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PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1 January 1972 - 3 April 1972

First MAW Electronic Warfare activities consisted primarily of providing Electronic Warfare (EW) training for First MAW, COMSEVENTHFLT, and third country forces in order to maintain First MAW and supported forces contingency readiness. Training was provided to enable friendly forces to work with EW support forces and equipment; and to enable their effective use of Electronic Counter Counter Measures (ECCM) against enemy Electronic Countermeasures (ECCM).

VMCJ-1, with its six EA6A Electronic Countermeasures air-craft, provided the bulk of Electronic Warfare support operations for the Wing. This Headquarters coordinated all aspects of VMCJ-1 employment to ensure that scheduling was in the best interests of First MAW forces, and that operational requirements for equipments and personnel were established and forwarded to highereechelons to enhance the Wing's Electronic Warfare readiness.

Training Operations:

Readiness training programs, coordinated by First MAW Electronic Warfare Office in garrison in order of their priority, were accomplished as follows:

(1) Fringe City

Fringe City is the code name for Electronic Warfare, ESM training missions flown in conjunction with the national Peacetime Aerial Reconnaissance Program (PARPRO), within the Pacific Command (PACOM). However, scheduling approval is coordinated and approved by CINCPAC at the theatre level. First MAW "Fringe City" missions are nicknamed "Beater Hound". Flights are intended to provide readiness training to EA6A aircrews to enable enemy radar intercept in actual areas of contingency. The training track now approved and utilized originates and recovers at Iwakuni, paralleling the Korean Demilitarized Zone during the intercept partion of the track. The program is highly sensitive, therefore missions are scheduled, closely monitored and controlled by Wing Headquarters. Beaver Hound missions were scheduled two months in advance and cordinated at a monthly conference at Fuchu Air Station, Japan; where mission details were briefed and current operational procedures and temporary restrictions to operations discussed. Four missions each month were scheduled. These



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missions could be activated by OPREP-1 48 hours prior to ETD, anytime before the end of the month, leaving a great deal of scheduling flexibility. The Korean track provides productive intercept training, and since it launches and recovers at Iwakuni, is not dependent upon detachment deployment. Due to the present operational commitment of VMCJ-1 EW assests which began 3 April, the Fringe City program is held in abeyance for the detachment return. Missions are scheduled two months in advance and only cancelled on last effective day each month. Coordination with Fifth Air Force and COMSEVENTHFLT continues, so that as soon as the current operational commitment is terminated, evolution into contingency readiness training missions can be immediately re-established.

(2) Marine Fighter/MACS support:


The proper jammers for air-to-air breaklock jamming operations had only just been received prior to the VMCJ deployment, so though planning was in progress, no firm training program had been testablished. The acqisition of the "I" Band jammers for breaklock training did give the EA6A the only "I" Band support capability available in SEAsia capable of working against some newly introduced radar threats. The "D" Band jammers required for jamming Marine Air Control Squadrons (MACS) are not in the Wing inventory, as the emphasis on combat jammers has temporarily surmounted the requirement. However, anticipate additional jammers should be available in the not too distant future.

(3) Seventh Fleet:

Electronic Warfare training for transiting 7th Fleet ships was requested by ships and coordinated by CG First MAW and COMSEVENTHFLT. EA6A's, when unable to reach ships from Iwakuni, deployed to Atsugi. Kadena, Naha or Cubi, in order to properly brief and provide maximum jamming time against fleet radars. Though this training is an important Fleet requirement, it is hoped that when EA6A's must be deployed, an AWEX lasting two or more days can be accomplished in order to give EA6A aircrews more return for the deployment effort.

(4) Other Countries:

Electronic Warfare training, coordinated through COMSEVENTHFLT, was requested by Austrailian forces who had experienced EA6A contingency training in the past. Since EA6A's were deployed at the time-of the operation, EA6A participation was cancelled for this exercise. Several "Eagle" exercises with Taiwan forces were participated in with detachments of 3 - 4 EA6A's. This training more chosely approximates an actual EA6A contingency deployment, and is sought after as the most realistic mission training for VMCJ-l aircrews. No training with ROK or JASDF forces was scheduled during this reporting period. This essentially, summarizes the Electronic Warfare program conducted by



First MAW while VMCJ-1 was in garrison at Iwakuni.

3 April 1972 - 30 June 1972

Contingency Operations:

On 3 April 1972, the contingency alert was sounded to move four VMCJ-1 EA6A's to Cubi Point, Philippines, to stand by for CTF 77 support, The Det was in place the next day. Two more EA6A's, from VMCJ-1, joined the detachment shortly thereafter, bringing the count to six. A Det of four VMCJ-2 EA6A's upgraded VMCJ operations at Cubi to ten EA6A's on 17 April. Operational control of the combined VMCJ detachment was chopped to CTF 79, who chopped combined Det operations to CTF 77. One EA6A was missing in action after a mission on 13 April. The crew was not recovered, and the cause of loss has not been resolved to date.

The first CTF 77 support mission was flown on 7 April, initiating the pattern of EW support operations that exist to date:

- a. EA6A's and a KC-130F tanker launched from Cubi early in the morning, landing at Danang in preparation for the days missions. Actual ECM missions launched and recovered at Danang. Unless mechanical failure prevented departure, EA6A's and KC-130 did not remain overnight in Danang.
- b. Initial alert frags were received at Cubi and Danang. Usually two EA6A's launched thrice daily **@rom** Danang at various times.

CTF 77 operations were usually supported from Gulf of Tonkin orbits, clear of active surface-to-air missile envelopes, tactical situations permitting, parallel to the North Vietnam coast and perpendicular to supported aircraft coast in/coast out routes. The intent was to make enemy radar sites that are looking at the strike aircraft also look into the EA6A's jamming, thus decreasing the threat radars capability to accurately control weapons against the force.

Operational unit doctrine required that two EA6A's orbit at the same time at different altitudes, with only one aircraft turning at a given time. This allowed one aircraft to protect the other while jamming was constantly directed in support of ingressing/egressing aircraft.

A notable mission for which the Det commander, Ltcol CARLTON, has been recommended for the Navy Cross demonstrates the high degree of proficiency and mission dedication of VMCJ aircrews. It should be noted that CTF 77 places high significance on the value of the EA6A's life saving support of their North Vietnam operations, largely because of the great decrease in aircraft





losses occurring subsequent to the EA6A's employment.

Despite a rocket attack, flight system problems and the fact he would have to go it alone when his wingman went down in the schocks, "Major" CARLTON" made up the time caused in initial problem delays, arriving on station adjacent to Haiphong just as the first aircraft crossed the beach. A threat site fired five missiles during the EA6A's 1&1/2 hours on station, three requiring evasion, which was delayed until the last moment in order to keep jamming oriented at the threat. Throughout this adventure, the EA6A was positioned to provide critically aligned and effective support jamming. Many of the over two hundred missiles fired that day were observed in ballistic flight, unguided without proper radar tracking. None of the Navy aircraft of B-52 strike force involved in the raid that day were lost to enemy missiles.

Though a few night support operations have been flown, the detachment expressed the desire that they not be extended beyond the daily support operations being conducted. Any step up in operations, they felt, would exceed their capability to retain consistant availability of VMCJ Det EA6A's.

The First MAW Electronic Warfare section of G-3 monitored and coordinated much of the necessary planning that effected the operations summarized above.

Additionally, the section provided comprehensive Electronic Warfare tactical briefings and an updated threat analysis to each Wing unit prior to their departure/redeployment from Iwakuni.

The operational basis for procurring additional EW equipments and tactical studies was researched then coordinated with other Wing Headquarter sections prior to submission to higher Headquarters. For example, EW studies supporting the acquistion of IRCM for perationally deployed Helicopters were the catalyst for formulating interim installations and countermeasures for CTG 79.3 Helicopter assets.

The Electronic Warfare Officer traveled to the VMCJ Det at Cubi on several occasions to coordinate briefings validated by other source documentation, and assist the organization of operational reporting.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY


During this reporting period the Management Division saw the culmination of months of research and study analysis thru the contract leasing of six Magnetic Card Selectric Typewriters. Two machines were installed in Staff Judge Advocate Building during January and the remaining four placed in the newly formed Word Processing Center. Processing Center was placed in operation on 6 March 1972. In addition to the normal daily routine a Staff Study was accomplished pertaining to the feasibility of combining the operation of the 1st MAW and MCAS Communication Centers. Further action on this Staff Study has been suspended pending further guidance. As a result of a Staff Study completed during the latter part of December the 1st MAW Communications Section received 4 XEROX copiers. These copiers were placed in operation on 23 April 1972. Other studies currently under way are (1) a study to determine the feasibility of combining other existing 1st MAW/MCAS Iwakuni activities and (2) preliminary planning for the establishment of a Operations Analysis Section within the Management Division pending the arrival of OA trained officers programmed for July. vigorous supervision of the Incentive Awards and Management Improvement Programs resulted in the submission of 32 Beneficial Suggestions and realized savings of \$42,250 in Cost Reductions and \$1,271,737 in Austerity Savings for FY-72. In addition to normal weekly/monthly briefings, the Management Division prepared special readiness briefs for the following dignitaries:

Special activities at DPI #28 included the conversion of manually updated MARES Data Base card deck to a Disc Pack through FORSTAT programs developed by the 3rd MAW. A special Marine Air Wing Personnel System (MAPS) briefing was presented to CG III MAF Lieutenant General L. METZGER on 17 February 1972. The upgrade of IBM 1401 B-5 computor to IBM 1401 C-6 configuration was begun in April and is currently 65% complete. Status of this upgrading is reported to FMFPAC biweekly by message. Of special interest is that this conversion was programmed and budgeted for a cost of \$2000.00, through utilization of assigned Computer Engineer the conversion so far has been accomplished at no cost to the Government.





During this reporting period the Readiness Information Center was deeply involved with the revised FORSTAT program as set forth in JCS Pub 6, Vol II, Part 2, Chap 1. Extensive schooling for subordinate units covering the revised system was conducted through the early months of this reporting period resulting in a relatively smooth transition from the "old FORSTAT" to the "new system". Dual reporting under both system ceased on 10 March 1972. Beginning the latter portion of March and intermittantly throughout April schooling was conducted in FORSTAT reporting for deploying elements of the 1st MAW. As additional elements of the 1st MAW were committed to current operational commitments in SEA it became necessary for the 1st MAW FORSTAT NCO to make several Staff visits to deployed units to assist the units in establishing a FORSTAT reporting system. Throughout the period covered by this chronology the Wing maintained a C-2 state of readiness. A detailed breakdown of 1st MAW units readiness by month are included as Tab F to this chronology.

As the tempo of operations increased in SEA, the Assistant Chief of Staff, Management, Major TUTTLE was deployed, as a pilot augmentee, to MAG-15 (Fwd). He remained deployed until just prior to his Rotation Tour Date (14 April - 16 May 72) at which time he returned to MCAS, Iwakuni and shortly thereafter he departed for CONUS. During the above period Major W. P. ALEKSIC was acting as the Assistant Chief of Staff, Management. On 24 May 1972 Major ALEKSIC was assigned as the Assistant Chief of Staff, Management.





- 1. In reference (a), authority was requested from the Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, to lease eight (8) MC/ST units from IBM Japan, Ltd. The purpose of that message was to expedite administrative action. Through the medium of this letter, full justification for the lease of such equipment is provided.
- 2. Peference (b) directed a review of the subject Word Processing Center as being worthy of consideration for adoption at other field activities, including Fleet Marine Force activities. Since the publishing of reference (b), several other major activities, including the 3d Marine Aircraft Wing, have reported qualitative and cost benefits in the operation of similar Document Processing Centers (DPC). The Assistant Chief of Staff, Management was directed to begin a comprehensive study with a view toward utilizing similar equipment and the DPC concept within this Headquarters.
- 3. Because of the very limited ability of IBM Japan, Ltd., to conduct or participate in a document processing study, the Wing Management Division undertook such a study with the assistance of the staff sections concerned. Data were collected from each of the following divisions/sections: G-1, G-2, G-3, G-4, Staff Secretary, Inspector, Comptroller, Adjutant, Communication-Electronics, Chaplain, Supply, Staff Judge Advocate and Management. Among the objectives to have been satisfied in the study were the following: (1) to determine the feasibility of establishing a DPC in the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing; (2) given the feasibility of



such a Center, to determine optimum configuration including types of equipment used; and (3) to determine support requirements.

- 4. Central to this study was the assumption that there is little justification for establishing a centralized typing and document processing capability unless substantial cost savings and qualitative advantages can be demonstrated. Translated, this assumption means one of two things. A new system will have to produce either more documents with a given direct labor input or a given level of document production with a reduced direct labor input. Since the actual number of documents processed in the existing system is basically satisfactory, the analysts in the study were interested in a new system which would reduce labor inputs, thus leading to measurable cost savings. They were further interested in a system which would significantly increase the quality of documents produced.
- Within the Wing Headquarters, 81 typists were identified. Some did virtually nothing but typing work. Others were involved in a wide range of tasks including typing. In order to determine how much typing each of these Harines did and the nature of the documents he processed, each man was required to participate in a two week data collection effort. The form attached as enclosure (2) was used to collect data from all 31 typists. Analysts supplied detailed instructions and made numerous personal visits to Marines involved in the study to ensure that data submissions were as accurate as possible. This two week period was followed by another, also two weeks in length, in which the analysts randomly sampled the typist population to personally observe what the typists were doing. They utilized the form attached as enclosure (3). There was no bias during the data collection effort resulting from seasonal typing fluctuations, operational commitments and so forth.
- 6. The following information came to light during the course of the study:
- a. A wide range of typing work can be produced in a Wing DPC. Included in this range are the following:
- (1) Rough and final drafts of unclassified directives produced not only at the Wing Headquarters but also at all subordinate units resident at MCAS, Iwakuni.



