





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#### PART II

#### NARRATIVE

#### PREFACE

All major efforts of the First Marine Aircraft Wing continued to be directed in support of combat operations in Indochina during the period July through December 1972. Deployed units flew combat and combat support missions comprised of close air support, combat air patrol, aerial refueling, interdiction and electronic countermeasures over North and South Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos and the Gulf of Tonkin. The Wing Headquarters at MCAS Iwakuni, Japan, continued to be deeply involved in consolidation efforts, contingency planning, and retrograde preparations. Units of the 1st MAW not committed to combat continued proficiency training and provided a variety of support to Wing Operations in Japan, Okinawa, Korea, and the Republic of the Philippines.

Examining each of the 1st MAW locations, this chronology tours a 3000 mile arc from Nam Phong, Thailand, to Atsugi, Japan, and relates the varied operational roles and commitments employing Marine aviation in the Orient during the latter half of 1972. Detailed chronologies of combat and combat support activities have been submitted on a monthly basis. To avoid unneccessary redundancy, but still provide the reader with an accurate prospective, and abbreviated summation of combat activities is also presented here.

Part III, the Sequential Listing of Significant Events; makes reference to the appropriate monthly report to facilitate further research on any particular operation or event. Those non-combat activities of the 1st MAW not previously documented during this reporting period are referenced to in the appendices of this report.

#### NAM PHONG RTAFB, THAILAND

From July to December 1972, Task Force Delta continued the rapid base development of Nam Phong, while concurrently concentrating its collective efforts to fulfill combat commitments. Construction efforts during the period were focused on the unit maintenance areas, service roads, the electrical power distribution system and the SEAsia huts of the cantonment area.

Physical security of Nam Phong was upgraded with the erection of several perimeter sentry towers, continued construction of fencing and the installation of lighting

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around vital areas.

The squadrons of MAG-15 continued to be employed primarily in an air-to-ground role in support of the ARVN forces operating in Military Regions 1 and 2. From 4 July to 22 October and again from 18 to 29 December, the MAG-15 F-4's also participated in the Barrier Combat Air Patrol (BARCAP) fighter cover missions for the 7th/13th Air Force "Linebacker" strikes against NVN. From 12 August thru 31 December, the A-6 aircraft of VMA(AW)-533 conducted night/all weather "attack systems" interdiction missions in Route Package I of NVN and the Barrel Roll region of Laos.

From July through December, MAG-15 suffered the loss of three F-4 and three A-6 aircraft. During this period, eight MAG-15 aircrewmen were listed as missing in action.

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#### BIEN HOA AB, RVN


Deployed from MCAS Iwakuni in May, MAG-12(fwd) continued its combat operations from Bien Hoa AB, RVN throughout the remaining half of 1972. Several news correspondents visited the Group during November after it had attained the status of being the only U.S. combat aviation unit still stationed on Vietnamese soil.

From July through December the A-4 squadrons of VMA-211 and VMA-311 were tasked with a standard 52 sorties daily in Military Regions 3 and 4 and Cambodia. Maintaining an aircraft availability rate of 85%, MAG-12(Fwd) flew 8968 missions and logged nearly 11,200 hours for the six month period.

Two A-4 aircraft were lost in September to AAA fire; one pilot was not recovered and was listed as missing in action. A third A-4 was lost during a takeoff accident in November; the pilot successfully ejected.

Ten 122MM and 71MM rocket attacks harrassed the Marines at Bien Hoa during the last half of 1972. During one attack in the early morning hours of 1 August, one enlisted Marine was killed and twelve wounded. Most of the attacks succeeded in inflicting only minor shrapnel damage to the MAG-12(Fwd) facilities and aircraft.



#### NAS CUBI POINT, R.P.

The VMCJ Detachment of 1st MAW and 2nd MAW EA-6 aircraft continued to provide its electronic countermeasures (ECM) support of the 7th Fleet air operations against NVN throughout the July through December period. Deployed since April 1972, the unit has been assigned to the operational control of the 7th Fleet's carrier strike force and tasked with the specific mission of degrading or neutralizing the enemy's radar capabilities used for the guidance of AAA fire and SAM missiles.

To accomplish this mission the VMCJ Detachment used its extensive facilities at NAS Cubi Point for maintenance and mission staging with a stop at Danang AB, RVN, for fuel and crew rotation. This method of operation provided the capability to maintain a maximum time on the ECM tracks over the Gulf of Tonkin and NVN while holding in-country assets to the very minimum. Total combat sorties numbered 1571 during the 3242 flight hours logged by the VMCJ Detachments' aircrews from 1 July to 31 December.

#### GULF OF TONKIN

The composite helicopter squadrons of HMM-164 and HMM-165 served as the aviation components for Marine Amphibious Unit (MAU) contingencies in SEAsia throughout the six month period covered by this report. Embarked aboard LPH ships, the units rotated line periods on station approximately 10 miles east of Hue, RVN,

On 11 July both squadrons were tasked to provide an assault lift for 800 RVN Marines in Operation Lam Son 72, the counter offensive to retake Quang Tri City. One CH-53 was lost to an SA-7 infrared seeking missile and two crewmen were killed. Forty-eight RVN personnel were listed as missing and presumed dead as a result of the same aircraft loss. Additionally, two CH-46 helicopters were downed by small arms fire, but were later retrieved by CH-53's.


HMM-164 was also tasked to support VNMC forces in Operation Son Than 9A-72 on 22 July. 688 VNMC were lifted into two separate landing zones after a B-52 "Arclight" landing zone preparation. No casualties or battle damage were sustained during the vertical assault.

#### HON LA ANCHORAGE, NVN

On 1 July the AH-1J Cobra helicopters of HMA-369

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recorded the first kills of the Marine Hunter Killer (MARHUK) operations near the NVN anchorage of Hon La. MARHUK was a new concept employing the Marine attack helicopters in a surveillance and interdiction role in support of the 7th Fleet's blockade of NVN ports.

Flying from LPD ships, the Cobras initially concentrated their firepower against NVN Water-Borne Logistic Craft (WBLC) which were carrying supplies from third country merchant ships anchored off shore. In September a significant decrease in WBLC activity was noted as the North Vietnamese tested the feasibility of off-loading bagged & boxed supplies from the merchant ships directly into the water under the cover of darkness. With flare illumination provided by the naval guns of supporting ships, the long strings of bags floating toward shore proved to be lucrative targets for the Cobra's 20MM guns and five inch Zuni rockets. During the latter line periods of 1972 the MARHUK operations saw an expanded use of the attack helicopters as off shore airborne spotters to direct naval gun fire against enemy AAA emplacements and coastal storage areas.

#### LUZON, R.P.

In mid-July the Central Philippines was struck by record-breaking torrential rains. On July 29th, USS Tripoli, with HMM-165 embarked, hurriedly sailed for the Philippines to assist in flood relief operations. Through 15 August, the helicopter unit operated from Clark AB flying stockpiled food & medical supplies to distribution points throughout the central Luzon flatlands.

President Ferdinand E. MARCOS awarded the Philippine Presidential Unit Citation to the men of HMM-165 for "their outstanding service" during the flood relief operation. UH-1E helicopters of Detachment "A" of HML-367 and C-117 aircraft from H&MS-17 also participated in this mission of mercy.

#### MCAS FUTEMA, OKINAWA, JAPAN

The helicopter assets of MAG-36 at MCAS Futema, Okinawa Japan, were widely dispersed in support of various combat and non-combat operations during the last half of 1972. As previously mentioned, two composite helicopter squadrons were embarked aboard LPH ships for MAU contingencies in SEAsia. Additionally HMA-369 was deployed on 7th Fleet LPD ships for the MARHUK missions.

The Futema base unit of HMH-462 fulfilled helicopter transport requests involving 418 tons of cargo and over

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10,000 passengers. From 28 October to 22 November a detachment of two CH-53's was deployed to Eniwetok Atoll in the Marshall Islands in support of a U.S. Atomic Energy Commission radiation survey.

A detachment of four CH-46 helicopters from H&MS-36 was located at Nam Phong RTAFB, Thailand to provide a SAR capability, while three more CH-46's were maintained at NAF Atsugi, Japan, for logistics and training support of 3rd Marine Division units at nearby Camp Fuji.

In December aircraft modifications and aircrew training commenced for HMM-164, HMM-165, and HMH-462 when the units were designated to participate in post cease-fire "End Sweep" mine clearing operations of NVN ports and inland waterways. HMH-463 was also deployed from Hawaii to Cubi Point and assigned OpCon to MAG-36 to augment the mine clearing task force.

VMGR-152 continued to maintain a detachment of four KC-130 aircraft at Nam Phong RTAFB for refueling and logistics support of Task Force Delta. One KC-130 was committed also to the support needs of the VMCJ EA-6 detachment at Cubi Point. The remainder of VMGR-152's aircraft flew a variety of missions including VIP transport, TransPac support, and augmented PATMA and MAC logistic efforts when required.

#### MCAS IWAKUNI, JAPAN

The 1st MAW Headquarters staff at MCAS Iwakuni, Japan was deeply involved throughout the last half of 1972 with administrative matters, consolidation efforts, contingency planning and retrograde preparations. Beginning in July, Iwakuni-based personnel were able to return their attention to the routine matters which had been bypassed during the rapid deployment and redeployment phase from April through June. TAD orders were screened to guarantee that all personnel were in possession of the proper orders and that all required procedures were being followed. Supply methods were reviewed to ensure the most expeditious service possible to the combat deployed units. Further, VMCJ-1 (less the VMCJ-1 Detachment at Cubi Point), H&MS-15's TA-4 aircraft plus support personnel and equipment, and VMFA-122 OpCon were reassigned to MAG-12 to achieve more centralized management of remaining assets.

HACLASSITA.

After all 1st MAW's TA-4's were reassigned to H&MS-12 in July, those aircraft and the C-117's of H&MS-17 became the primary sources of flight time for the aviators assigned to the Wing & Group Headquarters sections at Iwakuni. Over 1000 TA-4 and 1950 C-117 flight hours were logged by the two squadrons between 1 July and 31 December in the accomplishment of support missions.

The RF-4 aircraft of VMCJ-1 were tasked to provide current photographic coverage of a number of U.S. Military installations in Korea, Japan and Okinawa including the air-ground ordnance ranges and low level navigational routes in Korea. These missions provided the reconnaissance aircrews and support personnel an opportunity for training which is otherwise extremely limited due to airspace restrictions and flight control regulations at Iwakuni and the adjacent flying area.

On the morning of 27 September, the F-4B aircraft of VMFA-122 commenced a TransPac returning to MCAS Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii. The "Crusaders" arrived at MCAS Iwakuni on 2 May, in the wake of the deployment of VMFA-115 and VMFA-232 to Danang, RVN.

Several important personages visited the 1st MAW at Iwakuni during the latter half of 1972, including; Ambassador INGERSOLL, U.S. Ambassador to Japan; General E. E. ANDERSON, Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps; and Lieutenant General T. H. WILSON, CG, FMFPAC. Each received an operational briefing and toured the Iwakuni base facilities.

