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2. LOCATION: From 1-17 August 1968, 1st Battalion, 9th Marines was located at VANDGRIFT COMBAT BASE, with Company A at C1 LU (YD 008458). The battalion was responsible for the defense of the perimeter of VANDGRIFT COMBAT BASE and C1 LU.

From 17-25 August 1968, 1st Battalion 9th Marines was operating in northern IOTZ. Two areas were worked in this operation; both were southwest of CON THIEN and north of CAMP C'ROLL.

On 26 August the battalion assumed a relaxed posture at VANDGRIFT COMBAT BASE.

From 27-31 August 1968, 1st Battalion 9th Marines was employed in an operation to the west of the ROCKPILE.

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NARRATIVE SUMMARY

On 1 August 1968, 1st Battalion 9th Marines had received the mission of base perimeter defense of VANDENGRIFT COMBAT BASE and CA LU. Company A (Rein) was located at CA LU, Companies B, C, D(-) and U.S. were at VANDENGRIFT COMBAT BASE. Company D provided a platoon for defense of Signal Hill. On 1 August, at 1720, Company D observed suspected enemy mortar flashes at YD 966485 and XD 946494. They also observed flashes on the Rockpile. Artillery and 81mm mortar missions were fired with unknown results. At 2345, a company LP, heard digging and movement at XD 979476; 4x60mm HE rounds and 2x60mm Illumination mortar rounds were fired with unknown results. Digging and movement were no longer heard.

On 2 August 1968, at 0900, Company D observed one bunker which was later found to be an old fighting hole. At 1600, at Company C's position, one man was seriously injured while burning trash, resulting in one MPC medevac. At 2330, Company D heard movement along the outer wire of their perimeter; they fired pop-illumination and spotted one person running away from the wire at YD 013468. 81mm mortar illumination, 100xM-79 rounds, 12x60mm mortar HE and artillery illumination were fired with excellent coverage of target, but unknown results.

On 3 August 1968, at 1600, a patrol from Company A was crossing the Quang Tri River at XD 997445. One man slipped and panicked. Efforts were made to rescue him, but the man was lost from sight and not seen again.

Two UH-1Es helicopters conducted an aerial search of the river with negative results. At 1720, Company D spotted two enemy rocket sites at XD 974518 and called a fire mission with good coverage of target. At 2030, Company D spotted movement in their wire, 6xM-79 rounds were fired at the movement and 1xM26 grenade was thrown, a man on watch received a shell fragment in the left eye from an M-79 round. The Marine was medevacced to Delta Med. At 2345, Company C suspected movement in front of their lines. Small arms, M-79's and 60mm mortar illumination were fired and the movement stopped.

On 4 August 1968, at 1100, Company A observed 8 clean-cut Vietnamese in the field, one individual had soft hands, and papers stating that he was a 13 year old wood-cutter. Also, two women and a man in an ARVN uniform, were observed in a tree line. Search efforts were continued for the missing Marine (see C31600P Comp A) with negative results. At 2200, Company C at XD 997490, spotted lights and two suspected figures. Small arms were fired with good coverage and negative results. At 2240, Company D from Signal Hill, observed what appeared to be a flashlight moving toward their position. The light ceased after a 60mm mortar mission had been fired.

On 5 August 1968, at 0725, Company C spotted movement in the bushes to the front of their position. M-79's were fired and the area was checked with negative results.

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At 1115, Company D was held lifted to YD 081411. They began preparations for Fire Support Base HENDRICKSON. A platoon from Company B replaced the platoon on Signal Hill. At 1120, Company A found the body of the missing Marine lost in the Quang Tri River on 3 August. The body was found at YD 024456. At 1515, Company D observed one "V" in a tree line at YD 076415. The enemy disappeared into the heavy tree line before he could be taken under fire.

On 6 August 1968, There were no significant events.

On 7 August 1968, at 2140, Company F heard noises, talking and digging, at XD 973478. After 30 minutes a fire mission was called. The noises ceased, and a patrol discovered two destroyed bunkers. The bunkers were 30x5'.

On 8 August 1968, there were no significant events.

On 9 August 1968, At 1915, Company F heard digging and observed suspected enemy positions at XD 973474. An artillery mission was requested but called off since target was in a position that was difficult to bring effective fire upon. At 2340, Company F at XD 978479, reported 3 artillery rounds of unknown size landing at XD 973477. Attempts were made to locate the source of the rounds with negative results.

On 10 August 1968, there were no significant events.