- (3) Unclassified letters, memoranda, citations, and reports originated in the Wing Headquarters.
- (4) Special documents produced in the Office of the Staff Judge Advocate for all Wing subordinate units.
- b. Within the 13 divisions/sections participating in the study, a total of approximately 45,000 typing lines per week were being generated. The direct labor input averaged 850 man hours per week. Included in this total are 154 man hours per week expended in the Office of the Staff Judge Advocate.
- c. Time required from rough draft to finished copy will be significantly reduced by using PC/Sm's. Currently both rough and finished material are typed at the same rate of speed (about 10 wpm). But, since the storage capability of the MC/ST eliminates the need for a typist to retwoe the final copy, the MC/ST automatically produces a smooth copy at 165 wpm.
- d. The advanced features of the MC/SE, resulting in a daily output of approximately 1500 lines per unit, will permit a DPC containing eight machines to exceed present Headquarters production. This added capacity will allow the Wing DPC to assume responsibility for typing all unclassified directives and legal documents now typed by subordinate units.
- e. Using historical data supplied by the 3d Marine Aircraft Ming and current data from IBM Japan, Etd., it has been determined that a total of two supervisors, 10 clerk-typist and eight magnetic card (MC/ST) machines will constitute the projected DPC in this Headquarters. The two supervisors and 10 typists needed to staff the Center will come out of the total of 81 typists now employed in this Headquarters. The wages paid these Marines represent a sunk cost and do not appear in the cost analysis in enclosure (1). The establishment of a DPC will allow nine Marines of the Wing Headquarters Staff to be relieved of typing/clerical duties. They will be available for personnel redistribution action and therefore represent potential savings. These savings are identified in enclosure (1). These personnel savings do not reflect reduction at the group and squadron level which will be possible once the Wing DPC begins processing work for subordinate commands.

- f. Given the requirements of this Command, the MC/ST appears to offer performance equivalent to that of the Magnetic Tape Selectric Typewriter Model II or IV at a lower cost. The MT/ST models utilize tapes containing 23,000 characters of storage capacity; those tapes must be purchased for \$30 each. The MC/ST operates with a card possessing a capacity of 5000 characters; these cards cost \$1 each. The advantages of lower cost and simplicity of operation are expected to far outweigh any disadvantages resulting from the use of cards rather than tapes.
- 7. The quantitative case for extablishing a DPC in the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing is laid out in enclosure (1). During the first full year of operation, FY-73, a DPC within this Wing can operate at an annual savings of \$20,833 (using current wage and price data). This figure is substantiated by data from other commands using similar equipment and centralized typing systems. The qualitative case for establishment of a DPC is also strong. The DPC concept will allow skilled typists to be centralized under the supervision of experienced administrative personnel. Using the high productivity and error-free potential of MC/STs, great improvements in the quality of typewritten documents produced in this Headquarters can be expected.
- 8. Satisfactory maintenance and educational services are available from IRM Japan, Ltd. Maintenance is guaranteed within 24 hours of placement of a service call. English speaking instructors will visit this Headquarters three times annually to provide training.
- 9. In view of the strong justification to establish a DPC within this Headquarters and the ability of IBM Japan, Ltd., to provide continuing support, it is requested that authority be granted for the rental of eight (8) MC/ST typewriters. Management, Staff Judge Advocate and Adjutant representatives have determined that the MC/ST better fits the needs of this Command than either the Magnetic Tape Selectric Typewriter Model II or Model IV. The use of MC/STs in a centralized DPC will enable this Headquarters to establish a high productivity typing system which will benefit all Wing units resident at MCAS, Iwakuni. Constraints imposed by shortages of proficient typists and ever increasing volumes of typing work will be significantly reduced in magnitude.



INCIDENTLY, ONE UNIQUE FEATURE OF THE CENTER IS THE CENTRALIZATION OF BOTH FORSTAT REPORTING (WHICH IS NORMALLY A G-3 FUNCTION). AND MARES LOGISTICS REPORTING (WHICH IS NORMALLY A G-4 FUNCTION)

IN MWCS-18 EQUIPMENT READINESS IS DEGRADED PRIMARY DUE TO A RECENT CHANGE IN THE TABLE OF PREPORTABLE COMBAT ESSENTIAL EQUIPMENT. THE CHANGE IMPROVED ALL FUNCTIONAL AREAS, (MT. ENG. OTHER) EXCEPT COMMUNICATIONS.

ITEMS PREVIOUSLY LEN CODED WERE ADDED TO THE LISTING. (AS THE GENERAL WILL RECALL, THESE WERE USED FOR MANAGEMENT PURPOSES ONLY. AND PREVIOUSLY WERE NOT CONSIDERED IN COMPUTING CEE READINESS. HOWEVER THESE ITEMS ARE NOW USED.) AS A RESULT, BOTH T/E DEFICIENCIES AND DEADLINED COMBAT ESSENTIAL EQUIPMENT OF THE SQUADRON INCREASED.

SIR. MASS-2 IS 3 IN THE MEASURED AREA OF PERSONNEL WITH 77% OF T/O ON HAND. 6 PEOPLE ARE DEEDED FOR RETURN TO C2. CRITICAL MOS'S ARE THE PROBLEM HERE. THE G-1 IS ABREAST OF THE PERSONNEL DEFICIENCIES.

SOME RELIEF SHOULD BE PROVIDED MASS-2 WITH THE ARRIVAL OF 219.
INBOUNDS THE WING IS STILL AWAITING FOR THE MONTH OF APRIL.

THE RESTRICTION HAS BEEN IMPOSED BY FMFPAC, WITH CONCURRENCE OF HEADQUARTERS MARINE CORPS, BASED UPON THE FACT THAT SATELLITE AIRFIELD SUPPORT IS NOT ESSENTIAL FOR CURRENT WING HELICOPTER OPERATIONS. AS A RESULT, MABS-36, SINCE REDEPLOYMENT FROM VIETNAM, HAS BEEN STAFFED WITH SUFFICIENT PERSONNEL TO SUPPORT ONLY A SINGLE AIRFIELD.

HOWEVER, FMFPAC HAS DIRECTED THAT MABS-36 CONTONUE TO REPORT AGAINST A FULL T/O OF 643. THIS HEADQUARTERS DESIRES TO REPORT AGAINST A REDUCED T/O - TWO RECLAMAS TO THE FMFPAC POSITION HAVE BEEN SUBMITTED WITHOUT SUCCESS.

THE COMPOSITE READINESS OF C2 FOR MABS-36 IS BASED UPON THE REDUCED MISSION OF OPERATING ONLY ONE AIRFIELD.

THE SQUADRON HAS 30 PERSONNEL TAD ABOARD THE USS CORAL SEA AUGMENTING THE VMA (AW) 224 DETACHMENT. THESE PERSONNEL ARE ACCOUNTABLE FOR REPORTING PURPOSES, HOWEVER, ARE NOT AVAILABLE TO THE SQUADRON FOR ESSENTIAL MAINTAINENCE. WHEN SUBTRACTED FROM ON HAND STRENGTH, VMA(AW) 533 ACTUALLY HAS 74% OF 1/O ON HAND. QULY SQUADRON PRIDE, AND A THREE SHIFT WORKING DAY, HAS PERMITTED 533 TO REMAIN C1 IN ALL OTHER MEASURED AREAS.

THE SQUADRON IS MARGINALLY READY (C3) IN OVERALL READINESS.

THE PERSONNEL DEFICIENCY SEVERELY LIMITS VMA(AN)-533's

CAPABILLTY TO PERFORM ITS ASSIGNED MISSION IN A DEPLOYED SITUATION.

THE WING G-1 IS ABREAST OF THE PERSONNEL DEFICIENCIES.

THE 15 MAY PROJECTED DATE OF CHANGE TO C2 DVERALL READINESS IS PREDICATED UPON THE ARRIVAL OF MOS SKILLS PARTICULAR TO THE AG-A AIRCRAFT.

SIR, SINCE 1 APRIL 72, HMA-369 HAS BEEN IN THE PROCESS OF ACTIVATION FROM A CADRE STATUS. READINESS POSTURE IS CURRENTLY COMPUTED AGAINST AN AUTHORIZATION OF 12 AIRCRAFT. 4 AH-1J ARE ON HAND - 8 ARE PROJECTED NOT LATER THAN 30 JUNE 72. AND 12 NOT LATER THEN 30 SEPT 72.

THE MANNING LEVEL WILL REFLECT PERSONNEL STAFFING TO SUPPORT THE AH-1J BUILD UP. CONSEQUENTLY, C2 OVERALL READINESS IS NOT EXPECTED UNTIL SOME TIME DURING THE 1ST QUARTER OF FISCAL YEAR 73.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- 1. On 1 February 1972, a new executive staff division was established under an Assistant Chief of Staff, G-5 (Human Affairs). On 14 April 1972, the G-5 Division was redesignated the Human Affairs Division in accordance with instructions from the Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force Pacific not to use the term G-5 and/or S-5 to designate Human Affairs Staff Sections and/or officers. This division provides human affairs support and consolidates personnel services. The responsibiliteis of the Human Affairs Division include improvement of racial harmony and assurance of equal opportunity; enhancement of personnel services; and extension of inter-/intra-personal communications.
- 2. Direct supervision is provided in the areas of drug abuse education and drug exemption, PEOPLE Training, human relations, congressional and special interest correspondence, the Marine Corps Human Relations Training Program, postal matters, and career planning. Staff cognizance has been assumed over chaplain, education, special services, and public affairs (troop information program) activities. Close coordination is maintained with the Staff Judge Advocate for legal assistance referral and other legal matters. Liaison is also maintained with messes, clubs, disbursing, Marine Corps Exchange and the Provost Marshal for other kindred personnel related functions where appropriate.
- 3. Drug education lectures and seminars were attended by 1870 Wing personnel during the period from 1 January 1972 to 30 June 1972. Since receipt of ALMAR 77 of 19 July 1971, 121 Marines entered the drug exemption program; 29 of the 121 total exemptions were granted from 1 January 1972 to 30 June 1972. Total Marines rehabilitated locally and retained since July 1971 was 32; 15 of the 32 Marines were rehabilitated within the Command from 1 January 1972 to 30 June 1972. On 3 March 1972, the 1st MAW hosted the Japan Drug Abuse Conference chaired by representatives from HQMC. On 4 May 1972, the Marine Corps Random Urinalysis Program was implemented. To provide an open line of communication, to demonstrate concern and understanding, and to solve individual needs on an informal basis, a "coffee house" was opened at Iwakuni on 23 June 1972. The coffee

house seeks to function as a therapeutical center rather than an activity to air complaints. The coffee house is staffed and supervised by personnel from the Drug Abuse Education Contact Team and PEOPLE Training Unit. Its goal is to desensationalize, to provide accurate information, and to offer alternatives to drug abuse through open and free communication with the individual concerned. The counselors also aim at solving underlying problems an individual might have which leads to drug and alcohol involvement.

- 4. PEOPLE Training Seminars were scheduled on a weekly basis in an effort to produce more understanding and mutual respect by improving leadership and communication skills. Through the period ending 30 June 1972, a total of 1870 officers and men have been trained within the 1st MAW.
- 5. The Wing Human Relations Office, Human Affairs Division provided counseling services responsive to complaints in those areas where practices or policies are suspected of being discriminatory. In addition, this office presented lectures on equal opportunity as part of orientation briefings held for new arrivals to the Wing.
- 6. The Congressional/Special Interest Correspondence Section completed 206 inquiries which also included welfare reports and requests for family and financial assistance. Monthly average of inquiries was 34.
- 7. Human Relations Training Program Briefings for Marine General Officers, principal staff members, subordinate commanders, and senior staff NCO's were held on 27 March 1972, as a prelude to the introduction of the program within the command. Colonel D. J. HUNTER, Head, Human Relations Branch, G-3 Division, HQMC and Dr. Robert HUMPHREY, American Institutes for Research presented the briefings. The Marine Corps Human Relations Training Program was tailored to fit the current operational situation of the 1st MAW by forming six human relations training teams consisting of one human relations instructor and five discussion leaders each. These teams conduct the initial 20 hours of human relations training squadron by squadron with separate classes being held weekly for new arrivals. The program was implemented on 22 May 1972, when the first unit discussion leaders class commenced. By 30 June 1972, 30 discussion leaders were trained and 898 Marines had received the initial 20 hours of human relations training.