GULF OF TONKIN: Detachment "A" of HML-367 participated in Operation Song Than 8-72, RVN. (Ref: MAG-36 Command Chronology, July-Dec 72)

GULF OF TONKIN: MGen L. E. BROWN, CG, 1st MAW, visited USS Okinawa and the embarked composite helicopter squadron, HMM-164. An additional visit was made to USS Denver, and the embarked aviation element, HMA-369. (Ref: 1st MAW Command Chronology, Jul 72)

HON LA ANCHORAGE, NVN: Six Water-Borne Logistic Craft (WBLC) were destroyed and Six damaged as HMA-369 recorded the first kills of the Marine Hunter-Killer (MARHUK) operations. (Ref: lst MAW Command Chronology, Jul 72)

GULF OF TONKIN: USS Okinawa, with HMM-164 embarked, departed Point Angel (10 miles east of Hue, RVN) for Hong Kong. (Ref: lst MAW Command Chronology, Jul 72)

NAM PHONG RTAFB, THAILAND: F-4 aircraft of VMFA-232, MAG-15, commenced participation in Barrier Combat Air Patrol (BARCAP) missions in support of 7th/13th AF "LINEBACKER" operations against NVN. (Ref: 1st MAW Command Chronology, Jul 72)

MCAS IWAKUNI, JAPAN: Col G. D. McPHER-SON assumed command of MACG-18 relieving Col E. M. JONES. (Ref: MACG-18 Command Chronology, Jul-Dec 72)

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#### PART II

### NARRATIVE SUMMARY

#### 1. G-2

- a. The weekly G-2 intelligence brief was re-established on 24 August 1972. The meeting encourages discussion among Iwakuni based unit intelligence officers and SNCO's. The September 8 meeting covered an elaborate briefing by LtCol REICHERT on the responsibilities of the G-2 Section and included an update on 1st MAW subversive/dissident activities, sabotage/malicious destruction and racial incidents.
- b. Operation "Egress-Recap", a program set up for returned POW's is one of the high priority items which the G-2 has under its cognizance. The 1st MAW Team, recently expanded to 26 members, had its first real taste of action on 2-3 September, when alerted to the possibility that an unknown number of prisoners were to be released. Members of the 1st MAW Team at Nam Phong, Bien Hoa and Saigon, as well as those based at Iwakuni, were alerted and placed on standby. Wing Aircraft and crews were readied and, within a four hour period, the Team was in readiness. At 1700 it was learned that three prisoners were to be released, but that none of these were Marines. At 1900 the Team went to a stand-down.
- c. Operation Egress Recap is the code name for the service wide program which was instituted to repatriate prisoners of war. It is a program through which the Americans who were in a POW/MIA status are returned by phases to their homes. There are three chief phases of the program: Phase I or the initial phase during which time the returnee is picked up from his point of release and brought to the receiving hospital hopefully in the PACOM area; Phase II or initial processing phase during which he is received at a designated PACOM hospital, given initial medical treatment and prepared for further aero-medical evacuation to an assigned hospital in the United States; and Phase III or detailed processing phase wherein he (the returnee) is debriefed and processed at his home hospital. The 1st Marine Aircraft Wing is involved in the Phase II, PACOM processing. By III MAF Order 3461.2B the Wing is assigned the responsibility of providing an Egress-Recap Team. The Team is divided into two main parts: the administrative processing section and the escort section. The second section of course has the greater emphasis. In the administrative section, a Team Chief, and Admin Officer and senior clerk, two (2) CI subteams (1 officer and 1 SNCO each), a SJA, PAO and photojournalist, and a chaplain are provided to see to any immediate needs the escorts might have for their respectively assigned returnees. The escort section includes 14 escorts assigned to sponsor 13 aircrewmen with whom they have had some previous acquaintance and one counterintelligence officer for whom the Wing had the most knowledgeable acquaintance. Members of this Team must keep the Team Chief cognizant of their specific

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whereabouts at any time their location changes for a period greater than 24 hours including TAD, Leave, R&R, etc., and must be replaced when they have reached the 30th day prior to RTD. When allerted the Team must be ready to move in a matter of hours to a primary designated hospital site. Because of their status, each member is required to have a val pack/seabag ready to go and his shot record up to date at all times. Once the Admin Section reaches the designated site it will more than likely remain in place and each will provide the service associated with his particular position. The escorts, however, have services directly tied to the welfare of the returneee to whom each has been assigned. The services may vary depending on the particular desire of each returnee, but are standardized also to include a particular packet of duties ranging from reuniting the returnee with his family by phone, providing uniform and accessories, advising the returnee on current events, briefing disbursing data to the returnee and finally the possibility of escorting the returnee to the West Coast for further transfer to his home hospital; or in special cases accompanying the returnee all the way home. The unique problem faced by the 1st MAW is the fact that many of the members of the Team are not located in one place. Members are in Bien Hoa, Nam Phong, Okinawa and Saigon. Aircraft lift requirements have been laid on the Air Force through the PATMA System. First MAW, however, provides a backup. Alerts have shown that the 1st MAW members are ready to go and all are, of course, eager to see the program put into action.

- d. During this period the Wing G-2 Section conducted a rapid recall. The results were 85% of personnel within 25 minutes after the action was initiated.
- e. Pre-IG inspections and reinspections of 1st MAW units were conducted between 15 August and 27 September by teams from the Wing G-2 Section.
- f. Col CHRISTIAN, G-2 Headquarters Marine Corps, a member of the inspecting General's Team, briefed 1st MAN Intelligence personnel on policies and plans for the Intelligence field within the Marine Corps.
- 2. Air Combat Intelligence Section (ACI)
- a. The Air Combat Intelligence Section presented the intelligence portion of the daily operation brief to the Commanding General and Staff. In support of the aforementioned briefs, members of the ACI Section conducted a daily research of incoming messages and various documents to prepare the necessary graphics. On-the-job training sessions were conducted to familiarize personnel with terminology and procedures to research documents. In addition, numerous hours were expanded for administrative tasks to control the classified messages and documents.





- b. The ACI Section conducted briefs for the MAG-15, S-2 designate. Additionally personnel from the ACI Section want TAD to assist various units in preparation for the IG. ACI personnel presented a briefing on CPREP-4 reporting and the organization and operation of the S-2 section of MAG-15 in their support of operations at Nam Phong, Thailand.
- c. A briefing for the Chief of Staff concerning the MARHUK operations in the vicinity of Hon Co and Hon La Islands wasgiven by the ACI Section. Two charts were prepared and the situations depicted were talen from the MARHUK daily summary.
- d. Inventories were conducted on all (ASSOTOW) air and seaplane stations of the world volumes, and of all miniature target apertures.
- 3. Staff Counterintelligence Section (SCI)
- a. SCI continued to monitor and to report on subversive and racial elements within the Iwakuni, Japan area.
- b. The SCI Office is monitoring and reporting on suspected sabotage in Bien Hoa, South VietNam and Nam Phong, and Thailand. The SCI Office has also provided 1st MAW units with combination lock and safe combination service. In addition, the SCI has referred 5 subversive propaganda cases to Naval Investigative Service and referred two narcotics cases to Criminal Investigation Department, plus coordinated the screening of all CI applicants within the 1st MAW and its deployed units in compliance with MCO 3850.1C. Also, SCI provided 1st MAW Iwakuni units with a total of ten defenses against methods of entry (DAME) assists, and provided security support during the Assistant Commandant's visit on 29 and 30 September 1972.
- 4. Photo Imagery Interpretation Unit (PIIU)
- a. The PIIU continued to support the Command by updating work on HLA/DZ's and building mosaics.
- b. Work on 13 different photo missions was completed by the PIIU section during this period. The PIIU section also conducted an update to the classified material inventory and they began laying the Iwakuni mosaic.
- c. PIIU conducted liaison with VMCJ-l operating, planning/briefing and photo lab sections to coordinate efforts in the handling of aerial reconnaissance requests, to include receiving the daily VMCJ-l flight schedule, augmenting PIIU personnel into the planning and briefing section for on-the-job training in aerial reconnaissance mission planning and pilot briefing/debriefing.
- d. On 24 November 1972, PIIU commenced utilization of the AN/TSQ-82 Imagery Interpretation Facility (IIF). For purposes of immediate processing of official aerial reconnaissance imagery, which would include the Immediate Photo Interpretation reports (IPIR), when required.

- 5. Special Security Office (SSO)
- a. The special Security Office supported by the 3rd Special Security Communications Team supported the G-2 Division by disseminating compartmented intelligence to personnel within the General Staff Section.

### Electronic Warfare Command Chronology 1-31 July 1972

First MAW requested that subordinate units review ALE-29 RR-129 Chaff usage for May and June, and Submit:a one time usage report, by squadron. Additionally, First MAW requested reexamination of SOP for the employment of Chaff in various threat environments in view of current EOB threats; and planning for missions into high threat areas.

In view of the extended nature of current operations (since April 72), First MAW requested that the TSQ-90 be located with the EA26A's at the VMCJ Det Cubi Point. Situating the TSQ-90 system at Cubi Point could provide an additional "Quick Look" site for the initial analysis of high priority tapes acquired by Pacom theater Elint collectors in support of PEC coordinated requests. Two subsequent messages were sent coordinating shipment of TSQ-90.

As accurate and complete OPREP Reporting can greatly aid in the confirmation of a threat and the development of appropriate countermeasures/equipments, and the establishment of high threat areas to air operations, First MAW sent a message out recommending aircrews be briefed and debriefed for more extensive data relative to missile/rocket firings. The message also asks the units to ensure all reports refering to the firing of missiles/rockets include AFSCC, San Antonio, Texas; and Pacom Elint Center, Hickam AFB, Hi as info addees.

First MAW requested FMFPAC review the current development status of ALQ-86 indicator shields, and to provide assistance in procurring these comast essential items for ten VMCJ Det EA6A's.

Maj H. K. MILLS, First MAW EWO, attended both the Elint Requirements Coordination/Technical Exchange Meeting and the August Pacom Parpro Conference at Fuchu AS Japan on 2 and 3 August 1972.

Beaver Hound missions for September were submitted. Beaver Hound missions for August were cancelled, due to EA6A operational commitments.

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Electronic Warfare Command Chronology 1-31 August 1972

The Wing Electronic Warfare Officer (EWO), Major H. K. MILLS, represented the First Marine Aircraft Wing at the Elint Requirements Coordination/Technical Exchange Meeting, on 2 August, at Fifth Air Force Headquarters Fuchu, Japan. lowing day, Major MILLS attended the PACOM PARPRO Conference, also at Fuchu, and briefed the First MAW's Fringe City schedule for September. Discussions brought forth the proposal to incorporate the Recon-4 reporting system vice OPREP reporting. First MAW received a message from III MAF reiterating desire for First MAW to continue representing them at the PARPRO Conferences and requested they be put on distribution conference notes. August notes were readdressed and III MAF was put on distribution for future notes.

Subordinate units were tasked to provide inputs to enable the Electronic Warfare Officer to compile the First MAW Electronic Warfare (EW) Lessons Learned report. Requested inputs received and First MAW's EW Lessons Learned was submitted to FMFRAC.

FMFPAC requested First MAW review Pacom Elint Report Number One (PER-1) and submit any corrections/additions. First MAW not in receipt PER-1 and requested copies be forwarded.

Air Force Special Communications Center, San Antonio, Texas is planning a Meaconing, Intrusion, Jamming, and Interference (MIJI) tour to SEAsia. CINCPAC requested First MAW submit a list units/locations recommended for inclusion subject presentation. Action coordinated with units and requested information submitted.

Program for installation infrarred countermeasures (IRCM) for First MAW KC-130/OV-10 assets is progressing. A priority has been established. First MAW suggested using ALE-37's on our OV-10's. COMNAVAIRPAC stated the ALE-37 capability is greater than the protection required. They recommended First MAW consider using the Naval Research Laboratory (NRL) designed pod incorporating two ALE-29A housings. First MAW concurred. Funding for installation IRCM in KC-130's has been approved. NAVAIRSYSCOMHQ has directed NAVAIRTESTCEN to commence work at a "maximum effort level".

Recently VC/NVN artillery units have moved into the Danang area. Since employment, SA-7 crews have accompanied these units. The First MAW EWO sent a message to all our units transiting Danang warning of the possible IR threat.

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NAVMISCEN Pt Mugu is presenting a AN/TSQ-90 SYMON/SYCOL programing course 11-29 September and requested First MAW send an attendee. Due deployed TSQ-90 personnel and personnel lacking sufficient time prior to RTD, a negative reply was submitted. First MAW recommended a TSQ-90 officer scheduled for rotation to First MAW be maminated to attend.

The First MAW Electronic Warfare Office continues to closely monitor all aspects Electronic Warfare and related subjects. New threats, tests and evaluations, equipments and tactics are constantly reviewed and units updated.

H. K. MILLS

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Electronic Warfare Command Chronology 1-30 September 1972

The Wing Electronic Warfare Staff was enhanced in early September by the addition of Captain J. W. STONE 258 46 8769/7586, USMC. Captain STONE is filling the billet of Assistant Electronic Warfare Officer.

Task Force Delta submitted a thesis that SA-2 guidance changes could render the AN/APR-27 completely useless. The EWO requested amplifying information and the problem will be presented for discussion at the October PARPRO Conference. The First MAW's transition from OPREP to Recon-4 reporting for Beaver Hound missions is progressing smoothly.

A JAMEX request was received from the USS Oklahoma City. Due to the deployment of VMCJ-1, the request was disapproved. The disapproval message included COMSEVENTHFLT as an info addee, so as to preclude future requests while VMCJ-1 is deployed.

