



b. <u>Intelligence</u>:

(1) Situation:

(a) Enemy activity and sightings during the month of November have increased considerably from October. On 6 November contact was made with a large force of Viet Cong (possibly two companies). The Viet Cong attacked the road sweep team and security. Companies "K" and "M" made contact while moving to assist the attacked unit. Viet Cong fired thirty-four rounds 82mm mortar and twelve rounds 60mm mortar.

Spiper and harrassing fire has increased during November but has been fairly ineffectual so far. There was also an increase in mining and boobytrap incidents. On 18 November and 20 November the road was cut by blowing culverts with approximately sixty pounds of explosive.

The night of 19 November the Battalion Command Post was mortared for the first time. Intelligence reports from other sources have reported Viet. Cong units of Battalion size moving within the TAOR. Intelligence sources still indicate a minimum of two Viet Cong Battalions operating within the TAOR.

On the second of November two Ralliers were attached and were employed in an operation in the vicinity of La Thap (1) (AT 945517). Their knowledge of the area added to the effectiveness of the operation; Viet Cong documents and other material was uncovered along with large quantities of rice during their employment.

On 13 November the S-2 Officer and S-2 Chief questioned two Viet. Cong deserters from the V-25 Battalion. Information obtained that the Viet Cong are suffering from tropical disease and a shortage of rice.

(b) Scouts

The Battalion Scouts have conducted numerous road reconnaissance patrols this month. They have also assisted Company "M" on a search and destroy operation.

One Scout was stationed on observation point Zulu (AT 865439) during the period covered by this report.

c. Training: Training during this period was directed toward maintaining a high degree of proficiency in combat skills. Special training was conducted for all replacement personnel prior to assignments to Company units: Reference 3d Battalion, 9th Marines Order 1500.1.

d. Communication - Electronics:

During the month of November the communications platoon continued to provide communication support for operations within the An Hoa TAOR.

Classes on radio procedures and transmission security were conducted for all personnel concerned. Classes were also held on the AN PSR-1 (S.I.D.), its use, characteristics, and capabilities to personnel utilizing it.

All communications equipment was tac marked and all records brought up to date. All gear not in use, was packed in mount-out boxes, staged and cargo manifests prepared.

The communication platoon has been preparing continuously for any planned operation and for unit displacement. All personnel were assigned specific duties, and all communication equipment allocated in order to meet the requirement put on the communication platoon.

e. Close Combat:

During the period 1 November = 30 November 1966 the 3d Battalion, 9th Marines conducted search and clear operations, local patrols, ambushes and established PPB'S along Liberty Road, ferry site and within respective Company TAOR's to counter and minimize any enemy activities along and in the vicinity of Liberty Road from An Hoa to the southern bank of the Song Thu Bon river, GS (9253).

Close combat also included during the above period, a VC ambush that was prematurely activated by the Liberty Road sweep security patrol. See "Combat After Actions Report" enclosure (5).

Operation Mississippi: Company "L", 3d Battalion, 9th Marines chopped OPCON to 3d Battalion, 7th Marines for major operation, Mississippi.

271200H, 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines assumed OPCON of 3d Battalion, 9th Marines assigned TAOR.

300700H, 3d Battalion, 9th Marines commenced movement from An Hoa to replace the 4th Battalion, 503rd Brigade in the Da Nang area.

f. Fire Support and Fire Support Goordination:

- (1) General: During the month of November Battery "F", 2nd Battalion, 12th Marines, in direct support of 3d Battalion, 9th Marines and in support of the 1st and 3rd Reconnaissance Battalions, fired seventy missions. Of this total thirty-nine were in support of 3d Battalion, 9th Marines and ARVN units operating in TAOR and thirty-one were in support of reconnaissance observation posts. The battery fired fifty-six observed missions and fourteen unobserved, which were fired on reliable intelligence from the S-2. Enemy casualties from these missions, forty-two KIA confirmed and one hundred forty-six KIA probable. Artillery support was excellent and there were no difficulties in obtaining adequate fire support or coordination.
- (2) <u>H and I Fires</u>: H and I fires for the month averaged eleven concentrations and twenty-two rounds. The number of H and I were increased during Operation Mississippi in order to cover the Battalion TAOR and operation area.
- (3) The 3d Platoon, 1st 8-inch Howitzer Battery joined Battery "F" at An Hoa on 8 November. The mission is general support, reinforcing 2nd Battalion, 12th Marines; priority of fires to the support of reconnaissance observation posts. Since arriving at An Hoa the platoon has fired fifteen missions in support of reconnaissance observers, resulting in one probable KIA.