- During the period from 1 January 1972 to 14 April 1972, there were no Unit Post Offices that were activated. The complete Fixed Credit of \$50,000.00 was retained in the Main Branch Post Office Account during this period, being audited on a monthly basis. On 15 April 1972, Branch 14009 New York, N.Y., Unit # 1 was activated and deployed to Danang, Republic of Vietnam to serve deployed Marine Unit #1 was withdrawn on 20 June 1972, and returned to MCAS, Iwakuni, Japan. From 17 April 1972 to 18 June 1972, Unit #1 sold 6,053 Money Orders totalling \$468,742.73 (no fees collected in RVN) and \$1,280.00 in stamps. While deployed Unit#1 was allocated a \$10,000 Fixed Credit from the Main Branch Account. On 20 May 1972, Branch 14009 New York, N.Y. Unit#2 Post Office was activated and deployed to Bien Hoa, Republic of Vietnam on 24 May 1972 to serve deployed Marine units. Upon arrival of the Wing Postal Officer at Bien Hoa on 25 May 1972, it was ascertained that adequate postal service could be provided by the U.S. Air Force Post Office at Bien Hoa, and that there would be no need to operate Unit#2. A Marine POstal Liaison NCO was installed in the Air Force Post Office. Unit#2 was returned to Iwakuni on 28 May 1972, and subsequently redeployed on 3 June 1972, to serve Task Force Delta in Thailand. Unit#2 commenced handling mail at Task Force Delta on 3 June 1972. Money order and stamp sales commenced on 15 June 1972. From 15 June 1972 to 30 June 1972, Unit#2 sold 1,455 Money Orders totalling \$92,553.78-Fees \$218.25 and \$2,461.50 in stamps. While deployed Unit#2 is allocated a \$10,000.00 Fixed Credit from the Main Branch Account.
- 9. On 1 May 1972, the Career Planning function was transferred from the G-1 Division to the Human Affairs Division in order to more closely align the organization for support of human affairs with that of the Human Affairs Division at HQ, FMFPAC. During the period from 1 January 1972 to 30 June 1972, the 1st MAW Career Planning Section conducted staff visits to all subordinate units and gave presentations to four Staff NCO Academy and two NCO Academy classes. The HQMC Career Planning Contact Team, a representative from the HQMC Marine Security Guard School, and the FMFPAC Career Planning Team provided presentations to the 1st MAW. During March 1972, the 1st MAW sent a representative to the HQMC Career Planning Conference in Washington D. C.

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10. During the reporting period the Human Affairs Division coordinated the visits of the CMC Advisory Committee for Minority Affairs and the Director, Equal Opportunity (Military), OASD: M&RA. The Human Affairs Division also participated in briefings for the Commandant of the Marine Corps and the Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific.

1. <u>Purpose</u>. To announce the establishment of a Courtesy Patrol within the First Marine Aircraft Wing.

Background. A well established tradition within the Marine Corps is that Marines take care of their own. in recent months there have been complaints, allegations, frustrations, and irritations voiced and surfaced concerning liberty conditions and the conduct of our fellow Marines in the Iwakuni areas of KAWASHIMO and RTO. Commanders are responsible for the conduct, welfare, and well-being of their men not only during normal working hours but during off-duty and liberty hours as well. One technique that has been used successfully from time to time throughout the Marine Corps to make Commanders more aware of the liberty conditions, problems and requirements of their men has been the use of Courtesy Patrols. The concept of operations for the Courtesy Patrol is to provide assistance and a helping hand to a Marine "before" he gets in trouble. It also affords the opportunity of providing accurate information to the men and feedback to the Command in an informal environment. The Courtesy Patrol does not perform a security function; this remains within the province of the Provost Marshal. Accordingly, the Courtesy Patrol does not interfere or supersede the activities of the Military Police when they are required to take action or assume jurisdiction in appropriate cases. Members of the Courtesy Patrol will, however, take action imherent with responsibilities of their rank in providing assistance or helping Marines of this command in the KAWASHIMO/RTO area during peak liberty periods. It must be emphasized that the goal of the Courtesy Patrol is to reduce or neutralize irritants and help all Marines before they become a problem for the Military Police with possible disciplinary action as the outcome. As a fact of life Courtesy Ratrols will be primarily concerned with Marines who through overindulgence are potential risks to good order and discipline.

c. Courtesy Patrol Coordinator

- (1) Report to Assistant Chief of Staff, G-5 by 1600 daily, Monday thru Friday, for a briefing and special instructions. Personnel assigned duty on Saturday and Sunday will also report by 1600 Friday.
- (2) Muster the Courtesy Patrol Team inside the Main Gate at 1945 on the nights of operation, outline the team areas and routes of patrol, and pass on any special instructions.
- (3) Check in with the Military Police Operations at Building 457 by phone (Extensions 3232 or 4444). Report the time the Courtesy Patrol is activated and secured.
- (4) The Military Police Sub-Station at KAWASHIMO is the place of duty for the Courtesy Patrol Coordinator.
- (5) Maintain a journal of significant events and furnish a letter report to the Commanding General (Attn: ACofS, G-5) by 1000 on the first working day following the tour of duty. Unusual events will be reported orally by 0800.

d. Senior Member Courtesy Patrol Team

- (1) Report with team to Courtesy Patrol Coordinator inside the Main Gate at 1945 on the night assigned duty for instructions.
- (2) Deploy teams to assigned areas and commence providing assistance and a helping hand to Marines as required.
- (3) Check in with Courtesy Patrol Coordinator as directed.

DISCUSSION

THE ORGANIZATION WITHIN THE 1ST MAW FOR SUPPORT OF HUMAN AFFAIRS IS ESTABLISHED IN CONFORMITY WITH CG FMFPAC GUIDELINES. JOINT ORGANIZATION-AL STRUCTURE WITH MCAS, IWAKUNI HAS BEEN PARTIALLY ESTABLISHED. CERTAIN ACTIVITIES SUCH AS THE JOINT EDUCATION OFFICE AND CONSOLIDATED SPECIAL SERVICES ARE FORMALLY ESTABLISHED. 1ST MAW PERSONNEL SUPPORT IS PROVIDED TO MCAS, IWAKUNI THROUGH THE FLEET ASSISTANCE PROGRAM. THE 1ST MAW PROVIDES TRAINING SUPPORT TO MCAS, IWAKUNI IN DRUG ABUSE EDUCATION AND PEOPLE

TRAINING. LIAISON HAS ALREADY BEEN ESTABLISHED TO PROVIDE THE SAME TRAINING SUPPORT FOR THE HUMAN RELATIONS TRAINING PROGRAM. THE JOINT DRUG ABUSE CONTROL COUNCIL HEADED BY THE ASSISTANT WING COMMANDER AND THE JOINT HUMAN RELATIONS ADVISORY COUNCIL CHAIRED BY THE EXECUTIVE OFFICER, MCAS, IWAKUNI ARE OTHER EXAMPLES OF MUTUAL COOPERATION.

RECOMMENDATIONS

EXAMINE OTHER AREAS FOR POTENTIAL CONSOLIDATION WITH MCAS, IWAKUNI SUCH AS CAREER PLANNING.

TOPIC

ATTITUDE CHANGES REQUIRED TO HANDLE PREVIOUS DRUG USERS.

BACKGROUND

THE POLICY AND GUIDANCE THAT ENCOURAGEMENT AND GENUINE CONCERN FOR THE PREVIOUS DRUGUSER IS ESSENTIAL TO REGAINING AND MAINTAINING HIS SELF-RESPECT AS A MARINE IS UNDERSTOOD.

DISCUSSION

ATTITUDE CHANGES ON THE PART OF MANY PERSONNEL. IN LEADERSHIP POSITIONS AT ALL LEVELS MUST BE OBTAINED. THE FOLLOWING ACTIONS HAVE BEEN TAKEN WITHIN 1ST MAW IN AN EFFORT TO IMPART A GENUINE ATTITUDE OF CONCERN. THE POLICIES SET FORTH BY CG FMFPAC AND THIS HEADQUARTERS HAVE BEEN REEMPHASIZED TO THE GROUP COMMANDERS AND THE WING STAFF AT THE COMMANDING GENERAL'S CONFERENCE ON 4 MAY 1972. THE JOINT DRUG ABUSE CONTROL COUNCIL FURTHER DISCUSSED THE IMPORTANCE OF THIS TOPIC ON 5 MAY 1972. TWENTY-ONE GLOUP AND SQUADRON DRUG EXEMPTION REPRESENTATIVES ATTENDED A DRUG EXEMPTION SCHOOL ON 4 AND 5 MAY 1972, WHICH EMPHASIZED THE POSITIVE APPROACH NEEDED IN HANDLING PREVIOUS DRUG USERS. - THE WING DRUG ABUSE EDUCATION CONTACT TEAM PRESENTS CLASSES TO OFFICERS AND STAFF NCO'S PLUS SERGEANT AND BELOW ON A SCHEDULED BASIS. REGULAR DRUG ABUSE EDUCATION CLASSES ARE ALSO PRESENTED TO THE SNCO AND NCO ACADEMY.

RECOMMENDATION

CONTINUE COMMAND EMPHASIS AND REINFORCE EDUCATION EFFORTS.

TOPIC.

REENLISTMENT AND OFFICER RETENTION FOR USMC AND USN PERSONNEL IN THE FIRST MARINE AIRCRAFT WING.

BACKGROUND

REENLISTMENT GOALS FOR THE MARINE CORPS FOR FISCAL YEAR 1972 WERE ESTABLISHED AS 15% FOR FIRST TERM, 56% FOR CAREER, AND 23% FOR TOTAL REENLISTMENTS. THE NAVY ESTABLISHED A GOAL OF 30% FOR TOTAL REENLISTMENTS. NO GOALS HAVE BEEN ESTABLISHED FOR MARINE CORPS OR NAVY OFFICER RETENTION.

DISCUSSION

ENCLOSURE (1) COMPARES THE 1ST MARINE AIRCRAFT WING REENLISTMENT RATE WITH FLEET MARINE FORCE PACIFIC AND THE MARINE CORPS FOR THE FIRST HALF OF FISCAL YEAR 1972. ENCLOSURE (2) SHOWS THE SAME COMPARISON FOR THE THIRD QUARTER OF FISCAL YEAR 1972. IST MAW AND FMFPAC REENLISTMENT RATES ARE BASED ON THE NUMBER OF EAS'S AS DIRECTED BY HQMC. THE NAVY RHENLISTMENT RATES FOR FISCAL YEAR 1972 AS SHOWN ON ENCLOSURE (3) COMPARES THE FIRST MAW WITH FMFPAC. SINCE THE ASSIGNMENT OF A MAVY TRAINED CAREER COUNSELOR TO THE 1ST MAW THE FIRST TERM REENLISTMENT RATE HAS DOUBLED SINCE THE . FIRST HALF OF FY '72, THE STATUS OF OFF-ICER RETENTION IN THE 1ST MAW FOR BOTH USMC AND USN IS REFLECTED ON ENCLOSURE (4).

RECOMMENDATIONS

- (A) CONTINUE TO EMPHABIZE INCENTIVE PROGRAMS, QUALITY CONTROL, AND THE NEED FOR QUALIFIED, HIGHLY MOTIVATED CAREER PLANNERS.
- (B) CONTINUE TO PROVIDE A NAVY TRAINED CAREER COUNSELOR TO THIS COMMAND.

Subj: Human Relations Training Program

Ref: (a) MCO 5350.4

- 1. <u>Purpose</u>. To formally promulgate the plan for the conduct of the Marine Corps Human Relations Training Program within the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing.
- 2. <u>Background</u>. Reference (a) established the requirement that each Marine will receive initially 20 hours of Human Relations Training. Subsequently a minimum of 8 hours will be scheduled annually.
- a. On 20 May 1972, the Commanding General approved the plan to tailor the provisions of reference (a) to fit the current operational situation of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing so that the maximum number of Marines would receive Human Relations Training in the shortest period of time.
- b. On 22 May 1972, the plan was implemented when the first Unit Discussion Leaders Class commenced.
- 3. Organization. A Human Relations Instruction Section has been established within the Human Affairs Division.
- a. Six (6) formal school trained Human Relations Instructors are assigned on a permanent basis to train Discussion Leaders and to act as Discussion Leaders themselves as required.
- b. Thirty (30) Discussion Leaders will be obtained from subordinate units on a quota basis and issued TAD orders to MWHS-1 for a period of about 120 days.
- c. Six (6) Human Relations Training Teams consisting of one (1) Human Relations Instructor and five (5) Discussion Leaders will be formed from the above personnel.

- d. One or more Human Relations Training Teams will conduct the initial 20 hours of Human Relations Training for all Marines in a particular squadron. The time frame for this training will normally be accomplished within two weeks based on two hours per day and five days per week. Training sessions will be scheduled before, during, or after normal working hours at the discretion of the individual Squadron Commander. It is desirable that the entire Squadron or Unit be trained simultaneously; however this training may be conducted in shifts when dictated by operational requirements. Training will be conducted in or near Squadron working areas if practicable to minimize loss of time and logistics support.
- e. Personnel joining a Squadron or Unit will be required to attend classes for new arrivals starting on the first working day of the week after his arrival.

4. Action

a. Assistant Chief of Staff, Human Affairs

- (1) Exercise overall supervision of the Human Relations Training Program.
- (2) Schedule the Human Relations Training of all Squadrons through the parent Marine Aircraft Group so that the initial 20 hours of instruction for every Marine is substantially completed by 1 October 1972.
- (3) Furnish letter of completion to Commanding Officer of all Marines who finished 20 hours of Human Relations Training.
- (4) Maintain statistical performance data on the progress for review by the Commanding General.
 - b. Marine Aircraft Group and Separate Squadron Commanders
- (1) Provide personnel within established quotas to serve as Discussion Leaders on a TAD basis for a period of about 120 days.
- (2) Give maximum support to the implementation and completion of the initial 20 hours of training.
- (3) Ensure that subordinate squadrons make the proper administrative entry in the OQR/SRB for each Marine completing Human Relation Training.

