PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of July 1967 the 1st Battalion, 9th Marines was involved in four operational periods. From 1-13 July the battalion assumed responsibility for the Con Thien perimeter, search and destroy operations in its AO, and security of the MSR (Route 561) within its AO. From 14-31 July the 1st Battalion, 9th Marines was the resident infantry battalion at Camp CARROLL. Two operations, CIMARRON and BUFFALO took place 1-14 July and two, HICKORY II and KINGFISHER from 14-31 July 1967.

The month began with two companies "A" and "B" operating northwest, north and northeast of Con Thien. On 2 July both companies made heavy contact with an estimated two NVA Battalions. Company "A" was prevented from linking up as directed with Company "B" by heavy fire to its front and flanks. Company "B" casualties mounted including the Company Commander, two Platoon Commanders FO and FAC. A new Company Commander was sent in and Company "C" was heli-lifted in from Dong Ha. Close fighting continued as Company "C" with a platoon of tanks moved forward to relieve Company "B" and evacuate the casualties. The enemy countered with heavy massed artillery and mortar fire hitting the LZ evacuation site hard.

The Battalion Commander appraised the Regimental Commander of the situation and the Regimental Commander committed 3/9 which arrived at 1730. Companies "A" and "C" were chopped OPCON of 3/9 and remained so until 10 July. The remaining elements of Company "B" plus a platoon from Company "D" which had been used to secure the LZ were moved into the perimeter of Con Thien by 2015.

On 6 July Companies "A" and "C" were combined under the command of Company "A" due to the personnel shortage in each company and the evacuation of "C" Company Commander, WIA. That evening the combined companies engaged an estimated 200 NVA. Fighting continued throughout the night with the companies being credited with 150 NVA confirmed KIA's.

From 3-9 July, Con Thien was subjected to sporadic enemy artillery fire, receiving from 5 to 350 rounds a day. On 6 July Company "D"'s Commanding Officer and First Sergeant were killed by incoming rounds. On 7 July the COC was hit killing 11 and wounding 18. Companies "A" and "C" returned to OPCON of 1/9 on 10 July and were used as a reaction/counter attack force. On 13 July the daily road sweep of MSR uncovered one AT mine, the first encountered during this period.

At 1400, 13 July units of the 3d Battalion, 4th Marines arrived at Con Thien to effect a relief of positions with 1/9. At 1600, 1/9 chopped OPCON to 3d Marines and assumed the responsibility for the defense of Camp CARROLL.

Operation HICKORY II began at 0001, 14 July. The following day Company "B" relieved "I" Company 3/4 of the D-5 Sector. HICKORY was scored at 1600 16 July with negative enemy contact for 1/9.

Operation KINGFISHER began at 1601 on 16 July. Company "D" was heli-lifted to Ba Long and became OPCON of 3d Marines at 1140 on 17 July. At this time the CP, E&S Company and Company "A" (-) and Company "C" were at Camp CARROLL; 1st Platoon Company "A" occupied Khe Gia Bridge; Company "B" was at D-5 and Company "D" at Ba Long. For the next two weeks maximum effort was exerted to small unit training, refurbishing, and indoctrination of newly joined personnel. 19-20 July, Camp CARROLL was on 50% alert in anticipation of VC incidents to commemorate "Day of National Shame!" This passed without incident.

On 21 July, Company "B" medevaced a wounded Vietnamese national who was a victim of a mine believed to be detonated by a water buffalo. This same mine killed a 14 year old boy. A patrol from the Combined Action Platoon while on a sweep blew a 250 lb bomb in the vicinity of YD 095567. A report was received of 5 VC armed with assorted weapons in the vicinity of YD 115512. Company "B" dispatched a patrol and ambush with negative results.

On 22 July, Company "C" and 2nd Platoon, Company "A" departed Camp CARROLL to support operations of 3/3 near Ca Lu, OPCON to 3/3 at 1000. Company "B" sent a platoon to assist in the defense of Camp CARROLL assuming perimeter defense in Section D.

At 1645 one 35 year old male civilian was medevaced for acute appendicitis from Thon Lan Dinh. Liaison was accomplished by TP-6. On the 23rd at 2000 a patrol from TP-5 found propaganda leaflets and submitted same to the 3d Marine Regiment S-2. A Company "B" patrol discovered one 105mm mortar at YD 12059 and destroyed it in place. One Marine from Company "C" was injured slightly by rock splinters while attempting to blow a cave. The Medical Section initiated a Med CAP program in the vicinity of D-5 (YD 014513) on 28 July, seeing 151 patients.

On 30 July at 0745 Company "C" returned to Camp CARROLL after completing an operation with 3/3.

Company "C" replaced Company "A" and assumed responsibility of Sector B's segment of the Camp CARROLL Defense Perimeter on 31 July at 0830.

