PART II

NARRATTE SUMMARY

All elements of the First Battalion maintained their efforts during the month of May to ensure that the battalion's essential combat mission of providing direct artillery support to the First Marines was accomplished in a professional manner.

Extensive programs of pre-emptive fires required by the First Marines put a heavy workload on all segments of the battalion. The failure of the enemy to mount an offensive of any significance during the month indicates that the pre-emptive fires achieved the desired results.

Enemy activity within the battalion's fire capabilities consisted of sporadic indirect fire attacks utilizing rockets and mortars, and numerous sniper and mine/booby trap incidents. "B" Battery sustained negative damage from an 82mm mortar attack launched on 8 May. On 27 May the Northern Artillery Cantonment was subject to its first rocket attack (122mm) since its occupation by this battalion. NAC sustained negative damage as a result of the action. Vehicles and patrols operating in the vicinity of NAC experienced a sharp rise in attacks by snipers and mines/booby traps. The increase in these incidents of harassing attacks prompted the Battalion Commanding Officer to require all vehicles to travel in groups of at least two while utilizing roads near NAC. Wearing of flak gear also became a necessity on roads adjacent to NAC.

The High Threat OP's (Reno and Robin) were manned from 27 April until 4 May and were remanned during the Buddha Birthday Cease Fire (18-19 May).

In addition to providing direct fire support to the First Marines, and answering calls for fire from the First Battalion, Fifth Marines operating in the Southern Sector Defense Command and from units in the Northern Sector Defense Command, new procedures were developed to provide rapid fire support by D/S and G/S artillery units located in NAC, and the "WX" detachment for the 1/25th Vietnamese Regional Force Company Group. The system was put into effect on 19 May and immediately proved highly effective. (See Part II (f) for operational details)

Between 26-28 May the 1/25th Regional Force Company Group and a platoon from the First Marines conducted a sweep of the peninsula to the cast of Hai Van Pass. "WX" and general support units opened the operation with an extensive preparation and then remained ready to answer calls for fire from a Marine FO Team which accompanied the command group. On the second day of the operation, as the RF's advanced to the limit of "WX's" fire capability, two 4.2" mortar tubes were displaced from "WX" to AT957927 by helicopter and designated "WZ". The FDC continued to operate from "WX's" position at Hai Van Pass. At the close of the operation "WZ" was extracted by means of the narrow gauge railroad which operates adjacent to the position. This extraction by rail was unique and, according to the best information available, a first. The operation verified that the enemy had not reestablished himself on the peninsula in the two years since the last sweep of the area was conducted.

The program of weekly classes for forward observers, observation post per-

~

sonnel, and infantry small unit leaders which was begun in April was continued through May. The observation and adjustment of artillery fires, clearance procedures, rules of engagement, guest lectures on WA rocket gunnery and crater analysis were presented to those attending. A visual reconnaissance of the First Marines TAOR by helicopter was scheduled at the conclusion of each class.

The improvement of all the bastalion's fixed positions was continued. Various construction projects were completed or in various stages of completion as the month ended. At NAC the helicopter IZ and the internal road system were improved to better handle the increasing traffic load.

To ensure that all of the battalion's personnel were maintaining personal equipment in a high state of readiness, that living quarters were sufficient, and that standards of personal appearance were being adhered to, the Battalion Commanding Officer personally inspected each battery. All batteries were required to correct any discrepancies as a soon as possible, with the result that by the end of the month all batteries were rated as SATISFACTORY.

The month of May concluded with the 1st Bathalion, 11th Marines being eminently qualified to continue its mission of providing direct artillery support to the 1st Marine Regiment.

b. <u>Intelligence</u>

Enemy activity remained generally light, continuing the enemy's trend of avoiding contact with allied units. Indirect fire attacks, mines and booby traps, as well as sniper activity and small ambushes continued to comprise the bulk of the enemy's offensive actions.