#### PART II NARRATIVE SUMMARY

At the beginning of this reporting period the Wing Safety Center had been officially operating for five (5) months.

At that time the Safety Center consisted of a LtCol, Director; Maj Aviation Safety Officer; CWO-3, Ground Safety Officer, CWO-3 Ordnance Safety Officer; SSGT, NCOIC; and Sgt Aviation Safety Clerk.

#### MEMORANDUM

From: Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2 To: Group/Squadron Commanding Officers

Subj: Disturbance at MCAS Iwakuni, weekend of 1 January 1972

1. The following supplemental information is provided in an effort to dispel rumors regarding the acts of violence which occurred during the weekend of 1 January 1972. It is requested that this information be given broad dissemination by all commanders.

#### 2. MEW YEARS EVE EM CLUB INCIDENT

There were approximately sixty persons involved in the incident. Thirty (30) Negroes, twenty (20) Negroes, and ten (10) caucasians who perticipated on the side of the Mexican-Americans. MIS initially suspected four (4) Mexican-Americans in the stabling of two Negroes during the fight. Two Mexican-Americans were placed in confinement in the station brig, but were released when a third Mexican-American confessed to the stablings. The man was not confined because of his voluntary admission and the unlikelihood of flight from prosecution.

One of the Negroes stabbed during the fight, was confined when he threatened revenge on the Mexican-Americans involved in the fight. He was released from custody on 10 January 1972 and placed on restriction while awaiting trial.

NIS is continuing to interview suspects and victims.

#### 3. EVENTS FOLLGAING THE EM CLUB INCIDENT

After the EM Club was closed as a result of the fight, groups of Negroes committed a number of assaults both on station and in the Kawashimo area. Between the hours of 0045 to 0230, 1 January 1972, two caucasians were assaulted on base and eight ascaults occurred in the Kawashimo area with a total of fourteen caucasian victims. Information has been received that a minimum of ten addition ascaults were committed on base that were not reported to either investigative agencies or medical personnel by the victims concerned. One of the assailants was identified and is confined in the station brig.

#### 4. EVENT'S OCCURRING DURING NIGHT OF 1 JANUARY 1972

At approximately 2015, 1 January 1972, groups of Negroes ranging from Tifteen (15) to one hundred twenty (120) gathered in the Kawashimo bar area and committed a series of assaults both in bars and in the streets and alleys until approximately 2200. There were eight (8) reported incidents of assault involving fourteen (14) caucasian victims in the Kawashimo area. The Negroes returned to the base individually and in small groups when liberty was secured and reassembled aboard the station. Four (4) assaults occurred on the station between 2200 and 2230 involving six (6) caucasian victims. Two of the victims were Marine officers, one of whom later identified one of his assailants. The assailant is confined in the station brig.

#### 5. SUMMARY

NIS has interviewed twenty-five victims and interrogated four (4) of five (5) suspects as a result of the affray in the EM Club and the assaults occurring in the early morning hours of 1 January 1972. Twenty-two (22) victims have been interviewed and one (1) of five (5) possible suspects has been interrogated by NIS as a result of the assaults occurring on the night of 1 January 1972. One assailant will be tried by courts-martial on 18 January 1972 and specific charges are being brought against several others. Additional assailants will be brought to trial as positive evidence is compiled. It is anticipated that all legal action will be completed before the end of February 1972.

Subj: Disturbance at MCAS Iwakuni, Weekend of 1 January 1972

- 1. The information contained in paragraphs two and three is a summation of the disturbances that took place at MCAS Iwakumi from the night of 31 December 1971 until 0300 2 January 1972. During the course of the two nights activities, there were approximately 120 MPs/SPs utilized, agumented by the Wings Reaction Force of approximately 50 troops.
- 2. At approximately 2100 on 31 December 1971, two Mexican-American Marines became involved in a verbal exchange with two black Marines in the men's room of the Mainside Enlisted Club. The verbal exchange referenced Brown Power versus Black Power and resulted in an affray between the Mexican-Americans and the blacks. One Mexican-American suffered a black eye. The Duty Manager arrived and broke up the fight. None of the Marines involved desired to press charges and the Duty Manager directed them to return to their tables.

At approximately 2300, there were twenty to thirty black Marines seated at six to eight tables in the EM Club. A Mexican-American, who was not involved in the fight in the men's room but a friend of the Marine who received the black eye, approached the tables occupied by the black Marines and confronted the black who had struck his friend. The black denied that he had struck a Mexican-American, both stood up, and the Marine with the black eye was called over to the table. He pointed to a black and said "That's him!". Another black reached for a catsup bottle and the Mexican-American struck him. This assault resulted in approximately twenty Mexican-Americans and thirty blacks getting into a fight. Some white Marines entered into the fight, predominantly on the side of the Mexican-Americans. The fight resulted in the hospitalization of two blacks with major injuries as a result of stab wounds; both required

overnight hospitalization. An additional fifteen and injuries also resulted from the fight. The MCAS Officer of the Day closed the club at 2335. After the club closed, the blacks left MCAS Iwakuni and assaulted various whites in the Kawashimo bar area. The assaults resulted in ten whites being treated for minor injuries.

Between 2130 and 2230 on 1 January 1972, approximately fifty blacks gathered on the street between 3 and 4 Corners in the Kawashimo area, near the Bar New V. As the blacks were chanting, singing and giving the black power symbol, an undetermined number of blacks entered the Bar New V and assaulted some white patrons. Six Japanese policemen arrived on the scene, dispersed the blacks in the street and broke up the fights inside the Bar New V. Noaarrests were made. After the dispersal by the Japanese police, the crowd of blacks increased in number to approximately 100 or 130 and moved in the direction of 3 Corners. As the blacks approached 3 Corners, they broke up into groups of 10 to 15 persons; half entering bars in the 3 Corners area and half turned right on "Creep" street and went in the direction of Ktobuki (Skivvy) Bridge, entering various bars and assaulting whites on the way. At 2135, one CID and two NIS agents who were surveilling the blacks heard an affray in the Bar Blue Sky. As they approached the bar, they observed several groups of blacks walking and/or running in the streets and alleys. The agents welked into the middle of the groups and the CID agent was knocked to the ground by a brick thrown by one of the blacks. As the NIS agents attempted to apprehend the brick thrower, all were assaulted by the blacks and sustained minor injuries.

At approximately 2100, liberty was secured as a result of the number of assaults in the Kawashimo area and all personnel were ordered to return to MCAS. The blacks filtered back into the base individually and in groups of two or three. They reassembled once aboard MCAS and an undetermined number of blacks assaulted two whites just inside the Main Cate. The blacks then proceeded along the main road in the direction of the Officer's Club. As they neared the Officer's Club, a Marine Officer approached the blacks, identified himself and directed them to disperse. The blacks then assaulted the officer. A second Marine officer attempted to stop the assault and was also attacked. The blacks then ran off but stopped after a very short distance, looked at the two victims and started laughing, then walked off in the direction of the traffic circle and PMO Control.

Approximately twenty to twenty-five blacks were observed in front of PMO Control. They confronted the Station Provest Marshal who ordered them to return to their barracks. This group then walked in the direction of the Main PX and a group of about ten were observed assaulting a white passing on a bicycle in the vicinity of the fire station. The victim reported the blacks were running in the direction of Block 8 (Bldg #210). After this assault, the Wing Reaction Team and a portion of the Shore Patrol arrived at PMO Control. There were no further assaults reported.

A total of sixteen persons were treated by medical personnel. One injury was major, requiring hospitalization. Two of the fifteen minor injured were black, but they would not reveal who had assaulted them.

4. At the present time, two Mexican-Americans and one black have been confined to the brig as a result of the assaults. Two additional suspects and approximately thirty victims have been interviewed by the Naval Investigative Service. THERE WERE NO DEATHS AS A RESULT OF THE ASSAULTS OVER THE NEW YEAR'S WEEKEND.

- Purpose. To provide procedures for the security of MCAS Iwakuni, Japan and all tenant activities in the event of disorder, riot or civil disturbance.
- 2. Cancellation. Air Station Order 5541.1 and Wing Order 5541.1B.
- 3. General: An effective force to provide for the security of MCAS Iwakuni, its personnel, facilities and equipment, as well as the personnel and equipment of tenant commands, must be well organized, properly trained and capable of responding rapidly

to any requirement growing out of civil disturbance, riot or disorder. In providing security, this force must be fully capable of not only safeguarding personnel, facilities and equipment, it must also be an overwhelming force with the capability to effectively identify and apprehend dissident personne For this contingency, the lst MAW and FAW-6, in addition to providing for internal security, shall provide trained personnel to augment MCAS Iwakuni forces. To restrain the development of disorder and reduce tension, five internal readiness conditions have been developed and will be implemented during normal working hours by the Senior Marine Officer Present, i.e. CG, AWC, Chief of: Staffmor CO, MCAS... Outside of normal working hours, internal readiness conditions will be implemented by designated officers in accordance with the provisions outlined in enclosures (1) through (5). Enclosures (6) through (10) provide amplifying information relative to specific aspects of the Special Security Program.

4. Readiness Conditions. The five internal readiness conditions and their parameters are defined in enclosures (1) through (5). Readiness Condition V corresponds to normal routine aboard the Air Station, both during and after normal working hours. The other conditions indicate advanced states of readiness of Wing, MCAS and FAW-6 forces to effectively deal with threats to internal security. Along with their code names, the five conditions are listed below:

5. Areas of Responsibility/Designated Travel Routes. Geographic areas of responsibility are allocated to H&HS, MCAS, Iwakuni and tenant commands located at the Air Station. Commanders will establish those measures deemed necessary to provide maximum security of personnel, facilities and equipment within these areas as outlined in enclosure (6). Internal security forces will be equipped and trained in accordance with reference (a). The internal security of those areas not specifically allocated to particular units in enclosure (6) remains the responsibility of the CO, MCAS Iwakuni. It will be the responsibility of all

commanders to ensure that their subordinate personnel are fully aware of designated travel routes to be followed upon implementation of Readiness Condition III (Green). Further, personnel must be aware of the location of security control force rally points and dissident collection points as outlined in enclosure (3). The presence of unauthorized personnel, either singly or in groups, will not be allowed in these areas once Readiness Condition III or higher has been set. Personnel at rally and collection points in violation of this order will be detained, identified and the appropriate parent unit notified to pick them up.

Security Control Forces. It will be the responsibility of designated commands located at MCAS Iwakuni to organize, equip and adequately train security control forces in addition to those forces used by the units for internal security (see paragraph 5 above). Security control forces will be capable of deployment within the time frames specified in enclosures (1) through (5). When deployed to their assigned rally points, security control forces will be under the operational control of the Security Command Duty Officer (assigned by separate 1st MAW Bulletin). In addition to the Security Control Force, each Command (less MCAS H&HS and FAW-6) will designate at least one foot patrol. Each Command (less FAW-6) will provide one motorized patrol to provide internal security within assigned areas of responsibility as depicted in enclosure (6). The motorized and foot patrols will normally remain under the operational control of their parent units and will be used for internal security. However, they are considered security forces and as such may be employed by the Security Command Duty Officer if conditions require such action.

#### a. Composition of Forces

- (1) MAG-12, MAG-15
- (a) A thirty man platoon comprised of three-ten man squads each led by a SNCO. A platoon sergeant will be assigned.
  - (b) A company grade officer designated as the platoon leader.
    - (2) MWSG-17, MACG-18 and MWHS-2
  - (a) A twenty man platoon comprised of two-ten man squads each led by a SNCO. A platoon sergeant will be assigned.
  - (b) A company grade officer designated as the platocn leader.
    - (3) H&HS, MCAS and FAW-6
      - (a) A ten man squad.

(b) A SNCO/Navy 1st class designated as squad leader.

#### b. Uniform and equipment specifications

- (1) Uniform: Utilities, helmet, cartridge belt and brassard.
- (2) Equipment: Gas mask, flak jacket, night stick, first aid packet and one full canteen.
- (3) Note: Helmets will be painted with two 1" white strips, each 1" apart, around the circumference of the crown of the helmet. Brassards will be locally manufactured of any suitable red material 4" in width and will have the letters "SC" affixed. Letters will be manufactured of suitable white material and will be 2" in height.
- (4) The platoon/squad leader of each organization's security control force will be equipped with a Polaroid/Instamatic Camera to be carried personally by him or a designated subordinate. This camera will be used to photograph incidents as they occur or participants after the fact. Photographic evidence is invaluable in the process of identification. The Polaroid/Instamatic Camera must be used at every opportunity to hasten identification.
- c. Communications equipment. Radio set AN/PRC-25 will be used as prescribed in enclosures (1) through (5) and enclosure (8).
- d. Training. The training of security control forces will be carried out in accordance with the syllabus contained in enclosure (9). Throughout the training cycle, the concept of positive identification of suspected dissident personnel or those persons who become victims of dissident activities must be stressed. Positive identification or information which leads to the identification of dissidents will, more than any other factor, tend to minimize threats to the internal security of the Air Station and its tenant commands. Commanding Officers will ensure that prior to assignment to duty as members of the Security Force, all personnel are schooled and properly trained in the Rules of Engagement and use of Deadly Force as set forth in Marine Corps Order 5500.6B. Further, instructionand training in the use of the night sticks must be accomplished The Wing Internal Security Officer and his assistant will plan, implement and monitor the training program.
- 7. Control/Identification/Handling of Dissident Suspects. Specific details covering the control, identification and processing of persons suspected of engaging in dissident

activities are: addressed in enclosures (1) through (5). During any readiness condition, all dissident suspects will be kept under observation and positive control until they can be personally interviewed by their respective Commanding Officers. Once condition III or higher has been set, dissident suspects will be collected at one of two designated collection points by security control and MP forces. Upon notification, unit commanders will dispatch transportation and men to one or both of the collection points to pick up their suspect personnel. At that point, commanders assume full responsibility for transporting these suspects to a pre-selected area for positive identification, interviewing and processing.

