



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PART TWO: NARRATIVE SUMMARY

The Group flew 1535 sorties for a total of 1944 hours delivering 2256 tons of ordnance. This was flown in support of operations' Cleveland, Chinook, Tuscaloosa, Prairie I, Mississippi, Trinity, Desoto, Clay and Pawnee II for III MAF. An average of ten sorties per day were flown in support of the 7TH Air Force.

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PART THREE: SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. Personnel. During the month of January, MAG-13 lost five officers and 47 enlisted personnel due to rotation. During the same period, 24 officers and 128 enlisted personnel joined the Group for duty.

4. Civic Action

a. MEDCAP is MAG-13's most active civil affairs program. A Group Flight Surgeon goes into An Tan each Tuesday and Thursday to treat patients who come to the local Dispensary/Maternity Ward. An average of 35 patients are treated each week. In addition to the medical services rendered, soap, food and medicine are contributed to the Dispensary. In January, an operation was successful in curing the crossed-eyes of a young boy.

b. MAG-13 has participated in local self-help projects to a limited degree. Some material has been donated to complete a local Protestant Church and a Parsonage.

5. Industrial Relations

a. MAG-13 has been using all 36 Local National Civilians authorized by 1st MAW. The one interpreter and 35 laborers are used by MABS-13 Utilities Section and Motor Transport Section.

b. A request has been submitted to 1st MAW for an additional 30 Local Nationals with some technical skills (auto mechanics, diesel mechanics, carpenters and electricians).

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6. Intelligence/Counterintelligencea. Preparation for execution of assigned mission.(1) Particular events related.

(a) Continued Intelligence Operations, Briefing and Debriefing of assigned aircrews, and orientation to insure that assigned units receive maximum familiarity with combat conditions in the Republic of Vietnam.

b. Activities

(1) Cpl. W. J. FITZGERALD joined TAD from VMFA-323 on 1 January 1967.

(2) 1STLT D. E. FRITZ departed for JEST School, Cubi Point, Philippines on 3 January 1967.

(3) GySgt. J. D. NICKISON returned from emergency leave in CONUS on 5 January 1967.

(4) Sgt. M. E. LASSITTER departed for R&R on 5 Jan 67.

(5) GySgt. C. BADAMI returned from annual leave in Japan on 6 January 1967.

(6) Sgt. M. E. LASSITTER returned from R&R on 12 Jan 67.

(7) 1STLT D. E. FRITZ returned from JEST School 14 Jan 67.

(8) Capt. C. C. SIMON attended a briefing on Red Blazer Targets at MAG-12 on 14 January 1967.

(9) Capt. C. C. SIMON attended a Bright Light briefing given at Danang by USAF Joint Personnel Recovery Center on 17 Jan 67.

(10) 1STLT S. R. TOMLINSON, VMFA-314, assigned as a Briefing/Debriefing Officer to replace 1STLT FRITZ on 20 Jan 67.

(11) PFC J. H. BORLAND joined the section on 20 Jan 67.

(12) LCpl J. V. DAY and LCpl F. L. McGINTY JR. joined TAD from VMFA-542 on 21 January 1967.

(13) 1STLT H. J. HUDSON, VMFA-323, joined section as Briefing/Debriefing Officer to replace 1STLT RAMSDELL on 28 Jan 67.

(14) The most significant damage against VC/NVA forces was on 9 Jan 67 with 5 structures destroyed, 20 confirmed killed by air and 4 probable killed by air.

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(15) Inspections. Capt. C. C. SIMON conducted an A&M Inspection of VMFA-314 on 27 Jan 67. An overall grade of Satisfactory was given with no discrepancies noted.

(16) Training

(a) Intelligence briefs were presented to the Commanding Officer, his staff and Squadron Commanders at the regularly scheduled CO's Conference.

(b) On-the-job-training, for all Intelligence personnel within the Group was conducted on a continuous basis, during the entire period.

(c) The S-2 Section hosted a U. S. Navy Briefing Team which briefed aircrews and other interested officers of MAG-13, MAG-12 and MAG-36 at the Enlisted Club, MAG-13, on 28 January 1967. The briefing was on the Soviet produced SA-2 (Surface-to-Air-Missile). The briefing lasted for approximately 2 hours and had an overall classification of Secret. There were approximately 70 officers in attendance.

(d) Capt. G. W. BROKATE commenced briefing the Group Guard, on a weekly basis, on 10 January 1967. The briefing lasts approximately one (1) hour and covers the general situation in the Republic of Vietnam and in the Chu Lai TAOR in more specific detail. The times of this briefing are 1530 hours each Thursday and held in the MAG-13 Enlisted Club.

(17) Administrative

(a) Classified files were maintained in accordance with OPNAVINST 5510.1C and current applicable directives.

