

PART II NARRATIVE SUMMARY

The 1st Marine Aircraft Wing continued to fly in support of operations conducted throughout Military Region I. Fixed Wing aircraft flew 1,505 sorties and dropped 1,565.9 tons of ordnance. Helicopters flew 20,435 sorties and carried 60,717 tons of cargo and 27,653 passengers. During this period 3 helicopters and no fixed wing aircraft were lost due to direct enemy action.

PART III SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. OPERATIONS SUPPORTED

- a. During the month of March 1971, there were eleven operations in effect throughout Military Region I. Support was recored for five of these operations.
- (1) Jefferson Glen: Commenced C5180CH September 1970, with the 101st Airborned Division (AM) conducting search and clear operations in Quang Tri and Thua Thien Provinces. Fixed wing aircraft flew a total of 125 sorties dropping 396.4 tons of ordnance. EDA for this month was 1 KBMA, 17 bunkers destroyed, 1 bunker damaged, 9 secondary explosions, 12 secondary fires and 1 road cut.
- (2) Imperial Lake: Commenced 310930H August 1970. Fixed wing aircraft supported the operation by flying 127 sorites and dropping 359.8 tons of ordnance. HDA for this period was 3 structures destroyed, 1 bunker destroyed, 1 bunker damaged, 1 secondary explosion, 3 secondary fires, 1 bridge destroyed and 1 gun destroyed.
- (3) Finney Hill: Fixed wing aircraft flew 3 sorties while dropping 17.8 tons of ordnance during this reporting period. HDA for this month was 1 secondary explosion.

1. Due to the retrograde of the Wing Civil Affairs the Vietnamese Charitable Fund has been dissolved. This fund, totalling \$1,452.30, was divided and distributed to the following institutions for use in their Vietnamese projects:

Danang Assistant Nurses School- \$284.10 Crescent Beach Orphanage- \$284.10 Happy Haven Leprosorium- \$284.10 Cao Dai Temple, Danang- \$200.00 Catholic Relief Society- \$200.00 Buddhist Pagoda- \$200.00

- 2. The Civil Affairs Office continued to aid Crescent Beach. Several tons of building materials and supplies were delivered to the remote Orphanage by Marine Helocopter and U.S. Army Boat. A new school house is nearing completion and the kitchen is being renovated. These buildings have been made possible by Marines and other units who have donated time and materials. The money given them is to be utilized for the purchase of a Citizen Band Radio to be used for communication between the Orphanage and World Relief Society Headquarters.
- 3. Due to redeployment of the 1st MAW Dispensary the Med Caps at Phuoc Tuong have been discontinued. Since the 1st MAW Corpsman have joined the Medical Civic Action Program in February of 1971 over 10,000 inhabitants of Phuoc Tuong have been treated. The Med Caps in Co Man, Liem Lac, and Con Dau conducted with the aid of the MAG-11 medical personnel treated over 2,100 patients. The 95th Evacuation Medical Team is continuing to work in the hamlet of Hoa An. These Med Caps have treated over 700 patients during their work.
- 4. The Civic Action Office is continuing to work in the help-the-people-help-themselves. Lumber for the restoration of 51 homes has been distributed to the needy in the Wing AOR. At present the Civic Action Team members are assisting the hamlet in a self-development project of building a chicken house for 10,000 chickens. This project is being built in the hamlet of Phuoc Tuong at the old Wing Civic Action Compound.

5. Prior to the departure of the Wing Civil Affairs all projects will be terminated or reassigned to other units.

Pilots Return To Khe Sanh

(Editor's Note: This is the last story by Sgt. Sloat, who was killed in a helicopter crash near Phu Bai while covering the northern operations in late February.)

KHE SANH — The Marines have returned to Khe Sanh.

U.S. Marine helicopters are supporting U.S. Army and ARVN forces operating in the vicinity of Khe Sanh.

On the first day of the ARVN operation, the CH-53s ferried more than one million pounds of heavy artillery, ammunition, food and fuel across the frontier

Battle-Weary Vet Decorated

DA NANG — "Two-four-seven" they call it. It's a war hero, a combat-wise and battered veteran. It seemed to be grinning as it received its third decoration.

