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Operation Order 1-66 (Operation DOUBLE EAGLE) (U)

1. SITUATION

a. Enemy Forces.

- (1) Annex B (Intelligence)
- (2) Current intelligence mammaries.

b. Friendy Forces.

- (1) Seventh Fleet, in coordination with III MaF, will conduct an amphibious operation not later than 28 January, east of THACH TRU in the vicinity of BS 8342, in order to assist III MAF to seek out and destroy PAVN and Viet Cong units operating in Southern CHANG NGAI Province. This operation will include:
 - a. The landing of BLT 3/1 over BEACH RED 1, vicinity grid squares BS 8342 and 8442, in order to seize suitable ground for a Beach support area (BSA) and in order to conduct search and plear operations in assigned zone.
 - b. The landing of BHF 2/4 in trace of BHF 3/1 to conduct search and clear operations in its assigned zone.
 - c. The landing of landing Force supporting elements.
 unnex I (Landing Plan).
 - The landing of Task Force Delta command and control elements.
 - e. The passing of operational control of forces ashore to CG, Task Force Delte when he is firmly established ashore.
 - f. The Special Landing Force (BLT 2/3 and HMM 362) landing as reserve when requested.
- (2) USAF Strategic Air Command will attack targets in the Task Force Delta objective area.
- (3) 2d mir Division will provide USAF reconnaissance, interdiction, close air support, airlift and anti-air warfare in support of Task Force Delta.


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- (h) 1st Marine Aircraft Wing will provide air support as follows:
 - (a) Twenty-four hour a day all-weather close air support.
 - (b) Aerial resupply including fixed wing air drop.
 - (c) An airborne DASC as required.
 - (d) Maximum helicopter support for S-Day.
 - (e) Prior to D-15 one Air Support Radar Team to QUANG NGAI
- (5) 3d Marine Division will provide:
 - (a) Task Force Delta force requirements and for their necessary logistics support.
 - (b) Additional forces with associated command and control to reinforce assigned forces or exploit areas as required.
 - (c) For the deployment of the 2nd Battalion (-) (Rein), 9th Marines from DA NANG to QUANG NGAI on or about D-Day plus 1.
 - (d) Area clearance for Task Force Delta operations in assigned tactical area of responsibility.
 - (e) Psychological warfare assistance.
- (6) Field Forces VIETNAM will conduct coordinated operations in the northern region of II Corps Tactical Zone.
- (7) I Corps (ARVN) will conduct coordinated operations from QUANG NGAI and from present positions within the area of operations.
- (8) Present fixed positions of ARVN Forces in the objective area are as follows:
 - (a) 2 Companies, 3d Bn, 4th Regt, 2d ARVN Div NUI DAU BS 874325.
 - (b) 1 3 mpany, 3d Bn, 4th Regt, 2d ARVN Div DUC PHO BS 818385 2 hd Companies and PF elements
 - THACH TRU BS 757470 (c) 2d Bn, 4th Regt, 2d ARVN Div
 - (d) ARVH Special Forces (LLDG 6)(400 men) BA TO BS 571337
- (9) Annex H (Naval Gunfire)
- (10) Annex F (Air Support)








2. MISSION

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Task Force Delta conducts operations in assigned tactical area of responsibility in Southern QUANG NGAI Province to locate and destroy enemy forces therein.

3. EXECUTION

- a. Concept of Operations. Annex D (Concept of Operations).
- b. 3d Bn (-) (Rein), 1st Marines.
 - (1) Upon CHOP to Task Force Delta conduct search and clear operations in zone, on order, to Phase Line APPLE.
 - (2) On order, seize Task Force Delta Objectives CHARLIE and Del/Ta.
 - (3) Be prepared to move, during Phase II operations, overland or by helicopter lift to areas as assigned to engage and destroy enemy forces or to exploit ARCLIGHT strikes.
 - (4) Provide, on order, a Provisional Rifle Company for defense of the BSM.
- c. 2nd Bn (-) (Rein), 4th Marines.
 - (1) Upon CHOP to Task Force Delta continue search and clear operations to Phase Line ORANGE.
 - (2) On order, conduct further search and clear operations to Phase Line APPLE.
 - (3) On order, seize Task Force Delta Objectives ALFA and BRAVO.
 - (4) Be prepared to move during Phase II operations, overland or by helicopter lift to areas as assigned to engage and destroy enemy forces or to exploit ARCLIGHT strikes.
- d. 2nd Bn (-) (Rein), 9th Marines.
 - (1) Upon arrival QUANG NGAI on or about D-Day plus 1 CHOP to Task Force Delta.
 - (2) Establish hasty defensive positions vicinity QUANG NGAI ... irrfield.
 - (3) Be prepared to move, on order, during Phase II operations by helicopter lift to areas as assigned to engage and destroy enemy forces or to exploit ARCLIGHT strikes.
- e. Provisional artillery Group.





- (1) Upon ChOP to Task Force Delta place the LVTH platoon in direct support of 3d Bn (-) (Rein), 1st Marines and Btry H (Rein), 3d Bn, 11th Marines in direct support of 2nd Bn (-) (Rein), 4th Parines.
- (2) Provide general support for Task Force Delta from initial firing positions in the general vicinity of the BS., and BA TO.
- (3) Annex G (Artillery).

f. Provisional Reconnaissance Group.

- (1) Upon CHOP to Task Force Delta reassume OPCON of 1st Force Reconnaissance Co (-) and activities being conducted by that company from the BA TO area.
- (2) Insert reconnaissance teams as required within the area of operations for observation and patrolling missions.
- (3) Annex B (Intelligence).

g. to B (-) (Rein). 3d Engineer Bn.

- (1) Upon CHOP to Task Force Delta assigned general support.
- (2) Be prepared to conduct engineer tasks to include support for civil relief purposes.

h. Co n (-) (hein), 1st amphibien Trector Bn.

- (1) Provide three LVTs as a mobile command headquarters for CG, Task Force Delta.
- (2) Upon CHOP to Task Force Delta, be prepared to assume OFCCN of LVT platoons attached to 3d Bn (-) (Rein), 1st Parines.
- (3) General support of Task Force Delta. Be prepared to provide LVTs for troop transportation and for logistic support as required.

i. Shore Party Group.

- (1) Upon CHOP to Task Force Delta continue establishment of the BSA vicinity BS 837423.
- (2) Be prepared to logistically support Task Force Delta operations for a period of about three weeks.

j. Task Force Delta Reserve.

(1) Special Landing Force (SLF).










- (a) When requested by CG, Task Force Delta, Commander Amphibious Task Force (CTG 75.6) and Commander Landing Force (CTG 79.5) will release the SIF or elements thereof to the operational control of CG, Task Force Delta.
- (b) Upon CHOP to Task Force Delta the SIF, comprising BIM 2/3 and HMM 362, will be assigned reserve missions consistent with the situation at that time. These missions may include attack on designated enemy forces, reinforcement of committed units, search and destroy operations in exploitation of ARCLIGHT strikes or assignment of a Provisional Rifle Company for defense of the BSA.

k. Coordinating instructions.

- (1) Annex C (Operation Overlay).
- (2) D-Day The day designated by CATF for the amphibious landing tentatively, 28 January 1966.
- (3) H-hour The hour designated for the amphibious landing forces to cross the beach as determined by CATF.
- (4) T-mour Time on target for the initial B-52 strike to be determined.
- (5) S-Day The day designated for the initial B-52 strike to be determined.
- (6) EEI's Annex B (Intelligence).
- (7) Contact is from right to left.
- (8) This order effective on receipt.
- (9) Use Ch/CS on authority this Headquarters.
- (10) Coordination with ARVN units in the objective area through this Headquarters.
- (11) The unclassified code name for this operation is DOUBLE ELGLE.
- (12) 3.5" received launcher WP rounds will be used for marking targets whenever available.
- (13) Units possessing a sniper capability will make provisions for their employment during the operation.
- (14) For heli-lifted operations ashore, infantry battalions will be prepared to deploy rapidly a Battalion Command Group and two reinforced Rifle Companies. A third or fourth company may be employed on a follow-up helicopter lift.







- (15) All units will exercise necessary precautionary measures to prevent any items from failing into energy hands which the Viet Cong could use to produce mines or booby traps. Most important of these items are communication wire, batteries, duds of all sizes and types, all types of explosives, blasting caps, plastic waterproofing material and ammunition boxes.
- (16) Fire Support Coordination: Annex E (Fire Support Coordination).
- (17) Plan for landing: Annex I (Landing Plan).
- (18) Reports: Annex M (Reports).
- (19) Psychological Operations: ...nnex L (Psychological Operations).
- (20) Commanders will exert every effort to avoid damage to crops, property, shrines, temples, schools, livestock and the personal belengings of civilians.
- (21) Rules of Engagement.
 - (a) Individual
 - Rounds will not be chambered in individual weapons unless contact with the enemy is imminent. The senior Marine present will determine if, in his judgement, this measure must be taken to preserve the lives of USMC personnel. Initiation of any offensive or defensive formation implies imminent contact with the enemy.
 - 2 During the hours of darkness the sequence of engagement will be:
 - E. Challenge.
 - h. If the person challenged makes an overt attempt to avoid apprehension, opens fire or commits any other hostile act, and therefore endangers the life of the challenger, the challenger may load and fire.
 - c. Unit Commanders may prescribe illumination prior to firing if local circumstances allow.
 - d. The requirement for challenge may be waived by the local commander if required by the tactical situation and friendly forces are known to be not operating in the area.








- l Supporting arms will not be fired into any populated area except when the infantry commander on the ground personally determines the area to be hostile and that such action is necessary to save marine lives, and that there is no alternative to such a course of action.
- 2 ...ll supporting arms missions, with the exception of barrages, pre-planned and unobserved fires, will be controlled by an airborne or ground FLC, forward observer, NGF spot toam or RVNLF observer. All observed and unobserved fires, except barrages, will be positively approved at the appropriate FSCC level prior to the use of supporting arms.
- 3 Hamlets or villages not associated with ground operations will not be attacked without prior warning (by leaflets and/or speaker systems or other appropriate means) even though light fire is received from them.
- 4 Hamlets and villages may be attacked without prior warning if the attack is in conjunction with a ground operation involving the movement of ground forces through the area, and if, in the judgement of the ground commander, his mission would be jeopardized by such warning.
- 5 None of the foregoing is intended to deny the application of force against the source of hostile fires. Enemy forces engaging friendly troops will be destroyed by utilization of any available means.

2. MISSION

Task Force Delta conduct operations in assigned tactical area of responsibility in Southern QUANG NGAI Province to locate and destroy enemy forces therein.

- 3. ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS OF INFORMATION
 - a. What is the strength, location, identification, composition and organization of Viet Cong and PAVN forces within the objective area?
 - b. Will the Viet Cong or PAVN forces defend in the objective area?

