(C) During the month of May 1969 MASS-3 continued to provide close air support and coordination for elements of the First Marine Division in operations OKLAHOMA HILLS and VICTORY DRAGON 10. The Americal Division was supported in operation RUSSEL BEACH, GENEVA PARK, FREDRICK HILL, IRON MOUNTAIN and LAMAR PLAINS.

During May, three MASS-3 officers attended a week long orientation program visiting TADC and TAOC. All 6708's coming into Viet Nam will attend the orientation. During the coming month five more officers are scheduled for this orientation.

The month of May was one for increase as the number of fixed wing missions, helicopter missions, ASRT missions, targets hit and ordnance dropped all rose sharply over April's totals. A significant increase was noted in AN/TPQ-10 availability with an average of 84.8% availability for all MASS-3 sets. Chu Lai was especially high in operational time with 96.7% availability.

On 5 May 1969, for the first time since MASS-3 has maintained its Command Post at Chu Lai, a copy of stars and stripes was received on the same day of its publication. MASS-3 personnel were at first stunned, then exuberant at the prospect of receiving current papers on a daily basis. Their hopes were gradually crushed as the following days proved barren as to the delivery of papers. The situation has returned to normal as 3 and 4 day old papers filter into the MASS-3 Command Post via their normal channels such as strong winds, Black Market, mid-night requisition and absent minded visitors.

4. (U) Civic Action

The MASS-3 Civic Action program for May concerned itself with improving the coordination and cooperation between the Trung Toan hamlet people and the Americal forces. Problems such as persistent firing into the hamlet from the CLDC perimeter and searches and questionings without the hamlet chief's prior knowledge were given priority attention so as to eliminate any misunderstandings by the Vietnamese people.

A solatium payment was made to a woman occupant of a house in the Trung Toan hamlet who suffered a minor head wound and damage to her house as a result of M-79 shrapnel. Another solatium payment and medical assistance was provided when a Vietnamese civilian employee of MASS-3 was wounded on the job by the accidental discharge of a weapon. Because of the prompt action taken, misunderstanding and resentment by the people was avoided.

On 5 May, General WALT Scholarships totalling \$6,000 VN were given out to eleven recipient children. The Med Cap was continued on a limited basis treating 70 out-patients while emphasizing that their own midical facilities are now open to provide them treatment. Throughout May over 250 pounds of laundry and face soap, 60 pounds of clothing and a variety of tools and educational supplies received from CONUS supporting organizations and local sources were distributed. A well cover and hand pumps were assembled and installed on a public well in the Trung Toan hamlet. Also during May, 190 children were treated to either beach outings or movies where ice cream was served.

In all, 35 Man Hours were devoted to civic action programs in the Trung Toan Hamlet.