As a matter of fact, "Twofour-seven" seems to be grinning all the time, but that is part of its natural appearance. The grin fails to hide the hideous scars, grim souvenirs of its last battle wounds.

"Two-four-seven" is the saltiest member of our group," said Maj. Paul G. Judkins. "It was first wounded during the battle of Dong Ha, near the DMZ in 1967."

According to the major, "Twofour-seven" did not receive a Purple Heart when a mortar landed under its nose and inflicted deep wounds.

"Two days after it was wounded, it left Dong Ha under its own power. There were some people who thought it would surely die," continued Maj. Judkins, patting "Two-four-seven" on the side.

"Two-four-seven" survived and lived to see the 1968 Tet Offensive where it was wounded again in Phu Bai. Luck was not with it, though. "Two-four-seven" was ignored, patched up and sent back to Khe Sanh without recognition or decorations.

Two weeks ago it was sitting placidly — all 80,000 pounds of it — on the Da Nang Air Base flight-line when an enemy rocket ignited a nearby fuel dump and severely scarred its face with burns. "That was the limit," said Maj. Judkins, OIC of Sub-Unit 1, VMGR-152, who speaks of his aircraft as if they were living persons. "We had to give it some well-deserved medals."

"Two-four-seven" is the recipient of a Purple Heart with two

stars that prove all the action it has seen in Vietnam.

"We saw this KC-130 aircraft's record and the poor beast had literally been through hell," continued the major. "I was approached by SSgt. Norman J. Keefer who suggested we award the aircraft three Purple Hearts"

Hearts."

SSgt. Keefer is a Maintenance Chief for VMGR-152. He painted the proper ribbon on the KC-130's fuselage and the entire squadron attended the ceremony where Maj. Judkins painted the two stars.

"Two-four-seven" is currently undergoing "surgery" at MCAS Futema in Okinawa.



Laos Air Action

Skyhawks Blast Red Tanks

DA NANG—Three Russian-built light amphibious assault tanks being utilized by North Vietnamese troops in Laos were destroyed during air strikes by jet pilots from a Marine Attack Squadron.

The flight of A-4 "Skyhawk" jets, led by Col. A. C. Pommerenk, CO of the squadron's parent MAG, were on a scheduled bombing mission when they were diverted to aid besieged ARVN defenders of FSB 31, eight miles inside Laos.

Arriving at the scene of the intense ground battle, the pilots found the North Vietnamese

had one tank in position on a hill top, firing point blank into the ARVN position. Behind the hill, coming up the road, were four more assault tanks.

"The South Vietnamese were able to silence the one tank on the hill with their own artillery fire," related LtCol. Jerry T. Hagen, CO of the squadron and one of the pilots on the mission.

"The other four tanks started back down the hill, two turned left and two turned right," LtCol. Hagen continued. "Col. Pommerenk dropped bombs just short of the two tanks going south and cratered the road,

stopping their retreat. The second tank pulled up beside the lead tank and stopped."

With both tanks sitting side by side on the road, LtCol. Hagen made a bombing run which destroyed both tanks.


"They knew I was coming," stated LtCol. Hagen, "They raised their cannons and fired at my aircraft."

The two remaining tanks turned north, one off the open road and moved into a wooded area. The tank remaining on the road was destroyed on a bomb run by LtCol. Hagen. The last enemy tank escaped detection by remaining under cover in the wooded area.

Helicopters Rely On 'Ground' Pilot

KHE SANH — Maj. Rocco Valluzzi is a busy man.

You will find him everywhere in this northwestern part of Quang Tri Province, from Khe Sanh to nearby fire support and combat bases, to the Laotian border.

For 18 hours a day, the major is a dynamo of energy as he runs from one place to the other, shouting instructions, attending briefings and setting up communications — all part of his job as Marine Air Coordination Officer in Operation Lam Son 719.

The most important part of his job is to establish a web of supply for ARVN units in their thrust against communist sanctuaries in Laos.

For his job, Maj. Valluzzi utilizes CH-53 "Sea Stallion" helicopters from a marine heavy helicopter squadron to shuttle ARVN supplies to the ARVN at the battle front.

