COMMAND CHRONOLOGY, 9TH MARINE AMPHIBIOUS BRIGADE1. Introduction

a. This is the first semiannual Command Chronology submitted by the 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade in accordance with reference (a). The purpose is to provide a concise chronology of the significant happenings within the Brigade from its inception on 1 March 1966 through the end of fiscal year 1966.

b. Command Chronologies of subordinate units are enclosed and cover either the entire reporting period or that portion in which the unit was attached to the Brigade. The Command Chronology of the Special Landing Force is submitted separately to the Commandant of the Marine Corps, in accordance with reference (a).

a. Location. Camp Courtney, Okinawa (1 Mar - 12 June 1966)
Camp Hansen, Okinawa (13 Jun - 30 June 1966)

3. Commanders Narrative Summary

a. Organization

(1) The 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade was activated at Camp Courtney, Okinawa on 1 March 1966, with Col Herman Hansen Jr. commanding. BGen William A. Stiles assumed command of the Brigade on 30 March, and was subsequently relieved on 15 April by BGen Michael P. RYAN.

(2) The Brigade, upon activation, was composed of Headquarters and the Headquarters Company. On 30 March the command joined Regimental Landing Team 5, Battalion Landing Team 2/5 and Sub Unit Two, H&S Company, 1st Service Battalion. The Provisional Service Battalion, 9th MAB was activated on 4 April.

(3) Rotation of units commenced when BLT 2/5 embarked aboard assigned shipping on 8 April and departed for Vietnam.

(4) Battalion Landing Team 3/5 was placed under command of the Brigade on 6 May. Training was quickly completed and on 11 May BLT 3/5 embarked as the Special Landing Force BLT.

(5) Regimental Landing Team 5 was the next unit to rotate. On 22 May the RLT embarked aboard shipping and departed for Vietnam, arriving at Chu Lai on 27 May.

(6) The Brigade received its air unit, Marine Aircraft Group 13 (Rein), on 15 April. MAG-13, located at Iwakuni, Japan also has one VMGR squadron and a helicopter squadron stationed at Futema, Okinawa. The Air Group rotated VMA-214 to Chu Lai and received VMA-224 on 2 May.

(7) The first helicopter squadron rotation from Okinawa occurred during 24-28 May, when HMM-361 departed for Chu Lai and HMM-263 arrived at Futema.

(8) On 21 May, in response to a requirement for augmentation of the air defense in Taiwan, VMFA-323 deployed from Iwakuni to Tainan Air Base. The squadron accomplished the movement expeditiously and maintained Air Defense Alert until relieved on station by VMFA-314 on 24 June. VMFA-314 later terminated the air defense augmentation and returned to Iwakuni. Both squadrons subsequently rotated to Vietnam.

(9) During this reporting period the Special Landing Force (SLF), composed of one BLT and one helicopter squadron participated in two amphibious landing exercises, Hilltop IV and V, in the Philippines. The SLF conducted combat operations Jackstay, Osage, and Deckhouse One in Vietnam, and also joined with the 1st Cavalry Division for Operation Nathan Hale.

(10) Both helicopter squadrons and BLT's were rotated between the Special Landing Force and Vietnam. On 8 April HMM-364 rotated to Chu Lai and HMM-362 to the SLF. During 6-7 May BLT 1/5 offloaded at Chu Lai and the SLF then proceeded to Okinawa to embark BLT 3/5.

b. Personnel

(2) The first month of the Brigade's existence was characterized by the formation of the Brigade Staff. The officers and enlisted personnel of the Brigade Staff were formed primarily from the CTF-79 cadre Staff, Headquarters, 1st Field Artillery Group, and selected personnel from East-Pac, MidPac and 1st Marine Division. All principal staff members had reported by 25 March 1966. Of particular note has been the shortage of field grade officers. Throughout the period covered by the report, the Brigade Headquarters has averaged from 14 to 17 field grade officers below authorized strength.

(3) An individual rotation system was proposed and approved which will permit a split tour between Okinawa/Japan and RVN for personnel in nonrotating units. This assists in the dilution of overseas control dates and provides a morale lift to the personnel to serve in-country.

c. Administration. The early part of the period was utilized primarily for the publication of directives necessary for the Brigade's operation. As a newly activated unit, the directives and publications initially available were extremely limited. The Headquarters was in a large degree dependent on CG FMFPAC/IMAC(FWD) and Camp Butler files until allowances of directives were received from CMC and CG FMFPac.

(1) In an effort to purify the personnel accounting system, during May this Headquarters conducted a special audit of information maintained in the system. Reporting units audited personnel plates. This Headquarters and DPI-27 compared personnel rosters with information contained in the system. Corrections were made as required. This produced a very low data deficiency index for the command. Rotating units however, necessitate such audits be conducted on a continuing basis.

