PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the reporting period, the 2d Battalion, 26th Marines was still established in the Area of Operations that included the areas north and south of HAI VAN PASS.

The Battalion Rear Command Post remained at the ROCKCRUSHER (AT942749) throughout the period. The Battalion Forward Command Post remained in the HAI VAN PASS (AT944921) along with the Command Post of Company E (AT945919). Company F Command Post remained at LANG CO BRIDGE (AT886955). Company G maintained its Command Post on Hill 88 (AU807017) until 26 November. On 26 November, Company H relieved Company G in place and established its Command Post at Hill 88. Company G then moved its Command Post to the LIEN CHIEU ESSO DEPOT (AT937867) where the Command Post of Company H had been located. With this switch of Company Command Post locations, Company G assumed responsibility for the Area of Operations previously occupied by Company H, and Company H assumed control and responsibility for the Area of Operations previously controlled by Company G.

Numerous small-unit activities were employed within the Area of Operations in order for the Battalion to perform its mission of providing security for the highway and railroad routes in the HAI VAN PASS area. Daily road and railway sweeps were used to detect the presence of mines and other explosive charges. In spite of the precautionary measures taken, a train was blown off the railroad tracks at grid AT835976 on 13 November. The damage done was not extensive, and no friendly personnel were hurt seriously. To prevent this from recurring, the Battalion doubled the number of personnel providing security for the railroad. Twenty-four hour surveillance and extensive railroad sweeps and patrols have kept enemy activity in the vicinity of the railroad down to a minimum. In addition to the special security measures around the Fire Support Base located at LOS BANOS (AT834998).

On 15 November, Colonel THIEN, Commanding Officer QUANG DA SPECIAL ZONE, presented awards to members of the 26th Marine Regiment at an awards ceremony held at KIM LIEN VILLAGE (AT924856).

Twice during the reporting period, elements of the Battalion moved into the northern section of the Area of Operations to the area known as "The Hook", in the vicinity of grid AU835057. Both operations were in reaction to intelligence reports of enemy activity in the area. One unit from Company G captured one Vietnamese male on 5 November at grid AU836056. Along with the detainee, a small quantity of rice, medical gear, and other personal items were found in the immediate area. On 27 November, a platoon of Company E moved into the area in preparation for a sweep and clear operation of the entire "Hook" area.

During the daylight hours, the Battalion employed numerous squad-sized combat patrols, fire-team reconnaissance patrols, and observation posts, in order to detect and destroy any enemy movement inside the Area of Operations. During the hours of darkness, the Battalion employed extensive ambushes, listening posts, and night patrols. These night tactics resulted in two significant contacts with enemy personnel. On 10 November, at 1945, a night patrol from Company G ambushed two enemy at grid AU816057. During a search of the area under illumination, a U.S. caliber .30 M1 Carbine, and NVH pith helmet, and several bags of rice and fish were found. In another incident, a listening post position of Company F ambushed and killed one enemy at grid AT837976 on 13 November.

At the end of the reporting period, the 2d Battalion, 26th Marines, was still deployed within the assigned Area of Operations continuing to perform its assigned mission.

PART III

LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS1. MISSIONS/OPERATIONSa. Major Operations

The 2d Battalion, 26th Marines, participated in no major combat operations during the reporting period.

b. Command Relations

During the reporting period, the Battalion was under the operational and administrative control of the 1st Marine Division and the 26th Marine Regiment.

c. Combat Missions Assigned

Provide security for the highway and railroad routes in the Area of Operations and LOS BANOS Fire Support Base, the LIEN CHIEU ESSO DEPOT and conduct Category I operations in the populated areas as part of the accelerated Pacification Campaign.

d. Command and Control

During the reporting period, the Battalion Forward Command Post remained in the HAI VAN PASS area (AT944921). The Battalion Rear Command Post remained at the ROCKCRUSHER (AT942749). Company E maintained a Command Post also in the HAI VAN PASS area (AT886955). During the period 1-26 November, the Command Post of Company G remained on Hill 88 (AU807017), and the Command Post of Company H remained at the LIEN CHIEU ESSO GASOLINE DEPOT (AT937867). After this time, the two Companies exchanged Areas of Operations, and Command Post locations.

While lines of communication were stretched over 20 miles, no degradation of control was experienced by the Battalion during the reporting period.

e. Organic Operations

During the reporting period, the Battalion conducted 594 listening posts, 502 observation posts, 493 ambushes, and 424 patrols.

f. NBC Warfare

During the reporting period, the Battalion used no NBC devices against the enemy. No NBC devices were used by the enemy during the reporting period.