Later that day after a report of children scavenging for food at the Main Gate of Camp CARROLL's trash dump a U. S. type MK11 fragmentation grenade was discovered in the preparation stage of becoming a booby trap. The installer was not apprehended but the grenade was detonated.

Company "B", 1st Platoon departed as security for a Rough Rider to the Khe Sanh area, and became OPCON to 3/3 at 1125 hours, on 31 July.

At 1935 TF-6 requested an emergency medevac for a civilian child suffering from chest pains and a high fever. The evac to Delta Med at Dong Ha was completed at 2004.

As the month of July ended the 1st Battalion, 9th Marines continued as an integral part of Operation KINGFISHER carrying out its assigned mission.

(b) Conduct ground surveillance and spoiling attacks throughout assigned OA with designated forces, to detect and destroy infiltration of NVA forces.

(c) Maintain security on Route 561 in OA by aggressive patrolling along flanks.

(d) Provide security for mine sweep team in ZOA.

(e) Occupy and defend Con Thien complex with a company group and a battalion (-).

(2) Operation BUFFALO: To conduct a search and destroy operation within AO, maintain security of MSR (Route 561) in AO, and provide security for Con Thien.

(3) Operation HICKORY II: To occupy and defend Camp J. J. CARROLL and the assigned area of operations to include the defense of D-5, Ba Long Valley and the Khe Gia Bridge.

(4) Operation KINGFISHER: To occupy and defend Camp J. J. CARROLL and the assigned area of operations to include the defense of D-5, Ba Long Valley and the Khe Gia Bridge.

became OPCON of 3/9 on 2 July until 10 July. The battalion was chopped OPCON to 3d Marines on the 13th of July for the remainder of the period. Company "C" and the 2nd platoon of Company "A" during operation KINGFISHER were chopped OPCON to 3/3 from 22-30 July.

g. Equipment: Organic transportation remained a major problem. Five vehicles were lost due to enemy artillery fire and the expected personnel carriers which would alleviate the problem did not arrive. There was an acute shortage of M-16 cleaning gear. The tentage assigned which was left in place by preceding units was barely serviceable and rendered in worse conditions by the strong winds.

h. Logistics: Despite a number of O2 priorities resupply has not been effective especially 782 gear, repair parts for Communications gear and vehicle parts.

i. Civic Action: During Operation KINGFISHER, 1/9 began regular MEDCAPS in the D-5 area and assisted in three main Civic Action Programs there building a school, digging a well and teaching English. The MEDCAP saw 151 persons in the first visit.

j. Administration: Nothing significant to report.

1. Intelligence: During the period of 1 to 13 July the following NVA units were operating in the Battalion AO near Con Thien: The 7th and 9th

Battalions of the 90th Regiment, 324B Division and elements of the 80th Regiment, 324B Division.

Contact with the enemy during this period showed the enemy to be aggressive well trained and well disciplined. Captured weapons indicate the enemy were using AK-47 rifles, Chinese Communist 7.62 light guns, type 53; RPG-2 and RPG-7 Chinese Communist antitank grenade launchers.

Reports from friendly units indicate the enemy using RPG-2's and RPG-7's against armor and friendly crew served weapons. Friendly units also report the enemy using flare throwers, possibly the Soviet Man Pack Flarethrower LPO-50. The enemy also used 85mm field guns, 122mm field guns, 82mm mortars and 60mm mortars. Several 152mm Howitzers were also used.

During the period 13 to 31 July in the Battalion AO, the following enemy units were reported to be operating: elements of the 29th NVA Regiment, 325C Division, elements of the 15th Engineer Battalion, 90th Regiment, 324B Division.

Enemy movement in the 305 (TP 0954) has been reported in up to platoon size. However, no contact with reported units has been made. A VC propaganda team consisting of three men and two women all armed, was seen in the 305 area. The last sighting was on 25 July.

A few mining incidents have occurred. Several old Chinese Communist booby traps have been found along trails. An MK-2 U. S. grenade was found booby trapped in the trash dump at Camp J. J. CARROLL. These instances do not fit any specific pattern.

The AN/TPS-21 is being used at Camp CARROLL to detect enemy movement. No sightings by the AN/TPS-21 were made in July.

m. Weather: During the month of July the weather varied from hot, sunny days to periods of rain squalls and heavy winds. These strong winds at times caused helicopters to be grounded except in the case of emergency operation.

n. Communications: During the month of July, wire communications held up quite well. The only problem encountered was an occasional disruption of the radio relay shot from our Con Thien location to Dong Ha. The "breakdown" of this shot was due to improper antenna alignment in Dong Ha.

Radio communications suffered again this month from the lack of H-138 hand sets. We also encountered problems in that seven radios were reported as

combat losses.

