At 1915: Battery "G" displaced from the artillery position and moved to Dong Ha to stage for a move to the Phu Bai area, where the Battery will prepare for a deployment to Okinawa with BLT 1/4.

#### 2 November

At 0800H Battery "I" was returned to operational control of the 3d Battalion, 12th Marines

At 1120H Battery "G" arrived in Phu Bai, reverting to operation control of the 3d Marine Division.

At 2105H Battery "I" fired sixty rounds of HE at suspected fif VC with 60mm mortars at YD 105503. Surveillance on the mission, which been called for by the advisor at D-5, was good target coverage.

### 3 November

At 0800H Battery "I" displaced with six 105mm howitzers from t artillery plateau, west of Cam Lo, to the new Battalion position at Y 145616. The Battery was laid on azimuth 6400, and it also assumed tec nical and tactical fire direction for the Battalion.

At 1000H Mortar Battery, 3d Battalion, 12th Marines displaced be helicopter from the forward Battery position at Nui Con Thien(YD 11703) and moved to the new Battalion position north of Cam Lo. The Battery(Rear) moved to the position by convoy from Dong Ha and joined helilifted element. Four 4.2" mortars were emplaced and laid on azim 6400.

Turing the morning, initial elements of the Battalion Headquart moved to the new position by convoy.

#### 4 November

During the day the Battalion continued its displacement to the position. Good progress was also made on emplacement of both interior exterior wire.

#### 5 November

From 0640H to 0800H Battery "I" expended sixty-nine HE and twe seven WP rounds in prep fires at Grid Squares YD 1165, 1064 and 117. The fires were in support of 3d Battalion,4th Marines and were unol

At 0730H the Battalion FDC resumed technical and tactical fire ection of the Battalion.

At 1100H the 4th Marines Regimental Commander visited the Batt CP, departing at 1120H.

At 1105H the 12th Marines Regimental Commander and S-3 visited Battalion CP, departing at 1130H for Con Thien with the Commanding Officer of of the Battalion accompanying them.

During the afternoon, Battery "I" fired several concentration adjustments for forward elements with the 3d Battalion, 4th Marines

During the day the Battalion continued its displacement to the new position.

From 1930 to 1945H Battery "C"(1/11) expended ninety-eight HE twelve illumination rounds on reconnaissance by fire missions at 3 097704 and 091720 in support of the 2d Battalion,5th Marines.

# 6 November

At 0750H Battery "C"(1/11) expended twelve rounds of HE in a reconnaissance by fire mission at YD 110675. The mission was in support of 2d Battalion,5th Marines and was unobserved.

The Battalion displacement to the new position at YD 145616 was held up by the total collapse of a sixty meter section of the road

7 November

From 0730H to 0746H Battery "I" expended twenty-five HE and twenty-five WP rounds as preparation fires in Grid Squares YD 166 1666,1766,1166,1065,1165 and 1066. The rounds were fired in support of Companies "L" and "M" of 3d Battalion,4th Marines, which were sweeping in those areas. The fires were unobserved.

At 1445H the last convoy of equipment was brought in from Cam J. J. CARROL, completing the displacement. Battery "W" has a smal amount of equipment left in Dong Ha awaiting reopening of the roa

The Battalion received helicopter resupply of water and ammun The connecting road to Highway 9 was impassable at one point near Battalion CP, and vehicular movement was impeded.

#### 8 November

From 0500H to 0513H Battery "C"(1/11) fired one hundred and f rounds of HE, fuzes Quick and Delay, as preparation fires for the Battalion, 5th Marines at YD 150732. The fires were unobserved.

At 0855H Battery "C"(1/11) conducted a precision registration at YD 06856823. Nineteen rounds of HE were expended, and the registration was valid.

### 9 November

At 0755H Battery "I" fired twenty-two rounds of HE as prep fin on YD 13826564. The mission was in support of the 3d Battalion,4th Marines, and the surveillance was excellent effect on target.

At 1002H Battery "C"(1/11) fired fifty rounds at NVA troops in tree line at YD 110727. The mission was called by an AO(Sacred De. and the surveillance was two KIA(probable).

At 1530H the 12th Marines Regimental Commander visited the Battalion area. Accompanied by the Battalion Commander, he presented several individual decorations in an awards ceremony at the Batter "I" position.