2. INTELLIGENCE

a. Enemy Situation

- (1) During the reporting period, there was only one known enemy unit operating in the Area of Operations. This was the C-3 Company of the PHU LOC Armed Battalion with about thirty men armed with AK-47's, SKs rifles, and one 60mm mortar. An unidentified unit, possibly of platoon or company strength, was believed to be operating in the mountains in the western part of the Area of Operations.
- (2) No significant contact was made with any enemy units during the reporting period.

b. Enemy Initiated Incidents

- (1) On 13 November, the engine and one car of the daily train to HUE was blown from the tracks at grid AT835976. It appeared to have been done by a command-detonated mine. Two VC/NVA were observed moving in a south westerly direction away from the scene. No contact was made by the friendly units that swept the area after the incident.
- (2) On 14 November, Company H received 8-10 rounds of small-arms fire from the vicinity of grid AT936875.

c. Enemy Losses

d. Enemy Trends

Enemy activity during the reporting period leaned more to the collection and caching of all types of supplies than to active combat and terrorism. To support the main units in the mountains of the NUI CHIN and VINH PHONG areas, enemy forces infiltrated the surrounding areas, and began to collect rice and other foodstuffs. Indications were that the VC/NVA were purchasing food and other types of supplies from the civilian populace in DANG DUONG and AN HAO HAMLETS, and moving these supplies to the northern coastal mountains in the vicinity of grid AU835065.

e. Weather Conditions

During the reporting period, weather conditions were unfavorable to friendly operations due to the heavy amount of rainfall in the Area of Operations.

3. SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

5 Nov At 0805, second squad, second platoon, Company G, captured one Vietnamese male at grid AU836056. The man was wearing green trousers and a black shirt, and had no identification papers. In his possession were two metal ammunition boxes. One box had a small quantity of medical supplies, and the other had a small amount of rice and salt in it. In the immediate area, there was a cave containing some sleeping racks. ITT personnel were sent to question the man to determine if he had any information of immediate tactical value. After the questioning, the man was evacuated through the intelligence channels.

8 Nov At 1215, a railroad sweep from first squad, third platoon, Company F, found two $1\frac{1}{2}$ pound blocks of TNT at grid AT836977. The two blocks were tied together with a strip of bamboo, and were lying to the side of the railroad tracks. An electrical blasting cap was inserted between the two blocks. The squad checked the area, and found no other equipment. It did not appear that the charge had been set to detonate on the tracks. The charge was taken to the Company F Command Post, where it was turned over to S-2 personnel for evaluation.

10 Nov At 1945, while searching for an ambush position, a unit from Company G ambushed two enemy at grid AU816057. A search of the area revealed a U.S. caliber .30 M1 Carbine, an NVA pith helmet, and several bags of rice and fish that the enemy had dropped when they fled.

11 Nov At 1725, first squad, third platoon, Company G, discovered two rock shelters at grid AU824076. A search of the area revealed numerous fish nets, clothes, cooking utensils, assorted small arms ammunition, and two booby traps that were not rigged for detonation.

13 Nov At 0450, a fire team listening post of Company F ambushed and killed one enemy at grid AT837976. A search of the area revealed the body of a middle-aged Vietnamese male dressed in heavy green utilities. The body was taken to the Company F Command Post and later identified as that of a Regional Force soldier from RF Co 132 stationed nearby who was absent without leave.

13 Nov At 1030, the train running between DANANG and HUE was blown off of its tracks at grid AT835976, apparently by a command detonated mine. Two VC/NVA soldiers were observed fleeing to the west. One Marine and three Vietnamese civilian passengers were slightly injured. Company F sent units into the area to search for enemy without results.

15 Nov At 0930, Colonel THIEN, Commanding Officer QUANG DA Special Zone, presented Vietnamese Crosses of Gallantry to members of the 26th Marine Regiment at an awards ceremony held at KIM LIEN VILLAGE (AT924856). Recipients of the medals were Colonel R.A. HEYWOOD, Commanding Officer, 26th Marines; Lieutenant Colonel W.C. DRUMRIGHT, Commanding Officer, 2d Battalion, 26th Marines; Lieutenant Colonel W.A. SIMPSON, Commanding Officer, 3d Battalion, 26th Marines; Major P.L. HOGBOOM, S-3 Officer, 26th Marines; Major E.O. BIERMAN, S-3 Officer, 2d Battalion, 26th Marines; and 1st Lieutenant D.M. SMITH, Commanding Officer, Company E, 2d Battalion, 26th Marines.

15 Nov At 1250, third squad, first platoon, Company E, found one RPG round rigged with a pressure-type firing device at grid AT902946. The round was lying in a dry stream bed, partially covered with rocks. A warning marker composed of three rocks formed in an "L" shape was located five feet away from the booby-trapped round. Engineers were sent to blow the round in place.