One of the Battalion's AN/TPS-21's, radar set, was returned from repair and put into operation. Since the employment of this particular set, there have been no malfunctions or breakdowns whatsoever, and it has been functioning satisfactorily.

o. Fire Support: During all four of these operations, nightly MI's were fired in order that they might restrict and thereby hamper enemy operations. Many spotter rounds were fired to assist the companies in orienting themselves. Illumination was utilized to detect enemy movement and location.

On 2 July, four missions were fired to support Company "A", "B", and "C" who were engaged in heavy contact with NVA forces. Three missions were fired on 6 July under the same circumstances, to support Companies "A" and "C".

During the period 1st Battalion, 9th Marines was located at Con Thien, it was necessary to fire many counter mortar and counter-artillery missions. The counter artillery missions were delivered across the DMZ, where many secondary explosions were observed.

While located at Camp CARROLL, nightly missions were fired on bluffs and other likely areas of suspected enemy activity.

p. Air Support: During the first days of the reporting period extensive use was made of fixed wing and helicopter support. On 2 July 1967, helicopters lifted 135 personnel of Company "C" on short notice. Fixed wing aircraft, HU-1E gunships and flare ships were successfully employed that day and night. During the month of July over one hundred medical evacuations by helicopters took place; some during the hours of darkness supported by flares. Aerial observers were utilized for the placement of air strikes and artillery on enemy positions. Fixed wing aircraft conducted over one-hundred separate controlled TPQ missions on targets submitted by the aerial observers.

5. Supporting Forces.

a. Artillery. Operation Cimarron was marked by a great number of Artillery fire missions. There were 94 total fire missions fired during this operation. Among these were 8 prep fires, 6 marking round missions, and 10 concentration registrations. The remaining 70 missions were fired either on Viet Cong/ NVA forces or on NVA mortar and artillery positions. All but four of these 94 missions were observed. All of these missions were fired in support of the 1st Battalion, 9th Marines.

The breakdown of missions by type of weapon is as follows:
155mm-one mission, 8 inch guns-2 missions, 4.2 inch mortar-
2 missions, 175mm-guns- 2 missions, and 105mm Howitzers-87 missions.

The total number of rounds by type of round is as follows: HE-2761, WP-223, VT-69, and 16 illumination rounds. This accounts for a total of 3069 rounds fired for the Operation. This total accounted for one confirmed kill, numerous bunkers destroyed, and secondary explosions as well as suppressing NVA incoming mortar and artillery fires.

b. Air.

During Operation Cimarron air support consisted mainly of daily resupply, medical evacuations and aerial observation.

Observation aircraft were used extensively during the daylight hours for spotting enemy mortars and artillery positions which had been noted. Occasionally these aircraft were used by the sweeping companies to observe enemy movement preceeding them.

Resupply by helo was required by at least one company during the operation. Empty water containers still present a problem to a moving unit due to the shortage of choppers for retrieving them.

Thirty-five medical evacuations took place including two NVA and thirty-three U.S.

Close air support was limited to two days of strikes due to the lack of suitable targets. These consisted of twenty two sorties, using bombs, napalm and guns.

The Battalion used ten TPQ-10 sorties per night for the entire operation to hit enemy artillery positions and supply routes. When suitable targets arose, daylight TPQ's were employed.

c. Armor

The 1st Battalion 9th Mar. was assigned a platoon of tanks throughout Operation Cimarron. These tanks were used mainly in a defensive position and were occasionally used to deliver H&I fires. While at Con Thien, five "twin" 40mm M-42's were available for defensive use and H&I fires. For a short period there was also a section of LVT's used for resupply and transportation.

Within the ZOA 1st Bn. 9th Marines was reported the 90th Regiment of the 324th Division and the 341st Division of the North Vietnamese Regular Army. During the first few weeks of the operation NVA artillery units operating north of the Ben Hai River shelled the Battalion C.P. at Con Thien with sporadic fire during the day. At night the enemy on several occasions employed 82mm, and 60mm mortar fire against Con Thien. Most of the fire directed at Con Thien was of harassing type. During the last few weeks of the operation enemy artillery and mortar fire against Con Thien gradually increased.

Enemy activity was limited to fire team size units which employed ambushes and sniper activity against friendly units. The enemy also used DE-10 directional type mines command detonated against friendly units. Several Chi-Com grenade booby traps were found.

Very old enemy bunker systems were found at YD 164727. Enemy trench systems were found throughout the ZOA; trench lines and fighting positions were found surrounding all the farm villages.

Weather

The weather from 1 June 1967 to 2 July 67 was fair and warm. There were intermingled high clouds throughout the month; however these had no effect on air operations. The wind during this period blew from a generally north westerly direction. There were occasional thunder showers and electrical disturbances in the late afternoon and early evenings.

Cover and Concealment

Within the AO of the 1st Bn., 9th Mar. there was a generally heavy secondary growth with many by hedgerows and underbrush which tended to channelize movement along existing trails. This growth offered excellent cover and concealment.