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4. OTHER INTELLIGENCE REQUIREMENTS

- b. To what extent will the Vict Cong and PAVN forces employ mines, booby traps, punji stakes, and other such devices against friendly forces within the objective area? If so, what types? when? and in wintwhatbrumber?

5. RECONNAISSANCE AND OBSERVACION MISSIONS

- a. Orders to Submidinate Units.
 - (1) All Units. Report as obtained any information which may answer any of the intelligence requirements set forth in paragraph three (Essential Elements of Information).
 - (2) All Infantry Battalions. Maintain surveillance over all possible avenues of approach into friendly positions. Report as obtained all information relative to enemy movement, suspected movement, and other activities.
 - (3) Company B (-) (Rein), 3rd Reconnaissance Battalion. Conduct cound reconnaissance and observation missions in the area of operation as may be directed. See Appendix 7.

b. Requests to Higher, Adjacent, and Supporting Units.

- (1) Commanding General, 3rd Marine Division.
 - (a) Provide information as obtained on Viet Cong or PAVN units within or adjacent to the Task Force Delta area of operations.
 - (b) Provide information as obtained on the movement of Viet Cong or PAVN forces into areas adjacent to the Task Force Delta area of operations.
 - (c) Provide information relative to the ECM capability of the Viet Cong and PAVN against Task Force Delta units.
 - (d) Provide aerial reconnaissance and surveillance support of the operation as may be requested.

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- (e) Provide current and predicted weather data within the Task Force Delta area of operations.
- (f) Provide counter intelligence, interrogation translation, and other intelligence specialist support as may be required.
- (2) Commanding General, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing.
 - (a) Provide observation aircraft for aerial reconnaissance and surveillance as may be required.
 - (b) Provide available intelligence data as it becomes known.
- c. Coordinating Instructions.
 - (1) Submit information as obtained to G-2 by the most expeditious mean and laterally to units which may be concerned.
 - (2) Submit reports in accordance with references (b) and (c) as required by appendix 6.
 - (3) Make maximum effort to capture Viet Cong and PAVN and forward them to Task Force Collection Point, BSA, vicinity of BS 837423, with accompanying documents and equipment for intelligence exploitation.
 - (4) Submit by Flash message any indication of any of the following:
 - (a) Viet Cong or PAVN artillery, heavy mortars, anti-aircraft gun, or other heavy caliber weapons.
 - (b) Viet Cong or PAVN units of company size or larger which may be sighted. Include in message the location, direction of movement, size, unit, type and color of uniforms, equipment, weapons, and whether or not the unit can be kept under observation.
 - (c) Any unusual activity that represents an immediate or potential threat to any U. S. or ARVN unit, facility, or activity within the area of operations.
- 6. MEASURES FOR HANDLING CAPTIVES. CAPTURED DOCUMENTS. AND CAPTURED MATERIAL
 - a. References (b) and (c) provide the basic guidance for the handling of captives, captured documents, and captured material.
 - b. Processing and Disposition of Captives.
 - (1) The initial screening of captives will be conducted by

battalion S-2's for information of immediate tactical value.

- (2) All Viet Cong and PAVN captives, suspects, ralliers, and other indigenous personnel will be forwarded to the Task Force Delta Collection Point as expeditiously as possible. For treatment and handling of captives, see Administrative Order 1-66.
- (3) Wounded captives will be evacuated through medical channels providing the wounds are to the extent of justifying such evacuation. Walking wounded shall be treated and then evacuated through normal intelligence channels.
- (4) Care must be exercised to screen out the obviously innocent captives in order to avoid wasting of time, undue harassment of the local populace, and evertaxing the limited capabilities of the Task Force Collection Point.

c. Captured Documents.

- (1) The procedure for the handling of captured documents is set fort; in references (b) and (c).
- (2) All captured documents will be forwarded to the Task Force Headquarters as rapidly as possible.

d. Captured Material.

- (1) The procedure for handling of captured material is set forth in references (b) and (c).
- (2) All captured material will be forwarded to the Task Force Headquarters as rapidly as possible.
- (3) The discovery of large caches of rice and other food stores will be reported immediately. Special instructions and support will be provided for the evacution and disposition of such caches. See paragraph l.g. Administrative Order 1-66.
- (4) Captured material which cannot be evacuated will be reported immediately and destruction authority requested.

7. MAPS. CHARTS, AND PHOTOGRAPHS

The procurement and distribution of maps, charts, and photographs shall be in accordance with the provisions of reference (c).

1. MISSION

- a. Basic mission. See paragraph 2 to Annex B.
- b. Previous decisions. None.
- c. Purpose of this estimate. The purpose of this estimate is to provide detailed information on the Viet Cong and PAVN forces within the Task Force Delta area of operation, and, in addition, weather, terrain, and hydrographic data as it effects the conduct of operations.
- 2. CHARACTERISTICS OF THE AREA OF OPERATIONS
 - a. Weather. See daily weather forecasts and weather summaries as issued in INTSUM's. Climatological data based on the BONG SON Weather station are as follows:

(1) Mean Temperature	-	0600 68°, 1300 78° (Jan) 0600 68°, 1300 79° (Feb)
(2) Mean Precipitation		3.4 inch (Jan), 2 inch (Feb)
(3) Relative Humidity	•	0600 90%, 1300 61% (Jan) 0600 91%, 1300 60% (Feb)
(.)		10(00 N 1700 MH / 7)

(4) Wind Direction - 0600 N, 1300 NNE (Jan) 0600 SW, 1300 NNE (Feb)

(5) Effect on Enemy Operations. Periods of low cloud cover and reduced visibility during occasional CRACHIN should assist VC in their troop novement without detection by friendly aerial reconnaissance. Weather will have no serious effects on enemy operations.

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(6) Effect on Friendly Operations. Occasional periods of low cloud cover and reduced visibility will limit the effectiveness of visual and photographic reconnaissance, helicopter operations, and the conduct of aircraft strikes and observed artillery missions. Short periods of heavy precipitation that may occur would limit movement in the area to foot troops. Periods of high temperature and humidity can be expected to affect adversely individual physical endurance.

3. TERRAIN

- (1)a. Existing Situation. See paragraph 2.b of reference (c)
 - b...) Effects on Enemy Operations. The terrain and natural concealment provided by the vegetation throughout the mountainous regions of the area favor guerrilla tactics. The numerous bridges, overpasses, and defiles are likely locations for sabotage and ambushes. The scattered hills in the lowland areas will provide excellent observation posts for the enemy. raddy walls and treelines will provide limited cover and conceanment. The numerous built-up areas, with their large populations, will provide both cover and conceanment but, in turn, will limit observation and fields of fire. Movements of enemy troop units throughout the lowland regions should be detectable by friendly observation means. Coastal areas are less favorable as opposed to inland nountainous areas for enemy operations.
 - c. Effects on Our Operations. The very rugged forested terrain in the mountainous regions will severely restrict movement, maneuver capabilities, helicopter operations, supporting arms, and observation. The lowlands road net will not easily support heavy equipment without a considerable engineering effort. Numerous bridges will require major repairs or rebuilding before they can be used. Cultivated and built-up areas will greatly restrict vehicular movements of large troop units. Target acquisition and subsequent destruction will pose serious limitations for fire support agencies because of the high population density in the lowlands. The numerous built-up areas, treelines, and paddy walls will provide limited cover and concealment throughout the lowland areas. These same features will, on the other hand, limit fields of fire and observation and channelize movement.

The 20th Bn (Montagnards), although known to have been subordinate to the 2nd VC Regt for certain operations, is operating independently as a unit.

c. Armament. The exact inventory of weapons possessed by the above units in the area is unknown, however, the types listed are indicative of those possessed by VC units. Armament of company-size units is probably limited to one or two 60mm mortars, possibly one or two 57mm RR, and small arms to include several automatic weapons. f. Enumeration

- (1) Attack any target within the area at any time with a force of up to two PAVN Regiment's, one VC Regiment, 1 separate battalion, and 11 separate companies.
- (2) Attack multiple targets within the area simultaneously or in a coordinated sequence at times and places of their choosing with any combination of force derived from one PAVN Regiment, one VC Regiment, one separate battalion, and eleven separate companies.
- (3) Defend at a time and place of their choosing with a force of up to three regiments, one separate battalion, and eleven separate companies.
- (4) Independently or in conjunction with capabilities (1), (2), and (3) above, conduct extensive small scale attacks, ambushes, harassment, terrorism, and sabotage within the area.
- (5) Reinforce canabilities (1), (2), and (3) above with all or any part of two battalions and four separate companies within 12-24 hours after movement commences.
- (6) Evade direct contact with superior US/ARVN forces and resort to small unit harassing attacks, ambushes, mining, and the use of booby traps in an effort to inflict maximum casualties on US/ARVN forces and to decimate small units operating at extended distances from reinforcing elements.

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- (7) Reinforce any of the above with up to about 700 guerrillas currently located in the area.
- (8) Exfiltrate the area prior to or after commencement of operations.

g. Analysis ε i Discussion

- (1) Capability (1). Indications which favor the adoption of this capability are: The current disposition of the enemy forces; the Viet Cong knowledge of the avenues of approach, routes of withdrawal and reinforcement, favorable and unfavorable terrain, river and stream fordings, and natural obstacles. The enemy knowledge of the local population; the enemy capability to keep targets under surveillance at close range, the Viet Cong control of most of the area, and the availability of adequate areas for assembly of forces and preparation for an attack to include gathering of pre-attack intelligence and the establishment of communication and logistics bases. The recent battalion-size operations which the enemy has iniated against ARVN forces is an additional factor which favors this capability. Indications which militate against adoption of this capability include: The reluctance of the enemy to mass forces for extended periods of time, the enemy's limited fire support capability, and their inability to logistically support extensive offensive operations.
- (2) Capability (2). Indications which favor the adoption of this capability include those set forth for capability (1), plus the enemy knowledge that multiple attacks would complicate U. S. ARVN forces ability to provide adequate and timely supporting arms fire and reaction forces to areas under attack. Indications which militate against adoption of this capability are the problems the enemy would have in exercising command and control required by multiple attacks and the limited enemy logistic support capability.
- (3) Capability (3). Indications which favor adoption of this capability are: The Viet Cong knowledge of the terrain; their capability to keep opposing units under surveillance, the enemy prerogative of selecting the battle area and the president policy that defense may be required to make and the president quarters and base areas. In the adoption of this can allow to mass forces and standard light against to be supported under conditions of his choosing; the limited enemy supporting arms capability and the enemy knowledge of US/ARVN mobility and fire support and reinforcement capabilities.
- (4) Capability (4). Indications which favor this capability are:
 The Viet Cong knowledge of the terrain, to include avenues of

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approach, routes of withdrawal, and ambush sites; the Viet Cong knowledge of the local populace; the Viet Cong capability to keep targets under surveillance at close range; the availability of relatively secure bases from which to operate; the Viet Cong knowledge that actions of this nature tend to tie down sizeable friendly forces to static defense and reaction missions; and the Viet Cong knowledge that actions of this nature steadily wear down friendly forces. At present, there are no indications that militate against this capability.

