

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PART II

COMMANDER'S NARRATIVE

During the month of February 1968, 1st Battalion, 13th Marines continued participation in Operation Scotland in support of the 26th Marines.

At 0147 on 7 February 1968, the U. S. Army Special Forces Camp at Lang Vei came under a heavy NVA ground attack. Nineteen missions were fired in support of Lang Vei, expending 567 rounds of ammunition to include 68 Selected Ammunition projectiles, M444 (firecracker), recently introduced in Vietnam. Air Force air observers (coveys) reported excellent target coverage but an accurate surveillance could not be obtained due to darkness.

On the morning of 8 February 1968, the 1st Battalion, 9th Marines located west of the Khe Sanh Combat Base received a heavy NVA ground attack. Artillery Defensive fires were delivered until the attack was successfully repulsed. One hundred and nine NVA bodies remained after the attack, a large number credited to artillery. However, as no accurate determination could be made, no KIA by artillery for this action appears in the below total.


Two 105mm Howitzers were received by 1st Battalion, 13th Marines as replacement/float weapons bringing the total number of 105mm weapons to 20. These weapons were placed in "slit trenches" in Battery "A" to reduce the danger of being damaged. One 105mm howitzer belonging to the Det of Battery "C" on hill 881S remains inoperable due to a broken trail the result of an incoming rocket impacting in the gun pit. A helicopter lift is required to replace this weapon but due to position location and intense ground fire, the SOP, Khe Sanh, directed that no replacement attempt be made.

An additional 155mm Howitzer arrived 26 February 1968 bringing to a total of seven; the number of weapons on hand. Living and ammunition bunkers were built within the 1st Provisional Battery area to replace the temporary structures constructed when the Battery displaced during the last week of January 1968.

One 4.2" mortar has been out of action since 14 February 1968 with a broken standard. A replacement 107mm Howtar was received on 28 February 1968, however it was missing the Panoramic Telescope M-98 sight mount (on order) and has been inoperable since arrival. Mortar Battery, 1st Battalion, 13th Marines presently has five 4.2" mortars and two 107mm Howtars.

On 29 February 1968, 1st Battalion, 13th Marines supported the 37th ARVN Ranger Battalion with continued defensive fires during a heavy NVA ground attack. The attack was successfully repulsed with 72 KIA credited to the artillery.

A significant problem area developed during the month of February concerning the operational status of vehicles and engineer equipment. The combination of combat losses by enemy action, the extensive use of vehicles to transport paradrop supplies, and the absence of an orderly flow of repair parts into the Khe Sanh Combat Base has caused an exceedingly high deadlined rate. Efforts are being made to eliminate the problem of obtaining repair parts by sending couriers to distant supply sources and utilizing parts from those vehicles which are total combat losses. At present OPCON Batteries have 30 of 44 authorized trucks. Sixteen of these are operable. Ten are repairable and 4 are unrepairable and need replacement.

SEQUENCE OF EVENTS

One 155 Howitzer arrived 1st Provisional 155 Howitzer Battery bringing the number of weapons to six

7 February 1968

1st Battalion, 13th Marines fired 19 missions in support of the U. S. Army Special Forces Camp at Lang Vei expending 567 rounds of ammunition. Sixty-eight rounds of High Explosive Selected Ammunition M444 (firecracker) were fired for the first time in RVN.

8 February 1968

1st Battalion, 13th Marines fired defensive fire missions in support of 1st Battalion, 9th Marines. After the ground attack, 109 NVA bodies were counted, a large number credited to artillery. (This count does not appear with the total listed in part II).

14 February 1968

Two 105mm Howitzers arrived 1st Battalion, 13th Marines to be used as replacement weapons.

14 February 1968

One 4.2 inch mortar out of action due to broken standard.

14 February 1968

One 155mm Howitzer returned to action after the tube was replaced and the recoil mechanism repaired. Five of six weapons operational.

19 February 1968

One 105mm Howitzer inoperable due to faulty recoil mechanism. Second 105mm Howitzer inoperable due to broken trail incurred during January. Eighteen of twenty weapons operable.

24 February 1968

One 155mm Howizer arrived from Dong Ha bringing the number of 155mm weapons to seven. Five weapons are in action. One weapon required a recoil guide key, one required recoil mechanism repair.

28 February 1968

One. 155mm Howitzer repaired. Six weapons operational.

28 February 1968

Float 107mm Howtar arrived and assigned to Mortar Battery.

29 February 1968

1st Battalion, 15th Marines fired defensive fires in support of the 37th ARVN Ranger Battalion helping repulse a heavy ground attack. Seventy-two NVA KIA credited to artillery. (This figure included in total listed in part II).
