IMPLEMENTED PROJECT DESCRIPTION: "OPERATION NEW LIFE" IS THE CODE NAME FOR A DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE PROJECT/ACTION DESIGNED TO PROVIDE FOR THE IMMEDIATE EVACUATION OF RUENAAA3881 UNCLAS TPAGE 03 SOME 50,000 - 120,000 EVACUEES FROM THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM. THIS PROJECT WAS IMPLEMENTED ON 23 APR 75 WITH RADM G. S. MORRISON DESIG-NATED AS COMMANDER OF THE OPERATION NEW LIFE ACTIVITY ON THE ISLAND OF GUAM. THE PURPOSE OF THIS PROJECT IS TO PROVIDE ON THE ISLAND OF GUAM A TEMPORARY SAFE HAVEN FOR BOTH AMERICANS AND VIETNAMESE EVAC-UATING THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM. GUAM IS SERVING AS A TEMPORARY HOLD-

ING AREA PENDING THE MOVEMENT OF EVACUEES TO OTHER LOCATIONS. EVACUEES ARE ARRIVING BY BOTH AIR AND SEA TRANSPORTATION. WHILE ON GUAM, THE EVACUEES ARE PROCESSED BY IMMIGRATION OFFICALS AND QUARTERED UNTIL OUTBOUND TRANSPORTATION IS AVAILABLE.

DURING THE COURSE OF OPERATION NEW LIFE, THE POPULATION OF GUAM WILL BE SIGNIFICANTLY INCREASED. IN SUPPORT OF THIS PROJECT, THE NAVY IS PROVIDING FACILITIES, UTILITIES, TRANSPORTATION, AND OTHER FUNCTIONS ESSENTIAL TO THE HEALTH AND WELFARE OF EVACUEES.

2. EXISTING SITE CHARACTERISTICS:

(A) NAVAL STATION, GUAM, WHARVES SIERRA AND TANGO ARE PRESENT-LY USED FOR BERTHING SUPPLY SHIPS AND TRANSPORTS TRANSITING AT GUAM. SIERRA AND TANGO ARE 1491 FEET AND 1509 FEET RESPECTIVELY IN BERTHING LENGTH. BOTH WHARVES ARE LISTED IN THE SHORE FACILITY ASSETS OF THE NAVAL SUPPLY DEPOT GUAM. TENTS HAVE BEEN ERECTED AT THESE WHARVES TO PAGE 04 RUENAAA3881 UNCLAS TEMPORARILY SHELTER PEOPLE ARRIVING BY SHIP. THEY ARE INTENDED FOR USE ONLY UNTIL THE PRIMARY PROCESSING IS COMPLETED.

WATER IS SUPPLIED FROM AN EXISTING PERMANENT SYSTEM. TEMPORARY SHOWER FACILITIES HAVE BEEN INSTALLED. THESE ARE NO LAUNDRY FACILITIES IN THIS AREA. CHEMICAL TOILETS HAVE BEEN INSTALLED, WHICH ARE PUMPED OUT DAILY FOR FURTHER DISPOSAL INTO A NEARBY PERMANENT SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM. THIS WASTE IS EVENTUALLY DISCHARGED FROM AN OCEAN OUTFALL 60 FEET BELOW SEA LEVEL APPROXIMATELY 200 FEET OFFSHORE AT HAPUTO POINT. SOLID WASTE IS COLLECTED IN REFUSE CONTAINERS AND DISPOSED OF IN THE NAVAL STATION SANITARY LANDFILL.

(B) NAVAL STATION, GUAM; OROTE AIRSTRIP: THE OROTE PENINSULA, WHICH IS INCLUDED AS PART OF THE APRA HARBOR RESERVATION, CONTAINS THE ABANDONED OROTE AIRSTRIP, A COAST GUARD FACILITY, RIFLE, PISTOL, AND SKEET RANGES, GAB-GAB BEACH, AND A HELIPORT. THIS PENINSULA IS FEATURED WITH A STEEP CLIFF BORDERING ITS COASTLINE AND RISING TO OVER 200 FEET ABOVE SEA LEVEL.

OROTE AIRSTRIP IS LISTED IN THE SHORE FACILITY ASSETS OF NAVAL STATION. THE ENTIRE RUNWAY AND MOST OF THE SURROUNDING AREA IS PRACTICALLY LEVEL AND OPEN LAND. EXCEPT FOR ITS USE AS A DRAGSTRIP AND FOR EMERGENCY LANDING SITE, THIS AIRFIELD IS PRACTICALLY NON-UTILIZED. PAGE 05 RUENAAA3881 UNCLAS
A MAJOR PORTION OF THIS AIRFIELD LIES WITHIN THE EXPLOSIVE-QUANTITY-

DISTANCE (EQD) ARC OF THE PRESENT AMMUNITION WHARF AT CABRAS ISLAND. THIS EQD CRITERIA RESTRICTS THE EXPANSION OF SUPPORT FACILITIES OR NEW CONSTRUCTION IN THIS AREA. NO OTHER PLANNED USE FOR THE AIRSTRIP IS FORESEEN UNTIL THE PROPOSED RELOCATION OF THE AMMO WHARF IS RESOLVED.

A REFUGEE CAMP SITE AT THE RUNWAY IS IN USE FOR THE HOUSING OF TA MAXIMUM OF 40,000 PEOPLE IN TENTS. A TEMPORARY ABOVE-GROUND WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM, TIED TO THE PERMANENT WATER SYSTEM, HAS BEEN INSTALLED. THIS LINE FURNISHES WATER TO FIELD KITCHENS AND SHOWER STALLS WITH EXTERIOR FAUCETS. CLOTHING IS LAUNDERED AT THE FAUCETS. MOST OF THE WASHWATER SEEPS INTO THE GROUND WHICH IS RELATIVELY PERMEABLE. THE DISPOSITION OF THE WASHWATER IS THROUGH NATURAL EVAPORATION AND PERCULATION.