Terrain.

This area is characterized by rolling terrain interlaced with small stream beds and rolling hills. Since the area was formerly populated, abandoned paddies and dry farming areas are found throughout. There are dense hedgerows hampering movement and limiting fields of fire while affording excellent ambush sites.

The mission of the 1st Bn., 9th Marines during Operation Cimarron was manifold and included the following:

- (1) Coordinate and provide security for 11th Engr. Bn. personnel and equipment clearing a 600m strip between Con Thien and Gio Linh.
- (2) Be prepared on order to provide relief and reinforcement for Gio Linh artillery outpost, Qua Viet facilities and Con Thien CIDG camp in the event of an enemy attack.
- (3) Conduct ground surveillance and spoiling attacks throughout assigned OA with designated forces, to detect and destroy infiltration of NVA forces.
- (4) Maintain security on Route 561 in ZOA by aggressive patrolling along flanks.
- (5) Provide security for mine sweep team in ZOA.
- (6) Occupy and defend Con Thien complex with a command group and a Battalion. (-)

8. Concept of Operation.

The concept of operation for the 1st Bn. 9th Marine varied according to the particular mission assigned. One Company and a command group minus was used to provide security for the Engineer personnel and equipment. Two companies operated in the ZOA conducting extensive Sweep and Destroy operations, and 1 Company plus Battalion SOC group remained at Con Thien to maintain security.

9. Execution:

On 1 June the 1st Bn., 9th Marines were maintaining the positions they held at the end of Paria IV, utilizing day and night patrols. Company "A" discovered National Liberation Front Leaflets in the vicinity of YD 137712.

1650 on 2 June in the vicinity of YD 150713 a resupply helicopter to Company "D" received 6 to 7 rounds of small arms fire resulting in one USMC KIA, not evacuated. Also on 2 June in the vicinity of YD 150713 "B" Company discovered one German Mauser, 1 French rifle and parts to a Russian Carbine.

In the vicinity of YD 155741 at 1000 on 3 June 1967, Company "A" received 20 rounds of small arms fire, returned fire and swept

the area discovering: 1 M16 rifle, 1 3.5 rocket launcher serial 175214, 103 rounds of 5.56 mm ammo. This action resulted in 2 USMC WIA who were evacuated. At 1350, Company "B" found, in the vicinity of YD 106675, a bunker complex consisting of 15 bunkers and also found 111 rounds of 7.62mm ammo, 4 Chicago grenades, and 2 AK 47 Magazines. The positions for the Companies at this time were: Company "A" YD 160679, Company "B" YD 154718, Company "C" YD 113701, Company "D" YD 141711. At 1515 on 4 June in the vicinity of YD 154218 Company "B" found 32 Chicago grenades, 10 lbs. of TNT and numerous electric and non-electric blasting caps.

On 6 June, an airstrike was called at 1025 resulting in two secondary explosions. At 1350 Company "A" received 2 rounds of SAF resulting in one USMC WIA, medevaced. At 1430 Company "B" in the vicinity of YD 143720 found 4 NVA in graves 4 to 5 days old. They also found a range quadrant. At 2125 a squad size ambush from Company "D" in the vicinity of YD 145715 became disoriented and fired on a friendly listening post resulting in 4 USMC WIA.

On 7 June at 0845 Company "A" in the vicinity of YD 163710 opened fire on 2 VC in a rice paddy resulting in 2 KIA probable. At 1040 a platoon of Company "B" made contact with an estimated platoon of NVA. The results of this action were one USMC KIA, 2 USMC WIA, 4 enemy KIA confirmed, 4 enemy KIA probable, and one POW. Upon evacuation the POW fell from the helicopter resulting in one additional KIA confirmed.

On 8 June, only one incident was reported. At 1130 in the vicinity of YD 157713, Company "B" received and returned SAF resulting in one USMC WIA and two enemy KIA probables. No incidents were reported on 9 June.

On 10 June 1967, the companies were located as follows: Company "A" YD 163722, Company "B" YD 176713, Company "C" YD 142717. The 1/9 GP was at Con Thien CIDG camp. At 0940 a patrol from Company "A" located in the vicinity of 167725, found one dead NVA and one AK47. Company "B" in the vicinity of YD 185735 attacked an NVA ambush, killing one NVA and apprehending one NVA POW WIA, capturing two SKS rifles, an unknown quantity of grenades and claymore-type mines which were destroyed in place. At 1940 on 10 June the Bn. GP area received 62 rounds of 82mm, resulting in one USMC WIA non-evac. Counter battery fire had good coverage and secondary explosions were observed. No incidents were on 11 June 1967.

