ordnance Inspection was conducted with no discrepancies noted.

(c) The Division Supply and Fiscal Inspections were conducted with minor discrepancies noted.

(3) Motor Transport

(a) The Division Motor Transport Inspection was conducted with minor discrepancies noted.

(4) Messhall

(a) The Messhall status remains satisfactory.

e. Civil Affairs(1) Materials Distributed

(a) One-hundred School Kits for school at Thuoc Dong.

(b) Four-hundred School Kits to orphans at Battalion Medcaps.

(c) One-hundred School Kits to orphans at Hoa Loc (V).

(d) Two-hundred School Kits for school at Dunog Lam.

(e) One Carpenter Kit to First Church of Christ at Duong Lam (H).

(f) Eighty ammo boxes to First Church of Christ at Duong Lam.

(g) Two Carpenter Kits at Cam Toai Tay.

(h) Two Masonary Kits at Cam Toai Tay.

(i) Two-hundred and fifty ammo boxes for school furniture at Cam Toai Tay.

(j) Four-hundred School Kits for school at Goc Kha (H).

(k) Ten pounds of fertilizer and various seeds for agricultural project at Cam Toai Tay.

(2) Serious Incidents. This month there were three serious incidents involving command investigation resulting from friendly fire power and from non-operational circumstances. All of these were thoroughly investigated and proper action was taken on all of these incidents.

(3) Medcap. This month the Medcap unit of this Battalion treated one-thousand three-hundred eighty-one (1,381) Vietnamese in this Battalion's CAAOR. There were no Dentcaps this month but a schedule was set up for next month.

(4) Projects. This month the Battalion was involved in three projects. The first was an agricultural project at Cam Toai Tay which was steadily progressing and had the complete support of the people. The second was a Health and Sanitation Project at Cam Toai Tay, which was initiated by the 29th CA Platoon at Division. The third was a school at Cam Toai Tay, which was almost completed and should be open to students in the very near future.

f. Administration. Administrative support was satisfactory.

g. Personnel. The Battalion's category of readiness was C-2 for personnel. The total end of month strength was 35 Marine Officers, 1027 Marine Enlisted, 3 Navy Officers, and 55 Navy Enlisted. Total 1120.

#### h. Formal Training

(1) Orientation. All newly joined personnel received intensive orientation and indoctrination, which included instruction in care, maintenance, safe handling, familiarization and firing of the M-16 rifle.

(2) Personnel of the Battalion, in the numbers indicated, attended the following schools:

(3) An NCO School is conducted on the Battalion level weekly for Lance Corporals, Corporals, Sergeants, and those Private First Class assigned to an NCO billet.

#### i. Communications

(1) Communications for the month of January was satisfactory.

(2) A new lightweight manpack radar set (PPS-10) was tested and a report was submitted to G-3 Training.

(3) Division held a Command Material-Management Inspection. The Communication Platoon's rating was satisfactory with noteworthy remarks on the GOC and the construction and operation of the Message Center.

j. Weather

(1) General. The weather conditions in the area during the month of January continued to be favorable for military operations. Logistical support was not hampered by the weather during this period. Rainfall for the month was considerably less than had been anticipated.

k. Intelligence

(1) Enemy Situation 1-31 January. The capture of enemy personnel and equipment indicated the continued presence in our TAOR of the 31st Regiment, 341st Division and the 368B Regiment (Rocket/Artillery). Company-size cordon and search operations in conjunction with the National Police Field Forces proved to be an effective means of locating the enemy's supply caches. These searches yielded a large volume of rice that the enemy could ill-afford to lose.

On the 19th Kilo Company captured two POW's from the 31st Regiment. They pointed out their infiltration route from their base camp (AT850653) to a rest area (AT920632) and into a staging area in the lowlands (Phu Son 1) where rice and rockets were allegedly stored. On the 20th, Mike Company killed a VC carrying documents which were coded by replacing certain words with a letter and number combination. On the 27th, Kilo Company found a notebook in the kill zone of a successful ambush in which two wounded POW's were taken. This notebook apparently had belonged to the CO of the K 82nd Sapper Company. It listed the substitution code for the combinations utilized in the documents captured by Mike. This "N" Code identified villages in this area by the letter "N" followed by a number. It was utilized frequently in other documents captured in this area but had not been previously deciphered. Intelligence information is still being extracted from this notebook and other documents captured on the 27th.

