

1. Purpose. The purpose of this memorandum is to obtain a decision relative to proceeding with a mess contract award in support of the refugee operation at MCB, Camp Pendleton.

2. Discussion

a. Reference (a) provides a planning close out date for the Camp Pendleton refugee center of on or about 1 October 1975.

b. Although contractor proposals are still under review, it is anticipated that the review will be completed and a contract award can be made on or about 14 July 1975.

c. Based on the above estimate, feeding under the contract would begin approximately 28 July 1975. The overall six month cost is anticipated to be about \$4.8 million.

d. Provisions of the contract include a termination clause in the event of an early close out. Best estimate of the cost of terminating the contract on 1 October 1975 is \$300,000 to \$350,000.

e. With the awarding of the Mess Contract, approximately 850 Marines now engaged in mess related duties will be returned to their parent organizations. Operational readiness will improve. Morale is expected to improve.

✓ f. Adverse reaction and publicity may be anticipated due to the termination cost, should the 1 October close out occur.

g. Authority to enter into the contract agreement, to include funding authority, has been granted by the Secretary of Defense. Financial obligations incurred by the Marine Corps are reimbursable under special funding provisions for the refugee operation.

3. Summary. The possibility of payment of a \$350,000 termination cost (22 percent of the estimated \$1.6 million contract cost incurred) and resultant adverse reaction must be weighed against the availability of 850 Marines for a two month or longer period. The reliability of the 1 October close out date is suspect. It is more likely that a later close out will occur.

4. Recommendation. It is recommended that the DC/S for I&L be authorized to continue the contract review currently underway with the intent of making an appropriate contract award.

- Competitive solicitation issued 1 June 1975; ten proposals received.
- Performance proposals evaluated; five firms' performance proposals were found to be acceptable.
- Discussions held with five firms; "best and final offers" requested by 0900 PDT Tuesday, 17 June 1975.
- Southeastern Services Inc. protested to Contracting Officer and GAO (this firm eliminated based on unacceptable performance proposal).
- Protest is that (i) should've been formally advertised (ii) firm should not have been eliminated.
- Protestant also in contact with offices of Senator Eastland and Stennis (Miss.) and Representative Montgomery (Miss.)
- Navy Procurement Directives (NPD) require that a "Business Clearance Memorandum" go to NAVMAT for approval.
- Discussions with NAVMAT Procurement Control and Clearance Division and Navy Office of General Counsel bring conclusion that the five firms eliminated previously

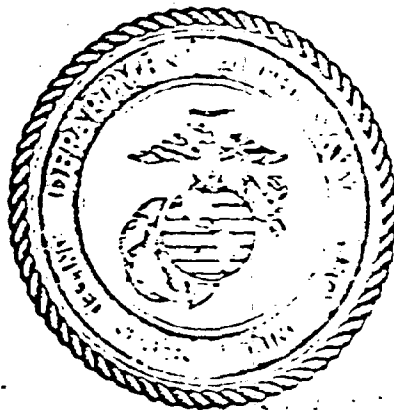

POINT PAPER

Subj: Phasedown of Operation New Arrivals

1. Phasedown Plan

a. A phasedown plan for Operation New Arrivals, initiated by the JCS J-4, was forwarded to the Inter Agency Task Force (IATF) on 19 June 1975 via SECDEF. The IATF is an organization, appointed by the President, to coordinate all government actions concerning evacuation and humanitarian assistance to Vietnamese and Cambodian refugees. The IATF operates under the overall cognizance of the Secretary of State. The point of contact on refugee matters for SECDEF is Mr. Von Marbod, who is the Principal Deputy to the Assistant Secretary of Defense, Comptroller.

b. This plan provides target dates for the close out of the four CONUS refugee centers and the establishment of a HEW administered refugee center. The plan is currently being evaluated by Ms. Taft, Head, IATF and is tentatively scheduled to be announced by 3 July 1975. The announcement is expected to include site selection of the HEW camp.

c. The phasedown schedule for each refugee center is included in this plan; however, the calculated dates are based upon the continuation of the present refugee processing-out rate and the establishment in August of the HEW camp, which is designed to receive refugees from the other centers. Planned capacity for the HEW camp is 15,000. The plan, in its present form, provides for the refugee center at Camp Pendleton to be phased down and closed out by 1 September 1975. However, Vice Admiral Weschler, J-4 JCS, has informally advised that a more realistic close out date for Camp Pendleton is 1 October 1975.

2. Messing Contract at Camp Pendleton

a. Action has been taken by the I&L Department to modify the refugee messing contract proposal to include a cancellation clause covering the contingency for early phaseout. Bidding negotiations will now be reopened. It is anticipated that the earliest the contract can be awarded is 8 July 1975. Messing service by the contractor would commence in late July.

b. With the announcement by the JCS of a firm close out date for Camp Pendleton expected by 3 July, an evaluation can be made at that time to determine if the actual awarding of the contract is desirable. If, for example, the close out date is 1 September 1975, the cancellation penalty for a one month operation (August) may be excessive and unfavorable publicity may result.

### 3. Guidance to the Field

a. On 6 June 1975 CG FMFPac sent a message to this Headquarters which discussed the impact on readiness of the operation of the Camp Pendleton refugee center. He requested that a target date for close out be provided so that training and personnel planning could be adjusted. A CMC reply provided a target date of 11 August 1975, which was based upon the best information available at the time.

b. Plans and informal discussions, referenced in paragraph 1 above, indicate that Marine Corps involvement in the operation of the Camp Pendleton refugee center will be extended up to 60 days beyond the 11 August date provided to CG FMFPac.

### 4. Summary of Planned Action

a. Prepare, staff, and forward for Chief of Staff release a CMC personal message to CG FMFPac (info: CG I MAF and CG MCB Camp Pendleton) which would explain that the 11 August close out date for the Camp Pendleton refugee center does not appear to be valid in view of plans now being finalized at higher governmental levels. The September/October planning dates would be provided. A "personal" is recommended because of the sensitivity of these close out dates.

b. Prepare, staff, and forward for Chief of Staff release a CMC message to the JCS requesting necessary phase-down information and the close out date of the Camp Pendleton refugee center, if this notification has not been received by 3 July 1975.

# Around 15,000 Refugees Expected To Settle In State

**CAMP PENDLETON** — John Eisenhower, chairman of President Ford's special commission on refugees, predicted yesterday that no more than 15,000 refugees, if that many, would settle in California.

Eisenhower was asked following a tour of Tent Camp 8 — the same visited recently by First Lady Betty Ford — if he agreed with Mario Obledo, California secretary of health and welfare, that as many as 80,000 Vietnamese and Cambodian refugees might settle in the state.

He replied that he and Nick Thorne, head of the civilian Interagency Task Force at Camp Pendleton, estimated that 15,000 refugees in California "would be on the high side" and 10,000 "on the low side."

## VISITS NIXON

Eisenhower toured the camp for two hours then went across Interstate 5 to the residence of former President Richard M. Nixon where, Eisenhower said, "dinner is at 6:30." Eisenhower's son, David, is married to the former president's daughter, Julie.

Asked if Nixon had made any unannounced visits to the Camp Pendleton refugee camp, Eisenhower said he did not know. The turnoff from Interstate 5 to the Nixon compound is the same as the one for the refugee camp. — El Camino Real

Eisenhower, son of President Dwight D. Eisenhower, said he regretted a statement he made shortly after being appointed to the commission to the effect that some refugees might have to spend the rest of their lives in camps.

## CLARIFIES REMARK

He said he was referring to only a very small number, persons who are identified by immigration officials as undesirables but who cannot be repatriated to Vietnam.

Eisenhower said acceptance of the refugees by Americans has improved since President Ford denounced persons who expressed dissatisfaction with their presence here.

"Especially after Mr. Ford's statement," Eisenhower said, "people have come to their senses and it (reaction to the refugees) couldn't be more favorable."

Eisenhower was escorted through Tent Camp 8 by Brig. Gen. Paul Graham, commanding general of Camp Pendleton. He was shown a library by its organizer, Tran Tung Thanh, who

told Eisenhower he hoped to continue law school in this country.

Then he stopped in a classroom where children were learning English, and paused briefly at a recreation area where Mark and Chris Landgreen, Encinitas residents who are YMCA volunteers, were supervising a basketball game.

## ANOTHER VISITOR

Hoang Ha Thanh, elected Vietnamese camp manager for Camp 8, asked Eisenhower to accept the gratitude of Camp 8's 5,000 residents for visiting the camp, and added that thanks should go also to the Marines and the American people.

Another visitor yesterday was George Elsey, president of the American Red Cross. After a tour of the camp, he

quipped "Either things are going very well or no one is speaking honestly to me."

He said this was his first tour of a refugee camp because "in the beginning people from headquarters is the last thing that is needed." He said he was pleased with the Red Cross operation which like the refugee camp itself will mark its first month anniversary today.

Elsey said he believed some Americans were under a "misapprehension that 130,000 refugees will be negative for the economy. 'We have 400,000 immigrants coming to this country every year and we never think anything about it. I think the idea that these refugees will be a drain on the country' is exaggerated — a myth."

CAMP PENDLETON — Fallbrook High students visiting teenage Vietnamese refugees here Tuesday afternoon found a way to bridge cultures.

The students communicated through a dance called "the bump," which the Fallbrook students taught their Vietnamese counterparts.

But the Americans also discovered certain things that they probably didn't know about the

Vietnamese youths — specifically, that rock music is a mainstay with them, too.

Several Vietnamese youngsters picked up instruments during the afternoon's festivities and played rock music familiar to most Americans, including a Vietnamese guitarist doing his impression of the late Jimi Hendrix.

The Fallbrook students found the afternoon a highly-rewarding experience.

Kathleen Lawler said that she

was impressed by the affection that the Vietnamese people showed for one another.

"It inspired me," stated Kris Spanjan. "There should be more Americans like them."

Debbie Drew recalled that the feeling of friendship between Americans and Vietnamese was mutual.

"A little kid said, 'You're not what I thought you'd be,' I said, 'Why?' He said, 'You're friendly,' " she recalled.

# War Criminals Among Refugees?

A national magazine has reported a group of notorious former South Vietnamese officials and CIA-trained assassins are among the 18,000 refugees at Camp Pendleton.

New Times magazine, in an article entitled "A Rogue's Gallery of Refugees," cites the presence of prominent Vietnamese officials who derived considerable wealth from the narcotics trade, CIA-trained agents from Operation Phoenix, and members of the Saigon government's secret police among the refugees.

"The vast majority of Vietnamese here or still on Guam are war victims rather than war criminals," the article states, before listing the names of the infamous figures believed to be in this country.

The article cites a San Francisco Examiner report that the Central Intelligence Agency aided the evacuation of 5,000 trained assassins from Operation Phoenix to this country.

Phoenix squads reportedly killed

20,000 South Vietnamese civilians during the war.

The CIA is also reportedly expediting the processing of these individuals out of the refugee camps, avoiding normal lengthy processing.

The magazine story substantiates earlier reports to The Blade Tribune by refugees on Camp Pendleton, who have declined to talk about certain matters or to give their names because, they said, they feared reprisals from CIA-trained agents at Camp Pendleton.

Besides the agents said to be on the base, other notorious individuals, according to the article, include Gen. Trang Si Tan, former Saigon police chief, who was said to be at Pendleton having meals brought to him in his tent while others wait in line.