- (5) Capability (5). Indications which favor the adoption of this capability are: The forces capable of reinforcing are readily available; most of the area is Viet Cong controlled, therefore providing relative freedom of movement. Indications which militate against adoption of this capability include: The limited enemy logistic support capability; the risk of detection and possible attack by air and artillery during movement, and the reluctance of the enemy to mass forces.
- (6) Capability (6). Indications which favor the adoption of this capability are: This is a basic energy tactic; provides the energy with the capability of inflicting significant damage on the opposing force; under these conditions, the enemy is least vulnerable to the effects of supporting arms fire. There are no indications which militate against adoption of this capability.
- (7) Capability (7). Indications which favor the adoption of this capability are: The disposition of guerrilla forces; the guerrillas knowledge of the local area and the population. There are no indications which militate against adoption of this capability.
- (8) Capability (8). Indications which favor the adoption of this capability are: The record of Viet Cong reaction to USMC/ARVN offensive operations; the adoption of this capability would conserve enemy strength for further operations against RVN forces and installations subsequent to departure of USMC/ARVN forces. Basic Viet Cong/PAVN tactics call for withdrawal when confronted by a superior force in areas not considered vital. Indications which militate against adoption of this capability are: The enemy has been accomplishing a buildup in the area. Recent activities in II Corps area indicate that on occasion enemy forces, particularly PAVN, have been attempting to hold their position and in instances counterattacking when terrain is favorable.

5. CONCLUSIONS

a. Probable Courses of Action. The probable courses of action are surrarized below:

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- (1) Against friendly operations in the coastal plains area, the enemy would probably execute capability (4) and conduct small scale harassing attacks, ambushes, terrorism, and sabotage.
- (2) Against friendly attacks in the mountain areas and foothills the enery would probably execute capability (4) with particular emphasis on harassments, ambushes, and the use of mortar fire, mines, and booby traps. In the event, however, vital installations are threatened, the enemy can be expected to execute capability (3), a strong defense.
- (3) Should friendly forces attempt to penetrate an enemy vital area they would probably execute capabilities (5) and (7) in an effort to divert friendly forces or to conduct counterattacks against friendly flanks and/or rear.
- (4) Should friendly forces attack the enemy in other than vital base areas, the enemy will most probably execute capability (6) ar resort to small unit harassing attacks, ambushes, mining, and the use of booby traps in an effort to inflict maximum casualties on friendly forces, or possibly capability (8), exfiltration in conjunction with the utilization of capability (6) or a delaying tactic.
- b. Vulnerabilities. Viet Cong forces, when concentrated, are vulnerable to air attacks, and to counterattacks by friendly forces whose air mobility provides the means to rapidly bring superior forces to bear. The Viet Cong are also vulnerable to friendly artillery, and his base areas are vulnerable to air attacks. Moreover, they are vulnerable to sustained combat and aggressive pursuit, and will normally attempt to break contact when meeting a superior force or when the circumstances of the engagement are not of their choosing.

 - (1) Location. Centered at BS 810490, approximately 5 kms NE of THACH TRU (5).
 - Length and Useable Length. 40 kms long, nearly straight sandy beach terminating to the NW at the base of a sandspit, BS 751688, and to the SE where the beach is backed by a lagoon, BS 904308. The beach is separated in the south portion for approximately 1500 meters by the mouth of the SONG TRA CAU and a rocky headland, Hill 163, centered at BS 853400. There are two areas in the north portion of the beach considered unsuitable for landing due to a high steep back shore; an area approximately 7 kms in length which runs from BS 795531 to BS 773595; and the other, approximately 1500 meters in length from BS 763632 to BS 759647. Approximately 30 kms of beach is considered useable.
 - (3) Widths. 100 to 300 yds at L.W.; 90 to 250 yds at H.W.
 - (4) Gradients. 1 on 5 to 1 on 35 from L.W. to H.W. 1 on 5 to 1 on 10 at H.W. Zone
 - (5) Approaches. Near shore bottom slopes moderate to mild shoreward of the 3 fathom depth contour, 200 to 650 yds off H.W. line. Six fathom depth contour, 700 to 1700 yds off H.W. line for three-fourths of the beach. The offshore approaches are clear. The nearshore approach is partly obstructed by a wreck 600 yards off H.W. line at BS 789555; approaches flanked to northwest by shoal and rocks. Bottom, sand.
 - (6) <u>Surf and Tidal Range</u>. Surf 4 feet or greater can be expected to occur 53% of the time in winter, 18% in spring, 6% in summer and 24% in fall; tidal range 4.5 feet, tropic.

1. Results of Engineer Reconnaissance.

- a. The beach under consideration consisted of a normal type beach sand slightly courser than that found at Chu Lai. The distance from the water line inland was approximately 300 neters. The height of the sand dunes varied from 20 to 30 neters along the 1200 neter front. There were no man made routes of egress or ingress, however a tracked vehicle would have little or no trouble getting inland from the waters edge. A wheeled vehicle would not be able to get inland from the waters edge unless a readway was installed or if it was towed.
- b. It was found that there were no man made obstacles on, behind, or in front of the beach. It was found that the sand dunes which reached the height of 30 meters dropped suddenly at an approximately 90% grade. This slope could be regraded by a tracked vehicle to ease its own, as well as any wheeled vehicle's way inland.
- c. Directly behind the beach was found an area large enough to neet all the requirements of a BSA. This area began at the end of the beach and went inland for 800 meters. It stretched across the entire 1200 meter front. The first 600 meters was cultivated and the soil consisted of a sand-gravel mixture, the greater percent being sand. Due to the fact that it was cultivated, it was in a loose state which would make it difficult if not impossible for a wheeled vehicle to move in.
- d. Within the center of this 600 meter stretch of cultivated land the water table most anywhere along the 1200 meter front is approximately 10-15 feet below ground level. This was an estimation.
- e. Within the 600 meter stretch there is sufficient space for a supply dump, fuel dumps, and a prisoner compound.
- f. Immediately after the cultivated area the ground gently rises for 200 meters to the crest of a 10 meter hill. This forward slope, 200 meters by 1200 meters, consisted of a sand-gravel mixture which was compacted to the extent that a man would barely leave a foot print. The degree of compaction and the amount of grass growing there makes this area the best suitable for a helicopter LZ.
- g. No mines were found in the area.

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- h. There were hamlets on both flanks as well as to the front of the beach area. There were no built up areas within the site suitable for the BSA.
- 2. Date of Reconnaissance. This data was obtained during the course of a reconnaissance conducted on 13 January 1966.

1. GENERAL

- a. This appendix amplifies references (a) through (c) by setting forth basic counterintelligence procedures and practice to be employed within the area of operations.
- b. Security is especially important in the counterinsurgency environment in the Republic of Vietnam. The Viet Cong may be expected to continue:
 - (1) To conduct espionage activities to obtain military information.
 - (2) To sabotage vital U. S. or ARVN installations.
 - (3) To undertake acts of terrorism against U. S. personnel and the pro-government civilian population.
 - (4) To propagandize the Vietnamese civilian population to incite anti-U. S. feelings.

2. MILITARY SECURITY

Safegurarding Military Information.

- (1) Commanders are directly responsible for the military security training of their units and for the safeguarding of all classified tatter in their command. Classified information will be safeguarded and handled in accordance with references (a) and (b).
- (2) Classified material will not be taken forward of battalion command posts except when essential for the conduct of operations.
- (3) Upon displacement, command posts will be thoroughly policed to ensure that nothing of intelligence value is left behind.

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(4) Personnel will not carry personal documents with exception of I. D. cards, dog tags and Geneva Convention Cards on their person which would be of value to the enemy in case of capture or loss.

b. Special Instructions.

- (1) While current U. S. Armed Forces security directives do not require that unclassified maps, training manuals and other publications of this nature be treated as classified material, RVNAF require that these items be treated with the utmost care. Frequently this difference in policy has caused serious difficulty in adjudicating what are, from the RVNAF standpoint, breaches of security.
- (2) During the period of operational deployment unclassified maps, training manuals and other publications of this type will be given sufficient protection to prevent their falling into unauthorized hands. Disposal will be made as if the material were classified.
- (3) Classified material furnished this command by a foreign government or international organization will retain the same classification as the furnishing government has assigned it. Vietnamese defense information is limited to the following categories:
 - (a) TOI MAT is the Vietnamese equivalent of TOP SECRET.
 - (b) MAT is the Vietnamese equivalent of SECRET.
 - (c) KIN is the Vietnamese equivalent of CONFIDENTIAL.

All material carrying these classifications will be afforded the same or greater degree of protection than that which the United States affords material of like classification.

c. Communications Security.

- (1) Communication security will be in accordance with provisions of Annex K (Communication Electronics) and other directives issued by higher authority.
- (2) Classified information will not be discussed over telephones or voice radio nets. Shackles and Operation Codes will be used when appropriate to safeguard friendly information.
- (3) Each unit having crypto devices will prepare an Emergency Destruction Plan for crypto material.

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(4) Report all communications security violations to this Headquarters (Attn: G-2).

d. Press Releases.

- (1) All press releases to the public will be governed by the contents of III MAF Order P5700.1 and any separate directives from this or higher Headquarters which may be issued later.
- (2) Publicity in connection with personnel escaped or recovered from the enemy is prohibited.

e. Code of Conducti

(1) All personnel will be instructed in the Code of Conduct for members of the armed forces.

f. Challanges and Passwords.

- (1) Challanges and Passwords will be utilized in the manner prescribed and contained in reference (c).
- (2) Coded list of Challanges and Passwords will be promulgated by CG III MAF msg and receipt of same by subordinate units will be insured by this Headquarters.
- (3) In the event the Challange and Password is compromised the G-2 will be notified by the most expiditious means available.
 Unit initially reporting compromise of the challange and password will immediately place the alternate challange and password into effect.

g. Photography.

- (1) Personal photography is a source of considerable enjoyment to a large number of personnel, however personally taken photographs contain information which could be of considerable intelligence value to the Viet Cong. Personal photography of the following areas is prohibited:
 - (a) Major Headquarters including Regimental and Battalion CP's.
 - (b) Supply installations.
 - (c) Communications sites.
 - (d) Such other areas as are designated by subordinate commands.
- (2) Personal photography of military installations from aircraft is prohibited.

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h. Security, Discipline and Training.

- (1) Personnel will be instructed on security of military information, personnel censorship and proper use of challenge and passwords.
- (2) Personal records and diaries will not be maintained by members of this command.

i. Counterespionage.

- (1) Commanders will ensure that all personnel are warned that low level agents, (vendors, local residents, refugees), have been known to gather information for the Viet Cong.
- (2) The Viet Cong also have the capability of using caucasian or negro agents, either in uniform or civilian clothes, to penetrate our installations or units. Any person, regardless of rank or position, who acts suspiciously, expresses undue interest in military routing, location of units, or who is observed in a restricted area, will be approached and identified. If he has improper identification or requires verification, he will be detained and the details will be reported immediately to the G-2.

j. Countersabotage.

- (1) All units will stress countersabotage in security plans. Particular emphasis will be placed on safeguarding command posts, supply installations, communications centers and water points.
- (2) Prior to occupying an existing building or structure, a thorough search will be made for hidden explosives or booby traps.

k. Countersubversion.

- (1) Troop information programs will include the official role of the United States in the Republic of Viet Nam in both political and military matters.
- (2) Any propaganda directed at the United States policy or U. S. servicemen will be reported immediately to the G-2 with all pertitent details.

1. Vistor Control.

(1) All units will be prepared to provide escorts for official visitors within their areas.

m. Protection of Ranking Officials.

(1) Units being visited by ranking government officials or general/

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flag officers will provide adequate protective security for such visitors.

3. CIVIL SECURITY

a. Control of Civilians.

- (1) Civilians will not be permitted access to operational areas unless appropriately cleared and authorized by the commanders.
- (2) All personnel are discouraged from dealing with itinerant vendors operating on the periphery of operational areas and along MSR's.

b. Refugee Control.

- (1) All units will ensure that refugees moving in the rear pass along and through established routes and check points. Refugee columns must be kept under control and off of critical supply routes.
- (2) Notify this Headquarters immediately of any large group of refugees moving to rear areas.
- (3) Large groups of refugees will be searched/checked for concealed weapons and for infiltrating enemy troops, insurgents and for agents at refugee control points when established.

c. Civil Leaders.

- (1) Friendly civilian leaders will be treated with due respect and afforded such protection as necessary. Names and incidents will be reported to this Headquarters.
- (2) All civilian leaders claiming to be friendly will be considered as "gray personalities" until their names and loyalties can be verified by this Headquarters. They will not be treated as prisoners during verification, but will be closely watched.

d. Alien Diplomatic Personnel.

(1) Hostile alien diplomatic personnel will be subdued, protected and brought to this Headquarters without delay.

e. Civil Unrest.

(1) Notify the G-2 immediately of any incident which may indicate a deterioration in relations between the local civilian population and U. S. Forces.

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- f. Aliens Claiming to be Refugees or Defectors.
 - (1) Aliens claiming to be refugees or defectors recovered by units of this command will be held in isolation. The G-2 will be notified immediately and will provide instructions for their disposition.
- g. Black, Grey and White Lists.
 - (1) Black, Grey and White lists will be promulgated by the CIT in the operational area as required.

4. PHYSICAL SECURITY

a. Camouflage.

- (1) Camouflage discipline will be continuous in the objective area.
- (2) Vehicle windshields will be covered to reduce sun reflection.
- (3) Vehicular and helicopter traffic will be kept to a minimum during hours of darkness.
- (4) All units will institute black out, dim out, and curfew in accordance with the tactical situation.

5. CENSORSHIP

a. Censorship may be established in accordance with OPNAVINST 5530.1B, CINCPACFLIINST 5530.1A and FMFPACO 05530.1.

6. SPECIAL OPERATIONS

- a. Clandestine Listening Devices.
 - (1) Only counterintelligence specialists will conduct technical inspections to determine if such devices are present. This does not preclude visual inspection to determine if such devices are present.
 - (2) In the event a listening device is suspected, contact this Headquarters, (Attn: G-2), immediately. Do not attempt to remove the device or make oral reference to the device within its functional area.

7. MISCELLANEOUS

a. All Marine Corps counterintelligence personnel attached to this command are under the operational control of this Headquarters.

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- b. Counterintelligence personnel are issued credentials by Headquarters U.S. Marine Corps. Commanders will insure recognition of these credentials and will render assistance as necessary for the accomplishment of the counterintelligence mission.
- c. The fact that the Marine Corps has counterintelligence personnel is not classified, however, the names and numbers will not be released without approval from Headquarters U. S. Marine Corps.

- (8) If it becomes necessary for any patrol number to re-enter friendly lines, he will reply "Recon" if challenged, followed by his name and rank.
- (9) Helicopters will be landed by radio contact if possible. Yellow smoke will be used to designate LZ. If no radio contact is established, a single red panel will be displayed in addition to yellow smoke.
- (10) Debriefing of patrols will be conducted by CO of 1st Force Recon Co or CO of Co B, 3rd Recon Bn, as appropriate.
- (11) Standing rules of engagement apply and will be observed.
- (12) Patrols will avoid contact or compromise by indigenous personnel.
- (13) All enemy sightings will be reported immediately and patrols will maintain radio contact until given permission to leave the net.

1. MISSION

Task Force Delta conducts operations in assigned tactical area of responsibility in Southern QUANG NGAI Province to locate and destroy enemy forces therein.

2. CONCEPT

a. General. Operation DOUBLE EAGLE will be conducted in a series of consecutive phases, designed to position Task Force Delta in the objective area for the ultimate purpose of finding and destroying major enemy forces. The build up of forces will be accomplished in such a manner as to deceive the enemy as to our ultimate intentions. The operation commences with every effort made to create the impression that forces are ashore to conduct search and destroy operations within a zone extending approximately 6,000 to 8,000 meters to the west and north of the landing area. The deep rangeing flexibility inherent in helicopter operations will be sacrificed in the initial phase. As this initial phase progresses, forces, supplies and equipment will be rapidly built up ashore in anticipation of operations in the mountainous areas further inland. Subsequent events will involve destruction of located enemy positions by rapidly executed strikes by heliborne forces and by ARCLIGHT bombing missions with fast follow-on exploitation search and destroy operations. Simultaneously with Operation DOUBLE EAGLE elements of ARVN I Corps and forces from II Corps Tactical Zone will conduct coordinated operations to the north and south of the Task Force Delta area of operations.

b. Phase I.

- (1) Commercing at D-18, 3d Marine Division conducts reconnaissance from BATO, vicinity BS 565530, with two Force reconnaissance platoons reinforced by a 105mm Howitzer Btry (-) (4 tubes).
- (2) On or prior to D-Day, Hill 63, vicinity BS 8439, is seized and occupied for the duration of the operation.

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- (3) Commencing at H-hour, D-Day, COMSEVENTHFLT conducts an amphibious landing over Red Beach vicinity grid squares BS 8342 and 8442 to land BLT 3/1, BLT 2/4 and command, control and supporting elements. BLT's conduct search and destroy operations as directed.
- (4) When ELT 3/1 secures its initial zone and Task Force Delta command and control elements are in position, the landing force will be firmly established ashore. At that time control of operations ashore will be passed to CG, Task Force Delta.
- (5) The Beach Support Area will be established commencing on D-Day vicinity BS 834420. This activity will be rapidly built up and prepared to support Task Force Delta operations for a period of about three weeks. Task Force Artillery, DASC and HDC will be established in the BSA.
- (6) Task Force Delta Reserve will be the Special Landing Force (SLF). It is planned that amphibious shipping upon which the SLF is embarked remain out of sight of the objective area to avoid alerting the Viet Cong to the deep and rapid manuever capability of the SLF with its helicopters.
- (7) The 2d Bn (-) (Rein) 9th Marines will be on alert to move from DA NANG to QUANG NGAI to stage for helicopter operations in Phase II.
- (8) In coordination with Task Force Delta operations, forces as assigned by the CG, 2d ARVN Division will be requested to move South along Route #1 and into the coastal area from QUANG NGAI to act as a driving/blocking force during Phase I Operations.
- (9) Forces as assigned by the Commander, U. S. Field Forces, Vietnam will move against the enemy in BINH DINH Province in independent coordinated operations.

c. Phase II.

- (1) At T-Hour, S-Day an initial B-52 ARCLIGHT strike or strikes will be conducted in the hills east of BA TO based on current intelligence.
- (2) One Battalion (Rein) from the DA NANG area will be staged into QUANG NGAL Airfield for further movement, on order, by helicopter, into the area of operations to positions to be designated to strike located enemy force or to exploit ARCLIGHT missions. Ships of the Amphibious Task Force in which the SLF is embarked will further close on the area of operations upon commencement of this phases

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The SLF will be prepared for commitment, an order, into the area of operations.

- (3) Additional ARCLIGHT strike missions will be conducted as determined by current intelligence.
- (4) It is anticipated that the forces assigned by the CG, 2d ARVH Division, will move during Phase II west and south down the Song Ve Valley on search and destroy operations.
- (5) Search and destroy operations continue in the area of the initial landing. All infantry battalions are prepared to move, on order, to engage enemy forces as their whereabouts is uncovered during the course of the operation.

d. Phase III.

- (1) Upon termination of operations, Task Force Delta will commence retraction.
- (2) The DA MANG based Battalion, on order, will be air-lifted by helicopter to QUANG NGAI for return lift to DA NANG. The SLF Battalion, on order, will backload to its assigned shipping. Concurrently the Beach Support Area facilities and combat support and service support units will be backloaded to assigned shipping. The two remaining Battalions will close the Beach Support Areas and re-embark when the BSA is cleared. Upon completion of backloading CHU LAI based units will be returned to CHU LAI and off-loaded; other DA NANG Based units will be returned to DA NANG for off-loading.

- 2. MISSIGN The TASK FORCE DELTA (TFD) fire support coordination center (FSCC) will exercise overall responsibility for planning and coordinating supporting fires for the elements of the Task Force after control is passed ashore in order to ensure maximum effective fire support and troop safety.
- 3. EXECUTION
 - a. Fire support coordination afloat will be in accordance with Annexes and of reference (b).
 - b. TASK FORCE DELTA fire support coordination will be in accordance with references (c) and (d).
- 4. TARGET INFORMATION
 - a. Target List. Target List to Armex B (Intelligence) of reference (b). The target list will be maintained initially by the Amphibious Task Force Commander (CATF). This responsibility will be passed to the Task Force Delta Commander prior to or with the transfer of responsibility for overall coordination. Subordinate Task Force Delta commands will be prepared to maintain that portion of the target list that applies to their assigned zones of action.

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b. Restricted Targets

- (1) Every effort will be made to preserve religious, cultural, medical, and public utility installation. Specific restricted targets are designated in the target list.
- (2) appendix 1 (No Fire Zones) contains the locations of friendly aRVN, Province and District forces within the area of operations. No fire will be placed in these zones without the specific approval of the CG, Task Force Delta (FSCC).

5. Aircraft Safety

a. . Air Sentries and Lookouts

- (1) Air Sentries will be positioned at artillery firing units and on naval gunfire support ships, and will check fire when friendly circraft are observed approaching danger areas.
- (2) artillery forward observers and naval gunfire spotters will check fire when it appears that the trajectories of artillery and support ships will endanger friendly aircraft.
- (3) Unless special coordination measures are prescribed, fires on helicopter approach and retirement routes in use are restricted to observed fires where the observer is capable of ensuring the safety of the helicopter using the route.
- (4) Information on all artillery and naval gunfire missions will be posted to all helicopter and fixed wing aircraft control agencies. For this purpose a "SaVaPlaNE" report will be used. This report will include the coordinates of the firing unit, the target coordinates, the time period involved and the maximum ordinate of the projectile.

Individual Battalion FSCC's will be responsible for passing "SaVaPlaNE" reports to the TFD FSCC. The TFD FSCC will be responsible for initiating "SaVaPlaNE" reports for those missions not initiated by the infantry battalions. The TFD FSCC, in turn, will disseminate the reports to DaSC and other air control agencies as required. For all preplanned registrations, "fired-in" concentrations, prepfires, and fire for effect missions, the "SAVAPLANE" report will be submitted to DASC at least thirty. (30) minutes

prior to commencing fire. For all "immediate" type missions, i. a., targets of opportunity, defensive fires, the "SAVAPIANE" report will be passed to DASC as soon as the required information is available. It should be continually kept in mind by all personnel concerned that the rapid and accurate transmission of these "SAVAPIANE" reports will materially reduce the small risk factor for operation of helicopters and fixed wing aircraft. The proper employment of the "SAVAPIANE" report and the helicopter approach and retirement routes should parmit the maximum effective employment of both supporting arms and helicopter/fixed wing aircraft, on a simultaneous basis, with a minimum of risk.

- b. Restrictive Fire Plan. When the possibility of massed artillery and/or naval gunfire exists and when such massing may endanger a simultaneous air mission, a restrictive fire plan will be employed. The echelon requesting the air support mission will recommend the restrictive fire plan, if one is required. The prompt and accurate dissemination of all "SAVAPIANE" reports by the responsible agencies and the careful observance of these reports by all helicopters and fixed wing aircraft, should reduce the requirements for restrictive fire plans to a minimum.
- 6. Safety of Ground Forces
 - a. See appendix 1 (No Fire Zones)
 - b. The boundaries of the TFD tactical area of responsibility (TAOR) are, in fact, no fire lines and bomb lines. As such they prohibit the employment within the area of any supporting arms from outside the TAOR without prior clearance from CG, TFD. As the tactical situation develops, the CG, TFD may establish Battalion Sectors within the TFD TAOR.
 - c. <u>Fire Coordination Line</u>. CG, TFD will establish fire coordination lines within the TAOR. These fire coordination lines will be utilized to regulate all supporting fires and air strikes occurring between TFD units and ARVN forces operating within the TAOR.

FMAW conducts air operations in support of operations, from D-15 extablishes ASRT at QUANG NGAI, prepares to establish forward helicopter base in the Beach Support Area (BSA), subsequent to H-Hour D-Day establishes a DASC in BSA, prepares to support search and destroy operations with fixed wing and helicopter aircraft.

2. Procedures

- a. Commander Task Force Delta establishes fire coordination lines, and no fire zones and nublishes changes thereto as they occur (See Annex E).
- b. UTM grid contained in reference (a) will be used for all support missions.
- c. Coordination of supporting fires will be in accordance with references (b), (c), and (d) and Annex E (Fire Support Coordination).
- d. Air support missions will be conducted in accordance with the schedule contained in Appendix 1 and as otherwise directed.
- e. Air-to-Ground Strikes within the TAOR must be under positive control of TACP, TAC(A), FAC (A), or ASRT. All strikes will conform to the rules of engagement contained in Operation Order 1-66. Additionally, Air-to-Ground Strikes under TACP, TAC(A), or FAC(A) control will conform to the procedures contained in Appendix 2.
- f. Alert status of on-call support aircraft is as follows.

Condition I - Two (2) Minutes

Condition II - Five (5) Minutes

Condition III - Fifteen (15) Minutes

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Condition IV - Thirty (30) Minutes

Condition V - As Ordered

- g. Helicopter, support procedures shall be as prescribed by reference (e) and as contained in Appendix 3.
- h. Medical Evacuation by helicopter will conform to the procedures established in Appendix μ_{\bullet}
- i. Aerial Delivery. See Appendix 5 (Aerial Delivery)
- j. Viet Cong captives will be delivered by helicopter to the collection point in the BSA. Captives will be processed in accordance with Annex B (Intelligence) prior to being put on helicopters. Captives will be blindfolded, bound, and guards will be provided by the unit requesting evacuation of captives. Captives will be searched prior to being brought into the proximity of helicopters. (Helicopter crews are briefed to refuse any captives not bound, blindfolded, tagged, and guarded.)
- k. Aircraft accidents or incidents should be reported in detail to DASC or FSCC by the most expeditious means. This report should include all known details, i.e., position, time, name of agency reporting, situation, condition of crew and aircraft, etc.
- 1. Aerial illumination may be procured by requesting the flare aircraft from the DASC. Forty-five minutes delay may be expected from time of request until arrival of aircraft on station.
- m. Helicopter approach and retirement lanes are as shown in Appendix 7. Additionally, the "SAVAPLANE" procedure will be used to protect aircraft from other supporting arms. This procedure is covered in Annex E (Fire Support Coordination).
- n. Reports of known enemy AA and heavy caliber automatic weapons fire will be passed to the DASC on a priority basis. These reports will be passed in the clear using six digit coordinates.
- o. Battalion FSCCs will be notified by the Task Force Delta FSCC when B-52 strikes are completed. This information will be relayed over all FSCC nets as soon as it is broadcast by TAOC DA NANG (Panama) and/or the B-52 Flight Leader.

1. General. Air-to-Ground Strikes will conform to the rules of engagement as contained within Operation Order 1-66. Additionally, the procedures contained here n will be followed.

2. Procedures

- a. Friendly front lines will be marked with front line marking panels and/or colored smoke prior to executing air-to-ground strikes.
- b. Every effort shall be made to mark the target with WP or smoke. Wheneven possible, the FAC will use 3.5 WP as a marking round.
- c. Mission request procedures shall be as prescribed by references (a), (b) and (c). The mission request form for strikes shall be as prescribed by TaB A.
 - (1) Recommended orbit points for air support flights will be will be filled by on station aircraft whom possible.
 - (2) To expedite engagement of the target, Tactical wir Requests should ask for on-station aircraft.
- d. If for any reason the DASCs are inoperative, TARS will be submitted to the TACRON on the TAR net.
- e. Normally, aircraft will not be on Conditions I and II. Normal operations will entail four aircraft on station, four aircraft on Condition III and four aircraft on Condition IV.

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Additionally, two aircraft loaded with napalm will be on condition III and two will be on condition IV. As air support activity increases the above conditions and number of aircraft will be modified accordingly.

Time Zone: H

1. General. Helicopter support procedures will conform to those prescribed by reference (a) and as contained herein.

2. Procedures.

- a. The mission request form shall be the same as prescribed by TAB A to this Appendix.
- b. Tanding Zones (LZs) not occupied by friendly forces will be neutralized by artillery, naval gunfire, or air prep prior to entry. Additionally, critical terrain surrounding a LZ and not occupied by friendly forces will be neutralized prior to a landing in the LZ.
- c. When possible IZs shall be located in areas which are relatively free from potential enemy fires and defenses.
- d. Each company/battery or larger organization will prepare and mark a landing zone within or adjacent to its location. This zone shall contain a wind direction indicator, i.e., windsock. Markings will indicate the unit designation, for example, G-4 or K-1 in white panels and will be large enough to be clearly visible to the pilot overhead at 2000 feet. (These panels will be removed upon the units departure from the area). Additionally, positions of friendly forces will be marked with panels and/or smoke. (Helicopters are briefed not to land without positive 12 identification).
- o. At night, when in use, IZs will be marked. Markings will consist of a minimum of three flashlights encompassing an area in which an H-34 helicopter can safely approach and land. Identification of the zone and/or attracting the pilots' attention will be accomplished by the use of illumination grenades or flashing strobe beacons. Caution, do not shine lights directly into or at the cookpit at any time!
- f. Two (2) helicopters will be in direct support of each battalion ashore. The method of employment of these aircraft is prescribed by TAB B.

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g. helicopters will be controlled in their operations by the DASC.

Helicopter pilots are under orders to respond to priorities as
established by the DASC and normal Wing Air Control Procedures.

Accordingly, all personnel are ordered to refrain from commandeering
helicopters and to submit mission requests for requirements.

This will expedite service and response for all units.

At times the tactical situation will be such that the ultimate delivery point for supplies cannot be forescen sufficiently in advance to make timely requests for each job to be done. Totally centralized control of helicopters in this type of warfare will cause helicopter support to be complicated, slow, and at times unresponsive to the ground commander's needs. "coordingly, in order to improve helicopter support and employment, two helicopters will be placed in direct support of each infantry battalion during the operation. Procedures to be employed in the use of these helicopters will be as follows:
 - a. The flight leader of the holicopters will be assigned the mission of supporting a specific battalion and will be authorized to answer directly the supported forces request for assistance, until relieved of this mission by the appropriate last.
- b. The infantry battalion commander may request the flight leader to accomplish the fellowing types of missions:
- (1) Medical evacuation
- Hesupply
- (3) Evacuation of VC personnel, supplies and equipment of the second of

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Appendix 4 (Medical Evacuation by Helicopter Procedures) to Annex F (Air Support) to Operation Order 1-66

Time Zone: H

1. General. Medical evacuation by helicopter is designed to rapidly remove the wounded from the battlefield and place them at medical facilities. Although the wounded may be in dire need of medical assistance, it will serve no beneficial end to expose them to even greater risks through haphazard evacuation procedures. These procedures are established to protect the wounded as well as the helicopter.

2. Procedures.

- a. Medical evacuation by helicopter will be requested only when a man's wounds are serious, the wounded cannot be moved by other means, or his presence endangers the mission of the unit. At night, or under extremely poor weather conditions, medical evacuation by helicopter will not be requested unless failure to be evacuated would endanger the life of the wounded man or the unit's mission.
- b. Medical Evacuation request forms will be as prescribed by TAB
- c. Medical Evacuation request shall include reference to the security of the Lz. ("secure" Lz is defined as one in which the majority of friendly-forces in it are standing in the open. Otherwise, a zone is considered "unsecure.") Normally, a medical evacuation helicopter will not be called into an Lz which is under fire that places undue risk upon the helicopter.

