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PART II
NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During this reporting period, block training was used extensively to maintain the battalion in a combat-ready posture. Training was limited by a steady drop in personnel strength, beginning at 65.7% on 1 July 1969, and dropping to 56.6% by the 15th of September and terminating the reporting period on 15 October 1969 with deactivation and a drop to 0.0% in both personnel and opstocks.

July was highlighted by numerous FIREX's and concluded with preparation for a PACNARMID demonstration. On 13 July, the battalion had a platoon mount-out for the Norton AFB "Mount-Out Exercise". On 22 July, the rifle companies supported the USS VANCOUVER in helicopter assault techniques. The battalion began the month with 91% of mount-out equipment and 97% of opstocks on hand.

During the first week in August, the battalion coordinated and sponsored a firepower demonstration for PACNARMID which included artillery, air, tanks, ONTOS's, flames and all organic firepower of an infantry battalion. The demonstration was attended by over 300 Midshipmen, the Commanding General, 5th Marine Division, the Mayors of Oceanside and San Clemente, representatives of various Navy Leagues and other distinguished guests. In the middle of August, Company "G" acted as aggressors to the 2nd Battalion, 24th Marines (USMCR), who were conducting their summer field training. The rest of the month was devoted to block training, FIREX's and a Regimental COMMEK. On 29 August 1969, LtCol J. P. GAGLIARDO JR. was relieved as Commanding Officer by LtCol E. Z. GRABOWSKI.

September started with block training, including numerous night activities. The Battalion conducted a static weapons display for guests of the Secretary of the Navy on 11 September. On 16 September 1969, Company "H" paraded down the streets of Escondido in support of that city's observance of Mexican Independence Day. Cadre and deactivation was initiated by warning orders on 15 September and the rest of the month was spent preparing for the final steps to cadre/deactivation. Personnel strength was 60% at the first of the month, and dropped to 31.1% by 30 September 1969 with opstocks and mount-out equipment remaining 97% and 91% on hand respectively.

During the first two weeks of October a wholesale redistribution of supplies and transfer of personnel occurred. On 1 October turn-in of stocks and mount-out equipment was initiated and by 8 October opstocks and mount-out equipment on hand was 0.0%. The personnel strength dropped from 18% to 0.0% of T/O by the end of the reporting period. The official deactivation ceremony was conducted on 15 October 1969.

Subj: Norton AFB Bomb Out, After Action Report

1. The following comments are noted on the subject operation:

COMMENT. This battalion learned during a final confirmation check that instead of flying out of El Toro as originally scheduled, the mounted out unit was to drive directly to Norton AFB and there participate in the demonstration.

RECOMMENDATION. That direct liaison be authorized in situations such as this to eliminate "the woe" stopping above the unit responsible for action.

COMMENT. Three vehicles broke down on the way to or from Norton. Regimental 3-4 had attempted to schedule a wrecker to accompany the convoy with negative results. Also drivers were not thoroughly briefed on the route.

RECOMMENDATION. That a wrecker accompany all convoys of any size outside the base. Also that the project officer thoroughly brief all drivers prior to the operation.

COMMENT. Upon arrival at Norton AFB, the Air Force project officer (Capt. Rogers) was unavailable during the entire Norton phase of the operation. The officer substituting for Capt. Rogers was not well briefed and had conflicting views on the operations as opposed to what had originally been laid on.

RECOMMENDATION. Hence, however, in the event this organization is tasked with operations with other armed services, the project/liaison officer be available for the operation.

COMMENT. The Marines arrived at 1000. At 1100 they commenced loading aboard a C-141. From 1200 to 1600 the unit was alternately embarked and off-loaded from the aircraft due to the heat (104°). The "operation" went at 1615 and the unit departed for Camp Pendleton at 1630. The "operation" consisted of debarking the aircraft in combat gear as a demonstration for Air Force Cadets, and lasted 3 minutes.

RECOMMENDATION. That in the future such operations/demonstrations not be considered unless they add to the training of our own troops. To spend 12 hours for a five minute "operation" is a complete waste of our Marines' time which could be much better utilized in many other ways.