Tan reportedly had a reputation as a torturer exceeded only by Colonel Nguyen Mau, also said to be at Camp Pendleton.

A former director of a special branch of the national police, Mau,

according to Johnson administration official Robert Komer, was involved Operation Phoenix.

A French schoolteacher named Jean Pierre Debris stated that in July 1970 he witnessed Mau's men bind a Vietnamese prisoner hand and foot to a bench, tie a rag over his nose, and pour soapy water and crankcase oil down his throat.

Debris, once a political prisoner, said that Mau also ordered other such tortures as needles put under the nails of prisoners and electric shock.

Colonel Nguyen Minh Chau, warden at the infamous Con Son prison, is reportedly at Pendleton, too.

The jailer gained infamy by putting five inmates — male and female — into tiger cages, five by nine feet, and refusing food and often water.

Others who have been reported seen at Camp Pendleton include General Huynh Thai Tay, chief of the special police branch investigating Viet Cong

suspects, and Brigadier General Tran Van Giau, who conducted surveillance on opposition South Vietnamese politicians.

Gen. Tay, reportedly was processed in Guam under the name Truong Bay. Gen. Giau, described as "one of the most hated figures in the deposed regime," identified himself as an infantry colonel.

One of the most notorious of all South Vietnamese officials was General Nguyen Ngoc Loan, who gained infamy by executing a Viet Cong suspect with a bullet to the head in front of United States television cameras during the 1968 Tet offensive.

Loan, according to New Times and also a former Vietnamese journalist interviewed by The Blade-Tribune last week, was seen among the refugees on Guam, although his present whereabouts are unknown.

Loan, the magazine article states, "acted as then-Premier Nguyen Cao Ky's bagman and enforcer, collecting kickbacks from the opium trade."

He reportedly ordered the assassination of an opposition legislator during the 1967 Vietnamese election.

The presence of CIA-trained assassins had previously sparked some concern in Washington.

Sen. James Abourezk (D-S.D.) had attempted to introduce legislation in Congress forbidding the CIA to hire any Vietnamese who participated in the Phoenix program.

But Abourezk doubted the effect of such a bill.

"I seriously doubt whether the CIA will identify its hand-picked murderers," he said.

## *Salvation Army Aids Refugees*

**CAMP PENDLETON —** The Salvation Army staffs from San Diego and Oceanside have been busy assisting the Vietnamese refugees since their arrival at Camp Pendleton.

According to Major Harland J. Hall, director of the Salvation Army Men's Social Service Center of San Diego, "The 275 volunteers have worked hundreds of hours in the past two weeks and had distributed more than 52 tons of clothing and shoes."

of clothing items have been distributed through the efforts of the volunteers, the Salvation Army officials say they need more volunteers to work in the afternoon to aid in the distributing.

# Pendleton Confirms Officials' Presence

**CAMP PENDLETON** — The presence of South Vietnamese special police chief Gen. Huynh Thai Tay in the refugee camp here has been confirmed by officials.

Tay, who was in charge of the investigation of possible Viet Cong suspects while in Vietnam, was recently cited by a national news magazine as one of a group of notorious South Vietnamese government officials who had been evacuated to this country.

New Times magazine also reported the presence of Gen. Trang Si Tan, former Saigon police chief, and Brig. Gen. Tran Van Giau, who oversaw the surveillance of opposition South Vietnamese officials, at Camp Pendleton.

Officials at Camp Pendleton said that Tan and Giau were both released on May 10 under the Immigration and Naturalization Service's "High Risk Category 2." INS public information officer Janet Gordon in Washington said today that Category 2 was instituted just prior to the downfall of the South Vietnamese government. It relates to past and present Vietnamese who were employees of the U.S. government, U.S. firms, and volunteer agencies.

There were no records regarding the presence of Colonel Nguyen Mau, a former director of the special branch of the National Police who allegedly tortured prisoners or Col. Nguyen Van Giau, who issued a directive that the government disregard provisions of the Paris Peace agreement regarding political prisoners.

Lt. Col. Arthur Brill, Marine Corps spokesman at the base, stated "All the refugees are being treated the same with the exception of the two

gentleman who were exceptions because of the agreement with the INS."

The New Times article charged that the former officials were receiving favorable treatment.

## Chula Vistans Host Family Of Refugees

The bags of belongings carted from a Camp Pendleton storage house were piled into the closet, but already the Harold McCurley residence shows evidence of a warm settling in. A bottle of Vietnamese fish sauce stands on the kitchen cabinet. Mrs. McCurley — Dorothy — and Le Thi Phuong smile as a child plays with a new Raggedy Ann doll. Outside in a peaceful Chula Vista backyard, Nguyen Long Phuong helps McCurley — "Mr. Bill" — hammer the dents out of a 1970 Renault.

### FIRST DAY

The Phuongs and their two children spent their first day yesterday at the home of their sponsors, a Rohr employee and his wife. Both families reviewed the day as one being "wonderfully caught up in the spirit of adjusting."

The Phuongs arrived at their sponsor's home, a modest white stucco house which McCurley said seemed to grow too large after their own two daughters married, late Thursday afternoon.

Friends and neighbors of

the McCurleys served them a Cantonese dinner and they settled in an 1850 fireplace and have a good night's sleep. Mrs. McCurley's grandparents.

"I was so happy to see such a large house — and an electric blanket," said Mrs. Phuong. "The nights were cold at Camp Pendleton."

### CHURCH AID

Yesterday morning began with a bacon and eggs breakfast and a visit to the Chula Vista First Presbyterian Church which is helping the sponsors with financial assistance for the refugee family.

The church provided them with additional clothing and the Phuongs enrolled their children in Sunday school. Then, they went shopping at Sears & Roebuck in Chula Vista. Purchases included denim, levis and a plastic dump truck for Hung, 3, and a doll for Duyen Nhung, 9.

The children greeted McCurley with their toys at the front door upon his arrival home from work.

Last night, the two families planned a quiet dinner at home with meat loaf and rice with fish sauce among the items on the menu.

After dinner, they intended to watch color television, a pastime which the Phuongs have not enjoyed before.

### ADJUST TO LIFE

The McCurleys have asked the Phuongs to stay as long as they wish to become adjusted to American life.

"But we don't want to trouble them more than necessary," said Phuong, 33, a former typewriter salesman in Saigon. He hopes to find work in the San Diego area so that "when we leave Mr. Bill's we will be able to come back and remember their kindness to us."

"We were just sitting here and these people have a need," said McCurley. "And we're hitting it off just lovely. If they can fix rice, we can fix hamburgers."

# Refugees cut donated clothes down to size

CAMP PENDLETON — Seven sewing machines hummed at a steady pace. Seven women sat bent over the machines with steady concentration.

There was no small talk — it was all business.

Then it happened. A machine went on the blink.

The two women on either side of the crippled machine stopped working and a conference ensued among the women.

When the problem was solved, the women smiled at one another and went back to their work.

The women, Vietnamese refugees, find the machines to be among the most useful things at this camp.

Most of the clothes donated to the refugees are many sizes too big. A Vietnamese woman who wears a size 10 is large by their standards.

Before the alterations are accomplished on these machines, the women look like youngsters dressing up in their mothers' clothes.

One girl was able to make two skirts from one she was given.

Most of the clothing donated is made with warm fabrics — and for this the recipients are grateful. "Being cold is hardest for the children," Thao Do Thi Dong said.

She was making long pants for her 5-year-old daughter from a pleated wool skirt.

Mrs. Thao did have some time to go home and pack a few articles of clothing for herself and her daughter before the two fled South Vietnam. "But I didn't know where we were going — what the climate would be like — so I guessed about what to pack," she said.

Mrs. Thao guessed wrong. The clothing she packed would be great for Chicago in August.

The temperatures here fall to the mid-30s in the night. "It is very cold here in the early morning," she said. "Just when it begins to get warm the night begins to come and it gets very cold again."

Dao Thi Ngoc Thuy recalled having second thoughts about the clothing she had packed in Vietnam while waiting for an airplane to take her family out. "We had been waiting at the airport for a day and my younger sister wanted to go home and get some rest," she said. "She was going to bring back some warmer clothing for the children after she took a nap. But right after she left we were told to board a plane. I never saw her again."

Mrs. Dao was making long pants here for her son, 4, and her daughter, 6. The material selected was thick wool.

Mrs. Dao's husband is a flight surgeon. The family will soon move to a small community in Nebraska. "I ask the Americans here about the weather there," she said, "and they tell me if I think it's cold here just wait till I get there."

The sewing-machine center was the idea of several Marine Corps officers and the Assistance League of Laguna Beach.

Some of the machines are old and some are very old. "We brought one machine here that was made in the early 1900s," said Mrs. Carroll Clappitt, a member of the league. "One of our members' grandmother insisted that we bring it here for these women."

No two machines thread or operate the same way.

At one time, several out-of-order were on the list. Several women were at each machine talking very fast and looking very puzzled. Two of the machines had the same problem. The thread from the bobbin was bunched up and tearing the material.

The women had just about decided

to give up when Sgt. A.C. Clausell entered the small Quonset hut.

He had been assigned to escort a reporter around the camp. Clausell approached the women to find out what was wrong. Soon they talked him into sitting down and playing repairman. "All I can do is fail," he told the women, "so I might as well give it a try." The women didn't understand English but they were jubilant.

Sgt. Clausell was busy for the next hour, going from one machine to the next with the same results each time — success.

It was obvious the women had found a hero. "I enjoyed helping them," Clausell said. "But I'm glad I'm getting out of here — would you believe I don't know a thing about fixing a sewing machine?"

The women waiting for their turn to use the sewing machines were talking, knitting and playing games with the children.

Tran Huong, 17, sat off in a corner reading a book. "It's 'Huckleberry Finn,'" she said. "I laugh much."

Miss Tran was waiting her turn for a machine to get an early start on next fall's school wardrobe. "We will be living in Escondido," she said. "I hope the public school will accept me to study there."

Miss Tran had planned to come to the United States in July as an American Field Service student. "I came early and instead of just a visit I will live here," she said. "I am glad."

There are 18 machines in the eight tent camps here. The machines are used from sunup to sundown — even a few men come to alter pants or shirts.

Much of the used clothing, being ripped apart to be remade into something smaller was donated by the Salvation Army.

So far, nothing donated has lacked a willing new owner.

In fact, some of the resewn clothes come out looking so good that a fashion show might be in order.

**TOUCH OF CLASS IN TENT CITY****Blind prince feels for refugees****By ROBERT DIETRICH**

**CAMP PENDLETON —** "I was a penniless immigrant 11 years ago," explained Dr. Wilhelm De Nijs, 58, once an Indonesian prince, as he navigated the main street of refugee tent city No. 5.

He walked rapidly, using his white cane to feel for guy ropes and tent stakes.

He has been blind since the last months of World War II.

The blind, deaf, mute, retarded and emotionally disturbed among the 18,000 South Vietnamese and Cambodians here have been his special concern for the past 10 days.

"I would like to help them do as I have done," he said, suddenly stopping his walk, "to help them pull themselves away from pity to accomplishment."

He stopped because he sensed Le Phu Quy, a 13-year-old boy blinded in a Saigon accident four years ago, stood before him confidently holding a small white cane. De Nijs gave him the day before.

"How are you Quy?" the doctor asked.

"Hello sir," the boy replied. "I am fine, thank you. How are you?"

Those are among the first English words Quy spoke in his life.

"He has a 40-word English vocabulary now, my own knowledge of Vietnamese is limited to five words," De Nijs said.