(2) During April this Headquarters assumed casualty reporting responsibility for the Special Landing Force and published a Casualty Reporting SOP which has proved a prompt and accurate means of recording and reporting casualties.

d. Intelligence

(1) Intelligence effort during the early part of the period was concerned with forming the section and procurement of basic intelligence material from higher headquarters.

(2) The Intelligence annexes to Operation Plans under review by 9th MAB were rewritten and updated.

e. Logistics

(1) During a provisional period when the 9th MAB was initially formed Capt John LOCKIE was assigned the duties of ACofS, G-4. On March 8 he was relieved by LtCol J. M. LANDRIGAN, who in turn was relieved by the present ACofS G-4, Col O. B. JOHNSTON.

(2) Other than internal personnel assignment and orientation, the first coordinating project of the G-4 Section involved the Logistic aspects of the deployment of BLT-2/5.

(3) LtCol SHARON was the first Brigade representative at the FMFPac Logistics Conference held 13-14 April 1966. Col JOHNSTON and Major FRISBIE (Supply Officer) attended the May conference.

(4) Coordination by this office and VMGR-152 with FMFPac/IMAC(Fwd) established recommended procedures for operation of WestPac Air Freight and Passenger Terminals, and also recommended that responsibilities for operation be assigned to VMGR-152.

(5) Logistic annexes for both the 104 and 201 contingency plans have been completed.

f. Ordnance

(1) During this period elements of RLT-5 were deployed as augmenting units to RVN.

(2) COMUSMACV requires 30 days of ammunition for all augmenting units. A full 30 days supply did not fit on the shipping and the ammunition dumps in-country could not receive a full 30 days of ammunition for these units due to storage problems. In view of the above it was recommended and approved that the augmenting units of RLT-5 deploy with 15 days of ammunition and complete their 30 day requirement through requisitions. It was also found that the LFORM aboard the SLF shipping should be utilized as mount-out stocks for the initial entry of the BLT in-country. The load time necessary to procure shipping to send mount-out stocks from Okinawa, as well as the dump conditions in-country, make it more efficient to off-load the LFORM with the deploying BLT and reconstitute this LFORM upon the embarkation of a new BLT. The augmenting BLT then submits requirements to the First Marine Division for in-country support.

(3) A shortage of training ammunition may create a problem in the future. BLT-3/5 required ammunition well in excess of the amount allotted by MCO P8011.4B, due to a low experience level of the personnel. This may be a recurring problem in the rotational BLT program. Usage data at this time is inadequate to produce firm planning factors and further study will be required concerning the training ammunition allowance.

(4) The supply of Class VA training ammunition has been limited and this has restricted the amount of training available to pilots of MAG-13. All of MAG-13 training ammunition is positioned on Okinawa for use by squadrons deployed to Naha.

(5) Elements of BLT-3/5 and Recon Platoons, Provisional Service Battalion received instruction and familiarization firing of the AR-15 Rifle.

g. Supply

(1) LtCol D. W. SHARON became the Brigade Supply Officer on 29 March 1966. During the month of May, LtCol SHARON was replaced as Supply Officer of the Brigade by Maj H. R. FRISBIE. LtCol SHARON received orders to the Third Marine Division.

(2) On 30 April a Supply Maintenance conference was held at 9th MAB Headquarters to establish liaison on both supply and fiscal problems pertaining to the overall maintenance requirements for aviation units. Representatives from MAG-13 attended.

(3) Supply inspections were held on units rotating from Okinawa, as well as HqCo, 9th MAB and all were reported in satisfactory condition.

(4) Earmarked Brigade mount-out requirements (Class I and III) were submitted.

(5) CG, 9th MAB was given authority by CG FMFPac to designate items for the RED BALL system.

(6) Duplicating equipment was not received, and this caused a major problem in reproduction.

(7) SOPs for the RED BALL system, tracer system and disposition of personal effects and baggage were staffed and approved.

(8) GAO personnel visited 9th MAB units (2dBn, 11th Marines) on 6 April. Representatives were Mr. MARING and Mr. WICKMAN.

