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~~SECRET~~PART TWO: NARRATIVE SUMMARY

MAG-13 flew 1636 sorties for a total of 2102.3 hours delivering 2806 tons of ordnance. This was flown in support of operations' Prairie II, Independence, Chinook, Trinity, Desoto, and Deckhouse VI for III MAF. Also, an average of 8 sorties per day were flown in support of 7th Air Force.

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PART THREE: SIGNIFICANT EVENTS1. Personnel

During the month of February, Marine Aircraft Group-13 had a loss of twenty-two (22) officers and eighty-three (83) enlisted personnel due to rotation and transfers. During this same period, twenty-one (21) officers and one hundred and eighty-six (186) enlisted personnel reported to the Group for duty.

2. Awards

There were one hundred and seven (107) Air Medals and stars in lieu of medals received by members of this command during the month of February. In addition to these medals, two (2) Purple Heart medals were awarded.

3. Casualties

a. Non-hostile casualties

- (1) Total for February-----ten (10)
- (2) Total returned to duty-----four (4)
- (3) Total MedEvac out of RVN-----one (1)
- (4) Total number of man days lost-----twenty (20)

b. Hostile casualties - none

4. Civic Action

a. Our most active civil affairs program is MEDCAP. A Group Flight Surgeon goes to An Tan each Tuesday and Thursday and treats patients who come to the local Dispensary/Maternity Ward. An average of thirty-five (35) patients are treated each week. Contributions of soap, medicines, and food are included in this program.

b. MAG-13 has participated in local self-help projects to a limited degree. Some material has been donated to complete a local Protestant Church and a parsonage.

5. Industrial Relations

a. MAG-13 is utilizing all thirty-six (36) Local National civilians authorized by 1st MAW. These personnel include one interpreter and laborers utilized by Utilities and Motor Transport.

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b. A request has been submitted to 1st MAW for an additional 30 Local Nationals with some technical skills (auto mechanics, diesel mechanics, carpenters and electricians).

6. Intelligence/Counterintelligence

a. Preparation for execution of assigned mission

(1) Particular events related

(a) Continued Intelligence Operations, Briefing and Debriefing of assigned aircrews, and orientation to ensure assigned units receive maximum familiarity with combat conditions in the Republic of Vietnam.

b. Activities

(1) Capt. G. W. BROKATE started a weekly General Intelligence Brief for MAG-13 Tactical Squadrons on 19 Feb 67. The Brief is prepared by the Group Intelligence Section and given by the Tactical Squadrons' Intelligence Officer. The Intelligence brief for H&MS-13 and MABS-13 is given by Group Intelligence personnel.

(2) A 7th Air Force Briefing Team conducted a SAR Brief for all available aircrews at the MAG-13 EM Club on 22 Feb 67. There were approximately 97 Officers present.

(3) The most significant BDA during this reporting period was on 16 Feb 67, with 8 structures damaged and 15 VC killed by Marine Air.

(4) Training

(a) Capt. G. W. BROKATE Briefing continued for the Group Guard on a weekly basis. This briefing is approximately one (1) hour long and covers the general situation in the Republic of Vietnam and in the Chu Lai TAOR in more specific detail.

7. Air Operations

a. During February 395 routine and 10 emergency aircraft arrestments were made. The Air Freight and Passenger Section processed 15,078 passengers, both incoming and outgoing. The cargo section moved 3,689,362 pounds of freight and 37,808 pounds of mail. The following number of aircraft were loaded/unloaded through the MABS-13 Air Freight:

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The Crash Crew responded to 43 emergencies and assisted in 20 MedEvacs.

8. Logistics. MABS-13 Ordnance Section assembled and delivered an average 135 tons of ordnance per day to the operating squadrons. This is an increase of 75% over the amount of ordnance delivered in January. The TAFDS Section opened four new dispensing systems and provided MAG-13 aircraft with 3,446,529 gallons of jet fuel.

9. Supply

a. Navy Supply Section

(1) MAG-13 Group Supply is currently supporting three tactical squadrons and a H&MS and MABS. At the present time, all materiel is stored in General Purpose Tents. Ground work is slowly progressing for five Group Supply warehouses. The completion of these structures is estimated to be within the next thirty days.

(2) Project O8 AVCAL Funds in the amount of \$66,000 was allocated MAG-13 for the third quarter. However, the amount of funds allocated is not sufficient to maintain the desired stocks of NSA materiel to be held by Group Supply. The available balance this date is \$14,000. Group Supply will request additional funds from the Commanding General, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing.