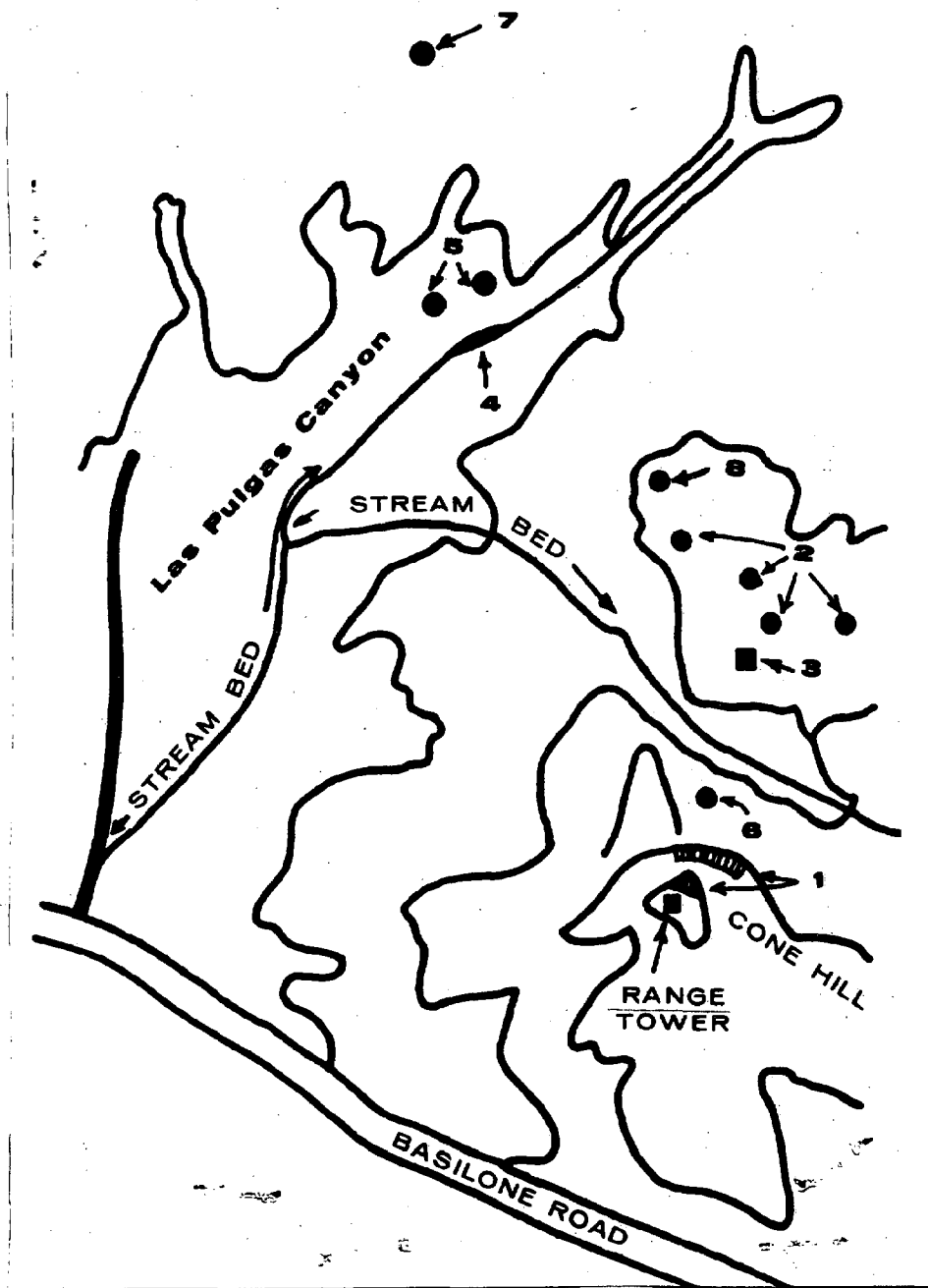

1. Purpose. To publish information and direct responsibility for the conduct of subject parade.

2. Information

a. The parade will be conducted at 0900 on 27 August 1969 on the east side of the 33 area (3rd Bn) Parade Field.

b. The parade unit will be a battalion of four (4) companies. Each company will consist of a Company Commander, guidon bearer, and three platoons. Each platoon will consist of a platoon commander, platoon sergeant, platoon guide and three squads of ten men each. In addition, the battalion will have a battalion staff and color guard. Rifle Company Commanders are authorized direct liaison with the H&S Company Commander, who will augment with personnel as required.