(b) Unclassified files were maintained in accordance with SECNAV INST P5213.3 - (Naval Filing System).

(c) Personnel security clearances were processed in accordance with current directives.

7. Air Operations

a. MABS-13. A total of 522 aircraft arrestsments were made by the Aircraft Launch and Recovery Section. The Crash Crew responded to 54 emergencies, five of which involved aircraft damage.

8. Logistics. The MABS-13 Ordnance Section assembled and delivered to the tactical squadrons a daily average of 78 tons of ordnance. The TAFDS Unit dispensed 2,968,279 gallons of jet fuel during January.

9. Supply

a. Navy Supply Section

(1) MAG-13 Group Supply is currently supporting three tactical squadrons and a H&MS and MABS. At the present time, all Material is stored in General Purpose tents. Working conditions still remain less than optimum, however, existing facilities are being utilized effectively. Construction of Supply Warehouses is still in progress. The completion of these structures is estimated to be within the next thirty days.

(2) Group Supply has forwarded all "IOL's" applicable to F-4B, TF-9J and C-117 aircraft support to Commanding General, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing, for inclusion by CNAP into an AVCAL.

(3) Group Supply was inspected by representatives of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing on 23 through 28 January 1967.

(4) Based on recommendations by the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing representatives for the forthcoming (3M) Maintenance, Material Management Program for the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing Units, Group Supply has reorganized the Stock Control Section. This was accomplished by establishing a document distribution unit that will enhance the management and logistic capabilities of the Group Supply. Also, the reorganization of the Aeronautical "RCA" Pool by increasing the number of repairables the Group "IMA" is capable of repairing. In addition, the OPTAR Projects 08, 10, 15, 40, 50 and 51 have been established as a Supply Accounting Section vice being a part of the Group Fiscal Section. A briefing of the Group Supply Inspection will be given by 1st Marine Aircraft Wing representatives on 7 February, 1967.

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(5) Group Supply is still awaiting third quarter OPTAR Project 08 AVCAL funds. These funds are urgently required to maintain current operations.

(6) Group Supply personnel continue to visit supply support activities in an attempt to acquire additional spare parts support.

b. Marine Corps Property Section

(1) A complete reconstruction of the Formal Account was accomplished prior to the Wing Inspection. This included putting the final touches on re-warehousing.

(2) During the period 23 through 27 January, the Wing Supply Management Team conducted a thorough, formal inspection of all supply records. The preliminary results proved to be Satisfactory with Minor Discrepancies.


(3) On 25 January, the Marine Corps Property Officer was relieved of all duties and reassigned to Force Logistics Command.

10. Motor Transport. MABS-13 Motor Transport Section carried 3,583,899 pounds of cargo and approximately 1.5 million gallons of fuel and oil. The total mileage for January was 51,698 miles.

AT 1200, 31 DECEMBER 1966, COLONEL D. D. PETTY, JR. ACCOMMUNIED BY A GROUP OF HIS STAFF, PRESENTED THE MARINE AIRCRAFT GROUP-13's COLORS TO SERGEANT KRUM AND COMPANY. GEERTY OF MABS-13 TO BE HOISTED ON THE GROUP'S NEWLY CONSTRUCTED FLAG POLE. THUS, MARINE AIR GROUP-13 CLOSED 1966 FLYING THEIR ORGANIZATIONAL COLORS AT CHU LAI, RVN. INAS MUCH AS SGT KRUM AND C/L GEERTY WERE THE MEN WHO CONSTRUCTED THE POLE AND SUPERVISED THE PLACING AND RIGGING, IT WAS MOST APPROPRIATE THAT THESE MEN HAVE THE HONOR OF RAISING THIS GROUP'S COLORS FOR THE FIRST TIME IN THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM. THE POLE WAS CONSTRUCTED SO THAT THIS COMMAND CAN PROUDLY DISPLAY THE DISTINGUISHING FLAG FOR ALL VISITING GENERAL OFFICERS.






RENDEZVOUS WITH DEPENDENTS IN HAWAII


Religious News







Should you meet the Grim Reaper in anyone of his forms over the next year, what will happen to your wife and children? Have you provided an estate that will support your wife and enable her to put your children through school? Will she have to work, thus depriving your children of both parents? Have you considered the possibility that a welfare organization will have to wash your dirty linen because you didn't have the foresight to provide for your family?

One of the most important fringe benefits of a service career is the very substantial estate, in the form of Government, Social Security and Veterans Administration-related benefits payable to the survivors of service personnel.

The major categories of survivor's benefits are listed below. For example, purposes we have chosen a sergeant with four years service who is married with two children (basic pay \$270.00).