19 Nov At 0245, first squad, first platoon, Company G, spotted and ambushed three enemy at grid AU825004. The enemy were wearing black pajamas, and carrying weapons. Friendly forces received no return fire when the ambush was sprung. The squad searched the area under 81mm mortar illumination with negative results.

19 Nov At 0945, second squad, first platoon, Company F, found a camouflaged trail at grid AT836988. The trail was marked with a string set in a zig-zag pattern six inches off of the ground. The trail led to a small one-man lean-to structure made of grass. The area was searched, but nothing was found. The lean-to did not appear to have been used recently.

20 Nov At 0125, the Command Post of Company E observed one fishing vessel pull away from the coast at grid AT015957. After pulling out to sea a distance of 100 meters, the boat appeared to stop and turned its lights out. The Harbor Security personnel were notified, and a patrol boat was dispatched to check out the area. The patrol boat reported negative findings.

20 Nov At 1530, first squad, third platoon, Company E, discovered three bunkers at grid AT902954. The bunkers were connected by paths, and covered a trench 150 meters long. Two sets of footprints were found in the area. A young Vietnamese boy was seen in the immediate vicinity, and a fire team was sent to apprehend him. The fire team failed to catch the boy, who evaded them in the thick vegetation. A search of the area uncovered three ChiCom grenades, a bow and arrow, part of an RPG round, and one booby-trap. All the positions and the equipment were destroyed.

21 Nov At 1745, a squad-sized observation post from Company H received six rounds of sniper fire from grid AT912874. One Marine was slightly injured when one round struck him in the foot. The friendly unit returned fire on the suspected area, and swept it with negative results. The wounded Marine was successfully medevaced.

21 Nov At 1845, second squad, third platoon, Company G, spotted and ambushed three enemy at grid AU803008. The enemy were wearing dark clothing, bush hats, and carrying packs and rifles. Due to the distance at which the ambush was sprung, the squad netted negative results when they swept the area.

21 Nov At 2030, a defensive road position of Company E spotted one enemy moving in a stream bed near its position at grid AT921922. The friendly unit opened fire and swept the area with negative results. In the morning, the area was searched again, and four trip flares outside of the friendly position had been disarmed. Further search revealed four small caves in the vicinity of grid AT934904. No equipment was found, but it appeared that the caves had been occupied within the week.

22 Nov At 1610, a fire team unit composed of Regimental snipers and personnel from Company G, uncovered a 55-gallon drum of rice at grid AU820047. The rice was covered in the drum with a plastic sheet, and buried in the ground. The rice was picked up and taken to Company G's Command Post.

23 Nov At 2100, first squad, second platoon, Company G, ambushed three enemy at grid AU826003. The friendly unit received ten rounds of return fire. A sweep of the area under illumination, and again in the morning revealed negative results.

4. FIRE SUPPORT

- (1) During the reporting period, Battery C, 1st Battalion, 13th Marines, fired 2 observed missions in support of the Battalion.

g. Significant Events

During the reporting period, two platoon-size operations were conducted in the area within the Area of Operations known as "The Hook". Firing preparatory fires for these operations were Battery B, 1st Battalion, 13th Marines; Provisional Battery, 1st Battalion, 13th Marines; and Battery C, 1st Battalion, 13th Marines. These preparatory fires were shot on the primary landing zone and the alternate landing zones.

5. AIR SUPPORT

a. General Operation

Due to unfavorable weather conditions in the Battalion Area of Operations, air support was at a very low level during the reporting period. The two major events scheduled during the reporting period were both cancelled due to low ceiling. Two helicopter logistical missions were flown in support of troops in the field.

(4) The time for the one emergency medevac request during the reporting period was 20 minutes from the time of request until the time of completion.

c. Close Air Support

(1) Two beacon strikes were utilized during the reporting period in reaction to intelligence reports. Two flights of A-6 aircraft dropped a total of 22,500 pounds of iron bombs. An airstrike utilizing an aerial observer aircraft used one flight of F-4 aircraft to drop 7000 pounds of iron bombs and napalm.

8. LOGISTICS

a. Supply/Resupply

During the reporting period, all Company supply/resupply was accomplished by truck. Vehicles for resupply missions were given to each Company for one-half a day on a rotating three-day cycle. Although not the most desirable method of resupply, no major problems were encountered.

b. Food and Water

During the reporting period, three messhalls were in operation, one each at HAI VAN PASS, the ROCKCRUSHER and the LIEN CHIEU ESSO GASOLINE DEPOT. All messhalls served two hot meals per day, and one hot meal daily was trucked to units not having access to messhalls. Supplementary rations of MCI's "B" Rations, and fruit juices were supplied to units not having access to messhall facilities.

c. Maintenance

During the reporting period, 1st and 2nd echelon maintenance was completed on equipment/vehicles by personnel of the Battalion. 3rd and 4th echelon maintenance during the reporting period was done by the 1st Force Service Regiment and Force Logistics Command.

d. Significant Events

- (1) Improvement of the road to Hill 358.
- (2) Improved drainage was accomplished in the DAI LA PASS Cantonment.
- (3) Water lines were installed in the Battalion Aid Station.