c. The parade will begin at 0900 with the battalion on the field as indicated in enclosure (3). Company F is designated Color Company and its Commander is responsible for the receipt and dismissal of the National and Organizational Colors. The Color Company will receive the colors at 0830 on 27 August 1969.

d. The Division Drum and Bugle Corps will provide martial music for the parade.

e. A rehearsal of 500 men, 500 women, 500 children, guidon bearers and color guard will be held at 1400 26 August 1969. A rehearsal of all personnel will be held commencing at 1900 26 August 1969. The uniform for the rehearsal will be utilities.

f. The sequence of events, pass in review and inclement weather plan will be in accordance with enclosures (1) through (5).

ADJUTANT: SOUND ATTENTION: Band sounds attention. Company Commanders bring their Commands to attention. Adjutant faces about remaining at carry sword. As commanding General takes his seat, Commanding Officer of Troops marches his staff on the field. When Commanding Officer of Troops has halted his staff, Adjutant faces about and commands:

ADJUTANT: BATTALION PARADE REST:

ADJUTANT: SOUND OFF: Band completes Sound Off and Adjutant Commands:

ADJUTANT: BATTALION ATTENTION

ADJUTANT: BATTALION PRESENT ARMS: Adjutant faces Commander of Troops salutes and reports:

ADJUTANT: SIR, THE PARADE IS FORMED: Commander of Troops renders hand salute and orders:

COMMANDER OF TROOPS: TAKE YOUR POST SIR: Commander of Troops and Staff draw swords and remain at carry swords. Adjutant remains at carry sword.

COMMANDER OF TROOPS: BATTALION ORDER ARMS:

COMMANDER OF TROOPS: RECEIVE THE REPORT, SIR: Adjutant marches to his post.

ADJUTANT: REPORT: Company commanders report in succession from right to left. Adjutant reports, "ALL PRESENT & ACCOUNTED FOR", then commands:

ADJUTANT: ATTENTION TO ORDERS: The adjutant publishes pertinent excerpts from the outgoing commander's orders, followed by pertinent excerpts from the incoming commander's orders. He then commands:

ADJUTANT: OFFICERS, CENTER, MARCH: Officers execute center march when the Commanding Officer of Troops commands.

COMMANDER OF TROOPS: OFFICERS, CARRY SWORDS: OFFICERS, POST MARCH
When officers have completed posting, Commander of Troops Command:
BOX THE STAFF, The senior staff officer will march the staff to a position, centered on the Commander of Troops and facing the reviewing stand.

The outgoing and incoming Commanding Officers then take their position in the reviewing stand. When both have taken their proper positions, the Commanding Officer of Troops directs the adjutant.

COMMANDING OFFICER OF TROOPS: DELIVER THE COLORS TO THE COMMANDING OFFICER.

The adjutant returns sword, and takes the most direct route to a position 4 paces in front of the color guard, salutes, and takes the organizational color from the junior bearer. Carrying the color as nearly in the position of carry color as he can without a sling, he marches by the most direct route to a position two paces in front of the outgoing commanding officer.

COMMANDER OF TROOPS: PRESENT ARMS: On this order the entire Parade executes present arms, and the adjutant transfers the colors to the outgoing Commanding Officer. The outgoing Commanding Officer passes the colors to the incoming Commanding Officer. The adjutant salutes as the color is passing from one to the other. The new commanding officer then passes the colors back to the adjutant.

COMMANDER OF TROOPS: ORDER ARMS: The old and new Commanding Officers face each other and exchange salutes. The adjutant then returns the color to the color guard, by the most direct route, salutes the colors, resumes post behind the Commanding Officer of Troops and draws sword.

COMMANDER OF TROOPS: STAFF ATTENTION.

COMMANDER OF TROOPS: BATTALION, ATTENTION; PASS IN REVIEW: Pass in Review will be Battalion in column with companies in mass. Personnel armed with a sword who are in the interior of a formation or at the rear will not execute present sword during Eyes Right but remain at carry sword.

COMMANDER OF TROOPS: STAFF, CARRY SWORDS: Commander of Troops executes right face and commands:

COMMANDER OF TROOPS: RIGHT TURN MARCH: Staff maneuvers to a position where it will be 12 paces in front of the band.

