



# 1. OPERATIONS

- a. The following services were provided during the month:

# 2. LOGISTICS

a. The T/E shortage of one (1) PU-344 generator and four (4) PU-648 generators exists.

## 3. MOTOR TRANSPORT

a. During the month, MACS-4 vehicles traveled 17,242 miles, transported 507,400 gallons of water, 112 tons of cargo and transported 2,606 passengers.

## 4. COMMUNICATIONS-ELECTRONICS

- a. 1 July AN/TPS-22B, AN/TPS-37, AN/TRC-97 and AN/GRC-135's were removed from PU-648 tactical generator power and placed on converter power.
- b. 3 July AN/TRC-97 (Mike System, MACS-4 to 1stMAW) was relocated to the Dong Ha area to support other Wing Radio Relay commitments. The vacated system was replaced with two AN/TRC-27's designated Romeo and Siena.
- c. 14 July Replacement mylar diaphrams were installed on all universal console operator positions. Significant improvement in display quality was noted.
- d. 15 July AN/TPS-34B system removed from PU-648 tactical generator power and placed on converter power.
- e. 18 July TDCC, Radio Relay and two AN/UPS-1's were removed from PU-648 tactical power and returned to converter power.

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

## 1. Operations

- a. The following services were provided during the month:

  - (2) Aircraft provided navigational assistance 14,412

## 2. Logistics

a. The T/E shortage of one (1) PU-344 generator and one (1) PU-648 generator exists.

### 3. Utilities

- a. 4 September 1968 1810 hours all 200 KW generators went down due to water blowing into generators. 1830 hours all systems back up on power except for half of TDCC. 2230 hours all generators and converters up except for the TPS-34B converter.
- b. 5 September 1968 1230 hours shut off all generators due to Typhoon Bess.
- c. 6 September 1968 1230 hours Camp Power back on except for AOC area. 1545 hours all generators and converters back on. 1645 hours Camp Power restored to the AOC area.


### 4. Motor Transport

- a. During the month, MACS-4 vehicles traveled 23,851 miles, transported 27 tons of cargo and 2 Roughriders furnished.
  - b. 22 September 1968 Received two (2) M-52A2 Truck Tractors.

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## 5. Communications - Electronics

- a. 5 September 1968 Typhoon Bess swept Hill 647 with sustained winds estimated at 80 knots gusting to 90 knots. The AN/TPS-34B Radome was completely destroyed and considerable damage was incurred to those portions of the radar above the pedestal. The AN/TPS-22 Radome and Para balloon were also completely destroyed. The pedestal assembly and several Wave Guide sections were also damaged. One AS 1310 HF Antenna sustained a broken lower ring, which was repaired locally.
- b. 9 September 1968 Began installation of Field Change 66 in the AN/TPS-34B, SN-A5. Several difficulties were encountered during the installation which are the subject of an Unsatisfactory Equipment Report. The installation was completed on 12 September 1968.
- c. 10 September 1968 AN/TPS-22C arrived by air shipment from Westinghouse Corporation.
- d. 11 September 1968 Installed the Power Supply and RF Amplifier modification to the AN/TPS-22C. AN/TPS-34B Radome erected using 4 panel sections and 4 door sections. Commenced erecting the antenna back up structure and antenna reflector panels.
- e. 12 September 1968 Began construction of the AN/TPS-22C. Completed and operational on 13 September 1968.
- f. 16 September 1968 AT-309 IFF Antenna arrived from MACRON THREE. A mounting bracket must be fabricated before it can be installed on the TPS-22C. Optical Encoder on the AN/TPS-22C began malfunctioning resulting in the loss of the North Pulse. A field expedient was successfully improvised using a mechanical switch.
- g. 20 September 1968 AN/TPS-34B restored and integrated with the AN/TYQ-2.