A. Lump sum death gratuity equal to six times the monthly basic pay (plus incentive pay). \$800 minimum-\$3,000 maximum. Example: \$270 X 6 equals \$1,620.

B. Dependency and indemnity compensation - the money amount payable to widows by the VA is equal to \$120 plus 12% of basic pay. (Example - 270 X 12% equals \$32 plus \$120 equals \$152). The amount payable to the widow continues for her lifetime, unless she remarries. Income from other sources does not effect payments.

C. Social Security - the one-time lump sum death benefit normally averages \$255. The monthly benefit would be approximately

\$202.40. The total payment to one family cannot exceed \$308 or 80% of monthly earnings, whichever is less.

D. Serviceman's Group Life Insurance--SGLI automatically provides \$10,000 of life insurance (\$2 premium deducted from pay). Settlement is made either by lump sum or 36 monthly payments, at serviceman's option.

MERITORIOUS MAST AWARDED TO SERGEANT
WILLIAM R. BETTS, U. S. MARINE CORPS
VMFA-542

On 25 January 1967, Sergeant William R. BETTS appeared before the Commanding Officer, Marine Fighter Attack Squadron-542 for Meritorious Mast. The following comments were made concerning his performance of duty:

"Sergeant BETTS, you became the Noncommissioned Officer in Charge of the Airframes Shop on 17 November 1966. The squadron, having been in Chu Lai only one month, was still in the process of adjusting to the tempo of combat operations. Every shop in the Maintenance Department was losing their key personnel and no replacements were anticipated. The Airframes Shop was operating at thirty percent of T/O and of that number, few were sufficiently qualified to work on the F4B. To a young Sergeant with less than a year in grade this initial supervisory experience posed quite a challenge, however, Sergeant BETTS, you have, in a remarkably short period of time, established a level of proficiency in your shop that is second to none. You have initiated a technical training program wherein each man not only acts as instructor, but also prepares his own lesson outline. This in itself is a unique teaching method. 

VIETNAMESE NEW YEARBACKGROUND

The celebration of TET is the most important, solemn and festive holiday of the Vietnamese people. TET is unlike any holiday that we are familiar with in the United States. It is highly complex in nature due to the fact that it commemorates three or more events rather than one. TET embodies the idea of a Spring Festival, the New Year, and general ancestor worship. For the Vietnamese, it is a time of solemnity, gaiety and hope encompassing homage to their ancestors, family visits, the observation of traditional taboos, and general merriment. It is truly a comprehensive holiday and all Vietnamese give it full observance. This year the holiday begins 9 February and lasts through 12 February.

To appreciate the customs of TET, an understanding of some ancient spirit-world legends is necessary because TET is a mixture of religion and superstition, with mythological derivation. The following are examples of the colorful superstitions and symbols that represent TET:

1. Each family erects a clean bamboo pole about 30 feet long in front of the house on TET Eve to frighten off "evil spirits". The pole is called the "Cay Neu". Attached to the top of the pole is a basket containing nuts and other items symbolizing gifts to "good spirits".
2. Throughout the TET holiday season, the Vietnamese refrain from cleaning their houses. They believe that a "good spirit" may be swept from the house in the cleaning process.
3. Fire or lighted coals are never borrowed from neighbors because the family spirit must provide its own warmth during TET.

INSTRUCTIONS

The Vietnamese attach special significance to the first visitor of TET as an omen of good and bad fortune for the coming year. Unless invited by the Vietnamese, visits by Marines during the first day of TET are to be avoided. You may visit only in the afternoon if an invitation has been rendered. Visits during the next two days are permissible. An invitation to visit is considered to be a great honor and the visit should be made if at all possible. The cleanest uniform you have should be worn.

A proper way to greet a Vietnamese during this time would be, "I wish you a happy and prosperous new year" rather than "Happy TET", which is meaningless.

To properly observe Vietnamese etiquette in the home when visiting, honored ancestors should be greeted prior to greeting the hosts. To do this you should face the family alter, press your palms together and incline your head three to five times. Then you may greet your hosts as told in the above paragraph.

If gifts or food are offered during a visit to a Vietnamese friend, accept them. The food will probably be tea and rice cakes. It is unpardonably rude to refuse this offer.

Certain gifts are taboo during this time such as: medicine and vitamins, sharp objects, and anything that is not new.

An appropriate gift for TET would be a bouquet of red roses for the wife of a family, but gifts are not necessary for adults.

For children up to 15 years of age, small red envelopes containing 20 new piasters have special significance. One such gift per family is considered sufficient. Appropriate envelopes will be provided by unit S-5's. Address the envelope, "CUNG CHUC TAN XUAN" which means "Many wishes for the new Spring".