g. Logistics:

(1) Supply and Distribution

- (a) Supply is presently moving from An Hoa to the new Battalion position north of Da Nang.
- (b) No operations were supported by supply during the month of November.



(a) MCB-6 has completed 83 tropical huts as of this report.

(b) MCB-10 has completed 500 feet on the west end and 300 feet on the east end of the airstrip extension. Resurfacing extension is presently in progress. KC-130 aircraft are not capable of landing as of this report.

h. Air Support:

The following is a synopsis of air activity for the month of November 1966.

- (1) 75 medevac missions were flown in support of 3d Battalion 9th Marines and local ARVN units.
 - (2) 1 fixed wing airstrike
 - (3) 2 UH-1E air courier and strike missions
- (4) One Company air lift to the Battalion position after operation completion.

i. Medical and Dental Support:

- (1) The medical status of the Battalion is presently excellent.
- (2) There were 398 visits to sickcall this past month; 393 Marines, 4 Navy and 1 Army. This represents a 33% increase over last month. Fifty-three of these men were admitted to the BAS ward. This is approximately the same as last month. There were 52 non-battle casualties evacuated to Da Nang an increase of 12 over last month. The ability of the BAS to hold patients at An Hoa has been limited by the preparation for leaving and lack of electrical power.
- (3) There were 7,872 immunizations administered to personnel of this Battalion this month. Ninety percent of the Battalion is up to date on immunizations.
- (4) With the addition of 14 new corpsmen and the loss of only 4 the medical platoon is presently 7 men over T/O.
- (5) The medical supplies situation is presently the best it has been in six months. There are only shortages in a few items.



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- (6) The BAS has increased the Med Cap Program within the past month. 9,480 Vietnamese were treated in spite of only 15 days work. This represents a 10% increase over last month.
- (7) There have been 6 cases of veneral disease this month. This is over a 50% drop from last month.
- (8) Sanitation of the Battalion CP area at An Hos and the Company CP areas forward are adequate.
- (9) There were 143 laboratory procedures accomplished this month.
- (10) <u>Dental</u>: Nine (9) days of this month the Dental Clinic has been without electrical power. 149 Marines were seen this month with 483 procedures accomplished. 32 Vietnamese civilians were seen for 47 procedures.

k. Civic Affairs:

- (1) Public Health: The public health activities conducted this month evolved around the Med Cap Program. A total of 9480 civilians were treated medically during this month. 10 persons received evacuation assistance.
- (2) <u>Public Welfere</u>: Public Welfare activities incuded the distribution of 983 bars of scap. Civil Affiars assisted USAID in the transfer of food to refugees in the Nong Son mining area.
- (3) The Battalion continued this month with clear and hold operation along Liberty Road designed to provide security for civilian as well as military elements engaged in road improvement and continued to provide special security for civilian vehicles on Liberty Road.
- (4) <u>Civilian Improvement</u>: 85 wooden boxes were delivered to Duc Duc District Headquarters for construction of desks for schools in the area.
- (5) Education: English language classes have been conducted tri-weekly for 25 persons in the An Hoa Industrial Complex.





- 2. MISSION. Third Battalion, Ninth Marines coordinates the relief in place of Third Battalion, Ninth Marines by the Second Battalion, Fifth Marines and prepares for, and executes movement to the Phu-Bai area on order, over a four day period.

3. EXECUTION.

- a. Concept of operation. On D-Day, 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines commences the relief in place of 3d Battalion, 9th Marines by company (+) increments daily until relief is completed.

 As 3d Battalion, 9th Marines units are relieved, they will displace to Phu-Bai on available transportation in company (+) increments daily until relief/movement is completed.
- b. Advance party.
 - (1) On 19 November 1966, 3d Battalion, 9th Marines, advance party displace by air to Phu-Bai. See Annex B (Advance party).



 - (a) Be prepared for employment anywhere within the 9th Marines TACR, on order of the Regimental Commander until relieved by Company "K" (Reinf).
- (2) Company "K" (Reinf).
 - (a) On reverting to Regimental Reserve, prepare for employment anywhere within the 9th Marines TAOR on order of the Regimental Commander until relieved by designated elements of 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines.

k. Coordinating instructions.

- (1) All maps within the command pertaining to operational areas within the Bettelion TAOR will be turned over to relieving counterparts. S-2 will ensure all maps applicable to operational committments within the Battalion TAOR are available to the relieving command in case of immediate need.
- (2) All company commanders and section heads will prepare a briefing for relieving counterparts pertaining to all aspects of operations within their assigned areas of responsibility as pertains to their particular function and areas of responsibility to include but not limited to the following subject areas:
 - (a) Supporting arms utilization.
 - (b) Resupply system.
 - (c) VC tactics within assigned TAOR.
 - (d) Civil Affairs.
 - (e) Tracked vehicle utilization.
 - (f) Terrain analysis of TAOR.
 - (g) Company defensive positions (i.e. flare, claynore employment).
 - (h) Company counterattack plans.
 - (i) Current employment of units within the company TAOR (PPB's, OP's, ambushes, etc.







S-3 will prepare a briefing for the relieving unit Advanced Party reporting to include an intelligence briefing by the S-2. (Include KC Scouts use).

- (3) All company commanders and section heads will prepare and submit to the relieving counterparts a complete turn-over file consisting of all aspects of operations within their assigned areas of resposibility.
- (4) S-5 will ensure all inventory of Civil Affairs commodities and building supplies are signed over to the relieving Civil Affairs Officer.
- (5) All units maintaining argunition bunkers will ensure that an accurate inventory of all types of argunition on hand is compiled, and that the relieving units signs for all argunition remaining in place. In the advent a relieving unit commander refuses to sign for a part of the ammunition, that part will be returned to LSL. No argunition will be left in fighting holes, nor will any individual Marine turn over any ammunition to another Marine in the relieving units.
- (6) S-4 is responsible for the instructions pertaining to staging of gear in case of inclement weather. Individual companies and sections will be responsible for maintaining twenty-four hour security over the units staged gear, and will maintain continuous security throughout the lovement phase.
- (7) The Officer-in-charge of the 3d Battalion, 9th Marines Advanced Party will ensure all nembers make liaison with the appropriate agency as they arrive in the new 3d Battalion, 9th Marines position. He will further insure that billeting arrangements, transportation requirements and messing facility arrangements are disseminated to the Advanced Party. All Advanced Party personnel will meet their incoming unit commanders and brief them on information gained from liaison meetings.
- (8) In the advent of inclement weather interfering with any phase of the move, a Frag Order will be issued to all units pertaining to the continuation of the movement phase.
- (9) In the advent of a sudden operational committment of all or part of the Battalion during the movement phase, a Frag Order will be issued including provisions set forth for the completion of the movement phase.




(10) Command Relationship.

- (a) Commanding Officer, 3d Battalion, 9th Marines assumes OPCON of all forces operating within the Battalion TAOR and retains that control pending arrival and emplacement of operating forces, command communications elements and attainment of a readiness posture which will permit relief of responsibility. When the preponderance of combat, communications and control elements of 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines are in position and when mutually agreeable to both the Commanding Officers of 3d Battalion, 9th Marines and 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, the latter will assume responsibility for the TAOR.
- (11) Unit commanders and section heads will provide guides to facilitate the necessary reliefs.
- (12) Priority of movement to relieving unit.
- (13) D-Day is to be announced.
