## PART II

SIGNIFICANT HIGHLIGHTS

1. (S) During period 1-31 March 1966, Marine Aircraft Group 11 continued to shatter old records as assigned aircraft flew 2501 sorties during 3439.7 hours of flight, and delivered 1876 tons of ordnance on assigned targets. See PART III, Paragraph 9.
2. (C) During period 1-31 March 1966, VMFA-314 established new records for F-4B, in-country based squadrons, these records are as follows: total sorties for one month, 711; total flight hours for one month, 924.3; total sorties twenty four hour period, 40; total flight hours twenty four hour period, 47.4.
3. (C) During period 1-31 March 1966, VMF(AW)-235 Crusaders flew 808 sorties and 1034.4 hours. This is the highest sortie /hour rate this squadron has flown since reforming in December 1964, and also establishes new highs for MAG-11 squadrons for operations in RVN.
4. (C) On 1 March 1966, VMFA-542 relieved VMFA-323, and commenced its second combat deployment to the Republic of South Vietnam.
5. (C) On 10 - 12 March 1966, units of MAG-11 provided air support for the withdrawal of the personnel at AS HAU.

2. (U) Awards

During the month of March 1966, 185 Air Medals, 3 Purple Hearts, and 3 Navy Commendation Medals were recommended for personnel of Marine Aircraft Group 11.

During the month of March 1966, 288 Air Medals, 4 Purple Hearts, 1 Navy Commendation Medal and 1 Bronze Star were presented to members of Marine Aircraft Group 11.

### 3. Casualties

- a. (C) On 4 March 1966, 1stLt T.P. KEENAN and Capt. C. R. FAIRCHILD from VMFA-314 ejected safely into the sea when their aircraft lost control systems hydraulic pressure, having been struck by ground fire during a napalm run. Both crew members were rescued. No injuries were sustained.
- b. (C) On 14 March 1966, Major E. C. PAIGE and WO-1 D. D. REDMOND from VMFA-314, ejected while on a night bombing mission. After spending a harrowing night pursued by hostile forces, both members were rescued by helicopter. Major PAIGE sustained no injuries. WO REDMOND suffered a dislocated shoulder and was transferred to CONUS for convalescence.
- c. (C) On 18 March 1966, 1stLt. Everett A. McPHERSON, Pilot and 1stLt. Brent E. DAVIS, NFO from VMGJ-1, were lost over North Vietnam while on a mission in support of the 2nd Air Division. Both crew members are considered lost in action and are still listed as missing.
- d. (C) On 25 March 1966, 1stLt. John Brooks SHERMAN from VMF(AW)-235 was killed in action nineteen miles west of Chu Lai Air Field, Quan Ngai Province, while on a CAS bombing mission, as a direct result of enemy ground fire.

### 4. Civic Action

- a. (U) On 6 March 1966, One hundred and twenty pounds of clothing were delivered to the Tin-Lanh School from the citizens of Charles Town, West Virginia and Mrs. K. L. LOPEZ of La Crescenta, California.
- b. (U) On 11 March 1966, Delivered 1600 (6 oz.) bars of soap to Madam KHOI, Principal of Tin-Lanh School, for distribution to the 766 students.
- c. (U) On 13 March 1966, Colonel E. O. ANGLIN and others from MAG-11 attended the dedication of a new four room addition to Tin-Lanh School. MAG-11 financed the building. Colonel ANGLIN made a donation of \$680.00 as the final payment for the construction, of which \$280.00 was donated from the Protestant Chapel fund.

- d. (U) On 23 March 1966, delivered a MABS-11 built desk (experimental model) to Tin-Lanh School. The desk was too large and must be rebuilt.
- e. (U) On 27 March 1966, delivered the reworked desk and four stools to Tin-Lanh School. Desk needs more work. The school needs about 50 of these desks to furnish the new building.
- f. (U) During 1-31 March 1966, Flight Surgeons and other personnel of MAG-11 made numerous visits to the towns of Cao Dai, Hoa Phat, Mai Tye, the school at Tin-Lanh and the World-Wide Evangelistical Crusade orphanage. Sick calls were held and balloons were given to the children.