HUMAN WASTE IS DISPOSED OF AS PREVIOUSLY DESCRIBED FOR TANGO AND SIERRA WHARVES: THAT IS, BY CHEMICAL TOILETS WITH THE CONTENTS GOING TO THE SAME OCEAN OUTFALL. SOME OF THE SOLID WASTES FROM THE CAMP ARE DISPOSED OF IN THE NAVAL STATION SANITARY LANDFILL. DUE TO THE LARGE VOLUME OF SOLID WASTE GENERATED, ESTIMATED AT 10 TONS A DAY, AN AREA ON THE OROTE PENINSULA IS BEING USED AS AN OPEN BURNING AREA FOR PAGE 06 RUENAAA3881 UNCLAS

THE SOLID WASTE GENERATED WITHIN THIS CAMP. THE MAJOR PORTION OF THE SOLID WASTE PRODUCED AT OROTE CAMP CONSISTS OF PAPER PRODUCTS, PACK-ING MATERIAL, AND DUNNAGE, AND LEFT-OVER FOOD WASTE.

MEDICAL FACILITIES ARE OPERATED AT SEVERAL LOCATIONS BY THE U.S. ARMY, INCLUDING AMBULANCE SERVICE WHICH IS PROVIDED WITH THE UNITS.

A CHAIN LINK FENCE APPROXIMATELY 5.000 FEET LONG HAS BEEN INSTALLED ACROSS THE BASE OF THE PENINSULA, AND ACCESS IS RESTRICTED TO OFFICIAL BUSINESS ONLY.

(C) ASAN ANNEX: CAMP ASAN, COMPRISING ABOUT 30 ACRES OF LAND AND 20 SUBSTANDARD METAL BARRACKS-TYPE BUILDINGS, IS INCLUDED IN THE SHORE FACILITY ASSETS OF THE NAVAL REGIONAL MEDICAL CENTER, GUAM. THIS CAMP IS LOCATED AT ASAN VILLAGE AND IS BOUNDED BY MARINE DRIVE ON ONE SIDE AND THE PHILIPPINE SEA ON THE OTHER. ASAN CAMP HAS A CAPACITY OF 6,250 PEOPLE, ALL HOUSED IN 2-STORY METAL BUILDINGS. THESE BUILDINGS WERE CONSTRUCTED IN 1949 FOR THE HOUSING OF NAVY CIVILIAN EMPLOYEES, AND WERE REHABILITATED IN 1966 FOR USE AS A HOSPITAL. AS THIS CAMP WAS DESIGNED FOR A MUCH SMALLER POPULATION, THE SANITARY AND LAUNDRY FACILITIES ARE NOW INADEQUATE FOR THE PRESENT LOAD. THESE FACILITIES ARE BEING IMPROVED AND EXPANDED AS DESCRIBED BELOX:

TEMPORARY WOODEN BUILDINGS ARE UNDER CONSTRUCTION. THESE BUILD-INGS WILL CONTIAN TOILETS, SHOWERS, AND LAUNDRY FACILITIES. THE WATER AND SEWER LINES NEEDED WILL BE CONNECTED TO THE EXISTING SYSTEMS.

THE EXISTING SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM CONSISTED OF A COLLECTION SYSTEM, AN IMHOFF TANK, CONTACT CHLORINATION, AND AN OCEAN OUTFALL. THIS OUTFALL WAS AT SEA LEVEL AT THE EDGE OF THE REEF. TO STOP THE POLLUTION CREATED BY THIS INADEQUATE OUTFALL, THE SEWAGE SYSTEM WAS TIED IN TO THE GOVERNMENT OF GUAM SEWER SYSTEM. IN THE GOVGUAM SYSTEM, WASTE IS TREATED BY CHLORINATION AND DISCHARGED THROUGH AN OCEAN OUTFALL LOCATED 65 FFET BELOW SEA LEVEL OUTSIDE THE REEF NEAR AGANA. SOLID WASTE IS COLLECTED IN REFUSE CONTAINERS AND DEPOSITED IN THE NAVAL STATION SANITARY LANDFILL.

(D) TEMPORARY PROCESSING FACILITY, NAS AGANA: EXISTING BUILDINGS USED FOR PROCESSING REFUGEES AT THIS STATION ARE PERMENENT-TYPE CONCRETE FACILITIES DESIGNATED FOR BACHELOR ENLISTED QUARTERS. THESE QUARTERS ARE FULLY IMPROVED AND MODERNIZED TO MEET MINIMUM STANDARDS BT

WITH THE EXCEPTION OF THE SANITARY SEWER TIE-IN TO THE GOVERNMENT OF GUAM SYSTEM AT THE ASAN ANNEX CAMP, ALL PROJECT WORK CONSISTS OF REPAIRS TO EXISTING FACILITIES OR CONSTRUCTION OF TEMPOR-ARY FACILITIES (TENT PLATFORMS, WOOD FRAME SHELTERS, ABOVE GROUND WATER DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM, ETC.). AS SUCH, THE ACTIONS ARE EASILY REVERSIBLE IN NATURE AND DO NOT CONFLICT WITH THE OBJECTIVES OR SPECIFIC TERMS OF ANY APPROVED OR PROPOSED LAND USE PLANS, POLICIES OR CONTROLS.