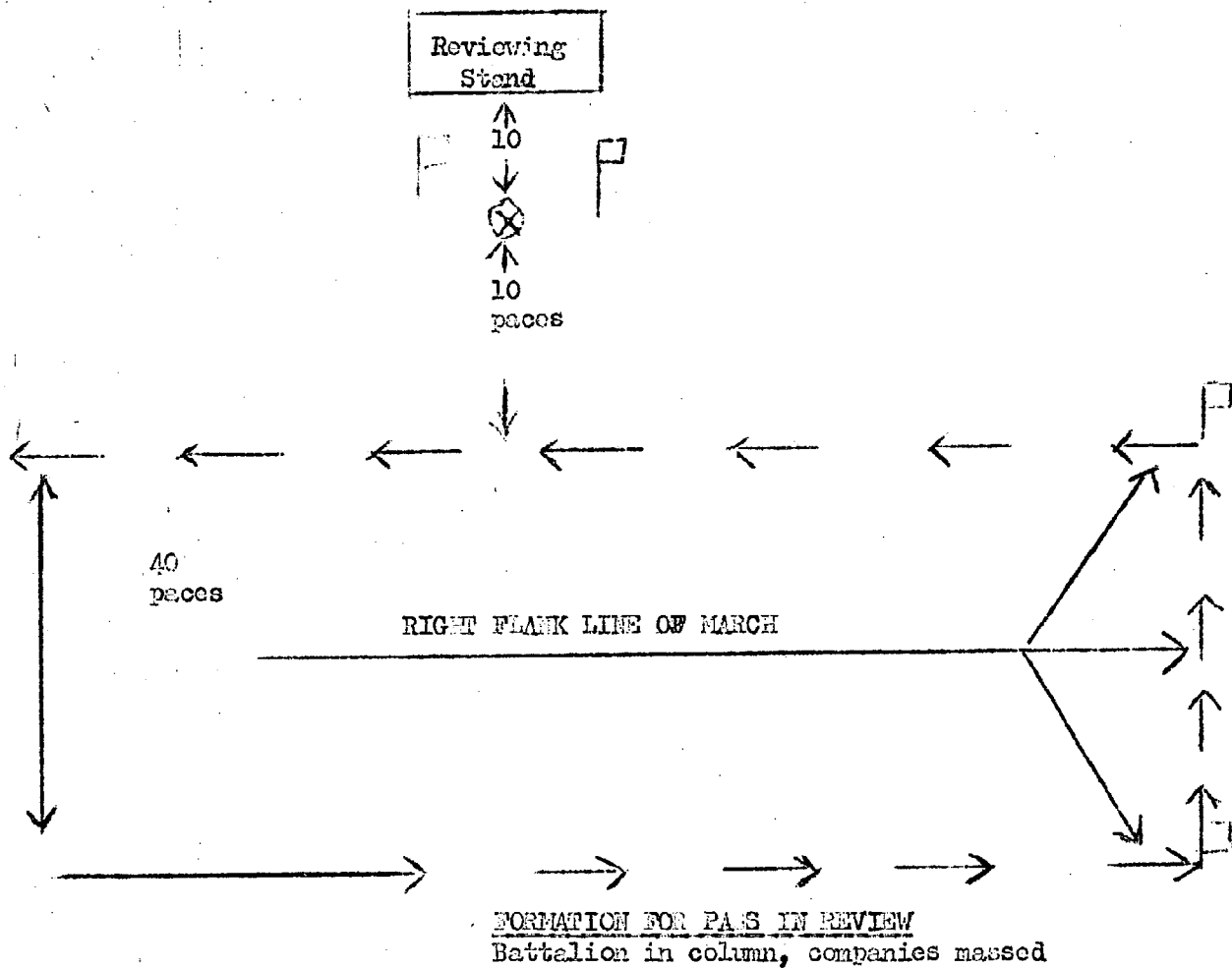

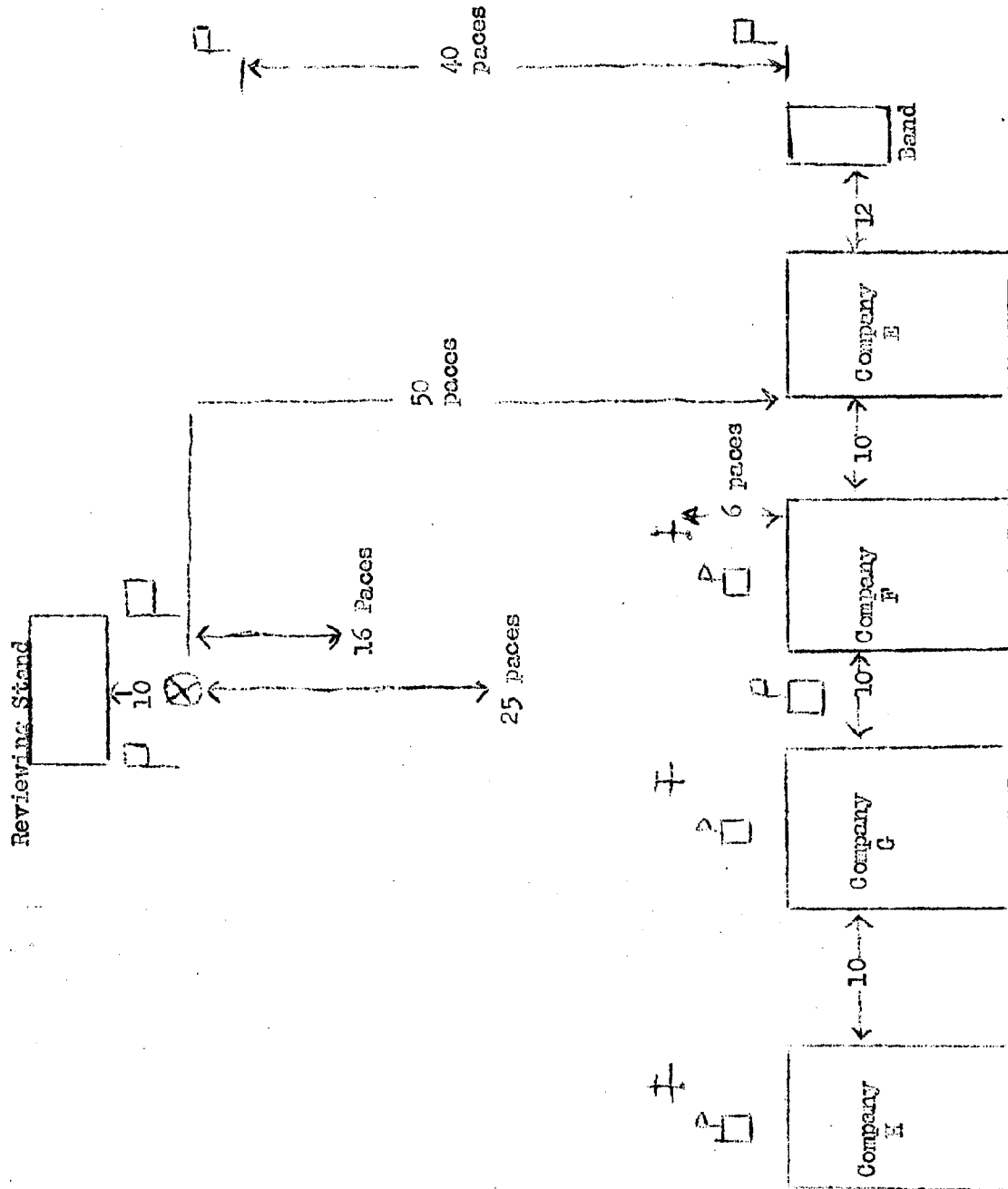

a. The awards/Change of Command Ceremony will be conducted in the 33 Area Theater upon notification from this Headquarters to execute the Inclement Weather Plan.

b. Modifications

(1) The band will be positioned as shown in Enclosure (5).

(2) The troop formation will consist of a 25 man detail from each company, a color guard, and the adjutant, positioned as shown in enclosure (5).

(3) Personnel will not be armed, but will wear cartridge belts and remain covered at all times.

