7. (C) GROUND DEFENSE. During the month of July, approximately fifty meters of reinforced single strand concertina wire was implaced on the

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perimeter. Approximately two hundred and fifty meters of grass and brush was cleared from the perimeter. One new bunker was constructed and construction began on a new ammunition bunker to replace the conex boxes currently in use. Fifty meters of wire was repaired.

8. (U) TRAINING

a. Ten hours of basic training were conducted with one hundred and seventy-one persons attending.

a. On 12 July 1970, radar set AN/TPS-22A, serial number A-14, was inoperative due to a worn central support bearing.

b. On 23 July 1970, radar set AN/TPS-22A, serial number A-14, received the central support bearing and was operational.

c. On 24 July 1970, four AN/TRC-97s, serial numbers C-4, C-13, A-9, and A-20, were transferred to MWCS-1. Marine Air Control Squadron Four presently has no radio relay capability.