- 8. Individual Responsibilities. Whenever riot, civil disturbance or disorder conditions exist, certain key officers from MCAS and 1st MAW Staff will carry out prescribed actions as outlined in enclosures (1) through (5). Other officers have responsibilities of a general nature which are not outlined in these enclosures. Enclosure (7), containing Command Duty Officer telephone numbers is provided as a ready reference to ensure rapid dissemination of information to the various MCAS/1st MAW agencies/organizations.
- a. Duties of the officers listed below are contained in enclosures (1) through (5) and are dependent on the readiness condition in effect.
  - (1) Security Command Duty Officer
  - (2) Wing Staff Duty Officer
  - (3) MCAS Staff Duty Officer
  - (4) MCAS Officer of the Day
  - (5) Wing Officer of the Day
  - (6) MCAS Iwakuni Provost Marshal
  - (7) Commanding Officer, MACG-18
- b. The Security Command Duty Officer is the direct representative of the CG FMAW and CO MCAS Iwakuni. As such he will command all security forces until relieved by competent authority, ie. CG, AWC, C/S or CO MCAS.
- c. Duties of the Commands/Officers listed below are general in nature and are enumerated in the following paragraphs for guidance:

#### (1) All Iwakuni Based Commands will:

- (a) Ensure that when condition III or higher is set the Commanding Officer and designated key personnel, specifically detailed in writing, return to their Command Post to assist in the proper functioning of their respective Security Control/Internal Security Forces.
- (b) Ensure that at least one vehicle is earmarked as a command and control vehicle. It will be for the use of the security force leader to aid in the command, control and coordination of his security control force. This as well as all other military vehicles used in a security control role, will prominently display the Mobile Unit Security Identification Flag.
- (c) Provide personnel and equipment as required in paragraph 6 above.
- (d) Upon activation of security control forces, ensure that the capability exists to transport these forces to designated rally points as outlined in enclosure (3) rapidly and in orderly fashion.
- (e) Once deployed, a security control force will be employed as a unit and not fragmented unless specifically authorized by the Security Command Duty Officer.
- (f) Immediately reconstitute a security control force once the initial force has been dispatched to its rally point or other area designated by the Security Command Duty Officer.
- (g) Ensure that a separate (red) folder be maintained for the Command's OOD containing the following material:
  - l This order.
  - 2 A roster of Security Command Duty Officers.
  - 3 Duty Security Alert Force assignments.
- $\frac{4}{2}$  Any special orders for the Duty Officer relating to Special/Internal Security matters.

Note: This order and any special instructions will be acknowledged as being read and understood prior to the Officer of the Day being posted to duty.

- (h) Ensure that all personnel Sgt and below are issued a recall control card in accordance with reference (b). Commanders will ensure that all concerned personnel, as well as security force personnel, are familiar with the conditions concerning issue, control, utilization and surrender of the subject card as prescribed in reference (b).
- (2) Group Commanders and CO, MWHS-1. Upon receipt of this Order, appoint in writing a standing Investigative Board to inquire into dissident activities or other events threatening the security of the Wing or its subordinate units. One or more members of the Board should at all times be present at MCAS Iwakuni to ensure that investigations concerning dissident activities can be initiated without delay.
  - (3) All Intelligence Officers. It is essential that the capabilities of all intelligence gathering/disseminating agencies located at MCAS Iwakuni be coordinated and that their products be channeled to the Senior Marine Officer Present and the Security Command Duty Officer, To this end, the intelligence plan (enclosure (10) to this Order specifies the responsibilities to be assumed by all intelligence agencies at each level of readiness. In addition, the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2 will assist in the submission of all those reports, less spot reports, required by reference (c).

#### 9. Rublic Announcement/Display of Readiness Condition

- a. Upon the direction of the Security Command Duty Officer or the Senior Marine Officer Present, the MCAS Staff Duty Officer will notify the Far East Network Iwakuni (TV and Radio) to transmit messages stating the security condition then in effect, e.g. condition GREEN, is now in effect. No other information will be displayed/broadcast unless specifically directed by the Security Command Duty Officer.
- b. Upon the setting of readiness conditions, the MCAS Officer of the Day will direct military police personnel at the main gate to display the triangular device appropriate to the readiness condition then in effect.
- c. All military vehicles operating on MCAS, Iwakuni during Readiness Conditions III, II, or I will prominently display a Mobile Unit Security Identification Flag. This flag will be 2' x 2 1/2', yellow in color, with the word "Security" centered on the flag in 4" black letters. Each unit having security control forces will be issued and required to maintain these flags. Unit Duty Officers will account for security flags daily by appropriate entries in the Unit Duty Officer's log.

## 10. Reports Required

- a. OPREP-3. Disturbances, riot or civil disorder conditions which lead to the establishment of increased readiness condition may make it necessary to issue one or more OPREP-3 reports.

  OPREP-3 reports will be submitted in accordance with reference (d).
- b. Spot Reports. Once Readiness Condition IV or higher condition is implemented, spot reports will be issued in accordance with reference (c). The Wing Staff Duty Officer will be responsible for issuing spot reports. Once Readiness Condition III or a higher condition is set, a 1st MAW Staff CI man will be available to assist the Wing Staff Duty Officer in making such reports. Spot reports made by the Wing Staff Duty Officer will satisfy reporting requirements levied on the CG, 1st MAW and CO, MCAS Iwakuni by reference (c). The initial spot report may be made by telephone but must be backed up by message as quickly as possible.

#### 11. Communications

- a. Two (2) AN/PRC-25 radios and two (2) RC-292 UHF-FM antennas will be installed and maintained in Bldg #464 (PMO Control) for command and control of security forces.
- b. Minimize will be automatically implemented and strictly enforced on all telephone/radio communications to ensure that priority security information may be passed unimpeded during Readiness Conditions III, II, and I.
- 12. Special Instructions. This Order may be temporarily adjusted by FMAW bulletins as base loading and unit deployments impact on security requirements.

13. Certification. Reviewed and approved this date.

# Procedures for Readiness Condition V (Normal Routine)

- 1. <u>Definition</u>. Readiness Condition V (Normal Routine) is that condition which is characterized by an absence of turbulence or significant disorders. There are no requirements for unusual command control measures or the establishment of an increased internal security readiness posture.
- 2. Authority to Establish. Readiness Condition V is normal routine and is therefore not formally established except by the removal of all higher readiness conditions.
- 3. Action. Upon receipt of orders to return to Readiness Condition V the following action will be accomplished:
  - a. Officer establishing condition will:
    - (1) Notify MCAS OOD.
    - (2) Notify Wing OOD.
    - (3) Notify the Security Command Duty Officer.
  - b. MCAS OOD will:
    - (1) Notify MCAS Staff Duty Officer.
    - (2) Notify MCAS Provost Marshal.
    - (3) Nofify MCAS Commanding Officer.
    - (4) Notify FAW-6 Duty Officer.
    - (5) Notify H&HS, MCAS Duty Officer.
    - (6) Notify Main Gate.
    - (7) Notify Community Services Activities
    - (8) Notify FEN (as directed).
  - c. Wing OOD will:
    - (1) Notify the Wing Staff Duty Officer.
- (2) Notify all Group Duty Officers (including MWHS-1 Duty Officer).

- (3) Notify the Chief of Staff.
- d. Each Group, MWHS-1, H&HS, MCAS and FAW-6 Commanding Officer will:
- (1) Ensure all required communications equipment is returned to the unit command post and is rechecked to ensure it is operable and on the frequencies established in enclosure (8).
- (2) Ensure required motor vehicles are operable, serviced and available to go in a standby status or be deployed with security control forces once a higher readiness condition is set.
- (3) Continue to upgrade training status of Security Force Personnel using enclosure (9) as a guide.

# Procedures for Readiness Condition IV (Condition Blue)

- 1. Definition. Readiness Condition IV (Blue) is that condition which follows the normal routine phase and is characterized by the existence of conditions which may lead to turbulence and, if unchecked, may develop into a significant incident. Further detailed indicators of this condition are included in enclosure (2) of reference (c).
- 2. Authority to Establish. Readiness Condition IV may be established by the following:
  - a. 1st MAW OOD.
  - b. 1st MAW Staff Duty Officer.
  - c. MCAS Iwakuni OOD.
  - d. MCAS Iwakuni Staff Duty Officer.
  - e. MCAS Provost Marshal.
  - f. Senior Marine Officer Present Aboard.
  - g. Security Command Duty Officer.
- 3. Action. Upon the establishment of Readiness Condition IV the following action will be accomplished:
  - a. Officer establishing condition will:
    - (1) Notify MCAS OOD.
    - (2) Notify Wing OOD.
    - (3) Notify Security Command Duty Officer.
  - b. MCAS OOD will:
    - (1) Notify H&HS MCAS Duty Officer.
    - (2) Notify MCAS Provost Marshal.
    - (3) Notify FAW-6 Duty Officer.

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- (4) Notify MCAS Staff Duty Officer.
- (5) Notify Commanding Officer MCAS.
- (6) Notify Main Gate.
- (7) Notify Naval Investigative Service Duty Officer.
- (8) Notify Community Service Activities.
- (9) Notify FEN (As Directed).
- c. Wing OOD will:
  - (1) Notify Wing Staff Duty Officer.
- (2) Notify all Group Duty Officers (including MWHS-1 Duty Officers).
  - (3) Notify Chief of Staff.
- (4) Notify Seventh Counterintelligence Team Duty Watch Stander.
  - d. Wing Staff Duty Officer Will:
- (1) Commence Spot Reporting in accordance with reference (c).
- e. Each Group, MWHS-1, H&HS, MCAS, and FAW-6 Duty Officer will:
- (1) Ensure that the unit security force platoons/squads are in a 60 minute standby status unless specifically designated as the duty security alert force. The daily assignment of a security force to assume the 10 minute alert posture will be promulgated by 1st MAW Bulletin.
- (2) Ensure required communications equipment is in working condition and preset to desired frequencies in accordance with enclosure (8).



- (3) Ensure that required motor vehicles are operable, serviced, displaying security identification flags, and available in a 30 minute standby status. If supporting a duty alert force, these vehicles will be in a 10 minute standby status.
  - (4) Notify Unit Commanders of action taken/anticipated.
- (5) Cause unannounced inspections to be held on an irregular basis throughout unit working and billeting areas.
  - (6) Notify all Squadron Duty Officers.
- f. Commanding Officer, MACG-18 will ensure that the two duty radio operators designated to man the MCAS PMO Control AN/PRC-25 radios are placed on a 60 minute alert status. Daily, from 1830 to 0100 hours, or as directed by the Security Command Duty Officer, these operators will assume a 10 minute alert status.

### Procedures for Readiness Condition III

### (Condition Green)

- 1. Definition. Readiness Condition III (Green) is that condition which follows Condition Blue and is characterized by an increasingly tense mood on the part of various groups. If unchecked, this situation could develop into a confrontation. Further detailed indicators of this condition are included in enclosure (3) to reference (c).
- 2. Authority to Establish. Readiness Condition III may be established by the following:
  - a. 1st MAW OOD.
  - b. 1st MAW Staff Duty Officer.
  - c. MCAS Iwakuni OOD.
  - d. MCAS Iwakuni Staff Duty Officer.
  - e. MCAS Provost Marshal.
  - f. Senior Marine Officer Present Aboard,
  - g. Security Command Duty Officer.
- 3. Action. Upon the establishment of Readiness Condition III the movement of personnel on liberty in the Kawashima or R.T.O. areas will be limited to closed vehicles after 2400 hours. Except for Provost Marshal, Air Station personnel holding special identification cards issued by the CO, MCAS Iwakuni, military dependents and Japanese National employees, no personnel will be authorized to leave the Air Station after 2400 hours without specific authorization of the Air Station or Wing Staff Duty Officer. In addition, the following action will be accomplished:
  - a. Officer establishing condition will:
    - (1) Notify MCAS OOD.
    - (2) Notify Wing OOD.
    - (3) Notify Security Command Duty Officer.

- b. MCAS OOD will:
  - (1) Notify H&HS MCAS Duty Officer.
  - (2) Notify MCAS Provost Marshal.
  - (3) Notify FAW-6 Duty Officer.
  - (4) Notify MCAS Staff Duty Officer.
  - (5) Notify Commanding Officer MCAS.
  - (6) Notify Main Gate.
  - (7) Notify MCAS Fire Department.
- (8) Notify the Naval Investigative Service Duty Officer.
- (9) Notify MCAS Naval Dispensary and alert them of the requirement to man the Wing Side Dispensary if Readiness Condition II or I is set.
  - c. Wing OOD will:
    - (1) Notify Wing Staff Duty Officer.
- (2) Notify all Group Duty Officers (including MWHS-l Duty Officer).
  - (3) Notify the Chief of Staff.
- (4) Notify the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1 or his designated representative.
- (5) Notify the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2 or his designated representative.
- (6) Notify the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3 or his designated representative.
- (7) Notify the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4 or his designated representative.