On 12 June 1967 at 0200 a PPB from Company "C" received one round of incoming, possibly artillery, resulting in five USMC WIA, non-evac. At 1005 Company "B" in the vicinity of 185736 found one Russian rifle and one bloody bandage--one KIA probable. Company "B" at 1640 in the vicinity of YD 118683 found 15 NVA in graves, plus miscellaneous gear.

During the period of 13 June to 20 June Company "D" was OPCON to 3rd Bn 9th Marines. On the thirteenth one incident was reported from Company "D" in the vicinity of YD 103709. A man tripped a booby trap resulting in one USMC WIA.

On 14 June a Company "C" patrol in the vicinity of YD 109740 tripped two booby traps resulting in two USMC KIA and ten USMC WIA. Company "B" in the vicinity of YD 182724 at 1430 received 15 rounds of 82mm incoming resulting in five USMC WIA.

On 15 June 1967 Company "E" suffered one Non Battle Casualty when a .45 cal. pistol discharged killing a Marine. At 1320 Company "B" in the vicinity of YD 185728 had LVT's attacked and one of the LVT's detonated a mine resulting in one USMC WIA non-evac.

During the rest of the month of June the Battalion had only 6 incidents of enemy contact. On the 19th Company "D" in the vicinity of YD 131718 found 8 fresh NVA graves. On the twentieth, Company "B" in the vicinity of YD 226743 received 37 rounds of unknown caliber artillery resulting in two USMC KIA and eight USMC WIA.

On the 24th and 25th Co "A" and Co "D" plus a Bn Command Group(-) conducted a SEARCH AND DESTROY operation. During this time Co "C" provided a blocking force.

On the 25th, Company "C" in the vicinity of YD 164708 made contact resulting in one enemy KIA confirmed, 1 enemy KIA probable and captured 1 AK 47, and 15 - 82mm mortar rounds. On 27 June Company "C" in the vicinity of YD 153723 detonated a booby trap resulting in the 2 USMC WIA. On 28 June a patrol from Company "D" made contact in the vicinity of YD 124724 with an estimated enemy squad resulting in 2 USMC WIA, 3 enemy confirmed kills and two enemy KIA probable. The last major enemy contact on Operation Cimarron was made by Company "D" at 0600 on 29 June in the vicinity of YD 125716 when they engaged an estimated enemy platoon resulting in three USMC KIA, 16 USMC WIA, 10 enemy KIA confirmed and 15 enemy KIA probable.

On 1 July 67 two minor incidents were reported. The 1st Bn., 9th Mar. CP in the vicinity of YD 106791 received 8 rounds of enemy artillery with 3 USMC WIA non-evac. Company "B" detonated a booby trap with 2 USMC WIA.

e. Communications. Nothing significant to report.

f. Medical Evaluation. Nothing new or unusual to report.

12. Special Equipment and Techniques. None.

13. Commanders Analysis.

a. During Operation Cimarron all units of the 1st Bn., 9th Mar., and especially those located at Con Thien CIDG Camp, were subject to enemy indirect fire weapons. The enemy made extensive use of long range artillery fire, usually during daylight hours, to harass and inflict casualties on personnel at Con Thien. This artillery fire came from north of the Ben Hai River, and because most of the firing was done during daylight hours it was extremely difficult to get an accurate location on the guns.

b. No civic action was taken due to the fact that the Battalion ZOA was deserted.

c. Propaganda through leaflets dropped by air.

5. Supporting Forces

a. Artillery. Operation BUFFALO was marked by an increase in actual physical contact with the enemy. There was a total of 49 missions fired during this 12 day operation. Due to the close contact with the enemy, many of the missions were fired close to our friendly lines. Repeated pushes by the NVA forces were stopped due to the swift and accurate artillery fire. This was particularly true during the first several days of the operation.

There was a total of 1937 rounds fired during the operation. 105 mm howitzers fired 1079 rounds of HE and 198 rounds of WE. The 4.2" mortars fired a total of 647 HE rounds, 5 illumination and 8 WE rounds. All of these rounds were fired in support of the 1st Battalion, 9th Marines. The number of kills is not known due to the destruction of records when the Command bunker was hit by enemy artillery on 7 July. This is also true of H&I information regarding number of rounds fired.

b. Air. During Operation BUFFALO air support was used extensively.

On 2 July fixed wing aircraft were employed through the use of AO's during daylight hours and into the night by utilizing flare ships. Enemy forces were kept under constant attack through the close coordination of artillery, fixed wing aircraft and HU1E gunships. The HU1E gunships played an important role in holding back enemy attacks by providing heavy suppressive fire which accounted for many NVA casualties.

Other air support action which took place on the 2nd day of July and during the period of the operation included the helo-lifting of "C" Company from Dong Ha to the vicinity of Con Thien. This lift consisted of about 135 personnel. Nearly one hundred med-evacs were completed during the short span of the operation. Some of which were accomplished during the hours of darkness by the use of flares. All resupply missions for engaged companies was accomplished by helicopters.