"When I came here on the first day of the operation," says Maj. Valluzzi during one of his few free moments, "I had to bulldoze about three acres of elephant grass in order to establish a clearing where the choppers could land."

Maj, Valluzzi is a pilot himself and has more than 200 missions in the "Sea Stallion."

According to Maj. Valluzzi, the helicopters have been making an average of 75 re-supply runs daily into Laos to get the vital supplies to advancing ARVN units.

"The first day alone," continued Maj. Valluzzi, "we carried more than one million pounds of supplies."

The CH-53's have proven themselves so worthy for this type of operation that BGen. O. E. Smith, Ass't CG of the 101st Airborne Div. (Airmobile) commented, "They have provided priceless help in the most vital moments."

During their runs across the border, the CH-53's are protected by AH-1 Cobra gunships from a Marine light helicopter squadron.

As air coordinator, the major lives in a canvas tent here, a place that brings back very many memories to him.

"I was here during the entire battle in 1968," he said, "and before that, I was here in 1966."

HML-367 Receives 4 New 'Deadlier' Cobras

DA NANG — HML-367, has acquired four of the deadliest Cobras in existence.

These Cobras are the new AH-IJ attack helicopters (shown above) assigned to the 1st MAW squadron for combat evaluation. They are much deadlier than their predecessor, the AH-1G.

The acquisition of the AH-1J will almost double HML-367's firepower output. Evaluations underway will determine future use of the new helicopters.

"We are the first Marine squadron to receive the new Cobra in a combat zone," commented Maj. Con Sillard, HML's XO, "and it's job to combat test it."

According to the major, the AH-1J is the most unique aircraft in the armed forces inventory.

"The capabilities of the ship have not been determined as yet," he continued, "but, according to its specifications, it will be a great weapon to have.

The aircraft is equipped with new rocket launchers which will

enable its gunner to fire any rocket in the pod in any order he wishes. It is also equipped with

wishes. It is also equipped with dual 20 millimeter guns.

Unlike the AH-IG, the new Cobras have two engines and a greater versatility in flight. "We do not know as yet how effective this aircraft will be," Maj. Sillard continued, "but tests conducted under the close observation of Bell Aircraft, makers of the helicopter, will show if it can prove itself in combat."

DANANG, Republic of Vietnam---Jet pilots from a Marine Attack Squadron, dropping smoke bombs from their A-4 "Skyhawk's", aided in the rescue of two U. S. Air Force fighter pilots who were surrounded by enemy troops.

Major R. L. Wood (Asheville, N. C.) and Captain George E. Fromm (Wyckoff, N. J.) were given the order to scramble when it was learned that the two pilots, down near Fire Support Base 31, eight miles inside the Laotian border, needed a smoke screen to allow rescue helicopters to extract them from the enemy infested area.

"We made contact with a Forward Air Controller who showed us where he wanted the smoke laid," related Major Wood. 'My wingman, Captain Fromm, and I joined up tightly and started a high speed descent."

"We made our run right down above the tree level," the major continued, "and put our smoke about 500 to 700 feet from the downed pilots."

Using the smoke screen cover created by the Skyhawks, helicopters were able to successfully evacuate the downed flyers despite the heavy concentration of enemy troops in the area.

"It was the first time we had used our smoke bombs," stated Major Wood. "We had been called many times but this was the first time we were able to utilize them."

Earlier in the day, other "Skyhawk" pilots made bombing runs to suppress the enemy fire which was being directed towards the downed pilots and rescue aircraft.

DANANG, Republic of Vietnam---Three Russian built PT76 light amphibious assault tanks being utilized by North Vietnamese troops in Laos were destroyed during air strikes by jet pilots from a Marine Attack Squadron.

The flight of A-4 "Skyhawk" jets, led by Colonel A. C. Pommerenk (Dana Point, Calif.), Commanding Officer of the squadron's parent Marine Aircraft Group, were on a scheduled bombing mission when they were diverted to aid besieged Army of the Republic of Vietnam (ARVN) defenders on Fire Support Base 31, eight miles inside the Laotian border.

Arriving at the scene of the intense ground battle, the pilots found the North Vietnamese had one tank in position on a hill top, firing point blank into the ARVN position. Behind the hill, coming up the road, were four more assault tanks.

