5. Supporting Forces. Operation Prairie IV was broken into three separate periods. Period I was from 20 April 1967 to 12 May 1967. During this period the battalion was located at Dong Ha Combat Base with many varied missions. From 20 April to 8 May one rifle company with one artillery battery in support and a small command group under the battalion executive officer operated to the south of Quang Tri City. Period II was from 13 May through 16 May 1967 during which time the battalion operated in the field against NVA forces. Period III was after the completion of Operation Hickory and extended from 29 May through 31 May 1967 while the battalion was at Con Thien CIDG Camp.

a. Artillery.

(1) During period I the battalion was stationary and the FSCC operated from Dong Ha Combat Base. At least one company was in the field during this entire period and on several occasions two. Artillery support was furnished these operating companies as needed. H&I fires and nightly on calls were also furnished. Numerous orientation rounds were called for and provided. These were of great assistance not only to the FO's but to the entire company. All fires were cleared and coordinated through the 1st Bn, 9th Marines. Fires were provided by various Marine Corps and Army batteries in the area.

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(2) During Period II the battalion was in the field. Heavy contact was made on several occasions and artillery support would have been used to a much greater extent except for the clearance problem. Due to the large number of units in the OA, aircraft of many types operated between the battalion and its direct support batteries. This made clearance very difficult and even impossible on several occasions. Overall the two supporting arms coordinated and worked well together. A large amount of H&I fires were employed with good results. Two large combat missions were fired during the operation. One was a counter mortar mission in which 266 rounds of 155mm high explosive were fired to suppress VC mortars while helicopters landed to pick up wounded marines. The mission was coordinated with the ALO so that firing continued while the helicopters approached, landed and left the LZ. The second was a prepfire mission in which five batteries fired 685 rounds of 105mm and 155mm, with fuze quick and delay, into a prescribed area in approximately forty minutes. Surveillance of the target area revealed excellent area coverage with heavy damage to bunkers. Over thirty VC KIA's were found in the area. Most of these were found inside bunkers and had been killed by shrapnel. The artillery prep had much to do with neutralization of the enemy stronghold. A smaller prep fire was employed at the start of the operation before the battalion moved over its first objective. Coverage here was also very good. A total of 1391 rounds were fired during this period on combat missions. A large part of these rounds were 155mm because of the distance the battalion was operating from its artillery support.

(3) During Period III the battalion CP and FSCC were stationary. At least two companies were in the field operating at all times and numerous missions were fired in their support. All missions were cleared and coordinated through 9th Marines FSCC with reasonable speed. The only delays encountered occurred when air was operating in the area. The battalion's supporting artillery fires fell into three groups during the closing days of Prairie IV. These groups were as follows:

A total of 206 targets were submitted for H&I fires, twenty-five of these received "Battery Ones" several times each night. The remaining targets received single rounds at specified times. Seventy additional targets were covered with 81mm mortar H&I fires during this same period. Approximately ten areas were submitted daily for TPQ-10 coverage. These fires were extremely important to the battalion during this period because as more of the other marine battalions moved south the 1st Bn, 9th Marines had more and more exposed and unoccupied areas to its north, east, and west. The artillery and mortar H&I's, plus the TPQ's were used to cover these danger areas. Normal nightly "On Calls" were plotted around each operating company and a series of night defensive fires consisting of twenty-five artillery and ten 81mm concentrations were plotted around Con Thien.

During this period 22 rounds of WP and 317 rounds of HE were fired in support missions and prep fires. Good effect and coverage was achieved on all missions.

A total of 78 WP and 314 HE rounds were fired as counter battery and at suspected VC artillery positions. These fires were prompt

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and accurate. The artillery fires plus timely air strikes have reduced the enemy artillery capability and the enemy fires have tapered off quite noticeably.

b. Air. The period 20 April through 12 May was very routine with only normal resupply, aerial observation and a minimal number of medevac-uations.

During the period 13 May through 16 May the weather was excellent for air support. Combat mission flown were as follows: Fifty-two air strikes (napalm; assorted bombs, rockets and guns), 168 medevacs (23 emergency, 61 normal resupply). Two night medevacs were conducted under extremely hazardous conditions, which included active automatic weapons, mortar fire, and a very small zone with tall trees surrounding it. During this operation two helicopters and one fixed wing were lost.

The final period, 29 May through 31 May was quiet and only routine resupply, two routine medevacs and daily aerial observation missions were flown.

c. Armor.

(1) The battalion utilized 2 twin 40mm M-42 and 2 Quad 50 caliber M-55 in the area south of Quang Tri City during Period I. For the most part the armor was used in a static defense role for security of a self-propelled 105mm howitzer battery. However the twin 40mm M-42's did accompany a rifle company on a search and destroy operation in an attempt to discourage long range sniping. While the M-42 accompanied the company, no long range sniping was encountered but in the dense vegetation along a river bank one M-42 was hit with a RPG rocket which resulted in 3 friendly KIA and one WIA (DOW).