During discussions with 376SW Kadena at the PARPRO Conference, it was discovered that, if flown concurrently, there is a possibility of conflict between Beaver Hound and Burning Candy missions. Coordination between 376SW Kadena and First MAW disclosed a conflict did exist. Tracks will be reviewed at the October PARPRO Conference.

Continued monitoring of the SA-7 threat produced an SA-7 Countermeasures Advisory from the EWO. The advisory was sent to First MAW A-14 units and reiterated the precautions necessary to ensure successful missions in an SA-7 environment.

The EWO received and distributed to all units copies of the Pacom Elint Report Number One (PER-1). Groups were tasked to review and submit corrections/additions to this Headquarters.

Prior to submission of First MAW's ALE-32 chaff requirement, additional data is required. FMFPAC was querried concerning data required.

Representatives from Point Mugu are planning a Technical Data Exchange/Liaison TSQ-90 visit in November. The VMCJ-Detachment was notified and requested to advise most suitable date for visit to Cubi Point.

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The Electronic Warfare NWP-33(D) was reviewed and a report submitted to G-3 Plans. The EWO recommended that chapter 11 of the NWP-33, which to date has not been published, be contracted by professional writers and completed.

The First MAW Electronic Warfare Office continues to closely monitor all aspects of Electronic Warfare and related subjects. New threats, tests and evaluations, equipments and tactics are constantly reviewed and units updated.

1. The Command Chronolgy for the Month of October 1972 is hereby submitted.

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Electronic Warfare Command Chronolgy 1-31 October 1972

Air Force Special Communications Center (AFSCC) queried combat committed units concerning SA-7 firing data. Present SA-7 data is in message format from many varied sources. The Electronic Warfare Office suggested that AFSCC consolidate this large volume of SA-7 message traffic into one study. Study received and distributed to Groups.

MAG-15 F-4J's are currently committed to daily BARCAP missions in support of Linebacker operations in NVN. Due current MIG tactics allowing minimum exposure time and use of terrain clutter to screen skin paint, plus current rules of engagement, a request for installation of ALQ-91/91A SRO-2/Crossup Interogators was requested.

First MAW was advised of a surplus corrider integration unit (INU) van, for possible use as shelter butted between TSQ-90 van units. To ascertain suitability surplus van, FMFPAC was queried for additional information. Due single entrance limitation and unavailability of butting kits, van could not satify First MAW requirements.

The USS Truxtun, USS Rowan and USS Worden all requested JAMEX services during October 1972. Due deployment VMCJ-1 in support of CTF 77 operations all JAMEX training could not be supported. Since VMCJ-1 is OPCON to CTF 77, and there may be immanent decrease in operational requirements, all future JAMEX requests will be readdressed to CTF 77 for approval/disapproval. FMAW representative at COMSEVENTHFLT Scheduling Conference requested that COMSEVENTHFLT/CTF 77 inform units that JAMEX requests should be forwarded when ships are within support radius of Cubi Point.

CINCPACFLT recommended a detachment of VMCJ-1 EA-6A's be assigned to the USS Midway to alleviate EKA-3B shortages. Comments of VMCJ-2 personnel, based on previous experience gained on Mediterranean cruises were requested and received. These comments and discussions resulted in First MAW suggesting that a detachment from VMCJ-2 or VMCJ-3 be considered before committing VMCJ-1.

VMA(AW)-533 lost an A-6 during a night Linebacker interdiction mission in RP-1. An unusal explosion was reported which could relate to the loss. AFSCC was requested to prepare an all source analysis to assist in determining the cause of the loss.

Aircrew confidence in their RHAW/DECM equipments may have been shaken by messages on the wire during October. FMFPAC was requested to initiate an all source review of USMC/USN deception repeater jammer effectiveness.

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Replies from all First MAW subordinate units were received and the First MAW's review of Pacom Elint Report Number One (PER-1) was submitted to FMFPAC.

A proposed replacement for AKAC-805 and CINCPAC Brevity Code systems is being developed for use with PARPRO activities. Fifth Air Force requested the number copies First MAW required of the new code system to ascertain distribution.

First MAW needs to submit an EA-6A ALE-32 chaff requirement. Past informal liaison indicated that CTF 77/COMSEVENTHFLT prefer not to use ALE-32 chaff because of operational complications. Accordingly, it was suggested that III MAF query COMSEVENTHFLT regarding the amount of ALE-32 estimated/desired during the next three months.

MAG-15 requested permission to alter the logic of the APR-27 Warning System based on original assumption that a threat did exist and assumption that APR-27 alternation would not degrade current system's warning performance. On 4 October 1972, the First MAW EWO and G-2 attended a brief by 388TFW at the PEC Requirement Conference on the suspected guidance anomaly. Since the information on which the request for APR-27 modification was based was so tenuous, and contrary data so well documented, that permission to modify on hand APR-27 systems was not authorized at this time.

The Naval Missile Center, Point Mugu is conducting a TSQ-90 liaison visit to First MAW for disussion software support TSQ-90 in relation to interface with EA-6A.. Preference date and discussion items were submitted to Naval Missile Center, Point Mugu.

First MAW requested the assistance of FMFPAC for procurement of a second UHF radio for VMCJ Detachment EA-6A aircraft.

To alleviate the hassle of readdressing the Marge volume, multi-paged Comfy Coat and MIJI messages, First MAW requested AFSCC include user units on addee listing.

Plans were finalized in anticipation of the MIJI briefing teams arrival in SEAsia. All arrangements by First MAW units were made and Contact Officers assigned.

LTCOL REICHART, Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2 and Major MILLS, EWO attended the PARPRO Conference and the Requirements/Coordination Meeting at Fuchu.

Beaver Hound schedule for December was submitted. Beaver Hound missions scheduled for October were cancelled.

ELECTRONIC WARFARE Command Chronolgy 1-31 November 1972

FMFPAC stated that in view of paucity of ALQ-91A systems and support problems associated with outfitting MAG-15 F-4J's with ALQ-91A's, First MAW should review the requirement for the forward deployment of system. Subsequent liaison with Staff FMFPAC has indicated that COMNAVAIRPAC intends to eventually outfit Navy/Marine F-4 Squadrons with approximately six ALO-91A's per squadron as the squadrons become ALO-91A installation capable, and some additional systems become available. The operational role that produced the request for outfitting of FMAW F-4J's with the ALQ-91A has been suspended, however, FMAW F-4's must be ready to again resume anik air-to-air combat role. In view of the state of flux regarding the current combat air-to-air role of the First MAW F-4J's, eventual installation of ALQ-91A system being programmed by COMNAVAIRPAC for WESTPAC F-4's; and the fact that peacetime contingency training could be accomplished with the ALQ-91A system, FMAW requested efforts for forward deployment and support of ALQ-91A systems identified for MAG-15 be resumed. First MAW also requested that FMFPAC provide technical assistance for maintenance until further WESTPAC replacements can be also trained prior to their arrival in WESTPAC as was outlined by FMFPAC.

Existing Tactical procedures for supporting COMSEVENTHFLT operations do not routinely include EA-6A/ALE-32 dispensing of fiberglass chaffs. However, Comseventhflt believes that tactical situations may develop which would require bulk chaff operations and that ALE-32 fiberglass chaffs for the EA-6A should be made available. Accordingly, to satisfy the three month contingency requirement stated by COMSEVENTHFLT, First MAW requested 30 cartons each of RR-142,RR-143, RR-145 chaffs for use by the VMCJ DET in Cubi Point.

First MAW drafted a message on airborne Chaff/Flare Tactics in Combined Threat Enviornment, that recommended aircrew briefings be updated to include specific data extracted from a COMOPTEVFOR message (271805Z OCT 72 (S) (PASEP)) as it applies to each squadrons aircraft. First MAW further recommended that procedures be developed that will ensure that ALE-29A Chaff/Flare mix carried on each combat mission is commensurate with the most current intelligence relative to the type mission and the operating area.

Major H. K. MILLS, EWO attended the November PARPRO/Fringe City Scheduling Conference at Fuchu.

The Beaver Hound schedule for January was submitted. Beaver Hound missions for November were cancelled, due to EA-6A operational commitments.

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AFSCC MIJI Briefing Team schedule modifications were completed, and the team sceduled to visit MAG-15 at Nam Phong. FMFPAC tried to assist FMAW requested scheduling of additional presentations periods to provide briefings for all pertinent MAG-15 personnel, but the schedule could not be modified. Cancellation of the RVN portion of the visit also precluded briefings for MAG-12 FWD personnel at Bien Hoa.

Capt J. W. STONE (Asst EWO) visited VMCJ-1/2 DETS at Cubi Point during the period 3-12 November 1972. The primary purpose of the visit was to effect certain aircraft modifications requests and certain maintenance procedures based on TSQ-90 readouts in order to enable proper ESM exploitation and reporting from ECM support flights in the Gulf of Tonkin. And a secondary purpose was to coordinate with the TSQ-90 support personnel (Capt Cleveland and Mr. Parker) from NMC, Point Magu during their visit during 7-12 Nov 72.

Solutions to the aircraft positioning and tape quality problems that had precluded an active ESM intercept and reporting program were determined and written up in ECP format. The recommended changes were submitted by VMCJ-1 DET msg 170139Z NOV 72.

It was determined during the visit by Capt CLEVELAND and Mr. PARKER that the principal need in the area of TSQ-90 soft ware was for an EOB compile and EOB compare program. The old SDS file program which builds on EA-6A intercepts only is unsatisfactory and must be replaced.

Electronic Warfare Command Chronology 1-31 December 1972

CMC was tasked by JCS to provide an input for a formal presentation on Air Defense Supression and ECM Experience. Accordingly, CMC requested Combat Operations Data from First MAW covering the period 1 April to 1 November 1972. First MAW input was completed and sent out on 1 December 1972.

First MAW sent out a message requesting their combat units to develop procedures that would minimize non-defensive dispensing of ALE-18/ALE-29 Chaff. First MAW suggested that the testing of chaff dispensors prior to entry into enemy territory should be accomplished as soon after join up as possible, in areas which will not inadvertantly interfere with friendly radar operation, or enhance enemy early warning. That aircrews should be briefed, should chaff be dropped over the Gulf of Tonkin the pilot should immediately report incident via covered circuit to his controlling agency, was also suggested.

A message was sent to FMFPAC requesting the status of the request for the urgently required ALQ-86 Indicator Shields, needed to correct unacceptable systems degradation and safety of flight.

A NAVAIRSYSCOMHQ message stated that the decision/installation time frame concerning incorporation of ALQ-126 into the RF-4B will be made subsequent to the January ECP submission; and that the ALQ-81/88 will be retained as interim DECM for the RF-4B. In order to retain an operational flexibility with ALQ-81/88 pods that is commensurate with mission requirements, and the changing threat environment, First MAW requested technical data pertaining to ALQ-81/88 pods. First MAW awaiting reply.

First MAW also queried FMFPAC on the current status of test/evaluation and procurement of IRCM(Infra-red Countermeasures) for the KC-130F.

LTCOL J. P. REICHERT and MAJ N. K. MILLS attended the December 1972 PACOM PARPRO Conference at 5th Air Force Fuchu on 4 December. They also attended the ELINT Requirements Coordination/Technical Exchange Meeting in Fuchu on 5 December 1972.

Beaver Hound missions for February were submitted. Beaver Hound missions for December were cancelled, due to EA-6A operational commitments.

### PART II

### NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During this period the First MAW Human Affairs Division experienced growth and expansion in overall scope of operations and experience accumulated. Many of the problems tackled by the Division during this time period are problems for which there are no known solutions. Therefore innovation and experimentation were exploited in an effort to find solutions to some of these problems. Drug Abuse and Race Relations were recognized as the most pressing problems and have therefore received the greatest attention.