C. THE PROBABLE IMPACT OF THE IMPLEMENTED ACTION ON THE ENVIRON-MENT

THE PRESENT UTILIZATION OF THE ASAN ANNEX COMPLEX, THE BACHELOR HOUSING FACILITIES, AND THE BARRACKS AT NAS AND NCS CONFORMS TO THEIR DESIGNATED USAGE; WHICH IS HOUSING. THOSE PRIVATE CONSTRUCTION COMPANY BARRACKS AND THE TOKYU HOTEL ARE HOUSING FACILPAGE 04 RUENAAA3882 UNCLAS

ITIES ORIGINALLY INTENDED FOR LABOR CREWS AND TRANSIENT PERSONNEL RESPECTIVELY. THEIR PRESENT CONCESSION TO HOUSE EVACUEES REMAINS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THEIR ORIGINAL PURPOSE. ALTHOUGH THE CONVERSION OF CB ARENA AND MINRON/COSRON DIFFERS IN THEIR INTENDED FUNCTIONS, NEVERTHELESS THEIR IMPACTS ARE MINOR. INVIEW OF THE ADEQUACY OF SPACE AND UTILITIES IN THESE FACILITIES, THEIR SUITABILITY AS A LIVING QUARTER POSES LITTLE NOTEWORTHY IMPACT.

THE CONVERSION OF OROTE POINT FROM AN EXISTING EMERGENCY LANDING FIELD AND THE ADJACENT OPEN LAND AREA TO A REFUGEE CAMP, SUBSTANTIAL-LY ALTERED THE LAND USE PATTERN OF THAT LOCALITY.

CLEARING, GRADING, AND EXCAVATION HAVE INDUCED SLIGHT CHANGES OF THE LAND TOPOGRAPHY. NO SIGNIFICANT ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITE IS ENCOUNTERED OR DISTURBED. A SLIGHT CHANGE IN FROSION AND DRAINAGE PATTERN MAY HAVE RESULTED. THIS CHANGE, HOWEVER, IS PRACTICALLY INSIGNIFICANT ATTRIBUTED TO THE NEAR LEVELNESS OF THE LAND IN THAT AREA.

A SIGNIFICANT ASPECT OF LAND USE PERTAINING TO ALL NAVY ADMINISTERED FACILITIES FOR REFUGEE HOUSING PURPOSE HAS BEEN THE DRASTIC CHANGE FROM A LOW TO A HIGH POPULATION DENSITY AREA.

THE SOLITUDE AND THE RECREATIONAL USE OF OROTE PENINSULA IS TEM-PORARILY DISRUPTED. THE UTILIZATION OF THE EXISTING AIRSTRIP AND PAGE 05 RUENAAA3882 UNCLAS

ACCESS ROADS FOR BICYCLING AND DRAG RACING IS DENIED. FURTHERMORE, GAB GAB BEACH, AS WELL AS THE RIFLE AND PISTOL RANGES ARE MADE INACESSIBLE.

MINOR CONSTRUCTION OPERATIONS UNDERTAKEN TO IMPROVE AND SUPPLY THE NECESSARY FACILITIES AND UTILITIES WILL POSE NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT UPON THE ENVIRONMENT. ONLY SECONDARY EFFECTS ARE PRODUCED; I.E. INCREASE IN NOISE, DUST, TRAFFIC. ETC.

APPROXIMATELY 500 ACRES OF LAND HAVE BEEN CLEARED AT ORDITE POINT. DISTURBANCE OF EXISTING WILDLIFE AND BIRD HABITAT AND POSSIBLE DEPRIVATION OF LIFE TO SOME ANIMALS HAS INEVEITABLY RESULTED AS A CONSEQUENCE OF FOLIAGE CLEARING. NO KNOWN ENDANGERED SPECIES IS AFFECTED BY THIS OPERATION. THE IMPACT IS AMELIOTATED DUE TO THE AVAILABILITY OF SURROUNDING WOODY LAND AREAS ON BOTH SIDES OF THE CAMP WHICH SERVES AS A SHELTER FOR AFFECTED ANIMALS.

OPERATION NEWLIFE WAS IMPLEMENTED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE AS AN EMERGENCY ACTIVITY. AS SUCH, THE ALTERNATIVES OF TAKING NO ACTION ON THIS PROGRAM OR OF POSTPONING ACTION PENDING FURTHER STUDY, WAS NOT AVAILABLE.

IN IMPLEMENTING THE PROJECT SOME ALTERNATIVES WERE AVAILABLE RELATIVE TO SPECIFIC FACILITIES TO BE USED OR PROCEDURES TO BE FOLLOWED. 

- Subj Sponsorship of Refugees by Marines Stationed at Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton
 - 1. The Chief of Staff at Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton has received many queries from base Marines related to sponsorship of refugees now located at the refugee center at Camp Pendleton.
 - 2. The Civil Coordinator and his team from the Immigration and Naturalization Service at Camp Pendleton can provide answers relative to sponsor eligibility and associated responsibilities of the requesting Marines as citizens. However, the following Marine Corps related questions require an answer.
 - a. If refugees are sponsored by a Marine family, can they live in government quarters aboard the base?
 - b. Would the refugees sponsored by Marine families have PX, Commissary, base theater, and other base privileges authorized to dependents?
 - c. If sponsored refugees themselves do not have above privileges, will sponsors be permitted to make purchases at commissary and PX and, in turn, give (or sell) these purchases to the refugees?
 - d. What, in general, will be the effect on the sponsor's personal insurance. Will it be the same as if the refugee is a family member, or will it be similar to coverage for a casual guest?
 - 3. Comments are requested on the above questions from those staff sections having cognizance in the area of concern. In addition, comments are solicited concerning the general problem of sponsorship, for which specific questions have not been asked.



PERSONNEL TURBULENCE ASSOCIATED WITH THE DRAWDOWN,
THE ADVENT OF THE ALL VOLUNTEER FORCE AND

- A NUMBER OF OTHER FACTORS.

- TODAY, THE COMMANDANT IS FACING THE TASK OF CHARTING A COURSE THROUGH A PERIOD WHICH MIGHT BE APPROPRIATELY CALLED THE "POST-VIETNAM ERA."
- THE OVERRIDING CONCERN AS THE PLANNING PROCEEDS IS QUALITY...QUALITY...TRUE QUALITY:
- EVERYTHING HINGES ON THE QUALITY OF THE YOUNG MARINES WE MUST FIND AND TRAIN.
- WE ARE LOOKING AT PERSONNEL QUALITY FROM TWO STANDPOINTS: -QUALITY OF INPUT; AND
 - -QUALITY OF PERFORMANCE WITHIN OUR RANKS.