#### 5. Public Information

- a. (U) On 29 March 1966, Major TAI, Deputy Commander of the 41st RVN Wing, Captain KHIET, Combat Group Commander and Captain VUONG, Squadron Commander, visited the VMF(AW)-235 flight line area and were hosted by the Commanding officers of MAG-11 and VMF(AW)-235. The squadrons policy of painting the name of a city in the I Corps area on one side of each aircraft and "A firm ally of South Vietnam", in Vietnamese, on the other was noted with pleasure by the visitors.
- b. (U) During March 1966, the ABC television Network filmed a story of a father-son team within VMF(AW)-235. MSgt D. H. TYNES, the squadron Maintenance Chief and Sgt L. H. TYNES, from the squadron Avionics section were featured.
- e. (U) During March 1966, both ABC and CBS television Networks filmed a typical days activities of the VMF(AW)-235 flight line.

#### 6. Intelligence

- a. (C) During March 1966, the Intelligence Section prepared maps and briefs for numerous sweep operations in support of III MAF. The most significant being Operations UTAH, TEXAS, KINGS, and INDIANA.
- b. (U) On 19 March 1966, selected officers of MAG-11 attended a survival lecture given by Brigadier General W. S. SPRUANCE, USAF.

- d. (U) On 15 March 1966, the Intelligence Section promulgated a new Intelligence SOP: Group Order P3800.3A. (See Appendix #1)

7. Electronic Countermeasures

- a. (S) During this reporting period VMCJ-1 EF-10B aircraft conducted electronic countermeasures against AAA and SA-2 fire control radars in North Vietnam. Fifty-one (51) sorties were flown in support of 2nd Air Division and thirty-seven (37) in support of the 7th Fleet.
- b. (S) In addition to the above missions, two (2) "IRON HAND" ELINT sorties in North Vietnam and fifteen (15) ELINT missions in South Vietnam were conducted for the location and collection of AAA and SA-2 fire control radar emissions.

8. Photo

- a. (C) VMCJ-1 RF-8A aircraft flew one hundred and sixty (160) in-country photographic reconnaissance missions in support of III MAF.

9. Air Operations

- a. (C) MAG-11 squadrons flew a combined total of 2501 sorties and 3439.7 hours of flight time during the period 1-31 March 1966. The following is a breakdown by units:

- d. (U) See paragraph 7. and 8. above for VMJ-1 Flight Information.

- e. Confirmed damage assessments included:

- (1) (S) Destroyed: Six hundred and sixty-six (666) structures, thirty-six (36) trucks, forty (40) bunkers and trench lines, three (3) automatic weapons, seven (7) gun emplacements, two (2) truck parks, five (5) bridges, one (1) radio tower, one (1) storage bunker and one (1) Sampan.
- (2) (S) Damaged: Two hundred and twenty (220) structures, six (6) trucks, one (1) bunker, one (1) bridges and six (6) river fords.
- (3) (S) Killed by Aircraft: Twenty-one (21) VC troops and three (3) water buffaloes confirmed. Forty-five (45) VC troops probably killed, but not confirmed.
- (4) (S) Other: Twenty-seven (27) roads cratered, one (1) ferry slip cratered and forty-six (46) secondary explosions.

- g. (C) During the month of March four (4) F-4B's were maintained on 15 minute ground alert, for air-to-ground operations from 0700-1900 daily. Two (2) were maintained on 15 minute alert status and two (2) on 30 minute alert status from 1900-0700 daily. Two (2) F-8E's were maintained on 15 minute ground alert from 0700-1900 daily, these were maintained primarily for helicopter escort.

10. Air Defense

- a. (C) Two (2) F-4B's were maintained on 5 minute ground alert and two (2) on one hour alert throughout the month. Four (4) air defense aircraft were scrambled on practice missions.

11. Special Operations

12. Ground Defense

- a. (U) Additional defensive and protective bunkers have been built in the MAG-11 area of responsibility.

13. Command Relationship/Command Control.

- a. (S) On 1 March 1966, VMFA-542 reported for Operational control to MAG-11.
- b. (S) On 1 March 1966, VMFA-323 chopped from Operational control of MAG-11.