In the area of Race Relations, the primary problem solving technique was a massive training effort which saw all 9000-Plus Marines of First MAW given 20 hours of instruction in Human Relations in the four months between 1 June and 1 Oct 72. This training was accomplished by full time instructors and included training of all deployed units of the Wing. The scope of this training is more fully appreciated when it is realized that more than 50% of the Wing personnel were deployed and that the deployment sites stretched from NAS Atsugi, Japan, to Nam Phong, RTAFB, Thailand. Training sites included MCAS Iwakuni, Japan, NAS Atsugi Japan, MCAS Futema, Okinawa, NAS Cubi Point, RPI Ben Hoa Air Base, RVN; Danang Air Base, RVN, Nam Phong RTAFB, Thailand and afloat units of MAG-36. To complement this training a Minority Cultural Center (Later renamed the Culture Center) was established at MCAS Iwakuni in August to foster better uniformity between different cultural groups within the Marine Corps, as well as to promote self-pride in the individual Marine for his cultural heritage. To accomplish this end the Center featured three functions; cultural exchange, educational study and social activities. During the subject period a workshop was opened for production of cultural artifacts, a USAFI course in Afro-American Literature was offered for college credit and significant social events were sponsored. The dates and attendance of these events are contained in Part IV. These social events were attended by persons from all ethnic backgrounds and formed a solid basis for the creation of an atmosphere of mutual respect which is now present at this location. center sponsored a gospel choir which has been extremely effective in promoting Japanese-American relations by appearing at several Japanese Protestant Churches in the surrounding community as well as at on-base chapel services. To further, augment the Wing's race relations and equal opportunity programs, a Human Relation Contact Team was formed to inspect local housing and public facilities (BASE) and report to the C.G. any discriminatory practices observed. Just the fact of this team's existance has done much toward reducing instances of

discriminatory practices in the surrounding community. These teams, made up of random selected Marines of all ethnic backgrounds, proceed under orders to designated public facilities, investigate and report in writing the reception they received and treatment accorded them at each place they are assigned to inspect. In this way places which practice subtle discrimination are being identified and steps taken to correct the situation. To enhance command support and improve unit participation in the Wing programs, the Commanding General personally briefed all new unit commanders and all newly arrived Colonels and Lt. Colonels on equal opportunity policies and practices within the Wing. During these briefings, five principles are emphasized:

- (1) Each unit should have its own equal opportunity program based on a positive award type of orientation rather than a negative or sanction orientation.
- (2) The chain of command is the primary and preferred channel for correcting discriminatory practices and communicating on racial matters.
- (3) All programs should strive to present supportive relationships between ethnic subgroups and the command. Culture centers and similar programs are most productive in this regard.
- (4) The quality of discipline cannot be compromised. All programs must uphold and support military courtesy and discipline.
- (5) Establishment of dual standards for minority personnel is unacceptable. This places a large responsibility on unit commanders to ensure that supplementary training and education programs are made available to minority personnel in order to qualify them for the high standards established for technical MOS's and officer programs. The results of HRI training and detailed lists of schedules are contained in Part IV.

In the area of drug abuse many lessons have been learned and many new facets of the problem uncovered. From the experience of operating our Coffee House (Desiderata) it was discovered that many young Marines who experiment with drug abuse and later become addicted do not generally have career goals or firm plans for their future. As a result of their experience a new emphasis was placed on Career Planning and the scope of career planning was expanded to include planning for civilian careers as well as military careers. Education programs have expanded and all these functions have been consolidated by creation of a primary duty Human Affairs Officer at the squadron and separate unit level (see WgO 6710.1 Part IV). As an effort to make the drug exemption programs more viable and credible with young Marines and as a method of obtaining help with drug problems a new policy was promulgated by the CG (SEE PART

IV). The primary task of this policy was to change the practice of automatically suspending security clearance of the indivdual drug exemptee and transferring him to a nonsensitive job. The primary new concern is for helping the indivdual become rehabilitated. As a result of this new practice the number of drug exemptions requested has soared during November and December 1972 (SEE PART IV) This increase was also contributed to substantially by the increase in urinalysis testing at deployed units of MAG-12 (fwd) and MAG-15.

In December, at the request of the Wing Commander a Drug Education Field Team (DEFT) from FMFPAC was deployed to Nam Phong, RTAFB, Thailand, to educate Marines there on drugs and drug abuse danger as well as to train and organize a local Drug Abuse Education Contact Team (DAECT). The results of their work should be felt during the next reporting period.

Detailed data of Marines trained in drug education are contained in Part IV.

During the subject period this wing experienced a most dramatic increase in first term reenlistments. The chart in Part IV shows the rate per month with a comparison of last year's results. As compared with a CMC goal of 12%, the First MAW attained an average reenlistment rate of 43.7% for this six month period. Although many factors contributed to this phenominal success, it is considered more than coincidental that it occurred simultaneously with our increased emphasis in the human aspects of Marine Corps operations.

During August, to increase participation in and awareness of alcohol abuse problems, a staff visit was made to all Iwakuni based unit by Major LETCHWORTH and GySgt Cloutier. GySgt Cloutier is a rehabilitated alcoholic and an active member of Iwakuni's chapter of AA. He voluntarily waived his anonymity to promote this program. As a result of this visit, several new alcoholics were identified by their command and enrolled in the rehabilitation program. The alcohol abuse problem has gradually become more apparent during this period and plans are being made for an enlarged program featuring a more formal, technical approach during the current period.

PEOPLE training seminars continued during the subject period as leadership training for officers and SNCO's. The primary emphasis was on communication skills and awareness. Statistics for the period are contained in Part IV.

Financial assistance requests, Congrint/Splint and WELREPS continued to be processed by their department during the subject period. Statistics are contained in Part IV.

Postal services were continually provided during the subject period. Statistics are contained in Part VI.

During this period numerous distinguished guests visited First MAW and were briefed on Human Affairs activities by LTCOL CARLSON. Dates and names are contained in Part III and a typical briefing guide is contained in Part IV.

- G. A Marine Postal Liaison NCO (MOS 0161 Postal Clerk) is assigned to the U.S. Air Force Post Office at Bien Hoa, RVN. His duties consist of receiving, dispatching and delivering all mail for units and personnel of MAG-12(fwd). Mail is routed from Fleet Post Office in San Francisco to Saigon, RVN, by commercial air,

and is then picked by truck and transported to Bien Hoa  $\dot{}$  (a distance of approximately 15 miles).

#### ACMC BRIEF, HUMAN AFFAIRS DIVISION

#### I. HUMAN AFFAIRS DIVISION, 1ST MARINE AIRCRAFT WING

A. THIS SECTION WAS FIRST ESTABLISHED 1FEB72 AS ASST. CHIEF OF STAFF, G-5, ON 14APR72, AS DIRECTED BY THE COM-MANDING GENERAL FMFPAC. IT WAS REDESIGNATED AS THE HUMAN AFFAIRS DIVISION; WE PROVIDE HUMAN AFFAIRS SUPPORT AND CONSOLIDATE THE WING'S INTEREST IN PERSONNEL SERVICES TO WING MARINES. THE RESPONSIBILITIES OF THIS SECTION ARE THE IMPROVEMENT OF RACIAL HARMONY, THE ASSURANCE OF EQUAL OPPORTUNITY, THE ENHANCEMENT OF PERSONNEL SERVICES AND THE IMPROVEMENT OF COMMUNICATIONS AMONG OUR MARINES HERE AT IWAKUNI, FUTEMA AND ALSO FOR THE WING'S DEPLOYED UNITS. AS CAN BE SEEN, WE HAVE A WEALTH OF INFORMATION AT OUR DISPOSAL.

## II. ACTIVE PROGRAMS UNDER THE DIRECT SUPERVISION OF THE HUMAN AFFAIRS DIVISION

- A. AT PRESENT I AM DIRECTLY RESPONSIBLE FOR 15 PROGRAMS: OF THESE PROGRAMS, THREE: HUMAN RELATIONS INSTRUCTION, DRUG ABUSE EDUCATION AND DRUG EXEMPTION/REHABILITATION AND PEOPLE TRAINING SEMINARS ARE RECEIVING THE GREATEST EMPHASIS SO I WILL CONFINE MY REMARKS TO THESE AREAS. LATER IN THIS BRIEF I WILL DISCUSS THE CULTURAL CENTER AND COFFEE HOUSE UNDER THE HEADING OF NEW PROGRAMS, AS WELL AS OUR BRAND NEW ALCOHOL ABUSE EDUCATION PROGRAM.
- A. HUMAN RELATIONS INSTRUCTION. AT THE DIRECTION OF GENERAL BROWN, A WING PROGRAM WITH THE AVOWED PURPOSE OF ACCOMPLISHING HRI TRAINING FOR 100% OF THE 1ST MARINE AIRCRAFT WING WAS INSTITUTED ON 22 MAY 1972. TO DATE 4786 MARINES HAVE RECEIVED THIS TRAINING OR 71% OF THE 1ST MARINE AIRCRAFT WING. IN ORDER TO ACCOMPLISH THIS GOAL, TRAVELING

HRI TEAMS, CONSISTING OF 2 OFFICERS AND 18 ENLISTED WERE TRAINED AND SENT FIRST TO MAG-12 (FWD) BIEN HOA, THEN TO CUBI PT. AND AT PRESENT THEY ARE AT TASK FORCE DELTA, NAM PHONG, COMPLETING THE TRAINING OF OUR DEPLOYED UNITS. THIS CHART SHOWS THE SEQUENCE OF TRAINING AND THE NUMBERS INSTRUCTED. IT IS OUR INTENT THAT EACH NEW MEMBER OF THE 1ST MARINE AIRCRAFT WING BE GIVEN HRI TRAINING BEFORE HE REPORTS TO HIS NEW ASSIGNMENT. I WOULD LIKE TO POINT OUT AT THIS TIME THAT SUCH INTEREST WAS SHOWN IN OUR PROGRAM AT BIEN HOA AND DANANG BY THE AIR FORCE THAT AT THEIR REQUEST 400 AIRMEN WERE GIVEN HRI TRAINING IN OUR TEAMS OFF DUTY TIME.

B. DRUG ABUSE EDUCATION. DRUG EDUCATION LECTURES AND SEMINARS WERE ATTENDED BY 4401 WING PERSONNEL DURING THE PERIOD 1JAN72 TO 1SEP72. ON 3MAR72, THE 1ST MARINE AIRCRAFT WING HOSTED THE JAPAN DRUG ABUSE CONFERENCE. ON 4MAY72 THE MARINE CORPS RANDOM URINALYSIS PROGRAM WAS IMPLEMENTED. WE ARE HAMPERED IN THE DRUG ABUSE EDUCATION FIELD BY OUR LACK OF TRAINED DRUG ABUSE COUNSELLORS. A REQUEST HAS GONE TO THE COMMANDING GENERAL, FMFPAC AND CMC FOR ASSISTANCE IN THIS CRITICAL AREA. THE HIGH DEGREE OF AVAILABILITY OF MARIJUANA TO OUR MARINES IS AN AREA OF GREAT CONCERN. OUR BEST ESTIMATES REVEALT THAT APPROXIMATELY 60% OF OUR YOUNG MARINES EITHER ARE USERS, WERE USERS OR WILL BE. THEY ARE EXPOSED TO IT EVERYDAY IN GROSS QUANTITIES.

HERE IN JAPAN THE USE OF HEROIN IS A LESSER PROBLEM, THOUGH IT EXISTS. JAPANESE LAW DEALS SEVERELY WITH HEROIN USERS AND PUSHERS. A TYPICAL SENTENCE FOR POSSESSION OF HEROIN IS 3 TO 5 YEARS IN PRISON, FIRST OFFENSE, WITH NO TIME OFF.

C. <u>DRUG EXEMPTION/REHABILITATION</u>. SINCE THE RECEIPT OF ALMAR 77 ON 19JUL71, 131 1ST MARINE AIRCRAFT WING MARINES HAVE ENTERED THE DRUG EXEMPTION PROGRAM. 11 EXEMPTIONS HAVE

BEEN GRANTED FROM 1JUN72 TO 1SEP72. THE TOTAL OF MARINES REHABILITATED LOCALLY AND RETAINED SINCE JULY 71 IS 34. THIS COMMAND IS STRIVING VERY HARD THROUGH ALL ITS ACTIVITIES TO ESTABLISH CREDIBILITY FOR THE DRUG EXEMPTION PROGRAM. THE LACK IN CREDIBILITY SEEMS DUE PRIMARILY TO THE LACK OF SUITABLE LOCAL REHABILITATION FACILITIES. ALL TOO OFTEN A DRUG EXEMPTION IS THE FIRST STEP TOWARD A RECOMMENDATION FOR ADMINISTRATIVE DISCHARGE. THE REQUIREMENT FOR SRB ENTRY OF GRANT OF EXEMPTION MARKS THE MAN AS A DRUG ABUSER.