2. Sequence of Events.

a. The adjutant commands: "Stand By", at which time all troops rise from their seats.

b. The adjutant commands: "Attention".

c. The adjutant publishes the orders.

d. The outgoing and incoming Commanding Officers take a position of the right side of the stage. (See Encl. (5))

e. The Commanding Officer of Troops then moves from his position (See encl. (5)) to a position in the center of the theater below the stage facing the adjutant and commands, "Deliver the colors to the Commanding Officer".

f. The adjutant moves to a position 4 paces in front of the colors, salutes and takes the organizational colors from the junior bearer. Carrying the colors, marches to a position 2 paces in front of the outgoing Commanding Officer.

g. The Commanding Officer of Troops, face about and commands, "Present Arms", Faces about again and salutes. On the command "present arms", the adjutant transfers the Colors to the outgoing Battalion Commander then passes the colors to the incoming Battalion Commander. The adjutant salutes as the colors are be transfered. The new Battalion Commander then passes the colors to the adjutant. The old and new Battalion Commanders exchange salutes.

h. The Commanding Officer of Troops returns to attention, does an about face and commands "Order Arms". The adjutant then returns the colors to the color bearer, salutes and leaves the stage.

i. The Commanding Officer of Troops then faces the troop formation and commands, "at ease, you may be seated."

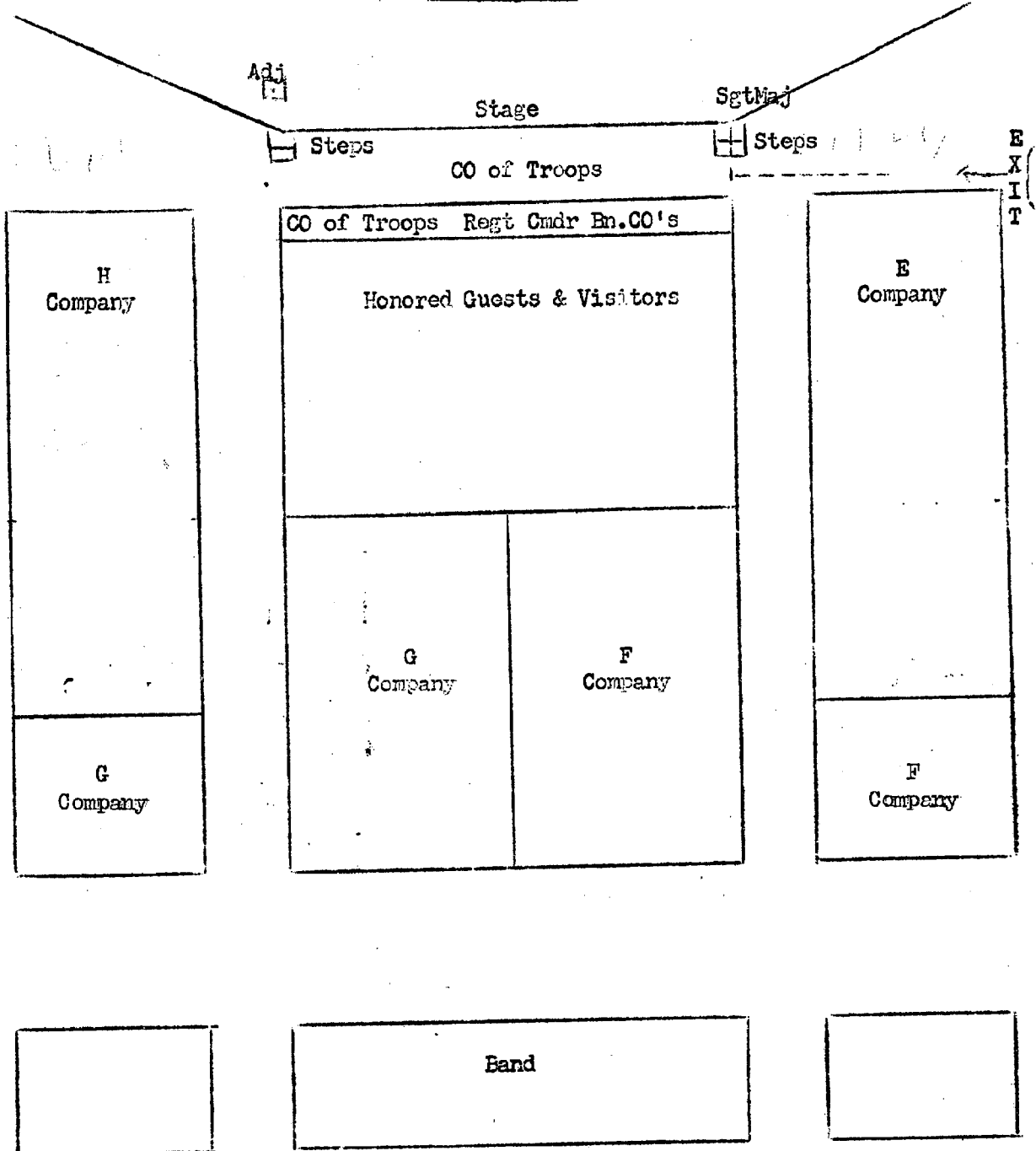
j. The old Battalion Commander, and then the new Battalion Commander make appropriate remarks.