(2) During Period II the battalion had a platoon of M-48 tanks in direct support. These tanks were utilized both in an offensive and defensive role. Although used as part of the nightly defensive perimeter no enemy contact was made with the armor in the defensive role. In the offensive role the tanks were used to help destroy a heavily fortified enemy position of over 75 bunkers. The tanks were utilized in the slow, methodical destruction of bunkers from hedgerow to hedgerow. The tanks fired from a point blank range both cannister and HE rounds. The tanks were also utilized in physically crushing machine gun emplacements. During this heavy fighting four tanks were hit by RPG rockets on different occasions. Two RPG rounds penetrated the turret of two tanks causing minor casualties.

(3) During Period III the battalion had one platoon of M-48 tanks, a platoon of M-50 Ontos and 4 U.S. Army twin 40mm M-42 in direct support. All units were utilized in a static defense role and no enemy contact was made.

6. Intelligence. The varied missions and sprawling area of the Dong Ha perimeter defense presented a peculiar intelligence challenge to a unit of this size. When operating principally below the YD 62 east-west grid

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line, the battalion was primarily concerned with the main force and local force enemy units operating as far west as Cam Lo, as far east as the mouth of the Cua Viet River and as far south as the village of Hai Lang. Missions assigned to 1st Bn, 9th Marines also directed that we keep abreast of terrain and new developments in enemy strength in the vicinity of the stronghold at Con Thien and the artillery position at Gio Linh.

Southwest of Quang Tri, in Hai Lang District, contact was made as expected, with local force guerrillas supported and led by small elements of main force or NVA. The suspected regimental size force located in the highlands of the Trieu Phong National Forest to the southwest was never positively identified while 1st Bn, 9th Marines units patrolled the north eastern boundaries of this area. Nevertheless, as friendly units progressed south or southwest, enemy activity usually increased. Contact was limited to long range sniper fire in the rolling, open plains, and to mines, surprise firing devices, and harassing fire in the populated areas away from Highway 1.

On 201005H April at YD 378452 Company "D" encountered small arms fire accompanied by an RPG-3 rocket fired from close range at a U.S. Army twin 40mm, M-42. Cover and concealment in this area was sufficient to allow the enemy to escape.

Enemy concentrations around the combat base itself were expected to be small, limited to snipers and local force guerrilla harassment. A platoon of trained local force snipers led by North Vietnam trained personnel was suspected to be operating in the vicinity YD 2756. Previous interrogation of prisoners from this area and weapons captured indicated that this force has operated with impunity close to the Dong Ha Combat Base for over two months. The enemy force limits itself to the rolling hill region southeast of the hamlet of Thon Ai Tu (1) and retreats further southeast into Than Na Cua (2) when heavy contact is made with friendly forces. A sweep of this area on 22 April by Company "C" revealed trench lines and fresh defensive bunkers in the vicinity of YD 2553.

In the area around Cam Lo village, west of Dong Ha, it was anticipated that contact would be limited to elements of platoons or companies of local force guerrillas. The area is suspected of being a chief southern access route for larger forces moving down from the north, and the valley to the northwest of Cam Lo, in the vicinity of YD 0861, is a well known emplacement for rockets directed at Camp Carroll. Yet, on a day to day basis, not more than one platoon is suspected of operating in this area. The rice harvest in the fields near Cam Lo reaches its peak near the end of May. It was believed that enemy activity would increase considerably during this period. The large rice fields east of Cam Lo and northeast of Dong Ha were harvested in the middle of May. These fields present a very fruitful target for enemy exploitation.

The coordinated mortar and rocket attacks on Dong Ha Combat Base, Gio Linh and elsewhere in the northern I Corps area were no doubt in part related to the enemy buildup which would be consonant with an attempt to recover substantial portions of this Spring's harvest. The attack, launched on 280242H April, from at least the two positions, at YD 263663 and YD 260610 indicated that intelligence sources from within the civilian

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population leave much to be desired. While general indication of a mortar attack were evident from early in the month, the actions of the populace made it appear that many areas to the north of Dong Ha were aware of the exact date.

On 12 May 1967, 1st Bn, 9th Marines moved into the area north of Cam Lo village to fulfill assigned missions in and around the vicinity of Con Thien. Estimated enemy strengths in the various areas concerned ran as follows:

a. A main force company operating in the vicinity of YD 1566 and YD 1666.

b. Local force platoons or companies each within the hamlets of Van Kim, Phu An, and Thon Bai An.

c. A battalion of NVA operating in the vicinity of YD 1067 and YD 1167 and north. This last assessment was acquired from agent reports of unknown reliability.

Enemy capabilities were expected to include 60mm and 82mm mortars, 75mm howitzer above the 70 grid line, and reinforcement by machinegun and sapper units. Due to the means of supply routes from North Vietnam, the battalion expected to encounter a well fed, well supplied enemy capable of fighting a sustained action.

Enemy resistance was expected to increase as the battalion moved northwest. It was assumed that contact would consist of well laid, pre-planned ambushes supported by mortars and medium machineguns. Danger areas were predicted at the southern approaches to hamlets and channelized sections of trail.

NVA forces encountered in the battalion ZOA were actually greater than forecast. In at least one area a large bunker complex had recently been constructed, and in another a large enemy force was prepared to aggressively engage operating friendly units.