TRAINED DRUG ABUSE COUNSELORS AGAIN WOULD BE A GREAT ASSIST HERE. A RECOMMENDATION WAS FORWARDED TO FMFPAC THAT DELETION OF THE SRB ENTRY OF GRANT OF EXEMPTION BE CONSIDERED AS AN AGENDA ITEM FOR THE MARINE CORPS DRUG ABUSE CONFERENCE BEING HELD IN WASHINGTON THIS MONTH.

D. PEOPLE TRAINING SEMINARS. PEOPLE TRAINING SEMINARS WERE SCHEDULED ON A WEEKLY BASIS IN AN EFFORT TO PRODUCE MORE UNDERSTANDING AND MUTUAL RESPECT BY IMPROVING LEADERSHIP AND COMMUNICATING SKILLS. THROUGH THE PERIOD ENDING 1SEP72, A TOTAL OF 1068 OFFICERS AND MEN. HAVE BEEN TRAINED WITHIN THE 1ST MARINE AIRCRAFT WING. UPON COMPLETION OF INITIAL HRI TRAINING FOR THE WING ON 10CT72, ADDED EMPHASIS WILL BE PLACED ON PEOPLE TRAINING TO GIVE THIS VERY WORTH WHILE EDUCATION TO AS MANY OF OUR FIRST WING MARINES AS POSSIBLE.

#### III. <u>NEW PROGRAMS</u>--

THIS WING HAS THREE NEW PROGRAMS UNDERWAY WHICH WE CON-SIDER OFFER AN INNOVATIVE APPROACH TO PROBLEMS.

A. MINORITY CULTURE CENTER. THE FIRST ONE OF GREAT LOCAL INTEREST IS THE MINORITY CULTURAL CENTER. THE CONCEPT WAS APPROVED BY GENERAL BROWN ON THE 28TH OF JULY 1972, AND

THE CENTER WAS ESTABLISHED IN A HANGAR VACATED BY ONE OF OUR DEPLOYED UNITS. FORTUNATELY THIS HANGAR HAS AIRCONDITIONED CLASS ROOMS, IS CLEAN AND NEWLY RENOVATED, HAS AN AREA FOR A DANCE FLOOR AND PROVIDES FIRST CLASS SPACE FOR THIS ACTIVITY. BY-LAWS WERE DRAWN UP FOR GENERAL BROWN'S APPROVAL BY APPROXIMATELY 70 MARINES OF MIXED CULTURAL BACKGROUND. THE ACTIVITIES THERE HAVE DISPLAYED A PATTERN OF INCREASED INTEREST. AS AN EXAMPLE, A PICNIC WAS SPONSORED BY THE CULTURAL CENTER ON THE 27TH OF AUGUST WITH OVER 200 PEOPLE OF MIXED RACE IN ATTENDANCE.

A CLASS ON BLACK LITERATURE UNDER THE AUSPICES OF USAFI MEETS THERE TWICE A WEEK. THIS CLASS IS TAUGHT BY AN OFFICER FROM HUMAN AFFAIRS WHO IS A CERTIFIED TEACHER.

A GRAND OPENING IS PLANNED FOR 16 AND 17 SEPTEMBER AT THE CULTURAL CENTER WITH PARTICIPATION FROM THE BLACK WORK-SHOP IN OKINAWA, BLACK REPRESENTATIVES FROM YOKOTA AND A DANCE TO WHICH THE ENTIRE BASE WILL BE INVITED. A BLACK SOUL GROUP FROM OKINAWA HAS VOLUNTEERED THEIR SERVICES FOR THE DANCE.

FUTURE PROGRAMS INCLUDE A BASE WIDE TALENT SHOW AND A VERY AMBITIOUS UNDERTAKING; THE PRESENTATION OF A PLAY.

THE KEY TO THE SUCCESS OF THIS ENDEAVOR SEEMS TO BE COMMAND APPROVAL AND THEN NEXT, COMMAND SUPPORT.

B. COFFEE HOUSE. TO PROVIDE AN OPEN LINE OF COMMUNI-CATION, TO DEMONSTRATE CONCERN AND UNDERSTANDING AND TO SOLVE INDIVIDUAL NEEDS ON AN INFORMAL BASIS A COFFEE HOUSE WAS OPENED HERE ON 23 JUNE 1972. THE COFFEE HOUSE SEEKS TO FUNCTION AS A THERAPEUTIC CENTER RATHER THAN AN ACTIVITY TO AIR COMPLAINTS. THE COFFEE HOUSE IS STAFFED AND SUPERVISED BY PERSONNEL FROM THE DRUG ABUSE CONTACT TEAM AND PEOPLE TRAINING UNIT. IT'S GOAL IS TO PROVIDE ACCURATE INFORMATION AND TO OFFER ALTERNATIVES TO DRUG ABUSE THROUGH OPEN AND FREE COMMUNICATION WITH THE INDIVIDUAL CONCERNED.

THE COUNSELORS ALSO AIM AT SOLVING THE UNDERLYING PROBLEMS AN INDIVIDUAL MIGHT HAVE WHICH LEAD TO DRUG AND ALCOHOL INVOLVEMENT. THE HOURS OF THE COFFEE HOUSE ARE 1800 TO 0100 EACH NIGHT.

- C. ALCOHOL ABUSE EDUCATION. FOLLOWING THE POLICY
  ESTABLISHED BY DOD THIS WING ESTABLISHED ITS ALCOHOL EDUCATION PROGRAM ON 4AUG72. IN AN EFFORT TO BE INNOVATIVE IN THIS
  NEW FIELD, STAFF VISITS WERE CONDUCTED WITH ALL IWAKUNI BASED
  UNITS BY HUMAN AFFAIRS DIVISION IN COMPANY WITH A REPRESENTATIVE FROM THE LOCAL ALCOHOLIC ANONYMOUS. RESPONSE HAS BEEN
  VERY FAVORABLE BRINGING ABOUT INCREASED ACTIVITY IN THE LOCAL
  AA. 9 NEW MEMBERS WERE RECEIVED ON ONE WEEK. THE ASST.
  CHIEF OF STAFF, HUMAN AFFAIRS IS PRESENTLY WORKING CLOSELY
  WITH ALL STAFF SECTIONS AND WING UNIT COMMANDERS IN AN EFFORT
  TO IDENTIFY THE PROBLEM PEOPLE, PROVIDE THEM COUNSEL AND
  GUIDANCE, AND ESTABLISH A PATTERN OF REHABILITATION THAT IS
  SUCCESSFUL. IT IS FELT THAT SUCCESS IN THIS FIELD WILL LEAD
  TO GREATER CREDIBILITY FOR THE DRUG ABUSE EDUCATION PROGRAM.
- IV. CAREER PLANNING. ON 1MAY72, THE CAREER PLANNING FUNCTION WAS TRANSFERRED FROM G-1 TO HUMAN AFFAIRS. DURING THE PAST FOUR MONTHS THE 1ST MAW CAREER PLANNING SECTION CONDUCTED STAFF VISITS TO ALL SUBORDINATE UNITS INSISTING UPON A VIABLE CAREER ADVISORY PROGRAM. THE WING IS PROUD OF ITS JULY AND AUGUST RETENTION/REENLISTMENT RATES, AND WE CONSIDER OURSELVES TO BE HAVING EXCELLENT SUCCESS WITH OUR AUGMENTATION RESULTS. WE ARE PARTICULARLY PROUD OF OUR JULY AND AUGUST 1ST TERM REENLISTMENT RATES OF 59.2% IN JULY AND 39.2% IN AUGUST. WE INTEND TO KEEP THE EMPHASIS ON OUR CAREER ADVISORY PROGRAMS SO THAT WE DON'T FALL BACK ON COMPLACENCY. THE PATTERN OF INCREASED REENLISTMENT TIED TO OUR RECENT COMBAT DEPLOYMENTS IS OBVIOUS FROM THE GRAPH. WE ANTICIPATE THE CONTINUANCE OF A HIGH REENLISTMENT RATE THROUGH THE END OF THIS YEAR.







- 1. <u>Purpose</u>. The purpose of this order is to promulgate standards and policies for drug and alcohol abuse abatement programs which include:
  - a. A preventive drug education program;
  - b. A drug rehabilitation and reorientation program;
  - c. An alcoholism rehabilitation and reorientation program;
  - d. A drug exemption program;
  - e. A random urinalysis screening program;
- f. An attitude change program to promote necessary changes in attitude to properly implement the foregoing programs throughout the First Marine Aircraft Wing.

RETURN TO WING CENTRAL FILES

#### 2. Background

- a. The policy to prevent and eliminate drug abuse within the Armed Forces was promulgated by reference (a). The policy addressed preventive drug education, restoration and rehabilitation of drug users, and authorized the military departments to establish amnesty programs on a trial basis.
- b. In reference (b), the Marine Corps restated policies, standards and procedures with reference to the instruction of Marines concerning the inherent dangers and consequences involved in the wrongful sale, use or possession of narcotics; drug abuse; and provided for educational opportunities concerning drug abuse relating to dependents of military personnel and civilian employees.
- c. In reference (c) the Secretary of the Navy established an exemption program for disclosures of drug use, and possession incident to such use. Its purpose--for the benefit of the individual--was to enable the drug abuser to obtain treatment, counseling, guidance and/or other rehabilitative aid needed without fear of punitive action. Its purpose--for the benefit of the command was to enable commands to be alert to the presence of an individual whose drug involvement might adversely affect the command's operational capabilities.
- d. On 1 March 1972, the Department of Defense issued directive number 1010.2 entitled "Alcohol Abuse by Personnel of the Department of Defense" which established DOD policies for preventing alcohol abuse and alcoholism, and for treating and rehabilitating alcohol abusers and alcoholics.

#### 3. Information

a. The Force Human Affairs Poll, taken in November 1971, indicates that between 40 and 50 percent of the command, at the time the poll was taken, had used or were then using some type of illegal or harmful drug. Also, the poll indicated that 47.7 percent of those polled would not tolerate marijuana users in their units; and a much higher percentage would not tolerate users of dangerous drugs. The poll, therefore, indicated that the Force is about equally divided between those who use drugs or condone their use, and those who cannot tolerate drug use or users. These two opposing views are compounded by ignorance and prejudice which further impedes, and may even prevent, the finding of solutions to the societal problem of drug abuse.

b. The poll further indicated that 56.6 percent of the Force is of the opinion that alcohol is a serious problem within the Marine Corps. Although the abuse of alcohol may be more acceptable, than that of drugs, because of its historic acceptance, generally without stigma, to a large sector of our society, this does not reflect the feeling of a number of younger Marines. There have also been many reports which indicate that the adverse effects of alcohol abuse are greater than those of drug abuse.