 TO ACHIEVE QUALITY OF INPUT, RECRUITING STANDARDS WILL

 BE RAISED:

-WE WANT TO REACH A LEVEL WHERE WE ARE TAKING 75% HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES...AND REACH THAT LEVEL AS QUICKLY AS POSSIBLE. THE QUESTIONS OF INTERIM GOALS AND POSSIBLE RECRUITING SHORTFALLS ARE STILL UNDER STUDY, BUT WE ARE GENERALLY OPTIMISTIC THAT WE CAN REACH THAT 75% GOAL AND STILL MAINTAIN AN END STRENGTH OF ABOUT 196 THOUSAND. IF WE HAVE TO TAKE A SHORTFALL FOR A WHILE, WE WILL. ON THE OTHER HAND, IF RECRUITING GOES BETTER THAN ANTICIPATED, THERE ARE NO PLANS FOR SIGNIFICANT EXPANSION. WE WILL JUST BE MORE CHOOSY.

-A NEW RECRUITING CONCEPT IS UNDER DEVELOPMENT—ONE WHICH WILL TIE THE RECRUITER INTO THE TOTAL PROCESS OF MAKING A MARINE. WE WILL BE LAUNCHING A PILOT PROGRAM WHICH WILL HAVE THE EVENTUAL AIM OF PLACING THE RESERVE AND RECRUITING DISTRICTS UNDER THE COMMANDING GENERALS OF THE TWO RECRUIT DEPOTS. THE FIRST ONES TO TRY THIS OUT WILL BE THE CG, MCRD, PARRIS ISLAND AND THE SIXTH DISTRICT HEADQUARTERS AT ATLANTA. THE NEW INDICATOR OF SUCCESS WILL BE HOW MANY MARINES MAKE IT THROUGH BOOT CAMP—NOT HOW MANY ARE SHIPPED.

-ONE FINAL OBSERVATION ABOUT QUALITY RECRUITING. SOME ARTICLES HAVE BEEN WRITTEN WHICH LEAVES THE IMPRESSION THAT PERSONNEL QUALITY IS LOW ACROSS

THE BOARD AND THAT THIS IS A PROBLEM WHICH BELONGS UNIQUELY TO THE MARINE CORPS. THIS IS NOT SO, AND SUCH ALLEGATIONS DO AN INJUSTICE TO THE TENS OF THOUSANDS OF GOOD MARINES WHO COME IN EACH YEAR AND LIVE UP TO THEIR CALLING AS MARINES--PERFORMING LIKE TRUE PROFESSIONALS AND KEEPING THEIR NOSES CLEAN. THE RECRUITING PROBLEMS WHICH FACE THE MARINE CORPS ARE FOUND--TO A GREATER OR LESSER EXTENT--DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE-WIDE. WE ARE UNIQUE ONLY IN THE SENSE THAT WE MUST APPEAL TO POTENTIAL RIFLEMEN OF THE MOST RUGGED SORT, WHILE SIMULTANEOUSLY MANNING A FULL RANGE OF MOS' WHICH ENCOMPASSES NOT ONLY THOSE OF A LAND ARMY BUT OF NAVAL AVIATION AS WELL. THERE ARE NO EASY SOLUTIONS TO THIS PERPETUAL PROBLEM, BUT WE'RE CONFIDENT THAT WE WILL CONTINUE TO HOLD OUR OWN...AND DRIVE THE QUALITY LEVEL UPWARD.

QUALITY OF PERFORMANCE IS ANOTHER MATTER. IN MOST CASES, OUR STANDARDS OF PERFORMANCE ARE ALREADY HIGH ENOUGH, BUT MARINES ARE NOT ALWAYS BEING REQUIRED TO MEET THEM. IN HIS MESSAGES TO THE CORPS SO FAR, THE COMMANDANT HAS PLACED HEAVY EMPHASIS ON A SENSE OF INDIVIDUAL RESPONSIBILITY, WITH HIS CALL FOR ALL MARINES TO "GET IN STEP...

AND DO IT SMARTLY." THERE IS NOTHING REALLY
REVOLUTIONARY ABOUT THIS APPROACH. IT IS THE
UN-MELODRAMATIC, MATTER-OF-FACT WAY OF THINKING
OF ANY MATURE INDIVIDUAL WHO TAKES RESPONSIBILITY
FOR HIS OWN ACTIONS (OR HIS FAILURE TO ACT) AND
DOESN'T ALWAYS LOOK FOR SOMEONE TO GET HIM OFF
THE HOOK. ONE OF THE MORE VISIBLE INDICATORS OF
WHO'S IN STEP IS THE MATTER OF PHYSICAL FITNESS
AND WEIGHT CONTROL. STARTING CLOSE TO THE FLAGPOLE,
THE COMMANDANT HAS GIVEN THE MARINES AT HEADQUARTERS
MARINE CORPS A MONTH--FROM 1 JULY TO 1 AUGUST--TO
WEIGH IN AT FLIGHT WEIGHT, OR BE SINGLED OUT FOR
FURTHER ATTENTION. IT IS A MEASURABLE STANDARD
WHICH A MARINE CAN CHOOSE TO MEET...OR NOT MEET,
AT HIS OWN RISK.