On 13 May Company "A" encountered the forward elements of a reinforced NVA company just north of the hamlet of Phu An at YD 135674. Subsequent attempts to push northwest into the hamlet of Thon Trung An disclosed that an extensive bunker complex had been erected in the vicinity of YD 130680 to protect its southeastern edges. The bunkers were well camouflaged, freshly dug two to three man emplacements. Material used was mainly banana trees and dirt while some of the larger bunkers employed large timbers. The emplacements numbered over 50 in all and were arranged as shown in enclosure (1). Smaller bunkers were located to the front with extremely restricted fields of fire for automatic weapons. Larger bunkers to the rear were used mostly for storage.

Enemy tactics in connection with the defense of a fortified position included a mortar attack, troops in fixed positions, and maneuvering troops.

When approaching the position, friendly troops were attacked with 60mm, 82mm mortars and light small arms. In the vicinity of the fortification, enemy fire discipline was maximal so as not to disclose individual positions. Due to camouflage and enemy fire discipline it would be easy to over commit friendly forces in which case maneuver elements would be held in reserve to flank pinned down friendly forces.

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In this particular instance, evidence indicated that the NVA forces had been in the field for some time. Although well resupplied, the troops in this case carried worn equipment and wore dirty clothes. Green NVA uniforms and tennis shoe type boots were discovered on enemy KIA's. Unit designation is unknown at this time as captured documents have not as yet been analyzed. Captured weapons consisted of a normal mixture of AK-47 and ChiCom carbines for the NVA rifle company, reinforced by light to medium 7.62 and .30 caliber machineguns.

During the period 14 to 16 May Company "D" made contact with a large enemy force in the vicinity of YD 115774. In a battle that lasted 2 1/2 days the enemy aggressively mortared friendly positions and made one aborted attempt to assault the company perimeter. Captured documents of enemy KIA revealed this to be a unit of the 806th Battalion. Weapons and clothing were new and well cared for, although continuity of equipment was lacking. Uniforms were mixed between khaki, green and camouflaged utilities. A U.S. M-1 rifle and two U.S. M-2 carbines were found along with AK-47's and ChiCom carbines.

In both cases, enemy units appeared to have ample ammunition and rations for sustained encounters. While Companies "A" and "D" encountered forces operating generally in the same area, it was evident that they were not identical enemy units.

During the 29 May through 31 May period of Operation Prairie IV the battalion ZOA remained the same as during Operation Hickory. Accordingly the intelligence picture remained substantially as reported for that operation. The enemy continued harassing fires on the Con Thien defensive positions at will from concealed positions. Significant intelligence events were:

a. The discovery on 30 May of 3 camouflaged bunkers along a trench line at YD 100703. The bunker complex also contained fighting holes and barbed wire and was considered a possible NVA CP.

b. The discovery on 30 May of two graves at YD 107718. The graves were marked with inscribed markers and were suspected of containing NVA officers. The markers were returned to the rear for further scrutiny.

Terrain. Terrain in the area of greatest contact was composed of thick hedgerows and treelines enclosing small terrain compartments. Topography is even with a gentle slope to the northwest toward Con Thien. Fields of fire are restricted and troop movement is channelized. Nowhere is prominent terrain evident.

#### 7. Mission.

a. Period I (20 April 1967 to 12 May 1967)

(1) Provide one rifle platoon (Rein) for security and defense of Cam Lo Bridge Site.

(2) Provide a reserve force of one rifle platoon (Rein) for Dong Ha Combat Base.

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(3) Provide one platoon (Rein) as Sparrow Hawk Force on 15 minute alert during daylight hours.

(4) Be prepared on order to reinforce or provide relief force for Oua Viet facility and Gio Linh artillery outpost as directed in the event of enemy attack.

(5) Be prepared to conduct ground surveillance and spoiling attacks throughout the assigned area with assigned forces to detect and destroy infiltrating NVA forces.

(6) Assume OpCon of Combined Action Company P at Cam Lo including CAC P-1, P-2, P-3, and P-4.

(7) Provide security for routes #9 and #1 in assigned area utilizing combined action platoons and assigned forces.

(8) Be prepared to provide forces as required to conduct relief or provide assistance to Con Thien CIDG Camp in the event of enemy attack on Quang Tri or Hai Lang.

b. Period II (12 May through 16 May 1967). Commencing at H-Hour, D-Day conduct a deliberate search and destroy operation from the north of Cam Lo river to the Con Thien outpost.

c. Period III (29 May through 31 May 1967). Provide security for Con Thien CIDG Camp. Conduct patrols and ambushes in the assigned ZOA and provide security for elements of the 11th Engineer Battalion as they accomplished their assigned engineering tasks.

#### 8. Concept of Operation.

a. Period I (20 April to 12 May 1967). During this period there was no over all concept of operation. The battalion was required to fulfill various missions assigned by higher headquarters in regards to the defense of Dong Ha Combat Base.

b. Period II (13 May to 16 May 1967). Two companies supported by a platoon of tanks and a command group were to commence the search and destroy operation to the north from assembly area "A" (YD 144615). They were to move in a column of companies along the axis of advance through objective 1 (YD 134674). At L-Hour one rifle company was to be landed at LZ Dove to support the attack on objective 1. On order the fourth rifle company was to land at LZ Hawk and move to blocking position "C" to support the attack on objective 2 (YD 120666). After securing objective 2 the battalion was to move toward Con Thien outpost (YD 115702) on two converging axis of advance. The alternate plan of entry for the two helicopterborne companies in case of inclement weather or lack of helicopter support was a foot march in trace of the two lead companies. Both landing zones and both objectives were to be prepped. See enclosure (2)

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c. Period III (28 May to 31 May 1967). The concept for this period was to have two rifle companies at the Con Thien Camp and have two companies conduct a search and destroy operation in their assigned portions of the battalion ZOA.