14. NBC Warfare

- a. (U) All Atropine Syrettes and Protective Ointment held by MAG-11 units were inspected and destroyed upon being found defective. A new supply has been requisitioned.

15. Training

- a. (U) Units of this Command continued training in: area indoctrination, escape and evasion, ground defense, weapons familiarization firing, technical training, and survival training.
- b. (U) The FMFPAC Contact Instruction Team program has been a considerable help in on the spot inspection and training in Fork Lift operations, Engine Generators, Automotive Test Equipment and Automotive Maintenance. It is recommended that this program continue.

16. Logistics

- a. (S) VMFA-542 arrived in RVN on 1 March 1966.

17. Motor Transport

- a. (U) Plans to establish a Group Tow Tractor Pool are being considered. This pool would provide better maintenance, availability and a centralized repair parts stockage point for tow tractors.
- b. (U) All motor transport sections of MAG-11 were inspected by the ~~FMFPAC~~ Contact Instruction Team. Minor discrepancies were noted and are being corrected.

18. Maintenance

- a. (C) On 4 March 1966, VMFA-314 lost one F-4B Phantom due to control systems hydraulic pressure loss, after having been struck by ground fire during a napalm delivery run.
- b. (C) On 14 March 1966, VMFA-314 lost one F-4B while on a night bombing mission.

- c. (S) On 18 March 1966, VM CJ-1 lost one EF-10B aircraft over North Vietnam while flying in support of the 2nd Air Division.
  - d. (C) On 25 March 1966, VMF(AW)-235 lost one F-8E Crusader on a close air support mission as a result of enemy ground fire.
  - e. (C) During the month of March 1966, VMFA-542 had two F-4B Phantoms receive hits from enemy ground fire. Damage was considered moderate to one and minor to the other.
  - f. (C) During the month of March 1966, VMFA-314 had three additional F-4B Phantoms receive moderate damage and three F-4B's receive minor damage, all as a result of enemy ground fire during bombing missions.
  - g. (C) During the month of March 1966, VMF(AW)-235 had two F-8E Crusaders receive moderate damage and one minor damage, as a result of enemy ground fire.

19. Base Development/Military Construction

- a. (U) Road construction within the MAG-11 cantonment has reached the stage where any area can be reached by vehicles up to and including 2½ ton trucks.
- b. (U) A new cement mixer was received during the reporting period. The D-6 tractor was returned from 4th echelon repair. Both pieces of equipment were urgently needed for the present tempo of cantonment construction.
- c. (U) A new incinerator is nearing completion for the destruction of classified material.

20. Avionics

- a. (U) The Avionics section received a new 100KW Caterpillar Electric Set (Mod D333). This unit was installed in the new Avionics Complex and is now in operation.

## SECTION I

GENERAL

GruO P3800,3A  
15 March 1966

100. Scope. To provide instructions in intelligence procedures, applicable within the Republic of Vietnam.

101. Policy. Subordinate Commanders are directed to offer positive guidance and support in the maintenance of a vigorous program in the intelligence field. Commanding Officers will insure that all personnel have knowledge of the contents of this order.

## SECTION II

GruO P3800.3A  
15 March 1966

## RESPONSIBILITY

200. Executive Staff Officer S-2. The S-2 is responsible for the planning, coordination and supervision of matters and activities pertaining to the enemy, weather and area of operation by providing timely essential intelligence information.

a. Mission.

- (1) To keep the Commander, his staff and subordinate units informed of the intelligence situation.
- (2) Collection of information relative to the enemy and areas of interest, not under friendly control.
- (3) Dissemination of intelligence.
- (4) The procurement and distribution of intelligence aids and materials, the supervision of the procurement of maps and photographs. (In accordance with Section III of this order)
- (5) Non-tactical measures to minimize the effectiveness of hostile intelligence, sabotage and subversion.
- (6) To provide the intelligence aspects of guerrilla warfare.
- (7) To exercise staff supervision, in coordination with the S-3, over intelligence training within Marine Aircraft Group 11.
- (8) To exercise staff supervision over assignment of intelligence personnel and specialists.