"The South Vietnamese were able to silence the one tank on the hill with their own artillery fire," related Lieutenant Colonel Jerry T. Hagen (Norma, N. D.), Commanding Officer of the squadron and one of the pilots on the mission.

"The other four tanks started back down the hill, two turned left and two turned right," LtCol. Hagen continued. "Colonel Pommerenk dropped bombs just short of the two tanks going south and cratered the road, stopping their advance. The second tank pulled up beside the lead tank and stopped."

DANANG, Republic of Vietnam—The crew of a Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron again proved the adage "Marines take care of their own" when they braved enemy fire to rescue crewmen of another downed Marine transport chopper.

The drama began when Major Michael J. Wasko, Jr., (Coatesville, Pa.), flight leader of the mission, began lifting artillery pieces from an Army of the Republic of Vietnam (ARVN) fire support base eight miles inside the Laotian border to another ARVN base desperately in need of them.

The support base was under constant mortar and small arms fire and on several different occasions the squadron's choppers had been driven out of the area despite close air support by Marine and U. S. Army gunships. The job, however, was being done.

As Major Wasko hovered his helicopter over the area, seven to 10 enemy mortar rounds exploded nearby, crippling the aircraft.

Captain Robert F. Wemheuer (Pensacola, Fla.) and First Lieutenant Dan Silver (Cameron, Mo.), pilot and co-pilot of an accompanying Marine transport helicopter, saw the major's bird go down and immediately moved in with an extract ladder to pick up the crew.

"Three orewmembers got on the ladder but the pilot and co-pilot weren't in sight," Captain Wemheuer said. "I had three men on the ladder and the enemy was firing at them so I elected to get out with them and come back later".

Before the captain had a chance to return a U. S. Army UH-1 "Huey" helicopter picked up Major Wasko who remained behind to assist his injured co-pilot.

Within two days, thanks to the NATOPS school, they have the basic knowledge to assist the crew and protect them if necessary.

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

DANANG, Republic of Vietnam -- When nearby St. Joseph's Hospital begins operation next Fall, it's patients will rest comfortably on beds donated by the Marine Corps.

Three hundred beds, matresses and pillows will be given to the hospital, located in East Danang, by Marine Aircraft Group (MAG)-11's Marine Corps Property Branch, starting St. Joseph's on the way to becoming a 600-bed hospital.

The project was coordinated by MAG-11 Commanding Officer, Colonel A. C. Pommerenck (Dara Point, Calif.), Navy Lieutenant Commander Gerard T. McMahon (Boston, Mass.), MAG-11 Chaplain, and First Lieutenant Joseph Backo (Honolulu, Hawaii), the Group Property Officer.

During a meeting in Parky Jaruary with the Most Reverend Peter M. Phan Nyoc Chi, the Catholic Bishop who heads the hospital. Chaplain McMahon asked if he could help with the new hospital. Bishop Chi told the chaplain the hospital's needs and the chaplain carried cut the project from there.

Contacting Colonel Pommerenck, Chaplain McMahon found that MAG-11's property branch had nearly 300 excess beds, matresses and pillows. Arrangements were made to deliver the beds during April.

The "Hospital Brothers of St. John of God" will staff the hospital. Their major mission will be treating persons suffering from tuberculosis, a disease which afflicts nearly 85 percent of the Vietnamese.

Chaplain McMahon has already requested some of the needed supplies from U.S. hospitals to help care thesse patients and it is anticipated they will arrive before the hospital opens in six months.

DANANG, Republic of Vietname—Two Marine Attack Squadron (VMA)-311 pilots killed 30 North Vietnamese on a recent air support mission for South Vietnamese troops conducting Operation Lam Son 719 in Laos.

Major Dennis Cavagnaro (Healosburg, Calif.) and First Lieutenant Jerry Pullium (Andrews, N. C.), piloting A-4 "Skyhawk" jet aircraft, also destroyed three mortars, three rocket launchers, and caused 11 ammunition explosions.

A strike request was received by a Forward Air Controller from an Army of the Republic of Vietnam commander who reported his unit was under mortar and small arms

Although the North Vietnamese were hidden by haze and were dug into a wooded area, the pilots, strikes proved deadly.