#### 4. General

- a. The continuing pronouncement that drug abuse will not be tolerated is of itself obviously ineffective. It is believed that a similar pronouncement about alcohol abuse would be essentially disregarded. The decision on the part of an individual as to whether to use drugs or not is primarily a state of mind and has little to do with how much clinical knowledge he has or doesn't have. This probably applies equally to alcohol abuse. It is therefore indicated that abatement programs must be directed toward the creation of a proper state of mind.
- The total issue of drug and alcohol abuse revolves around people and their problems. The entire spectrum of human affairs issues must be examined with a view toward promoting leadership effectiveness which will provide suitable alternatives to drug and alcohol abuse. Training policies must be evaluated to provide the most interesting and challenging training possible within mission requirements. Personnel assignment policies and job requirements must be constantly reviewed with a view toward enhancing job satisfaction. Programs must exist which provide maximum possible attention to, and solution for, personal problems, real or imagined, of all Marines and/or their dependents. Special Services and educational programs must be planned and supervised to ensure they enhance leisure time activities. A professional and meaningful work program that provides challenges, goals and rewards, complemented by an active, constructive yet relaxing off-duty program, constitutes the type of environment that opposes, and eventually replaces the drug and alcohol environment.
- 5. Policy. The policy within the First Marine Aircraft Wing as it pertains to the abatement of drug and alcohol abuse, is as follows:

- a. Work and off-duty programs must be made satisfying to the degree that they will preclude the desire for, or become a logical substitute for, drug and alcohol abuse.
- b. To the maximum degree possible, the sale, trafficking, possession or use of drugs must be prevented through a strong enforcement program.
- c. Through a viable preventive drug education program, individuals who have never used drugs will be encouraged to avoid them; individuals who have used drugs and stopped, or individuals who use them only occasionally or experimentally, will be encouraged to refrain from any further use; and individuals who are deeply involved with drugs and are not getting help with their problem will be encouraged to seek help.
- d. A drug or alcohol abuser, will not be treated as a second-class citizen; but rather, as an individual who has a problem and needs help. Attitudes must be changed or maintained which permit maximum help in restoring the individual to the role of a fully effective Marine. Commanders and leaders at every level must set the precedent through their example in promoting these attitudes towards the drug and alcohol abuser.
- e. Those individuals who are deeply involved with drugs, and can be identified either through the drug exemption program or through other methods, will be helped to the maximum extent possible through reorientation and rehabilitation programs in order that the individuals concerned can be restored to a full duty status. Those individuals who need help beyond the capabilities of local commands will be identified for transfer to a Naval Drug Rehabilitation Center.
- f. The dangers of alcohol abuse will be included in all educational and preventive drug programs. Problem drinkers and alcoholics will be identified as early as possible and will be provided treatment and rehabilitation in order to restore them to full service and health as soon as possible.
- 6. Drug and Alcohol Abuse Programs. Since the inception of the Drug Exemption Program, established in accordance with reference (d) the priority of efforts in matters of drug abuse control has been directed toward encouraging voluntary disclosure of drug abuse and providing rehabilitative aid to Marines so identified. Although the Exemption Program has identified many, those processed within this program represent only a

small percentage of the Wing actually involved, or subject to involvement, in drug abuse. The need for commands to retain flexibility in methods used in drug and alcohol abatement programs based on local situations and environment is acknowledged. However, within this flexibility, structured and quantifiable programs must exist. The following are designed to provide a more complete program of drug and alcohol abuse abatement:

#### a. Preventive Drug Education Program

- (1) Continue emphasizing the drug education program required by reference (b).
- (2) Continue emphasizing the drug abuse information program required by reference (e). The programs will be positive in their approach, i.e., scare tactics will not be emphasized nor shall propaganda imply that drug and alcohol abusers are deviants or freaks.
  - (3) Provide for logical and tangible alternatives to drug use through the continuing efforts of all to identify, understand and improve situations that may be contributing factors in the use and abuse of drugs.
  - (4) Utilize the principles of the participant-oriented approach to learning found in the PEOPLE and Human Relations Training Programs to provide for free communication and exchange between individual Marines, NCO's and officers.
  - (5) Adhere to the technique of programming the presentation of drug and alcohol abuse topics at the lowest unit level to facilitate communications and exchanges between the small unit leader and the individual Marine.

#### b. Drug Rehabilitation and Reorientation Program

- (1) Provide programs of counseling, encounter groups and treatment for those individuals identified as needing help.
- (2) Develop increased self-pride and sense of responsibility permitting individuals to function without drugs.
- (3) Motivate individuals toward performance of useful service and honorable completion of enlistment.

(4) Evaluate each individual drug involved Marine to determine which method of training or rehabilitation is best. there is no single "best" method.

#### c. Alcoholism Rehabilitation and Reorientation Program

- (1) Emphasize the physiological and psychological dangers inherent in alcohol abuse.
- (2) Stress the inconsistencies between the abuse of alcohol and military responsibility, job performance and the distinct possibility of misconduct or illness stemming from its abuse.
- . (3) Focus on the early identification of the problem drinker and the alcoholic.
- (4) Establish treatment programs to include both medical and non-medical.
- (5) Promote the acceptance of the recovered alcoholic in the military community, as well as the acceptance of the fact that alcoholism is treatable.

#### d. Drug Exemption Program

- (1) The Drug Exemption Program will be conducted in accordance with reference (d), as modified by references (f) and (g).
  - (2) Exemption representatives must be assigned based upon their personal attributes of maturity, responsibility, and the facility to communicate with young Marines.
  - (3) If otherwise qualified the test of sincerity of an individual's request for  $exe_mption$  is his manifest intention to cooperate fully in his own rehabilitation.
  - (4) Reference (h) contains amplifying information for the Drug exemption Program.

#### e. Random Urinalysis Screening Program

(1) The Random Urinalysis Screening Program will be conducted in accordance with the instructions contained in reference (1).

(2) This program should be used as a deterrent to drug abuse during discussions in drug education and information periods.

#### f. Attitude Change Program

- (1) Promote understanding of attitudes, values and situational factors contributing to drug abuse in order that they can be recognized and combatted.
- (2) Develop informational programs that influence changes in perspective of those individuals who inhibit drug abatement efforts by their single-minded intolerance of all Marines who have illegally used drugs.
- (3) Reverse the peer influence trend that encourages drug abuse participation by developing counter-peer groups that discourage drug abuse and promote voluntary disclosure in cases where help is needed.
- (4) Promote free lines of communication. Effective drug education extends beyond one-way indoctrination. Provide opportunities for discussion, from all viewpoints, of values and experiences among Marines of all ranks and ages.
- 7. Drug and Alcohol Awareness. The following additional thoughts are offered for consideration in the conduct of drug and alochol abuse abatement programs:
- a. Programs must be dynamic. There has been a great surge of interest in the drug and alcohol abatement areas and we must be constantly alert to methods of refining and upgrading our efforts.
- b. The thrust of our drug and alcohol programs must be preventive in nature. Treatment is the price we pay because our preventive program has not been totally successful.
- c. Education is a function of communication. The problem of communication in the area of drug abuse is compounded by lack of understanding, bias, emotion and faulty logic.
  - d. Adhere to the following basic principles:
- (1) Be well informed. Ensure that materials presented are authoritative, factual and current.

WgO 671+°° - Aug 1972

- (2) Avoid over-reaction. Drug abuse is many things ranging from alcohol ingestion to heroin injection.
- (3) Avoid drug stereotypes. Drugs wary widely in their composition and in their effect on the individual.
- (4) Discard scare techniques or use them with extreme caution. The use of untruths, half-truths and threats of severe consequesces are counterproductive, particularily when presented to those with drug abuse experiences.
- (5) Use of ex-drug users or ex-alcoholics as outlined in reference (j) in education and encounter programs has been found to be highly beneficial.

#### 8. Action

- a. All Commanding Officers will ensure they have definitive viable and dynamic drug and alcohol abatement programs established within their commands in accordance with the provisions of reference (a) through (k), and this Order.
- b. Copies of existing, new or modified Orders, implementing the actions contained herein, will be provided this headquarters.
- c. A new reporting requirement is established with this Order in abordance with reference (k). Monthly reports commencing with period 1-31 Aug are due this Headquarters by the 5th of the month following the reported period. Reports will be submitted utilizing the format outlined in Encl. (1) of this Order.
- d. Each Squadron or separate unit will create a primary duty Human Affairs Officer who will assume the additional duties of Drug Exemption Officer, Alcohol Control Officer, and may additionally function as Special Services Officer, Education Officer and such other duties as the Commanders may deem appropriate or related in the spirit of this Order. His responsibliities will include but not be limited to:
- (1) Creating an atmosphere of concern for individuals identified as hawing a drug or alcohol problem.

- (2) Judiciously handling those personnel requesting assistance with a drug or alcohol problem to prevent notoriety of the individual concerned.
- (3) Monitoring the individual's work conditions, and making recommendations to the Commanding Officer concerning the best method of creating the most conducive atmosphere for the rehabilitation and reorientation of the drug and alcohol abuser.
- (4) Conducting the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Programs as outlined in paragraph 6 of this order, working in close cooperation with the Commanding Officer in order to successfully implement the attitude change program.

General Administration procedures were tested by the Inspector General on 9 November 1972. Minor errors were noted. Overall report was satisfactory.

During the reporting period, the Awards Section processed 57 recommendations from within the Headquarters, and 868 recommendations submitted by subordinate units. Unit Award recommendations were submitted on Marine Aircraft Group 12 and Task Force Delta.

Classified Material procedures (including Registered Publications) were inspected by representatives of FMFPAC. Errors were noted and have been corrected.

The CMCC processed inventories received from 25 Secondary Control Points. One Secondary Control Point has major discrepancies.

During the reporting period all classified material originated by First Marine Aircraft Wing was reviewed for possible early downgrading. Appropriate reports were issued.

During the reporting period, general reproduction has produced 454,274,511 copies on the Multilith and 139,000 by XEROX equipment.

With the closing of the Wing Communication Center in October the Message Distribution Center assumed the additional responsibility for a 24 hour courier service between the Station Communication Center and the Wing Headquarters. In the last six months the Message Distribution Center has processed 106,550 messages and reproduced 2,525,944 copies for distribution. This is an average of 583 messages and 13,808 copies per day.

Commencing in October 1972, the Word Processing Section was tasked with producing letter type orders for all personnel being detached from this Command. Concurrently two shifts were established in order to provide maximum utilization of the leased equipment. That section produces over 5000 finished sheet products per month.

During the period 1 July 1972 through 31 December 1972, the First Marine Aircraft Wing received \$15,057,900 Operations and Maintenance Navy, \$3,600,366 Operations Marine Corps, and \$1,000 Community Relations Funds. These funds were sufficient to support Wing operations including all known unprogrammed costs associated with SEASIA combat operations. It should be noted, however, that OMC fund utilization 1st Half FY-73, amounted to 81% (3.6 MIL) out of an annual financial ceiling of 4.44 million. As expected, unprogrammed SEASIA costs contributed significantly to these high obligation rate.

#### NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the reporting period, Branch Law Offices were established at MCAS(H)Futema, Okinawa, and at the Royal Thai Air Force Base, Nam Phong, Thailand. These branch offices are staffed bytpersonnel of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing Law Center and provide complete legal services to units stationed at these locations. In addition the officer lawyers assigned to the Branch Law Center Nam Phong also provide legal counsel for Marine units operating in the Republic of Vietnam.

Every four to five weeks a military Judge and a court-reporter from the Law Center proceed to Bien Hoa, Vietnam, and Nam Phong, Thailand, for the conduct of judicial proceedings. These trial trips usually last about one and a half weeks and result in an average of 8 to 10 trials.

The Branch Law Office, Task Force Delta, established liaison with the U.S. Military Assistance Command, Thailand, concerning jurisdiction of the Thai government over personnel in that country.

#### 1. Courts-Martial:

- a. A Cpl from MWHS-l was tried by SPCM on 28 September 1972 for larceny, drafting 5 bad checks, and impersonating an NCO. He pleaded guilty and was found guilty. He was sentenced to confinement at hard labor for 4 months, forfeiture of \$250.00 pay per month for 4 months, reduction to E-l and to be discharged from the service with a bad conduct discharge.
- b. A Pvt from MWSG-17 was tried by SPCM on 14 September 1972 for hitting a SSgt with his fists and stealing a motorcycle helmet. He pleaded guilty and was found guilty. MCAS IWAKUNI, Japan, July 28--- One Marine and a \$65,000 machine are predicting the future for planes of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing.

Corporal Jerry C. Halmon, a 19-year-old Texan, is one of three men in the Marine Corps currently trained in "analysis of aircraft engine oil for wear metal."

Simply translated that means that Halmon and his machine, which make up the 1st MAW's Spectrometric Cil Analysis Program (SCAP) lab, have the responsibility of analyzing aircraft oil specimens for minute particles of metal in the oil. These fragments, invisible to the naked eye, can indicate problems with the engine that might prove costly or even fatal if not detected as early as possible.

The SOAP lab's costly machine "energizes" a small sample of the oil with a 16,000 volt charge to burn it. A mercury lamp projects the deposits of the burnel oil into the machine onto a prism-like mechanism which breaks the light into a spectrum of colors. These colors are then transformed into varying electrical charges which give a readout on the machine as the dial on the machine is turned to run through the list of 20 elements that can be detected.

These readouts are checked against a chart of acceptable tolerances for each particular metal. If an element readout exceeds these limits, an advice cole is sent to the squairon detailing the action required.

"For example, a recent sample we received from the engine of a Marine A-6 jet showed a high silicon count. This can be an indication of wear, contamination or one of many other things. Our advice was to flush the system, then send more samples after a 10-minute run-up of the engine and five hours operation," Halmon explained.

Commenting on his background for the new job, Halmon said he had been a jet mechanic when a request came from Headquarters Marine Corps asking for volunteers to retrain as oil analysis technicians.

