CONSOLIDALED SURVEHILANCES.

During Agril, 1969, 2/11 was credited with 110 confirmed KIAs, 198, probable HTMs, 95 structures damaged or destroyed, 8 secondary emplosions, 1 12.7mm AA gun destroyed, and 1 mortar tube destroyed.

PART II

During April 1969, the 2d Battalion 11th Marines provided fire support to the 5th Marine Regiment in their Area of Operation. Operation Muskogee Meadows, a Rice Denial Operation, was conducted from 070800H to 202400H. 2/11 fired on Rice Route targets in support of this operation.

On the night of 21 april, 0.44 joined the 7th Marines, air and reconforces in attacking a large force of enemy in the northern portion of the AO. Air and artilleny were cardinad with 40 confirmed KIAs.

Mortar and rocket attacts fold off sharply following the major series which ended in late Manch.

Recovalsance inserts not with constally high resistance while trying to establish Observation Posts, and 2/11 directed K 4/13 on several occasions to provide area fire after an intended insert had been regulated before landing.

b. Invelligence

During April 1969, there was a marked decrease in enemy activity. The batts like received a total of 47 incoming rounds in 8 incidents. The counter-mortar/counter-rocket plan was continuously revised to compensate for new data received.

On 25 April the battalion received from 11th Marine Rogiment on experimental sound detection system known as the LASL. These compact systems, along with their crews, were assigned to two observation towers approximately 1000 meters apart as test sites. It is too early to determine the effectiveness of the units at this time. The MPQ-4 and the MPQ-10, counter mortar radar systems, continue to be plagued with difficulties. The effectiveness of these devices has greatly diminished in the last month due to repeated mechanical failures.

On 25 April 1969 during a mocket attack a Village Chief from Phu Da Village reported the location of a rocket site. The same site was identified by Foxtrot battery. The Village Chief was turned over to 13th ETT.

c. Training

The battalion continues to devote substantial time for training with particular emphasis on security of the position area, direct fire procedures; and refinement of skills thair each occupational field.

d. Logistics

During this reporting mental the following projects have been completed.

- The emisting galloy has been framed in, screened and provided with a commuzated bin most.
- 2. New bunker constransion for S-4, S-4/Hq bettery and communications.
- 3. Byacusvion of Legisla of power cenisters and shell casings from An Hoes

Nonreceipt of construction saterials has slowed down the work on the new Motor Transport/Hq Battery Supply bunker and has placed the 2/11 messhall project into a "sometime in the future" category.

A shortage of 2nd and 3nd echelon repair parts has resulted in increased deadline time for motor vehicles. Vehicles have been deadlined for lack of parts as long as $2\frac{1}{2}$ weeks.

Positive commective action is being undertaken to replace/resupply items of individual clothing and equipment destroyed by combat action or wormout in service. Jungle utilities, jungle boots and underwear continue to be hard to get items of clothing while gas masks and insect repellent are areas of shortage in individual excipment.

Enemy action accounted for the loss of a PV-239 generator during the month of April.

e. Civic Action/Civil Affairs

The Sof program increased in tempo during the reporting period. 2/11 has asked for and received an average of 15 civilian workers daily for use in heavy manual labor projects. A civilian laundry service was tried and terminated during April because of poor quality laundering and submember assumes of lost clothing. A new laundry service, a satellite of the 5th Marine civilian laundry, is now being operated on a trial basis.

During April, 2/11 provided lumber, clothing and soap to the Villagens of Thu Da I and My Son.

g. Supporting Forces

Battery K 4th Battalion, 13th Marines, General Support Reinforcing; Plt "A", 3d 8" Howitzer Battery (SP), General Support; Plt "A", 3d 175 Gun Battery, General Support.

- h. Intelligence. 5th Marines INTSUMS.
- i. Mission. Direct Support, 5th Marines.
- j. Execution. During Muskogee Meadows, the 2d Battalion 11th Varines provided fire support to the 5th Marines engaged in Rice Denial operations in their Area of Operation. Suspected Rice Routes were interdicted in hopes of preventing enemy taxation of local Vietnamese. 2/11 fired 386 missions, expending

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10,762 rounds which accounted for 59 confirmed KM: and 62 probable KIA. 36 Structures were destroyed.

k. <u>Maval Gunfire</u>. During Muskogoe Meadows, the following ships were made available for support:

USS OKLAHOM. CITY (CLC-5)
USS NEWPORT NEWS (CA-148)

There were 25 hours of ship availability. During 23 of these hours AOs were available for observation. Ships fired a total of 724 rounds which resulted in 3 confirmed KIA, 4 probable KIA and 25 bunkers damaged or destroyed. There were 4 secondary fires or explosions.

- 1. Administrative Matters. Operation Muskogee Meadows placed no special requirements on Supply, mintenance or Motor Transport.
- m. Communications. No special nets or frequencies required. No unusual difficulties encountered. Normal maintenance and improvement throughout the operation.
- n. Medical. Normal operations throughout.
- o. Commander's Analysis. Operation Muskogee Meadows was one of the shorter operations in which 2/11 participated. No displacements were planned or executed since no special situations arose which might have required them.

Known routes of approach and egress were interdicted in hopes of preventing enemy access to rice being harvested during the Operation, but ammunition expenditures and mission volume remained about the same as during the period immediately prior to the Operation.

No surveillances were available to demonstrate the effectiveness of these Rice Denial fires, but experience gained in targeting and resulting familiarity with Rice Routes in the 5th Marines Area were deemed to be a valuable outcome of the Operation.