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d. Casualties evacuated by helicopter will be delivered to the medical facility located in the BSA.

- 2. Helicopter Approach and Retirement Lanes are valid only in so far as they fall within the TAOR. Outside the TAOR, TF Delta FSCC does not coordinate fire support and therefore cannot guarantee the lanes. If the TAOR expands, then those lanes thereby encompassed become effective.





- 1. AUTHENTICATION. KAA-60 is designated as the in-country authortication system and will be used on all radio circuits external to Task Force LEMMa, and on all internal radio circuits guarded or controlled by Task Force DELTA. KAM-60 may be used on all other Task Force DELTA circuits.
- 2. NUMERAL CODES. KAC-138. is effective for joint use in plain language messages.
- 3. CRYPTO CHANNELS. KAK-2641 is the common on-line crypto channel between Task Force DELTA, 3d MarDiv, and the ADC Command Group, Chu Lai. (Task Force DELTA and S.P. Group Headquarters only)
- 4. OPERATIONAL CODE. KAC-140 is effective for joint use in plain language messages.
- 5. INTERNAL SYLTEMS. Task Force DELTA to provide locally produced numeral ciphers, authentication tables, and text ciphers for use by and with subordinate units. These will be in sufficient quantity to be distributed at the squad or patrol level. These systems will be employed only on internal Task Force DELTA Communications systems.
 - 6. All units carry effective edition of cryptographic publications plus two months ROB.



1. SITUATION

a. Enery Forces

- (2) It is assumed that the morale of VC/RAVN units in the area of operations is presently in a high state. The RAVN units have been thoroughly indectrinated to their cause. In addition, their last major contact was a complete success. Presently they are training and resting which increases their morals. It can also be assumed, due to the recent TET heliday, that both VC and PAVN will be susceptive to psychological propaganda.

b. Friendly Forces

- (1) 3d Marine Division will provide the following support:
 - (a) One audio/visual team on call.
 - (b) One U-10 loudspeaker aircraft.
 - (c) Fre-recorded tapes to include recordings by former YU/PAVN.
 - (d) The capability to rapidly reproduce leaflets in order to exploit VC acts of terrorism or other themes that may develop during the course of the operation.
 - (e) Leaflet requirements and for their delivery to CHU LaI.

2. MISSION

To perform psychological operations in support of the tactical situation with primary emphasis on the "CHIEU HOI" appeal and on the reduction of enemy combat effectiveness.

3. EXECUTION

- a. Extensive use will be made of aerial loudspeaker and leaflet drops during a two phase operation:
 - (1) During Phase I of the operation the theme will be one of civilian indoctrination to explain why the operation is being conducted.

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- (2) Phase II of the operation will primarily be directed toward an enemy audience utilizing the following themes:
 - (a) Show of GVN and allied strength.
 - (b) Former VC defeats on the battlefield.
 - (c) Uselessness of dying for the VC cause.
 - (d) Better life provided by the GVN.
 - (e) Loneliness for family and home.
 - (f) questioning the truthfulness of VC leaders.
 - (g) Chieu Hoi and surrender appeals.
 - (h) may additional themes that may develop from the situation.

b. Coordinating Instructions.

- (1) This deadquarters will be notified immediately upon the following:
 - (a) Chieu Hoi returnees (individuals that leave the VC ranks to return to the GVN freely).
 - (b) Detrimental changes in civilian attitudes and/or emotions.
 - (c) meny acts of terrorism that may be exploited (e.g. killing of civilians, burning homes, destroying rice, etc.).
- (2) Returnees are to be given preferential treatment and not treated as VC. This does not preclude interrogation for intelligence purposes. Normal security precautions will prevail at all times.
- (3) ITT notify this Headquarters upon the capture of "cooperative" WC or PAVN personnel, in order that timely psychological exploitation may be conducted.
- (4) ...ll combat units will carry (one per fire team) leaflet # 5-65 to assist in questioning civilians and/or captured personnel.
- (5) No leaflets except those approved by the Commanding General, Task Force Delta will be disseminated.

This Material is to be clearly marked as to where found, under what circumstances, when, and by whom. The G-4 Section will assume responsibility when the Intelligence Section has completed evaluation and will arrange for storage or evacuation. The G-4 will maintain a record of all enemy material passing through the BSA. Unless the tactical situation dictors otherwise, no captured rice will be destroyed. The return of captured VC rice to villagers of the area through the civic action program constitutes an opportunity to gain a major psychological victory. Rice will be brought to the BSA and turned over to the Civil Affairs Officer for this purpose. Bags will be available in the BSA.
- h. Excess Materials. Any materials determined to be in excess of units needs will returned to the BSA.
- i. Salvage. The TFD G-4 will be kept informed of all material requiring salvage. When practicable such material will be returned to the BSA. No materials of potential use of the enemy will be left abandoned or unguarded. See Annex B (Shore Party).

j. Distribution

- (1) Prescribed loads sustain units on D-Day.
- (2) Unit distribution on D+1 using helicopters assigned to units requesting supplies.
- 2. EVACUATION AND HOSPITALIZATION. See Annex C (Medical).

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- 3. TRANSPORTATION
 - a. See Embarkation Plan 1-66.
 - b. All cargo handling vehicles in the BSA, including trucks, will be under the operational control of the BSA Commander.

 - (b) Furnish Helicopter Support Team (HST) to Infantry Battolions as required.
 - (c) See Annex B (Shore Party).
 - (2) <u>Detachment. Company B (-) (Rein). 3d Engineer Battalion</u>. Establish and operate one waterpoint in vicinity of the BSA under the direction of the Shore Party Commander.
 - (3) Detachment, Force Logistics Support Unit #1
 - (a) Establish and maintain a POL dump in the BSA.
 - (b) Establish and maintain a Class V dump in the BSA.
 - (c) Establish and maintain a Class I dump in the BSA.
 - (d) Provide explosive ordnance service for the BSA.
 - (e) Provide a recharging capability for BA 451.
 - (f) Provide Ordnance Team for recharging flame throwers and to inspect small arms.
 - (4) <u>Detachment, Company D. 3d Medical Battalion</u>. See Annex C (Medical).
 - (5) <u>Detachment</u>, <u>Marine Air Base Squadron</u>. Establish and maintain a Tactical Air Field Dispensing System in the BSA.

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- b. Maintenance. Only first and second echelon of maintenance will be available. End item replacement will be used where possible. Critical items of equipment will be evacuated through the BSA to FLSU#1 for priority repair.
- c. Laundry. Laundry facilities will be available aboard the ships of the Task Force. This will be the form of rough, bulk laundry. Battalions will collect clothing by company and turn into the BSA. Two men per company will accompany the laundry to the ship to insure each unit gets its own clothing back. Units will insure that troops mark clothing with permanent ink prior to the operation to hold losses to a minimum.
- 5. PERSONNEL. See Annex D (Personnel).
- 6. MISCELLANEOUS
 - a. Security of the BSA is the responsibility of the BSA Commander.
 - b. Assignment to space in the BSA will be controlled by the BSA . Commander. See Appendix 1 (BSA Sketch) to Annex B (Shore Party).
 - c. Insure that each individual has a four day supply halizone/iodine tablets for water purification.
 - i. It is anticipated that much of the terrain to be traversed will be rice paddy. Individuals should carry enough socks for frequent changes. Foot powder should be issued each individual prior to movement to objective area.
 - e. Utilities, marching pack, T/O weapon, helmet, green side out.

 Body armor (upper) will be worn at all times in the forward areas.

 A card containing the individual's name, rank, serial number and date of birth will be placed in the pack of all personnel participating in the operation. Present unit designation WILL NOT be included on these cards.
 - f. All units requiring supplies and services will keep TFD G-4 and BSA informed of their CP coordinates. All request for supplies and services will include the coordinates for delivery and landing zone marking instructions. It is imperative that landing zones be clearly marked with unit designation.
 - g. In order to make maximum use of helicopters, all units will insure that sufficient personnel are present in the helicopter landing zones to expedite unloading of supplies and equipment,
 - h. Lister bags will be used in CP's whenever possible in order to free water cans for use by front line units.

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- i. The military and personnel effects of all evacuated individuals will accompany the casualty to the evacuation point. Units will provide supply personnel at the evacuation point to inventory and tag the items with owners name, status, and organization. Upon completion of the operation, these effects will be turned over to the unit Supply Officer who will handle them in accordance with current directives. Every effort will be made to assure that military and personnel effects are safeguarded and properly accounted for.
- j. Commanders will encourage troops not to take large amounts of money or valuables.
- k. Reports. See Annex M (Reports) to Operation Order 1-66.

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

1. ORGANIZATION

a. Medical Troops

- (1) Medical Platoons of 2/3, 2/4, 2/9 and 3/1
- (2) Company D (-), 3d Medical Battalion.
- (3) Company B (Rein), 3d Medical Battalion.
- (4) Surgical Team and Ships Medical Division on board LPH-8

2. MISSION

- facilities in the BSA for shock and resuscitation so that cosulties may be prepared and evacuated to other medical facilities.
- b. Company B (Fein), 3d Medical Battalion. Designated as a medical facility for receiving casualties being evacuated from the area of operation.
- c. Surgical Term and Ship Medical Division. Designated as a medical facility to receive casualties being executed from the combet area.
- d. BLT Medical Protoons. Prepare end assist casualties in evecuation to the next higher medical facility.

3. SANITATION AND PREVENTIVE MEDICINE

- a. All troop commanders require maximum sanitary discipline rossible under combat conditions.
- b. Ensure all troops have in their nossession enti-malarial prophylaxis for a period of three weeks.
- c. Ensure all troops have in their nossession water nurification tablets for a period of 4 days.
- d. Ensure all troops have in their possession selt tablets for four days.

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- e. All units take available lister bags for storage and use of water in static situation. It is recommended that each man drink 6 to 8 conteens of water daily and take one salt tablet with each canteen of water.
- f. Ensure all troops have two full canteens of water upon landing in the objective area.

4. EVACUATION

a. Movement

- (1) After embarkation, casualties which require treatment beyond that on board ship will be evacuated to Company B, 3d Medical Battalion (Chu Lai).
- (2) MEDEVAC helicopters will not be called until a doctor or corpsman determines the requirement. This requirement is established in order not to lose our supporting arms capability during a fire fight to allow helicopters to come in.
- (3) In no case will evacuation be held up for lack of medical records.

b. Assualt Phase

- (1) Phase I. Casualties will be evacuated to "D" Medical in the BSA, then to "B" Medical at Chu Lai.
- (2) Phase II. Casualties will be evacuated to "D" Medical in the BSA, then to either the LPH or to "B" Medical at Chu Lai.
- c. Casualty Overload. In the event of casualty overload in the Chu Lai area, "B" Medical Company will make immediate arrangements to evacuate casualties by aircraft to DANANG.
- d. Civilian, ARVN, and Captive Casualties. Will not be evacuated in the above medical evacuation chain. Civilians and ARVN will be evacuated to Quang Nai. Captives will be evacuated to "B" Medical. Captives will receive last priority for evacuation.