201. Responsibility. Commanding Officers will insure all personnel are alert to:

- a. Report information concerning the enemy or potential enemies.
- b. Recognize and report any evidence of sabotage, espionage, subversion, treason, sedition or disaffection.
- c. Preventing disclosure of any information concerning military activities which may be of value to the enemy.

## INTELLIGENCE COLLECTION

300. Essential Elements of Information (EEI)

a. Purpose. The purpose of an EEI is to answer the Commander's current high priority intelligence requirement. The specific items of information relative to the enemy, terrain and weather which are not available to the Commander. The EEI's constitute the Commanders priority intelligence requirements and therefor prescribe the intelligence mission of Marine Aircraft Group 11.

(1) Applicability of EEI to a Subordinate Commander. An EEI (SIOR - Special Intelligence Collection Requirement) is a directive from a Commander to his subordinate to develop specific information.

(2) Applicability of EEI to an Adjacent Commander. The EEI of an adjacent Commander will be handled in the same manner as the Senior Commanders.

(a) Published EEI's shall be reviewed by all intelligence officers with an emphasis on those EEI's which units of Marine Aircraft Group 11 are capable of fulfilling.

(b) Marine Aircraft Group 11 has the standing responsibility to collect all possible information on the enemies land, sea and air forces and the terrain in the area of operation.

(c) Data extracted from published EEI's will be included in preflight briefings.

301. Specific EEI's of Higher Headquartersa. 3d Marine Amphibious Force.

(1) As promulgated.

b. 1st MAW

(2) As promulgated.

302. Intelligence Collection Plan. The Group S-2 will prepare a collection plan to insure the procurement of intelligence information relating to EEI's. Collection tasks may be assigned to subordinate units and requirements will be sent to higher and adjacent units.

303. Specific MBI's of Marine Aircraft Group 11. (Reported on continuing basis)

a. As promulgated by this Headquarters in mission and intelligence briefs.

304. Reporting MBI's. All information pertaining to the MBI's will be forwarded to this Headquarters (S-2). Aircrews will be debriefed by the Group S-2 after each air mission. In the absence of positive information, pertinent negative information will be reported.

a. WICJ-1 will submit all information pertaining to MBI's and those reports required in Section VII of this order.

305. Reportable Routine Information. Evaluation of information will be indicated by use of the following code. (except when debriefing flight crews)

401. Mission Brief. An intelligence mission briefing may be defined as a concise and accurate presentation of intelligence necessary to support the mission. Briefings will be conducted in the S-2/S-3 briefing room.
402. Mission Debriefing. A debriefing is a systematic interview of aircrews to determine the results of the mission and to obtain information for subsequent missions, operations and required reports. The mission debriefing guide will be that as prescribed by the 1st IAW. Reporting of intelligence received from debriefing will be made in accordance with Section VII of this order.

Counterintelligence personnel are available for advice and assistance. Requests for counterintelligence assistance will be made via the Group S-2.

601. Security of Classified Information. Classified information will be handled in accordance with the provisions of OPNAVINST 5510.10 and supplementary instructions issued by this and higher headquarters. In all cases, classified information will be disseminated on a strict need-to-know basis.

a. Personnel records or diaries recording any sequence of events in which Marine Corps personnel, ships, aircraft, or equipment are involved are prohibited.

602. Physical Security. Group Order 03440.2\_ applies.

603. Civil Security. During combat operations, the Group Security Officer will establish measures to screen and control movements of civilians in areas under MAG-11 control to prevent the infiltration of enemy agents.

a. Civilians applying for employment in the MAG-11 Cantonment will be referred to the Group Civil Affairs Officer.

604. Communication Security.

a. Detailed instructions governing communications security are contained in appropriate Naval Communications Instructions.

b. Additional instructions are contained in Group Order 02200.1\_.