(2) There was an increase in booby trap incidents during the month. The surprise firing devices were most often encountered in the Bo Ban area (AT9569, AT9669), Sherwood Forest area (AT8969) and the Phuoc Ninh area (AT9267). On the 22nd of January nine Vietnamese civilians were kidnapped from Cam Toai Tay (H) in the vicinity of (AT924689). Another kidnapping took place on the 23rd when six civilians were kidnapped from the vicinity of (AT927687). There was no political significance attached to the kidnappings and it is believed the people were taken to serve as laborers.

(5) Terrain. The terrain of the 3d Battalion, 7th Marines TAOR is primarily mountainous in the western portion, broken by Happy Valley, Mortar Valley, and Leech Valley. Vegetation here is generally quite heavy. The remaining eastern portion is flat with occasional small hills, laced with rice paddies and tree lines. The primary rivers in the TAOR are the Song Tuy Leon which is the northern boundary of the TAOR, and the Song Yen which forms a portion of the eastern boundary of the TAOR.

m. Medical

(1) General. No serious outbreaks of illness were encountered in the Battalion.

(2) Evacuations. Casualty evacuation remains satisfactory.

- (3) Supply. Medical supplies are adequate.

- (5) BAS completed their move into a newly constructed area.
- (6) Sanitation. Sanitation of the Battalion area improved. Formal sanitation inspections were held once weekly on all cantonments.

n. Chaplain

- (1) Thirty-three worship services were held in the battalion area and out-lying CAP units. Attendance at these services was 408. Of these services, ten were services of Holy Communion, attendance: 124.
- (2) Two memorial services were conducted with eighty persons attending.
- (3) Sixty-two persons were visited in the DaNang hospitals.
- (4) Indoctrination lectures and moral guidance discussion groups: eight, with 108 attending.
- (5) Chaplain attended five Division Chaplain's training sessions.
- (6) Counselling and guidance interviews: thirty.
- (7) American Red Cross cases: nine.
- (8) Additional activities included the answering of five letters of inquiry; four overnight visits to out-lying hills; the distribution of ninety books and twenty-nine gift boxes and packages; and the regular meeting of the Battalion Watch and Action Committee.

o. Command and Control

- (1) The Third Battalion, Seventh Marines remained under the operational and administrative control of the Seventh Marines.
- (2) 3d Platoon, Co L, 3/7 was returned to the OPCON of 3d Battalion, 7th Marines on 15 January 1969.

p. Psychological Operations

- (1) During the month of January the total amount of leaflets distributed by this battalion were as follows: 4,100 Chieu Hoi; 9,776 Rewards; 1,550 Pro GVN; 1,266 Ban Tin Newspapers; and 300 report V. C. Cadre.
- (2) There were 4 HB broadcast operations. The first broadcast was 13 January in exploitation of the detonation of a VC/NVA booby trap by a

Vietnamese child. The second broadcast on 16 January was utilized to exploit a Viet Cong terrorist incident involving the indiscriminate B-40 rocketing of Goc Kha (AT943663) and also to get the populace of Duyen Son (AT953663) to evacuate the hamlet. The third broadcast on 20 January was utilized to exploit rockets captured by this Battalion on 19 January. The fourth broadcast on 21 January was in reference to Rice Denial.

(3) Total number air leaflet drops requested were 22. Total leaflets dropped were 564,000. Themes utilized were Chieu Hoi, rallying instructions, safe conduct passes, rocket rewards, and reporting VC mines. Nine tapes were requested. The tapes requested were used as back-ups on Chieu Hoi Drops.

(4) The HE Team from 7th Psyops Battalion was utilized four times, primarily in reference to Civic Action Psyops. On 3, 10, and 17 January, a total of nine movies were shown at the An Phouc School at Hieu Duc with a total attendance of 100 people. Six films were devoted to Health and Sanitation and three to Pro-GVN. 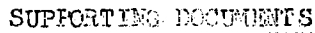