(3) A letter request has been forwarded to Commanding General, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing, on twelve chronic troublesome F-4B items for positioning these assets in the WESTPAC area.

(4) Group Supply is currently implementing phases of the Maintenance Materiel Management (3M) Program.

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b. Marine Corps Property Section

(1) A Communications Shop Stores was established and located at the Group Communications Section in order to expedite requests and maintain stock of spare parts.

(2) Administrative/Materiel Inspections were conducted on all squadrons within Marine Aircraft Group-13.

(3) Two senior SNCO's have attended the presentation of the Marine Corps Unified Materiel Management System (MUMMS) on Okinawa.

10. Motor Transport

a. A new maintenance office was constructed. The refueler office and parts room were completed and a carburetor and ignition shop was started. A total of 50,712 miles were recorded by all vehicles. 6,132,945 pounds of cargo and 41,990 passengers were transported. The Refueler Section delivered 94,505 gallons of MOGAS; 61,500 gallons of diesel fuel, 36,000 gallons of JP-4 and 338,100 gallons of 115/145 AVGAS. A total of 2,394 miles was recorded.

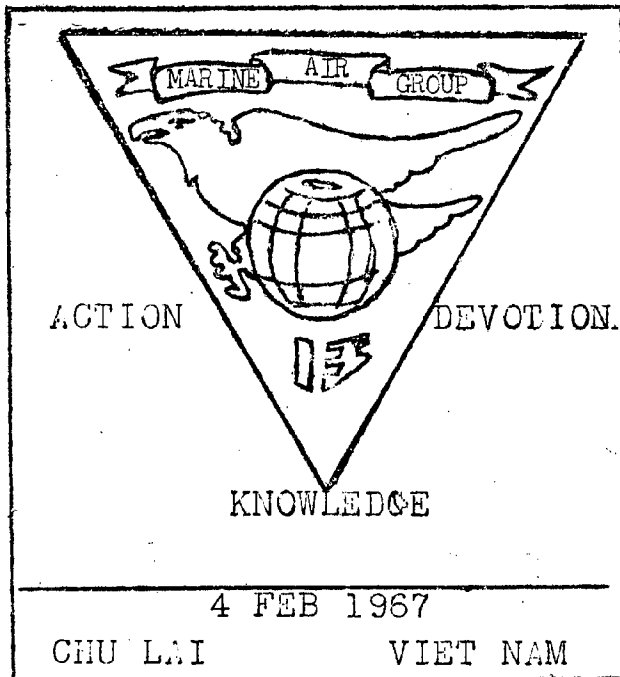

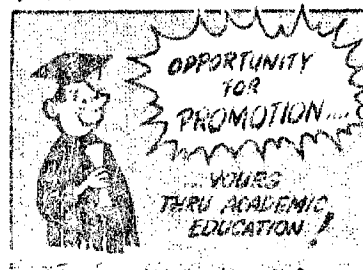


COLONEL D. H. JOHNSON TO ASSUME COMMAND OF MARINE AIRCRAFT GROUP 13

BETTER HOUSING FOR MILITARY BACHELORS

NAVY TIMES published information pertaining to: (1) Basic allowance for Quarters (BAQ) for senior NCOs, petty officers and junior officers of all services. (2) Raise the standards of adequacy for present quarters and for construction of new quarters drastically. Thus, many quarters presently termed "adequate" will now become officially "inadequate." About 13,000 officers and enlisted of all services may qualify for the off-post privilege the first year, but if the program is later expanded to E-4 through E-6 another 40,000 would be included. This program is anticipated to commence next July. Under the same program the Defense Department has outlined the following: Improvement of enlisted barracks and dormitories. Trainees will get 72 square feet living area per person with open bays and central toilet facilities. Men in pay grade E-2 and above will get the following: E-2 through E-4 three or four men to a room with central toilet facilities. Each man will get from 90 to 105 square feet of space. E-5 and E-6: Two men to a room (approximately 135 to 155 square feet per man with an adjacent bath. E-7 through E-9 One man per room (Approximately 275 to 350 square feet) with a private bath.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Preparatory School Scholarships enabling young men to prepare for the Naval Academy are available to high school seniors who are sons of active, retired and deceased Navy, Marine Corps, Army and Air Force personnel and civilians. Address requests to Mr. Roy S. BENSON, Ctrs G, Navy Yard, Washington, D. C. 20390.