A rocket site with 8-140mm rockets was discovered by the units of the 3rd Battalion, First Marines near AT862826 on 6 May. On 8 May Phase II of the expected enemy offensive opened with a rocket attack on DaNang. The 2nd Battalion, First Marines had units assault the launch site at BT052681 and captured 11-122mm rockets. "B" Battery and 2nd Bn., 1st Marines Copereceived 82mm mortar fire on the 8th, but sustained no damage. On 27 May NAC and FIC were attacked by 122mm rockets, but the FO team from "T" 3/1 directed artillery fire on AT846800 and reported 4 secondary explosions, NAC sustained no damage.

There was a noticeable increase in mining and sniper incidents around NAC, vehicles and patrols from the Cantonment being the principal targets.

The resentlement hamlet of Tu Cau was attacked on the 28th. Several houses were destroyed by fire.

The High Threat OP's (Reno and Robin) were manned from 27 April until 4 May and during the Buddha Birthday coase fire (18-19 May).

c. Maintenance, Equipment and Supply

Effort continued on the major position improvement projects. The helicopter landing zone was enlarged by 10,000 square feet, and the soil around it is presently being stabilized. The soil stabilization and the acquisition of required lighting and equipment will be completed during June.

The road network within the cantonment has been graded and oiled. Some upgrading of secondary roads and additional oiling will take place in June. Two additional huts were erected for living quarters, and work continues on rescreening and rebuilding the cantonment living, messing and head spaces.

The Motor Transport section continued to maintain an average deadline rate of only 2% for the month of May. Increased emphasis was placed on driving safety instruction, with a number of classes presented by the Motor Transport Officer.

Battalion Supply continues to reconcile its records in all commodity areas. Additional input data for the Combined Allowance List was submitted to Division as a result of the Division directed redistribution of excesses. Most of the Battalion excesses were disposed of, with the remainder scheduled for invoicing in June. Battalion Supply initiated a project to upgrade the condition of its embarkation boxes. The project will be completed in June.

All engineer equipment remains in an operational status.

BAS personnel conducted a vigorous program of sanitation inspections, which has resulted in a greatly improved cantonment sanitation status.

Efforts were initiated to reduce the number of excess food stores in the NAC mess hall.

First Battalion, Eleventh Marines remains in a C-1 Readiness Category in both equipment and supplies on hand, and in operational readiness.

d. Civic Action/Civil Affairs

The completion of the third month of the First Battalion Civic Action Sections efforts in the three hamlets of the village of Hoa Vinh saw several important steps taken.

A total of 145 Vietnamese patients were treated during the month with the assistance of the ARVN 10th Political Warfare Team. The team also assisted with Psychological Operations by showing movies, broadcasting Chieu Hoi tapes, and by distributing pamphlets.

In the hamlet of Huong Phuoe, 25 desks have been constructed for the hamlet school from ammo, boxes donated by the First Battalion. The school is now 90% finished. The roof on the school building in the hamlet of Van Duong was also completed.

Ten "General Walt" Scholarships were awarded in the sum of \$500 VN to

promising primary students in the Hoa Vinh Village.

Finally, liaison was made with G-5 concerning the purchase of 200 bags of cement for the St. Joseph Orphanage. The cement will be paid for by the Orphanage and used in the construction of a children's dormitory.

e. Training

Classes on artillery procedures for forward observers, OP personnel and small unit leaders were increased during the month of May.

The firing range near NAC was completed with the assistance of the 7th Engineers, who constructed a road from Route 545 to the range with a clearing on either side to prevent ambushes. A newly constructed berm now permits the firing of .50 caliber machineguns and M-79 grenade launchers. Tenent units at NAC have begun incorporating the use of this range into their training programs.

In keeping with the increase emphasis on drug abuse education, including the President's Proclamation of Drug Abuse Week, the Battalion Surgeon conducted 4 classes, each lasting 30 minutes, on the subject.

f. Operations

While maintaining its rapid responsiveness to observed fire missions, the Battalion, in keeping with the wishes of the CG 1st Marine Division, increased its already extensive pre-emptive target program.

Erie Glade, a XXIV Corps high threat pre-emptive operation, was terminated on 2 May with the First Battalion having fired 540 rounds on 9 targets.