- (8) Notify the Assistant Chief of Staff, Human Affairs Division, or his designated representative.
  - d. Wing Staff Duty Officer will:
    - (1) Man the Security Coordination Center (TACC).
- (2) Be prepared to brief the Security Command Duty Officer on the general situation to include the rationale utilized to establish the readiness conditions.
- (3) Continue spot reporting in accordance with reference (c).
- (4) Ensure all required radio equipment is available and operable in the Security Coordination Center.
- (5) Activate motorized and foot patrols in all areas of responsibility as depicted in enclosure (6).
- (6) Ensure all Community service activities (i.e. clubs, messes, bowling alley, etc.) are notified of the security condition and requirement to report all incidents or unusual activity.
- (7) Ensure access to Security Coordination Center is limited to those personnel required for the functioning of the Center or otherwise authorized by the Commanding General or his designated representative.
  - e. The Security Command Duty Officer will:

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- (1) Report to Security Coordination Center for briefing by the Wing Staff Duty Officer.
- (2) Assume cognizance of all Security Control Forces and ascertain their readiness status.
- 3. Direct MCAS Staff Duty Officer to notify the Far East Network (FEN) of the established security condition III (Green) and any special announcements required. Note: Announcements will be reduced to writing and specifically authorized by Security Command Duty Officer prior to FEN transmission.
- f. Commanding Officer MACG-18 will provide two (2) radio operators to man the permanently installed AN/PRC-25 radios located in the MCAS PMO Control Center.

- ness Condition III (Green) triangular device is displayed at the main gate.
  - h. MCAS Provost Marshal will:
- (1) Provide a AN/PRC-91 or 91A for the Security Coordination Center.
- (2) Ensure that personnel authorized in the immediate area surrounding PMO control are kept at an absolute minimum.
- (3) Notify Courtesy Patrol Ashore of the setting of condition III (Green).
- i. Each group, MWHS-1, H&HS, MCAS and FAW-6 Duty Officer will:
- (1) Ensure that unit security force platoons are mustered, equipped and moved to the unit command post or designated barracks area in a 10 minute alert status.
- (2) Ensure required communications equipment is distributed and frequencies are set in accordance with enclosure (8) and communication checks made, if not previously accomplished.
  - (3) Activate motorized patrols in areas assigned in accordance with enclosure (6). Ensure the motorized patrols initiate communication checks with the coordination center every 30 minutes.
  - (4) Ensure that trucks and command vehicles with canvas removed and security flags displayed, are available at the unit command post with drivers assigned to transport security force personnel.
- (5) Notify Unit Commanding Officer of action taken/anticipated.
- (6) Ensure that unannounced inspections of billeting and working spaces are conducted on a periodic, irregular basis during the condition.
  - (7) Notify all squadron Duty Officers.
  - (8) Notify Unit Intelligence Officers or their desig-



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nated representatives, to report to the Commanding General's Conference Room for an intelligence community briefing by the ACofS, G-2, prior to reporting to their respective command posts to begin gathering information relative to conditions within their units.

- j. Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2 will:
- (1) Conduct a meeting in the Commanding General's Conference Room with designated members of the intelligence community, in accordance with paragraph 1. b. (1) of enclosure (10).
  - (2) Activate the 7th Counterintelligence Team.
- (3) Maintain communications with the various unit intelligence officers, law enforcement and investigative agencies in order to collect and evaluate all available pertinent information and make appropriate recommendations to the Security Command Duty Officer or Senior Marine Officer Present Aboard regarding the establishment of a higher or lower readiness condition. Be prepared to dispatch intelligence personnel to the MCAS/Wing Naval Dispensaries upon receipt of information indicating injury to personnel as a result of dissentient activity.
- 4. Assist the Wing Staff Duty Officer in making all required spot reports.



# Procedures for Readiness Condition II (Condition Yellow)

- 1. Definition. Readiness Condition II (Yellow) is that condition which follows condition Green and is characterized by a number of disorders and breaches of discipline occurring, coupled with attempts by individuals or small groups to form into larger groups in order to further their goals. If unchecked, this situation would inevitably develop into a major confrontation. This phase is likely to be particularly short and fast moving. Other indicators of this condition are included in enclosure (4) of reference (c).
- 2. Authority to Establish. The Security Command Duty Officer is the only individual authorized to establish or remove this condition. In the event the Senior Marine Officer Present Aboard is immediately available, his specific approval will be required to establish or remove this condition.
- 3. Action. Upon establishing Readiness Condition II, liberty may be secured on the order of the Security Command Duty Officer and when directed all personnel entering the Air Station will be identified and required to surrender their recall control card. Use and accountability of the subject card will be in accordance with reference (b). In addition, CO, MCAS Iwakuni will issue special identification cards to personnel specifically authorized to leave the Air Station after the closing of the gates/securing liberty. Japanese National employees and military dependents are authorized to leave the Air Station upon securing of liberty and closing of the gates. Unofficial groups consisting of more than four (4) members, regardless of the location, will be immediately identified, told to disperse and given direct orders to return to their billeting area along authorized travel routes in accordance with enclosure (6). Personnel not assigned official security duties will return to their billeting areas and remain there. Courtesy Patrols, on nights activated, will carry out duties as directed by the MP Ashore OOD or the Courtesy Patrol Coordinator, and will not secure until so ordered by the MP Ashore OOD. The sale of alcoholic beverages will be terminated aboard the Air Station. The Wingside Medical Dispen-

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sary will be manned and prepared to process injured personnel. The G-2 will direct intelligence personnel to man the Wing and Station medical facilities and assist in identifying injured personnel. Ensure actions required for lesser conditions of readiness are completed as applicable. In addition the following action will be accomplished:

- a. MCAS Staff Duty Officer will:
  - (1) Notify the MCAS OOD.
  - (2) Notify the FAW-6 OOD.
- (3) Notify the Far East Network, Iwakuni when directed by the Security Command Duty Officer to pass the word on establishment of Readiness Condition II (Yellow), and any special announcements specifically directed by the Security Command Duty Officer. Announcements will be reduced to writing and be approved by the Security Command Duty Officer prior to FEN transmission.
- (4) Ensure that the Readiness Condition II(Yellow) triangular device is displayed at the main gate.
  - (5) Notify Commanding Officer, MCAS.
- (6) Alert Public Works Officer to have busses on standby.
  - (7) Notify MCAS Fire Department.
- (8) Notify MCAS Naval Dispensary. Direct immediate opening of Wing Side Dispensary.
  - b. Wing Staff Duty Officer will:
    - (1) Notify the Chief of Staff.
    - (2) Notify the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2.
    - (3) Notify the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3.
    - (4) Notify the Wing OOD.
  - c. The Security Command Duty Officer will:
- (1) Notify the Wing and MCAS Staff Duty Officer of the setting of condition II (Yellow).
  - (2) Relocate CP to MCAS PMO Control and assume



control of all security communication nets.

- (3) Insure that community service activities (i.e. clubs, theater, bowling alley, cafeteria, snack bars, etc.) are closed and all personnel present at the activity are directed to return to their billeting area upon occurrence of any disturbance in that service activity. The perpetrators of any incident shall be apprehended and identified by Military Police/Security Forces. Concurrently with the closing of any facility in accordance with this requirement, all gates will be closed to all outbound personnel other than those as specified in paragraph 3 this enclosure.
- (4) Deploy Security Control Forces to their respective rally points as follows:
- (a) MAG-12: Parking area immediately adjacent to PMO Control Bldg #457 (see enclosure (6)).
- (b) MAG-15: Parking area immediately inside the main gate (see enclosure (6)).
- (c) MACG-18: Handball courts Bldg #2158 across from the Commissioned Officer's Mess (Closed). To operate and provide security and control of this dissident collection point.
- (d) MWSG-17: Air Station parade ground across from Bldg #360 (Air Station Headquarters).
- (e) MWHS-1: Wing Side handball courts Bldg #2161 to operate and provide security and control of this dissident collection point.
- (f) H&HS, MCAS: West parking lot of the Sakura Theater Bldg #630.
- (g) FAW-6: Parking area immediately in front of Bldg #295.
- (5) Ensure that all personnel in transit are allowed access only along designated routes in accordance with enclosure (6).
  - (6) Coordinate with PMO for the required use of

Security control forces to augment the Military Police where conditions dictate.

- (7) Accomplish the following additional instructions if securing of liberty and closing of gates by the Security Command Duty Officer is deemed necessary.
  - (a) Notify Wing SDO.
- (b) Notify MCAS SDO of condition and direct busses be provided for transporting personnel from main gate to billeting areas.
- (8) Direct MCAS Staff Duty Officer to notify the Far East Network (FEN) of the established Security Condition II (Yellow) and any special announcements required. Note: Announcements will be reduced to writing and specifically authorized by the Security Command Duty Officer prior to FEN transmission.
- d. The Wing OOD will notify Group OODs plus the OOD of MWHS-1 of the setting of Condition II (Yellow).
  - e. MCAS Provost Marshal will:
- (1) Provide forces for control of disturbances and apprehension of personnel as required.
- (2) Coordinate with the Security Command Duty Officer for the required use of the Military Police to augment security control forces where conditions dictate.
- (3) Ensure all personnel returning to the Air Station after 2400 surrender their recall control card in accordance with reference (c).
- (4) Ensure that personnel encountered outside of their billeting area or enroute along other than designated access routes are identified and delivered to the nearest dissident collection point for processing.
- (5) Be available at MCAS PMO Control to assist the Security Command Duty Officer in matters relating to



security. Additional personnel may be drawn from MCAS PMO off duty section to assist in the functioning of the MCAS PMO Control during Readiness Condition II and I.

- (6) Notify the Courtesy Patrol of the setting of condition Yellow and direct them to secure if conditions warrant such action.
- f. Each Group, MWHS-1, H&HS, MCAS and FAW-6 Duty Officer will:
  - (1) Notify unit CO.
  - (2) Notify all squadron Duty Officers.
- (3) Within assigned areas of responsibility ensure that motorized and foot patrols identify all individuals not in their barracks or traveling on designated access routes and direct them to return to their billeting areas.
- g. All unit Commanding Officers, or in their absence their Executive Officers, will:
  - (1) Return to their command posts.
- (2) Reconstitute deployed security control forces to have a force on standby ready for immediate deployment.
- h. Only official vehicles displaying mobile unit Security Identification Flags will be permitted to move along routes other than those designated in enclosure (6).

### Procedures for Readiness Condition I

#### (Condition Red)

- 1. Definition. Readiness Condition I (Red) is that condition which follows condition Yellow and is characterized by a series of violent organized assaults, destruction of government property, mob action or the total breakdown of legitimate control over personnel involved. Further detailed indications of this condition are included in enclosure (5) to reference (c).
- 2. Authority to Establish. The Security Command Duty Officer is the only individual authorized to establish or remove this condition. In the event the Senior Marine Officer Present Aboard is immediately available, his specific approval will be required to establish or remove this condition.
- 3. Action. Upon the establishment of Readiness Condition I (Red) no personnel movements will be authorized aboard MCAS Iwakuni except for official business. All liberty will be secured. No military personnel will be authorized in the Kawashima or R.T.O. area except for those persons returning from liberty by closed vehicles and those performing official duties. All gates will be secured to all movement except those personnel returning incident to the securing of liberty, official business or individuals as described in paragraph 3, enclosure (4). All personnel, except key designated personnel, will be mustered in their respective billeting areas. Ensure actions required for lesser conditions of readiness are completed as applicable. In addition, the following actions will be accomplished:
  - a. The Security Command Duty Officer will:
    - (1) Terminate liberty
- (2) Notify the Station and Wing Staff Duty Officer of setting condition I (Red).
- (3) Ensure the MCAS Staff Duty Officer notifies the Far East Network (FEN) of the established security condition and any special announcements.
  - b. MCAS Staff Duty Officer will:

- (1) When directed by the Security Command Duty Officer notify the Far East Network, Iwakuni, to pass the word on establishment of Readiness Condition I (RED), and any special announcements specifically directed by the Security Command Duty Officer. Announcements will be reduced to writing and be approved by the Security Command Duty Officer prior to FEN transmission.
- (2) Ensure that the Readiness Condition I (Red) triangular device is displayed at the main gate.
  - (3) Ensure that all community service support facilities, i.e., clubs, bowling alley, theater, snack bar, cafeteria, hobby shop, etc., are closed and all personnel are directed to return to their billeting area by the approved designated routes.
    - (4) Notify H&HS OOD.
    - (5) Notify FAW-6 OOD.
    - (6) Notify MCAS Public Works Officer.
      - (7) Notify MCAS Fire Department
  - (8) Notify MCAS Naval Dispensary. Direct opening Wing Side Dispensary if not previously opened.
    - c. 1st MAW Staff Duty Officer will:
      - (1) Notify 1st MAW OOD.
      - (2) Notify Group plus MWHS-1 OODs.
  - d. MCAS Public Works officer will provide all available busses with drivers to the Provost Marshal for movement of personnel from the main gate to billeting areas.
  - e. All unit Commanding Officers will ensure that a sufficient number of officers and staff non-commissioned officers are assigned to the unit barracks to maintain good order and discipline.