Fixed wing aircraft were used for the first time in single salvo runs on active NVA artillery batteries. Anti-aircraft fire was extremely heavy, destroying two aircraft and damaging four. One helicopter was damaged by small arms fire.

c. Armor. During Operation BUFFALO, the 1st Battalion, 9th Marines had a platoon of tanks and a section of M-42's attached. The tanks were employed not only in the defense of Con Thien, but also in infantry support missions. On 2 July four tanks were used to secure an LZ for Company "C" which was being helo lifted into the area of contact. They were also used in relief column moving to assist Company "B". In this movement, the 90mm guns fired canisters with their fire being directed by an airborne AO. This fire in coordination with a HUAY gunship resulted in over 70 confirmed kills, and prevented an enemy attempt to flank Companies "B" and "C". Four RPG rounds were fired at the tanks during this encounter with only one causing any damage. This one rendered the turret of one tank immobile. Two of the tanks hit AT mines while evacuating casualties, but were able to be towed by the remaining two tanks back to Con Thien. All four were employed throughout the remainder of the operation in a defensive role at Con Thien.

6. Intelligence. During Operation BUFFALO, the 1st Battalion, 9th Marines encountered elements of the 90th Regiment, 324B Division of the North Vietnamese Regular Army. The enemy was equipped with AK-47 rifles, bolt action rifles, some with sniper scopes, they employed 82mm and 60mm mortars, RPG 7 antitank weapons, and 7.62mm machine guns of the Chinese Communist type 53. A majority of the dead NVA found had as many as 12 ChiCom grenades on each body. The enemy was reported to have used flame throwers, probably the Soviet ManPack Flame Thrower LPC - 50. The enemy was dressed in green uniforms, his web gear was clean and appeared to be new. Some of the enemy were observed wearing USMC flak gear and helmets, and some were carrying M-16 rifles. Virtually all of them carried gas masks. The enemy appeared to be fresh, well trained, and aggressive. Their tactics were sound and they appeared to be well led, employing artillery and mortar fire extensively.

Weather. The weather during the period 2-14 July was hot and humid. There were gusty winds during the daylight hours and at night it was cool with a slight steady breeze out of the west southwest.

7. Mission. To conduct search and destroy operations within AO, maintain security of the MSA (Route 561) in AO, and provide security for Con Thien.

8. Concept of Operation. Two companies operated outside of the perimeter of Con Thien to the west, northwest, north and northeast. One company (reinforced) H&S Company and the command group defended the Con Thien perimeter. One company remained at Dong Ha providing a reserve force as well as accomplishing administrative requirements, refurbishing and rest.

9. Execution. Operation BUFALO began on 2 July 1967 with the 1st Battalion 9th Marines operating in and around the Con Thien defense perimeter. At this time, Companies "A" and "B" were operating independently north and northeast of Con Thien, Company "D" and "H&S" Company plus the CP group were inside the Con Thien defense perimeter with Company "C" at Dong Ha. At 020915, Company "A" detonated a booby trap resulting in 3 USMC WIA. At the same time Company "B" reported receiving small arms fire which by 1000 had become an engagement with an estimated 150 NVA. This estimate was later revised to an NVA Battalion. At this time Company "A" was directed to move to the east to link up with Company "B". The action picked up rapidly as the enemy small arms fire was supplemented by mortars and artillery. The contact was so close and occurred so quickly that friendly artillery could not be employed to support Company "B". Company "A" attempted several times to link up with Company "B" but was prevented from doing so by heavy small arms fire from all sides. At 1000, Company "C", at Dong Ha was alerted to stand by to be helo-lifted to the area of contact. In the meantime, radio contact with Company "B" indicated that the Commanding Officer, two Platoon Commanders, Forward Observer and Company radio operator had been killed and the FAC had taken over command. Shortly thereafter communications with him was lost. The Company XO who was with the 1st Platoon (last in order of march), behind the company command group established contact with the Battalion G. P.

At about 1200, the S-3A was directed to move to Company "C"'s LZ and assume command of the elements of Company "B". At about 1200 Company "C" was landed in the vicinity of YD133712 which had been secured by a platoon from Company "B" and a platoon of tanks. Before Company "C" could move out the LZ it received 100 rounds of mortar fire and artillery suffering 11 WIA's. Company "C" moved north from the LZ retracing Company "B"'s route of advance. At its northeast point of advance north (GS1372), "C" Company established a defense perimeter and with the assistance of the newly appointed "B" Company Commander and the Battalion S-2 commenced evacuation of Company "B"'s dead and wounded to the LZ located at GS135711. Throughout the day the LZ was subjected to heavy massed artillery and mortar fire. Casualties being moved through it were taking additional wounds and personnel in the zone were becoming casualties. At 1500 with Company "A", "C" and remains of "B", being hard pressed on all sides, the Battalion Commander notified the Regimental Commander that all assets of the Battalion were engaged and the situation looked critical. At this juncture, the Regimental Commander committed 3/9 which arrived by helicopter at 1700. On arrival of 3/9, Companies "A" and "C" became OPCON of 3/9 as directed by the Regimental Commander. The remaining elements of Company "B" and the platoon of Company "D" in the LZ were moved into Con Thien perimeter arriving there at 2015. Casualties suffered by 1/9 for 2 July 1967 were 51 USMC KIA, 166 USMC WIA, 34 USMC MIA. A search of the battlefield on 4 and 5 July to recover bodies and two weeks of dental identification produced the following

revision to the above casualty figure: 84 USMC KIA, 166 USMC WIA, and 1 USMC MIA.

There was no reported contact on 3 July. However, during the period 3/9 July, Con Thien was subjected to sporadic enemy artillery fire receiving from 5 to 350 rounds a day. (350 on 2 July)

On 6 July the Company Commander of "C" Company was evacuated after being wounded by enemy artillery fire. Later the same day (1930) the company commander and first sergeant of Company "D" were killed by incoming artillery fire in the defense perimeter of Con Thien.

As a result of the losses suffered by both "A" and "C" companies during the preceding days of the operation and the loss of the "C" Company Commander, "A" and "C" Companies were combined under the command of Company "A"'s Commanding Officer. Shortly thereafter, the combined companies ("A" and "C") surprised an estimated 200 NVA who were caught moving across "A" Company's position. In the fighting which ensued and continued throughout the night, "A" Company was credited with 150 NVA confirmed KIA with only minor friendly casualties.

At 1345 on the 7th of July, the 1/9 GP received two rounds of heavy artillery, one of which was a direct hit on the COC bunker resulting in 11 USMC KIA, and 16 USMC WIA. This fire was estimated to be of 130mm caliber or heavier.

During the period 8 - 13 July the Battalion positions at Con Thien were subjected to enemy artillery fire which inflicted 3 friendly KIA's and 35 WIA's.

On 10 July, Companies "A" and "C", returned to OPJON 1/9 and were kept outside the Con Thien defense perimeter in the southern sector as a reaction/counter-attack force.

On 13 July 1967, the daily road sweep of MSR (Route 561) uncovered one AT mine, the latest such mine encountered during the period.

At 1400, 13 July, units of the 3d Battalion, 4th Marines arrived at Con Thien to effect a relief of positions with 1/9. At 1600, 13 July 1/9 chopped OPJON to 3d Marines, and assumed responsibility for the defense of Camp CARROLL.

10. Results. The termination of Operation BUFFALO at 140001 July found the below listed casualty figures:

c. Captured Materials: A large quantity of materials, weapons, grenades and C-4 were destroyed in place due to the lack of means to evacuate same, however, some captured gear was turned in by Company "A" and Company "C", then OPCON to 3/4.

11. Administrative.

a. Supply: Due to heavy losses of equipment suffered during Operation BUFFALO, Supply was called on to meet rather stiff demands. Equipment damaged or destroyed included 2 M274's, 3 Water trailers, 1 M80-109, 1 M-470, 1 M-416, 5 PRC-25's, 1 RC - 292, 1 M-60, and 2 60mm mortars. There was a shortage of utilities, canteens, and M-16 magazines, which were on an G2 priority order. Another difficulty encountered was reclaiming of casualty evacuee gear. All units on Operational assignment were issued one day Class I, Basic Allowance of Class B and complete essential Class II. Resupply was by helicopter and motor transport.

b. Maintenance: Due to the heavy dust, and higher usage of vehicles, it was evident that maintenance had to be a constant concern. Since the vehicles were driven from Dong Ha to Con Thien daily there was an abnormal increase in the mileage on all vehicles. Dust was the major problem encountered, also the higher usage rate for all equipment. A major item, the AN/TPS-2 ground surveillance radar, was degraded at least 90% of the time because of lack of spare parts. Approximately twenty AN/PRC-25 radios were inoperable due to lack of handsets. The majority of maintenance problems on Operation BUFFALO can be attributed to the lack of spare parts.

c. Treatment of Casualties, Evacuation, and Hospitalization:

Casualties were treated at the Con Thien outpost by the Battalion Surgeon or in the field by Corpsmen and evacuated by helicopters, if required as quickly as possible.

d. Transportation:

Motor transport and helicopters were used for non-tactical moves. With the exception of the helo-lift on 2 July all tactical moves were made on foot.

e. Communications. Problem was discussed in a. and c. above.

f. Medical Evaluation. Nothing new or unusual to report.

12. Special Equipment and Techniques. The new search light battery was employed, not long enough to get a true evaluation.