9. NEW TECHNIQUES

No new techniques were developed during the reporting period.

10. TRAINING

- a. From 4-30 November, four Rifle Platoons received instruction under the Battalion's "Weekly Training Platoon Program".
- b. This Program included the first day as a day of rehabilitation. The platoon received clean clothes, showers, a medical examination, haircuts, and a PX call. The training week began with an inventory examination to measure the student's knowledge, and ended with a final examination to determine his progress. During the week's training, $8\frac{1}{2}$ hours of classes were presented on tactics and 5 hours were given to practical application. Techniques of fire and defensive firing were taught using fire commands and the "quick-kill" method. Patrolling and ambush tactics were taught. An application period followed which stressed the lessons learned. The platoon was inspected, and all unserviceable equipment was surveyed prior to its return to its parent unit.
- c. Technical training was conducted at the platoon level in the 81mm Mortar Platoon, 106mm Recoilless Rifle Platoon, Communications Platoon and Service Platoon.

11. CIVIC ACTION/PSYCHOLOGICAL WARFARE

During the reporting period, a total of twelve Medcaps were run, an average of three per week. At each of these Medcaps, the doctors and corpsmen treated an average of 75-80 people. The Civil Affairs Officer spent the reporting period working with local village and hamlet chief's in order to learn of their needs and gather what intelligence information was available.

12. COMMUNICATIONS

a. Radio

During the reporting period, the Radio Section provided communications personnel and equipment for two Battalion Command Posts (Forward and Rear), and supervisory personnel and equipment for the rifle Companies and the 81mm Mortar Platoon.

- (1) The aforementioned communications covered eleven stations operating on seven nets.
- (2) On 12 November, the Radio Section activated HF equipment on the Division Tactical Air Request Net.
- (3) A Tactical Air Control Party was provided for the Battalion with Forward air Controllers attached to each Rifle Company.
- (4) The 3rd Edition, 2d Battalion, 26th Marines, Communications Operating Instructions (COI) was published on 10 November 1969.

b. Wire

- (1) The Wire Section maintained internal wire communications for the Battalion Command Posts (Forward and Rear). A total of thirty-four internal lines, and two external lines were maintained at the switching central in the Battalion Rear Command Post, while a total of eight internal and two external lines were maintained at the Battalion Forward Command Post. Additionally, a guard switchboard was maintained for the ROCKAWAY security, with ten lines to the perimeter bunkers.
- (2) Hotlines were maintained between the 2d Battalion, 26th Marines COC and the 26th Marine Regiment COC; between the 2d Battalion, 26th Marines FSCC and the 26th Marine Regiment FSCC, with the aid of a Radio Relay section from the 26th Marine Regiment. An additional hotline was maintained between the Battalion Executive Officer and the Headquarters Commandant.
- (3) On 20 November, wire lines were laid in for Company F's bunkers inside their area of Operations. Much radio equipment was released as a result of this installation. A total of three miles of wire was laid and eleven phones were installed.
- (4) A telephone line was installed from the Battalion Switching Central to the Battalion Supply.

c. Message Center

- (1) 26th Marines continued to guard for the Battalion. The Message Center made courier runs three times daily to the 26th Marines to pick up and deliver messages.
- (2) The Message Center was, on 22 November, tasked with the responsibility of providing Message Center service for the Battalion Rear Radio Central.

d. Radio Relay

During the reporting period, a radio relay shot was maintained by the 26th Marine Regiment between its COC and the 2d Battalion, 26th Marines COC. Four channels were provided: Two hotlines and two common users.

e. Maintenance/Supply

- (1) The Maintenance section provided a technician with equipment for the Forward Command Post as of 5 November to conduct on-sight repair and to provide technical assistance.
- (2) The Maintenance Section installed lighting in the Company G and Company H areas, the S-2/S-3 offices, and the barbershop.
- (3) The amount of communications equipment on leadline steadily increased due to the inability of the Direct Exchange program to handle the input.
- (4) Supply continued to function in accordance with current directives. Emphasis was placed on reducing on-hand stocks to a 30-day level. Communications Supply was designated as an issue point by the Battalion S-4.

13. MEDICAL/DENTAL

- a. Battalion aid station administration was handled by the administrative section at the Battalion Rear Command Post. All sick call was handled by the Medical Officer and six Hospital Corpsmen, utilizing the facilities available.