## COMMUNICATIONS PLAN

#### 1. General

- a. The communication nets established herein are designed to support all security conditions outlined in the Basic Order and amplified in enclosures (1) through (5).
- b. Voice radio procedures shall be in accordance with ACP 125.
- c. Nets depicted on Tab A, with the exception of PMO Control, shall be controlled nets.

# 2. Radio Nets (General)

- (a) Security #1. This net is primarily an intelligence gathering and alert net for the submission of spot reports by motorized and foot patrols and as a means to request assistance by either patrol. Security Coordination Center (TACC) is the Net Control Station (NCS) during Readiness Conditions IV & III. However, Net Control will be shifted and assumed by the Security Command Duty Officer during these or higher readiness conditions when deemed necessary. All stations will be informed when control is shifted and directed to commence using call sign "Security Control" for Net Control. Individual units will maintain a listening watch with an immediate capability to enter the net. All motorized and foot patrols will guard this net.
  - (1) Because of the number of stations on this net, traffic density may dictate the activation of an additional net. All stations should be alert and prepared for frequency shift if directed.
  - b. Security #2. This net will be utilized to deploy Security Control Platoons. Spot reports from Security Control Platoons will be submitted via this net. If activated during condition IV and when activated during condition III, the Security Coordination Center will be the Net Control Station until relieved of responsibility by the Security Command Duty Officer.

During Conditions II and I, the Security Command Duty Officer will assume Net Control Station functions at MCAS PMO Control. Net Control can be assumed by the Security Command Duty Officer at any time he deems such action necessary. All Security Control Platoons shall guard this net. Units shall monitor this net and be prepared to enter when directed by the Net Control Station.

- c. Communication Guard and Frequency Assignments. Communications guard requirements and frequency assignments for each net are contained on Tab A. Frequencies are unclassified and transmission in the clear is authorized.
- d. Radio Equipment Check. When Condition IV has been set all units will immediately conduct radio checks with the Security Coordination Center. If not previously accomplished during that day, radio checks will be conducted daily at 1830. All radios specifically designated for Security Control use will be checked during the daily checks and those radios found to be inoperable will be immediately replaced.



- (1) When the General Collective Call is utilized, all stations guarding or monitoring the net will respond.
- (2) When the Selective Collective Call is utilized only those stations so specified will respond.
- (3) When checking into the net in response to a General or Selective Collective Call, stations will check into the net in the sequence of units listed above.
- b. Call signs for all security control elements will be formed by adding the appropriate suffix designated below to the Unit Call Sign:
- (1) <u>Commanding Officer or Principal Staff Officer</u>. Utilize the phonetic "ALPHA" plus the numerical code designator, example, "Six ALPHA six" is the Commanding Officer of FAW-6.
- (2) <u>Unit Officer of the Day</u>. Utilize the phonetic "OSCAR DELTA"; example, Twelve OSCAR Delta is the MAG-12 Officer of the Day.
- (3) <u>Security Control Platoon</u>. Utilize the designator PAPA ONE; example, One PAPA One would be the Security Control Platoon from MWHS-1.
- (a) Subsequent Security Control Platoons as constituted would utilize unit call sign, the suffix PAPA and the next consecutive numerical designator.
- (4) Motorized Patrol. Utilize the Phonetic "MIKE" plus a numerical designator if more than one motorized patrol is activated by the unit; example, Seventeen MIKE is MWSG-17 motorized patrol, if MWSG-17 had two motorized patrols activated, one would be identified as Seventeen MIKE One, the other Seventeen MIKE Two.
- (5) <u>Foot Patrol</u>. Utilize the phonetic "FOXTROT"; example, Eighteen FOXTROT is MACG-18 foot patrol. If more than one foot patrol is activated by a unit, the provisions of the preceding paragraph apply.

## 4. Radio Nets (Unit)

- a. Units having internal security radio nets will report the existence of such nets to the Communication-Electronic Branch, First Marine Aircraft Wing, citing frequency, call signs, and number of stations on the net.
- b. Units activating internal security radio nets not previously reported and not prescribed by this Order during Readiness Condition III or higher will notify the Security Coordination Center immediately upon activation, reporting frequency utilized, call signs, and number of stations on the net.
- 5. Radio Equipment. The Commanding Officer MACG-18 will provide and maintain two (2) AN/PRC-25 radios and two (2) RC 292 UHF-FM antennas for security command and control communications support of the Security Command Duty Officer in Bldg #494, MCAS PMO Control.

- Net Control (NCS) This station controls all transmissions on the net. In Controlled Net Procedures, a station having a message for another station on the net must obtain permission from NET Control before transmitting his message.
- Guard (X) - - Stations directed to guard shall have the capability to receive or transmit and are authorized to contact Net Control without specific direction from that station.

## Procedures for Intelligence Gathering Agencies

- 1. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2 is the focal point for the processing and dissemination of all information relating to disorders, riots and civil disturbances which might result in the recommendation for establishment of a revised security readiness condition. The following procedures are utilized:
- a. Readiness Condition IV and V. Normal procedures followed within the intelligence community under the cognizance of the ACofS, G-2 related to the continuous assessment of indicators of unrest in the Iwakuni area include the following:

## (1) Collection

- (a) Personnel of the 7th Counterintelligence Team (7th CIT) maintain frequent personal contact with all 1st MAW units for purposes of passing pertinent information concerning members of the units, and gathering information concerning indicators of unrest or conditions within the units with potential for causing disturbance. This information is reported to the 7th CIT Commander for consolidation, evalvation, and further reporting as outlined below.
- (b) The 7th CIT Commander maintains daily personal contact with the ACofS, G-2 for the purpose of passing information gleaned from team contact personnel as described in paragraph 1. (a) above, along with information gathered from other sources.
- (c) The AcofS, G-2 maintains continuous liaison with the intelligence officers of the group-level 1st MAW units in order to provide a flow of information in both directions concerning indicators of unrest and the overall "pulse" of the units concerned.
- (d) Weekly meetings are held at the CG, 1st MAW office which are attended by the CG, 1st MAW; CO, MCAS Iwakuni; CO, FAW-6; Resident Agent, (NIS); MCAS Provost Marshal;

respresentatives of the Provost Marshal Office, Criminal Investigative Division (CID), and the ACofS, G-2. These meetings are for the purpose of discussing matters of mutual interest, and include the passing of information concerning indicators of unrest and/or information concerning planned activities possessing disturbance potential.

- (e) Weekly meetings are conducted by the ACofS, G-2 which are attended by intelligence officers of all 1st MAW units. These meetings are for the purpose of passing along pertinent information gleaned from the meetings outlined in paragraph (d), above, and ensuring that all intelligence officers, including the ACofS, G-2, are current on all related information within the intelligence community.
- (2) <u>Processing</u>. The ACofS, G-2 is responsible for the evaluation, integration and collation of all information received so that a valid assessment of the "pulse" of the Iwakuni area can be made at any time.
- (3) <u>Dissemination</u>. Apart from that dissemination of evaluated information which takes place in the various meetings described above, the ACofS, G-2 provides the Command with a daily written assessment, containing a resume of the previous 24 hours activities and a recommendation for the setting of specific security conditions for the night based on evaluated information.
- b. Readiness Conditions I, II, or III. Upon the initial setting of Readiness Conditions (I, II, or III,) the following special procedures, under the direction of the ACofS, G- 2 or his representative, will be utilized:
- (1) A meeting will be held in the Commanding General's Conference Room upon setting of the readiness condition. Attendance is required of all Groups, MCAS and FAW-6 Intelligence Officers or their representatives, the 7th CIT Commander or his representative, the MCAS Provost Marshal or his representative, a representative of CID, a representative of NIS, and the ACofS, G-2 or his representative. The purpose of this meeting will be to:
- (a) Immediately assess the current situation, in-cluding what is actually happening in the area and what caused it.
- (b) Determine what is most likely to develop from the current situation.

- (c) Provide an overall assessment, to include recommended courses of action for submission to the Security Command Duty Officer and/or the Senior Marine Officer Present Aboard.
- (d) Assign areas of significant intelligence interest for further investigation by appropriate agencies, to include stationing personnel at the MCAS/lst MAW Naval Dispensaries during Readiness Conditions II or I to assist in identifing injured personnel.
- (2) Following this meeting, the ACofS, G-2 or his representative will provide the Security Command Duty Officer and/or the Senior Marine Officer Present Aboard with the current assessment and stand by to receive, evaluate and disseminate information received from the various agencies concerning occurrences and likely developments. Efforts will be made to obtain and evaluate all data available from individuals arriving at the dispensary. The Group-level intelligence officers will man their respective unit command posts and will keep the Security Coordination Center advised of the current situation within their areas. Other agencies will pursue their own areas of interest, and keep the Security Coordination Center advised of their findings, using the ACofS, G-2, or his representative, as point of contact.

#### SECTION I

- 101. SCOPE. This Order is a compilation of policy, instructions, guidelines and procedures to be employed in connection with award recommendations submitted by units of this Command. All matters not specifically covered herein shall be referred to the Commanding General (Attn: Awards Officer) for clarification and subsequent inclusion in this Order, if appropriate.
- 102. COMMAND RESPONSIBILITIES. Commanding Officers shall pursue a vigorous awards program and initiate timely action to ensure proper recognition of exceptional performance of duty by members of their command. Recognition may be in the form of a meritorious mast, a recommendation for a letter of appreciation, a certificate of commendation or recommendation for a personal decoration.

### 103. COMMAND AWARDS POLICY

- 1. <u>INDIVIDUAL RECOMMENDATIONS</u>. Recognition of individual performance of duty is an integral portion of leadership and command, a just reward for a job well done, and one of the intangible aspects of human motivation. In those cases where the individual has served honorably, continually displayed superior professionalism (considering billet, rank and military experience), and has contributed significantly to the unit's mission to a degree which cannot be fully recognized via a fitness report, he should be recommended for an appropriate personal award. The practice of routinely recommending end of tour awards for those who performed effectively is not appropriate. Rather, only those whose performance has indeed been exceptional should be considered for an award.
- 2. UNIT RECOMMENDATIONS. Unit recommendations are desired when the performance of a unit has been such to warrant recognition. The Meritorious Unit Commendation is specifically appropriate for groups, squadrons and separate detachments and shall be fully utilized as a means of recognition for valorous or meritorious achievement which renders the unit outstanding compared to other units performing similar service. References (a) and (b) contain the criteria for determination of the appropriate award and the administrative procedures for preparation and submission of the award recommendation.

### SECTION II

### 201. INDIVIDUAL AWARD RECOMMENDATIONS

### 1. INITIATION

- a. Recommendations for the award of a military decoration may be initiated by any officer senior to the individual being recommended. In the event a recommendation is originated by an officer other than the Commanding Officer of the individual concerned the recommendation shall be forwarded to the Commanding Officer for comment and/or recommendation prior to forwarded. In all cases where it does not detract from the individual's actions, recommendations shall be submitted unclassified.
- b. INITIATION OF MERITORIOUS SERVICE AWARDS RECOMMENDATIONS FOR MEMBERS OF THE WING STAFF. Within the Wing Staff the appropriate reporting senior for fitness report purposes shall be responsible for initiating award recommendations for members of his staff. Recommendations shall be addressed to the awarding authority via the Commanding General and delivered to the Wing Awards Officer for administrative processing and forwarding to the awarding authority. The award recommendations for members of the Wing Staff shall NOT be forwarded via the Commanding Officer, Marine Wing Headquarters Squadron-1.
- 2. PROMPTNESS OF SUBMISSION. Promptness with which military awards are acted upon is essential; therefore, recommendations shall normally be completed and forwarded within ten (10) days after the performance of the act(s) or the termination of the service(s) to which the recommendation refers.
- 3. MERITORIOUS SERVICE AWARDS. In the event a member voluntarily extends his tour, he may be recommended for a meritorious service award upon completion of his normal tour. However, it is not desired that a member receive more than one award for meritorious service during a normal tour. Upon completion of an extension, a member could be eligible for consideration for an additional recommendation. To ensure that this policy is maintained requires close monitoring and strict adherence of the regulations contained herein by commanders at each level of command.
  - a. Meritorious service recommendations shall include the

individual's entire tour of duty and shall be submitted only upon completion of his normal tour of duty. When an individual is transferred to another major command, (i.e. III Marine Amphibious Force or 3rd Marine Division), prior to completion of a normal tour, an award recommendation may be submitted early in accordance with reference (a). Justification for early submission must be included on the NAVPERS 1650/6 Form.

- b. In order to establish a means of providing continuity, and to ensure that the service of deserving personnel are not overlooked, recommending officers and/or supervisors who are to be reassigned or detached should pass on recommendations for meritorious service awards to their successors. Such recommendations (to include a statement of the individual's accomplishments/meritorious service to date on NAVPERS 1650/6) shall be held until the end of the individual's tour, consolidated at that time, and submitted as a recommendation based on the individual's entire tour.
- c. To prevent a loss of continuity or failure to appropriately recognize the individual's previous meritorious service when transferred to another command within this Wing prior to completion of his normal tour of duty, recommendations shall be made a part of the individual's local records and/or transmitted to his new unit in the form of a completed NAVPERS 1650/6. Upon completion of his tour, the recommendation shall be revised and expanded to include his later service and a recommendation submitted based upon his entire tour of duty, or if appropriate the original NAVPERS 1650 shall be submitted with an endorsement directing the subsequent portion of the recommendation stand.
- d. Initiating letters of recommendation for meritorious service awards shall postdate the detachment date of the individual concerned.
- 4. <u>HEROIC AWARDS</u>. Recommendations for award to persons rescuing or endeavoring to rescue any other person from fire, drowning, shipwrecks, or other perils of the water or for any other acts of heroism, shall contain the following if at all feasible: (Note: The Navy and Marine Corps Medal is not appropriate for rescue or attempted rescue from a situation involving actual conflict with the enemy).
- a. Testimony of at least two eye-witnesses (cases where only one or no eye-witness statement is obtainable shall be fully explained).