13. Commander's Analysis. Just prior to the commencement of Operation BUFFALO, two Companies of 1/9 had been conducting sweeps to the north, and northeast of Con Thien.

The movement of Companies "A" and "B" on 2 July appeared to have tripped off prematurely an enemy build up which from all indications, and subsequent interrogation of one POW substantiated, the NVA had not wanted to make any contact at this time. The NVA were infiltrating through the DMZ massing for a large operation, possibly against Con Thien, Gio Linh or Dong Ha. Their avowed tactics of not hitting an objective unless victory is assured, confirms the presence of at least two NVA Battalions supported by numerous artillery pieces (possibly 6 to 8 batteries). These enemy forces were able, despite heavy losses, to withdraw grudgingly when 3/9 and 1/3 moved into the area to exploit the contact developed by 1/9.

The fierce action of 2 July resulting in heavy friendly casualties in a short time span, points out the need for a more efficient casualty evacuation system. Marines sorely needed to continue the action are required to help with the evacuation of personnel and material. It appears necessary to develop some method of providing litter bearers from other sources in order to alleviate this problem and keep more of the infantry elements engaged in offensive contact.

The enemy personnel exceptionally well trained and equipped holding their fire to the last minute, and making excellent use of cover and concealment. Planned artillery and mortar fire were used extensively with the enemy force moving in under their own mortar and artillery fire in the attack.

Flamethrowers were used to force Marines from positions of concealment and to channelize movement by setting fire to hedgerows. There are reports that on two occasions they called out in English, "Friendly, 2nd Platoon." Other reports had them wearing USMC helmets, flak jackets and using M-16's.

Considering the defense at Con Thien the obstacles around the perimeter consisted of a combination of double apron, triple concertina strands, and tangle foot with off-set gates. Placed within the outer wire were 25/30 55 gallon drums with a combination of napalm/gasoline (FUGASSIE) detonated electrically. Each position had 2 to 3 claymores set just behind the inner strand of wire. Enemy action against these defensive positions for the period

consisted of artillery fire, both medium and heavy caliber with incoming fire, ranging from 5-350 rounds (2 July) per day, concluding the period with the use of heavy artillery fire in lesser number; but employing delay-type fuzes. One of these destroyed the Battalion COC bunker, penetrating approximately 5 feet of sandbags, loose dirt, and 12" X 12" timbers.

b. No civic action was undertaken.

c. No PsyOps were conducted.

5. Supporting Forces.

a. Artillery. There was very little artillery fired during this short operation due to the fact that 1st Battalion, 9th Marines was the resident battalion at Camp CARROLL, and was responsible for the security of that Camp. The 1st Battalion, 9th Marines had only limited participation in Operation HICKORY II. There were no fire missions on the first two days of the Operation. On the final day of the operation, 16 July there were two fire missions - both being called in on lights in the area. 105mm howitzers fired both of these missions expending 12 WP's and 36 HE rounds. The lights were extinguished.

The number of H&I's fired during this period are as follows: 105mm 193 rounds; 155mm - 52 rounds; 4.2" mortar - 92 rounds.

b. Air. No air was employed by the 1st Battalion, 9th Marines during Operation Hickory II.

c. Armor. Armor was utilized solely for defensive purposes in the defense of Camp CARROLL. This armor included Company "B" (-), 3d Tank Battalion, one Battery of M-42 twin 40's from "G" Battery 1/44 USA, and 1st platoon of ONTOS, Company "A", of 3d Anti-Tank Battalion.

6. Intelligence. During the period of the operation, 1/9, as the resident defense battalion of Camp CARROLL, made no contact with the enemy. However, small units of Viet Cong were reported operating in the D-5 area around GS 0951.

Weather. A southwesterly flow of winds continued throughout the three days of the operation. Generally unlimited ceiling and unrestricted visibility prevailed. The high was 95 and the low 81, the visibility was about 17 miles.

7. Mission. To occupy and defend Camp J. J. CARROLL and the assigned area of operation to include the defense of D-5, Ba Long Valley and the Khe Gia Bridge.

8. Concept of Operation. Camp CARROLL was defended by Company "A" (-), Company "C", and "H&S" Company plus the command group. One platoon from Company "A", maintained defense of Khe Gia Bridge. Company "D" was preparing to assume defense of the Ba Long area.

9. Execution. Operation HICKORY II for the 1st Battalion, 9th Marines was marked by negative enemy contact of any type. The Operation began at 0901 on 14 July 1967. At this time all commitments as stated in the mission were fulfilled with the exception of the relief of the D-5 sector, and relief of Ba Long Valley.

On 15 July 1967 at 1000, Company "B", relieved Company "I", 3/4 in the D-5 Sector.

On 16 July 1967 there was no enemy contact. Operation HICKORY II terminated at 1600 on the 16th of July and Operation KINGFISHER began.