The ex-prince, now a U.S. citizen who directs Services for the Blind in Santa Ana, volunteered to help teach English to refugees unable to attend regular language classes here.

The American Red Cross team here arranged for De Nijs to hold classes in a tent twice a week and will have a trailer schoolhouse ready for him next week.

Quy, already able to write Vietnamese in a cursive typewriter, is building up his English vocabulary through an interpreter who follows De Nijs' lesson guides.

Quy's new white cane, coupled with orientation lessons, allows him to walk to the camp washhouse now without the aid of an escort.

The circumstances that led De Nijs from his once royal birthplace on the Indonesian island of Java, started with duty as an intelligence officer in the British army, exile by the Communist former Indonesian President Sukarno and elevation to the Hindu Brahmin priesthood.

"I am the second son of the last king of Surakarta," he said.

He lost his eyesight while on a sabotage mission behind enemy lines in World War II.

After his exile, friends brought him to Santa Ana and helped him start a program for aiding low-income blind persons.

"I did not want to live out the rest of my life in a rocking chair."

He later expanded his project to include retarded and emotionally disturbed youths and teen-agers from minority ghettos.

"We also began working with the hopeless elderly.

"Our aim is unique," he said. "We are not seeking to find employment — they would be the last in the pecking order and the first to be fired.

"We want to encourage entrepreneurship — starting a business on a small scale. Our market place is the swap meets.

"I think we can do the same with some of the Southeast Asians resettling here. Some of them, I am

sure, can be valuable in working with Americans.

"They will not take jobs away from Americans, but, perhaps, create new industries."

De Nijs said he decided to work with disadvantaged Americans after realizing how the Communists exploited peasant classes in Asian revolutions.

"Communists exploit people without hope. They know people like that have no fear of losing what they do not have. When your home is nothing more than a slum, you are willing to lay down your life for something better."

"I predict that if we do not counter this trend of hopelessness among our American disadvantaged, we will be fighting Communists in this country.

De Nijs says he will sponsor as many Indochina refugees as possible."

## Taels of gold brighten the pockets of refugees

CAMP PENDLETON — A Vietnamese refugee haltingly enters the trailer, flashes a nervous smile and pulls a small package wrapped in crumpled paper from the pocket of his Marine fatigue jacket.

"I bring you this from Vietnam," he said as he handed the package to the gold dealer.

Inside the package was three taels of nearly pure gold.

As he left the portable office of Deak and Co. here, relieved of his gold but with \$534 in his pocket, the refugee passed a long line of others waiting to dispose of the gold they took with them when they fled South Vietnam.

"We haven't had anyone come in with sacks of gold to sell," Yves Gandillon said, as he adjusted the scales to weigh a 1.2-oz. tael of gold. "The people in Saigon who had the means to accumulate that much gold would have established Swiss bank accounts long before the country fell."

"Most of the people who come to us want to sell a few taels so they can buy shoes, warm clothing and other supplies on the base. I'm sure they have more gold with them but

are waiting to see how the price goes."

A tael is made up of two wafer-thin sheets of gold which, when wrapped in a covering paper, is roughly the size of a package of cigarette papers.

The gold sheets are marked with stamps and the names of the four cities in which they are produced — Saigon, Hong Kong, Hanoi and Phnom Penh.

"Many people in the Far East have gold because, like in most troubled countries, gold and jewels are the only forms of barter you can depend on," Gandillon said. "Most of the people here are upper income Vietnamese who probably bought the gold on a hedge against their country falling."

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The Deak office here also exchanges foreign currency. Unfortunately for some of the refugees, one of the currencies the firm doesn't exchange is the Vietnamese piaster.

"This man has 10 million piasters he wants to sell," Gandillon said, breaking off his conversation in French with the refugee. "About all the piaster is good for now is papering a room."

At the time Vietnam fell, the exchange rate was 3,000 piasters to the dollar — or \$3,333 for the refugees' 10 million piasters.

"But the exchange rate a few months ago was 400 to 500 piasters to the dollar," Tom Kelly of the Deak office said, which would have brought the man with the now worthless piasters \$20,000 to \$25,000.

"We deal in 120 different currencies," Gandillon said. "The only ones we don't handle are from Vietnam, Burma, Chile and Cyprus. The governments in those countries are just too unsettled."

Unable to sell his piasters, the refugee reaches into his pocket and produces five taels of gold.

Taking the \$890 payment in the form of a check, he inquires how he should go about having the money deposited in his account in a North Dakota bank.

The gold price, based on the New York gold exchange price, changes daily. It is currently on the upswing, moving from \$175 a tael to \$178 yesterday.

"We are gamblers, as we have no machines here to check purity," Kelly said. "Pure gold is .9999 — there is no such thing as 1.000 as gold has to have come compounds in it to keep it together. We have no way of checking to see if the gold we buy is .95, .96, .97 or more. We can only hope."

Currency is also a gamble.

"A couple of days ago, if you had French francs you would have a good deal," Gandillon said.

"Today, you would take a bath. It's a gamble but the advantage we have is that we can wait longer to sell since we're a large company."

Most of the refugees here didn't arrive empty handed. They come to the gold office daily to exchange French francs, Hong Kong dollars, Thai bahts, a few gold coins, British pounds and U.S. dollars.

Some, who worked for the United States in Vietnam, have arrived with U.S. Treasury checks to cash.

# Cubans Share Roles With Vietnamese

**CAMP PENDLETON** — A group of 60 Cubans who came to the United States as refugees in the '60s drove here from Los Angeles yesterday to tell hundreds of Vietnamese that a good life awaits them in the United States.

Their spokesman, Jose Marrero, president of the Cuban Chamber of Commerce of Los Angeles, also told the Vietnamese refugees they shared a common bond as victims of communism.

## 'KNOW EMOTION'

"We know the emotion and sadness you feel when you leave your country and can't return," he said. "No one else can understand what it is like to be an exile unless he goes through it."

"Like us, you have lost maybe the battle but have not lost the war against the enemy of freedom, communism," said Marrero.

"We have to keep this country for freedom," Marrero added with emotion.

Maj. Louis Andrews of the refugee affairs office said Marrero's speech was strictly impromptu. When Marrero started talking about "joining us in the fight against communism," Andrews said, military authorities asked him to tone down his political remarks.

Marrero complied, telling reporters later he was not talking about a "fight" in a military sense, but rather about resisting "movements in Congress to bring this country to a Socialist-Communist situation."

Andrews said the Cubans requested permission about 10 days ago to distribute

clothing and toys to the Vietnamese refugees. He said their request was approved by State Department officials at the camp.

## MANY QUESTIONS

Marrero delivered his speech to about 300 Vietnamese refugees seated in bleachers near Tent Camp 8. When he finished, the Vietnamese surrounded him and others in his party and plied them with questions about the United States.

George Reyes, a Cuban who now owns a sewing factory in Los Angeles, was one of those questioned. There was the following exchange:

"How long do you have to wait until you can become a citizen?"

"About five years," said Reyes. "First you will become permanent residents."

"Did you have a sponsor?"

"Yes, a relative."

"Did you have problems with the Americans when you first came over?" asked one Vietnamese.

"No," said Reyes.

"What about difference in race?" asked another. "Will we have problems because we are not white?"

"No," said Reyes, "tell the people that you are Vietnamese. They will be sympathetic. They will help you."

"What if we cannot get a job?" asked another.

"The government will help you find one, and it will give you some money while you are looking," Reyes said.

"This country is the best."

Hoang Kiem Nam, a former journalist in Vietnam, told American newsmen he was glad the Cubans came.

"We do not feel so lonely anymore," said Nam. "We see they went through the same thing. They talked to

us like brothers and it causes a warm feeling."

Ngo Khac Thuat, a former lieutenant colonel in the Vietnamese air force, said of the Cubans: "I think we are on the same side, fighting against the Communists. We are from different countries, but we had the same experience."

## 'HAPPY IN AMERICA'

"Like them," Thuat added, "we are happy in America, but we will dream of someday going back to Vietnam when the opportunity is right. We should never lose our tradition."

Elsewhere in the camp yesterday, crowds of children watched San Diego's puppet lady, Marie Hitchcock, give several performances during the day.

The refugee population yesterday was listed at 15,562.

## U.N. OFFICIAL WILL MEET REFUGEES

FT. CHAFFEE, Ark. (UPI)—Vietnamese refugees who want to return to their homeland will meet with a U.N. official today—the deadline they set for avoiding a peaceful demonstration.

Post officials said a U.N. official from Geneva will visit the fort to meet with the 207 refugees who said they want to return to Vietnam. Le Minh Tan, leader of the refugee group, said they will protest the delay unless some action is taken by today.

Chief Army spokesman Col. Joe Rogers said post officials were notified Tuesday about the visit of the U.N. official, but did not have the representative's full name or time of arrival.

Helping the refugees who want to return to Vietnam has developed into a problem for relocation officials because they want assurances the refugees will not be harmed or punished if they return.

Tan said that the refugees are thankful for the help they received from the Americans but that they wanted to return to their homeland. He said most of the refugees who want to return to Vietnam left members of their family behind during the evacuation.

Meanwhile, officials at the University of Arkansas medical center at Little Rock announced that a 10-year-old refugee girl from Ft. Chaffee underwent surgery for removal of a tumor from her abdomen. Hospital officials said Huyen Le was in fair condition following removal of the 6-7-pound tumor.

The child visited with her parents following the surgery and was communicating with nurses through an interpreter. Hospital officials said a pathology report on the tumor was expected later Wednesday.

The refugee flights to Chaffee are expected to resume today. The flights were postponed Monday because the refugee population exceeded the 24,000 ceiling set by the Pentagon. There were 24,651 refugees at the post Tuesday.

Post officials announced during Tuesday's briefing that 170 refugees completed processing and left the post during the previous 24-hour period. Officials said 2,544 refugees completed processing since the relocation center was opened earlier this month.

## States Agreeing to Aid Refugees

WASHINGTON (UPI)—States and cities as well as thousands of persons across the country are volunteering to help resettle displaced Indochina refugees, the chief spokesman for President Ford's refugee task force said Wednesday.

Ellen Green of the Interagency Refugee Task Force said thousands of refugees being brought into the United States from Vietnam and Cambodia need have no fear of being sent back home through lack of charity on the part of Americans.

"I can say firmly that we are not going to run out of sponsors whatever else happens," she said.

Washington state, under the aegis of Gov. Dan Evans, is taking 500 families and another state has also expressed interest in taking between 3,000 and 4,000 refugee families, she said.

Another four states and at least two cities have shown interest, Miss Green said. But she declined to name the cities and states concerned.

She said the sponsorship program has received a big boost as a result of state and municipal interest and has resulted in a change allowing state and local governments to receive up to \$500 for each refugee resettled.

There has been no shortage of sponsors offering either to take whole families to live with them or provide jobs.

## Vietnamese Refugee Population at Eglin Now Stands at 4,822

EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. (UPI)—The refugee population of the Vietnamese relocation center here now stands at 4,822, but a base spokesman said officials had decided not to fill the camp to its 5,000 capacity.

"It has been decided that the total will never be allowed to reach that figure," the spokesman said after another plane load of 165 refugees arrived at the camp from Guam aboard a DC-8 flight.

An additional 684 refugees have been processed out of the camp for new homes in the United States and Canada. Twenty-four left the camp Monday.

