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## PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During March 1971, the 11th Motor Transport Battalion conducted twelve (12) convoys in support of the 1st Marine Division. Six (6) retrograde convoys totaling ninety-one (91) vehicles, were executed to Combat Base Baldy in support of the Fifth Marine Regiment during phase VI of the Redeployment Cycle. Four (4) convoys totaling fifty-four (54) vehicles were conducted to Deep Water Pier in support of the Fifth Marine Regiment, 11th Marine Regiment, 1st Reconnaissance Battalion, and 1st Engineer Battalion, to stage equipment at the POE. Vehicular support totaling twenty-one (21) was provided on a daily basis to the Division for general support and miscellaneous runs.
2. The Battalion's vehicles traveled 92,719 miles, hauled 11,288 tons and transported 31,765 passengers during March 1971.
3. The Battalion continued to conduct an active and effective Civil Affairs Program. The Battalion continues to support the following projects indicated by the following data:
  - a. Approximately one hundred and twenty (120) cans of waste food products were delivered to the hamlet of Khan-Son for swine consumption. Thirty-five villagers were treated through the Med-Cap Program, while eighty-five (85) received treatment at the Battalion Aid Station. Also During the month of March the Battalion collected \$500.00 for the Protestant Children Orphanage at China Beach and \$200.00 for World Division Incorporated.
4. On 24 March the Battalion "stood down" and discontinued normal operations to initiate preparation for impending redeployment to Camp Pendleton California.