"I was the only Marine in my particular class, however, two others had gone through the school before me. Both of these men are deployed with Navy units at this time, but will be relieved by trained Navy technicians. In the near future, we'll have three oil analysis technicians here at Iwakuni," Halmon said.

According to Halmon's officer in charge, Chief Warrant Officer Oscar Creech, "the spectrometric oil analysis is an aid to safety and maintenance. It can actually locate a potential trouble area within an engine long before the engine reaches the point of an in-flight failure,"

MCAS IWAKUNI, Japan—Gunnery Sergeant Lynn D. "Tex" Mattocks' idea of week-end recreation is putting his lithe, five-foot five-inch, 135 pound body aboard 2,000 pounds of angry, snorting Brahma bull—and then attempting to stay there.

Mattocks belongs to the rough and grueling sport of rodeoing. He counts himself as "the only member of the Rodeo Cowboys Association (RCA) who is a career military man." The RCA is to rodeo as the NFL and AFL are to pro football.

"Tex", as he is referred to on the job with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing, started his rodeo career in Moline, Kansas. The year was 1950 and he was 15 years old when he got on the back of a bronc for the first time in competition.

From the first ride in 1950, Mattocks has been active in the rodeo circuit, doing everything from bronc riding to bulldogging.

"When I came into the Marine Corps," Mattocks says, "I dropped out of competition for a while. I got interested in rodeo again when I found out I could participate in RCA sanctioned events using my military identification card."

The RCA rodeo circuit is considered the big league of professional rodeo, and active duty servicemen are allowed to participate in events without belonging to the association. However, after a few rodeos, Mattocks applied for membership and was accepted.

Mattocks proudly displays his bronc riding championship belt buckle and various other awards he has collected in his 22 years of riding the rodeo circuit, and thinks people today have the wrong image of rodeo cowboys.

"The rodeo rider of today has changed considerably from what he was 40 years ago. Today he is usually a college graduate, a business and family man," says Mattocks.

The elevating image of the cowboy of today is due in part to the various rodeo associations that sponsor the thousands of rodeos that take place in the United States and Canada yearly.

Mattocks points to the number of professional men who are now roder riders. The RCA counts as members doctors, businessmen, lawyers and at least one actor, Ben Johnson, who won an academy award this year for his role in "The Last Picture Show."

"Today's cowboy is every bit as much an athlete as are the pro football and baseball players. Most of them stay under some kind of physical training program so they can meet the stress that rodeoing demands."

The tremendous amount of physical strain on a rodeo rider is evident when the man climbs onto the bronc. Most bronc and bull riders, according to Mattocks, weigh less than 155 pounds and usually are under six feet tall. Place this man on a bull that weighs in the neighborhood of a ton and you have an extreme test of strength and skill between the man and the animal.

"This physical exertion is hard to explain," continues Mattocks.

"The ride only lasts eight seconds, but I've played two hours of good hard basketball and have never been able to match the feeling of physical stress I've gotten from riding during those eight seconds."

Although it is the rider who gets all of the prize money and all of the glory, the real hero at any rodeo is the rodeo clown. The rodeo clown has two very important jobs. His primary job is to assist a fallen rider by attracting the attention of the bull and steering him away. The other function is to provide some comic relief to the otherwise thrilling and dangerous business of the rodeo.

In both cases the clown is faced with the danger of being injured by the animal he is "clowning around with." For eleven of his 22 years of rodeoing, Lynn Mattocks has performed this dangerous job.

"I got into the clowning business in 1953," Mattocks says. "I was working stock at a rodeo when they found out the clown couldn't make it. I had a pretty good knowledge of what most of the stock at that rodeo would do, so I volunteered to do the rescue part of the clown's work. I went into the arena without a clown suit."

The first time Mattocks clowned, a rider caught his hand in the rope hold.

When this happened the rider was dangling from the bull.

"The only thing I could do was throw myself over the bull and jerk the rider's hand free of the rope. At that time I wasn't concerned with my own safety at all. That's the way it's been ever since I started clowning on a regular basis. The main objective of clowning is to be ready to save the rider if he should get into trouble. If you can't put the purpose of your job above your own personal risk, then you shouldn't be working at that job."

For all of his enthusiasm for the sport, it is hard to imagine that Mattecks.has redeced mainly as a week-end activity.

When "Tex" was at Camp Pendleton, he was centrally located to the California rodeo circuit. On a long week-end he could make it to four rodeos in four states in four days.

"I have made enough of the rodeos in enough different places to be considered active on the circuit," he says.

"When I retire from the Marine Corps, I plan to ride the circuit full time.

"I'll be 40 when I retire, and I think this is just about the prime age for a rodeo rider," says Mattocks. "The rodeo circuit is just like anything else in sports. The more experience you have, the better you are at it."

"Rodeoing to me is just like golf is to most other folks. Some men will play golf just as long as their legs can get them around 18 holes. That's the way I feel about rodeo riding. I'll ride until my body can't do it anymore."

Mike McLees has one of the hottest machines in town and he spends hours keeping it that way. Everyday before the sun comes up, he's out there; tinkering with it, going over every moving part and some that don't—cleaning and polishing its smooth surfaces and windows.

The sleek machine in which he takes so much pride is not a late model car, or a motorcycle. McLees has never ridden in the machine that takes so much of his time, but he checks and re-checks it as if his life depended on its functioning.

If McLees' life doesn't depend on his machine the lives of two others do, and is the prime reason he spends every possible second honing his machine to penfect running condition. His machine is a three-million-dollar F-4B Pharitom jet fighter and Sergeant Mike McLees is a plane captain with Marine Fighter-Attack Squadron (VMFA)-122.

The job of plane captain is one based on personal pride. "That's why
I like the job," says McLees. "You get a lot of personal satisfaction out
of it."

A plene captain's life revolves around his aircraft. His work schedule depends on the status of his bird. If the plane is down, or in the hangar for repairs, he doesn't work. If the bird is up, or ready to fly, he comes in early to pre-flight and leaves late, after it's back on the ground, to check for mechanical malfunctions occurring during the flight.

"When the plane is 'up', it makes for a pretty long day for these guys," says Gunnery Sergeant Bill Donahue, the Flight Line Chief and Non-Commissioned Officer-in-Charge of the 122 plane captains.

Mac's day begins two hours before his bird is scheduled to take-off. That means an eight o'clock launch time, requires McLees to be in by six to begin the pre-flight procedures on zero-zero "Double Nuts", the Phantom that's his responsibility.

"We have a system of competition among the plane captains," says Donahue.

"Each quarter, the plane captains' performance is evaluated. The man with
the highest rating becomes plane captain of "Double Nuts" the Marine
Aircraft Group-24 commanding officer's plane. The next highest rated
man gets number one, the plane flown by the commanding officer of 122. It's
an added incentive, and gives them something more to strive for, and
as far as performance goes, it has been a great motivating factor."

McLees begins his pre-flight starting with the nose of the aircraft and works his way along the left side to the tail. He is assisted in the exacting inspection by Coporal Mark Cordova, a plane captain trainee.

"The only way you can learn to be a plane captain," McLees says, "is through on-the-job training."

As Cordova goes through the hundreds of items he has to check on "Double Nuts", McLees watches. "Be sure and check this and these," McLees advises as Cordova peers into the maze of wires in a wing panel. "We got a message about this bolt," he adds singling out one in a conglomeration. "They've been breaking under stress. Make sure it's not damaged or cracked."

As Cordova makes his rounds around one side, up the other, on top of the fuselage, under the wings, McLees follows him and points out particular characteristics of the plane.

In the cockpit, Mac checks the instruments, switches, dials and knobs to make sure each one is in the off or 'normal' position.

"A pilot has to be a pretty smart guy to know how to read all of these,"
he says pointing to the cluster of instruments. He then proceeds to the
back of the cockpit to check the Radar Intercept Officer's instruments.

After Cordova has given Double Nuts a thorough going over and only after Madies has rechecked his work and is satisfied that the plane is airworthy, then and only then, does he finally start back to the line shack.

It is seven-thirty in the morning and already he has been at work for two hours. The pre-flight complete, McLees signs the form that will make him responsible for the way the aircraft functions during today's flight.

"I have personelly inspected this aircraft in accordance with instructions," the form reads. "Any discrepancies noted have been entered on this form."

"This is where you sign your life away," McLees says. "When your name goes on this form, it makes you responsible for any accident that may have been caused by something your everlecked on the pre-flight."

Double Nuts is scheduled to launch at eight. Prior to launching, GySgt.

Domahue calls his plane captains tegether. Like Tem Landry preparing his

team for the Superbowl, Benahue talks to his men.

"I want to see good signals out there. If you're having problems, I want to see those hands come up in the air."

The stage is set. McLees, sesisted by Corporal Jim Green, plane captain for 122's commending officer's aircraft, walk out to Double Nuts with the pilot, Captain John Dempsey and RIO. 1st Lieutenant Bob Houser.

"How's the bird look today Mike?" asks Dempsey.

"Locks real good sir, "

The launching of an aircraft is like the kick-off in a football game. The air is tense with excitment, and Donahue scans the flightline and makes sure all of his players are set. McLees is standing in view of the cockpit.

Problems is the real show place of the squadren," says Sergeant Sammy Rodelsuse, the Assistant Flight Line Chief. "If you look good on the flight line, then your whole squadren is going to look good."

have been overlooked. Nothing has. Behind Donahue, who has positioned himself in the center of the flight line, a representative of each of the maintenance shops waits to assist if necessary.

Donahue is satisfied and points to Double Nuts. "Start the engines."

From deep within the bowels of an engine starter comes a low moan, and
the hose that concects "Zero-Zero" to the compressor uncoils like a snake
as air rushes into the belly of double-O to set her turbines turning.

The low rumble turns into a high-pitched whine as Double Nuts springs to
life.

With this accomplished, McLees makes another quick visual check of the aircraft and signals to Donahue a thumbs up. Everything's OK.

Meanwhile, for number Seven, the aircraft accompanying Double Nuts en its flight, things are not so good. Its plane captain is holding up four fingers signaling Donahue that Seven is having electrical problems. An electrician sees the sign and is already sprinting out to the ailing F-4's side.

By the time Donahue is getting the thumbs up from Seven, McLees is talking to Dempsey and shaking his head. Double Nuts has developed trouble in her airspeed indicator which is causing it to register flight at close to 100 miles an hour. Donahue walks out and confers with McLees and regretfully McLees signals the pilot to shut down the engines. Double Nuts is downed.

"Since the plane captain is solely responsible for the operation of the bird," says McLees, "when a plane captain says his bird is down, it doesn't fly and no one can argue with that. It doesn't matter who the pilot is — commanding officer, commanding general, commandant, the plane captain has the final word on the status of his bird."

After Double Nuts' engines have died down, the flight crew changes to Green's aircraft, the back-up bird for the flight, and he and McLees change roles. Another pilot pre-flight, much less detailed however than the one performed by Green earlier that morning. Donahue gives the signal te start her engines.

Again the low moan, then the scream from the tunbines. Donahue gets the thumbs-up from Seven and they're ready to go. But Green is signalling one finger—power plant trouble. One can't get its right engine to ignite.

In the cockpit of Seven, the pilot is getting impatient and waving his hands in the air. He is already 15 minutes late on his scheduled departure and wants to launch.

Donahue wraps his finger around in the air and points down the flight line. "Go ahead."

As Seven taxis to the runway, McLees and Green are walking back to the flight line. "That's something that really hacks you off," McLees says, "when you have to down a bird, and nothing you pre-flighted was the cause of it. You just never know."

In the line shack things are more relaxed. Like the post-game locker room, there are a few laughs and some horseplay.

After the technicians have diagnosed what is wrong with Double Nuts, McLees checks with the maintenance department to see when she can be fixed, before leaving.

He takes a stroll through the hangar and reminisces about each of the aircraft. He knows their histories. He speaks of them as individuals rather than machines — with affection and understanding.

"I think the job of a plane captain is the best in the air wing. You get to meet a lot more of the people in the squadron and you learn a lot.

It never falls into a dull repetition because you never know what to expect."

The stillness of the morning is split by an F-4 climbing into the sky and McLees pauses to watch.

"That's the most satisfying part of the job," he says, "watching your bird climb into the sky on take-off."

Of all the words plane captains say describe their jobs, none could sum up their purpose better than those of Gunnery Sergeant Donahue in the training syllabus he has designed for plane captains.