An Atlanta representative of a soy-sauce manufacturer called the refugee camp to offer to donate 100 cases of the product to spice the bland Air Force diet being fed to the refugees. The spokesman said procedures for the shipment were being checked out.

However, the spokesman said no source has been found for "Nuoc Mam," the spicy fermented fish sauce Vietnamese love and use on most of their food. "Apparently most of the Vietnamese already in this country make their own," he said.

Refugees at the camp are also doing without chopsticks.

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## 341 Viet Refugees Arrive at 4th U.S. Military Base

Ft. Indiantown Gap, Pa. Becomes Temporary Home  
for Group; Navy Officer Thanks 2,000 Welcomers

LANCASTER, Pa. (AP)—The fourth U.S. military base picked to handle Indochina refugees got its first arrivals Wednesday when a planeload of Vietnamese arrived here after a 120-hour flight from Guam.

The tired group of 341 refugees made their temporary home at Ft. Indiantown Gap, a military base in the rolling farm hills of Pennsylvania.

"We hope we'll have a good life here," said Chu Xuan Dinh, a telephone technician from Saigon. "I hope we'll have many things better."

The refugees, mostly middle-aged parents and their children, wore American clothes and smiled at the 2,000 persons who greeted their arrival at Harrisburg International Airport.

They continued by chartered bus to Ft. Indiantown Gap, a 200,000-acre military reservation about 25 miles northeast of Harrisburg.

Big-eyed children stared at their new surroundings. Their parents carried small packages of belongings and treated gawking Americans with quiet courtesy.

"Permit me to thank you for your hospitality," said Lan Nguon Tann, a former South Vietnamese navy officer

who spoke at an airport welcoming ceremony. "We are grateful to you."

Ft. Indiantown Gap is the fourth military base in the country to be pressed into service as a temporary home for refugees. Federal officials said there now are 24,700 refugees at Ft. Chaffee, Ark.; 18,000 at Camp Pendleton, Calif.; and 4,822 at Eglin Air Force Base, Fla.

Army and civilian authorities at Ft. Indiantown Gap said they expect a total of 15,000 refugees to arrive from the Pacific in the next 10 days. They said they had no idea how long the people would remain.

They are quartered in the same wooden barracks that housed World War II troops on their way to Europe. Army and civilian carpenters built partitions in dozens of the two-story buildings to add some privacy for families.

Volunteer groups, most with religious affiliations, are coordinating efforts to find jobs and sponsors for refugee families.

Gov. Milton J. Shapp led brief welcoming ceremonies. The crowd cheered once as the refugees left their plane and again when the eight buses pulled out.

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# Refugee Education Planned

The federal government will probably contract with schools and universities for education of Vietnamese refugees, a federal official said here yesterday.

Kathy Doolin, planning administrator for the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), said officials are negotiating with a national educational agency which would subcontract with individual schools such as San Diego State University for refugee educational programs.

She did not identify the agency but said a broadly written contract would be completed in a week or so.

## SOME CONFUSION

Meanwhile, local school officials are confused about their responsibility for educating refugee children at Camp Pendleton.

County school administrator Gilbert Stuve told board members yesterday that estimates on the average stay for refugees at Camp Pendleton range from as little as 90 days to as long as 18 months.

"We're not in a position to finance educational programs for them," said County Schools Supt. M. Ted Dixon.

Stuve said many more refugees than anticipated are expected to settle in California instead of being relocated throughout the nation. He said as many as 70 per cent of the 60,000 refugees at Guam, Wake and Camp Pendleton are expected to remain in California. However, some federal officials say no more than 15,000 will settle in the state.

County Board of Education members yesterday were concerned over what to do about it.

## \$100 MILLION

Dixon estimated it might cost more than \$100 million to educate refugees if most of them settle in California. He said the federal government has a responsibility to help pay the cost. Board members agreed to contact area congressmen to seek federal funds to defray the cost of educating refugees in local schools.

Board member Amy Villalobos said, "Knowing the way the military operates, I imagine they won't give us the apple until the apple is rotten."

The present refugees at Camp Pendleton are not expected to be as much of a problem for educators as the ones who are coming. There have been persistent reports that while those who were flown out of the country were well educated, those who were picked up in Navy ships were principally uneducated fishermen and farmers.

Earlier this month, San Diego State officials expressed an interest to the State Department in a contractual arrangement to teach the refugees English. Yesterday, Robert McCoy, assistant to San Diego State President Brage Golding, said HEW officials had acknowledged an interest in cooperation and the school is ready to gear up for it.

## FACILITIES NOTED

McCoy said the university could use classrooms and dormitories which are vacant during summer months or the classes could be held at Camp Pendleton. Two San Diego State officials attended a seminar in San Francisco on the linguistic problems of the refugees.



**SPONSORS VOLUNTEER****Refugees Helped  
By States, Cities**

States and cities as well as thousands of persons across the country are volunteering to help resettle displaced Indochina refugees, the chief spokesman for President Ford's refugee task force said in Washington yesterday.

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"There has been no shortage of sponsors offering either to take whole families to live with them or provide jobs."

She said a total of more than 18,000 sponsorship offers had already been received.

## New Refugees Claim They Escaped Death

FT. INDIANTOWN GAP, Pa. (UPI) — For Nguyen Quang Vinh and many other refugees, escape from South Vietnam was not only a flight to freedom but also an escape from execution.

Vinh's fears were echoed time and again Wednesday by the 519 Vietnamese refugees arriving at the nation's newest refugee camp after a 20-hour flight from Guam.

They are the first of 15,000 expected in a 10-day period and seemed more like tourists than refugees running for their lives.

Most of them had western-style hair cuts and wore sports clothes and blue jeans. Only a few were barefoot. Many of the children wore shorts and tennis shoes.

Most had small suit cases, flight bags or pillow cases in which, officials said, they carried about everything they had. They were middle and upper class: businessmen, U.S. employes, officials and military officers. There were few who looked like farmers or fishermen.

They told of narrow escapes and loved ones left behind.

Vinh, 40, who worked for the U.S. Agency for International Development in Saigon, said he dodged bombs and Viet Cong rocket fire at the Saigon airport to get his wife, three children and two nephews out of the country.

"The Viet Cong don't like Vietnamese who worked for the Americans. I'm sure I would have been killed because I worked for the Americans," he said in halting English.

Diep Uuan Thong, 40, a Navy officer, said he escaped with his wife and three children by commandeering a naval vessel.

"If I had stayed in Saigon I would have been killed, and I think that my family would have been killed, too. So I had to leave," he said.

A woman cradled a baby in her arms and said her husband forced her to leave without him. She said she did not know if he got out.

## Two Refugee Groups Separated In Camp

FT. INDIANTOWN, GAP, Pa. (UPI) — Cambodians and Vietnamese have been enemies for centuries.

But American officials at the nation's newest refugee camp hope the common bond of having lost their homelands will prevent confrontations between the Vietnamese refugees and the Cambodians who arrive today.

Richard Friedman, civilian coordinator for the refugee camp, said the 480 Cambodians arriving today make up the first large group of Cambodian refugees to reach the United States.

"I have spoken to our Vietnamese hands and I understand there has been a long and continued history of antipathy between the Cambodians

and Vietnamese," Friedman said Thursday.

An American military officer who served three tours in Vietnam put it a little more bluntly: "The Cambodians and the Vietnamese hate each other with a passion."

Friedman said officials have been alerted to the possibility that problems between the two groups could develop, but will make sure the Cambodians and Vietnamese know it is in their best interests to get along.

He said the Cambodians will be housed and fed in an area apart from the Vietnamese refugees but the only barrier between the two groups will be a thin white tape that anyone could jump over or crawl under.

There was no problem between the Cambodian and Vietnamese refugees during the weeks they lived on Guam, Friedman said.

"In fact, I understand that on Guam the Cambodians and Vietnamese have organized a volleyball league. I am confident that we can emulate that here," he said.

"You have to remember that the Vietnamese and Cambodians have a common bond as refugees. They are in the same boat, and I hope this bond will override any basic enmity that they had back home."

Friedman said he will not place extra military policemen to watch over the Cambodians.

The arrival of the Cambodians presents other problems, Friedman said. All of the signs in the barracks are in Vietnamese and there is no one on the base who speaks Cambodian.

# Ky Says U.S. Asked Him To Rule 2 Weeks Before Fall

WASHINGTON — Former South Vietnamese Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky said yesterday that two weeks before his country fell to the Communists, U.S. Ambassador Graham Martin asked him to take over the government.

Ky said he agreed and Martin said he would need a few days to make the arrangements.

Instead it took 10 days for President Nguyen Van Thieu to decide to resign, Ky reported, and by that time it was too late to rally the dwindling and demoralized forces of the south.

## VISITS FAMILY

Ky flew here from Camp Pendleton last Saturday to visit his wife and 13 other members of his family, including his six children, who arrived in the Washington area a month ago.

In an interview at the rented suburban home where they are staying near Fairfax, Va., the former air marshal and commander of South Vietnam's air force also

1. Predicted that Thailand would fall to the Communists within two years.

2. Said he has an offer from a publisher and will begin writing a book soon on the "facts" of what hap-

pened to cause the collapse in South Vietnam.

3. Said there will not be a bloodbath in South Vietnam right away, but one will come quietly later, "once they get all of the foreign press out of Saigon." Former South Vietnamese military officers will be sent to re-education centers, he said, then disappear.

4. Refused to blame the U.S. Congress for the collapse in South Vietnam, despite a turndown on promised one-for-one replacement of ammunition and equipment.

"At the beginning of the

final Communist offensive we still had enough ammunition to resist the Communists for at least three months . . ." he said. "We could have had a good show for three months."

## BALLOT 'RIGGED'

There is no doubt South Vietnam could have been saved, Ky said, if there had been a change in command and leadership earlier. He called Thieu's election in 1971 "100 per cent rigged." After that, South Vietnam began sliding toward defeat, he said. This was the turning point.

Ky is the most prominent of the 131,000 South Vietnamese and Cambodian refugees who have fled to the United States since the fall of their government early in May.

He is now trying to fashion a new life for himself, his wife, and family in a strange new land he simultaneously admires as the freest of all nations, and yet one he said must ask itself if it wants to be the leader of the free world.

"If you accept it then you must fulfill your responsibilities . . ." he stated.

"You claimed it (before) and we accepted it. Now it is time for you to think about it, whether you want to be a leader, and if you want to be leader then you have some

responsibilities you have to fulfill." Ky said he tried to talk to Thieu when the collapse in the south began but Thieu

That was as close as he came to a rebuke toward the switch in U.S. policy, that at first helped create South Vietnam, supported it for 20 years, and ended up refusing to provide requested amounts of aid or the "vigorous" reaction to a Communist offensive promised by former President Richard Nixon.

Ky spoke almost bitterly of Thieu, a political rival who ousted Ky from the 1971 presidential race. "I said then that if Thieu stayed and continued his policies we would lose South Vietnam within two years. I said there would be a debate... it happened."

In Ky's view, Thieu became more and more isolated from the people after 1971. Ky said that only a government that brought in leaders from many factions could have marshaled enough popular support to save South Vietnamese independence.

Ky has predicted that Laos and Thailand would become the next Communist targets. Laos is now substantively under Communist control, and Ky said yesterday that North Vietnam will rapidly step up infiltration into Thailand.

Communism there will "spread like a cancer," he said, adding, "Thailand will fall in two years... there will be a communist government there, maybe even without a war."

