



PART II

COMMAN DER'S NARRATIVE

During the month of March 1968, 1st Battalion, 13th Marines continued participation in Operation Scotland in support of the 26th Marines.

On the evening of 1 March 1968, the 37th ARVN Ranger Battalion received an NVA ground attack on the eastern portion of the Khe Sanh Combat Base. Artillery defensive fires were delivered until the attack was successfully repulsed. Two hundred and seventy-four artillery rounds were fired in support of the Ranger Battalion, including 26 Selected Ammunition Projectiles, M444 (Firecracker).

On 2 March 1968, the 1st Battalion, 13th Marines fired 157 artillery rounds in support of the 37th ARVN Ranger Battalion. These rounds, including 11 Firecracker, were directed against an NVA attack on the eastern portion of the Combat Base.

On 18 March 1968, the 1st Battalion, 13th Marines supported the 37th ARVN Ranger Battalion. Four hundred and six artillery rounds were fired during this action, to include 59 Firecracker rounds.

On 21 March 1968, 1st Battalion, 13th Marines fired 1,138 rounds consisting of "preparation" and "on-call" fires, in support of a combat patrol operation conducted by the 1st Battalion, 26th Marines.

On 30 March 1968, 1st Battalion, 13th Marines fired 2,608 rounds consisting of "preparation", "on-call" and "will adjust" fires, in support of a combat patrol operation conducted by Company "B", 1st Battalion, 26th Marines. One of the KIA's sustained during this action was a Forward Observer from Battery "A", 1st Battalion, 13th Marines.

On 8 March 1968, a Howitzer in Battery "A" received a direct hit which destroyed the weapon. The replacement was a float weapon that was stored in the Battery "A" position. On 9 March another float 105mm Howitzer was received by the 1st Battalion, 13th Marines. On 22 March Battery "B" and Battery "C", 1st Battalion, 13th Marines received a heavy artillery attack which destroyed a Battery "C" Howitzer position and damaged the weapon. One 105mm Howitzer belonging to the Detachment of Battery "C" on Hill 881S remains inoperable due to a broken trail, and the terrain and tactical situation still precludes a replacement attempt. The 1st Battalion, 13th Marines has a total of 19 105mm Howitzers of which 17 are in firing order.


The 1st Provisional 155mm Howitzer Battery (Rein) has six weapons on hand, all in firing order.

Mortar Battery, 1st Battalion, 13th Marines presently has five 4.2" Mortar and two 107mm Howtars. One 4.2" Mortar is out of action with a broken standard. Another 4.2" Mortar is out of action with a broken standard and a faulty recoil mechanism.

On 31 March 1968, Operation Scotland was suspended and the Battalion continued to support the 26th Marines as Operation Pegasus commenced.



The Battalion position areas were improved considerably during the menth of March. Due to the increased availability of ammunition cases, cannisters, and other building materials, numerous below ground bunkers were completed and gun positions and ammunition bunkers improved. Increased usage of available tractors has assisted in the personnel bunker building program and has provided the opportunity to increase the surviveability of vehicles through the digging of vehicle revetments.



SEQUENCE OF EVENTS


- 1 March 1968 The 1st Battalion, 13th Marines supported 37th ARVN Ranger Battalion by firing extensive defensive fires to stop an NVA ground attack on the Eastern portion of the Khe Sanh Combat Base.
- 2 March 1968 The 1st Battalion, 13th Marines supported 37th ARVN Ranger Battalion by firing extensive defensive fires to stop an NVA ground attack on the Eastern portion of the Khe Sanh Combat Base.
- 8 March 1968 Gun #3 of Battery "A", 1st Battalion, 13th Marines, received a direct hit, destroying the weapon. A replacement was provided from Logistic Support Unit.
- 9 March 1968 One float 105mm Howitzer arrived Khe Sanh Combat Base and positioned with Battery "A", 1st Battalion, 13th Marines.
- 14 March 1968 Battery "A", 1st Battalion, 13th Marines changed tubes on Gun #6.
- 14 March 1968 A quantity of CS ammunition for the 4.2" Mortar arrived Khe Sanh Combat Base.
- 18 March 1968 The 1st Battalion, 13th Marines supported 37th ARVN
 Ranger Battalion by firing extensive defensive fires to
 stop an NVA ground attack on the Eastern portion of
 the Khe Sanh Combat Base.
- 21 March 1968 One 155mm Howitzer arrived Khe Sanh Combat Base and was assigned to 1st Provisional 155 Howitzer Battery.
- 21 March 1968 The 1st Battalion, 13th Marines fired 1138 rounds in support of a combat patrol operation conducted by 1st Battalion, 26th Marines.
- 22 March 1968 Battery "B" and Battery "C", 1st Battalion, 13th
 Marines received a heavy artillery attack which
 damaged Battery "C" Gun #5 and destroyed the attendent ammunition bunker and gun pit.
- 27 March 1968 1st Provisional 155mm Howitzer Battery (Rein), 3rd Battalion, 12th Marines changed the tube on Gun #6.