# 10 November

At 1500H Battery "I" and Battery "C"(1/11) expended thirty—thre rounds of HE in a Regimental Time on Target mission at YD 076623. The mission was fired at a suspected arms cache and was unobserved

In the afternoon, the Battalion celebrated the 191st Anniverse of the United States Marine Corps with a reading of the Commandant birthday message by the Battalion Commander that was followed by a cake cutting ceremony and an excellent evening meal served at the Battalion Mess.

# 11 November

At 1030H, Battalion technical fire direction was decentralized and Battery "I" assumed their own technical control.

At 1230H the Battalion Commander departed by vehicle to Dong I to attend a Regimental Commander's Conference.

At 1400H the 4th Marines Regimental Commander and his party visited the Battalion position.

# 12 November

At 0900H the Battalion Commander and S-3 departed the Battalion position by helicopter on a trip to the Battery "C"(1/11) position at Nui Con Thien(YD 117702).

At 1231H a helicopter was requested for evacuation of PFC Dwigunshov would in received the gunshov would in received the and was evacuated to "D" Med at Dong Ha. The 12th Marines Regime Surgeon was present in the Battalion area and assisted the Battal: Surgeon in treating MOUNT's wound.

# 13 November

At 1400H divine services were conducted in the Battalion CP  $_{\mbox{\scriptsize fc}}$  all hands.

At 1500H representatives from each battery departed for Dong for the Martha Raye USO Show.

At 2200H Battery "I" fired forty rounds, shell HE, on a reporte VC company 4000 meters south of the Battalion CP. No surveillance was given at this time, but the ARVN will sweep the area tomorrow.

### 14 November

Commencing at 0630H Battery "I" fired eight preparation fires: the following Grid Squares: 0666, 0765, 0665 and 0565. A total of fifty-four rounds was expended on this unobserved mission in support of the 3d Battalion, 4th Marines.

At 1820H Battery "I" fired twenty-four rounds at four VC in a tree line at YD 068665. Darkness prevented a complete surveillance of this mission fired for the 3d Battalion,4th Marines, but the rowere reported "on target."

# 15 November

At 0830H Battery "I" fired ten rounds of HE on YD 07256344 as prep fire for 3d Battalion,4th Marines. The FO reported the rounds target.

At 1040H Battery "C"(1/11) fired eight rounds of HE at YD 1477 During this reconnaissance by fire mission, Battery "C" expended it twenty thousandth round; in support of 2d Battalion,5th Marines operations in the Nui Con Thien area.

At 1450% Battery "C"(1/11) expended twenty-one rounds of HE and three WP on a reconnaissance by fire at YD 150717. The mission was observed by an FO for 2d Battalian, 5th Marines, with good effect on target.

# 16 November

At 0800 Battery "G"(1/11) fired forty-five rounds of HE quick in a recon by fire mission at YD 122732. The mission was in support of 2d Battalion, 5th Marines and was unobserved.

Word was received that Mortar Battery would return to Phu Bai within a week to begin processing for deployment to Okinawa.

### 19 November

Due to grant inclement weather, both Batteries "I" and "W" fire daylight harracsing and interdiction fires.

At 1400H Lt. Roger HANSEN, CHC, USN reported aboard for duty.

#### 20 November

During the morning, the Battalion Commander and the Commanding Officer of 3d Battalion, 4th Marines accompanied the 4th Marines Regmental Commander on a helicopter visit to the Con Thien area(YD 117-703).

At 1450H the relief of Battery "C"(1/11) by Battery "A"(1/12) wa effected at the position area at Nui Con Thien(YD 117703). The move of both batteries was made by CH-46 helicopter, shuttling loads betw Con Thien and Dong Ha. Battery "A"(1/12) will be under the operation control of the Battalion and will provide its own technical fire direction. Four 105mm howitzers were emplaced initially and laid on azimuth 4400. Operational control of "C"(1/11) was passed to the 3d Marine Division.

#### 21 November

The entire twenty-four hour period was characterized by rain, for and poor visibility.

Daylight.H&I concentrations were cleared, and fire commenced on them at 1200H.

#### 22 November

The Cattallon S-3 conducted a nighttime. forward observer school with emails in adjusting illumination. The 107mm Mortar Battery provide. support for the school.