l. The new and old Battalion Commanders then leave the theater.

m. The Commanding Officer of Troops then commands, "You are dismissed".

HISTORY OF THE 2nd BATTALION

In January of 1944 the 27th Marine Regiment was activated at Camp Pendleton California as part of the newly formed 5th Marine Division. After almost a year of intensive training, the 2nd Battalion deployed over seas with the 5th Marine Division for the invasion of Iwo Jima. Toward the end of the Iwo Jima campaign, the 2nd Battalion was put in reserve because of its extensive number of casualties. The Battalion went to Hawaii for rest and rehabilitation; preparatior was being made for the invasion of Japan. However, Japan had fallen and the 2nd Battalion participated in the occupation of Japan. Upon return to the United States, the Battalion was deactivated in January of 1946.

In June of 1966 the Battalion was reactivated when the Regimental Headquarters was ordered to do so, and participated in the build up of the 5th Marine Division in response to the seriousness of the Vietnam crisis. The Regiment under went rigorous and intensive training and deployed to Vietnam in February of 1968. After 7 months of intensive battle on many a sweep and destroy mission and patrols, the 2nd Battalion returned to the United States in September 1968. Presently stationed at Camp Margarita, Camp Pendleton, California, the Battalion continues its combat readiness training to be ready for any call.

B. Summary of Events:

1. August. During the month of August, the Marines in H&S Company were involved in 106 recoilless rifle and 81 mm mortar Fire Exercises, General Military Subjects training, Marine Corps Institute studies, Military Occupational Specialty training, Physical Fitness Tests, and on-the-job training. The PACMARVED was supported by the 106 recoilless rifle platoon and the 81 mm mortar platoon with both static displays and live firing demonstrations. The 81 mm mortar platoon additionally fired on range 204A for two (2) days and on range 407 for one (1) day. The Commanding Officer of 5th Anti-Tanks passed on a job well done to the 81 mm mortar platoon for their night illumination firing. A total of 429 81 mm rounds were expended during the month of August. The 106 recoilless rifle platoon had two (2) Fire Exercises during the month while the Flame Section fired once. No problems were encountered with the exception of the lack of targets on the flame thrower range. The 106 recoilless rifle platoon expended 12 rounds and the Flame Section expended 90 gallons during the month of August.

2. H&S Company hosted the 23 August make-up for the Physical Fitness Test and the General Military Subjects test. Participation by the rifle companies was sketchy and consequently the effectiveness of the Saturday make-up was lost.

3. The 106 recoilless rifle platoon provided aggressors for Operation Beat Tempo. They supplemented "G" Company's forces and did a creditable job.

4. The Communications platoon participated in a Communication Exercise from the 19th through the 21st of August. No problems were encountered.

5. The man rifle/pistol range detail was completed on 29 August and qualified 100%. The detail was well coached. The only problem was with the Technical Inspections of the rifles. It was discovered that many rifles had to be replaced and could not be repaired on the spot. This caused confusion and took excessive time. In the future, the Friday prior to the two (2) week range period will be used to complete Technical Inspection of the weapons.

6. Company Block training for General Military Subjects will be initiated during the month of September. This should prove very beneficial to the Marines involved as the Battalion Staff Officers will be included as instructors, thus ensuring a high level of instruction. The month's training was closed out with a 27 August Change of Command ceremony. H&S Company supplemented the rifle companies and was not formed as a company for this parade.
