Draft of Letter from CMC, signed by BGen Simmons, to Director DIA

Subj: Documentation concerning NVA, VC, and South Vietnamese Forces in DIA files

1. The visit of members of the Marine Corps History and Museums Division to the DIA library on 22 December 1975 generated several questions as to how and if our division can exploit the information contained in your files to support our writing effort on Marines in the Vietnam War. Although the DIA library's card index is of limited use for our research, we learned that the DIA can provide computer printouts of documentation concerning specific subjects. It is requested that such printouts be provided to the division on the following categories:

- a. Estimates by year of overall enemy strategy from January 1965 through April 1975, with specific relation to the enemy B-5 Front, Military Region Tri Thien Hue, Military Region 5, and Front 4.
- b. Prisoner interrogation reports of VC/NVA officers and senior civilian cadre, e. g. province and district chiefs, from January 1965 through 1975.
- c. Reports on activities of the Vietnamese Marine Corps from 1954 through May 1975.
- d. Estimates of size and disposition of NVA heavy artillery, 1966-1975.
- e. Estimates of South Vietnamese unit effectiveness down to battalion, 1954-1975.
- f. MACV (CORDS) Hamlet Evaluation System reports, 1967-1975, and any comparable South Vietnamese evaluation reports.
- g. Evaluation of efforts to neutralize the VC Infrastructure, 1965-1975.
- h. Documents and reports on NVA/VC POW camps.
- i. Estimates of enemy strength and activity in the DMZ, January-March 1972, with special reference to the NVA 304th, 308th, and 324B Divisions.
- j. Description of targets struck by USAF in the DMZ, September 1971 through April 1972.
- k. Estimates of enemy strength and activity in the Central Highlands, especially in relation to Pleiku, January-March 1972.
- l. Estimates of enemy strength and situation in the Central Highlands and of the threat to Ban Me Thuot and Vietnamese estimates of the situation, February 1975.

2. We also would like to have a listing of biographies of South Vietnamese senior military officers and civilian officials.

3. Finally, we would like to have a determination of DIA policy concerning use of information from these documents in preparing official Marine Corps histories of the war. These will be published histories.

1. We visited the DIA library on 22 December 1975 to examine their holdings on the Vietnam War and to investigate possible use of this material to support our writing effort. As pointed out in Reference b, the DIA index card system will be of limited use to us, but we learned that DIA has the capability to provide computer printouts of lists of documents on specific topics.

2. At a special writers' meeting on 7 January, we prepared the enclosed list of topics. We suggest that these topics be submitted as a formal request for information from CMC, signed by the Director of History and Museums, to the Director of the DIA. Besides the list of topics, the enclosed draft letter for EGen Simmons's signature also includes a request for a statement from DIA of their policy on use of information from these documents in our published official histories.





1. This is in further reference to your letter of January 21, 1976 which forwarded correspondence between Department of the Army and Mr. Adam Schesch who has requested access to North Vietnam captured documents. Copies of the films of these documents are currently held by this Agency.
2. It is noted that this is not a FOIA request. However the provisions of that statute should be considered in evaluating a request of this nature.
3. The material in question consists of more than 3.1 million frames of unreviewed documents. This material has not been cataloged nor evaluated. Some of the material is classified. A large portion of the documents are in Vietnamese.
4. In the absence of a request for an identifiable document this Agency would not be in a position to review an uncataloged mass of material such as this so that it would be meaningful for the requester's purpose. There also is no legal requirement to create a record.
5. Further screening of material of this magnitude would constitute an expenditure of much manpower. The requester has not indicated a willingness to pay for this substantial cost.
6. It would be the position of this Agency that in view of the above, this mass of unidentified material is not at this time available to the requester nor would the exchange of correspondence with Mr. Schesch qualify as a "request" which identifies records under provisions of the FOIA. We view the FOIA as the guideline which we would follow in this situation. This Agency would not consider this material to be available to this requester.