He rejected the idea that communism is the wave of the future. "To see your standard of living, your way of life, Americans really cherish their freedom... little things in daily life... you really are a free people... I was surprised when I discovered there was no curfew here."

## 82 Cambodians decide to return

ARANYAPRATHET, Thailand (AP) — Eighty-two Cambodian military men, most of them fliers, voluntarily returned to Cambodia today after six weeks of exile in Thailand. Many said they were going back because they had left their wives and children behind.

"We're not afraid to go back to be ruled by the Khmer Rouge, even if we have to be forced to work in the jungles," said Capt. Kong Lach, who served in the Cambodian air force for 14 years before the country fell to the Communists April 17.

Kong Lach, the highest ranking officer returning today, said he could not

sleep since arriving in Thailand.

"Most of us do not know the fate of our families, and if our families were with us we would not return to Cambodia," he told newsmen at the border bridge linking Thailand and Cambodia.

Chai Suwan, the chief Cambodian immigration officer at the border village of Poipet, said all of the returnees would be taken to Phnom Penh by truck for what he called "Khmer Rouge-style indoctrination."

"Everyone has to go through this before we let them see their families and then go to work for our country," he said.

**FAMILY NEEDED****Refugees  
Tied With  
Red Tape**

The 600 tomato plants, bean patches, pepper bushes and peach, plum and apricot trees sit in the shadow of San Diego Stadium, their leaves a little dusty and their blossoms wilting.

Even Tom Hall and his 20 or so employees who planted them this spring and watered them faithfully admit they need some tender loving care (TLC).

The TLC, Hall said, will be provided by a Vietnamese refugee and his family who want to learn how to become good American farmers and, perhaps, someday be the esteemed purveyors of a 100-acre estate of fruits, vegetables and flowers running in and out of the urban development of all of Mission Valley.

Meanwhile, Hall has about two acres, the plants which were donated by a nursery after being damaged in an early spring deluge, a tractor, house, a sort of barn and a probable cow awaiting the refugees.

**Can't Find Any Help**

He can't, however, find any refugees to take the job and, he says, he's been looking since the fall of Saigon.

"I don't understand," he said. "There are 130,000 people with no place to go and it's a problem to find a farmer."

Hall has written or telephoned almost all of the seven voluntary agencies engaged in the placement of refugees supplied to him by Operation Newlife, the State Department's interdepartmental task force at Camp Pendleton. Some have replied with form letters thanking him for his interest and promising, "We will be in touch."

Monday, Hall decided on a more immediate approach. With some of his employees at A-1 Soils Co. who assisted on the planting project, he drove to Camp Pendle-

ton. "First I had to fill out a form for the guard at the gate to get in," Hall recalled. "Then they directed us to a trailer. I think it was the Red Cross trailer. I told the lady there I wanted to interview some farmers. She said, 'You can't do that; you have to wait for the State Department and the agencies to call you.' I said, 'But lady, I have 600 tomato plants and they need a farmer.'"

**No Luck At Camp**

Hall had no luck, however, and returned home again to tend his own plants.

Hall views the potential farm as "a great opportunity for someone to hoe their own row in the great American tradition of self-sufficiency." His farmer, he says, will have to be willing to sweat.

"We need to beautify this valley," he said. "Get rid of the weeds and plant some flowers. There are a hundred acres here that could be beautified. You could put flower beds on the hillsides with pictures of the California Bear or the U.S. flag. Five thousand Christmas trees along Murphy Canyon Road. There is so much potential because the water is only 10 feet down. He doesn't own all the land, but he's sure the rest of the Valley tenants will cooperate. They are, he says, longtime friends.

Hall, 69, came to the valley about 30 years ago. He set up his soil company which distributes topsoil, sand, gravel, fill, sawdust and fertilizer around the county and now pulls in up to \$2,000 a day. He dreams of franchising his dirt sometimes "like Kentucky Colonel chicken," but his most immediate dream is that "the valley will help a refugee like it helped me."

"We are all refugees from something," he said. "I'm a refugee from senility and old age. But I help someone."

**Student To Help Refugees**

Hall is working with San Diego State University to find an interpreter for his Vietnamese farmer if one is needed. His dispatcher and office helper, Sharon Stemm, a senior at Kearney High School, will chauffeur the family around and teach the Vietnamese how to run a tractor, he said. Other employees are putting their beer money into a trust fund for the future farmer.

Hall, himself, is moving out of his three-bedroom house on Mission Village Drive and into a mobile home at the site of his company so the house will be ready for the refugees.

He'll keep looking, he said, until he finds them.

Morale had become a problem among Vietnamese refugees at Camp Pendleton. The full impact of severing ties with their homeland — possibly forever — was getting to them.

For many, days had dragged into weeks without sponsorship.

Yesterday their morale got a boost.

For the first time since evacuees began arriving at the camp April 29, Vietnamese music, played live, swept across the rolling countryside and into the tents. A crowd of more than 3,000 persons gathered to listen.

"We thought it would do them good," said Chieu Pham, one of the musicians. He is a student at San Francisco State University, majoring in chemistry.

**GOOD VIBRATIONS**

In the American idiom, the chemistry on this occasion — with three talented Vietnamese songstresses sitting in with the band — was fine.

Two of the girls are refugees. The other is a professional vocalist from San Francisco who left Vietnam seven years ago to appear on the Ed Sullivan Show and remained in the United States to achieve success.

The professional vocalist, Bach Yen has been featured with Liberace and Bob Hope among other celebrities.

She, along with refugee sisters Vylen and Kim Anh Ly, sang mostly sentimental melodies.

**LOVE SONG**

"That song told of a loved one who is left behind going down to the dock on a cold winter night and looking out across the waves," Vylen Ly, the elder sister, explained to an American listener between numbers.

Another lyric, she said, told of the actual separation. Still another, she said, spoke of love of country.

She said "Raindrops on the Trees" would be the English equivalent to the Vietnamese title of one particularly haunting melody.

The Ly sisters, both now with Los Angeles sponsors, formed two-thirds of a trio called the Three Cats that sang in Saigon theaters and nightclubs after office hours they said. The girls are clerks.

**SPONSORS FOUND**

"The Vietnamese songs symbolize their sentimentality," Marine Sgt. Douglas Wynn, listening nearby, commented. "But they also like slow rock."

The band consisted of three guitarists, a drummer and a couple of sound effects men working electronic bass. All are Vietnamese students enrolled in San Francisco area colleges.

"This is probably our last appearance here at the camp," Pham said. "We're just amateurs and we paid our own way, including renting the sound equipment."

He motioned to a nearby truck, saying:

"It cost us over \$600 and students don't have that kind of money."

# Vietnam Orphan Gains New Home

"We receive you into the household of God."

Five-year-old Stefan, whose Vietnamese name is Le Thanh Nam, arrived in the U.S. from Vietnam on April 3, in one of the first orphan airlifts. The Beans adopted Nam through the Holt Adoption Program of Portland, Ore. after 4 1/2

years of waiting.

During the sermon before the baptism the Rev. Mr. Barclay likened the ceremony of baptism to adoption.

"Adoption was very common among the Greeks and Romans. It assured the continuity of family worship and the inheritance of property," he said.

The Rev. Lawrence Bausch, curate, assisted at the baptism and celebrated the Eucharist.

When Nam, who suffers from the after effects of polio, first arrived in San Diego with his new family, he was missing his braces and crutches and couldn't stand.

Today he was able to stand on his feet and hold up his arms to his new mother.

"He goes three days a

week to Children's Health Center for therapy and can move around pretty well on his crutches," said Bean.

"We had been worried that the language barrier would be a problem, but have found that we can fill in with gestures," he said.

"He has learned the words for banana and airplane. He loves bananas," said Mrs. Bean.

"We talk to him all the time and he learns fast. We usually call him Nam, even though his formal name is Stefan," she said. "He is getting stronger every day."

The Beans have three other children, Lauren, 9, Darrin, 8, and Martin, 6, all of whom have taken well to their new little brother.

Stefan (Nam) Bean will go

through another ceremony next Sunday when he is consecrated in Our Redeemer Lutheran Church, the parish of the Rev. H.W. Milschke. He and Mrs. Milschke are Nam's godparents. Mr. and Mrs. James Kent are also godparents for the child.

"We were married in the Episcopal church 11 years ago but attended the Lutheran Church for many years," said Mrs. Bean.

"We transferred here because it was closer and the children can walk to rehearsals and meetings," she said.

Baptized in the same ceremony with Nam was Benjamin Aaron Rodriguez, 4-week-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Saul Rodriguez.

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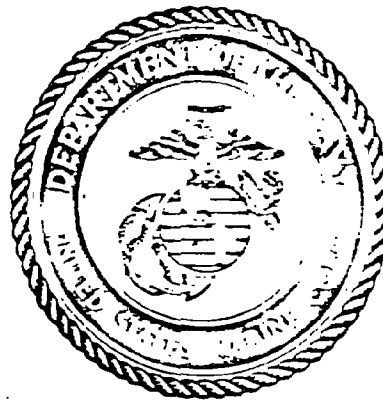

The breakdown of numbers of refugees processed for release to the various U.S. states and foreign countries is contained in Military Installation Commander and Civil Coordinator MCB, Camp Pendleton joint message 040748Z June 75 (Joint Daily Report No. 44). As of 2000 PDT, 3 June 1975, the number of refugees with full security clearances is 11,169; the number with assigned sponsors is 2,927; and the number with both is 2,715. A new reporting procedure takes effect today. Henceforth, a single joint Commanding General, MCB Camp Pendleton and Civil Coordinator report will be made by message as of 2000Z daily, to arrive in Washington by 0200Z the following day. The new report will give more detailed statistical information on refugees processed and being processed, and will consolidate information previously reported by other means. 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## Ford Refugee Panel At Camp Pen

CAMP PENDLETON — The chairman of the President's Special Commission on Refugees will arrive at Camp Pendleton today as the base prepares to receive another 250 immigrants.

Chairman John Eisenhower is scheduled to arrive at the base at 3 p.m. and, after a briefing with senior officials, will tour the camp.

As of 8 a.m. today, there were 17,095 refugees at the base, including 1,365 Cambodians. A spokesman said a plane carrying approximately 250 was expected between eight and 10 p.m., but its point of origin was not immediately known.

Eisenhower's appearance coincides with an appeal to his office from California Health and Welfare Secretary Mario Obledo.

Obledo said in a telegram Tuesday that interviews with 1,138 refugees indicated that approximately 18,000

Vietnamese will settle in California.

"America's 655,000 unemployed Vietnam veterans should not be forced to compete with refugees for scarce jobs," Obledo said. He also charged that U.S. State Department sponsorship programs will "eventually result in the majority of refugees receiving welfare assistance."

Obledo said the state interviews indicated one per cent of refugee children speak even limited English and few refugees have substantial assets (97 per cent had less than \$4,000.)

A state department spokesman said it was not known how many of the refugees were employable, but that few interviewed had skills presently in demand.

Obledo's charges were refuted by Robert Carleson, federal commission

of welfare and former state director of welfare in the Reagan administration, who castigated Obledo and Gov. Brown for failing to welcome the refugees.

Carleson accused Obledo of sowing fears that welfare rolls would be expanded by unemployed Vietnamese, and said there were probably more persons receiving welfare aid in California who were not entitled to it than there were refugees who could be expected to settle in the state.

