



1 OCT: Two aircraft delivered suppressive fire on enemy mortar positions in the Phu Loc area. The mortar fire was silenced.

2 OCT: Four sorties were flown during an emergency extract of a recon team at YD 705145. Two aircraft sank an enemy boat at YD 730101.

3 OCT: Six sorties were flown providing cover for a downed O-1 and a Sparrow Hawk for the downed aircraft at YD 245658.

4 OCT: Four sorties were flown while making an emergency recon team extraction at YD 792068

5 OCT: Four armed helo sorties were flown during an emergency recon team extraction at YD 620211.

7 OCT: Four armed helo sorties were flown during an emergency recon team extraction at YD 353422

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3 Nov 196717. TRAININGa. GENERAL MILITARY SUBJECTS TRAINING

(1) Classes were given to two newly joined personnel; consisted of intelligence brief, general area brief and weapons indoctrination brief.

b. TECHNICAL TRAINING

(1) 2050 hours of on-the-job-training were accomplished and 256 hours of formal classes were given.

c. PILOT TRAINING

(1) Four newly joined pilots were given lectures as prescribed by Squadron SOP. TAC (A) syllabus training is progressing, qualifying pilots as prescribed in Squadron SOP. APMs are held 3 times a week. One MATCU lecture and one Recon Team lecture was held for all pilots. Three pilots NATOPS requalified.

d. CREW CHIEF/GUNNER TRAINING

(1) Three crew chiefs NATOPS qualified and 5 aerial gunners were NATOPS qualified.

d. EDUCATION

(1) 64 personnel are enrolled in various types of correspondence courses.

20. SUPPLY

a. During the month of October this unit received project 01 grant of \$48,000. This was the total money for the 2nd quarter FY-68.

b. A new materiel office location was established. This will greatly facilitate coordination between aircraft maintenance and the Maintenance Control Tool Room.

c. A new storage and issue building was set up for Marine Corps Property.

d. Approximately 80% of the cold weather requirements were received from MAG-16.

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23. MAINTENANCE

a. The month of October has seen several notable improvements made in the maintenance area. First, we finally have a roof over the hanger, thanks to the Sea - Bees. There are still many shrapnel holes to be covered, but it is a vast improvment over working completely out doors, as we have for the past 10 months.

Another area of improvement was the laying of steel matting alongside the hanger, to make an area for GSE. The troops from GSE shop worked many hours at night to get the matting down, and have built quite nice shop for themselves.

b. The past month has seen us come into MAG-36. We have been visited by a few key personnel from the Group, and have been assured of all the support they can muster for us. It will solve many problems having the Group near at hand. Welcome aboard!

24. AVIONICS

a. The H&MS-36 Avionics department has been set up and the caliber of support received from them is outstanding. The 3M readouts are getting back to the Squadron in shorter periods of time.