On 11 August 1968, at 1900, Company C at XD 997516, spotted approximately 30 troops who appeared to be setting in. The troops were taken under 81mm mortar fire with unknown results.

On 12 August 1968, at 0130, Company A observed small light and heard a dog barking. Light was observed with aid of night observation device. One 81mm mortar round was fired with negative results. At 1800, Company A at YD 031472, observed one enemy at YD 034147. 81mm mortar mission was fired with unknown results.

On 13 August 1968, Company D returned to VANDGRIFT COMBAT BASE, and assumed perimeter security with Companies B(-) and C. At 2205, Company D observed movement at YD 003482, while searchlights were being used. 2xM-16 rounds and 2xM-79 rounds were fired with negative results. At 2215, Company B spotted enemy movement to the west of their position (XD 977479), in the defensive wire. 10xM-79 and 5x81mm mortars were fired with negative results.

On 14 August 1968, at 2315, Company C fired 81mm mortar mission on a possible avenue of approach to VANDGRIFT COMBAT BASE at XD 973505. During adjustment rounds with MP, screams were heard from the area of impact.

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On 15 August 1968, at 1300, Company A at XD 981541, spotted 2 NVA at XD 961537, carrying a mortar tube. A fire mission was called but adjustments were slow and difficult and the mission was ended. At 1430, Company B at XD 999472, spotted 2 NVA digging at XD 972463. An artillery mission fired 8 rounds with negative results. At 2220, Company B heard movement in their wire, 1xM26 grenade was thrown and the movement ceased.

On 16 August 1968, there were no significant events.

On 17 August 1968, at 1000, 1st Battalion 9th Marines was helilifted to operate in the vicinity of YD 0966. Company patrol base camps were established and extensive patrolling commenced. Company A at 093659, was reinforced with tanks, from Company A, 3d Tank Battalion. At 1745, a platoon of Company C at YD 094668, found approximately 28 bunkers in good condition, with tunnels from each bunker. Bunkers and area appeared to have been vacated in a hurry. All bunkers made of sticks, wood, and dirt, were blown. At 2350, the battalion CP at YD 093661, received one friendly artillery round. There were no casualties and check fires were called.

On 18 August 1968, at 0900, the tanks attached to Company A, returned, due to rains making movement from area at a later date difficult. At 0910, 1st Platoon, Company C, found one dud 155mm round, which engineers blew in place. At 0955, 1st Platoon, Company C, at YD 096675, discovered a partially destroyed complex of 12 to 15 bunkers 2'x2'x4'; overheads consisted of sticks and dirt. All remaining bunkers were destroyed. At 1000, Company A at YD 092655, found one bunker 5'x8'; bunker was destroyed. At 1000, Company D found 15 bunkers 4'x5'x4' at YD 102659. Most of the bunkers were destroyed from bombing, the others were then destroyed. The remains of a body were also found. At 1125, Company A, at YD 095655, found 3x82mm mortar rounds and 5 bunkers 6'x4'x4'. The bunkers and 2 rounds were destroyed. One round was brought back to the Company CP. At 1130, 2nd Platoon, Company D, found an automatic weapon and miscellaneous gear at YD 087667. At 1220, 3d Platoon, Company D, found 8 bunkers 4'x4'x6' with sticks and dirt as overheads, and 3 one man fighting holes, 3'x3', at YD 099670. The bunkers and fighting holes were destroyed. At 1315, a patrol from Company A, at YD 095655, found 20 bunkers, 67x82mm rounds, 3x60mm rounds, 1x75mm round and 3 boxes of 82mm mortar fuses. The bunkers and ordnance were blown. At 1330, the patrol from Company A found 5x50 caliber cases (empty); 1 medal the size of a quarter, made of copper with a star on a red background, believed to be a VC medal, a plastic cigarette case with cigarettes and lighter, 2 mortar pits approximately 10 feet apart with bunkers on each side. At 1420, Company C, at YD 092682, received 6-8 mortar rounds near their perimeter. Mortar fire was returned with good coverage of target. At 1430, Company C, received one flight of fixed wing on YD 105675, and observed one destroyed mortar position.

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At 2215, on 18 August 1968, an LP from Company C, spotted 5 figures to their front. Small arms, M-26 grenades, and 82mm mortars were employed with negative results.