Meanwhile, at Fort Chaffee, Ark., 207 refugees will meet with a U.N. official from Geneva Thursday regarding their demands to be returned to Saigon.

A spokesman at Camp Pendleton said today that 39 persons there had made similar requests and would discuss their problem with the U.S. consul's office.

# Refugee Military Service OK Urged

**CAMP PENDLETON —** Vietnamese and Cambodian refugees should be allowed to enlist in the U.S. armed forces, provided strict security checks are used in screening, an Inter-Agency Task Force official has said.

Nick Thorne, chief of ITF, said yesterday he expects many of the hundreds of refugees still on Guam to request to enlist.

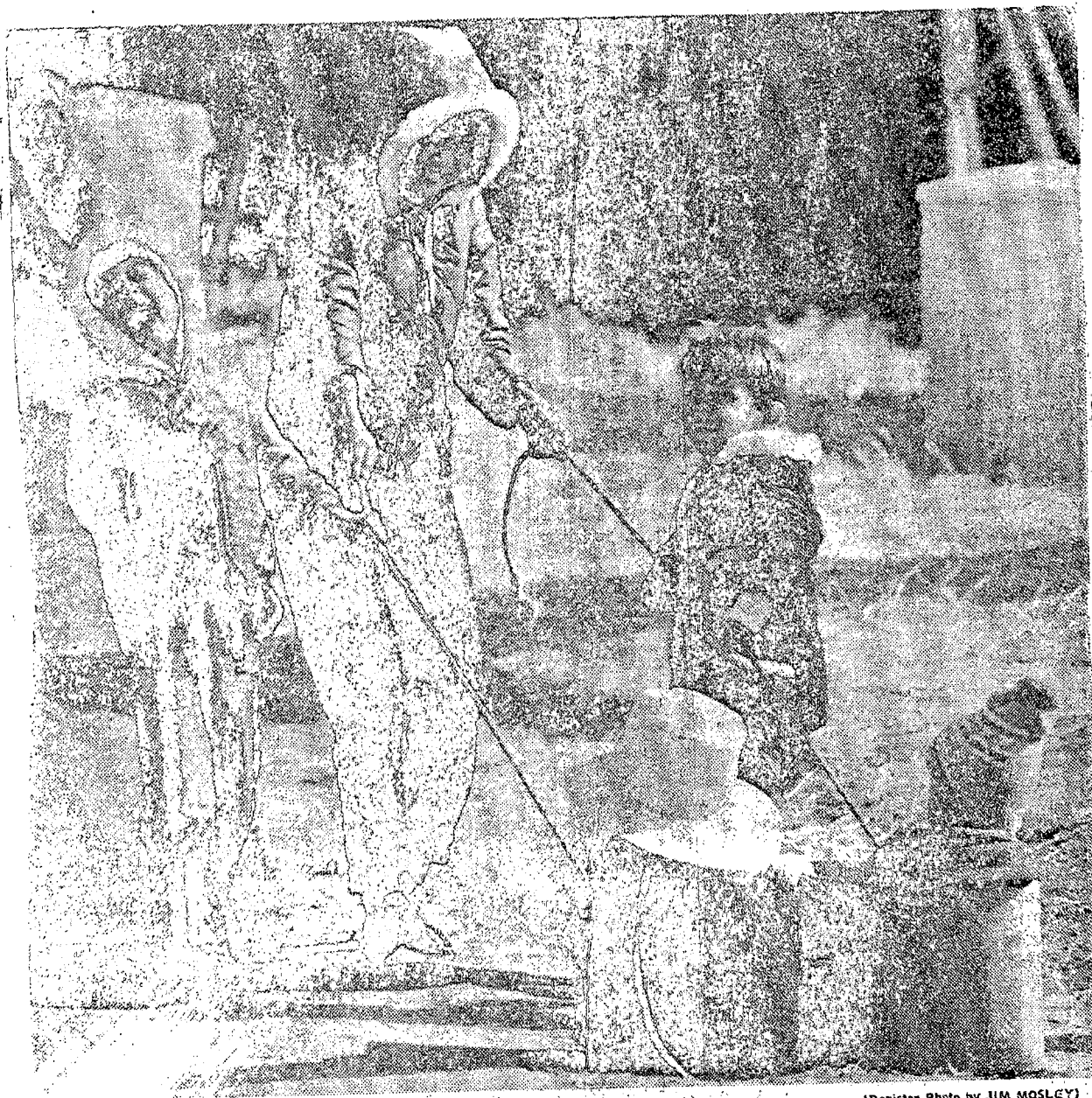
Thorne recommended that Congress should consider allowing refugee enlistments after he briefed Rep. Lionel Van Deertin, D-Calif., during a tour of the camp here, he said a large number of former South Vietnamese naval personnel "who took to their ships and kept going," were among the Guam refugees.

Van Deertin visited the refugee camp here with his daughters, Vicki, 23, and Susie, 21, and son, Job, 20. Van Deertin agreed that allowing refugees to enlist would be a good idea, but added that security procedures must be flawless.

Thorne said Hungarian and Cuban refugees have been allowed to enlist in the U.S. armed forces in the past and the task force was investigating whether congressional approval was needed to allow Southeast Asian refugee enlistment.

He said he doubts whether there would be a need to isolate refugees in an Indian-reservation type facility as was suggested by a civilian official at the Ft. Chaffee, Ark. refugee center, and feels they can be absorbed into American society with little difficulty.

Van Deertin said his mail is running 11 to 1 against bringing refugees to California, adding that many of the letter-writers are people once in favor of continuing the Vietnam war, but who now resent the refugees as "a reminder of the failure of U.S. foreign policy."

## Enlistment of refugees into U.S. armed forces urged

CAMP PENDLETON (AP)—Congress should seriously consider allowing Indochinese refugees to enlist in the armed forces, said Nick Thorne, chief of the civilian Inter-Agency Task Force.

Thorne, who briefed Rep. Lionel Van Deerlin, D-Calif., during a tour of the sprawling refugee camp at the Marine base Monday, said enlistment requests are expected in great numbers from refugees still on Guam.

Thorne said a large number of former South Vietnamese naval personnel "who took to their ships and kept going" were among the refugees on Guam.

Van Deerlin visited the refu-

gee camp here along with his daughters, Vicki, 24, and Susie, 21, and his son, Jeb, 20. The congressman said the idea of refugee enlistment is good "providing we have an airtight screening system."

"I wouldn't want any bad apples like the guards at Kon Sanh," said Van Deerlin, referring to a notorious prison where the South Vietnamese government imprisoned its political opponents in tiger cages.

Thorne said Hungarian and Cuban refugees in the past had been allowed to enlist in the U.S. armed forces and his agency was investigating whether congressional approval was needed to allow Indochinese refugee enlistment.

He said he believed the Indochinese refugees could be absorbed into American society and there would be no need to isolate them in an Indian reservation type facility, as has reportedly been suggested.

# Neighborhood 'Adopts

Kim-Anh Nguyen, one of Huntington Beach's newest residents, watched during the 1968 Tet offensive in Vietnam when the Viet Cong buried her husband and 65 others alive.

So did her seven children.

Two months ago, as the Viet Cong neared their home in Hue again, she gathered her children

— aged eight to 18 — and made a 500-mile trip on foot to her sister's home in Saigon.

Her sister-in-law, Bach-Mai Nguyen, 37 and pregnant, recently carried her one and two-year-old children on a mountainous 100-mile trip on foot from Viet Cong surrounded Pleiku to Saigon, dodging bullets all the way.

And Thuong Nguyen, 40, a Viet-

namese Air Force major, put his wife and five children on a plane out of Saigon in late April, not knowing if he would ever see them again.

Today, 21 members of the Nguyen family are making new lives for themselves in Huntington Beach — where a whole neighborhood has adopted them.

They are all staying at the home of Mr. and Mrs. George

## 21 Refugees

Young, 17272 Avalon Lane. Young's wife, Marianne, is Bach-Mai's sister, and sister, sister-in-law and aunt to the others staying in her home.

"Some people might think we are crazy to put 21 people in here," Young said Friday. "But we needed to. The help from the neighborhood has been amazing."

All 12 children in the Nguyen

family have been attending school the past week at nearby Lark View School, where Principal Stanton Burrill has arranged an emergency English language tutoring program and put two adult family members to work as instructional aides.

The students, age five to 18, are being tutored by their volunteer classmates at Lark View, and families throughout the school

area have donated clothing, food and even offered to take them in to their homes.

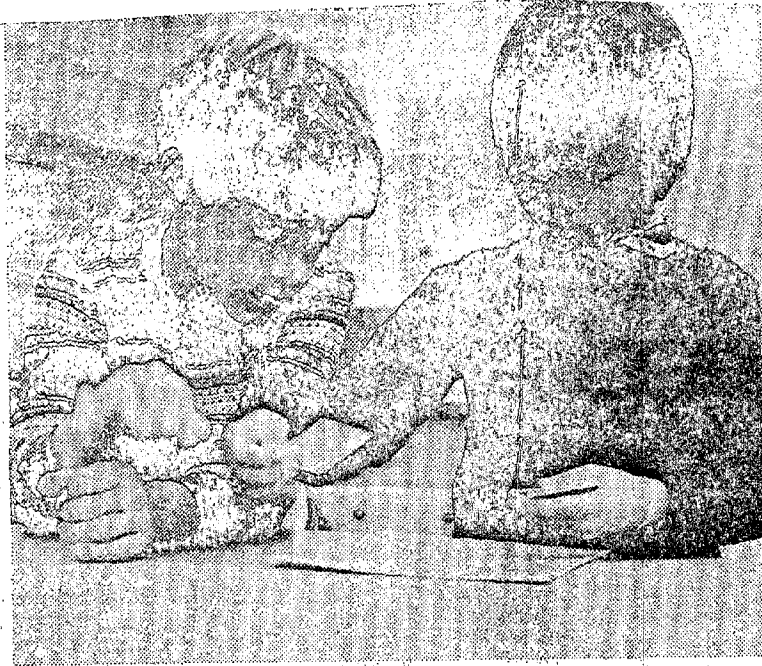
"It's amazing how quickly the kids are learning," Burrill said of the Vietnamese.

And, he noted, the American volunteer youngsters are learning Vietnamese words from their new friends as well. "It's a

tremendous enriching experience," he said.

School officials have been scrambling throughout the area searching for special instructional aides to help.

During the day, the children learn English, then at night they teach it to the adults and preschool youngsters at home.

Young, a third-generation Chinese-American, met his Vietnamese wife, while employed as a Rand Corporation consultant in Saigon. He noted the relatives all escaped with only what they could carry.

All the family members have not yet gathered. The husband of one of the sisters still is at Camp Pendleton with members of his family, awaiting processing.

Two days ago, Bach-Mai learned that her husband and three other children are safe in Guam.

Young said he hopes to keep all the family members together awhile "to give them time to acclimate."

Thuong said he isn't sure what the future will hold, but he is grateful for the chance to begin again here.

"When I sent my family out of Saigon, I didn't know their destination, and I didn't care. I wanted them to live, and if they

hadn't left, they wouldn't have lived," he said.

After he escaped by ship a week later, then found them in Guam he said he'd experienced "a miracle."

"I didn't use to believe in miracles," he noted happily.

## REFUGEES FIND HOMES

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Defense Department reported yesterday that almost 20,000 refugees from Indochina have completed processing and have gone to new homes in the United States.