5. HOSPITALIZATION

- a. Company "B", 3d Medical Bat alion will provide hospitalization for casualties initially.
- b. Company "C", 3d Medical Battalion in Danang will provide for overload of casualties.
- c. When available and on order LPH 8 will be used for hospitalization.

 - a. Company "D", 3d Medical Battalion, and the LPH-8 will have blood available. Emergency resumnly of whole blood will be made available upon request from either Company "B", 3d Medical Battalion, Chu Lai or Company "C", 3d Medical Battalion, Deneng.
 - b. Preposition 150 blankets and 150 stretchers at Company "B",
 3d Medical Battalion, Chu Lei.
- 7. MEDICAL ADMINISTRATION
 - a. Evacuation and Casualty Report. See Annex D (Personnel).
 - b. Location of Company "D", 3d Medical Bettalion to be announced when established ashore.

. GENERAL. Personnel procedures will be in accordance with reference (a) through (i).

2. STRENGTHS

- a. All units will embark at strengths required to carry out assigned tasks.
- b. All units will provide TFD G-1 ten (10) complete and correct rosters of personnel participating in the operation prior to embarkation. These rosters will include lines one and two of the Addressograph Plate.
- o. Casualty approving. See Appendix 1 (Casualty Reporting)
- Personnel duals Summary (PDS) Reporting
 - (1) Almin year Reporting Procedures. Organizations listed in Annex A (Bask Decentration) to Operation Order 1-66 will establish an Administrative Rear Echelon for the preparation and submission of administravive reports. The Admin Rear Echelon will report the chargeable strength, to include attachments, in accordance with the procedures outlined in reference (i). The only exception to the procedures outlined in reference (i) is that under the column titled "PRESENT FOR DUTY", the Admin Rear Echelon will report only those personnel not deployed with Task Force Delta.
 - (2) Deployed Unit Reporting Procedures
 - (a) Deployed Reporting units will submit an initial report by 1200 on D-1 using the format outlined in Appendix 2 (Personnel Daily Summary Change Report) to this Annex.

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- (b) Commencing 0700 D+1, reporting units will submit changes to the PDS by message only. Reports will be submitted by 0700H for the preceding 24 hour period (000H 2400H). Message type reports will reflect changes only to the initial PDS report. Organizations having no changes during the reporting period will report by message "NO CHANGE MY PDS". An example PDS Change Report is outlined in Appendix 2 (Personnel Daily Summary Change Report) to this Annex.
- (c) Organizations will report all critical shortages and casualties among those personnel filling key billets, by billet, rank and MOS.
- (3) Reporting Format. Numbered horizontally, columns are sub-divided into officer and enlisted columns. Reporting organizations will utilize Line A in reporting organizational strengths and casualties. Lines B through D will be used in reporting strengths of attachments. Lines E and F will be used in reporting interpreters and Civilian Correspondents who are attached.
- 3. REPLACEMENTS. No replacements are anticipated.
- 4. DISCIPLINE, LAW AND ORDER. In accordance with reference (f).
- 5. CAPTIVES
 - a. A TED Collection Point for holding and evacuation will be established in the BSA. GS 8342, by the Shore Party Commander and Military Police Unit Commander.
 - b. See what intering to captives, all provisions of the Geneva Convension were be observed. See reference (b).
 - c. United the behavior of the search distance of the search distance of the search of
 - d. Capthe will be blindfolded, bound with rope, and excepted by an areal grand during all phases of processing and execution. Captives will be led firmly but gently when blindfolded. Special care must be exceptised in the handling of captives who are blindfolded and tied when being moved or transported to or from aircraft or vehicles. These captives are helpless and must be assisted to prevent injury. Captives will be bound in such a manner as to ensure they cannot escape or harm either their captors, guards, interrogators, or other captives. Bindings will ensure security but will not be such as to cut off blood circulation, cut, injure, or otherwise cause pain. Captives will not be trussed in anyway that is, could be, or may be mistaken to be, tortuous.

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- e. Capturing units will deliver captives to the TFD Collection Point in the BSA as expeditiously as possible. After interrogation, captives, except North Vietnamese (PAVN) soldiers, will be delivered to the CHIEU HOI Center at Quang Ngai City. North Vietnamese (PAVN) soldiers will be delivered to the CHIEU HOI Center at Danang. Every effort will be made to deliver returnees/ralliers to the appropriate CHIEU HOI Center within 48 hours after rally.
- f. Captives will be under the control of the MP Platoon, which will be responsible for emergency first aid, and the issuance of food and water.
- g. Seriously wounded captives will be evacuated to Company B, 3d Medical Battalion, contingent upon the availability of transportation. The MP Commander will coordinate the evacuation of captives with the BSA Commander.
- 6. GRAVES REGISTRATION. All KIA's will be evacuated to Company B, 3d Medical Pattalion, Chu Lai.
- 7. MORALE AND PERSONNEL SERVICES
 - a. Leave. No leave for personnel is anticipated except for emergency leave.
 - b. Decorations, Medals, and Awards. Recommendations for decorations, medals, and awards will be expeditiously processed within 96 hours after completion of operations, in accordance with references (d) and (e). See CAI, at beginning of this Order
- (1) All recommendations for decorations, medals, and awards (other than recommendations for Purple Hearts) will be addressed via the Commending General. Task Force Delta. Recommendations will be in strict compliance with the instructions set forth in reference (d).
 - (2) Recommendation for Purple Heart awards are not necessary. Purple Heart awards will be automatically made by the Commanding General, 3d Marine Division (Rein), FMF, from data extracted from Casualty Reports.
 - (3) The Commanding General, 1st Marine Division (Rein), FMF will be provided a copy of any recommendations to be forwarded in the case of a member of the 1st Marine Division attached to Task Force Delta.
 - (4) A copy of reference (e) will be provided for any unit not holding this directive.

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c. Religious Services. Chaplain's activities will be scheduled and coordinated by the TFD Chaplain. A Chaplain of Protestant and Catholic faith will be available at the Shock and Resuscitation Point.

d. <u>Information Services</u>

(1) ISO personnel will accompany each unit to furnish timely and accurate ISO coverage of operational action.

(2) Civilian Correspondents

- (a) Correspondents participation will be limited to those areas and situations wherein their presence will not interfere with the success of the operation.
- (b) Civilian correspondents entering the TFD CP will be directed to report to the G-1 for the coordination of their activities. Interviews by TFD Staff Personnel are not authorized except after G-1 clearance has been obtained.
- e. Exchange Services. No Exchange Services will be available during this operation. Personnel should be advised to take sufficient health and comfort items to sustain them for a minimum of three days. When sundry rations become available, units will be notified and rations will be equally distributed.
- f. Postal Services. See Appendix 3 (Postal Services).
- 8. CIVIL AFFAIRS. See Appendix 4 (Civil Affairs).
- 9. PERSONNET PROCEDURES. All personnel procedures will be in accordance with existing regulations.
- 10. INTERIOR MANAGEMENT. See Appendix 5 (Interior Management).

- 1. GENERAL INFORMATION. Casualty Reporting will be in accordance with reference (a) and the procedures prescribed herein.
 - a. Evacuation Points. As designated in Annex B (Medical) to Administrative Order 1-66.
 - b. Casualty Reporting Officer. A designated Casualty Reporting Officer will be responsible for the preparation and su'mission of casualty reports.
 - c. <u>Casualty Reporting Section</u>. A Casualty Reporting Section will be established in the BSA and such other places as directed by the Casualty Reporting Officer.
 - d. Casualty Reporting Section (Rear). A Casualty Reporting Section (Rear) will be established in the 4th Marines CP in the Chu Lai enclave under the direction of the Casualty Reporting Officer.
 - e. <u>Unit Representatives</u>. Each BLT will assign two administrative men as unit representatives. These representatives will report to the Casualty Reporting Officer in the BSA for duty.

1. Service Records

- (1) Organizations based in the Republic of Vietnam will retain service records in the organizational rear echelon in the appropriate enclave.
- (2) All other organizations will deliver the service, bealth and dental records of all permanent and attached personnel to the Casualty Reporting Center (Rear) in the Cuh Lai enclave on D-2. The service records will be accompanied by one administrative men for each reporting unit and an officer in charge. The officer in charge shall have been delegated authority to sign "By direction" for the organizational commander. Transportation to the Chu Lai area is the responsibility of the organizational commander.
- 2. HIPORTING PROCEDURES FOR INACUATED CASUALTIES

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- a. Unit corpsmen will complete the medical tag and attach it to each casualty to be evacuated from the unit.
- b. The Casualty Reporting Officer will cause the Casualty Card USMC (NAVMC 10453-PD) to be completed. Units are not required to complete a Casualty Card on personnel evacuated beyond battalion level.
- c. The Casualty Reporting Officer will cause the reports required by references (a) and (b) to be transmitted to the 3d Marine Division Casualty Reports Control Center.
- 3. REPORTING PROCEDURES FOR CASUALITIES NOT EVACUATED. Unit Commanders are responsible for the preparation and submission of casualty cards on personnel missing in action and those casualties not evacuated beyond battalion level. Casualty cards will be completed in accordance with enclosure (7) to reference (a). Additionally, each casualty card will be accompanied by a completed form: enclosure (1) to reference (a) in the case of personnel missing in action; enclosure (3) to reference (a) in the case of casualties not evacuated beyond battalion level. These reports are to be delivered to the Casualty Reporting Officer in the BSA not later than 1300H daily.
- 4. STATISTICAL CASUALTY REPORTING. Organizational commanders will submit a consolidated report of permanent and attached U.S. casualties by the fastest means, written or oral, to the TFD G-1 by 0500, 1100, 1700 and 2300 daily. The report will be in the following format:
 - a. U.S. WIA since last report
 - b. U.S. KIA since last report
 - c. U.S. MIA since last report
 - d. U.S. WIA cumulative
 - e. U.S. KIA cumulative
 - f. U.S. MIS cumulative
- 5. EVACUATION OF DECEASED REMAINS
 - a. The evacuation of friendly deceased remains will be in accordance with reference (c). The Casualty Reporting Section (Rear) will complete the required forms for organizations other than BIT 2/9 and BIT 2/4.

b. Upon notification of a death, the rear echelon of BLT 2/9 or BLT 2/4 as appropriate, will prepare a Personnel Data of Deceased form and forward it to the Casualty Reporting Section (Rear) in the Chu Lai enclave.