9. Execution.

a. Period I (20 April to 12 May 1967). In the period from 20 April to 12 May the battalion's missions and efforts were so diverse and extensive as to preclude any coordinated efforts for companies in the field. Therefore, this period is reported on a individual company chronological basis.

(1) Company "A"

Company "A"'s first mission was to provide security for the Cua Viet Facility at the mouth of the Cua Viet river and security for the dredge activities at YD 265629. This mission included aggressive search and destroy activities to the northwest of the Cua Viet Facility. The first contact was made at 0800 on 24 April. The company was making a sweep of a hamlet when they spotted 4 VCS running to the southwest. In the attempt to apprehend the suspects, a marine tripped a ChiCom grenade that had been set with a trip wire. One marine WIA resulted from this action. Company "A" was unable to fire at the fleeing VC because of the many civilians in the area. A search of the hamlet revealed 3 M-26 boobytraps, some discarded plastic caps from 82mm mortar rounds and a tunnel complex. There were no men in the hamlet. The tunnel complex and boobytraps were destroyed.

On 25 April one platoon was transported by LVT to the vicinity of YD 260745. As they approached a small hamlet, a group of 6-10 VC ran to the north from the hamlet. The group was taken under fire with 50 caliber machineguns, but it was not determined if the VC sustained any casualties. The platoon was not permitted to go outside of its assigned boundary to conduct a search.

Although extensive search and destroy activities were conducted throughout the period, little contact was made. On 26 April at YD 265627 one platoon apprehended a VCS who was caught in the act of observing the platoon's position. The suspect had no ID card and he was taken into custody.

On 27 April while sweeping a hamlet at YD 360624 a marine was wounded by a ChiCom grenade boobytrap. Active patrolling and sweeps were conducted on 27 April, but there were no incidents of note.

At 0242 on 28 April the Dong Ha Combat Base came under 140mm rocket and 82mm mortar fire. The attack lasted approximately 40 minutes and resulted in a number of casualties, none of which were from the 1st Bn, 9th Marines. Company "A" at first light, began a search of the areas suspected of being the launching sites for the rocket attack. At YD 256680 they found 78 launching positions and 54 intact rockets. The positions were aimed at the Dong Ha Combat Base. Another launching site for 30 rockets and 15 intact rockets was discovered at YD 258682. In connection with these results one platoon at YD 256680 found 4 VC of military age without ID cards. They were taken into custody.

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Company "A" continued its mission. No further incident occurred until 1 May when a sweeping platoon at YD 258753 received heavy small arms fire and six 60mm mortar rounds. Fire was returned and the area checked, but there was no indication of enemy casualties.

No further contact was made until 11 May when sniper fire and automatic small arms fire was received at YD 278520, 295538, and 276512. No casualties were sustained. The company returned to Dong Ha Combat Base and made preparations for a forthcoming operation of battalion size.

(2) Company "C"

The beginning of this reporting period found Company "C" with the mission of providing the Sparrow Hawk platoon, the reaction force at the Dong Ha Combat Base, and local patrols in the vicinity of the base.

On 20 April the Sparrow Hawk was called out to help a reconnaissance unit that had discovered a large cache of enemy weapons and supplies at YD 088654. Some of the supplies were captured and others were destroyed in place.

On 22 April one WIA was sustained by Company "C" when a patrol at YD 271544 received sniper fire. Fire was returned but no enemy casualties were found. Another WIA was sustained by the company from sniper fire the same day at YD 272548. Again, there were negative results in a search for the enemy.

Company "C" relieved Company "D" and took over the mission of conducting search and destroy operations south of Quang Tri City on 24 April. Contact was made at 1130 on 25 April at YD 357460 when a company sweep was fired on by an estimated VC squad. Fire was returned and an AO operating with the company called in artillery fire. The AO spotted 4 probable VC KIA. Most of the enemy contact in the area south of Quang Tri City consisted of long range sniper and harassing fire. More harassing fire was received at YD 339476 while an LZ was being secured on the evening of the 25th.

Mines were also encountered in this area. A trip wire activated ChiCom grenade detonated resulting in one marine WIA at YD 350475. The 26th was uneventful but on the 27th at YD 345446 a patrol discovered 6 bodies clothed in green uniforms in shallow graves. The bodies were badly decomposed and it was estimated that they were 10 days to 2 weeks old. At 2300 the night of 27 April the company received approximately 25 rounds of 60mm mortar fire. Two marines were wounded in this attack. Sniper and harassing fire were again the only contact made on 28 April. In all sniper incidents fire was returned and searches conducted but with negative results. One marine was wounded when he fell on a punji stake at YD 363474. Another marine WIA was sustained when a ChiCom grenade was detonated along a trail at YD 354477.

On 29 April 4 WIA were sustained from mine detonations. One incident at YD 349471 occurred when a ChiCom grenade set along a trail was detonated and wounded one marine. A short time later at YD 349470 a mine of unknown type exploded and injured 3 marines.