A Pentagon statement said 130,079 refugees were in or have passed through the system. It said 653 were still between Indochina and U.S. bases in the Pacific. It gave this breakdown:

— 82,542 at U.S. bases in the Pacific, — 24,651 at Ft. Chaffee, Ark., — 17,536 at Camp Pendleton, Calif., — 4,780 at Eglin Air Force Base, Fla.

## Pennsylvania-bound *Refugees due in new camp*

AGANA, Guam (AP) — The first refugees headed for the new evacuee camp at Indiantown Gap, Pa., will come from Guam, authorities announced today.

Adm G. Steve Morrison said a flight carrying 340 Vietnamese would leave Guam early Wednesday Guam time. A second flight of 179 refugees is scheduled to follow within several hours and more will leave daily until June 1. A total of 1,779 are scheduled to be transferred to the Pennsylvania camp.

But this was not expected to make an appreciable dent in the size of the refugee population still on Guam. As of Tuesday, 47,081 remained on the island, with 37,631 jammed into sweltering "Tent City."

Morrison said he is not optimistic about the prospect of flights resuming at a faster pace. A month ago, when refugee flights began to the mainland, thousands were being

moved out of Guam daily. But the flow has decreased to a trickle, and on Monday only 262 refugees were flown out in 24 hours.

"When we first started, they were leaving at 6,000 a day," said Morrison. "I thought that would go on forever. But now I realize it was just until they filled up the camps back there."

The admiral noted that more ships carrying refugees are expected here—two of them with 355 aboard are scheduled to arrive May 31. And another 6,100 Vietnamese are at Subic Bay in the Philippines awaiting transfer to Guam.

"A certain number who left Singapore are unaccounted for," he noted. "...they may even have gone back to Saigon." Morrison continued to express concern about the potential for bad weather on Guam while the refugees are camped here.

# Persons who fled Cuba

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Cubans who streamed here after the takeover of their country by Fidel Castro in 1959 are assisting many Vietnamese refugees who have arrived here.

Wilfredo Acosta, a Cuban exile, worked at Eglin Air Force Base processing Vietnamese refugees; Jose Menendez pro-

vided rent-free housing in a duplex apartment house for two Vietnamese families; Gladys Victores brought canned milk, ham and soup to 31 South Vietnamese refugees who arrived in South Florida after flying 12,000 miles in five days.

"I heard on the radio about these people, and it just broke

my heart," said Mrs. Victores.

"We Cubans have to help."

Acosta, Menendez, Mrs. Victores and others said they provided a help for some of the thousands of refugees because they have not forgotten how this country welcomed them a decade ago.

At first the Cubans came by

regular commercial airliners, with American visas in their passports. They stayed by claiming political refuge. After the U.S. and Cuba broke off diplomatic relations in 1961, it became more difficult to leave the Caribbean island, particularly for the poor. Then, it became impossible.

# helping Viet refugees

The Cuban exodus had a rebirth in December 1965, when President Lyndon B. Johnson took up a Castro challenge and established the Cuban refugee airlift between the island and Miami.

In seven years of operation, the Freedom Flights brought in some 270,000 Cubans. Approx-

mately 400,000 other Cubans got here on their own. Philip A. Holman, acting director of the Cuban refugee program, told Congress last week that the government had spent more than \$1 billion to aid the 670,000 Cubans.

The Cuban program, under the Department of Health, Edu-

cation and Welfare, is being phased out, but it is still costing some \$90 million a year.

Cubans were resettled throughout the country, but the majority — more than 350,000 — are in Miami. Most of the others are in the New York City area, in New Jersey and California.

Although many have assimilated and become part of the American mainstream, many others still live in their own colonies, virtually apart from any American influence.

In Miami, their activities range from bank presidents — seven — to laborers holding down two or three jobs.

1. The purpose of this summary is to provide information to the Staff on the on-going actions concerning OPERATION NEW ARRIVALS.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACTIONS/EVENTS

a. CMC msg 142143Z May 75 established new reporting procedures for CG, MCB, Camp Pendleton and the Civil Coordinator, Camp Pendleton. The new procedures standardize and consolidate existing reporting requirements of Secretary of State and CINCPAC, as well as new requirements reflected in JCS msg 140002Z May 75. Henceforth, there will be two joint daily phonecon reports (as of 0800Z and 1800Z) made to CMC and relayed to Secretary of State, JCS and CINCPAC. These phonecon reports will be verified by follow-on message reports.

b. The refugee center at Eglin AFB has requested the transfer of 12 Vietnamese interpreters and families (total 95) from Camp Pendleton to Eglin AFB. They have been temporarily located at Camp Pendleton in accordance with a previous agreement with officials at Eglin AFB. The 95 personnel will be airlifted from El Toro at 0730 PDT, 15 May 1975. This figure is reflected in the attached SITREP.

c. The Logistics SITREP for Guam indicates no new cases of Dengue fever reported.

d. The combined Armed Forces Day open house scheduled for 17 May 1975 by Marine Corps Base, First Marine Division and other tenant activities located at Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton has been cancelled because of the extensive commitments of personnel and equipment to OPERATION NEW ARRIVALS. Press releases to local news media have been made indicating the reason for the cancellation and emphasizing the Marine Corps active participation in OPERATION NEW ARRIVALS.

1. The purpose of this summary is to provide information to the Staff on the on-going actions concerning OPERATION NEW ARRIVALS.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACTIONS/EVENTS

a. A query was received from Mr. Bratton, International Committee for European Migration, regarding the use of MCAS, El Toro for the movement of 1,000 refugees to France. Mr. Bratton was specifically concerned with landing rights and refueling of aircraft from either World Airways or Overseas National Airways. After coordination with Major Jackett at MCAS, El Toro, it was determined that El Toro facilities could be used only in connection with refugee movement in Military Airlift Command (MAC) charter flights where costs were paid by Secretary of State under OPERATION NEW ARRIVALS funding. Maj Jackett added that Civilian charters were not eligible to use MCAS, El Toro facilities. Mr. Bratton was so advised.

b. CMC msg 172239Z May 75 provides an OPERATION NEW ARRIVALS impact statement on personnel, training and readiness for a JCS response to Congressman Sikes. Copy is attached.

c. An Environmental Assessment is being prepared at Camp Pendleton in response to Secretary of State msg 170013Z May 1975. The assessment will emphasize factors affecting the ability of Camp Pendleton to support the refugee facility and will include impact on water supply, sewage disposal, solid waste disposal, transportation requirements and pesticide use. An original submission date of 19 May 1975 was subsequently changed to 21 May 1975.

d. The Secretary of State has provided the following guidelines and procedures concerning sponsorship of Indo-Chinese refugees.

(1) With certain exceptions, refugees require sponsors to assist in insuring that the refugees do not become public charges and to help each refugee make the transition from refugee status to status as a self-sufficient member of his community. Sponsorship can take the form of an offer of support, employment or both. However, the sponsor must also be ready to help the refugee with some of the less tangible aspects of resettlement such as adjustment to a new culture and acquainting the refugee with American law and requirements.

Sponsorship is not a formal, legal commitment. However, the sponsor undertakes a clear moral commitment to help the refugee to the best of his ability.

(2) A sponsor, in conjunction with an appropriate Volunteer Agency (VOLAG) will be expected to:

- (a) Receive the refugee and his family;
- (b) Provide shelter and food, until the refugee becomes self-sufficient. Shelter need not be in the residence of the sponsor but must be adequate;
- (c) Provide clothing and pocket money;
- (d) Provide assistance in finding employment and in school enrollment for children;
- (e) Cover ordinary medical costs or medical insurance. Once employment is obtained, the sponsor will assist the refugee to locate permanent housing, acquire minimal furniture and arrange for utilities. Offers of sponsorship should be made directly to one of the Volunteer Agencies listed below:

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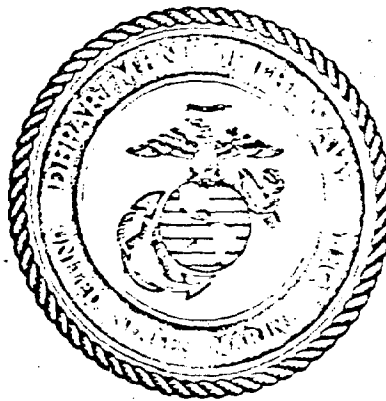

2. SIGNIFICANT ACTIONS/EVENTS

a. Actions continue relative to converting the present messing arrangement at the Camp Pendleton Refugee Center to contract. CMC message 271847Z May 75 seeks ASD (I&L) concurrence. CMC message 271846Z May 75 advises CG, MCB Camp Pendleton of concurrence with his proposal, advises of progress to date, and requests that the Civil Coordinator at Camp Pendleton initiate action through his channels to obtain SECSTATE (IATF) funding concurrence.

b. SECSTATE message 270010Z May 75 establishes a new reporting procedure for the Civil Coordinators at all Camps. Impact of new report on present reporting procedures established by JCS and others is being evaluated by the I&L Department New Arrivals Operations Center, the JCS Logistics Coordination Center, and the MCB, Camp Pendleton Reports Control Center.

c. Two hundred and fifty (250) Cambodians are due to arrive at MCAS, El Toro today, 28 May 1975, at 1615 PDT, for further transport to the Refugee Center at MCB, Camp Pendleton.

d. Mr. Al Cook, Republican Minority Council for the Senate Judiciary Committee visited the Camp Pendleton Refugee Center on 27 May. Mr. John Eisenhower, Chairman of the President's Special Committee on Refugees, and Mr. George Elsey, President of American Red Cross, are expected to visit the Refugee Center today.

1. One hundred eighty (180) Cambodians arrived 24 1805 PDT May and were transported to Camp San Onofre. On-hand count of Cambodians at San Onofre is 1389.
2. General Graham, CG MCB Camp Pendleton accepted a diversion of 177 Vietnamese originally scheduled into Fort Chaffee. The aircraft arrived at MCAS El Toro at 26 1515 PDT May and the Vietnamese were transported to Camp Talega.
3. JCS requested a projection of the capability of Camp Pendleton to receive Cambodians on a priority basis. JCS message 261708Z May 75, CMC messages 270037Z May 75 and 270038Z May 75 and CG, MCB CAMPEN message 262452Z May 75 apply.
4. CG, MCB Camp Pendleton has proposed replacement of the present messing operation with a commercial contract arrangement. The proposal would free approximately 202 cooks and 730 messmen and cost approximately \$2,000,000 per month. CG, MCB CAMPEN message 241657Z May 75 applies.
5. SECDEF message 212130Z May 75 provides summary of authority to use New Arrivals funding for hiring Vietnamese refugees who were former U.S. Government employees.
6. Three representatives of the Norwalk Citizen's Action Committee appeared at MCAS El Toro on 23 May 75 with an indigent mother and two children seeking assistance for what they described as "Refugees in their own country". They left the station after 20 minutes and were filmed by an unknown TV crew outside the gate. The story has not yet appeared in the local news.
7. Former Premier Ky departed Camp Pendleton on 23 May 75. He was sponsored by the "Food for the Hungry" organization.
8. On 25 May 1975 ceremonies were conducted at the Refugee Center in celebration of the 2519th anniversary of Buddha. BGen Graham, Commanding General, MCB CAMPEN, made brief remarks to assembled Buddhists during the ceremony.

9. At Camp No. 8, part of the Talega complex, there are now 1,100 refugees enrolled in English classes. Work continues to expand the present classroom facility.