MCAS IWAKUNI, Japan, Sept. 5---Six persons some seven thousand makes from their home in the United States were drawn together here recently in what turned out to be an unusual set of circumstances. The unique chance meeting resulted from the efforts of a young couple unscrambling the problems of getting married in a foreign country.

To say they had an unusual wedding would be an understatement.

First Lieutenant Terry Mills, assigned to the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing here, and his fiance, the former Miss Pam Best, both from Pontiac, Lichigan, had been planning for some time to get married. They decided that, rather than wait until March of next year when Terry returned to the United States, to take the "big step" now.

Pam and her mother, Mrs. Elise Best, boarded a commercial jet liner in Detroit and flew as far as Hiroshima, about 40 kilometers (24 miles) from here, where they boarded a train with the prospective bridegroom for the final leg of their journey to Iwakuni.

MCAS IWAKUNI, Japan, Dec. 5—The fine citizens of Larchmont, New York will be pleased to know that Father James von Meysenbug finally received his birthday present — all 6,000 pounds plus \$2,000 of it.

It all started last May when Mrs. Barbara Hernandez of Larchmont wrote her family friend von Meysenbug, a Navy chaplain assigned to the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing, and asked what he wanted for his 46th birthday. Little did she realize at the time that his answer would involve the entire community of Larchmont, a major airline, and many members of the four armed forces of the United States in a massive project dubbed Operation Angel.

Von Meysenbug wrote back to the Hernandez family and explained that he really didn't need anything for himself; but, if they wanted to, the family could send whatever clothing articles and foodstuffs they could gather to the Sacred Heart Orphanage in Da Nang, Vietnam. This, concluded von Meysenbug, would be a good birthday present for him.

The six Hernandez children did as von Meysenbug asked, to the tune of three tons of goods and \$2,000 in donated cash.

Working through the summer, the Hernandez kids, ranging in age from twelve to twenty, launched Operation Angel by soliciting donations from Larchmont-area merchants. As it began to gather steam, the New York City news media began to publicize Operation Angel, which in turn garnered more donations.

By the end of the summer, the money and the goods were ready to send to Da Nang. A local shipping company packed the three tons of "birthday presents" into crates, but the problem remained: how to get the stuff from New York to the other side of the world? It was then that I'an American World Airways, hearing of the plight of Operation Angel, volunteered to fly the crates to California free.

Once in California, Operation Angel fell into the eager hands of Commander Charles Tevelson, the director of the Navy's Project Handclasp, a program designed to coordinate the gathering of items for the many American—sponsored orphanages in the Far East. Threatened with extinction by various budget cuts due to the lessening involvement in Vietnam by American forces, the publicity surrounding Operation Angel gave Tevelson the vital ammunition he needed to help keep Project Handclasp alive. Tevelson arranged to have Operation Angel loaded aboard a Navy transport and shipped to Da Nang by way of Saigon.

In Da Nang, Commander John Higgins, the officer in charge of the Navy Fleet Air Support Unit, commandeered three Navy flat-bed trucks and an Army forklift to complete delivery to the Catholic-sponsored Sacred Heart Orphanage.


Lieutenant Commander von Meysenbug, meanwhile, returned to Da Nang from his base in Thailand in time to receive his belated birthday present when it arrived on November 13.

"It's hard to describe the joy and the gratitude of the sisters and orphans of the Sacred Heart Orphanage," said von Meysenbug, who with the help of Higgins and Air Force Chaplain Captain Edward Cardoza from Da Nang, distributed the gifts to more than 400 orphans.

According to von Meysenbug, Operation Angel will probably be the last shipment of goods of any proportion to orphanages in the Far East. But, it's not over yet. Goods are still coming in to the Hermandez' household, and wives of Air Force members from Michigan and New Jersey, stationed in Da Nang have launched Operation Angel in their states with Commander Tevelson handling the arrangements for transportation.

Operation Angel did not stop at providing toys, clothing, appliances and other essentials to the orphanage. When the sisters and the children of the Sacred Heart began sending thank you notes to the people who donated to their cause, a New York businessman hearing of the gesture sent them enough money to pay for the postage on the cards.



## Fleet Air Wing Six becomes FAW-1 detachment in Navy shift

Fleet Air Wing Six (FAW-6) ceased to be last Saturday.

Rear Admiral Richard E. Fowler, commander of Patrol Forces for the Seventh Fleet, and Capt. Arthur K. Bennett, commander of FAW-6, struck the colors of the unit and disestablished it after 22 years of operations in Japan.

In remarks made during the disestablishment ceremony, Admiral Fowler outlined the major accomplishments of FAW-6, calling them significant contributions to the role of antisubmarine patrol operations. One of the most significant achievements of the unit, as stated by Fowler, was the great example of Japanese-American coordination in patrolling the seas of Japan. The Admiral was

referring to the cooperation between Japanese and American patrol forces.

Admiral Fowler re-emphasized that the mission of the Iwakuni Detachment of Fleet Air Wing One, as the old FAW-6 unit is now officially designated, would not change.

The one patrol squadron assigned to FAW-6 will now come under the command of FAW-1 headquartered at Naha, Japan.


Another patrol squadron in the Philippines will come under FAW-1 when Fleet Air Wing Eight disestablishes sometime in August.

Admiral Fowler lauded Captain Bennett's efforts by awarding him the Meritorious Service Medal for his performance as Commander of FAW-6.

#### Marines aid East Coast flood victims

Marines and equipment from Quantico were involved in the rescue and relief operations of victims from flooding waters in Virginia last week. The area was one of several eastern states inundated by heavy rain and swollen rivers.

Twelve Marines with trucks, blankets and medical equipment were sent to Falmouth, Va., in Stafford County at 10 p.m. Wednesday. They aided civilian authorities in the evacuation of victims forced from their homes by the rising waters.

At midnight an additional 50 Marines with trucks and supplies were sent to Manassas to assist in evacuation operations. Evacuation operations were also conducted by base Marines at Fredericksburg, where flood waters forced residents from their homes.

Helicopters from the Air Station were airborne to aid Stafford County Red Cross preparations and assist Prince William County Sheriff's Department and county authorities.

The Marine helicopters rescued a number of civilian victims in various parts of Stafford and Prince William counties. One operation included the evacuation of 26 persons, including a Boy Scout Troop which had become stranded on the Rappahannock River.

The group was given food an temporary lodging at Quantico while they awaited aid from civilian agencies.

In addition to assigned operations from civilian authorities, the helicopters conducted search patterns looking for stranded victims.



Early 1942 saw 1st MAW's newly-activated MAG-13 departing for Samoa to help in the defense of that island.

With the opening of American offensive actions on Guadalcanal, the 1st MAW was handed the job of close air support for operations there. Wing aircraft began to arrive at Henderson Field just 13 days after the first Americans hit the island.

As the enemy lines receded toward Tokyo, so did the 1st MAW line of obligation stretch in the same direction. Following the Japanese defeat on Guadalcanal, the Wing was given missions in support of combat operations in New Georgia, Vella Lavella, the Treasury Islands, the Bismarck Sea, New Britain and New Guinea

The action for the recapture of the Philippines was the 1st MAW's major combat assignment in World War II. That began in December 1944. This campaign eventually employed all of the Wing's units and they were used in this capacity until the war's close.

The end of World War II found the 1st MAW moving operations to an occupation role in northern China, where the Wing supported ground units in their protection of American interests. The Wing's Marines assisted in the disarming and repatriation of Japanese military men in China.

Post-war phase-downs hit many of the 1st MAW's units while in China. April 1947 brought the movement of 1st MAW headquarters to Guam and another transfer later that fall sent the Wing to MCAS El Toro, Calif., where it remained as a ready reserve aviation adjunct to the West Coastbased Marine ground units until the outbreak of the Korean war.

Deployment of American units to Korea in June 1950 included elements of the 1st MAW. Little more than a month after the commitment of American forces, the 1st MAW was flying combat operations in support of those troops.

Throughout the remainder of the Korean War, Wing units flew continuous combat missions.

Cessation of active hostilities in July 1953 left the 1st MAW in South Korea as a residual force for three years before it was relocated to the Naval Air Station, Iwakuni, Japan.

In Korea, Marine air units had pioneered the vertical envelopment concept, and they continued to improve and perfect these helicopter techniques in the years following Korea.

The American intervention in wartorn Vietnam brought deployment of one 1st MAW helicopter squadron to Soc Trang in April 1962. The squadron moved to Danang later that year. That same year units of the 1st MAW were sent to Thailand to assist that country in her fight against Communist guerrillas.

With the 1965 escalation of American involvement in the Vietnam war, the 1st MAW and Marine ground units were landed at Danang. The March arrival of Marine air units found the 1st MAW's MAG-16 helicopters deployed to Danang. Shortly after that, MAG-11 arrived from NAS Atsugi, Japan, flying new F-4B Phantoms which had replaced the F-8U Crusaders a short time before.

The 1st MAW headquarters was moved to Danang in June 1965 and remained there until returning to MCAS Iwakuni in 1971.

MAG-13, operating F-4B Phantoms, joined MAG-12's attack and all-weather aircraft at Chu Lai during September 1966. In the more than four years of combat operations after that, 1st MAW aircraft flew in support of almost every action of American ground troops and their Vietnamese counterparts. For example, the HQMC history cites the 1st MAW in 1966 as "flying more than 80,000 combat sorties."

During 1968, the Wing "delivered more than 143,000 tons of ordnance when the enemy launched his Tet offensive against Hue. In that year more than 11,000 sorties were flown over North Vietnam prior to the bombing halt while 3,500 were flown over Laos."

In 1968, Marine helicopters "lifted more than 1,100,000 troops, delivered over 129,000 tons of supplies, and evacuated more than 79,000 casualties."

Phase I withdrawals in August 1969 brought the return of some 1st MAW units to Iwakuni, where the 1st MAW (Rear) was established in October of that year as part of Phase II.

Wing headquarters shifted from Danang to Iwakuni in April of last year, closing more than six years of continuous combat for the 1st MAW.

The Wing now consists of five groups and the Marine Wing Head quarters Squadron (MWHS-1). These are Marine Aircraft Groups 12 and 15, Marine Air Control Group (MACG) -18, and Marine Wing Support Group (MWSG)-17. Marine Aircraft Group 36, the fifth group, is the Wing's Okinawa-based helicopter arm.

The July 4 meeting of the two All-Star teams was rained out.

The Navy All-Stars will travel to Yokosuka for their Japan District softball playoffs, beginning on July 27.


Winning first place was club president, Jim Greer, who held a club flush at the run's end.



# lst MAW celebrates thirty-first birthday

The 1st Marine Aircraft Wing is 31 years old today. From its commissioning in July 1941 as one-half of the Marine Corps aviation arm, the 1st MAW grew to assume the entire Marine air commitment during the height of the Vietnam activity.

When the 1st and 2nd MAWs were commissioned on July 7, 1941, the Marine Corps inventory boasted only 251 aircraft, according to HQMC Historical Branch.

Each wing consisted of a headquarters squadron and one aircraft group — MAG-11 with the 1st MAW at Quantico, Va. and 2nd MAW's MAG-21, whose major concentration was at the Ewa airfield in Hawaii.

Most of the aircraft were obsolescent trainers relegated to the Marine Corps' newly-authorized aviation service. For it was only after the establishment of the Fleet Marine Force concept in 1933, that Marine Corps aviation became an integral part of the Corps' operations.

In 1935 aviation was taken from the Division of Operations and made a division-level activity directly under the Commandant.

The "birth" of a Marine aviation branch, coupled with an allocation of 1,167 aircraft from a 10,000-plane Navy purchase in June 1940, brought the designation of then-existing aviation units into two Marine Aircraft Wings.

A table of organization for the 1st MAW on December 6, 1941, shows only 104 aircraft divided among two fighter squadrons (17 and 22 aircraft), two scout or dive-bomber squadrons (23 and 19), one observation squadron (12) and a utility squadron (7). The Wing headquarters and MAG-11 headquarters each had two aircraft.

Of those 104 aircraft within the Wing when Japanese aircraft aimed for Hawaii and Pearl Harbor, 19 were out-dated and virtually useless planes of the early 1930's.

With the outbreak of war with Japan, the 1st MAW was dispatched to the West Coast where it joined Army and Navy air units in a coastal