The High Threat OP's at Reno and Robin remained manned from the beginning of the month up to 4 May. The OP's were again manned during, and for several days after, the Buddha Birthday cease fire which was observed from 18 to 19 May.

is system was developed whorein both the 1/25th R.F. Co. Group and the U.S. Army 40mm

"duster" section, co-located on Hai Van Pass, could be readily supported by fires from the X-Ray mortar detachment reinforced, if necessary, by D/S and G/S artillery units located in the Northern Artillory Cantonment. The postulated system was put into effect on the evening of 19May70 on a trial basis, and immediately proved highly effective.

A joint COC/FSCC was established, co-located with the 1/25th C.P., and manned by one U.S. Army advisor, one R.F. interpreter, a two-man liaison team from X-Ray mortars, a representative from the "duster" section, and a three-man liaison team from the interested company of the 3d Bn., 1st Marines. An R.F. Lieutenant was placed in charge as the direct representative of the C.O., 1/25th R.F. Co. Group (Captain TAP). In return for the Marine Artille lery liaison team and regularly scheduled forward observer training for key R.F. personnel, Captain TAP augmented X-Ray mortars' local security forces with six R.F.'s.

Requests for artillery support originating from any of the units represented are received in the 1/25th COC/FSCC, interpreted if necessary, then sent to the X-Ray FDC over land line for computation of initial firing data. Political clearance is understood in that the mission/request has already cleared the 1/25th R.F. Co. Group COC/FSCC and, if the fires of the X-Ray mortar detachment are adequate for the nature of the target, nightime military clearance is obtained directly from the 3d Bn., 1st Marines' FSCC. This latter provision deletes the previous requirement for clearing such fires with the 1st Marines' FSCC thereby improving the rapidity of response and adhering to the established doctrine that "fire support coordination should be effected at the lowest level possible." If reinforcing fires are required and/or missions are requested during daylight hours (0600-1900), the X-Ray FDC relays the request to the FDC of the 1st Bn., 11th Marines who coordinates such requests with the 1st Marines FSCC for clearance and SAV-A-PLANE as required. Requests for reinforcing fires beyond the control of 1st Bn., 11th Marines are passed to the 11th Marines FDC.

To further expedite these procedures, all fire requests originating with the 1/25th R.F. Co. Group are referred to as "TANGO" missions throughout all clearance and communications channels. The system has worked exceptionally well thus far.

On 13 May the Division CG, Major General WIDDECKE, fired the six millionth round to be expended by the 11th Marines since entering Vietnam. The round was fired by Mortar Battery's "WY" detachment on Hill 270 AT865 681.

During the period 26-28 May the "WX" detachment of Mortar Battery, with reinforcing fire from "L" Battery 4/11 and "A" platoon, 3rd 8" Howitzer Battery, supported a sweep of the peninsula to the east of Hai Van Pass by the 1/25th Vietnamese Regional Force Company Group. On the second day of the operation 2 "WX" mortars were displaced by helicopter to AT957927 and designated "WZ". "WZ" was located to provide direct support over the entire operation's planned route. The operation terminated on 28 May, after "WZ" had expended 407 rounds. Inserted by helicopter, "WZ" was extracted by local narrow gauge railroad, a displacement unique in the Battalion's history. The operation failed to uncover anything of significance, but it did verify

that the enemy had not reestablished himself on the peninsula.

Technical operations continued to receive considerable emphasis. Precision registration points were established for "C" Battery in the vicinity of Nam O Bridge. The IOD team on Hill 270 was used to establish registration points for "A" Battery and "MY". All 105mm batteries were calibrated with the M-36 Chronograph. This calibration allowed the correct pairing of equal shooters, and in "B" Battery's case, where registration clearances are extremely rare, the determined Muzzle Velocity Variation (MVV) proved invaluable in determining the Velocity Error (VE) necessary in the computation of current GFT settings. FADAC was non-operational during the entire month due to repair delays at FIC.

Live fire FO schools were conducted for the 11th Marines and the 3rd Bn., 1st Marines.

The First Battalion continued the support of numerous squad and platoon size patrols and ambushes throughout the First Marines TAOR during the month of May and maintained its quick-fire channels to "L" Battery 4/11 and "F" Battery 2/11.