10. As of 0100 PDT, 27 May, 10,266 refugees at Camp Pendleton have received final security clearances, 3,855 have acquired sponsors, and 1,398 have acquired both.

11. On Monday 27 May 1975, Congressman Van Deerlin of San Diego and Supervisor Hayes of the Los Angeles Board of Supervisors visited the Refugee Center at Camp Pendleton,

b. MGen CASEY, OJCS, J-4 levied a requirement for information concerning refugee impact on Reserve training and Camp Pendleton capacity to process an increased number of refugee arrivals as long as the 18,000 capacity was adhered to. The following information was provided:

(1) By shifting the Reserve units to other camps the impact on Reserve training will not be significant. CMC has provided an impact statement to SECDEF to this effect.

(2) Since Camp Pendleton is quickly reaching its 18,000 person refugee capacity an increase in refugee input is really OBE; however, the throughput number could be increased if the refugees were processed in the following priority (i.e., Category I consisting of refugees with stateside relatives, Category II consisting of sponsors other than relatives, Category III consisting of all others).

c. DC/S for Manpower (Code MSPA) advised that the Office of the Secretary of Defense will dispatch an officer to Camp Pendleton to locate the Vietnamese members of the Four Party Negotiating Team.

d. Former Cambodian Premier SAKUM PHOY departed UTAPAO via World Airways for El Toro and Camp Pendleton.

e. The Commandant, 11th Naval District (COMELEVEN 062211Z May 75) is requesting subordinate commands to provide Camp Pendleton with 20 additional cooks, for a total of 60 from the 11th Naval District Commands.

f. MGen VAUGHT, ADC/S for I&L, discussed the rapid approach of the 18,000 capacity at Camp Pendleton with VAdm WESCHLER, J-4 JCS. VAdm WESCHLER indicated that there was no planning in process at the present time to increase input beyond the scheduled 18,000 capacity at Camp Pendleton. VAdm WESCHLER further indicated that a message was being prepared to appropriate addressees that he hoped would assist in speeding up the refugee processing procedures at Camp Pendleton.

g. MGen VAUGHT, ADC/S for I&L, spoke with BGen MILLER, Deputy CG, FMFLANT, concerning CG, FMFLANT msg 052029Z May 75. BGen MILLER advised that the intent of the message was to respond to a planning directive of CINCLANTFLT (CINCLANTFLT 011750Z May 75) in which, for planning purposes, CINCLANTFLT subordinate type commanders are to provide support to COMNAVBASE Charleston. BGen MILLER further stated that he did not know, at the present time, exactly what CG, FMFLANT would be tasked to do, but HQMC would be kept advised. MGen VAUGHT further advised BGen MILLER that MCSC, Albany was inappropriately tasked in CINCLANTFLT 011750Z May 75, that all supply requests would go to DSA or appropriated Integrated Material Managers. RAdm GRINSTEAD, OP-41 has been so advised.

h. Capt MILLS, JCS, J-4, requested some general background information for MGen CASEY, Deputy J-4, JCS, concerning transportation, subsistence, billeting, medical support, and the latest base loading statistics on the refugees at Camp Pendleton. Information was provided. MGen CASEY is testifying before the House International Committee on the morning of 7 May.

1. The purpose of this summary is to provide information to the Staff on the on-going actions concerning OPERATION NEW ARRIVALS.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACTIONS/EVENTS

a. CMC message 091920Z May 75 was released advising CAMPEN, El Toro, JCS, CINCPAC, MAC and 22nd AF of reinitiation procedures once CAMPEN is able to take more input (CAMPEN is presently over capacity).

b. LtCol Jones (LPP) contacted Capt Williford (C/S COMNAVBASE Charleston) who agreed that a correction would be made to COMNAVBASE Charleston msg 081400Z May 75 relative to tasking of MCSC, Albany for security support.

c. During the period 1800 - 2100, 9 May 1975 MGen Casey, Deputy Director, J-4, BGen Graham, CG, MCB CAMPEN, Col Realson, C/S MCAS, El Toro, and LtCol Jones coordinated procedures for MCAS, El Toro to accept two flights totaling 539 refugees to be held at El Toro on a temporary (24 hours) basis. This coordination included procedures to insure that no additional flights would be diverted to El Toro. At the direction of MGen Vaught, appropriate message traffic was readressed to ALCON to conclude action on closing down the flow into El Toro. Departure of these refugees for Fort Chaffee, Arkansas was scheduled to commence at 0300 PDT on 11 May 1975. This departure was subsequently changed to 13 May 1975.

d. Col Rose from Sec State Inter Agency Task Force along with HEW and INS representatives visited Camp Pendleton on 10 May 1975 to investigate processing problems with particular attention to the backlog of refugees (approx 8000) awaiting NAC and financial investigation of sponsors. Visit was appropriately coordinated with CG, MCB Camp Pendleton.

e. A request was received from the Logistic Coordination Center, OJCS for a five day projection of numbers of refugees to be released from Government control (0200 to 0159 PDT). Col Woodham, C/S Camp Pendleton advised that this projection could not be realistically made until the Civil Coordinator could provide reliable estimates. The reliability is directly related to a determination/resolution of the NAC problem mentioned above.

f. The JCS Logistic Coordination Center requested that Camp Pendleton retain interpreters and their families (totalling 112,) ultimately destined for Eglin AFB until further notice. Duty officer (Lt. Cunningham was advised and confirmed that this would be done.)

g. Cdr FRIES, JCS J-4 watch officer was advised in response to questions concerning projection of flights into El Toro that the Camp Pendleton capacity is 18,000 and that capacity has been exceeded causing considerable overcrowding. CMC position is that no more can be accepted at Camp Pendleton until the present level is reduced below 18,000.

h. Immediate threat of Dengue fever appeared on 9 May on Guam with one death and three suspected cases among refugees. All Pacific commands responded to provide Malathion spray liquid and ground spraying equipment. Spray equipped aircraft is available CONUS for positioning on Guam 20 - 23 May. CG, FMFPac has located four A-4 a/c with capability that can respond in 36 hours.

i. Various messages from JCS, CINCPAC, and MAC indicated approaching saturation of CONUS camps and required slowdown of flow from WESTPAC. Last message (JCS 101827Z May 75) indicates incoming flow to CONUS camps will not exceed 1000 per day from 130359Z to 160400Z May 75. Additional guidance will be given by JCS at 1500 EDT 12 May 1975.

j. CG FMFLant continues to plan in support of COMNAVBASE Charleston.

k. Other significant events are contained in the narrative of the attached sitrep.

1. The purpose of this summary is to provide information to the Staff on the on-going actions concerning OPERATION NEW ARRIVALS.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACTIONS/EVENTS

a. A call to MCAS, El Toro (Maj JACKETT) confirmed that five C-141's are scheduled to begin transferring 539 refugees at 0945 PDT from MCAS, El Toro to Fort Chaffee. This group arrived at El Toro as a temporary measure on 10 May 1975.

b. ComNavBase Charleston issued a message correction regarding the tasking of MCSC, Albany in support of a contingency plan.

c. CG, MCB, Camp Pendleton has requested a temporary ceiling increase of 60 civil service billets to support refugee center operations and expressed a requirement for 40 enlisted TAD personnel to support security operations. Additionally, CG, MCB Camp Pendleton has requested that two colonels 9906/9907 and two LtCols 9910 be assigned MCB, Camp Pendleton for duty with OPERATION NEW ARRIVALS for the duration of the operation.

d. At Camp Pendleton the U. S. Catholic conference has registered 1447 heads of families. This equates to about 6500 refugees. Of this group, 2300 have sponsors. The Lutherans have registered approximately 1000 individuals but have sponsors for only 300 Cambodians included in that total. Other agencies have been less active but have been registering refugees and obtaining sponsors. Based on these preliminary figures, it appears that the half way mark is being reached in terms of registration of refugees at Camp Pendleton. Identification of sponsors appears to be moving.

e. JCS message 122238Z May 75 indicates that Eglin AFB will increase their capacity to 5000 refugees over the period 16 to 20 May 1975. To insure time for preparation and smooth input, evacuee input flow will be reduced to 600 per day commencing 16 May 1975.

f. At Guam, the early deployment of an USAF aerial sprayer equipped C-123 is being requested in order to suppress the Dengue fever mosquito. Ground mounted spraying operations are currently being conducted.

g. As part of a GAO review of budgetary, legal, policy and related matters concerning the evacuation of Vietnamese nationals from South Vietnam, GAO auditors Harry J. HEDRICK and Thomas F. DAVID will visit the Civil Coordinator at MCB, Camp Pendleton on 13 May 1975.

8 - 9 May 1975

1. The purpose of this summary is to provide information to the Staff on the on-going actions concerning OPERATION NEW ARRIVALS.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACTIONS/EVENTS

a. Col WOODHAM, Chief of Staff, Camp Pendleton informed Col NELSON that the projected refugee population would exceed the 18,000 capacity by 082130 PDT. Based upon this and earlier projected population data, MGen VAUGHT contacted VAdm WESCHLER, Director J-4, OJCS. VAdm WESCHLER agreed to initiate action to cease refugee input to MCAS, El Toro and Camp Pendleton with the flight due to arrive at MCAS, El Toro at 2130 PDT 8 May. Action was initiated with JCS J-4 LCC, Camp Pendleton, El Toro, CINCPAC and CINCPACAF to stop the incoming flow.

b. Col NELSON, LPP-1, advised that MGen CASEY, J-4 JCS, had requested BGen GRAHAM, CG, MCB Camp Pendleton, to accept a DC-10 at El Toro (for Camp Pendleton) with 380 aboard at 2200 PDT. BGen GRAHAM accepted. After the arrival of the aforementioned DC-10 at 2200 the total aboard count at El Toro and Camp Pendleton was 18,840. Col WOODHAM, C/S, Camp Pendleton advised that the processing out "slow-down" was because of new INS instructions that require a NAC on each refugee and a financial status investigation of each sponsor. At Camp Pendleton there are now over 7,000 refugees who have been processed for everything except NAC, and over 1,000 that have been processed for everything except financial investigation of sponsors. Camp Pendleton is to advise PACAF and all concerned of when and how many can be received once processing has reduced the numbers on hand below capacity.

c. CG, FMFLANT continues to plan in support of COMNAVBASE Charleston as directed by CINCLANTFLT.

1. The purpose of this summary is to provide information to the Staff on the on-going actions concerning OPERATION NEW ARRIVALS.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACTIONS/EVENTS

a. Col HUDEK, OJCS, J-4 provided information that it is imperative that all refugee centers accept the maximum number of evacuees in order to help relieve the overcrowded conditions at WESTPAC initial staging areas (Guam, Wake Island). In so doing, Col HUDEK acknowledged that Camp Pendleton is fast approaching maximum capacity.

b. COMNAVBASE, Charleston messages 061900Z and 072000Z May 75 are planning directives relative to the establishment of refugee centers under Navy control. MGen VAUGHT, ADC/S for I&L, and Col NELSON, LPP, made contact with MCSC, Albany (BGen JOHNSON) and OP41 (Cdr METCALF) concerning the appropriate method of obtaining supply support for the Navy controlled refugee centers. Navy (OP41) was also advised that any tasking of MCSC, Albany or other non-FMF commands should come through CMC.

c. Information requested by Senator HUMPHREY concerning the refugee capacity at Camp Pendleton and procedures utilized in feeding of the refugees was provided to OJCS, J-4.

d. Other significant events are contained in section K of the attached SITREP.
