



PART II

NARRATIVE SIMBIARY

The month of August saw Task Force Dolta aviation units gradually improve their ability to conduct combat operations in support of 7th Air Force and the Republic of Vietnam. The scope of the operation which had previously included air-to-ground missions in and around the DMZ, FR-1 and help as well as air-to-air (BARCAP) missions along the

eastern and western borders of North Vietnam was expanded further to include all-weather "systems" attacks by our A-6 heavy haulers into RP-1. During the endeavor to achieve efficient reliable combat operations the milestone of 1500 combat sorties from Nam Phong was passed.

On the minus side of the ledger, however, VNFA-232 lost an F-4J just short of runway Ol due to fuel exhaustion. The aircraft was returning from an Air Combat Maneuvering training flight at a time when the weather prevented visual navigation and all station navigational aids were inoperative or other wise not useable. Both aircrewmen successfully ejected and sustained only minor injuries. They were recovered by TF Delta SAR aircraft. Tragedy struck again on 26 August when "Motion Alpha" flight from VMFA-232 was engaged by a flight of MIG aircraft in northeastern Laos and the winger man was shot down. The attack by the MIGs was not detected until a missile impacted and destroyed the number two aircraft due to a unique failure of radar and communications involving two separate control agencies as well as the Motion fighters. Again both aircrewment gected and made voice contact with rescue aircraft. During the attempt to rescue the pilot, intense enemy ground fire forced the "Jolly Green" aircraft out of the zone. The second rescue aircraft succeeded in recovering the RIO with only minor injuries. Contact with the pilot, however was never reestablished in spite of continuing efforts over the period of two days. He is presently listed as missing in action.

The construction effort continued to forge ahead during the month with the completion date of the second permanent mess hall and the on site hospital complex drawing significantly nearer. These facilities, when complete, will contribute to the overall health and morale of all assigned personnel. The completion of the helicopter pad and maintenance complex as well as the VMGR detachment maintenance area were further steps toward maximum efficiency. Their use coupled with the newly completed 250 ft by 500 ft AM-2 parking ramp extension allowed the helicopters to be moved from the south high speed turnoff. This same construction provided that the tankers could be parked along the west side of the AM-2 apron so that inbound C-130 aircraft could load and offload on the apron adjacent to the air freight terminal. Work continued throughout the month on other high priority projects such as the electrical power distribution system, supply warehouse, MABS maintenance facilities, the avionics complex maintenance and storage facility and myriad other smaller projects. The highly

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critical runway spalling problem was corrected during the month by the application of epoxy cement patches. Those patches and the construction of AM-2 engine high power turnup areas off the runway have resulted in the elimination of any further damage to the runway surface.

VMGR-152 Detachment Delta continued their outstanding combat support effort without the loss of a single aerial refueling mission. They continued in fact, to average 100% availability in support of their vital operation. They not only flew 65 combat support missions, but also completed 70 administrative or logistic flights while satisfying a multitude of short fused, critical requirements. These efforts resulted in a total of 322.8 hours being compiled and 774,770 gallons of JP-4 being delivered to the fighters.

The all hands effort was also demonstrated by H&MS-36 Detachment Delta who flew 238 medevac, SAR or administrative sorties for a total of 194.3 hours. During these flights a total of 23,000 pounds of cargo, 1413 passengers and 16 medevacs were carried. 10 of the medevacs were emergency in nature. The exceptional professionalism of this detachment was demonstrated on 2 August when they were at the site of the crashed F-4J and had commenced pickup of the ejected crewmembers in less than five minutes after the unannounced ejection.



29 August 1972 VMGR maintenance facility completed.