605. Signs and Countersigns

a. Signs and countersigns are established by III MAF and are disseminated by message and are effective from 1200H - 1200H daily.

b. In addition to signs and countersigns employed by USMC units, the Air Force uses a number system effective from 1200H - 1200H daily. Air Force Code Numbers are available at Group S-2.

c. Squadron Commanding Officers are responsible for disseminating Signs and Countersigns/Air Force Code Number to personnel within their respective units.

d. Challenging will be in effect throughout the LMG-11 area of responsibility from dark until daylight and at any other time deemed necessary.

e. All personnel will be instructed in the proper use of the Sign and Countersign to reduce the possibility of compromise.

f. Any known or suspected compromise of the Sign and Countersign will be reported immediately to Group S-2 by the most expeditious means.

606. Censorship. In accordance with Group Order 5530.1\_.

607. Visitor Control. In accordance with Group Order 5512.1\_.

608. Security Inspections/Surveys. In accordance with Group Order P5511.2\_.

609. Security Clearances and Access. In accordance with Group Order P5511.2\_.

b. Report of E & E Materials on Hand. A quarterly inventory report of E & E materials on hand will be submitted to this Headquarters (Attn: S-2) on 1 January, 1 April, 1 July and 1 October by each Squadron in the format set forth in Appendix B.

c. Report of Intelligence Training Conducted. To be submitted to this Headquarters (Attn: S-2) by the 5th of each month in letter form and will contain the following information: subject; number of hours; number in attendance (Officer and Enlisted); instructors name.

702. Special Reports.

a. Spot Report. Submitted by Squadrons to Group S-2 on occurrence and will follow the format set forth in Appendix C. Submitted by the Group S-2 when pertaining to aircrew debriefs.

b. Fire Incident Report. Submitted by Group S-2 to Wing G-2 on occurrence in the format as set forth in Appendix D.

c. Report of Fragments. Immediately upon landing, after returning from a mission, each aircraft will be inspected for hits. If a hit is observed, the aircraft will be checked for fragments. All fragments found will be forwarded to the Group S-2 Section specifying the Squadron, serial number of the aircraft and where in the aircraft the hit occurred and where in the aircraft the fragments were found. It is especially important that all fragments be turned in for analyzing so as to determine the type weapons the enemy is employing against friendly aircraft. All personnel who maintain aircraft will be advised to turn in all fragments.

d. Report of Pre-Rotation Inspection. The Intelligence portion of the Squadrons pre-rotation inspection will be conducted when required by the Group Commanding Officer. A report of discrepancies noted will be forwarded to the inspected unit via the Group S-3. A verbal report of discrepancies noted will be given to the inspected unit immediately upon completion of the inspection.

800. Organization. Intelligence Sections within this command will be organized in accordance with current Tables of Organization.

1001. Materials.

a. SEEEK-1 Kits. COMSEPS has developed the SEEEK-1 which is now in use by operating squadrons. The SEEEK-1 kits are a Section H Allowance item and will be obtained through the supply system.

b. Blood Chits. Blood Chits are items designed to assist air crew members to evade or escape from enemy or unfriendly territory. They are a rectangular piece of material picturing the U. S. Flag, under which appears a text in several languages appropriate to a specific geographical area. The text identifies the bearer as an American and contains the statement that the U. S. Government will reward individuals assisting him. The following Blood Chit is used in this command:

(1) M 61-1

c. Survival Cloth Charts. These charts are topographical, water resistant and of a 1:2,000,000 scale consisting of adjoining charts on either side of the cloth. The following Survival Cloth Charts are used in this command:

d. Language Aids (Pointee Talkees). These are aids to assist downed crew members in obtaining help and information. It consists of questions and statements in English with translations of the same into various resident languages. The following language aids are used in this command:

e. Procurement. Requests for Evasion and Escape materials with the exception of the SEEEK-1 kit will be directed to this Headquarters (Attn: S-2).

f. Accountability. Although the subject materials are not classified, Commanding Officers of units holding these materials shall insure that strict accountability is maintained.

(1) The above materials will be stored and handled on an accountable basis and receipts in the format of Appendix E shall be exchanged when custody is transferred.

(2) In addition, a quarterly inventory of the Evasion and Escape materials checked-out (Squadron to Group - Group to Wing) will be submitted in accordance with Section VII, (Reports), to this order, using the format contained in Appendix B. This quarterly inventory will also serve as a quarterly receipt of this material.