#### 23 November

From 1005H to 1045H Battery "A"(1/12) fired twenty rounds into Gid Square YD 0967. The nature of target was recon by fire, and the mission was in support of the 3d Battalion, 4th Marines

### 24 November

During the day both Catholic and Protestant services were held in

the Battalion area. All Battalion personnel were afforded the opportunity to attend divine services.

At noon Mortar Battery displaced by vehicle from the Battalion position at Cam Lo to Dong Ha. They will depart at a later date to Phu Bai to prepare for a deployment with BLT 1/4.

Commencing at 2210H Battery "I" expended sixty rounds of HE in missions in the vicinity of Grid Squares YD 1056 and 0957 at a sus pected VC company. The target was originally reported by a Popular ces unit and relayed to the Battalion by the Cam Lo advisor. All fir were unobserved, and no immediate surveillance was received. The are was to be swept the following morning.

# 25 November

At 0900H the Battalion Commander, accompanied by several member the Battalion Staff, departed by helicopter for a liaison trip to N Con Thien(YD117703), returning at 0945H

During daylight hours, night defensive concentrations were fired for the Provisional Infantry Battalion and 3d Battalion,4th Marine

At 1625H Battery "I" fired fourteen rounds of HC smoke on coord YD 126666 as a screening agent for 3d Battalion, 4th Marines.

# 26 November

At 1105H the Battalion was notified by the advisor at Cam Lo of ARVN intelligence report of a planned VC ambush at YD 114597. The objective of the planned ambush was the daily gravel run.

At noon, The Battalion Commander attended a dinner in honor of the Commanding Officer, 12th Marines at the 11th ARVN Artillery  $B\varepsilon$ 

At 1343H Battery "A"(1/12) fired seven rounds on YD 005680 in recon by fire mission. The fire was in support of the Provisional Infantry Battalion, and the surveillance was rounds on target. 27 November

During the day, Protestant and Catholic services were conducted in the Battalion area for all hands.

From 0940 to 1320H Battery "A"(1/12) fired a total of seventyrounds supporting the Provisional Battalion. The nature of target recon by fire, and the surveillance was excellent coverage of targe lander Brown and State 1 28 November

At 0730H The Battalion FDC resumed tactical and technical conta of fire direction for Battery "I"(3/12),

At 0726H Battery "A"(1/12) fired six rounds of HE in a recon by mission at YD 087705. The mission was in support of the Provisional Battalion and was unobserved.

At 0730H technical control of Pattery "I" was passed to the battery's FDC.

At 0824H Battery "A"(1/12) fired five rounds of HE at YD 093710 in a recon by fire mission in support of the Provisional Battalion. The mission was unobserved.

At 1600H the Battalion Commander attended a Division Commander's conference at the 3d Marine Division Command Post(forward) at Dong

At 1905H Battery "I" fired fourteen rounds of illumination at YD 140630. The mission was in support of the 3d Battalion, 4th Marines and the nature of target was suspected enemy movement.


# 30 November

At 0805H a friendly jet aircraft on a TPQ-10 mission dropped two bombs in the vicinity of coordinates YD 164616. The bombs detonated within one hundred and fifty meters of the 3d Battalion, 4th Marine Command Post, but there were no casualties. The ordnance was estim to be trive hundred if pound bombs.

At 0830H Battery "A"(1/12) fired sixty rounds of HE quick on coonates YD 126740 as a diversionary prep fire. The mission was in support of the Provisional Infantry Battalion and was unobserved.

At 0850H Battery "A"(1/12) fired two hundred and eighty-eight rounds of HE quick on coordinates YD 157738 as unobserved prep.firefor the Provisonal Infantry Battalion.

At 0947H, Mortar Battery commenced a vehicle move by Rough Rider Gonvoy from Dong Ha to Phu Bai. Operational control of the battery passed to 3d Marine Division.





Personnel and Administration
This Battalion has maintained an operating level of personnel at approximately 74% of its authorized T/O strength during the month of November. This figure breaks down as follows:

This Battalion joined 35 personnel of various reaks and MOS's while rotating 32 back to CONUS.

Morale and Discipline
The state of morale of this command remained at a high level consistent with the conditions under which the unit has served. The R&R program again continued to be the most effective morale booster although the promotion Quotas received by the battalion also helped to a marked degree

The supply of Beer and soft drinks was adequate. The meals furnished for the Marine Corps Birthday and Thanksgiving were an additional morals booster. No movies were presented.