(9) MACS-6 was given authority, by CG FMFPac message to 3d FSR, to requisition items deadlining low density Marine Corps peculiar equipment.

h. Motor Transport

(1) Motor Transport maintenance and supply problems were discussed and resolved during a 4 day Staff Visit to MAG-13 by the Brigade MTO. Discussion topics included the fourth echelon maintenance capability of MAG-13 (MABS-13); the shortage of 4th echelon tools and equipment; shortages of section "M" equipment; and the consolidation of maintenance and motor transport supply functions under MABS-13 units based at Iwakuni.

i. Embarkation

(1) During the period the Embarkation Section coordinated the loading/offloading of the following units:

Debarkation of elements of 3d AmtracBn and 1st Shore Party Bn

Embarkation of elements of BLT-3/5 to Japan for FFEEX

Embarkation of BLT-2/5 to Vietnam

Embarkation of BLT-3/5 aboard SLF shipping

Embarkation of Hq, RLT-5 to Vietnam

(2) The only docking facility generally available for amphibious shipping is Tengan Pier. This pier can accommodate one APA or AKA, as only one side of the pier is dredged at present. It cannot be approached during periods of high winds or heavy surf. All other shipping is loaded/offloaded in the stream at White Beach, or at ramps at Naha port in the case of LSTs. Because of the limited pier space and lighterage, the concurrent deployment of more than one BLT is not feasible.

j. Medical. The 9th MAB Medical Section came into being on 3 April 1966 when one HM1 and one HM2 reported for duty. A medical Administrative Chief and Medical Administrative Officer reported for duty shortly after. Staff visits were made to MAG-13 by the acting Brigade Surgeon and Admin Chief, and to MAG-13 and MCAS, Iwakuni by the Medical Admin Officer. No major problems were encountered.

k. Communications

(1) The Communication-Electronics Office has conducted normal routine communication business during the period 1 Mar-30 June 66. The CEO office has conducted three inspections as part of the Brigade Inspection Program. Inspections of BLT-3/5 on 25 April and Headquarters Company, 5th Marines on 5 May were conducted to ensure their preparedness for embarkation and deployment. The Provisional Communication Platoon, Headquarters Company, 9th MAB received a routine inspection on 25 May. From 1-10 June the Assistant CEO was TAD to the SLF as a communications observer for the Hilltop V Exercise. Liaison was also effected while enroute to the SLF with CTF-76 and III MAF Communications Representatives on contingency plan frequency matters.

(2) During the period 1 Mar - 10 Jun the 9th MAB operated a message center at Camp Courtney.

(3) Mr F. D. ROBBINS, NAVSHIPREPFAC, Yokosuka, made a "TEMPEST" survey of communication center facilities at Camp Hansen and Camp Schwab on 23 May.

(4) The 9th MAB Communication Center at Camp Hansen was activated on 11 June. A full duplex ORESTES Secret on-line circuit was established between the Camp Butler Communication Center at Camp Courtney and the 9th MAB Communication Center at Camp Hansen.

(5) The Provisional Communication Platoon, HqCo, 9th MAB was activated 1 April 1966, in accordance with FMFPac message 190341Z March 1966, to provide, on an interim basis, an operational communication capability for the MAB Headquarters in event of a contingency deployment. A provisional T/O and T/E were provided by CG FMFPac. Personnel for the platoon were ordered TAD from other FMFPac WestPac units on Okinawa (5th Marines and Third FSR). Equipment for the T/E was provided from 1st FAG assets. Shortages were reported

to CG FMFPAC. CG FMFPAC msg 010230Z Jun 66 acknowledged remaining equipment shortages and advised that CommSptCo, 9th Comm Bn would provide relief upon arrival during August 1966.

(a) The primary mission of the Prov Comm Plt during this period has been to operate the 9th MAB Communication Center and to conduct normal internal communication training.

(b) The Prov Comm Plt activated covered teletype circuits for test on request by NAVCOMMSTA PHIL on 27 April and NAVCOMMSTA Japan on 12 May. An uncovered teletype circuit was activated for test with NAVCOMMSTA Guam on 19 May.

(c) During 10-16 May the Prov Comm Plt provided Okinawa Communication Guard for the CG, FMFPAC visit.

(d) Twenty-five men from the Prov Comm Plt attended the LFTUPAC Waterproofing School on vehicular and man pack communication equipment on 13 May.

(6) Additional item of interest: MSgt D. M. ONDRAK, 9th MAB Comm Chief, was promoted to Second Lieutenant on 27 May 1966 and reassigned to a 2502 billet in the Prov Comm Plt, HqCo 9th MAB.

1. Training

(1) During this period the following schools were utilized by Brigade personnel as appropriate:

- Counterguerrilla Warfare
- Demolition and Landmine Warfare
- Projectionist
- NCO Leadership
- Vietnamese Language
- Basic Infantry Weapons

(2) Marine Aircraft Group 13 also utilized Air Force Schools in Japan and the Philippines.

(3) Weekly training schedules, to include GMST and Technical Training, were carried out by MAG-13, RLT-5 and each BLT, using training areas and ranges on Okinawa and Japan. Five Command Post Exercises were held by RLT-5.

(4) During April BLT 3/5 sent two companies to the Fuji McNair training area for a two week period.

(5) BLT 2/5 held a LEX at Kin Blue Beach on 7-8 April, prior to deployment to Vietnam.

(6) Each BLT with the Special Landing Force participated in a PHIBEX at San Jose, Mindoro.