If greeting cards are sent, they should arrive prior to the first day of TET to be considered sincere. Greeting cards may be purchased locally.

Arguments, violent insults or emotions should be avoided during this period. To the Vietnamese, what a man does during TET forecasts his actions for the rest of the year.


Caution. It is not unusual to celebrate TET with fireworks. Also, RF/PF troops occasionally fire their weapons during the holiday. Discretion and positive identification must be made before engaging targets during this period.

Appropriate unit participation in TET observance includes luncheons for village and hamlet officials, including elders, parties for children or other groups, and presenting gifts to individuals or selected military or civilian groups with which the unit may have led close association.

Of particular importance during the entire TET period are respect for Vietnamese traditions and exemplary courtesy and good behavior. Those are necessary throughout the year, but should be given special attention by all personnel during the TET holiday.

3. Operating Instructions:

a. Crank the generator handle to alert the switchboard.

b. "RING OFF" after completing the call. It is not necessary to wait and tell the operator to break the call down.

c. Conference calls will be made only at the direction of the Group Commander.

d. The operator is not permitted to pass messages except in the case of an emergency.

e. Avoid making unnecessary calls and limit the length of the call to three (3) minutes.

f. DO NOT request to 'hold' as the switchboard operator is instructed not to do so.

g. When information desired is not readily available, request a "call back" rather than holding the circuit open.

h. Know the number you desire, or ask for the switchboard supervisor; do not require the operator to find the number for you.

4. It is emphasized that the telephone system in this organization is a FIELD TELEPHONE SYSTEM. Patience on the part of users will facilitate handling the maximum number of calls. Complaints should be registered with the Group Communications Officer, SWISS 10, not the switchboard operator.

5. Restriction on calls to MOMENT: Place non-essential calls to MOMENT at times other than 0800 - 1100. Limit duration of all calls.

JOINT UNIFORM TELEPHONE COMMUNICATIONS PRECEDENCE SYSTEM

1. The precedence indicators listed in the chart following are directed for joint use and specify, by its military precedence designator, the relative order in which telephone calls should be handled based on the importance (content) of the call.
2. The precedence system is directed for use by all authorized users of the voice communication facilities of the Department of Defense. Since the effectiveness of the system depends upon cooperation on the part of all authorized to employ it, users must be familiar with the purpose to be served by precedence category and the types of calls which may be assigned the respective precedences. Each authorized user should consider whether a call requires special precedence and exercise care not to request or utilize one higher than the circumstance requires.
3. A high precedence call can ordinarily be placed only by the Commanding Officer and members of his Executive Staff. In emergencies, anyone may place such a call. The switchboard operator is required to take the name and rank of any person originating a precedence call. High precedence calls will pre-empt (interrupt) any call of lower precedence.

FLASH Has precedence over any other telephonic calls of lower precedence. Pre-empts lower precedence calls. May be pre-empted by the application of the FLASH OVERRIDE capability available to: (1) President of the US, Secretary of Defense, and Joint Chiefs of Staff; (2) Commanders of Unified and Specified Commands when declaring Defense Condition ONE or Defense Emergency.

Flash precedence is reserved for alerts, warnings, or other emergency actions having command or area security. (e.g., Presidential use, announcement of an alert ; opening of hostilities; land, air, or sea catastrophies; intelligence reports on matters leading to enemy attack; potential or actual nuclear accidents or incidents; implementation of services unilateral emergency action precedences, etc.)

IMMEDIATE Has precedence over any other telephonic calls of lower precedence. Pre-empts lower precedence calls.


Immediate precedence is reserved for vital communications: (1) having an immediate operational effect on tactical operations, (2) which directly concern safety or rescue operations, (3) which affects the intelligence community operational role; (e.g., initial vital reports which must be completed from vehicles in motion such as operational mission aircraft; intelligence reports on vital actions in progress; natural disaster or widespread damage; emergency weather reports having an immediate bearing on mission in progress; emergency use for circuit restoration, use by tactical command posts for passing immediate operational traffic, etc.)

PRIORITY Has precedence over any other telephonic call of lower precedence. Pre-empts lower precedence calls.


Priority precedence is reserved for calls which require prompt completion for national defense and security, the successful conduct of war or to safeguard life or property, which do not require higher precedence. (e.g., reports of priority land, sea, or air movements; administrative, intelligence, operations, or logistic activity calls requiring priority action; calls that would have a serious impact on military, administrative, intelligence, operational or logistic activities if handled as a ROUTINE call.) "Normally, PRIORITY will be the highest precedence which may be assigned to administrative matters for which speed of handling is of paramount importance."

ROUTINE Has no precedence over any other call and is handled sequentially as placed by the calling party. No pre-empt.

Routine Precedence is reserved for all other official communications.