Both pilots attacked the enemy position, making two runs to deliver their ordnance.

Ground forces swept through the enemy position the next day and confirmed 3000 dead, which were accredited to the VMA=311 pilots.



DANANG, Republic of Vietnam---A Gold Star in lieu of the second Distinguished Flying Cross was presented to Major Rocco F. Valluzzi (Brooklyn, N. Y.) "For heroism and extraordinary achievement in aerial flight while serving as a pilot with Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 463, Marine Aircraft Group 16, in connection with combat operations against the enemy in the Republic of Vietnam."

Major Valluzzi earned the award on June 10, 1970, when he launched as aircraft commander in a flight of four heavy transport helicopters assigned to resupply an outpost at Thoung Duc. The outpost, located at the junction of the Con and Vu Gia Rivers, had been under heavy pressure for several weeks by enemy troops in the surrounding hills and had been subjected to daily mortar fire which precluded the delivery of vital supplies to the outpost.

"Although he observed enemy mortar rounds impacting in the landing zone shortly after the lead aircraft lifted out of the area after having deposited its cargo, Major Valluzzi resolutely elected to continue his approach and succeeded in releasing his external load of supplies in the drop area before the enemy began delivering additional mortar fire into the zone," the citation accompanying the medal stated.

While the flight was refueling at Marble Mountain Air Facility the resupply mission to the outpost was declared an emergency mission.

The citation continued, "Quickly proceeding to the outpost Major Valluzzi, undaunted by the intensity of the hostile mortar and machine gun fire, skillfully maneuvered his transport into the dangerous area and safely delivered his external cargo load."

"While climbing out of the zone, he alertly observed the muzzle flashes from the mortar tubes and marked the enemy position with smoke grenades for air strikes by fixed wing aircraft. KHE SANH, Republic of Vietnam---The dials lit and hummed as monotonous and undecipherable communications jargon, to most persons, was being transmitted to a pilot somewhere over the Laotian border. A hum from a computer became a sharp squeal when the radar indicated the aircraft was over the bomb release point for striking the target.

"Stand by, Mark, Mark." Captain Golden C. Kirkland (Birmingham, Ala.) spoke into the mouthpiece. "Release. Thank you. You were supporting close air support missions for the Army of the Republic of Vietnam over a suspected enemy entrenchment."

With that, the Marine Officer in Charge of the Air Support Radar Team (ASRT) shut off the machine and shook his head in disbelief.

"It's really a strange feeling to realize you are bombing an enemy target many miles away without ever leaving this tiny room," he said.

Bombing targets many miles away is exactly what Capt. Kirkland and his men have been doing at a combat base near the Lactian border.

Assisted by a close knit team of radar experts from Marine Air Support Squadron (MASS) 3, a group from the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing (1st MAW) Communications Squadron, and utilizing a platoon of Marines from Headquarters and Headquarters Squadron (H&HS)-18 for security purposes, Capt. Kirkland and his men effectively enabled tons of ordnance to be dropped daily over enemy positions since the Operation Lam Son 719 in Laos began.

The support they provide helps airmen from all services find targets when visibility or darkness prevents effective dead-reckoning bombing.

"We work under the 101st Airborne (Airmobile) Division and therefore we operate 24 hours daily giving directions to pilots. One could easily say that we are on loan to the Army," the captain continued.

The ASRT system is a maze of intricate electronic and directional equipment that scans the skies searching for the aircraft on the bombing mission.

"Once we find the aircraft with a radar beam, we lock the directional signal on the aircraft. We feed the position to a computer which has the position of the target and then it feeds us information on how to guide the aircraft to the target," Capt. Kirkland explained.

The captain is very pleased with his operation and gives much of the credit to Commissioned Warrant Officer 3 Robert Hanevik (Elmore, Minn.) who was responsible for moving the entire equipment from Quang Tri to the forward combat base and having it ready for operation within 24 hours.

"I guess he set the record for moving the gear here in Vietnam," add Capt. Kirkland. So effective has been the maintenance procedures set by CWO-3 Hanevik that the radar has been operational continuously, except for 10 minutes during a black out in the power system, since the operation started.



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