(3) Prior to unit rotation, all survival materials checked out from Group S-2 will be returned and accounted for.

g. Loss. In any case that the subject material(s) may be found missing, an investigation of such missing materials will be conducted, consisting of the circumstances surrounding the loss, to include statements from those individuals concerned with such material(s). This report will be forwarded in quadruplicate to CG, 1st MAW (Attn: C-2) via this Headquarters (Attn: S-2).

(1) If loss is through operational use, i.e., crashed or lost aircraft, where materials are not likely to be recovered, such loss will be reported to this Headquarters as soon as circumstances permit.

h. Classification.

(1) There will be no publicity concerning Escape and Evasion activities conducted within this command.

(2) In general, the details of this program are UNCLASSIFIED, however, specific areas within the scope of this program are classified as follows:

(a) Inventories are classified CONFIDENTIAL.

(b) Investigation of missing material need not be classified unless other factors connected with the investigation requires a security classification.

1002. Unit E & E Officer. Units will designate in writing to this Headquarters (Attn: S-2) an E & E Officer.

a. The overall effectiveness of an Escape and Evasion program depends to a great extent upon the appointment and complete support of an active interested E & E Officer. This officer assumes the responsibility of fulfilling the complete E & E functions, which consists primarily of preparing each pilot in his unit with the necessary "tools" to help him get back, if he goes down in enemy territory.

b. The E & E Officers' duties consist of:

- (1) Collection of E & E information.
- (2) Research, analysis and delivery of periodic and pre-mission E & E briefings.
- (3) Maintenance of pilots E & E reading file.
- (4) Monitoring and Recommendations for E & E equipment.

1. Purpose. To promulgate instructions concerning the waiver of certain investigative requirements and granting of personnel security clearances while in the Republic of Vietnam.
2. Background. Chapter 15 of reference (a), establishes the investigative requirements which must be fulfilled prior to granting/issuance of personnel security clearances. Reference (b) grants Commanders the authority to waive certain portions of reference (a).
3. Action. In accordance with the authority contained in reference (b), the following procedures will be adhered to in Marine Aircraft Group Eleven in granting CONFIDENTIAL clearances and interim SECRET and TOP SECRET clearances.

a. CONFIDENTIAL - Squadron Commanders may grant CONFIDENTIAL Clearances after a satisfactory check of available service and medical records, (OPNAV Form 5521-429, Certificate of Clearance will not be used for granting CONFIDENTIAL clearances). Local agency check need not be conducted.

b. SECRET/TOP SECRET - Will be issued only by the Group Commander when granted within the purview of this order. Upon notification of successful completion of an NAC, Squadron Commanders may issue FINAL SECRET. The authority for the granting of a FINAL TOP SECRET rests with the Group Commanding Officer only.

(1) Prerequisites

(a) Local Records Check of SRB/OQR and medical records.

(b) The necessary completed forms for an NAC/BI as required by Chapter 15 of reference (a), will be forwarded to this Headquarters (Attn: S-2) with a cover letter justifying the need for interim clearance.

(c) All certificates issued under the provisions of this order will bear the following statement, "VALID ONLY IN RVN. PROVISIONS OF III MAF ORDER 5521.1 AND PARA 1523 OF REFERENCE A APPLY". This will be placed on the Certificate of Clearance in the upper right hand corner under the date.

(d) Each individual granted a Certificate of Clearance, based on the provisions of this order will execute the "Security Regulations Affidavit", enclosure (1).

(e) The "Security Termination Statement" (OPNAV Form 5511-4) will be executed by each individual upon transfer or re-assignment from the Republic of Vietnam.

(f) In all cases and prior to granting of a Certificate of Clearance, Commanders will insure that personnel meet the prerequisites set forth in Chapter 15 of reference (a).

4. Responsibility. Security is a command responsibility and nothing in this Order is restrictive of the good and prudent action taken by each Commander in the performance of his security responsibilities. Commanders, when invoking the provisions of this Order, will insure that each clearance is a valid requirement and a delay in issuing the clearance would seriously curtail the overall functions of this Command.