On 19 August 1968, at 0815, Company A, at YD 094664, located 2 bunker complexes, both were destroyed. At 1200, a patrol from Company C found 2 sniper holes, 1 bunker 5'x8'x5', 5x82mm mortar rounds, 5xRPG rounds, 1xChiCom grenade and 3 powder charges. Positions and ordnance were destroyed. At 1230, a patrol from Company A found 5 bunkers and a dud 500 lb. bomb at YD 092655, remains of an old plane without identifying markings at YD 092654, a 175mm round at YD 102651. All above were destroyed. At 1400, a Company B patrol, made contact with 4-6 enemy at YD 087653. Received 2 grenades and 10 rounds of small arms. They returned small arms and M-79 fire. The enemy broke contact. A fire mission was called in on enemy. A subsequent patrol checked area with negative results. On return to perimeter, the patrol received one sniper round. At 1630, Company D at YD 097662, discovered 1 bunker 4'x5'x3' with in their perimeter containing 10x82mm fuses, 3 claymores, 9 RPG rounds, 4 cases of 7.62 linked and 12x82mm rounds. All ordnance was destroyed.

On 20 August 1968, Companies A and B displaced to Company Patrol Bases in the vicinity of the YD 0964 grid square.

On 21 August 1968, at 1300, 1st Battalion 9th Marines conducted a helicopter operation to vicinity of YD 0364. Companies A and H-S were located at 036646, Company F at YD 013643, Company C at 035641 and Company D at 023652. At 1400, approximately 15 rounds of unknown size impacted in the vicinity of 039649 resulting in one USMC WIAE. At 1600 the lead elements of Company A received sniper rounds at 033648, resulting in one USMC WIAE. At 1625, Company D at 023652, found 3 small bunkers containing 1 case of .50 caliber machine gun ammunition; all was destroyed. At 1800, Company C found 3 bunkers (2 with sleeping facilities, one with a tunnel system), 3 bunkers, 3 slit trenches, 8x60mm rounds, and 2 NVA stamps. All positions and ordnance were destroyed.

On 22 August 1968, at 1025, a patrol from Company B found 8 bunkers, one of which was booby trapped with 2 grenades, and recently used sniper holes. On a recently used trail, a new AK-47 round was found. The bunkers were destroyed as were the grenades. At 1105, a patrol from Company A found one dud 500 lb. bomb. At 1145, at YD 027647, the patrol received 6 rounds of sniper fire. Fire was returned with negative results. 11 USMC WIAE resulted. At 1500, Company C, at YD 028633, found 7-3 man holes (7'x5'x4') made of logs and bamboo with aluminum air vents. In them were 23x60mm rounds, 30x60mm warheads, 800xAK-47 rounds, 50x37mm rounds, 1 helmet, 1 pair of sandals, 3 entrenching tools, with 2 covers, 2 canteen pouches, 3 Opium cans open and discarded, 1 tray and 1 pair of trousers, all gear was disposed of. At 1530, a patrol from Company A, at YD 028641, found 2x152mm rounds, 1 ship flare (U.S. made) also found 5 grass huts, caves and 3 bunkers at 029642. All positions and ordnance was destroyed. At 1545 a patrol

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
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from Company B made contact with an estimated "V" company at YD 008642. The patrol received small arms automatic weapons and 60mm mortar fire. A small arms and 81mm mortar fire were returned. 14 casualties were being evacuated to the Company B CP (YD 019643), 2nd Platoon of Company B became pinned down by intense enemy fire near YD 010643. Air provided napalm and rockets in support. Due to the approaching darkness and heavy volume of enemy fire, 2nd platoon Company B was unable to return to the Company Patrol Base, and established a hasty perimeter at YD 013643. Artillery suppression fires were fired throughout the night and a flare ship provided illumination until first light. Casualties for the contact numbered 24 WIA, 8 KIA (7 not yet retrieved), one MIA and 1 NBC.

On 23 August 1968, at 0800, a platoon from Company C was dispatched to reinforce Company B. At 0900, one platoon from Company B moved to assist the 2nd Platoon of Company F in recovering of the casualties and to enable the platoon to return to the patrol base. Air support was erroneously utilized and one bomb landed near the relief force resulting in 5 casualties including the company commander. Casualties were evacuated and Company F returned to the Base Camp. Still missing were 7 KIA and 1 MIA. At 1035, Company A at YD 041654, found 50-75 loose .50 caliber rounds in a pit 8'x3' deep with a dirt mound in the center. The rounds were destroyed. At 1340, Company A at YD 029645, found 2 caves (1 "A" frame type), 4 grass huts, and 5 - 3 man holes, all were well concealed from the air and all were destroyed. At 1430, Company C found what appeared to be a battalion size assembly area. In this area they found trenches and bunkers encircling the hill from top to bottom. Also found were ropes, ladders, grenades, picks, 13x82mm mortar rounds, cooking utensils, stoves, bandages, food, canned milk made in China, gas masks, slit trenches, 10 helmets, NVA clothing, rifle cleaning equipment, bottles of pills, tennis shoes, radio batteries, and M-16 magazines. Bandages and socks with dried blood were found in one bunker. Some of the digging had been recent. At 1610, Company A, at YD 034645, found an "L" shaped sleeping hut (10'x3'x4') and destroyed it. At 1730, a small Battalion command group moved to Company B's position at YD 018647. At 1750, the CP at YD 018647, took about 10 rounds of artillery near their position. Artillery and 81mm mortars were fired with unknown results. At 1845, Company D at YD 032625, received approximately 14 rounds of 82mm mortar fire. Counter fire was employed. Casualties numbered 1 USMC KIA. At 1845, Company D began displacing to Company B's position and set in near YD 022649, for the night.

On 24 August 1968, at 0720, Company B at YD 026660, took approximately 15 rounds of 82mm mortar fire and fired counter mortar mission with unknown results. At 0730, Company D resumed move to join Company B. At 0730, Company C began a displacement to YD 035687. Company A, at 0900 began a displacement to YD 023643. At 1500, elements of Company B (rein) began to retrieve the bodies from the contact of 22 August.

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
At 1515, this unit received 3x60mm mortar. 6 counter mortar missions were fired with unknown results. At 1600, Company D's CP received 4 rounds of 82mm mortar fire from estimated position XD 005655. Counter mortar fire and artillery were employed with good coverage of target but unknown results. At 1700, while firing mortar suppression fires, the CP at XD 019648, observed several small secondaries. Artillery fires were repeated and a huge secondary sending a fireball 300'-400' in the air was observed. AO reported a destroyed bunker with a huge hole in it in area of secondary. At 1730, a Marine while carrying a body, tripped and the safety of his M-79 disengaged resulting in the discharge of one M-79 round. The man was wounded in the face and legs. All bodies were recovered (the MIA was located and included in the KIA count). The last elements of Company B returned to the perimeter at 2100.

On 25 August 1968, at 0855, Company E received 1x60mm from XD 019648. A 60mm mortar mission was fired with good coverage of target. At 1000, a troop lift was begun to move the Battalion back to V'NDEGRIFT COMBAT BASE. At 1200, Company E and 2nd Platoon Company C began receiving 82mm fire in the area. An AO was on station, fixed wing and artillery were employed. 27 rounds of 82mm were taken, resulting in negative casualties. The lift to V'NDEGRIFT COMBAT BASE was completed by 1400.

On 26 August 1968, there were no significant events.

On 27 August 1968, at 1600, 1st Battalion 9th Marines conducted a halibutne operation in conjunction with operation Lancaster Trousdale. Company Patrol Bases were established with Company A in the vicinity of XD 928528, Company B with the Battalion CP at XD 919520, Company C at XD 890515, Company D at XD 913529. At 1635, the battalion CP observed an active enemy rocket site fire 2 volleys of 5 rounds each. A fire mission was called but ended due to closeness of friendlies.

On 28 August 1968, at 1000, Company A found a well used trail leading northwest from XD 918529. At 1230, 3d Platoon, Company C found 12 fighting holes at XD 875506. At XD 870500, the platoon observed a "W" cut into a tree along a trail this mark was noticed every 150 meters leading to a possible base camp at XD 877502. An artillery mission was requested on the area with unknown results. At 1530 Company D, at XD 910529, found a possible rocket site with command detonating booby traps. 20x2.75 inch rockets were found, 10 of which were partially destroyed by MRC LIGHTS, the other 10 were piled and rigged for command detonation. Also in that area were 3 bunkers 6'x4'x4', constructed of logs and dirt, 8 - 2'x3'x2' fighting holes. Positions and ordnance were destroyed. At 1900, Company C received 5 rounds of 82mm mortar fire at XD 890515. Only 3 rounds of the 5 rounds detonated.



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On 29 August 1968, Company D at XD 917526, found approximately 100 feet of multi-strand electrical wire. At 1105, Company A found 8 old fighting holes overlooking the stream at 919532. The holes were 2'x3'x4'. At 1530, Company D at XD 909518 found 20 bunkers along a trail running east to west along the ridge line. The bunkers were 7-14 days old. 4'x3'x4' with logs and dirt overhead comm wire connected the positions. 3 suspected rocket positions 8'x12'x3' were found in the same area. In the position were 3 holes in a triangular position. These appeared to be where a tripod had been placed front hole was 7 feet from rear hole tripod was pointing on a 1400 mill azimuth. Also in the positions were found a plastic lid for a canister of unknown size, a canvas fuse pouch, and document. The positions were destroyed.

On 30 August 1968, at 0900, a patrol from Company A, found 2 dud 2.75 in rockets and a 250 lb bomb in the vicinity of XD 920537. All was blown. At 1315, a patrol from Company D, found 2 bunkers 6'x3'x5' about 1 week old covered with dirt and logs. Bunkers were 25 meters apart with 6 gauge comm wire running between them. The bunkers were destroyed. Several trails leading to a water point in the vicinity of XD 909531 were located. At 1310 the patrol from Company D found 2 documents about 25 meters from the trail. At 1330, the patrol found 11 bunkers 3'x6'x6' with dirt and logs overhead and destroyed them. At 1330, a patrol from Company C found a possible heavy weapons site at XD 897501.

On 31 August 1968, at 2250, Company E had one marine accidentally wounded and the man was medevaced.

1. A. COMPAT MISSIONS ASSIGNED. During this reporting period the Battalion was employed on the following missions:

- (1) Providing defense for VANDGRIFT COMPAT BASE and C-2 LU from 1-17 August 1968.
- (2) From 17-25 August 1968, the Battalion was employed in operations in the northern IOTZ, where a series of company sized patrol bases were established. With extensive patrols and OP's.
- (3) From 27-31 August 1968, the Battalion was employed in an operation, to seek out and destroy the enemy, his supply caches and infiltration facilities while concurrently evaluating the effectiveness of ARCLIGHT Strikes.

B. SIGNIFICANT OPERATIONS CONDUCTED. The battalion was engaged in two major operations during the month of August. The first operation was in the vicinity of the C-2. The second operation was in the vicinity of the ROCKPILE, consisting of a search and destroy mission.

E. NEW TECHNIQUES EMPLOYED. None

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I. CIVIC ACTION: Civic for the month of August consisted of the taking of 4 boxes of clothes and toys to people of CAM LO REFUGEE VILLAGE. 100 School Kits were taken to District Headquarters to be distributed at the start of school, on 16 August.

While we were there we talked to the head of the medical team about MedCaps. We discussed times, locations throughout CAM LO and necessary security force needed.

We gave assistance to a mother and her 2 children we had entered into the QUANG TRI HOSPITAL. Such as things they needed while in the hospital and in returning home to CAM LO.

We talked to people of PHOU VILLAGE, YD 0444, about them using the trash dump, by way of collecting usable items out of it. It was decided they could enter no more than 15 people between 1000 and 1200 hours each day.

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L. INTELLIGENCE. During the month of August, 1st Battalion 9th Marines participated in operations near the DMZ and ROCKPILE area. Enemy forces in the Battalions area of operations were composed primarily of one division (the 320th), the 7th Battalion of the 64th Regiment and an unknown unit. Supporting the above infantry units were the 164th Artillery Regiment, 84th Artillery Regiment, and the 54th Artillery Regiment.

From 17 August - 25 August the Battalion was on an operation West of C-2. Numerous contacts and sightings were made during the operation (largest contact was a Battalion). Approximately 126 bunkers were discovered and enemy equipment and munitions captured included the following: 1x500 lb bomb, 1x175 Howitzer round, 1x155 artillery round, 2x152 artillery rounds, 1x75mm round, 50x37mm rounds, 14xRPG's, 110x82mm rounds, 34x60mm rounds, 4xChiComs, 3xClaymores, 3 boxes fuses, 1 case x .50 cal rounds, 800xAK-47 rounds, and 4 cases 7.62 rounds. One dead body was also found during the operation.

From 27 August - 31 August the Battalion took part in an operation southwest of the ROCKPILE. During the operation no significant ground contact was made. 5 rounds of incoming 82mm mortar fire was received throughout the operation. Bunkers (approx 65) and quantities of enemy munitions were found. Enemy ammunition captured included 22x2.75 inch rockets and 1x250 lb bomb. During the operation 7 trails were found.

M. WEATHER. Temperatures ranged from the low 70's during the evening to the low 80's during the day. Winds ranged from 0 - 45 knots. Occasional showers occurred throughout the month.

N. COMMUNICATIONS: During the month communications for the battalion remained stable. The advent of the monsoon season did cause minor problems, particularly in the failure of radio handsets, and resupply of dry cell batteries, neither of the above problems reduced the battalions communicability to any marked degree.

The KY-38 and PRC-77 equipment was introduced into the battalion, but except for one brief period, was utilized solely on the regimental radio net. This equipment was excellent in communicability, maintainability, and reliability. Having but KY-28 proved a distinct disadvantage in that coding the company cipher units daily would be, at best, impractical.

Some minor instances of frequency conflict and frequency override due to mutual interference were encountered, none of which lessened the units capability to perform the assigned missions.

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O. ARTILLERY. On Operation Lancaster II, arty, on the spur of the moment, fired between 800 - 900 rounds in prep of the LZ's and likely enemy positions. For the first seven days of the operation, contact being light, a regular program of H&I's and TOT's were fired along with regular missions during the day.

On the 23rd and 24th artillery support came into play. In support of Company B artillery was slow in reacting with the exception of one 8" Battery which fired all night long in support of a platoon that was surrounded. The next day artillery fired over 3000 rounds to support units of Company B that went out to retrieve 8 MIA's. Artillery was credited with one .50 cal machine gun, one huge ammo cache, and between 400 - 500 troops. All day long smoke missions to cover the friendly units were fired along with mortar suppression fires, as a consequence of these fires, no more serious casualties were sustained.

Earlier in the month of August 1st Battalion 9th Marines was assigned the mission of the defense of VINDIGRIFT COMBAT BASE. Over 20 night defensive fires were shot in and a "check" round was shot on these replot grids periodically to check out their effectiveness. Also during this period a very heavy and extensive program of H&I's and TOT's were fired.

P. AIR: 1st Battalion 9th Marines, left on August 17, 1968 for Lancaster II. 1/9 landed in LZ SATURN, 093666, and commenced operations immediately. On 19 August air operations consisted of 3 TFQ missions and two air strikes in the 0967. Company C had an AO work the 1066 - 67 grids for them on 19 August. There was 1 routine medevac from Company D, Company 1, Company B each.

20 August: Air operations consisted of 3 air strikes on bunker positions in Company C's AO, and 3 medevacs.

21 August: 1st Battalion 9th Marines lifted from LZ SATURN to LZ FALCON EAST, JUNIOR and VULTURE. The lift was successful and put all units into their proper LZ's.

22 August: 6 TFQ missions were submitted as air operations increased in 1/9's new AO. Air observers worked with various companies for 5 hours. A patrol from Company B made contact and air observers counted 3 .50 Cal guns in the patrol's area. A flare ship was used for the patrol for the entire night. 2 air strikes were run for the patrol under the flares.

23 August: 11 TFQ missions were submitted and the light CP was lifted to the Company B CP around 1730. There were 11 routine medevacs.

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ENCLOSURE (1)

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24 August: Air Observers worked for Company P the entire day and discovered 20 - 25 bunkers in the 0267 grid and mortar position with large troop concentrations in 0165 - 0565.

25 August: Air strikes numbered around 18 as Companies D and P and CP prepared to lift out of LZ JUNIOR. Air was on station all day and totaled at least 250 KBA during the past 3 days. All of 1/9 was air lifted back to VNUBPIFT COMP'T BASE.

On 27 August 1st Battalion, 9th Marines lifted out to kick off Operation SCOUTS ND TROUSDALE. From this time until the end of the month all air operations were normal with no air strikes and routine resupply and medevacs.

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

5. Enemy rocket, mortar, artillery and anti-aircraft capabilities in the area of operations.
6. Provide required aerial photography in support of the operation.
7. Provide aerial observation in the zone of operation as required.
8. Provide CIC and ITP teams as required.

4. MEASURES FOR HANDLING PERSONNEL, DOCUMENTS AND MATERIAL

a. Captured personnel

(1) Captured personnel will be referred to as detainees until classified by ITP personnel and will be turned over to the 3-2 for processing IAW reference (b).

(2) Handling of detainees will be firm at all times, but will not involve force beyond that necessary to defend against or subdue resisting detainees. All detainees will be searched, segregated, tagged and evacuated through the intelligence as expeditiously as possible. All material and documents will be evacuated with the detainees.

(3) Battalion 3-2's will accomplish the initial screening and then expeditiously evacuate detainees to Regimental headquarters. Secured detainees will be evacuated through medical channels except walking wounded not requiring hospitalization who, after initial treatment will be processed through normal intelligence channels for interrogation and disposition. It is imperative that all possible information concerning the time, place and circumstances of capture be recorded on the POW tag prior to forwarding to 3-2.

b. Captured documents

(1) Captured documents relating to communications, including operating instructions, codes, mess yes, frequency list and call signs, will be tagged and evacuated without delay. Under no circumstance will plain language transmissions be made to report the capture of enemy communications and security material.

(2) Documents captured at communication installations will not be separated from the equipment unless recapture is imminent or evacuation of the equipment is impossible. Such documents and equipment will be tagged and evacuated together without delay.

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5. COUNTERINTELLIGENCE

a. The enemy has been found to use ARVN uniforms and also U.S. uniforms to gain passage through FNL/MAR areas. Caution is in order when isolated individuals or groups of ARVN soldiers are noticed in your respective areas. Check of their ID card will enhance your ability to determine their identity.

b. Enemy capabilities include interception and translation of information when transmitted over insecure communication equipment.

6. REPORTS

a. Report significant intelligence information by spot reports. Include best estimate where exact information is not available.

b. Submit shall reports and morter reports to Battalion S-2 ASAP.

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Appendix 1 (Terrain study) to Annex M (Intelligence) to Operation Order 9-68

1. General. See (3-3 Overlay of 'O) for Study Area

2. Description of the Area of Operation

a. Relief: Two distinctive topographical regions are represented in the Study Area: 1. Rolling plains and low hills which cover most of the top portion of the area and 2. Rugged intermediate high mountains throughout the majority of the area.

b. Rolling Plains and Low Hills. Across the top of the study area, rolling plains, hills and isolated mountins are found. The elevations range from approximately 50-300 meters. The ground slopes range from 10 to 30% and commonly are as large as 50%. The topography is coarse textured, the streams are generally 3 to 4 kilometers apart so that in the rolling plains and low hills the topography offers large areas for dispersion. The hills become increasingly higher to the south, particularly to the southwest.

c. Intermediate to High Mountains. To the south and notably the southeast, the elevations increase and the topography becomes extremely rugged. Steeply sloped mountains occupy most of the southwestern corner of the study area. The mountains are aligned in a northwest to southeast axis with the central spines being pieted by several intermittent and perennial streams flowing in deep valleys flanked by high relief.

3. Drainage

a. General. The area is drained by a combined Da Krong -uang Tri River system. It empties into the Gulf of Tonkin out side the study area. In the southwestern quadrant, the mountain streams flow due south to southwest and due west into the Da Krong River while the watershed feeds into theuang Tri River, often flowing due north. The Da Krong River enters the study area at XD0931 and empties into theuang Tri River to the west. Theuang Tri River commences at XD9241 and flows in an easterly direction.

b. Principal Streams. While comprising actually one drainage system the Da Krong anduang Tri Rivers should be considered separately because of their configuration. In the area (101440 to 2040) the river expands from 90 to 240 meters, depending with the season. At mean water, its depth is 1 meter as it flows through a bed composed of sand interspersed with rock and gravel. Navigation is limited to small craft and sampans. In the final stretch, extending to the border of the study area, the width measures 120 to 900 meters with a depth of 3.2 meters at mean water to 3.5 meters at high water. Lighters and river launchers may pass at mean to high water while sampans are unrestricted a all year long. The banks of the river consist of general gradients throughout its whole length.

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4. Vegetation

a. Rolling Plains and Hills. Varying undergrowth forest with brushwood interspersed is the prevalent type of vegetation. The brush wood areas consist of moderate undergrowth and vegetation that normally does not exceed 3 meters in height on the slopes of hills and mountains. The 20-40 foot high tree canopy is sufficient to provide good to excellent concealment from aerial observation. On level terrain, the canopy is usually broken.

b. Mountains. Almost the entire high country is covered by dense undergrowth forest with mostly continuous canopy 150 to 200 feet high. On the ridge lines, the canopy is shorter with less undergrowth. The steep gullies are filled with thick secondary growths of vines and elephant grass.

5. Cultural Postures. The population in the study area is primarily in villages and hamlets along the banks of the Lang Tri River.

6. Military Aspects of the Areaa. Observation and Fields of Fire

(1) In the lowlands, observation is good in the paddy dikes except where broken by hedgerows and stands of brushwood. Moving into hills, it becomes difficult to see because of the canopy and secondary undergrowth. In the mountains long range observation is possible but limited by the high canopy and very dense underbrush.

(2) Fields of fire for flat trajectory weapons will be good in the plains and the river valleys but rapidly turns poor in the canopy area. Indirect fire target coverage will be reduced in effectiveness due to the canopy, secondary undergrowth and in the mountains by the steep slopes.

7. Cover and Concealment. In the lowlands, cover will be limited to irrigation ditches, paddy dikes and streams and river banks. Moving into the forested areas concealment becomes better with some cover provided by the underbrush. Concealment in the undergrowth is fair to good on the plains with the steep slopes of hills allowing excellent cover and concealment.

8. Obstacles

(1) Naturals. In the lowlands the foot movement through the rice paddies is impeded and channelized along the dikes in the rainy season. Tracked vehicles and wheeled vehicles must avoid areas. The river and many of the streams and canals are usually too deep to be forded. In the plains and low hills, the undergrowth restricts movement in many locations to existing trails. The mountainous area limit travel to the stream valleys because of the perpendicular pattern of the major ridges. Combined with this terrain, the dense vegetation severely channelizes movement to a few existing trails. These can be very slippery in the wet season with crossing of streams extremely difficult because of depth and velocity.

(2) Artificial. The notable artificial obstacles in the area would result from the destruction of existing bridges along the two BMZGAK routes (556 and 557) as well as deterioration of the road bed.

9. Key Terrain

- a. Hill 818 at YD096377 and Hill 824 at YD018376 dominate the area between the Da Krong and Da Long Valleys.
- b. Hill 660 at YD096444.
- c. Hill 908 at XD941311.
- d. Hill 691 at XD928443.

10. Avenue of Approach

(1) The major avenue of approach into the study area is the Quang Tri (Trach Han) River Valley which runs generally east to west.

(2) The Da Krong River Valley crosses the southwest corner of the area on the northwest to southeast axis.

11. Zones of Entry. Helicopter Landing Zones are scattered throughout the flatlands and within the Quang Tri River Valley. Several locations are available in the mountains for one or two aircraft drops. Available landing sites are indicated in Annex C (Fire Support).

11. Lines of Communication

a. Two roads of significance exist within the study area. Route 556 was once a fair weather road with a width of 3-4 meters. It generally runs parallel to the Quang Tri (Trach Han) River crossing the waterway by means of fords at YD157406 and YD113418. The second route, 557 traverses the northern portion of the study area through gently rolling hills. Its last reported condition was an all-weather roadbed of 3-4 meters in width. The surface is crushed stone and gravel.

b. Numerous trails are found throughout the study area.

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Appendix 2 (Weather Study) to Annex A (Intelligence) to Operation Order 9-63

1. Climate. The southwest monsoon continues in full force over all of Southeast Asia during August and into the middle of September.

a. Precipitation. The number of days with precipitation averages 15 days for August. Most precipitation occurs in afternoon and evening showers or thunderstorms.

b. Clouds. During the month of August convective clouds form over most regions during the late morning. Afternoon ceilings of 2000-4000 feet are common throughout the country. Stratus ceilings are common in the early morning, often below 1000 feet (obscuring mountain tops).

c. Visibility. Early morning fog in interior valleys restricts visibility to less than 3 miles.

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Appendix 3 (Summary of Army Situation) to Annex A (Intelligence) to
Operation Order 9-48

1. ENEMY FORCES.

a. The area of operations encompasses a section of an enemy infiltration route. As such, his strength in the area fluctuates greatly on an irregular basis. As of this writing there are indications that the enemy is principally dispersed to the Southwest (Da Krong Valley) of our area of interest. As of this writing there are no reported large enemy forces currently employed in the area of operations. Some sightings (AO and recon) have been reported (See Appendix 4, Tab A) in the AO. However, as a major infiltration route the possibility of enemy units operating in the area remains feasible.

b. Infantry units within the AO can be reinforced with up to regimental sized forces from within the DMZ and unknown size units from the Da Krong Valley area.

2. ENEMY CAPABILITIES.

a. The enemy has the capability to defend prominent terrain features from within fortified positions in our AO.

b. The enemy has the ability to attack by fire any target of opportunity.

c. The enemy has the capability to reinforce and counterattack with unknown size forces.

d. The enemy has the capability to withdraw along his infiltration routes into established Base Camp areas.

3. PROBABLE COURSES OF ENEMY ACTION.

a. The enemy will try to inflict maximum casualties by attacking by fire any lucrative target of opportunity.

b. The enemy will utilize small delaying actions, exfiltrating the major portion of his troops unless an opportunity presents itself whereby he can inflict maximum casualties in a rapid ground engagement.

c. The enemy will commit larger forces only when he feels it is to his advantage.