GOING HAND-IN-HAND WITH THE EMPHASIS ON QUALITY IS THE EMPHASIS ON COMBAT READINESS--TRADITIONALLY OUR BREAD AND BUTTER. THIS HAS SEVERAL INTERESTING WRINKLES:

-WE PLAN TO FOSTER THE FULLEST POSSIBLE NAVY AND MARINE CORPS COOPERATION IN MAINTAINING THE AMPHIBIOUS CHARACTER OF OUR FORCE IN READINESS--BUT WE WILL MAINTAIN AS WELL THE READINESS TO EXECUTE OTHER MISSIONS AS DIRECTED BY THE NATIONAL COMMAND AUTHORITIES, USING THE MODE OF STRATEGIC LIFT

WHICH MAY BE MOST AVAILABLE OR APPROPRIATE.

THIS DOES NOT IMPLY THAT WE ARE BARGAINING FOR NEW ROLES AND MISSIONS. WE ARE NOT.

-TO KEEP OUR COMBINED ARMS PACKAGE UP TO SPEED, WE WILL DEVELOP THE MOST COMPREHENSIVE AIR-GROUND TRAINING CENTER YET, AT 29 PALMS. IN THE FOREFRONT OF OUR THINKING AS WE WORK THIS UP WILL BE SOBERING LESSONS OF THE INTENSE MISSILE AND TANK-HEAVY ENVIRONMENT OF THE LATEST-MIDEAST WAR AND THEIR POTENTIAL APPLICATION TO FUTURE MARINE CORPS OPERATIONS--EITHER AMPHIBIOUS OR IN A MAJOR LAND WAR.

PAST

-AT THE SAME TIME, A BOARD HEADED BY MAJOR GENERAL HAYNES IS UNDERTAKING A DETAILED AND COMPREHENSIVE STUDY OF THE TOTAL MARINE CORPS FORCE STRUCTURE--BOTH AIR AND GROUND. IT WILL HAVE INITIAL RECOMMENDATIONS BY MID-OCTOBER; MORE DETAILED ONES BY THE END OF THE YEAR.

-ANOTHER MEASURE AIMED AT UPGRADING OUR READINESS IS THE CURRENT DIALOGUE BETWEEN THE COMMANDANT AND THE CHIEF OF STAFF'S COMMITTEE ON TEN SPECIFIC INITIATIVES WHICH COULD BRING ABOUT SIGNIFICANT PROGRAMMING CHANGES IN THE NEAR FUTURE. THESE RANGE FROM INITIATIVES TO IMPROVE PERSONNEL QUALITY TO PROCUREMENT OF WEAPONS AND EQUIPMENT TO CHANGES IN UNIT COMPOSITION.

RUNNING THROUGH THESE EFFORTS TO UPGRADE COMBAT READINESS ARE TWO PHILOSOPHICAL APPROACHES:

-THE FIRST IS THAT IN THE ABSENCE OF UNLIMITED FUNDING, WE MUST BE PREPARED TO PARE DOWN OR EVEN GIVE UP SOME MARGINAL, NICE-TO-HAVE CAPABILITIES IN ORDER TO RAISE THE OVERALL LEVEL OF READINESS. IN THE COMMANDANT'S WORDS: "THERE IS NO FREE LUNCH. WHAT WE MAKE IN PEANUTS, WE MIGHT LOSE IN POPCORN."

-THE SECOND APPROACH IS THAT THE MARINE CORPS
MUST SHED AN UNFORTUNATE AND SOMEWHAT, THOUGH NOT
TOTALLY UNDESERVED IMAGE IT PROJECTS IN SOME
CRITICAL PARTS OF THE PENTAGON--THAT OF A PONDEROUS,
INFLEXIBLE WORLD WAR II-TYPE ORGANIZATION, TOO
SPECIALIZED TO SERVE AS A TRULY GENERAL PURPOSE
FORCE, AND RESISTING CHANGE BY HIDING BEHIND THE
LAW. CALL IT WHAT YOU WILL--THE FUTURE CORPS
MUST BE READY TO GO ANYWHERE, ANYTIME, UNDER WHATEVER TRYING CIRCUMSTANCES, INCLUDING AMPHIBIOUS
ASSAULT--AND WIN:

TO SUM UP:

-THE WINDS OF CHANGE ARE BLOWING--STEADILY AND PERSISTENTLY--BUT NOT WITH DESTRUCTIVE HURRICANE FORCE. DO NOT LOOK FOR DRAMATIC ABOUT-FACES IN DIRECTIONS THE CORPS IS TAKING. YOU WILL NOT SEE

ARBITRARY MANDATES COMING WITH SHOCKING SUDDENNESS FROM HEADQUARTERS MARINE CORPS. THE COMMANDANT JUST DOESN'T BELIEVE IN MAGIC, INSTANT SOLUTIONS. AT THE SAME TIME, HE DOES NOT FEEL THAT THE CORPS IS FACING ANY PROBLEM SO SEVERE THAT IT WON'T YIELD TO A STEADY, SYSTEMATIC ATTACK BY ALL HANDS. EFFORTS ARE ALREADY UNDERWAY TO GET ALL HANDS INTO THE ACT. THIS IS TRUE OF THE DISCUSSIONS NOW TAKING PLACE AT HEADQUARTERS AND WILL APPLY AS WELL TO FIELD COMMANDERS, WHO WILL GET THEIR DAY IN COURT BEFORE DECISIONS AFFECTING THEIR COMMANDS ARE MADE.

-THE COMMANDANT ALSO FEELS THAT EVERYONE WHO WEARS--OR WHO HAS WORN--THE EMBLEM IS PART OF THE SAME CORPS. THERE IS ROOM FOR ONLY ONE "TEAM" -- A TEAM TO WHICH EVERYONE BELONGS AND EVERYONE CONTRIBUTES.

THE THIRD MARINE DIVISION ASSOCIATION AS A BODY--AND EACH MEMBER AS AN INDIVIDUAL--CAN CONTRIBUTE IN TWO IMPORTANT WAYS:

-ONE WAY IS TO CONTINUE THE FINE WORK OF MAINTAINING A LIVING MEMORIAL TO OUR DEPARTED COMRADES-IN-ARMS THROUGH AN ACTIVE AND HEALTHY SCHOLARSHIP FUND, AND BY KEEPING ALIVE THE STRONG AND MEANINGFUL CAMARADERIE OF THE PAST--PART OF THE TRADITION WHICH HAS MADE OUR CORPS GREAT.

-THE OTHER WAY IS TO HELP PUMP FRESH
VITALITY INTO THE MARINE CORPS OF TODAY...AND
OF TOMORROW. IF WE ARE TO ATTAIN THE TRUE
QUALITY OF PERSONNEL WE SEEK, ALL MARINES--PAST
AND PRESENT--MUST PITCH IN. TONIGHT, I AM
CALLING ON EACH OF YOU TO DONATE YOUR TALENTS,
YOUR PERSONAL AND PROFESSIONAL CONTACTS, AND YOUR
INFLUENCE AS OPINION MOLDERS WITHIN YOUR COMMUNITIES
TO OPEN DOORS FOR OUR RECRUITERS AND TO GET THE
MARINE STORY OUT WHEREVER AND HOWEVER YOU CAN.

-IF YOU ARE ALREADY DOING THIS, I AM ASKING YOU TO REDOUBLE YOUR EFFORTS.

-IF YOU HAVE NOT YET STARTED, I AM ASKING YOU TO TAKE THE FIRST STEP AND GET IN CONTACT WITH YOUR LOCAL RECRUITER TO SEE WHERE YOU CAN HELP.

-EVERYONE HERE HAS A GOOD IDEA OF THE TYPE OF YOUNGSTER WE NEED TO HAVE A MARINE CORPS WE CAN ALL BE PROUD OF. WE CAN USE YOUR HELP IN FINDING MORE OF THEM.

THIS HAS BEEN A QUICK LOOK AHEAD. I LIKE WHERE WE'RE HEADING.

LET'S MOVE OUT AND GET THERE -- IN STEP--TOGETHER.

- 1. Reference (a) requested this Division provide a roster of Marines, officer and enlisted, who possess Vietnamese language capability and who are stationed on the West Coast. Reference (b) was reviewed and enclosures (1) and (2) are provided.
- 2. It should be noted that enclosures (1) and (2) include both FMF and non FMF linguists. A numerical breakdown by category is as follows:

FMF - 14/16 Non FMF - 12/10

Reference (c) reported the number of officer/enlisted personnel in I MAF who speak Vietnamese as 11/27. In computing the total number of Vietnamese-speaking Marines on the West Coast, the totals reflected in enclosures (1) and (2) should not be added to those in reference (c) or double-counting may result. Reference (d) attempted to clarify the differences in the totals of reference (c) and this letter. G-2 FMFPAC used the Manpower Management System, local records check, and interviews to obtain totals. (On the other hand, this Division used Manpower Management System, monthly Interrogation Translation Team reports, and personal knowledge.) G-2 FMFPAC stated that a by-name list will be forthcoming.

1. FOLLOWING IS TEXT OF RELEASE MADE THIS DATE BY DASD/PA: OUDTE THREE MILITARY BASES IN THE UNITED STATES HAVE BEEN SELECTED TO SERVE AS RECEPTION CENTERS FOR INDOCHINA REFUGEES.


QUOTE THE BASES SELECTED AS TEMPORARY HOUSING SITES ARE EGLIN AFB, FL; FORT CHAFFEE, AR; AND THE MARINE CORPS BASE, CAMP PENDLETON, CA. THE BASES WILL BE USED FOR TEMPORARY HOUSING FOR INDOCHINA REFUGEES FOR UP TO 90 DAYS OR MORE. EACH BASE MAY HANDLE UP TO 20,000 REFUGEES.

OUOTE REFUGEES GOING TO EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE WILL ARRIVE AT PAGE 2 RUEKJCS 5216 UNCLAS EGLIN; THOSE GOING TO FORT CHAFFEE WILL ARRIVE

AT LITTLE ROCK AIR FORCE BASE AND THOSE GOING TO CAMP PENDLETON WILL ARRIVE AT THE MARINE CORPS AIR STATION, EL TORO, CA.

QUOTE MOVEMENT OF REFUGEES TO THESE BASES IS EXPECTED TO BEGIN WITHIN THE NEXT TWO DAYS IN ORDER TO REDUCE LARGE BUILDUPS OF REFUGEES AT U.S. BASES IN THE PACIFIC. UNQUOTE.

- 2. IN VIEW OF INTENSE NATIONAL PRESS AND PUBLIC INTEREST, DASD(PA) WILL PROVIDE GUIDANCE AND COORDINATE ALL DOD PUBLIC AFFAIRS ACTIVITIES CONCERNING MILITARY SUPPORT OF INDOCHINA REFUGEES AT THESE CONUS SITES. THIS WILL INCLUDE BOTH SERVICE AND JCS ASPECTS OF PA OPERATIONS. QUERIES INVOLVING DOD ASPECTS OF THE OPERATION NOT COVERED BY GUIDANCE AVAILABLE SHOULD BE REFERRED TO DASD(PA).
- A. THE PA OPERATIONS GRADUALLY WILL BE DECENTRALIZED TO THE MILITARY SERVICES WHOSE INSTALLATIONS ARE BEING USED FOR PROCESSING BUT ASD(PA) WILL CONTINUE TO MAINTAIN THE BROAD OVERALL POLICY OVERVIEW.
- B. THE MILITARY SERVICES WILL NOMINATE TO ASD(PA) BY MOST EXPEDITIOUS MEANS A SENIOR PA OFFICER TO SERVE AS BOTH DOD AND SERVICE SPOKESMAN AT EACH OF THE RECEPTION CENTERS AND/OR PORTS OF







Immigration officials are now using two 2740 computers, but are still playing "catch-up". BGen GRAHAM has spent \$4.5 million as of 2 May. MGen MILLER and BGen GRAHAM agreed that BGen SIMMONS, Historical Division, should be approached concerning the recording of this operation as an historical event.

- e. BGen GRAHAM has requested that authority be delegated to him as CG, MCB, Camp Pendleton to authorize the utilization of helicopters for certain visitors to Camp Pendleton in connection with refugee matters. Present regulations require CMC approval on a case-by-case basis. Matter has been referred to DC/S for Aviation and final resolution is pending.
- f. The Cambodian typewriters provided by the Cambodian Embassy, Washington, D. C. for publication of a Camp News bulletin arrived Los Angeles at 052015 May 75.
- g. Capt BOTTS, JCS called requesting that notification be made to all concerned that General KY, former Vice President, RVN, be processed according to normal procedures and receive no preferential treatment. MCB, Camp Pendleton and MCAS El Toro were advised. MGen MILLER, DC/S for I&L, notified the Chief of Staff.

OPERATIONS NEW ARRIVALS LOGISTICS ACTION SUMMARY 1 May - 2 May 1975

1. The purpose of this summary is to provide information to the Staff on the on-going actions concerning OPERATION NEW ARRIVALS.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACTIONS/EVENTS

- a. MGen VAUGHT reported that he had discussed the logistics situation with Col WOODHAM, C/S, MCB CAMPEN the afternoon of l May, and inquired if any problems existed which this Headquarters could help resolve. Col WOODHAM stated that the required supplies were flowing smoothly and there were no immediate problems requiring special assistance.
- b. A daily report of the status of required supplies was requested as of 1800 PDT each day. The first report as of 1800, 1 May indicates that OPERATION NEW ARRIVALS is receiving exceptional support from all supply agencies. Current status of major items is as follows:

All remaining items above are now enroute to Camp Pendleton. It is anticipated that all significant requirements will be met by 1800, 2 May. In the area of subsistence, 225,000 pounds of rice of 300,000 pounds requested is already on hand. The DSA Depot at Ogden, Utah, moved 642,000 pounds of materiel in 13 hours.

- c. MGen MILLER reported that he had discussed the refugee operation with BGen GRAHAM the evening of 1 May. BGen GRAHAM reported the following developments.
- (1) There was an unconfirmed report that a typhoon may be approaching Guam. This could result in an effort to speed up airlift operations. It was agreed that the current tempo of refugee movement cannot be increased as it would exceed the refugee processing capability, and that the final capacity of 18,000 refugees cannot be exceeded. (Subsequent inquiries by the I&L Watch Officer to the Air Force indicated that PACAF knew of no typhoon in the area of, or approaching Guam. This information was passed to the Staff Secretary, MCB, CAMPEN).

- (2) MCB, CAMPEN is in need of additional SNCO's. It was agreed that MCB, CAMPEN will send a message to HQMC (DC/S Manpower) requesting some SNCO's currently at the Western Division Matches be made available on a TAD basis to Camp Pendleton. In addition, MCB, CAMPEN may request SNCO's from other West Coast commands on a volunteer basis.
- d. Mr. ROGNER (OASD, I&L) had expressed concern that facilities support for OPERATION NEW ARRIVALS may result in illegal construction projects. Liaison between Col BATES (LFF) and Col MERRILL, AC/S, G-4, CAMPEN, resulted in obtaining information which was passed to Mr. ROGNER who appeared satisfied that USMC was not violating any DOD regulations.
- e. The State Department has been requesting a breakout of the number of refugees by nationality (Vietnamese, Cambodian, other). This information has not been made available to MCB, CAMPEN by the Civil Coordinator and is therefore unavailable in the daily SITREPS. The State Department and OJCS (J-4) have been informed that they will receive this information as soon as it is made available.
- f. Dr. SHIELDS, Deputy Asst SECDEF for Internal Security Affairs has requested that the 22 members and families (154 people) of the Four Party Military Negotiating Team be processed and billeted together upon arrival at CAMPEN. The Flight #6576 and ETD Guam 010300 May PDT were provided to Col COFFMAN, MCB, CAMPEN together with the request to contact I&L Coordination Center once they are processed.
- g. Col BEAL (LF) coordinated a CAMPEN request with ASD (Manpower and Reserve Affairs) to authorize sale of PX items to refugees. Request was approved. Actions taken by CAMPEN are contained in paragraph h of the attached SITREP.

Narrative

Summary. A medical team from the Naval Regional Medical Center, Camp Penaleton composed of five doctors and 40 corpsman have treated a total of 160 refugee patients. Most treated for minor abrasions and rashes. Approximately 70 percent of patients have been children. Seven refugees currently hospitalized: Two measles, one pneumonia, one drug withdrawal and three dehydration. Dispensary operating 24 hours a day with doctor in attendance at all times.

Postal services provided by special postal unit established at Camp Talega. In addition to normal Chaplain assistance to evacuees contact has been made with a Buddhist group in San Diego for such services at Camp.

Permission received from HQMC to sell health and comfort items and sundries over and above those items furnished as issue to both refugees and returning American nationals. Accordingly, three mobile trailers stocked with MCX items were stationed in refugee billeting areas. Mobile canteens also stationed in camps. Bank of America Mobile Banking facility moved to Camp Talega to provide banking services. Personnel from both the Marine Corps and Navy Food Management Teams on the West Coast have reported aboard to assist in messhall operation. They will be used in supervisory positions. Fifteen cooks from nine West Coast Marine Corps posts and stations have also been ordered into Camp Pendleton to Assist in the preparation of food. All eating utensils being used are disposable, i.e., paper plates, plastic utensils, paper cups, etc.

Thirty seven busses besides other vehicles from the Base Fleet are being continually operated in support of transport requirements. Chartered commercial busses being used between El Toro and CAMPEN have been received on loan from Marine Corps Base, 29 Palms. Boxes are prepared and placed on each bus bringing refugees to Camp Pendleton from El Toro. These boxes contain milk, towels, Kleenex, cigarettes, candy bars, baby powder, baby bottles, etc. In addition, upon arrival at the refugee camp each refugee is given a bag of articles for their personal use. Four different bags are being made up: Men, women, children, and babies. As an example, contents of the men's bag are: soap, toothpaste, toothbrush, shower shoes, bath towel, deodorant, cigarettes and matches, comb, razor, foot powder, shaving cream, dishpan and padlock. In addition to available toilet facilities, 300 chemical heads have been rented. Latest arrivals do not have adequate warm clothing for cool evening temperatures. Field jackets are being issued on a local loan basis. San Onofre evacuee Camp activated. 1400 Quonset billets fully occupied. As the refugees continue to arrive at Camp Pendleton, National News Media interest remains at a very high level. The Camp Pendleton CIB logged 88 newsmen through the center as of 1600 (PDT) this date. As the interest by national media continues, the CIB is seeing representatives from large middle sized cities from around the country. The morning Press briefing was attended by 67 newsmen. Col J. ROSE (JCS Rep) visited evacuee camp and provided helpful information during his debriefing. No significant problems encountered or anticipated at this time. Information regarding breakdown by nationality can not be provided by Civil Coordinator at this time.

OPERATIONS NEW ARRIVALS LOGISTICS ACTION SUMMARY 30 Apr - 1 May 1975

1. The purpose of this summary is to provide information to the Staff on the on-going actions concerning OPERATIONS NEW ARRIVALS.

2. Significant Actions Events

- a. Fonecon with JCS J-4 revealed that the 500 immersion burners provided from USMC assets had arrived on Guam and were being used.
 - b. MGen VAUGHT reported that liaison with Mr. STIEGAN, Defense Depot Ogden, Utah, stated that the last of 23 trucks departed Ogden at 300620 Apr (PDT) with 660 general purpose tents, 47,000 blankets, 15,500 field jackets and 2000 lockers. Subsequent reports from Camp Pendleton revealed first shipment arrived 301800 Apr (PDT) and second shipment at 302200 Apr (PDT).
 - c. A fonecon report to MGen MILLER from BGen GRAHAM provided a detailed report of the refugee situation at Camp Pendleton as of 301545 Apr (PDT). BGen GRAHAM reported the following significant developments:
 - (1) A total of \$2,000,000 has been spent to date which does not include civilian pay or certain items from the DSSC. This total includes \$132,000 clothing, bedding, pillows, etc.; \$851,000 from the DSSC; \$147,000 from self-service; \$53,000 from Navy Support Center; \$443,000 miscellaneous from the DSSC; \$95,000 other miscellaneous; 18,000 chemical heads; \$52,000 health and comfort items.
 - (2) General GRAHAM estimated that the subsistence for 90 days for the 18,000 refugees will be \$3.2 million. He is buying 18,000 sets of chopsticks and bowls. He is buying these items incrementally. He stated that yesterday he noticed that most of the refugees were not eating at the messhalls but were taking the food and eating in their quarters or on the ground, apparently in family groups.
 - (3) General GRAHAM stated that they have had a large amount of media coverage including reporters from Canada, England, France, Belgium, as well as reporters from the Chicago Tribune, Washington Post, and all the major TV stations.

- (4) There are 900 Cambodians who will be arriving in the near future; 200 on 3 May, 200 on 4 May, and 500 on 5 May. General GRAHAM will billet them at San Onofre which is capable of holding 1400 people.
- (5) He is receiving calls from all over the country including one from the staff of Senator KENNEDY. There is no indication that Senator KENNEDY is going to visit Camp Pendleton but is seeking information only.

This operation continues to have high national press interest. Every national network, wire service and many major newspapers and radio stations were represented by the 93 newsmen who visited the press center in the refugee area Two press briefings were held by DPAO, Civil Coordinator, and other federal agency representatives. No problems encountered or anticipated at this time. Dr. Cowan, Assistant Sec Def for Health and Environment visited the evacuee encampment at Camp Talega and observed support and processing procedures.

- Maj E. V. COX (LFS-4) reported MCB Camp Pendleton (LCol MUFFI) had requested use of Navy Food Team personnel to assist in refugee feeding. Maj COX granted Marine Corps approval to C.O. Navy Food Service System office (Capt TOMSUDEN).
- 1545 MGen MILLER, DC/S, I&L, received telecon report of operations from CG, MCB Camp Pendleton (BGen GRAHAM).

- 1730 Col BERTHOUD (LM) reported that MCSA Philadelphia had been instructed by CMC msg to stop all shipments to RVN. Estimated completion date is 6 May 1975.
- SecState defined these terms: New Life, New Horizons, and New Arrivals. Capt. WHELAN (State Dept) advised New Life pulling refugees out of combat area to staging areas (Guam, etc). New Horizons was a temporary term associated w/refugee effort in CONUS. New Arrivals has replaced New Horizons. Passed same to Col SULIK (FMFPAC).



- 2245 Col REDFIELD (FMFPac, G-4) called concerning ETA of first A/C. His info from J-4 CINCPAC 8-C141's to arrive at 2230, 28 Apr 1975. Reported that MGen MILLER's info indicated ETA first A/C 1200 PDT NLT 1500 PDT. MGen MILLER's info related to J-4 meeting with Adm WESLER and Gen CASEY.

- O355 Col NELSON called concerning status of 28 refugees who landed at NAS Los Alomitas. Gave Col an up to date account and continued to make contact with NAS Los Alomitas.
- Called CO NAS Long Beach (LtCmd PICHEL) requested permission to billet evacuees upon arrival since Camp Pendleton did not desire that evacuees arrive until subsequent to 1200, 29Apr75. He indicated he would make contact with CO and other responsible individuals for direction.