1. On 3 March, Dr. Cosmas and I visited Dr. John Hatcher, TAG Archivist for Vietnam Records to examine the finding aids to MACV records in his custody. During our discussion with Dr. Hatcher, we once more touched upon the captured enemy documentation contained in the microfilm/computer (FMA) system referred to in para 3 of Ref a. As explained in Ref a, the documentation in its present form is unworkable. There are three copies of the documentation: one in the custody of the Air Force at Lowry Air Base in Colorado; one in the custody of Hatcher, and the other in the custody of DIA. Only a few computers can service the system. DIA is in fact phasing out its FMA system and no longer can search the film. A complete description of the documentation is contained in the enclosed Ref b. Col Vorhies, the author of Ref b, headed the Documentation Branch, Exploitation Division, J-2 HqUSMACV, from Jun-Nov 1968. Dr. Hatcher and Col Vorhies are attempting to have the documentation declassified. Hatcher told us that he ideally would like to give the documentation to an University Computer Center with the stipulation that the center maintain and service these records. In a telephone conversation with Dr. Hatcher this afternoon, he mentioned that he and Colonel Vorhies are meeting serious opposition to their efforts and he is not too optimistic. It is recommended that the History and Museums Division give its full support to Hatcher's attempt to declassify these documents.

2. In a separate telephone conversation, Hatcher told me he is having the chronological printout index at Carlisle reproduced and available for our use at his office in the near future.

3. In addition to the printouts and accession papers available at Hatcher's office, the Center for Military History maintains accession lists of records directly retired by it and also a set of monthly CORDS records. Our historians can examine them at CMH.

4. We have received the computer printout indexes to the DIA Intelligence Reports. (This is not to be confused with the FMA system which is entirely different). The printouts pertain to the following topics: Enemy strategy; POW Camps in North Vietnam; Effectiveness of South Vietnamese Units; North Vietnamese heavy artillery; and South Vietnamese Marines. We also received copies of the two subject modifiers which will pertain to number codes used on the printouts. Mrs. Bonnett has accessioned these printouts and will organize them for use by the historians. Mr. Van Devander of the DIA Library has been most cooperative.

5. Dr. Oscar Fitzgerald from NHD informed me that the Navy has discovered in the FRC, Mechanicsburg, Pa. over 4,000 reels of microfilm consisting of CinCPac messages organized by date/time group. We can borrow these reels on a selective basis.

6. It is recommended that the division have a professional seminar on Vietnam records and sources and that Vietnam historians from the other services and Dr. Hatcher be invited to participate.

1. On 3 March, Dr. Cosmas and I visited Dr. John Hatcher, TAG archivist for Vietnam Records to examine the finding aids to MACV records in his custody. During our discussion with Dr. Hatcher, we once more touched upon the captured enemy documentation contained in the FMA microfilm/computer system referred to in para 3 of Ref a. As explained in Ref a, the documentation in its present form is unworkable. There are three copies of the documentation--one maintained by Hatcher's office, one by the office of Hatcher, and the other held by the Air Force at Lowry Air Force Base in Colorado. Only a few computers can service the system. DIA is in fact phasing out its FMA system and no longer can search the records. A complete description of the documentation is contained in the enclosed memorandum from Colonel Harold W. Vorhies to DIA (encl 1). Colonel Vorhies headed the Documentation Branch, Exploitation Division, J-2 HQUSMACV, from June-November 1968. Dr. Hatcher and Colonel Vorhies are attempting to have the documentation declassified. Hatcher told us ideally that would like to give the documentation to a University Computer Center with the stipulation that the center provide and service these records. In a telephone conversation with Dr. Hatcher this afternoon, he mentioned that he and Colonel Vorhies are meeting serious opposition to their efforts and he is not too optimistic. I would recommend that the History and Museum Division give its full support to Hatcher's attempt to declassify these documents.

2. In a separate telephone conversation, Hatcher told me he is having the chronological printout index at Carlisle reproduced and it will be available for our use at his office in the near future.

3. In addition to the printouts and accession papers available at Hatcher's office, the Center for Military History maintains accession lists of records directly retired by it and also a set of monthly CORDS records.



1. The visit of members of the Marine Corps History and Museums Division to the DIA library on 22 December 1975 generated several questions as to how and if our division can exploit the information contained in your files to support our writing effort on Marines in the Vietnam War. Although the DIA library's card index is of limited use for our research, we learned that the DIA can provide computer printouts of documentation concerning specific subjects. It is requested that such printouts be provided to the division on the following categories:

- a. Estimates by year of overall enemy strategy from January 1965 through April 1975, with specific relation to the enemy B-5 Front, Military Region Tri Thien Hue, Military Region 5, and Front 4.
- b. Prisoner interrogation reports of VC/NVA officers and senior civilian cadre, e. g. province and district chiefs, from January 1965 through 1975.
- c. Reports on activities of the Vietnamese Marine Corps from 1954 through May 1975.
- d. Estimates of size and disposition of NVA heavy artillery, 1966-1975.
- e. Estimates of South Vietnamese unit effectiveness down to battalion, 1954-1975.
- f. MACV (CORDS) Hamlet Evaluation System reports, 1967-1975, and any comparable South Vietnamese evaluation reports.
- g. Evaluation of efforts to neutralize the VC Infrastructure, 1965-1975.
- h. Documents and reports on NVA/VC POW camps.
- i. Estimates of enemy strength and activity in the DMZ, January-March 1972, with special reference to the NVA 304th, 308th, and 324B Divisions.
- j. Description of targets struck by USAF in the DMZ, September 1971 through April 1972.
- k. Estimates of enemy strength and activity in the Central Highlands, especially in relation to Pleiku, January-March 1972.
- l. Estimates of enemy strength and situation in the Central Highlands and of the threat to Ban Me Thuot and Vietnamese estimates of the situation, February 1975.

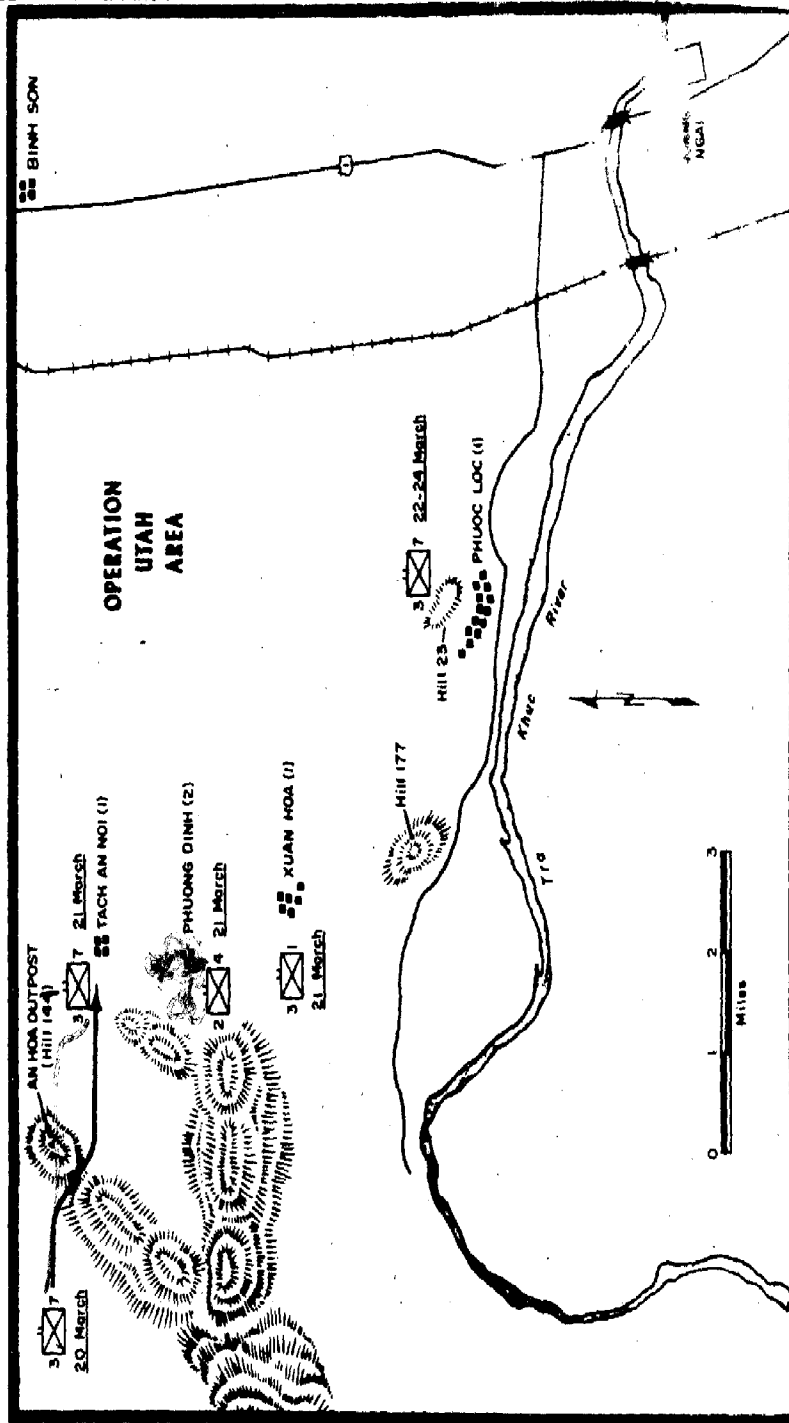