- b. The precise locality of the rescue or attempted rescue, or heroic action (In cases where this information is classified, so state in lieu of location).
- c. The date, time of day, nature of the weather, including force of wind, condition and temperature of the water, if applicable, and amount and sources of light if at night.
- d. The names of all persons rendering assistance and the nature of the assistance.
- e. A freehand sketch of the scene, including distances, location of assistance and height of piers or vessels from which rescue efforts were started, if applicable. (Mandatory for Medal of Honor recommendations only):

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- f. A statement as to the swimming qualifications of the rescuer if applicable.
- g. An account of the cooperation or lack thereof on the part of the person being rescued.
- h. A rescue from burning should be described in great detail, including the aid recieved by the rescuer, the extent of the burns, and a description of the outer clothing of the rescuer.
- i. Recommendations shall include the above but are not necessarily limited to that information alone.
- 5. PREPARATION OF RECOMMENDATIONS: Reference (a) requires that award recommendations be submitted directly to the awarding authority from the Commanding Officer of the indivdual. However, the following procedure shall be established within this Command: Commanding Officers will deliver; without a formal forwarding endorsement, the original and three copies of award recommendations to the Commanding General, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing (Attn: Awards Officer) for recording; consolidation and mailing. Information copies shall simultaneously be delivered to Commanding Officers intermediate to this Headquarters (i.e. Group Commanding Officer).
- 6. <u>INITIATING RECOMMENDATIONS</u>. Recommendations shall be submitted in accordance with the following instructions on Awards Recommendation Form NAVPERS 1650/6 (5-71). (Figure 1, Appendix A).

- a. The Commanding Officers accomplishing the 1st Endorsement (item 22) of NAVPERS 1650 6 shall address the recommendation as follows and include the appropriate via(s):
- (1) Recommendations for the Bronze Star and lesser personal awards for living or deceased members shall be addressed to the Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific and delivered to the Commanding General, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing.
- (2) Recommendations for the Navy and Marine Corps Medal through Silver Star Medal for living or deceased members of this Command shall be addressed to the Commander, U. S. Pacific Fleet and delivered to the Commanding General, 1st Marine Airstaft Wing.
- (3) Recommendations for the Medal of Honor and Navy Cross for Living or deceased members of this Command and awards to members of other U. S. Armed services shall be addressed to the Secretary of the Navy and delivered to the Commanding General, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing.
- b. The following instructions apply to completion of the Awards recommendation Form by item number: (Figure 1, Appendix A).
- (1) Complete address of Commanding Officer, or title of other officer originator.
- (2) Complete address of the next commander in the chain of command of the commanding officer of the individual being recommended. (Except as specified in paragraph 104).
  - (3-10) Self explanatory.
- (11) Self explanatory date must agree with terminal dates shown in items 22 and 27 in case of meritorious service.
  - (12-13) Helf explanatory.
- (14) Self explanatory in case of meritorious service award no end or tour, the CONUS command to which ordered for duty shall be grown.
  - (15) Self explanatory include Reporting Unit Code.
  - (16-19) Self explanatory.

- (20) Self explanatory when Combat Distinguishing Device is recommended the justification <u>must be</u> included in Summary of Action. (Subjection to hostile fire must be indicated).
- (21) Self explanatory do not include classified location (enter CLASSIFIED) unless facts contained in Summary of Action are classified.
- (22) Specific date of action or inclusive dates of entire tour of duty even though not a member of unit submitting recommendation.
  - (23) Self explanatory personal decorations only.
- (24) Self explanatory Do Not INCLUDE ANTICIPATED RECOMMENDATIONS OF RECOMMENDATIONS FOR AN EARLIER ACTION WHICH HAVE NOT BEEN SUBMITTED. Ensure that dates listed are correct and not the date of the previous recommendation.
- (25) Include all personnel being recommended for same action/service INCLUDING personnel from other units if known.
- (26) List eyewitnesses only if STATEMENT IS ATTACHED. See paragraph 201.4(a) regarding heroic actions.
- be complete and clearly depict the action or service for which the subject is being recommended for a personal decoration. It is not necessary to embellish the statements of fact with descriptive adjectives and adverbs. It is of prime importance that the action or service be clearly described and related in time sequence from beginning to end. Information to be shown, as appropriate, it is as follows:
- (a) Date of action/dates of service: The date(s) shown must correspond with item(s) (ll and 22 for meritorious service). On an "end of tour" award recommendation the indivdual's ENTIRE tour must be accounted for in chronological sequence with at least a brief description or explanation of his duties even though performed with other than the initiating unit. If at all possible, periods of duty performed with former units shall be substantiated by letter(s) of continuity attached.
- (b) Weather (fair, overcast, foggy, heavy rain, ceiling, etc.)

- (c) Terrain (mountainous, flat, valley, heavy foliage, open etc.).
- (d) Water, if rescue from drowning involved. (include depth, width, temperature and current).
  - (e) Enemy situation.
  - (f) Friendly situation.
- (g) Narrative of heroic act or meritorious service. (Include statement of act or service to include time and results of action).
- (h) Include justification for Combat Distinguishing Device if not previously justified by contents of Summary of Action.
- (28) Continuation of 27. Additional pages may be added as necessary.
- (29) Self explanatory normally this shall be signed by the unit command, however, see paragraphs 104 and 201 in this regard. In no case is "By direction" or "for" as signature authorized.
- (30) First endorsement to be completed by addressee shown in item 2. Endorsement shall be addressed to the appropriate Awarding Authority via appropriate intervening commanders. (Figure 2, Appendix A). In no case shall award recommendations be forwarded to a command outside the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing without being addressed via the Commanding General for recommendation/comment. In view of the limited space for listing vias, authorized abbreviations shall be utilized and additional vias listed as appropriate, per

## 7. CITATIONS

- a. Recommendations for awards shall be accompanied by proposed citations, clearly labeled "Proposed Citation".
- b. A "Proposed Citation" shall contain an account of heroic acts or an enumeration of meritorious achievements or services as shown in figures I through 3, Appendix A. No classified information shall be included in the proposed citation, even though the recommendation which it accompanies may contain classified information.

### 8. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

- a. Eye witness statements shall either be typewritten or handwritten, but in any case must be completely legible. In preparing the Summary of Action (item 27), care must be taken to ensure that the information therein does not conflict with supporting statement(s).
- b. It is incumbent upon the originator of a recommendation to carefully review the action/service for which being recommended to determine appropriate award based on criteria contained in reference (a). Recommending a higher award to allow for "downgrading" by intervening commands is not desired.
- c. In the case of "companion awards", (Multiple award recommendations for participation in the same action/achievement) each additional participant must be listed in item 25 of the individual recommendation. All companion recommendations shall be forwarded at the same time to allow for proper review and Awarding Authority action. In cases where personnel from different units (including Groups) are involved in the same action, close liaison is expected so as to ensure submission of all recommendations simultaneously.

## 9. PRESENTATION OF AWARDS

- a. Presentation of personal decorations shall be made by the individual's Commanding Officer,
- b. Awards received subsequent to an individuals detachment/rotation shall be forwarded without delay, via certified or registered U. S. Mail, directly to his new command. A copy of the forwarding endorsement in each case shall be furnished this Headquarters (Attn: Awards Officer) for file.

- 202. POSTHUMOUS/IN ABSENTIA AWARDS. Recommendations for posthumous or in absentia (Missing in Action) awards shall be submitted within seventy-two (72) hours after receipt of information. The format shown in Figure 5, Appendix A will be followed. If appropriate, intervening commanders shall endorse the recommendation. The original only is required for administrative processing at this Headquarters. It is imperative that all pending awards, including any awards approved but not presented, be forwarded at once to facilitate prompt review and forwarding to the Awarding Authority.
- 203. CERTIFICATE OF COMMENDATION. Authority to issue the Certificate of Commendation is limited to the Commanding General. However, subordinate commanders are encouraged to submit recommendations for the Certificate of Commendation for their personnel when the individual's performance of duty or actions cannot be appropriately recognized by other means, i.e., fitness report markings, conduct and proficiency marks, meritorious mast or a personal decoration. An original and two copies of the recommendation shall be submitted in the format shown in Figure 6, Appendix A. The proposed citation shall not exceed 85 spaces in width or 1.1/2 inches from top to bottom since this is maximum typing space available on the form.
- 204. LETTER OF APPRECIATION. Within the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing only the Commanding General shall issue the Letter of Appreciation. Subordinate commanders are encouraged to submit recommendations for the Letter of Appreciation in a format similar to Figure 7, Appendix A. In lieu of a proposed citation, the recommendation shall contain a proposed Letter of Appreciation (Figure 7, Appendix A).
- 205. MERITORIOUS MAST. Whenever the performance of an enlisted person is considered noteworthy or commendable beyond the usual requirements of duty, or he demonstrates exceptional industry, judgement or initiative for his rank, the senior who has observed him shall make a report of this to the individual's commander. In those cases where the performance, etc., does not meet the criteria for a Certificate of Commendation or a personal decoration, Meritorious Mast should be held by the individual's commander or requested of senior commanders in the chain of command.

206. STRIKE/FLIGHT AIR MEDAL. Pertinent information regarding criteria and administrative instructions are set forth in reference (a).

1. ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA. Only those personnel designated for duty involving flying by means of flight orders placing them in a flying status are eligible for awards of the Strike/Flight Air Medal. In order to be eligible for points towards an Air Medal, an individual must be on flight orders and a designated crewmember of the aircraft on that sortie.

## 2. ADMINISTRATIVE INSTRUCTIONS

- a. Submission of Certification of Eligibility via the chain of command is the responsibility of the Commander of the unit to which the individual is administratively attached, or if he performs aerial flight in another unit, it is the responsibility of the unit with which flight is performed to maintain a resume of the Strike/Flights. The resume (dertified to be true) shall be forwarded on the appropriate occasion to the individual's unit as substantiation for the Certification of Eligibility.
- b. Colonels and officers of greater rank must apply for Strike/Flight Air Medal on Awards Recommendation Form NAVPERS 1650/6 and submitted in the format shown in Figure 8, Appendix A. These awards are approved only by the Secretary of the Navy.
- c. All recommendations for the award of the Strike/Flight Air Medal shall be forwarded to the Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific for approval or other appropriate action.
- 207. COMBAT ACTION RIBBON. Certificates of Eligibility for the Combat Action Ribbon shall be accompanied by an Awards Recommendations Form (NAVPERS 1650/6) for consideration by Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific.


### SECTION III

301. INDIVIDUAL AWARD RECOMMENDATIONS FOR OTHER U. S. ARMED FORCES. Awards for members of other U. S. Armed Forces shall be prepared in the format outlined in Section II, except that the recommendation shall be routed through that Armed Forces appropriate chain of command in addition to normal channels.

## SECTION IV

401. FOREIGN AWARDS. SECNAVINST 1650.23 disseminates the information that under the provisions of Public Law 89-257 and SECNAVINST 1650.1D, certain members of the Armed Forces of the United States may accept and wear individual personal decorations tendered by certain foreign nations.



### SECTION V

501. UNIT AWARDS. Unit awards are generally recommended for battalion/squadron or larger units; however, they may be recommended for separate companion units and detachments. Recommendations for squadrons and detachments shall be initiated at the Group level. Recommendations for the Group shall be prepared at the Group level and submitted for the Commanding General's consideration.

# 502. SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS AND LIMITATIONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- l. PRESIDENTIAL UNIT CITATION. This award is on the same level as the Navy Cross. It shall be recommended for a unit only when it has clearly distinguished itself by action(s) of a character comparable to that which would warrant the award of the Navy Cross to an individual. The performance of the duty in carrying out a mission under the ordinary hazards of war, or participation in extended periods of combat duty or a large number of combat missions does not, in itself, justify a recommendation for this award, which is designed to recognize specific acts of heroism on the part of the unit acting as a team.
- 2. NAVY UNIT COMMENDATION. This award is on the same level as the Silver Star Medal and the Legion of Merit. It should be recommended for a unit only when it has clearly distinguished itself by action(s) of a character comparable to that which would warrant award of the Silver Star Medal or the Legion of Merit to an individual. Normal performance of duty or a large number of combat missions does not, in itself, justify recommendation for this award.
- 3. MERITORIOUS UNIT COMMENDATION. This award is on the same level as the Bronze Star Medal. It should be recommended for a unit which has distinguished itself under combat or noncombat conditions, by either valorous or meritorious achievement which renders the unit outstanding compared to other units performing similar service, but not sufficient to justify the Award of the Navy Unit Commendation.

### SECTION VI

601. CAMPAIGN AND SERVICE MEDALS. These awards shall be made in accordance with the criteria and procedures in SECNAVINST P1650.1D, Marine Corps orders and bulletins in the 1650 series, and such other directives/instructions as may be published by CMC, FMFPac, or this Headquarters.

#### SECTION VII

701. PRECEDENCE OF MILITARY AWARDS. Military decorations take precedence over all other awards. The precedence of Navy decorations is as follows:


