PART II NARRATIVE SUMMARY

GENERAL. Assigned responsibility for conducting unilateral and combined operations in the Western portion of the 7th Marines Tactical Area of Responsibility, the 3rd Battalion conducted operations from Fire Support Base ROSS (BT023342) to which it had moved in the beginning of October. Having established the CP at Fire support Base ROSS the battalion deployed its companies in specific areas of responsibility to execute particular missions assigned. Extensive combat patrolling and rice denial activities were carried out by all the companies which at various times were located in the area known as the "slot" Vic (BT0341) and in the low-lands and foothills to the west and northwest of FSB ROSS. A "fixed" mission was security for Fire Support Base Rider (BT946345) at which location training was accomplished by all companies as they rotated through this location.

The first eight days of the month saw companies K, L and M and the Battalion CP in intermittent contact with the 2nd Battalion of the 36th NVA Regiment while Co I provided security for FSB Rider. As the month progressed both Co I and Co L participated in the First Marine Division's "Stack Arms" program. Upon its return, Co L deployed to FSB RIDER, relieving Co M of the defensive responsibilities. By the end of the month all companies had an opportunity to work with the various PF activities operating directly west of FSB ROSS. The month ended with planning and coordination complete for the Battalion's return to LZ BALDY.

SPECIFIC. On 1 November 1969 Co L was beli-lifted from and relieved of the responsibility for the security of the "ROCKCRUSHER" (BT108429). The company was inserted at BT001427 to assist Companies K and M in screening for a sweep conducted by the 3rd Battalion of the 51st ARVN Brigade. Co F 2/7 was placed under the operational control of 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines to provide security for both the "ROCKCRUSHER" and Route 535.

At 0055 on the morning of the first, the lines of Co I's CP located at 987307 spotted one person moving outside the perimeter. Upon challenge by a sentry the man made no response, but ducked behind a bush. The sentry opened fire hitting the man in the head, upperleft arm and leg. Investigation revealed the casualty was a Corpsman who had apparently been returning from a head call outside the lines. He later succumbed to the head wound.

At 1015 the same day a squad reconnaissance patrol from 2nd Platoon Co I, while in the vicinity of AT957305, spotted 05 NVA/VC moving west in a treeline to their front. The squad opened fire causing the enemy to flee to the soughwest. A sweep of the area revealed one enemy killed and several blood trails, as well as one civilian wounded who had taken shelter in the line of fire behind the five NVA/VC. He was treated by a corpsman. Following the blood trails produced one additional enemy KIA.

Approximately two hours later, at noon, a squad of the 2nd Platoon Company M while on a daytime patrol found three booby traps at BTOhhhl7. The booby traps, all tin cans about 3½ inches tall and 2 inches in diameter, were of the pressuredetonated type, and had been hurled in the trail prior to being revealed by heavy rains. They were destroyed in place.

That afternoon around 1430, the same platoon while refilling their canteens in the vicinity of BTO16416, had one Marine detonate a chi-com booby trap which had been set in the stream bank. The casualty received shrappel in the left calf.

That evening the Battalion CP was located near Co K's position between the coordinates 998412 - 999428. At 1845 they recieved fourteen to sixteen rounds of 82mm mortar fire which were walked up the slope, over the crest and down the other side of the hill. Three rounds landed in or near three fighting holes resulting in two friendly killed and twelve wounded. Counter-mortar fire was fixed by a section of the Battalian's 81mm mortars with the CP, the 60mm mortars of both Co K and Co L (who had just been heli-lifted to the vicinity) as well as 105mm howitzers located at FSB ROSS.

On the 2nd of November in the vicinity of 979314 Co I's 2nd Platoon spotted five personnel walking in a column from northeast to southwest. A 60mm mortar fire mission was called in but produced negative results.

At 1230 on the fourth of November a squad from the second platoon of Co M while set in a daytime position at 032417 observed five NVA/VC 200 meters away, dressed in black, moving northwest. The Marines set up a base of fire with a machine gun and small arms. A 105mm fire mission was called. The impact area was swept thoroughly revealing two enemy killed by artillery, and one killed by small arms. On the three bodies 500,000 Piastres and approximately ten documents, bearing an unknown seal, and written in Vietnamese and Chinese were found.

Activities on the 5th of November commenced at 0645 when Marines from Co I's 2nd Platoon moving to a blocking position spotted four NVA/VC carrying packs and AK-47:s, moving northeast to southwest. The platoon opened fire killing one enemy immediately. His companions managed to elude pursuit. The casualty had one pack, one AK-47, one helmet and various documents on his person.

Later, at 0815, a Co M activity on patrol in the vicinity of 050415 observed one NVA/VC with pack and AK-50. He was killed by small arms fire.

At 0850, the first platoon of Co M was taken under automatic weapons fire near BT050405. The patrol's return fire resulted in one NYA/VC killed. While sweeping the area of the action the platoon observed five NYA/VC approximately 200 meters east walking in a rice paddy. The patrols subsequent small arms fire chased the enemy toward a village. A further sweep of the village resulted in the capture of one NYA/VC, while another was trapped in a cave. A fragmentation grenade was thrown into the cave resulting in one more enemy killed. The detainee was returned to the Battalion rear.

The 2nd platoon of Co M had moved to BTO501.05 by 1010 that morning when they spotted one NVA/VC dressed in green khaki with a pack and cartridge belt. He was approximately 50 meters to the north and moving from east to west. Small arms resulted in one NVA/VC killed.

Company K's let Platoon reached 046395 by 1310 and observed one NVA/VC with an AK-47 sitting along the trail. He was shot and killed.

At 1330 on 6 November 1969, while in daytime position, Co L observed one NVA/VC moving in a southerly direction carrying rifles and packs camouflaged with brush.







The 3rd Platoon of Co L called in and observed both a 60mm mortar and a 155mm Howitzer fire mission. Upon sweeping the area the 3rd Platoon discovered one NVA/VC killed by artillery wearing an NVA uniform and carrying assorted documents. A second sighting of 10 additional NVA/VC was then made resulting in another 105mm and 155mm fire mission. The subsequent sweep uncovered 400lbs. of rice and two USMC water containers. Fifteen personnel found in the area were detained and sent along with the rice to the Battalion rear.

At 1705 the same afternoon the rear element of Co. I's 2nd Platoon, then located at 985326, observed five NVA/VC with packs, helmets, and weapons moving north. Simultaneously, the point element spotted two NVA/VC moving across their front. Both elements opened up on the enemy at the same time. The point captured one NVA/VC while the rear elements target fled. Sweeps conducted in the area of both sightings produced no further results.

On the 7th November at 0850 in the vicinity of BT038413 the second Platoon of Co. L on daytime patrol spotted one NVA/VC advancing toward them. They took him under fire wounding him in the right thigh and left calf. POW was evacuated to Battalion rear. He had in his possession one pack with assorted personal gear which had veen camouflaged with brush.

At 1555 that afternoon Marines from Co M while patrolling near 993305 observed four NVA/WC (300 meters away) dressed in black and carrying packs and weapons. The Marines fired small arms resulting in one enemy killed and causing the others to flee to the north.

On the 9th of November Co M was heli-lifted to LZ RIDER to provide security for Battery H, 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines which was providing supporting fires for the 1st Battalion, 7th Marines.

The following evening at 1810 the 2nd Platoon of Co L while in a night time position at ATO22400 observed 15 NVA/VC with weapons in the vicinity of ATO13396. An 81mm mortar and 105mm Howitzer fire mission was called , while observing the mission the 2nd Platoon received ten 60mm mortar rounds. No friendly casualties were sustained, but the friendly missions were repeated. A flare bird was requested, a sweep of the area was made, but nothing was found.

On the 11 November at 0800 Co L 3rd Platoon, upon entering a village near ATO50415 observed two NVA/VC fleeing to their fromt. A squad was dispatched to pursue the one enemy who fled down a trail, but returned without finding him. The other enemy had fled to a bunker into which hand grenade was thrown resulting in one female enemy killed. She was wearing a green NVA utility shirt and black pajamas trousers. A search of the bunker produced assorted U.S. medical gear, two USMC cartridge belts, one M-26 hand grenade, one NVA messkit, one NVA flag and assorted documents.

That same morning at 0815 a squad from 2nd Platoon Co I while on patrol in the vicinity of AT998336 observed seven personnel fleeing north from a village. Ewo were carrying packs and three had weapons. The squad opened fire. A search of the area revealed three packs, two dead NVA/VC and one NVA/VC detained with another pack. This pack contained medical gear, a hammock, and various personal items. The dead enemy was approximately 50 yrs old, in good physical condition and well fed.

At 1400, a squad from the 2nd platoon, Co M, while set to at AT970338 observed four NVA/VC working in a rice paddy in the vicinity of AT941339. One NVA/VC remained in the bordering treeline and carried a weapon to provide security for the other three. A 105mm fire mission was called during which all four personnel fled into the treeline. After the mission was completed, two personnel emerged from the treeline and carried away two dead.

On 12 November at 1300 a five ton truck from Battery K, 4th Battalion, 11th Marines stationed at FSB ROSS hit a fourty pound box mine at BT095409. The explosion resulted in 04 USMC WTA, two emergency and two priority medevacs. The truck was destroyed.

Later that same day at 1550 the Co M artillery forward observer while sitting in a daytime position at AT949364 observed three NVA/VC, wearing packs, working in a rice paddy at AT960319. A 105mm Howitzer fire mission was called and resulted in one NVA/VC KIA.

On the 15th of November at 1840 a squad from 2nd Plateon Co I, while moving to a night time ambush position at BTO2/394, observed 12 enemy moving toward the east. They were taken under fire. During a sweep of the area, one dead NVA/VC and one AX-47 were found. The remaining enemy fled to the south.

Marines from Co K at 1410 on the 16th spotted suspicious movement near a hootch in the vicinity of AT994340. They set up a 360 perimeter, and searched the hootch finding a tunnel beneath a tran door in the floor. CS gas was empleyed causing two personnel to flee from the tunnel's rear entrance. These two, plus two additional personnel found nearby were detained. The tunnel was found to centain 700 lbs of unpolished rice, clothes, medical gear and diary.

Co I Marines, while moving to a hill top at BTO29412 later that afternoon, observed one NVA/VC. Fe was taken under fire but fled northward. The point men moved to the top of the hill and spotted two more NVA/VC moving up the side of a hill 300 meters to his front. Again the enemy was taken under fire by small arms, M-79, RM-191 resulting in two NVA/VC killed. One of these was apparently an officer as he was carrying a 9mm pistol and had numerous documents. The other carried personal gear and two chi-com grenades. Both wore green utilities and one had NVA helmet.

While on a daytime patrol, on the 18th of November in the vicinity of BTO38440 at 1630 in the afternoon, a squad from Co I's 3rd Platoon came across a barbed wire and bamboo barrier astride a trail. The barrier was 12s feet tall by 7 feet wide and the wire was not rusted. It was removed from the trail and destroyed. A search of the area revealed nothing further.

On the 20th, Marines of Co M spotted eight NVA/VC while patrolling the area near AT969353. An AO was requested and upon arrival directed fire from 105mm Howitzers and 81mm mortars. One dead NVA/VC with pack was found in the impact area.

A 1200 pound cache of rice was found by Co K at 98833% on the 21st about 1800 in the evening. The rice was placed in a central location and was retrograded.

At the same time Co I's 3rd Plateen was moving along a daytime patrol rouge at BTO49425 when the scout-sniper team observed four WYA/VC rice carriers with large packs moving across their front. Four rounds were fired by the team resulting in one NVA/VC KIA. Als pack contained only sleeping and mess gear.

Later that night at 2215 00 m, seeping the area of an archier fire mission at TTC13366, observed three NVA/VC crossing their front. The encry were engaged with small arms. The subsequent sweet discovered are dead NVA/VC carrying a 9mm pistol and medical gear. The casualty was dressed in green utilities with a blue shirt as were his companions who escaped. Some distance from the body an

On the 22nd, Co M had moved to BT025398 and by 1400 was located for the evening. One Marine picked up a long pole with which to build a small shelter. The pole when picked up detonated a M-26 grenade causing six USMC wounded. Further inspection of the area uncovered no additional booby traps.

At 1710 that afternoon the H&S security patrol, conducting a normal security patrol near FSB ROSS discovered five tunnels, all measuring 3 feet high by 10 feet long by 5 feet wide, located at BT016335, 018336, 024336, and 039337. They were all blown with C-4. The patrol then discovered 300 meters of trench line at BT024330. All these works indicated the enemy had been active closer to FSB ROSS than previously determined.

On the morning of the 23rd at 0815 in the vicinity of BT025385 Co M's 1st Platoon spotted four NVA/VC wearing black pajamas and carrying packs and weapons. The enemy, sighting the Marines at the same time, opened fire. The Marines returned the fire and advanced toward the treeline. Three bunkers were found into which grenades were thrown resulting in one enemy dead. This enemy was approximately 25 years old, were black pajamas and had no pack or weapons. A further search of the area produced no additional findings.

At 1000 in the afternoon the 2nd Platoon from I Co while patroling near BT042453 spotted one NVA/VC wearing green utilities, NVA helmet and pack heading across their front 400 meters away. They opened up with small arms and closed on the area of the sighting where they found en NVA helmet and one blood trail. A sweep of the vicinity with a scout dog team flushed the NVA/VC who when he attempeted to fire on the Marines with an M-16 was killed by the dog and his handler.

Co M's 1st Platoon was emroute to the CP (around 1930) with five detainees when they were taken under fire by enemy sniper at BT020385. The fire came from about 100 meters to the east and caused one USMC casualty (who was not evacuated). A 105 mm fire mission was called, after which the Marines closed on the impact area. One enemy attempted to flee from the treeline and was killed by small arms.

On the 26th of November Co K's resupply was to be dropped by C-130 at AT980339. One of the pallets landed about 1000 meters to the north. A platoon was dispatched to secure the gear, but on arriving at the scene at 1600 found only the net and an empty pallet. A sweep of the area produced no results. The Marines then came under fire by an enemy sniper. The fire was returned and the patrol proceeded to the CP. The CP meanwhile had observed five NVA/VC carrying cases of combat rations moving to the south. A 105mm fire mission was called, but a later sweep produced negative results.

Around 1800 on the 25th, Co L's Commander was returning with security to FSB ROSS. At AT999353 the lead tank in a convoy of two tanks and two amtracs hit a mine. The tank burst into flame and was immediately destroyed by exploding internal ordance. The action resulted in two USMC killed and two USMC wounded (priority medevace).

At 0625 on the morning of the 27th of November the northeastern road sweep leaving FSB ROSS found an ammunition box buried in a mud puddle in the middle of the road. The box contained twenty pounds of C-4 with a pressure dehonator and a blasting cap. It was blown in place with & 1b of C-4.

Proceeding down the road the sweet team was soon appreached by a Vietnamese who gave them a can marked calcium chloride containing 1.5 lbs of an undetermined high-explosive. The can was destroyed with C-4 and the boy was paid 2000 plasters.

At 1130 that merning Co M's 3rd Platoon was moving to a new position when they observed 15-20 NVA/VC wearing black pajamas and yellow khakis moving east at BTO37412. A 105mm mission was called after which the Marines immediately searched the area. They found 19 packs each containing 50 lbs of unpolished rice. In addition they discovered one chi-com granade, an NVA helmet and various documents.

Meanwhile, Co M's 2nd Plateon had reached their daytime position at BT017401 when they spotted three personnel some distance away standing in a treeline. A 105 mm fire mission was called and three bodies were observed lying in the rice paddy for 30 minutes.

The road sweep which left FSB ROSS on the 28th at 0845 found one M-33 grenade booby trap under a bridge located at 38035344. The M-33 was intended to be deterated by a trip wire and was blown in place with C-4.

Later, around 1100, the same sweep team found a 70 lb box mine at ET078387. The detonation device was removed and returned to LZ BALDY for examination by S-2 personnel.

At 1645 in the afternoon the point man of So M*s third platoon moving along a trail at ATO38413 observed a wire entwined around his right leg. Reacting immediately the Marine took successful evasive action to avoid the explosion of an M-26 booby trap.

On the afternoon of the 29th at 1725, Co I observed a CH-46 explode high in the air, break apart and plunge to earth at 977348. The chase helicopter immediately landed nearby and picked up one body before proceeding to LZ BALDY. More helicopters, soon arrived at the scene and Co I (-) was heli-lifted to the site of the wreckage to provide security. A search resulted in finding six additional bodies accounting for all those aboard at the time of the accident. The following morning a safety team arrived at the site, inspected the wreckage and caused its removal.

on the 30th at 0700, 200 meters outside the front gate at FSB EOSS, the road sweep team found a box mine burisd in the right track of the road. It was blown in place resulting in a hole six feet long, six feet wide, and four feet deep

d. Intelligance

(1) Enemy Situation: (1 - 30 November 1969). During the month, of November, the enemy appears to have reacted to the 3rd Battalion's presence in the area by going underground or by withdrawing. Reduced enemy sightings in 3/7's area, coupled with increased sightings and contacts in areas to the west, indicates that the enemy has reduced his activity within the AO. However, the incidence of booby traps and read mines has increased during the month, indicating that the enemy's guarvilla activities in the area have also increased. This increase in booby traps and read mines was not unexpected because it was felt that the enemy would be forced to resort to basic guarvilla techniques as the friendly forces increased their operating effectiveness in the area. The enemy's principal unit in this area, the 36th Regiment of the 2nd NVA Division, is still located and operating in the northwestern portion of the 3rd Battalion's AO. The following major sightings and incidents occured within the AO during the month:

Generally the terrain is composed of flat land with occasional small hills in all but the western and northwestern sectors which are character— ized by low foothills developing finally into heavily vegetated mountains. Rivers and roads in the TAOR are fordable and passable except during the monsoon seasons.

g. Organization and Operations

- (1) Command and Control. The 3rd Battalion was under the operational control of the 7th Marine Regiment from 1-30 November 1969.
- (2) Significant Operations Conducted. Three companies plus the "jump CP" were committed to action against the 2nd Battalion, 36th NVA Regiment from 1-8 November. After that, the companies generally worked within assigned Company AO's which were rotated occasionally. Two companies completed the Battalion's participation in the "Stack Arms" Program.

(3) Artillery support.

- (a) 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines remained in direct support of the 7th Marine Regiment.
- (b) Battery "G", 3/11, supported the 3rd Battalion from FSB MSS during November. Fire Support was also received from Battery "I", 3/11, when the 3rd Battalion was operating in the Northwestern portion of the AO.
- (c) Battery "K", 1/13, located at FSB ROSS was in general support and provided reinforcing fires for Battery "G".
- (d) Additional reinforcing fires were also provided by the 1st 8" Howitzer SP Battery (Platoon "B")
- (e) During the month of November, artillery units provided close and continuous fire support to the 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines. Because inclement weather prevailed during part of the month, close air support was minimal and artillery provided the majority of the supporting fires.

h. Formal Training

(1) All personnel joining the Battalion received a five day extensive orientation and indoctrination course, which included instructions in the care, maintenance, safe handling, familiarization and firing of the M-16 rifle on both the day and night firing ranges. They also fired the M-79 grenade launcher and the M-60 machine gun for familiarization on the day range and received instruction in the detection, neutralization and employment of enemy and friendly mines and booby traps.

- (3) In addition to the formal schools attended, this battalion requested and received instruction from the 1st Platoon, Company "C", 1st Engineer Battalion mines and booby traps. Twenty-one Marines and two Navy Corpsman attended the class on 21 November at the battalion's booby trap lane.
- - (5) The Motor Transport section held classes for the battalion and company drivers on the HPUC (Steam Jenny) and basic vehicle engine operations for ben Marines during the month of November.
 - (6) Two companies, Company "M" and Company "L", completed the training provided by the RIDER Plan. This was an individual company training program designed to provide instruction for the companies in the areas of air support, patrolling, and platoon tactics, supporting arms fires, combat intelligence and first aid. Leadership instruction was also provided and aimed primarily at the fire team leaders and squad leaders.

i. Logistic, Equipment, Supply.

(1) Logistics. -

- (a) Presently, the battalion is still without its laundry unit.

 A Vietnamese laundry, however, is located at the Vietnamese shop in the cantonment. Additionally, the opening of a laundry unit at the LSU at LZ BALDY alleviated the difficult problem of laundering large amounts of laundry.
 - (b) Construction of a wooden ramp for a Xeon Spotlight Jeep has been completed by the 1st Engineer Battalion. Plans for a new main electrical distribution system have been submitted to the First Marine Division. Construction on a passenger terminal structure for the landing zone will begin shortly.

(2) Equipment and Supply.


- (a) On 10 November a contact team from FSR performed much needed ratintenance on the refrigeration units in the battalion messhall.
- (b) The overall supply situation greatly improved throughout the month. The need for jungle clothing and small arms cleaning gear still exists and will probably continue to exist in the future.

j. Civil Affairs.

- (1) Medcaps. During November, 1969, the 3d Battalion treated 308 Viotnamese civilians for minor illnesses,
- (2) Dentcaps. During the month, 51 people from the local area were treated for dental problems.

k. Psychological Operations.

(1) Air Drops. This month the Battalion requested 14 air drops emphasized ing themes such as hunger, disease and low moral from which the NVA suffer.

Additionally, 1 air tape was requested emphasizing the loneliness of the NVA soldier and his distance from home.

1. Communications.

- (1) Communications for the month of November were adequate. The relatively flat terrain within the AO afforded the battalion excellent communications.
- (2) A battalion radio operators school, held 24-26 November, emphasized the use of the Nestor (D-N) equipment. Additional emphasis was placed upon transmission security and ways to avoid common radio transmission security violations.

m. Mediaal.

- (1) General. At present time the malaria rate within the battalion has remained about the same as in the previous month. However, the current rate is still below the battalion's high point reached during September. Because there was less rain during the month than had been expected, immersion foot was not a serious problem as in the month of October.
- (2) Evacuation. The present system is operating in a satisfactory fashion.
- (3) Medical resupply remains a persistent problem requiring constant attention. Because the battalion's usage rate of certain medical supplies is very high, it is difficult to keep these items in stock. These items include: Lomotil, Oral Penicillin, Erythomylin, and Tinactin.
 - (4) Malaria cases: 82
 - (5) Fever Unknown Origin: 73
 - (6) Veneral Disease: 5
- (7) Sanitation facilities on FSB ROSS are still continuing to improve, Although the urinals and heads require constant attention, they are maintained in a sanitary condition.
- (8) BAS, Six additional tents were added to the BAS this month, thus added to the BAS this month, thus added to the BAS area, because of its close proximity to the landing zone, still remains extremely muddy and dirty.

h. Chaplain.

(1) The Battalion Chaplain performed the following support for the

 - (7) That helicopter support will continue to be minimal.
- (8) That resupply will be unit distribution by either helicopter or surface means.
- (9) That supporting artillery will continue to provide fires from presently occupied or previously established Fire Support Bases.
- (10) That the medical problems of dysentary, immersion foot and malaria will continue to require increased command attention.
- (11) That the weather will continue to present problems to air and surface movement, and maintenance of equipment,
- (12) That utilization of organic supporting arms in the field will continue to present problems of mobility, security, and logistics.
- (13) That communications relay sites will be required to insure positive communications.

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2. MISSION. 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines conducts mobile/strike operations within the 7th Marines TAOR; is prepared to conduct unilateral or multi-battalion reconnaissance-in-force operations; is prepared to conduct combined GVN/US search and destroy operations; and is prepared to conduct coordinated company-sized operations within the 7th Marines TAOR.

3. EXECUTION

- a. With four rifle companies and Command Group ALPHA in the field, 3rd Battalion conducts offensive operations, utilizing surface or air mobility, to seek out and destroy enemy personnel, equipment, and installations within the 7th Marines TAOR, supported by Command Group BRAVO (rear).

 - c. Company "K". Be prepared to conduct operations as directed.
 - d. Company "L". Be prepared to conduct operations as directed.

 - g. 81mm Mortar Platoon
 - (1) General Support.
 - (2) Be prepared to detach sections on order.
- (3) Be prepared to provide security personnel for Command Group ALPHA on order.

h. 106mm Recoilless Rifle Platoon

- (1) General Support.
- (2) Be prepared to detach sections on order.
- (3) Be prepared to provide security personnel for Command Group ALPHA on order.
- (4) Be prepared to provide, on order, security detachment for defense of Command Group ALPHA.
- (5) Be prepared to assume sector defensive responsibilities at LZ Baldy in accordance with Battalion Cantonment Defense Plan (to be published).







- a. The enemy continues to operate, infiltrate and maintain base camps within the 7th Marines TAOR. The enemy draws upon this area as a source for food supply and labor. He continues to maintain control over the civil populace through psychological operations and terrorist activities.

2. ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS OF INFORMATION (EEI's)



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- b. All POW's will be classified as Detainees initially until further classification by ITT.
- c. Prisoners will be evacuated from the point of capture to Command Group Alpha if at all possible. If not, prisoners will be evacuated to 7th Marine C. P. on LZ BALDY. An ITT Team will do a spot interrogation and will fully exploit the prisoners for tactical information of immediate concern to the commanding officer. Wounded POW's will be classified no higher than PRIORITY for med-evac and will be handled in accordance with paragraph 4 of Annex B to Administrative Plan 4-69.
- d. POW security will be provided for by the Battalion Headquarters Commandant in the field.
- e. Documents and materials will be handled in the same manner as described in paragraph 4.a above and paragraph 1.f of Administrative Plan 4-69 to Operation Plan 7-69. Prisoners shall not be separated from documents and equipment captured with them.


5. DOCUMENTS AND/OR EQUIPMENT REQUIRED

- d. Destruction of classified material will be carried out completely in the field when word is given by proper authority or when in danger of being captured by the enemy unit.

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Appendix 1 (Intelligence Estimate) to Annex B (Intelligence) to Operation Plan 7-69

1. MISSION: 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines conducts Mobile/Strike Operations within the 7th Marines TAOR; be prepared to conduct unilateral or multi-battalion Reconnaissance in Force Operations; be prepared to conduct GVN/US search and destroy operations and coordinated company sized operations within the 7th Marines TAOR.

2. ENEMY SITUATION

- a. Topography; The 7th Marines TAOR is dominated in the western portion by extremely rugged hills and mountains with slopes in excess of 30 percent. This rugged topography is primarily covered by multi-canopied, dense undergrowth forests which create extremely restricted vehicular and, at best, extremely poor foot movement. Extensive rice fields are found in the southern portion of the TAOR. Movement through these rice fields, when the ground is dry, is fair for tracked vehicles and foot troops. When the ground is wet, these areas are fair for APC'S and poor for foot movement. These rice fields are poor for wheeled vehicles at all times. Widely scattered open areas are found in the central and southern portions of the 7th Marines TAOR, and these are fair for tracked vehicles and good for foot movement during the dry season, Several brushwood areas with slopes from 0 to 20 percent are widely scattered throughout the AO. During the dry season, these areas are fair for tracked vehicles and foot movement. Scattered areas of single-canopy are also found throughout the AO. These areas are generally fair for both troop movement by foot and track vehicles, but poor to unsuited for wheeled vehicles during both dry and wet seasons.
- b. Hydrography: Mountain streams provide water to the lowlands. The upper courses of these rivers flow swiftly over steep irregular gradients and run off regularly during the rainy seasons (September January). During the summer months, water is often in meager quantities in the high ground. All rivers are trafficable except at the height of the rainy season which is in October.



d. Enemy Military Situation

(1) Strength: Total enemy estimated strength of the military forces operating within the 7th Marines TAOR is believed to be approximately 2,300, composed of roughly 2,000 NVA and 500 VC.

(2) Composition, Disposition and Equipment

- (a) 36th NVA Regiment; This is the major NVA unit operating within the 7th Marines TAOR. Its estimated strength is 610 men, and it is composed of 3 battaliens and 8 support companies. The Headquarters, 36th Regiment at present is located within the Que Son mountains, in the vicinity of AT 9838. The battaliens are numbered 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Their unit strength is approximately 135. They are equipped with 60 and 82 millimeter mortars, B-40 and B-41 rocket launchers, individual and automatic weapons. Each battalien has 3 infantry companies and 1 weapons company. The present general locations of these battaliens are: 1st Battalien AT9638, 2nd Tattalien AT9842, and the 3rd Battalien located semewhere along a line extending from vicinity AT980560 to BT0405000. The most probable location of the 3rd Battalien is AT9530.
- (b) T.3 Sapper Battalion: Estimated strength is 180. This battalion is composed of four companies, designated C.1, C.3, C.5 and a headquarters company. All companies are armed with two RPD LMG's, three B-40 rocket launchers, 18-20 AK-47's, eight 1-kilogram satchel charges, 12 half kilogram C-4 charges, and grenades. This is the only NVA Sapper Battalion in Quang Nam Province and is considered to be an elite unit. Current probable location is AT9843 and last known location was on 17 June 1969 at the same coordinates.






- (c) 42nd Reconnaissance Battalion: Estimated strength is 120. This battalion is probably located in the vicinity of AT9341. No further information.
- (d) GK.33 Mortar Battalian (120mm): Estimated strength is 250. This battalian is equipped with six 120mm Mortars and an unknown number of 60mm and 82mm Mortars. This battalian is probably located in the vicinity of AT8732.
- (e) 105th Main Force Company: Estimated strength is 130-150. This company is equipped with two 81mm Mortars, four 60mm Mortars, two 57mm Recoilless Rifles, two B-40 and two B-41 rocket launchers, and individual weapons. This unit is broken into four platoons. They are: the 75th Sapper Platoon, 81st Weapons Platoon, 93rd Transportation Platoon, and a Headquarters Platoon. This company is probably located in the vicinity of AT8940. Last known location was on 4 October 1969 at AT991386.
- (f) 1st VC Regiment: Estimated strength is 685. This regiment is broken into 3 battalions, numbered the 40th, 60th, and 90th. They are equipped with 60mm, 82mm, and 81mm Mortars, 57mm and 75mm Recoilless Rifles, .30 Caliber and 12.7 Machine Guns, and individual weapons. This regiment is probably located in the vicinity of AT7930.

(3) Geinforcements:

(a) Major NVA units located to the north, west and south of the AO capable of reinforcing enemy units within the AO, include the 90th NVA Regiment/324B Division and elements of the 2nd NVA Division, specifically the 3rd NVA Regiment, and to a much lesser extent, the 21st NVA Regiment and the D.3 Battalion.

(b) Major NVA units available for reinforcing:

- (1) 90th NVA Regiment: Estimated strength 1s 1,065. This unit is broken into 3 battalions and 8 support companies. The Head-quarters is located in the vicinity of ZC1835. The 3 battalions are numbered the 7th, 8th and the 9th. They are composed of 4 companies and each is equipped with 60 and 82 millimater Mortars, B-40 and B-41 rocket launchers, and individual weapons. The 9th battalion is armed with two 12.7 anti-aircraft machine guns. The strength of the battalions are: 7th -255, 8th-355 and the 9th-260. All 3 battalions are probably located in the vicinity of ZC1835.
- (2) 3rd NVA Regiment: Estimated strength is 648. This unit is broken into 3 battalions and has 10 support companies. The Head-quarters unit is probably located in the vicinity of AT9226. The 3 battalions are equipped with: 82mm Mortars, 57mm and 75mm Recoilless Rifles, and individual weapons. The 3rd battalion is also equipped with three 50 caliber machine guns and two 120mm Mortars. All 3 battalions are probably located in the vicinity of AT9226.



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
(3) D.3 Battalion: Estimated strength is 250. This unit is probably located in the vicinity of AT 9856 (NFI)

4. STRENGTH AND WEAKNESSES

- a. Recent operations conducted by GVN and FWMAF in Southeastern Quang Nam Province and Northeastern Quang Tin Province have disrupted and preempted any enemy plans for a major enemy maneuver of elements in the southern command of Group 44 Front 4.
- b. At the present time the enemy force within the AO is considered to be disrupted, demoralized and hungry, but he is known to be regrouping in base area 116.
- 2. His forces, logistics and surface installations are vulnerable to air and artillery.
- i. His recent tactical defeats on the battlefield, sickness, hunger, shortage of food, ammunition and supplies, and austere living conditions have increased his vulnerability to psychological operations.
- e, The enemy has the tactical advantage. He can pick the time and place of contact and utilize well prepared defensive positions if he chooses. The enemy can also break or refrain from contact whenever he feels his position or posture unfavorable.

5. ENEMY CAPABILITIES

- a. Attack: The enemy has the capability of attacking in battalion size force. He has the additional capability of directing 122mm/140mm rockets, recoilless rifle and mortar fire on fire bases, helicopter zones and troop concentrations.
- b. Defend: The enemy possesses extensive fortifications within the area of operations. He could briefly defend any specific area against helicopter-borne assaults or ground assaults.
- c. The enemy's thorough knowledge of the terrain and trail networks in this area theoretically allow him to reinforce any unit within the AO at any time.
- d. Withdrawal: The enemy has continuously demonstrated his capability to withdraw either partially or completely, (partial withdrawal includes going underground as well as withdrawing from immediate area of operations with the intentions of returning immediately upon removal of our forces).
- 6. ANALYSIS OF ENEMY CAPABILITIES: Relative order of probility:
 - a. Adoption by enemy (in order of probility):





- (1) Withdraw
- (2) Defend
- (3) Attack
- (4) Reinforce

b. Rational for probability of adoption:

- (1) Reinforce: Possible but not very likely. The enemy units can reinforce internally at will. This presumably would be attempted only if the enemy intended to attack or counter-attack. External reinforcing would become involved only if the NVA felt that a successful conclusion could be predicted.
- (2) Attack: Not considered likely. Strengths and general condition of the NVA units in the area do not indicate that they would desire to become engaged in extended zontact with mobile Marine units unless victory was assured.
- (3) Defend: This is possible. The enemy is capable of initially defending against entrance of friendly units into the area of operations. His defense would most likely be to the extent necessary to delay or harass our forces, Further defense by the enemy would be centered about only key caches and installations.
- (4) Withdrawal: This must be considered the enemy's most likely course of action. The enemy's knowledge of the terrain enable him to move rapidly towards points of regress. Once the enemy has determined: (a) General concept of the operation, (b) Deployment of our forces, and (c) Our inability to restrict all points of regress, simultanecusly he will most probably avoid contact and initiate at least a partial withdrawal from the area of operations.
- 7. <u>GONCLUSION</u>: The enemy will initially harass friendly forces and defend key areas and caches until fixed combat becomes inevitable. Ultimatly, he will withdraw or go underground, avoiding detection or involvement in major engagements.





a. Enemy Forces. See Annex B (Intelligence) to Operation Plan 7-69 and current intelligence summaries.


b. Friendly Forces

- (1) 1st Marine Aircraft Wing provides attack, photo imagery, and logistical air support as required.
- (2) MaG-16 provides Assault Helicopter support, Observer/TAC (A) aircraft and Command Control/VR helicopter support.
- (3) 7th Marines allocates and coordinates all air support for 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines.

2. PROCEDURES

a. Fixed Wing

- (1) Close Air Support strikes will normally be TAC(A) controlled. Refer to Appendix 1 for the type of ordnance to be used. Requests for Close Air strikes will be submitted by 0900 the day before the desired strike, except in situations of contact with the enemy which will be taken any time.
- (2) Beacon Air Strikes are accomplished by the electronic equipment in the A-6 type aircraft in conjunction with the battery operated beacon at a friendly position on the ground. The ALO/FAC operating the beacon will have communications with the Aircraft to insure safety to ground forces. The dosest friendlies for beacon strikes will be 1500 meters.



Beacon strikes have alloweather capability and need not have visual sight of the target. Refer to Appendix 1 for the type of ordnance to be used. Requests for beacon strikes will submitted to the ALO by 0900 the day prior to the requirement.

- (3) Air Observers are available for visual and photo reconnaissance. A0's may be used to cover troop movement, find trails and LZ's as well as pin-pointing the enemy in contact situations while calling in artillery or air strikes. AO requests will be submitted by 0900 the day before it is to be used except in contact situations which will be accepted at anytime.
- (4) T P Q 10's missions are all weather radar controlled strikes with a minimum danger close of 1500 meters. T P Q 10 targets are submitted with an intelligence rating and are cleared for a block time period and may be hit any time during that period. Division will determine which targets will be hit based on intelligence evaluation. Type of aircraft and time of drop will vary since T P Q's are occasionally diverted aircraft which cannot drop due to weather or mechanical failures on original missions. T P Q 10 targets will be submitted by the ALO by 0900 each day.

b. Resupply

- (1) Normal resupply requests will be submitted to the S-4 representative with command group ALPHA prior to 0800 the day before the resupply is desired via the EST net. Add-on's will be minimized. S-4 at battalion rear will submit lifts and weights to the regimental ALO by 1000 the day before resupply is required. The S-4 will in turn inform the battalion ALO of the number of lifts, weights, and destination.
- (2) Emergency resupply will be taken anytime based on valid logistical and/or tactical requirements. Ammunitions, medical supplies and water constitute emergency resupply. Normal resupply should be used to the fullest advantage to minimize if not eliminate the need for emergency type resupply.
 - c. Medical Evacuation. Refer to Appendixes 2 and 3.

d. Troop Lifts

(1) Troop Lifts will be submitted by 0900 to the ALO the day before it is desired. Information on trooplifts will include exact number of people to be moved, pick-up and drop coordinates, frequency and call sign for both pick-up and drop zones. Heliborne assaults will normally require at least 48 hours notice to allow adequate briefing and coordination.

e. Tactical Air Control Party

TACP will control and coordinate all air operations with the assistance of HST for logistic activities. Unit commanders will be responsible for their landing zones to insure it is of the proper size and is free of all debris

which could damage the helicopters (loose ponchos, branches, sandbags, etc.)
Battallon and Company TACP will monitor HST operations.

f. Helicopter Support Teams

HST is responsible for providing and maintaining a tactical logistics met to coordinating all helicopter logistical resupply/retrograde, and locally controlling helicopters landing zones.

g. Command and Control/VR Helicopters

Command and Control/VR helicopters are allocated to the regiment. Requests for C & C/VR missions will be submitted to the battalion ALO by 0900 the day before required. C & C/VR helicopters are controlled by 7th Marines and will be made available at their discretion.

Med-evac request will be called in to the TACP on the primary nat and will inturn be forwarded to BALDY HDC who notifies the med-evac aircraft. Information to be given to TACP will be:

- a. Type and number of medevac emergency, priority, routine
- b. Pick-up coordinates
- c. If medical assistance is required
- d. Landing Zone secure or unsecure
- e. Marking of zone air, panel, smoke, strobe light etc.
- f. Landing zone frequency and call sign
- g. Special instructions such as (1) no sit-down zone is available, hoist with Neil Robinson litter or jungle penetrator, (2) doctor is desired aboard aircraft.

The 3/7 fire Support Coordination Center (FSCC) will excercise overall responsibility for planning, coordinating, and controlling the conventional fires supporting the elements of the 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines, thereby ensuring maximum effective fire support, safety to aircraft, troop safety compliance with the Rules of Brown and compliance with the Rules of Engagement.

- (1) Fire support coordination will be accomplished in accordance with the existing doctrines and SOP's: See References (b) and (c).
- (2) Fire support coordination between battalions, adjacent commands and higher units will be accomplished by 7th Marine FSCC through 3rd Battalion 7th Marines FSCC.

The 3/7 Fire Support Coordinater will coordinate the employment of arms with the rifle companies and with the 7th Marines.

4. TARGET INFORMATION

- a. Intial preparation fire and planned fires will be intiated by the fire support coordinator, using current Intelligence Data, and submitted to Regiment.
- b. The Rules of Engagement, as set forth in reference (b), will be applied at all times.


5. AIRCRAFT SAFETY

a. Save-a-plane

- (1) Save-a-plane in a simplified system which enables the simultaneous use of Air and Artillery Support. The origin of artillery fire, the maximum ordinate (highest point in the air the round travels), and the impact grid of the round is given to 7th Marines FSCC. Aircraft approaching near the path of rounds will be warned and diverted around or over it.
- (2) Artillery may be checked-fired by the aircraft if it is not possible to go over or around the path of rounds. However, a contact fire mission will not be check fired. The aircraft will either be diverted from it's mission or put into a hold pattern.
- (3) After 1800 and with a maximum ordinate of less than 10,000, & save-a-plane is not needed.
- b. Aircraft Lookout. The Gun-Target line will be observed during all fire missions by the Battery and the Forward Observer.

c. Restrictive Fire Plan

- (1) When there is a probability that artillery fire will engage a simultaneous air mission, a restrictive fire plan may be employed. Under this plan all surface fires are prohibited between prescribed maximum and minimum altitudes (above sea level) within a specific rectangular area, or series of areas, during a stated time interval. The centerline of this area will be specified by two or more points along an axis. The width is specified by a distance on either side of the centerline.
- (2) Echelons requesting an air support mission will recommend the restrictive fire plan if it is required. Higher echelons will not impose a restrictive fire plan in the absence of such recommendations unless the need is clearly indicated. Recommendations and orders for a restrictive fire plan will state the coordinates of the points making the centerline, the distance on either side of the centerline, the maximum and minimum altitudes above the highest terrain feature within the area enclosed by the rectangle, and the time period.



All grids will be cleared through the 3/7 FSCC. Grids outside the 3/7 AO and within 500 meters of the Battalien Boundry line will be cleared through the 7th Marines FSCC.

b. All observed fire missions addlabegin with one white phosphorus 100 meter high burst adjusting round. Benger close in double canopy is 1000 meters and in other types of terrain deservices is 600 meters. Missions with 1000 or more meters danger close to friendly forces will be adjusted with no less than a platoon of artillery. Missions with less than 1000 meters danger close will be adjusted with the same number of pieces as are to be received in effected.

c. Air support which is not TAC(A) controlled should not be any nearer than 1500 meters. This relates primarily to Beason and TPQ 10 air strikes. Close air support may be closer since there is an air borne controller to mark the target and insure thar friendly forces are not too close. A good rule to go by is one meter for each pound of ordnance for danger close. Therefore, a 500 pound bomb should have aclearance of 500 meters, positive coordination between the TAC(A) and the ground unit, and adequate protection for the troops. This rule may be modified based on terrain, enemy situation and increased cover for friendly troops.



- c. Earlyword can be used to exploit a rapidly developing situation. A fairly rapid response time (approximately three hours) is possible. A message to the CP Group BRAWO can alert S-5 to the need for Earlyword and arrangements can be made with G-5. Information required is the grid. call sign and frequen of the using unit.



- d. An HB (1 speaker) team is available from regiment. The team has an interpreter and is capable of backpacking its equipment. This team could be used to much the same advantage as Earlyword.
- e. S-5 will provide any psychological operations support requested by th S-3 or rifle companies. Any support desired by a line company should be requested through S-3 which will consolidate such requests and forward them to S-5. In addition, S-5 will moniter the intelligence situation and orient psychological operations themes accordingly. An attempt will be made to emphasize the themes of the hopelessness of the communist cause due to recent significant losses of equipment and supplies and battle casualties, and the general disease, hardship and hunger faced by the VC/NVA.

4. ADMINISTRATION AND LOGISTICS

a. The S-5 will administrate psychological operations and maintain record of operations conducted. Any logistical requirements will be coordinated through S-4.

5. COMMUNICATIONS/ELECTRONICS

a. Any requests for special psychological operations support should be made via the battalion administrative net and relayed to the S-5 office by landline or message. S-5 will utilize normal communication channels through 7th Marines S-5.



Administrative Plan 4-69 to accompany Operation Plan 6-69

Time Zone: HOTEL

1. SUPPLY

a. General

- (1) The S-4 is responsible to the Commanding Officer for coordinating the Logistical Support of the Battalion.
 - (2) Unit distribution will be made from IZ Baldy.
- (3) Companies are responsible for timely and complete supply requests to S-4.
 - b. Supplies and Equipment Availability
 - (1) All necessary classes of supply will be available.
- (2) Sundry Packs will be issued on an as requested/when available basis.
 - c. Prescribed Loads See Annex A (Prescribed Loads)

d. Resupply

- (1) All necessary classes of supply will be available through the LSA. Supply discipline is a command responsibility.
- (2) Procurement of all supplies is the responsibility of the Battalian Supply.
- (3) Resupply lists will be submitted to the S-4 representatives with Command Group Alfa via the HST Net not later than 0800 the day prior to the desried resupply date. He will in turn, consolidate and transmit them to the S-4 (Command Group Bravo) via the Battalion Administrative Net.
- (4) Request for Emergency Resupply may be submitted at any time based on valid requirements existing.

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TAB (c)

- (5) Units receiving resupply are responsible for designating and preparing a Landing Zone, and for maintaining HST communications.
- (6) The 1-4's will monitor and coordinate Logistical air support in accordance with Operation Plan 7-69.

e. Resupply Delivery Methods

- (1) Air Delivery
 - (a) Helicopter Delivery will be used in most cases.
 - (b) Air Drop by Parachute/Cannister may be used if required.
- (2) Surface Delivery
 - (a) Manpack capability may be required.
- (b) Direct support $2\frac{1}{2}$ Ton trucks are readily available where road communications exist.
- (c) Huskies/Amphibious Tractors will be available in accordance with requirements and trafficability.

f. Captured Material and Equipment

- (1) All captured material and equipment will be tagged with the captor's name and company.
- (2) Resupply Helicopters/or surface means will be used to transport captured material to the LSA.
- (3) The Battalion S-4 will be notified when captured material and equipment is being retrograded in order that the Battalion representatives may be made available to recover it from the LSA.
- (4) Unless not feasible, captured weapons will be tagged and shipped in cargo nets or by surface means.

g. Retrograde and Salvage

- (1) A forthcoming Battalion Order, regrading Supply Procedures, emphasizes that Commanding Officer as well as individual Marines are responsible for supplies and equipment charged to their possession.
- (2) The individual Marine is responsible to his Company Commanders for the equipment listed on his IMR Card. The Company Commander in turn is responsible to the Battalion Commander for the proper supply discipline within his command.

- (3) When clean uniforms are drawn from supply an equal amount of dirty uniforms will be turned in to replace them.
- (4) Unserviceable 782 gear will be turned into Battalion Supply so that the Equipment Custody Records may be adjusted to accurately reflect equipment on hand.

i. Ordnance Care and Disposal Procedures

- (1) Routine maintenance for ordnance carried by individual Marines consists of cleaning and protecting the exterior surfaces from the elements.
- (2) Ammunition that has become Grade III must be retrograded, destroyed or otherwise rendered useless.
- (3) Excess and Grade III Ammunition may be retrograded along with other retrograde material.

2. EVACUATION and HOSPITALIZATION

a. See Annex B (Evacuation and Hospitalization) to Administrative Plan 4-69 to Operation Plan 7-60.

b. Handling of Med-Evac Weapons and Equipment

- (1) Unit leaders will carry plastic tags to attach to all weapons and equipment of an evacuee.
- (2) The evacuee's name and unit will be printed on the attached plastic tags.
- (3) All individual equipment and weapons will be evacuated with the individual unless circumstances dictate otherwise.
- (4) Cryptographic material, maps and Group III items will be handled in accordance with Annexes B (Evacuation and Hospitalization) and Annex D (Personnel).
- 3. EMBARKATION. See Annex B to Administrative Plan 4-69

4. SERVICES

a. Maintenance

- (1) Inoperable weapons may be replaced one for one on a float basis.
- (2) Contact Teams are available from the LSU on LZ Baldy.

b. Engineer

(1) Engineers will be attached to each Company.



- (2) Attached Engineer personnel will assist the unit commander to select, prepare and maintain required landing zones.
- (3) Additional Engineer support may be requested through the S-4 representative in the field via the Administrative Net.

c. Miscellaneous

- (1) HST Teams will be attached to each Company.
- (2) EOD Teams are available upon request.
- 5. PERSONNEL. See Annex D to Administrative Plan 4-69

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Annex B (Hospitalization and Evacuation) to Administrative Plan 4-69

Time Zone: HOTEL

1. ORGANIZATION

- a. Command Group Alpha. 1 Medical Officer and 1 Corpsman.
- b. Command Group Bravo. 1 Medical Officer and 20 Corpsman.
- c. Company Medical Personnel. 8
 - (1) Headquarters Company 1 Corpsman
 - (2) Weapons Platoon 1 Corpsman
 - (3) Rifle Platoon 2 Corpsman

2. MISSION

a. Command Group Alpha

- (1) Medical care of Command Group.
- (2) Medical counsel to Battalion Commander on Med-evac, Medical supplies, preventive medicine and infectious disease.

b. Command Group Bravo

- (1) Medical care of Battalion Rear.
- (2) Medical Records.
- (3) Medical Supplies for Battalion.

c. Company Aid Men

- (1) Emergency first aid to casualties.
- (2) Screening medical ailments of troops in field.
- (3) Distribution of Malaria pills (Saturday).
- (4) Performance of urine test for detection of Chloroquine (Suncay).
- (5) Senior Corpsman will insure all corpsmen in the company are provided with adequate medical supplies.



- 3. <u>SANITATION and PREVENTIVE MEDICINE</u>. The following procedures are to receive direct Command Attention as to enforcement:
- a. <u>Messing and Sanitation</u>. Recommend as to proper disposal of waste and trash.

b. Water Purification

- (1) All water intended for consumption will be treated with Iodine/Halazone on a supervised basis, including ground water.
- (a) Clear water 1 tablet per canteen, wait 20 minutes before drinking.
- (b) Cloudy water 2 tablets per conteen, wait 20 minutes before drinking.
 - (2) Water testing is impractical and unsatisfactory in the field.

c. Sanitation

- (1) Corpsmen shall advise as to proper construction and position of slit trenches and supervise their maintenance and use. There should be no more than 10 individuals per slit trench.
- (2) All personnel will be indoctrinated with the importance of washing hands after making a head call.

d. Maleria Prevention

- (1) C-P tablets taken weekly on Saturday, will be provided by the Battalion Medical Department.
 - (2) Corpsmen will carry an adequate supply for the units they serve.
- (3) Platoon size, alphabetically ordered rosters demonstrating that the pill was taken and urine tested will be turned in to the company rears every week. These rosters will be combined in the Battalion rear and a roster of the entire Battalion will be turned in to Regiment every Wedensday.
 - (4) Every man will be supplied with mosquito head netting.
 - (5) Sleeves will be rolled down by 1830 every day.
- (6) Mosquito repellent will be carried by every man and used frequently in the evening hours.

e. Prevention of Dysentary

(1) Water treatment as above



- (2) Inspection of slit trenches and trash pits by company corpsmen. All personnel must use facilities provided not individual constructions. Corpsmen will recommend suitable sites and proper construction. They will not dig the facility.
 - (3) All messing waste will be deposited in trash pits which are 4'x4'x4'.

f. Prevention of Warm Water Immersion Foot

- (1) Be aware of the problems caused by prolonged exposure to wet enfironment. Understand that serious secondary infections may result.
- (2) Unit leaders will provide for and supervise use of as many periods as possible to air feet and dry socks (Three $\frac{1}{2}$ hour periods a day is ideal).
- (3) All hands will carry an extra pair of socks, changing socks as often as possible. Unit leaders will have troops feet checked for early signs of immersion foot.

g. <u>Personal Hygiene</u>

(1) All individuals will be informed of the importance of personal hygiene. Each person will wash and shave as frequently as possible. Brushing teeth cannot be neglected as cavities are a major problem in Vietnam.

4. EVACUATION

a. Movement

- (1) The Helicopter is the primary source of medevac.
- (a) Emergency and priority medevacs will be taken directly from their positions to the appropriate medical facilities.
- (b) Routine medevacs will be taken back to the Command Group Bravowhere they will be screened by the Battalion Surgeon. The Battalion Surgeon will decide whether further evacuation is necessary.

b. Classification of Medevacs

- (1) Emergency Critically wounded, injured, or ill personnel whose immediate evacuation is a matter of life or death, or loss of limb.
- (2) Priority Seriously wounded, injured of ill who requires early hospitalization, but whose immediate hospitalization is not a matter of life or death.
- (3) Routine Evacuation of deceased personnel, evacuation of people with minor injury or illness, or the routine travel of a patient from one medical facility to another for further treatment.



5. SUPPLY

- a. Corpsmen will carry basic allowances of medical gear. This wories in content with individual corpsmen.
- b. Resupply of corpsmen in the field will take place through coordinated efforts of the S-4 and the Supply Chief of the BAS at Command Group Bravo. A representative from BAS will be on hand at the S-4 when company resupply is being called in. His function will be to maintain communication directly between the BAS at Command Group Bravo and the medical personnel in the field.

6. ADMINISTRATION

a. Casualty reporting at company and Command Group Bravo BAS will be done on field medical card (Form DD 1380).

7. MEDICAL PLAN DISPLACEMENT and FROM F. S. B. ROSS to L. Z. BALDY

- a. The Command Group Bravo BAS of 3/7 will move from L.Z. ROSS only after the 1/7 BAS has arrived.
- b. 3/7 Personnel going to Baldy may obtain medical aid at the BAS or the 1/7 BAS.
- c. While on F.S.B. ROSS, the 3/7 BAS will provide medical care for all USMC personnel on this hill.
- d. Should the Battalion move in large convoy to L.S. BALDY, we shall use the following plan for medical care and evacuation: Trucks holding BAS supplies and personnel will be spread throughout the convoy. Corpsmen will have facilities for treating casualties on momentary notice. Radio operators will be located on appropriate vehicles should need for a medevac arise.

1. GENERAL

a. The administrative move from FSB Ross to LZ Baldy will be conducted concurrent with or after the Battalion assumes the Mobile/Strike mission for the 7th Marine Regiment.

b. The Battalion Rear and Company Rears will displace by echelon to ensure that no interruption of support for the Operating Forces occurs.

2. ORGANIZATION

a. The Battalion Rear and Company Rears will be organized for displacement into four (4) Embarkation Units:

b. Advance Party

- (1) Each Section/Unit will provide one individual for the Advance Party.
 - (2) The Advance Party will depart FSB Ross on D-Day.
- (3) The Advance Party will perform the duties of guides and security personnel at LZ Baldy during subsequent phases of the move.
- (4) In addition to individual weapons and equipment, each individual may carry one water proof bag of personal items.
- (5) Personal gear, other than indicated above, will be packed and tagged by the individual and staged by the Section/Unit for interim security and subsequent follow on move.

c. Operational Party


- (1) The Operational Party will consist of personnel and equipment essential to establish an operational capability for each Section/Unit.
- (2) Only equipment and supplies required to perform normal but austere operations will displace with this phase of the evolution.
- (3) In addition to individual weapons and equipment, each individual may carry one water proof bag of personal items.
- (4) Personal gear, other than indicated above, will be packed and tagged by the individual and staged by the Section/Unit for interim security and subsequent follow on move.
- (5) Organizational gear not displaced during this phase will be packed securely by the respective Section/Unit and tagged or marked for identification. The Section/Unit will stage this equipment and supplies and provide interim security.
- d. Follow Up Party. This part of the evolution is comparable to general unloading.
- (1) Priorities are established, however maximum flexibility must be maintained during this period to ensure a rapid transfer of equipment, supplies and personnel to LZ Baldy.

e. Rear Party

- (1) Each Section/Unit will provide one individual for the rear guard.
- (2) The rear party will perform duties as final security and area police.
- (3) In addition to individual weapons and equipment each individual may carry one water proof bag of personal items.
- (4) Personal gear, other than indicated above, will be packed and tagged by the individual and staged by the Section/Unit for interim security.
- (5) The Rear Party will displace to LZ Baldy only upon completion of the entire evolution and on order of the Battalion S-4.

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f. Personnel Accounting

- (1) Respective Sections/Units will maintain accurate rosters as to the organization of their personnel for the above evolutions.
- (2) Respective Sections/Units will provide each phase Commander a personnel roster for that particular phase.

5. LOADING/UNLOADING

a. Equipment Available. One (1) forklift at FSB Ross and as available at LZ Baldy.

b. Packing

- (1) Mount out boxes will be utilized to the maximum possible possible extent.
- (2) General office type equipment (i.e., Desks, Chairs, Fans, etc.) will be stowed to ensure minimum damage during the evolutions.
 - (3) Prepare an inventory for each assigned vehicle load.
 - (4) Check the inventory list at both ends of the displacement.

c. Marking/Tagging

- (1) All personal gear will be tagged and clearly marked with the individuals name and Section/Unit.
- (2) All organizational equipment and boxes will be clearly marked indicating Section/Unit.
- (3) All garrison type equipment will be clearly marked indicating Section/Unit.

d. Staging

- (1) Each Section/Unit will stage its equipment and material in the area designated by Appendix 1 to Annex C (Embarkation) to Administrative Plan 4-69. Debark points and unloading areas will be established at LZ Baldy by the Advance Party.
- (2) Each Section/Unit is responsible for the security of its equipment and material.
- (3) Equipment and Material will be staged in accordance with the schedule established by Appendix 2 to Annex C (Embarkation) to Administrative Plan 4-69.

- e. All loading/unloading will be accomplished by the respective Section/Unit with assigned working parties as required.
- f. It is the responsibility of the Section/Unit to load assigned vehicles in sufficient time for the vehicles to form into a convoy at the staging area by 0945 and 1630 daily.
- g. It is anticipated that one round trip per day per convoy will be completed.
- h. It is anticipated that vehicles loaded at FSB Ross (3/7), will be reloaded at LZ Baldy (1/7), for the return trip and vice versa.
- i. Timely loading and unloading is essential so not to delay convoy travel and to make vehicles available for reloading to meet convoy schedules.

5. MISCELLANEOUS

- a. <u>Definitions/Designations</u>.
 - (1) D-Day The day the Advance Party departs FSB Ross.
 - (2) D#1 Day The day the operational phase commences.
 - (3) H-Hour 1000 each day for each phase of operation.
- b. <u>Embarkation Personnel</u>. All Section/UnitsEmbarkation Personnel will assist the Battalion S-4 during the entire evolution and are to be assigned to the follow up party. These personnel will provide continuous liasion between the S-4 and respective Section/Units, for detailed instructions and guidance on the conduct of the move.
- c. <u>Police</u>. Each Section/Unit is charged with the responsibility for the proper police of their respective area. Inspections will be conducted by Section/Unit Commanders or their designated representatives. Upon completion of their inspections, a request will be made of S-4 for a final impropertion which must be satisfactory before responsibility will be relieved.



1. GENERAL. All equipment and material of all Sections/Units will be staged in accordance with this Appendix, making efforts to protect staged gear from the weather and insuring adequate security at all times.

a. Operational Phase

- (1) Equipment and material will be staged not later than H-3 hour on D+1 Day.
- (2) Equipment and material will be loaded on assigned vehicles not later than H-1 hour on D+1 day.



1. CONVOY CONTROL

- a. All vehicles will be staged in the designated staging area 0945 and 1630 daily.
 - b. Each vehicle will have a minumum of one (1) shotgun. (Escort)
- c. Personnel will wear required combat equipment (for example: helmet, flak jacket, T/O weapon) enroute between FSB Ross and IZ Baldy.
- d. Section/Unit personnel manifests will be utilized in lieu of individual passes for moving purposes. These will be approved by Unit/Section heads.
- e. Convoy Commanders will be designated prior to the briefing of all vehicle drivers by the Motor Transport Officer.
 - f. Convoy Commanders will be Officers or Staff NCO's.

2. CONVOY COMMUNICATIONS

- a. At least two (2) PRC 25's are required in the Convoy Commanders vehicle and in the last vehicle in the Convoy.
- b. One (1) PRC 25 will be on the Convoy Net and one (1) PRC 25 will be on the Battalion Administrative Frequency.
- c. Other PRC 25's may be interspersed throughout the convoys as they become available.

3. TRAFFIC CONTROL

a. FSB Ross



1. STRENGTHS

- a. Officers. All companies to be at M/L strength.
- b. <u>Staff NCO's</u>. H&S Company 20 Staff NCO's assigned and chargeable. Each rifle company 5 Staff NCO's assigned and chargeable.
- c. Enlisted. H&S Company 285 enlisted assigned and chargeable. Each rifle company 190 enlisted assigned and chargeable.
- d. <u>Personnel Reports</u>. Recurringpersonnel reports will continue to be submitted. These reports include morning reports, 03 reports and unit diaries. Additionally, each company will submit a daily report of the number of personnel in the field, and the number remaining in the rear.

2. REPLACEMENT

a. Replacements will be procured through normal input, and will be assigned to companies by the Battalion S-1. They will not be assigned to duty in the field until they have completed a five-day orientation and indoctrination period.

3. DISCIPLINE, LAW AND ORDER


a. The Battalion Executive Officer, as Officer in Gharge, Battalion Rear, will have Article 15 NJP authority. Courts-martial and office hours will be held both in the field and in the rear. Necessary administration in connection with courts-martial and office hours will be accomplished by the Battalion Legal Office and Company headquarters (rear).

4. PRISONERS of WAR

a. No collection points will be established in the field. Prisoners will be turned over to ITT personnel as soon as practicable.

5. GRAVES REGISTRATION

a. Remains wild be of Town, as routine medical evacuees, to Graves Registration Detachments at 1st Medical Battalion, Danang, or LZ Bally.



6. MORALE and PERSONNEL SERVICES

- a. <u>Leave</u>. Annual leave, emergency leave and R&R will be granted. Commanding Officers will insure that personnel scheduled for leave or R&R are returned to the rear in sufficient time to ensure their reporting for scheduled flights.
- b. <u>Postal Service</u>. Depending on the availability of air and surface transportation, mail will be delivered to the field daily. Company mail orderlies will provide forms for purchasing money orders, and will purchase money orders for personnel in the field from the 7th Marines Post Office.
- c. Pay. Pay call will be held in the field on the first day of each month or as soon thereafter as practicable. Advance pay rosters, indicating the amount of money due each individual, will be routed to the field on or a about the 20th day of each month.
- d. <u>Information</u>. Unit commanders keep troops informed of current news and battle progress. Free distribution of newspapers will be made.
- 7. <u>GIVIL AFFAIRS</u> S-5 will cordinate civil affairs program from Command Group Bravo.

81 PERSONNEL PROCEDURES

- a. An S-1 representative will accompany Command Group ALPHA in the field, and is responsible for reporting all casualty reports to the S-1 by radio. Commanding Officers and Executive Officers of subordinate companies are charged with the responsibility for timely submission of casualty reports to the S-1 representative in the field. The importance of timely, accurate submission of casualty reports cannot be over emphasized.
- b. Courier service will be established between Command Groups ALPHA and BRAVO. The Battalion S-1 is responsible for coordinating courier runs.
 - c. Religious services will be conducted in the field whenever practicable.
- d. Whenever an individual is ill or wounded to a degree requiring his medical evacuation, his group III personal effects will be recovered by an NCO or Officer for courier delivery to the Company rear.

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- e. Security will be provided for special services and clubs property at all times. Club managers will accompany club property during displacement, and the Special Services Officer of NCOIC will appearance accompany special services property.
- f. Personnel scheduled for rotation to CONUS will be returned to the Battalion rear ten days prior to rotation tour date.
- g. Personnel evacuated outside the Republic of Vietnam will be transferred by service records to Camp S. D. Butler, Okinawa. Orders for personnel who are medically evacuated out of Vietnam will be prepared by the Commanding General, 1st Marine Division.
- 9. INTERIOR MANAGEMENT. No change.
- 10. CIVILIAN EMPLOYEES. No change.

1. SITUATION

- a. Enemy. Intelligence Annex Operation Order 7-69
- b. Friendly. Operations Order 7-69
- c. Attachments/Detachmnts. None

d. Assumptions

- (1) That 3rd En 7th Marines will have no Civil Affairs area of responsibility as the battalion becomes the Moble/Strike Battalion.
- (2) That 1st Bn 7th Marines will take over the present civil affairs area around FSB Ross.
- (3) That planning initiated for the area around FSB Ross will benefit 1st Bn in establishing a civic action program.
- (4) That any supplies ordered for civic action projects in the Ross area can be delivered to 1st Bn with little additional effort.
- 2. <u>Mission</u>. To provide for the orderly and efficient transfer of civil affairs areas of responsibility within the 7th Marines area to insure that there is little waste of time and effort in the maintenance of continuity in the civil affairs program of the 7th Marines and its battalions.

3. EXECUTION

- a. Concept of Operations. 3rd Bn 7th Marines will coordinate with 1st Bn and pass information of a general nature concerning the area around? FSB Ross. Information and status reports on all projects will also be passed. (See appendix.)
- b. With regard to construction projects materials ordered for use in planned projects will be delivered to 1st Bn. for completion of projects.
- c. S-5 of 3rd Bn will work closely with S-5, 7th Marines during the period of Mobile operations to learn the nature of projects and gain general information to learn the nature of projects and gain general information of and contacts in the eastern area of the 7th Marines area of operations.



- d. S-5 of 3rd Bn will give any assistance required to 1st Bn to insure proper completion of projects not completed prior to exchange of areas.
- e. Coordinating Instructions. S-5 of 3rd Bn will contact S-5 1st Bn and will insure that S-5 1st Bn meets essential contacts such as the District Chief, Army advisors and village Chiefs. S-5 3rd Bn will then carry out a similar educational process with regard to the eastern area of operations.
- 4. <u>ADMINISTRATION and LOGISTICS</u>. S-5, 1st Bn, will take over administration of projects, in an uncompleted stage. 3rd Bn will give logistical assistance with regard to supplies ordered for projects in the Ross area. Some administrative assistance can be supplied to 1st Bn in matters requiring liaison with Division.
- 5. <u>COMMAND</u> and <u>COMMUNICATIONS</u>. Communications will continue to be primarily by landline.

1. MEDICAL

- a. Building of dispensaries in three (3) refugee hamlets located in Son Xuan (V). (037344, 046344, and 045350.)
- (1) Estimated requirements: 15 bags of cement and 60 ammunition boxes (105mm) for each dispensary. Roofing material is available locally, utilizing either tin or thatch.
 - b. Enlargement of the medical facility in Que Son.
- (1) Estimated requirements: 40 bags of cement, three beams; (one: 7 meters, two: 4 meters in length), and one truckload of gravel. Beams are available now through our bunker destruction program. Cement is available upon request from III MAF. Gravel is available from the rock crusher, probably could get the engineers to deliver a truckload to Que Son.

2. SCHOOLS.

a. General Walt Scholarships:

(1) The district chief will provide 3/7 with a list of names of students who need scholarships. As soon as the number of scholarships is determined, the administrative proceedings will begin. Students are provided VN\$500.00 each month and the scholarships are renewable quarterly.


b. School Kits

(1) When 3/7 arrived at FSB Ross, it was learned that school childeren needed school supplies. 3,000 school kits were ordered from III MAF. Upon delivery, 3/7 will distribute these among the schools in the Que Son area.

3. AGRICULTURE

a. Pig Project:

(1) S-5 at Division has an American Boar available for breeding purposes. Could easily arrange to use this boar in the Que Son area.



b. Chicken Project:

- (1) Need to check on availability. 1st MAW has a chicken breeding program. If Division has nothing available, arrangements could be made to utilize Wing Sources.
- c. All that is required from district farmers, is to care for the pigs and chickens while in use. The district chief will arrange for farmersto conduct the projects.