Chaplain support was very adequate. During the month of November a Chaplain was assigned duty with this Battalion. Due to cur isolated location his presence for religions services and personal problem counseling added tremendously to the morale of the personnel in this Battalion. #### S-2 MATTERS INTELLIGENCE

Throughout the month of November the S-2 was involved in obtaining, on a daily basis, a general situation report on friendly and enemy units. The contents of this report were based on information gathered from 3d Marine Division Forward and MACV Advisory Team sources. Paterial gathered was presented to the Commanding Officer and his Staff on a thrice weekly basis.

During November specialized training of the Intelligence Clerk was continued. The training included varied aspects of the process

obtaining and recording Intelligence information.



# S-4 MATTERS,

- A. LOGISTICS. The overall logistics situation is fair. Four hundrand twenty-six supply requisitions were filled during November leave two thousand nine hundred and seventy-five requisitions outstanding which gives a 14% level of completion for submitted requisitions. Operating parts on hand are still at the 60% level.
- B. INTENANCE. Maintenance has improved during November, wuntil precedity it is at the very good level. This improvement is due primarily to loss of three firing batteries on BLT rotations. Our remaining batteries are in good shape, and motor transport deadline is presently only 12%. We still have not received a replacement for the T-15, which was code "X" in June 66.
- C. FOUR SERVICES The Battalion continues to serve 60% "A" rations and 40% "The mations.

# COMMUNICATIONS-ELECTRONICS

### 1. General.

a. Captain LIST relieved Captain SOMMERVILLE as Battalion Communications Officer on 10 November.

b. The displacement of the Battalion CP early in the month required the construction and development of a new communications network

c. Turing the final twenty days of the month, activity centered around the continued improvement of the new system and the central fization of all equipment at the new CP location. All equipment which had been in the rear was moved forward. The communications center vestablished, a teletype circuit was set up, and courier runs to the rear were continued on a daily basis. Operator training with the KY was continued. All items of the old family of FM radio equipment we turned in to the Battalion supply for further invoicing to FLSG "A'

# 2. Equipment.

a. <u>Vehicles</u>. A considerable amount of work was performed on communications vehicles by the motor pool. The performance of weekl preventive maintenance was stressed. There are one M-37 and two MRC-83's from this section which remain on deadline.

b. Radio and Wire. No major failures of equipment occurred. The new family of FM radio equipment continues to prove itself to be

extremely reliable.

c. Teletype and associated equipment. A long period of storage and lack of proper maintenance were contributing factors in the difficulties encountered in trying to set up a teletype circuit with 12t Marines. These problems were compounded by a lack of power and a lack of qualified technicians for the teletype and associated electronic and cryptographic equipment. A failure to check and PM equipment of a regular basis over the past few months was the major culprit. This in turn can be attributed to the rapid succession of moves and displacements and an inadequate maintenance program resulting from the moves.

### 3. Personnel.

Personnel shortages continue to present problems. While it is true that this battalion has been able to meet its operational communications committments, it should also be pointed out that it has been at the expense of its maintenance and training programs. Of necessity, the operational committments must come first, but it sho be rembered that maintenance and training are necessary in order to continue to do this. The introduction of the new family of FM radi equipment has been advantageous in two respects. First, it has provided us with an improved piece of equipment which considerably out



performs its pre

performs its predecessors. Second, because it is a brand new piece equipment, the amount of maintenance has been minimal up to now. In all honesty, it must be admitted that this new equipment has gotten the unit off the hook, so to speak, because we have not had to both meet operational committments and worry about extensive maintenance at the same time. Therefore, it is imperative that continued attempt be made to provide enought personnel to ensure that both of these aspects of communications are able to be performed adequately.

# 4. Special problem areas.

One recurring problem has continued to hamper both the operation and maintenance aspects of communications within this Battalion. This is simply the lack of adequate 110 volt 60 cycle power. In ord to conserve what power is available, this CP has power only from 17 to 0800. During the daylight hours, the one PU-239 generator which have has been turned off for maintenance. It is left off for this less as to conserve what little operating time it still has in it. Because of this, there is no power available during normal working hours for either the operation of teletype and crypto equipment or electronics test equipment. This has forced us to rely upon the wholly uneconomical method of establishing courier runs which place undue demand on wehicles, personnel and time; all of which could be used much more effectively in some other way.