On 30 April a squad size unit of VC was sighted at YD 362455. They were pursued, but not found. There were several sniper incidents during the afternoon of 30 April with no friendly casualties. At 1705 at YD

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355433 a Company "C" platoon received approximately 100 rounds of small arms fire from an estimated 15 VC. One marine was wounded. Small arms, 60mm mortars, artillery and air strikes were brought to bear on the suspected enemy position. A search of the area revealed no positive results. On 1 May another marine at YD 333470 was wounded by sniper fire and again the enemy was not located.

At 0635 on 2 May seven VC were encountered at YD 349443 and taken under small arms and artillery fire. A search of the area revealed a bullet punctured helmet with blood and pieces of brain tissue in it. Also, several blood trails and drag marks were found along with some assorted gear. One confirmed and two probable VC kills resulted from this encounter. A short time later at 0645 an estimated squad of VC were taken under fire by a squad from Company "C". Small arms and artillery was brought to bear against the enemy. Two enemy dead and some assorted equipment was found and there was evidence of 2 more probable KIA's.

At 1735 one platoon at YD 346448 received small arms fire that wounded two marines. After returning fire, the area was searched with negative results.

No further significant action occurred until 5 May when at YD 360456, a marine was hit by sniper fire. On 7 May at YD 359465 a ChiCom grenade with trip wire was detonated and two marine WIA were sustained. The company returned to the Dong Ha Combat Base on 7 May and took over the mission of base reaction force.

### (3) Company "D"

At the beginning of Operation Prairie IV Company "D" had the mission of conducting search and destroy operations in the area south of Quang Tri City.

On 20 April the first contact in this operation was costly for U.S. Forces. An Army M-42 40mm tracked vehicle accompanying a Company "D" platoon in a sweep at YD 383453 was hit by a anti-tank rocket. The rocket was fired from a hedgerow 50 meters away. Three U.S. Army personnel were KIA and 1 WIA, also 2 U.S. Marines were WIA. Response to the enemy action netted no results.

Also on this same day 2 ChiCom grenades with trip wire were detonated. One was at YD 382454 where 1 marine WIA was sustained and the other was at YD 378453 where 2 more marines were wounded. Nearby, a M-26 boobytrap was discovered and destroyed in place.

No further incidents took place and on 24 April Company "C" took over the Company "D" mission. Company "D" returned to the Dong Ha Combat Base and assumed responsibility for Sparrow Hawk, Cam Lo Bridge security and local patrolling around the base.

On 25 April a platoon conducted a sweep of a village at YD 207602. The sweep was unrewarding. All Company "D" missions were maintained without incident until 5 May when at YD 241548 a patrol spotted 2 VC snipers with weapons. The VC were taken under fire with small arms, but a search of the area did not reveal any VC casualties. Later that day some harassing fire was received as a patrol moved in the vicinity of YD 285519. Casualties were sustained on 5 May at YD 266558 when a

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marine was wounded by a punjii stake and at YD 293541 when 2 marines were wounded by a pressure detonated mine. Both incidents occurred during search and destroy operation. The final incident of this period occurred on 6 May when a patrol member detonated a trip wire activated M-26. Three marine WIA resulted from this incident.

On 7 May Company "D" moved out to provide security for an Army artillery battery located at YD 223676. Three days later the battery and Company "D" displaced to YD 223658. No enemy contact was made while Company "D" provided the security for the battery.

(4) Combined Action Company P

The 1st Bn, 9th Marines had operational control of CAC P located in the Dong Ha area. This company consisted of four platoons.

On 21 April CAP-2, after receiving 2 rounds of sniper fire from YD 275556, dispatched a sweep team to check the suspected sniper site. During the sweep, a boobytrapped grenade was detonated. One marine was hit in the chest. No medevac was required.

The next day, April 22nd, CAP-2 was again fired upon from the same general vicinity. As a reaction force moved out in an attempt to make contact with the enemy, a boobytrap was exploded and resulted in 2 marines and 1 PF being wounded. Small arms fire was directed into the suspected enemy area. Upon checking the area later, no evidence of the enemy was discovered.

Enemy activity was minimal until 3 May when 1 grenade was thrown over the protective wire at a machinegun position. One friendly WIA resulted.

While moving on patrol in the vicinity of YD 116597, a combined squad of PF's and marines walked into an ambush of at least 25-30 VC or NVA's. The ambush was positioned in such a way as to offer an excellent field of fire over the well used trail. The patrol immediately returned fire, but was pinned down and unable to move. A reaction force from CAP-2 and also one PF company were dispatched to the aid of the beleaguered unit. The enemy broke contact upon approach of the relief group and fled. A sweep of the area produced no appreciable results. Two PF's and one marine were KIA, 2 PF's and 1 marine were wounded. One M-16 and 2 carbines were captured by the enemy before they fled.

Again activity was calm until the 9th of May when CAP-2 received 40 incoming sniper rounds from the vicinity of YD 275550. One friendly WIA reported. Small arms fire was returned with negative results.

On the morning of 11 May 1967 a large VC force attacked CAP-2. The attack commenced with attempts to break through the protective wire and the throwing of satchel charges. Heavy friendly fire prevented the enemy from exploiting the advantage of surprise and the enemy was finally driven off. Two VC were found in the wire at daylight. One pair of wire cutters and 1 AK-47 rifle were found with the bodies. The friendly casualties were 1 marine KIA, 12 marines WIA, 2 PF KIA, and 3 PF WIA. The enemy casualties were 2 KIA confirmed and 15 probable KIA.

