(a) During the month of September the S-2 Officer attended the Marine Corps Intelligence Symposium in Hawaii.

(c) The S-2 Office briefed 108 EF-10B flights in support of the Navy and Air Force missions.

SECRETSECRETh. (S) Air Operations.

(1) During this reporting period VMJ-1 EF-10B aircraft conducted Electronic Counter Measures against AAA and SA-2 fire control radars in North Vietnam. One hundred and fifty one (151) sorties were flown in support of the Seventh Fleet and eighteen (18) sorties were flown in support of the Seventh Air Force.

(2) In addition to the above missions eight (8) "Iron Hand" Elint sorties were flown in North Vietnam for the location and collection of AAA and fire control radar emissions.

(3) One (1) "Tally Ho" active/passive sortie was flown in support of the III MAF.

(4)

(a) On 2 September, two RF-8A's were launched to photograph the area just North of the DMZ for confirmation of "Cross Slot" radar (see August's Command Chronology; Par h. part 4). Photographs revealed Radar installations plus numerous lucrative targets. Two RF-8A's were launched on the morning of 5 September for battle damage assessment and photos revealed the radar site was either destroyed or moved during the night. Photos also revealed that all other targets struck were either damaged or completely destroyed.

(b) Recent evidence reveals "Cross Slot" radar was damaged and removed during the cover of darkness (see para. 1.).

(5) VMJ-1 RF-8A flew one hundred and forty six (146) incountry photographic reconnaissance sorties in support of III MAF and ten (10) out of country (North Vietnam) photographic sorties, completing 155 photo missions.

During September VMCJ-1 supported one hundred and fifty one (151) U. S. Navy and eighteen (18) USAF/Marine Corps Rolling Thunder strikes in North Vietnam. VMCJ-1 also flew eight (8) passive ELINT collection missions in support of 7th Air Force. During this period ECM support was primarily in the form of active jamming against enemy fire control emitters (Firecans and Whiff) and the Fansong Radar used for Missile Control and guidance. ECM coverage was again provided in the highly defended areas of Than Hoa, Thia Binh, Nam Din, Haiphong, Hon Gay and Vinh complexes. In addition to the active ECM support provided, VMCJ-1 reported locations of one hundred twenty (120) Fire control emitters, seventeen (17) Fansong emitters and thirty five (35) EW/GCI emitters. A continuing ELINT effort is being conducted along the DMZ and Route Package one area while EF-10B's go to and return from target areas in the far North. During the past month the SO/Crosslot radar (strike of 4 Sep. see para II h. Air Ops) in the vicinity of the DMZ was again detected and a new SO/Crosslot radar was detected in the vicinity of Dong Hai on 21 Sep.

m. (U) Photo.

(1) During this reporting period VM CJ-1 RF-8A aircraft flew one hundred and fifty six (156) sorties in support of 1stMAW/III MAF. One hundred and eighty two (182) ^{missions} were received, one hundred and fifty five (155) were completed. A total of 40,199 feet of film was processed during this period.

n. (U) Command and Control. Nothing significant to report.

o. (U) Training. Normal training conducted.

p. (U) NBC. Normal training conducted.

q. (U) Logistics and Supply.

(1) One (1) EF-10B BuNo 125786 was received from NAS Atsugi (NIPPI) after completion of a ten (10) month PAR cycle.

(2) One (1) EF-10B BuNo 127051 was surface transported to NAS NORIS for overhaul and repair due to damage from wheel assembly exploding in flight. (See August Command Chronology).

(3) One (1) RF-8A BuNo 145636 received from NAS Atsugi (NIPPI) after completion of corrosion control.

(4) One (1) RF-8A BuNo 146860 was hit by enemy ground fire causing damage to the port inboard wing panel. Damage was repaired in 24 hour period.

(5) New aircraft reporting system was instituted by COMNAVAIRPAC or reporting aircraft in correct Al status code in accordance with COMNAVAIRPAC Instruction 5442.2H.

(6) On 23 September, the Maintenance department launched thirteen (13) out of 14 scheduled EF-10B sorties over a period of 24 hours. This aircraft availability represents the high state of readiness^{for} which the VM CJ-1 Maintenance department is known.

(7) The VM CJ-3 Advance Maintenance Party arrived on 23 September for the relief of VM CJ-1.

(8) Average availability of aircraft for this reporting period was 85%.