6. MISCELLANEOUS

- a. Records of Emergency Data. Unit Commanders will cause each individual to review his Record of Emergency for accuracy.

 Those personnel whose service records are not available, will complete a Record of Emergency Data in accordance with existing regulations.
- b. Ordnance. Prior to evacuation of a casualty from the unit, the unit commander will cause, ammunition, granades and other ordnance to be removed from the casualty.

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

Delivery of first class letter mail will be made as often as possible, consistent with the tactical situation and the availability of transportation. Initially, mail will be delivered as usual to organizational Rear Echelon mail rooms for sorting by Company and by Platoon within each Company.

DAYANG PARED WHTES ATO SLF UNIT. Letter mail for personnel involved in the operation, will be delivered to the 3d Marine Division Post Office for dispatching.

CHULAI ALSO Units. Letter mail for personnel involved in the operation and the Task Force Delta Staff will be delivered to the Chu Lai Air Mail Terminal for dispatching.

- 4. SLF UNITS. The SLF Commander will be requested to disembark the SLF Postal Unit to report to the TFD G-1 in the TFD CP within the BSA on or about D+4. This Postal Unit will act as the TFD Postal Unit and will be responsible for receiving and dispatching of letter type small for all organizations and units participating in the operation. No stamp or money order sales will be made during the operation.
- 5. DISPATCHI'G OF PAIL. The 3d Marine Division Postal Officer will arrange for the forwarding of mail from the Danang enclave to the Chu Lai Air Mail Terminal, utilizing available means of transportation, for further delivery to the Task Force Delta Postal Unit within the BSA.
- 6. MASK TONG! DELTA POSTAL U II. Upon receipt of mail the Tosk Force Delta Postal Clerk will notify Battalions and separate units and request that Unit Mail Orderlies pickup the mail for their unit.
- 7. UPT COMANDERS ACTION. Commenders will insure that mail orderlies exercise strict control over mail and that necessary precautions are taken to prevent the loss or destruction of personal mail. Mail will be handled in strict compliance with reference (a). Mail which cannot be delivered within 24 hours will be returned to the Task Force Delta Postal Unit for return to the unit's Rear Echelon Mail koom for retention.

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8. OUTGOING MAIL. Mail collections will be effected daily by units and delivered to the Task Force Delta Postal Unit for dispatching to the Danang or Chu Lai Post Office for processing and forwarding.

- 1. SITUATION. (See Administrative Order 1-66)
- MISSION. Task Force Delta will conduct Civil Affairs to control the populace in the objective area and give aid to the civilian populace within the availability of local resources and U.S. supplies as necessary.


3. EXECUTION

a. Concept of Operation. Primary effort will be directed toward providing essential assistance to the populace to maintain order and to meet the minimum needs for survival of civilians left homeless or injured in the course of this operation.

b. Task Force Delta


- (1) Establish Civil Affairs control in combat areas.
- (2) Be prepared on order to execute or assist with the following:
 - (a) Population control.
 - (b) Psychological Warfare indoctrination (Annex L to Operation Order 1-66).
 - (c) Medical assistance to civilians. Civilians will be medically evacuated to the Province Hospital for emergency lifesaving only.
 - (d) Operation of assembly areas for displaced persons.
 - (e) Phase in of U.S. Army Civil Affairs Teams including ARVN Civil Affairs Teams, if required. Teams will be on call to be phased in by message request to III Marine Amphibious Force.

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c. Coordinating Instructions.


- (1) Report locations and primary points of contact with civil authorities.
- (2) Captured VC rice that is not contaminated will be evacuated for return to RVN control. Unit commanders will not destroy this rice unless it is considered totally impractical to evacuate it. In these circumstances permission to destroy the rice must be obtained from CG, TFD, prior to destruction. Evacuation will be accomplished as follows:
 - (a) Rice bags will be provided unit commanders from BSA on request.
 - (b) Ground evacuation to BSA will be arranged by TFD Head-quarters when feasible; helo evacuation in other cases.
 - (c) Return to RVN authorities will be arranged by TFD Head-quarters.
- (3) Civic Action Situation Reports will be submitted daily and in accordance with instructions contained in reference (b) (see Annex M (Reports to Operation Order 1-66).
- (4) Damage assessment to local structures, rice paddies, and other property will be reported to this Headquarters (G-5) to facilitate subsequent settlement of claims through Government of Vietnam channels. The populace should not be in any way given indication that combat claims will be processed through U.S. channels.


4. LOGISTICS

a. Civilian Assistance

- (1) Civic Action commodities shall be requested through normal command/logistical channels.
- (2) Sufficient MedCap supplies and other commodities to effectively carry out the Civil Affairs program will be held in the BSA for requisition by units. Minimum MedCap supplies for use during Phase I will be carried by units to provide required civic medical assistance.

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b. Sociological

(1) Public Health. Commanders will assist in providing essential medical treatment to civilian personnel as operations, supplies, and personnel permits (i.e. static situation).

(2) Displaced Persons

- (a) Displaced persons shall not be evacuated from the area of operations.
- (b) Commanders will direct the handling of non-combatant persons in accordance with reference (c) and set standards of care to prevent disease and unrest.
- (c) Care and support of displaced persons will be provided from supplies contained in paragraph 4a(2) avove, and other commodities provided from local ARVN sources.

(3) Arts. Monuments and Archives

(a) Commanders will ensure that troops are especially careful not to damage or violate the premises of property, livestock, religious structures, and other property, such as graves, which hold particular significance to the people.

(b) Troops will refrain from needless damage or wanton destruction of property consistent with the over-all mili-


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tary mission.

(4) Cultural Relations

- (a) Within the requirements of the military situation, maximum respect for customs, traditions, and desires of the people will be enforced.
- (b) Use of churches, temples, and other religious institutions for military purposes is prohibited.
- (5) Command and Signal

(b) G-5 will be located in the Task Force Command Post.

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

1. GENERAL

a. The Task Force Delta Command Post will be established on order to provide the Commanding General and his Staff with the facilities required to perform command functions in the support of assigned missions.

2. LOCATION AND INSTALLATION

- a The CP will be established within the BSA.
- b. If the tactical situation requires the displacement of the TFD CP, the future location will be selected by the G-3 in coordination with the G-1 and Communication Officer. After selction of the new CP site, the location coordinates will be submitted to Commanding General for approval.
- c. The Command Post will be located far enough forward to ensure positive control of subordinate units, to take advantage of cover and concealment, and reduce the need for early or frequent displacement.
- d. In a defensive situation, the Command Post will be as far to the rear as control considerations permit to avoid the necessity for displacement in the event of a local penetration.

3. ARRANGEMENT AND OPERATION

- a. The Command Post will be organized for continuous operation.
- b. All Staff Section Offices and Facilities will be designated by standard signs provided by the Headquarters Commandant.
- c. The Captive Compound and Collection Point will be located outside of the Command Post Operating Area. The location of the Captive Compound and Collection Point will be selected by the Head warters Commandant in coordination with the MP unit Commander. The MP Unit Commander is responsible for the con-

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struction and security of this facility.

4. MESSAGE HANDLING PROCEDURES

- a. Field messages include the following types of messages:
 - (1) Tactical Messages. Messages received over tactical radio nets, which do not terminate in the communication center.
 - (2) Administrative Messages. Messages sent or received through the communication center.
 - (3) Phone Calls. Messages sent and received through the field telephone system.
 - (4) Miscellaneous. Messages received by other means such as runners or couriers.
- b. All messages received by Task Force Delta will be processed in the following manner:

(1) Tactical Messages

- (a) Incoming: Message arrives via tactical net and copies will be distributed as follows: 1 copy radio operators file, 1 copy to cognizant staff section and 1 copy to G-1. G-1 enters messages in G-1 journal/file. G-1 routes copy to any other cognizant sections for sighting and return.
- (b) Outgoing: Staff section sends message via tactical net, and 3 copies will be distributed as follows: 1 copy radio operators file, 1 copy to originating staff section for "Has Been Sent" file, 1 copy to G-1 for entering into G-1 journal/file. G-1 routes copy to any cognizant sections for sighting and return.

(2) Administrative Messages

- (a) Incoming: Message arrives at communication center. Communication center delivers 3 copies to G-1. G-1 enters message in G-1 journal/file. G-1 routes copy to action section and other cognizant sections.
- (b) Outgoing: Originating section delivers message to communication center. Communication center delivers 3 "Has Been Sent" copies to G-1. G-1 enters message in G-1 journal/file. G-1 back routes "Has Been Sent" copy to originating section and other cognizant sections.

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(3) Phone Calls

- (a) Incoming: Action section receives phone call, 3 copies are made of each message. Action section retains one copy and delivers two copies to G-1. G-1 enters message in G-1 journal/file. G-1 routes copy to cognizant sections for information as required.
- (b) Outgoing phone calls will be handled in the same manner as incoming.
- (4) Miscellaneous. All messages received by means other than those listed in subparagraphs (1), (2) and (3) above will be delivered to the G-l for routing and entry in the G-l journal/file. The G-l will ensure that a copy of all messages bearing a date-time-group, which are sent or received by other than electrical means, are delivered to the Communications Center.
 - (a) Message Recording. Each Staff Section is responsible for recording in section journals a synopsis of all incoming and outgoing messages or telephone conversations of an operational nature.
- 5. CP ADMINISTRATION. The Headquarters Commandant is responsible for administration of the Command Post. He will coordinate and supervise the following activities:
 - a. Internal Command Post Security
 - b. Messing
 - c. Sanitation and Police
 - d. Assigning and marking tent areas
 - e. Billeting
 - f. Transportation
 - g. Camouflage, blackout and noise discipline
 - h. Command Post guides
 - i. Movement control of persons and vehicles within the Command Post

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6. INTERNAL ARRANGEMENT



- a. The G-1, in coordination with the Headquarters Commandant, will plan the internal arrangement of the Command Post using enclosure (1) as a guide.
- b. The Headquarters Commandant will normally locate himself near the entrance to the support area.
- c. Motor park and supply installation locations will be coordinated with the Headquarters Commandant.
- d. Dispersion of all installations within the Command Post perimeter will be effected to the maximum degree permitted by the terrain.

7. VEHICLE CONTROL

- a. The Headquarters Commandant is responsible for coordination of all vehicles which are attached to Task Force Delta Headquarters.
- b. The Headquarters Commandant will supervise the dispersion and camouflage of all vehicles within the designated motor park, and will assign specific parking areas for each vehicle.
- c. When initially moving into a new Command Post site, vehicles will be permitted into the operating area of the Command Post to unload. After unloading, vehicles will be returned to the motor park. Vehicles will not re-enter the operating area without the express permission of the Headquarters Commandant.