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## b. Period II (13 May through 16 May 1967)

On 12 May at about 1730 the battalion (-) comprised of Company "A", Company "C", elements of H&S Company and the CP entrucked at the Dong Ha Combat Base and conducted a tactical motor march to the vicinity of assembly area "A" (YD 144615). A platoon of tanks met the battalion at assembly area "A". The CP and Company "C" position was at YD 143617 and Company "A" position was at YD 140617. Night defense, aggressive patrols, and ambushes were conducted from these positions. No contact was made.

On the morning of 13 May the battalion (-) commenced a search and destroy mission north to Con Thien outpost as specified in Operation Order 3-67. Company "A" and supporting tanks moved in the lead position. Company "C" and the CP group followed in trace. Artillery prep fires were utilized from 0910 to 0925 on objective 1, the hamlet of Phu An (YD 134674). Air strikes were carried out from 0930 to 1145 on objective 1. There were insufficient helicopters to lift Company "D" as planned. Because of the lack of helicopters Company "D" was moved into the OA by foot march. At 131450H the first contact was made by Company "A" at YD 135684. After completing the sweep of objective 1 and moving in a north-west direction, the point element made contact with an NVA unit. Initial contact temporarily pinned down the lead elements of Company "A". Tanks and other elements attempted to move into position to gain fire superiority. A gully obstacle prevented tanks from moving to the most advantageous position. The 1st Platoon, Company "A" moved west across the gully and was subjected to intense automatic weapons fire that prevented them from continuing their advance or withdrawing. The 3rd Platoon, Company "A" with the tank platoon moved north through the 1st Platoon position in an attempt to provide covering fire for the removal of the wounded. The 3rd Platoon, Company "A" and the tank platoon came under heavy fire from automatic weapons and anti-tank weapons and were unable to extract their wounded. To enable them to make this extraction, the 3rd Platoon, Company "C" moved up to provide security. This maneuver was successful and the wounded were removed. Because of darkness Company "A" was unable to continue the attack. NVA units engaged were well armed with machineguns, AK-47's, grenades, and anti-tank weapons. It is now known that the enemy unit engaged was at least company size and was well dug into hedgerows and tree lines which ran north south and east west. The results of this action were 9 USMC KIA and 52 WIA; NVA 24 KIA confirmed and 30 probable.

Company "D" whom had moved by foot from YD 222687 to a position at YD 668136 linked up with the other units. Company "D", H&S Company and the CP maintained a night defensive position at YD 136667 and conducted ambushes and patrols, without contact. Company "A" and Company "C" conducted normal night activities from a position in the vicinity of YD 133683.

At the onset of the battalion activities Company "B" was made OpCon 3rd Mar Regt at the Camp Carroll Artillery Plateau. On 13 May Company "B" chopped to 1st Bn, 9th Marines and returned to Dong Ha Combat Base to prepare for insertion into the OA. Due to a lack of helicopters the planned helicopter assault of Company "B" into LZ Hawk was unable to be

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conducted. On the morning of 14 May the company was transported by motor convoy to the vicinity of the Cam Lo Bridge and then proceeded on foot to join the battalion.

On 14 May a Company "A" platoon sweep at YD 136683 made the first contact of the day at 0730 when they encountered a well entrenched machinegun position. Friendly casualties were 1 marine KIA and 1 WIA. After a brief fire fight the Company "A" platoon broke contact and withdrew to the CP. At 1015 mortar fire in Company "A" and Company "C" areas caused numerous casualties. Approximately 30-40 rounds of 82mm mortar fire rained down on the companies positions at YD 133680. The bombardment resulted in 2 marines killed and 39 wounded. Fire was returned with mortars, artillery, and air strikes. A short distance from the initial impact area another barrage was fired upon an LZ. Twenty-five rounds of 82mm mortars was received at YD 134680. The incoming fire was received just as a working party was removing water and rations from the LZ. Four marines were killed and 20 wounded in this attack. The effects of counter mortar fire and air strikes are not known.

Company "B" in sweep activities at YD 131664 killed a NVA sniper in a "spider trap position". Company "D" moving in sweep activities fired 10 rounds of 60mm mortars in reconnaissance by fire mission. The enemy responded with 2 - 82mm mortars causing 2 marine WIA. More mortar fire was received by Company "A" at YD 134680. Two marines were wounded. Fixed wing air support dropped 4 - 500 pound bombs. There appeared to be a base plate flying through the air from the impact area and it is suspected that the enemy position was destroyed.

At 1730 Company "D" while conducting a company sized search and destroy mission made contact with a group of about 20 NVA. The NVA were taken under fire with small arms. They ran and were pursued by Company "D". While Company "D" was pursuing the fleeing enemy contact was made with an estimated company of NVA at YD 117679. Company "D" was in column with the CP and 1st platoon at the lead of column. The initial contact brought fire down on the column from both the east and west flanks. The CP group and the forward platoon became separated from the main body. The two rear platoons were under continuous fire, from enemy in concealed positions, but they managed to link-up, form a defensible perimeter, and establish a LZ for extraction of casualties. The CP group and the forward platoon with great difficulty and under continuous fire attempted to move to the established perimeter. One squad became separated as the unit was moving. This increased the difficulties in linking up at the perimeter. The link up was made in the early evening and all the serious casualties were successfully evacuated. However, the action was not over. Twelve rounds of 82mm mortar was received and the lines were attacked by troops with satchel charges and small arms. The results of this encounter were 6 marines KIA and 16 WIA while the NVA sustained 27 KIA, by body count and another 50 probable. During the aforementioned helicopter evacuation, 1 helicopter (H-34) was hit and downed in the LZ. Since the LZ was under heavy fire the non-serious wounded and the bodies of the KIA were not evacuated but an emergency resupply of ammunition was conducted during the hours of darkness.

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During the night of 14 May the battalion conducted aggressive night activities. The CP, H&S Company, and Company "A" located at YD 680134, while Company "B" established at YD 669136, Company "C" at YD 675137 and Company "D" at YD 115674. There was no further contact until 0345 on 15 May.

The action started at 0345 with a short mortar barrage on Company "D" position at YD 113675. Artillery and a flare ship were called in to support the companies efforts. There was a short lull in enemy activity until 0415 when one enemy unit estimated at company strength began a continuous aggressive probing attack against the Company "D" perimeter. Repeated efforts were made to probe the perimeter. The enemy was supported by 82mm mortars. Counter mortar artillery fire searched for the enemy positions. The probing attempts were met by small arms fire and none of the probes succeeded in penetrating the lines. The probing attacks continued until 1100. The approach of a medevac or resupply helicopter would initiate a new attack by enemy forces. The attacks were characterized by the use of heavy automatic fire, satchel charges and grenades. In addition, four 82mm rocket rounds were fired at Company "D" position. Casualties sustained in this encounter were 5 USMC KIA and 56 USMC WIA. Enemy losses were 21 KIA confirmed and 30 probable. Two ChiCom machineguns were captured.

Early on the morning of 15 May Company "B" moved to join Company "D" in order to assist Company "D" in evacuating its casualties and to sweep the area. At 1145 the enemy initiated action against Company "B" at vicinity of YD 116674. Five 82mm mortar rounds claimed 11 marines WIA. The enemy action was answered immediately by 60mm mortars. Shortly thereafter more fire was received. Two marines were killed and four wounded in this subsequent attack. Artillery was called on the suspected enemy position. At 1300 more mortar fire was received by Company "B" and air support was called on the enemy. An AO directed the close air support. The company moved to YD 115674 and at 1400 82mm mortars again fell upon their position. One marine was killed and 10 wounded in this attack. More artillery was called to destroy the enemy position. At 1540 another mortar attack resulted in 1 USMC KIA and 1 WIA. Evacuation of the more serious casualties was accomplished by the continual moving of the landing zone in order to keep the enemy fire from zeroing in.

An AO working in conjunction with Company "A" spotted a concentration of enemy bunkers at YD 131682. Aircraft were called in and the position was hit by air strikes. There was one large secondary explosion after a bomb run. A search of the area revealed one NVA KIA. Aggressive patrols and ambushes were conducted throughout the night of 15 May. No contacts were made. Positions for the night were Company "A", and CP at YD 131679, Company "B" and Company "D" at YD 115674, and Company "C" at YD 132667.

Early on 16 May Companies "D" and "B" moved to the east to a safe landing zone to evacuate the bodies and walking wounded. While moving Company "D" received 11 rounds 82mm at 0945 but no casualties resulted. Company "A" and the battalion CP at YD 131667 received 15 rounds 82mm mortars and 150 rounds of small arms fire. Again no casualties resulted from these enemy attempts.

The next confrontation with the enemy cost the lives of 3 marines and wounds for 33 others. Companies "A" and "C" while conducting a search in

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vicinity of YD 130682 were taken under fire by 82mm mortars and heavy small arms fire. This was the same enemy position that Company "A" and Company "C" received the heavy fire from on 13 May 1967. It was estimated that an enemy reinforced company was being encountered. All infantry weapons and the guns of accompanying tanks were brought to bear on the enemy. The enemy was well dug in with mutually supporting positions and interlocking cross machinegun fire. Five tanks were used in an attempt to destroy the enemy complex. One tank was hit and disabled by a 82mm recoiless rifle round that blew off the track. Artillery and 81mm mortars brought fire on the enemy positions. The action of infantry and supporting arms against the enemy continued from 1440 to 1820. Companies "A" and "C" broke contact at dusk because the approaching darkness made a continuation of the attack undesirable. A search of the area disclosed 23 enemy dead by body count and 33 probable KIA's were estimated.

The night was spent in defensive positions and normal night activities were conducted. Positions occupied on the night of 16 May were CP, Company "A", H&S Company at YD 131679; Company "B" at YD 120678; Company "C" at YD 132677; Company "D" at YD 133676. No contact was made and the battalion temporarily ended Prairie IV at 172400H and commenced Operation Hickory at 180001H.

c. Period III (29 May through 31 May). At 290001H May 1967 Operation Prairie IV began again after the completion of Operation Hickory. The battalion CP and two rifle companies were located at Con Thien CIDG Camp with two rifle companies conducting search and destroy operations in the assigned portions of the battalion's ZOA. Companies "D" and "C" were both located at YD 137708 because Company "C" had been required to assist Company "D" in conducting medical evacuations the previous night.

At 0800 a VC "Rallier" was picked up by Company "B" 50 meters outside the perimeter wire of Con Thien. The VC surrendered as a "Chieu Hoi" although he did not have a pass in his possession at the time. He was exploited for immediate information of tactical value and delivered to 9th Marines S-2 for further interrogation. At 1245 while on a sweep, Company "D" discovered approximately 6 mortar positions about 3 feet deep and 6 feet in diameter inclined towards Con Thien at YD 115713. It is felt these holes are used to emplace the mortar tubes without base plates. Companies "C" and "D" set in for night defensive positions and no contact was made although normal patrols and ambushes were conducted.

The engineer platoon having completed improving fields of fire around Con Thien commenced to widen the strip from Con Thien to Gio Linh. The strip which was 200 meters had to be widened to 600 meters.

At 0650 on 30 May Company "B" received two rounds of 82mm artillery in its column as the company left Con Thien to provide security for the engineers. The fire resulted in two non-serious WIA's. Counter battery fire was returned on all suspected gun positions.

At 0930 Company "C" relieved Company "A" in its assigned portion of the perimeter at Con Thien. Company "A" conducted a sweep around Con Thien starting to the southwest and ending to the northeast. One platoon from Company "A" spotted a VC squad heading north wearing black uniforms in vicinity of YD 103701. An artillery mission was called with results unknown. Company "A" found two well marked graves with wooden markers

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inscribed in Vietnamese at YD 107718. About 1730 Company "A" found 8 rounds of 82mm mortar at YD 108719. The rounds were destroyed.

A platoon of M-50 Ontos arrived at Con Thien and were placed in direct support of the battalion. The two rifle companies outside the Con Thien perimeter set in their night positions with Company "A" at YD 122738 and Company "D" at YD 138708. No contact was made with the enemy.

Company "B" continued to provide security for the engineers on 31 May while Company "A" was used to screen the northern portion of the strip and Company "D" was used to screen the area east of the engineers. Upon completion of the days work Company "B" returned with the engineers to Con Thien. Company "A" set in a night defensive position at YD 127712 and Company "D" set in at YD 130705. No enemy contact was made and Operation Prairie IV ended at 312400H May 1967.

11. Administrative Matters.

a. Supply. All units on operational assignments were issued one day Class I, basic allowance of Class V and combat essential Class II. The battalion was resupplied by small boats, helicopters and motor transportation.

b. Maintenance. Nothing significant

c. Treatment of Casualties, Evacuation and Hospitalization. Casualties were treated in the field by the battalion medical officer or corpsmen and evacuated by helicopter as quickly as possible.

d. Transportation. Motor transport was used for non-tactical moves. All tactical moves were made on foot.

e. Communications. No difficulty was encountered with wire communications. Interference of an unknown commercial station rendered Company "D" tactical net (frequency 44.3 MC, M-623) unusable. It also became apparent that when the battalion took operational control of the fourth rifle company a requirement for a permanent administrative net was needed. An administrative net was established.

f. Medical Evaluation. No new or unusual medical circumstances occurred during Prairie IV.

12. Special Equipment and Techniques. None13. Commanders Analysis.

a. Tank-infantry communications was almost non-existent because of the lack of communication equipment that would net. The RT-70 in the

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M-48 tank and the AN PRC-25 utilized by the infantry would not net due to difference in assigned frequency and lack of power in the RT-70. An AN PRC-25 was given to the tank platoon leader by the battalion so he could come up on the desired frequency but it was very difficult to monitor the AN PRC-25 while wearing his tank helmet and monitoring his own tank net. The tank infantry phone on most of the tanks were inoperable. Friendly casualties did result because of this lack of communication. This problem will be solved when the RT-524 replaces the RT-70 in the M-48.

b. It was noted that the tactics of the NVA were very similar to those encountered by this battalion previously. The enemy remained in a position fortified with extremely well camouflaged bunkers and held their small arms fire until the friendly forces got within 25 meters or less. The mortar fire utilized by the enemy was pre-registered but mortar tubes themselves were fired from within the fortified complex and once friendly troops closed with the enemy the mortars could no longer fire due to the very short range (less 100 meters) and the intermingling of troops. This was by far the most heavily fortified area this battalion has encountered. See enclosure (2) for a diagram of the fortified area.

c. The Civic Action Program for Period I (20 April to 12 May 1967) was engaged in Civic Action solely through the efforts of CAP-1, 2, and 3 located in the Dong Ha Area. First Bn, 9th Marines had operational control of the CAC units. During the above period 1070 Vietnamese citizens were assisted medically by the corpsmen and doctors of 1st Bn, 9th Marines and CAC. Also bridges, boat docks, and other public improvement projects were begun and are progressing nicely at this time.

During Period II and Period III no civilians were encountered and no Civic Action accomplished.


d. In the field of Psy-Ops, a leaflet drop was arranged over two suspected fortified enemy troop concentrations when it became apparent that close air support was to be used. The theme was U.S. planes and bombs. No audio means were employed as no prisoners had been captured and there was no definite idea as to the enemy unit disposition at the time.


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Operation Overlay Prairie IV