WHAT TO EXPECT FOR 1967

1. CLOTHING MAINTENANCE ALLOWANCE INCREASE to \$5.10 and \$7.30 effective 1 January 1967.
2. Com-rats increase to \$1.30 daily rate effective 1 January 1967.
3. Social Security yearly deduction increased from \$277.20 to \$290.40 effective 1 January 1967.
4. Proposed increase GI BILL education subsistence by \$25 to \$30 monthly, thus increasing the present \$100 to \$130 for single veterans; from \$125 to \$155 for those with one dependent; and from \$150 to \$175 monthly for veterans with two or more dependents.
5. Defense is going to recommend a new pay grade for the top-ranking enlisted man in each of the Armed Forces. The new pay grade will call for \$150 a month more in basic pay. In the interim, these enlisted men in each service have been awarded \$150 a month proficiency pay, effective 1 Jan 1967.

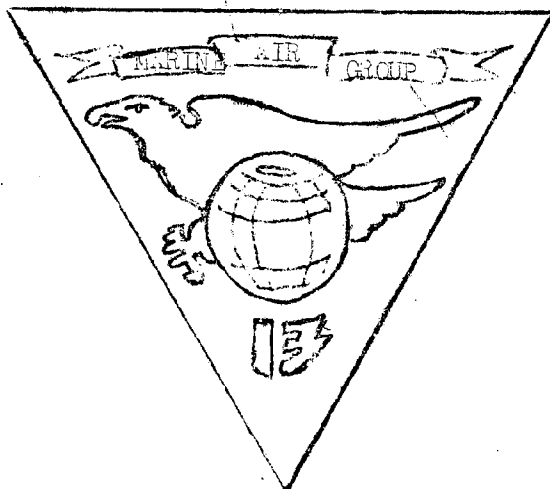

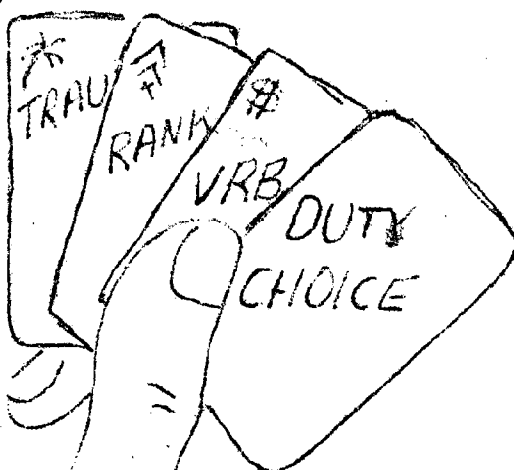

The old saying that "things have never been better" has special application to the opportunities being afforded those who decide to reenlist in the Marine Corps.

One important bonus being given, and most naturally the thing on everyone's mind, is the promotion factor. Promotion to Sergeant, Corporal or Lance Corporal can be yours for reenlistment of three years or more. The time in grade requirement is six months for the Sergeant promotion and four months for the Corporal and Lance Corporal promotion. With all of the bonuses now being offered by the Marine Corps, it is the wise Marine who will now carefully map out his future for the best interests of himself and the Marine Corps.

PROMOTION BOARDS IN SESSION AT HEADQUARTERS

A Marine Enlisted Selection Board convened Jan 13 to select fully qualified Sergeants for promotion to Staff Sergeant. Sergeants with a date of rank of Dec. 31, 1965, or sooner, are being considered by the Board.

For the Company Grade Officers, a board to select and recommend approximately 215 officer and enlisted Marines for temporary appointment to the grades of 1st and 2nd Lieutenant Limited Duty, convened Jan 16 at Headquarters, U. S. Marine Corps.

The Board, headed by Col. J. R. STOCKMAN, is expected to be in session six to eight weeks.

The third selection board convened at Washington, D. C. Jan. 31 to recommend male officers on active duty for temporary promotion to Captain.

First Lieutenants with a date of rank of July 1, 1966, or earlier, on active duty the day the board convenes will be eligible for consideration.

All promotions made from this board will be effective for not longer than six months after the end of the current national emergency or the date the officer is released from active duty, whichever is earlier.

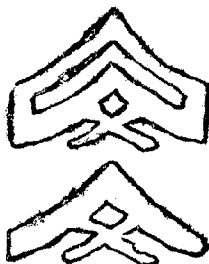

The first of the major airlines will offer discount fares; with reserved seats; to military men on leave soon.

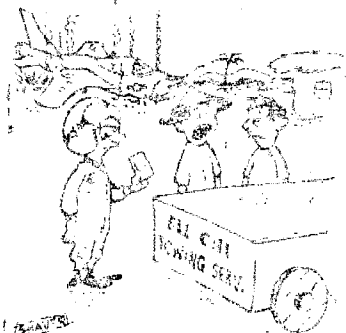

Marine Corps personnel who demonstrate outstanding leadership in the Vietnam conflict may be eligible for temporary appointment to second lieutenant under the recently revived "battlefield commission" program.

According to Marine Corps Order 1421.7, exceptional performance of duty in combat is defined to mean "outstanding combat leadership while under fire".

Personnel nominated for appointment to second lieutenant must be U. S. citizens, 20 years old but not past 37th birthday by the end of the fiscal year in which recommended; have a minimum GCT or AA of 110; must not have been convicted by court-martial, or by civil authorities, or the subject of an offense which involves moral turpitude, or an offense for which the maximum penalty includes death, dishonorable discharge or confinement in excess of one year, and be of "unquestionable moral integrity and of commissioned officer caliber."

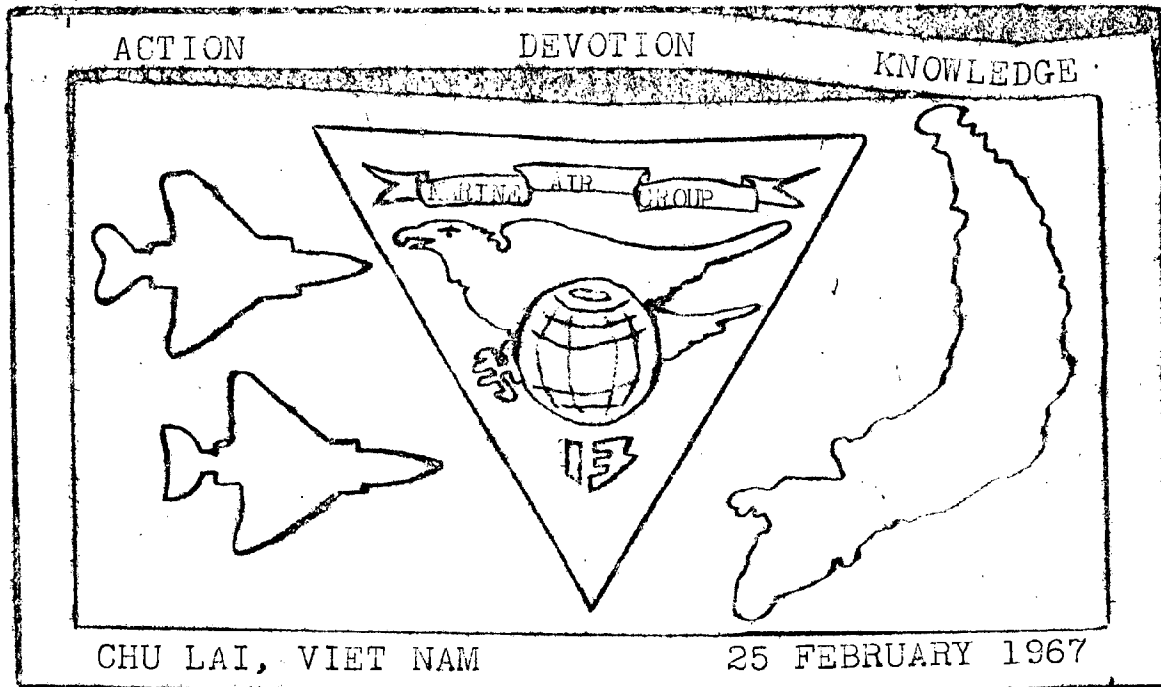

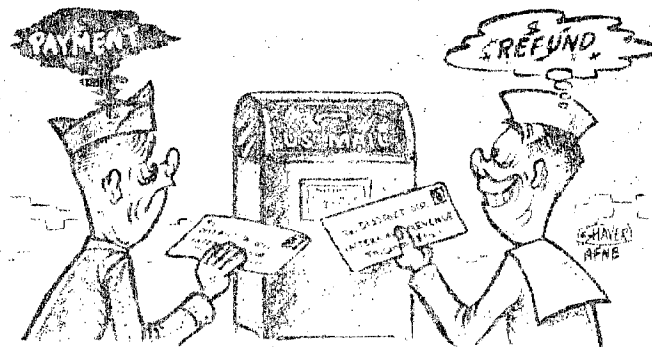

The main provisions are to conduct welfare services to military personnel and dependents and serve as a means of communications between members of the armed forces and their families.

Your main concern with the Red Cross organization while you are in the service will be with the Field Director's offices on military installations and the Red Cross Chapter services in your home areas.

The Field Directors office provides service on military installations of the armed forces and to dependents living on Post. The Red Cross Chapter is set up to provide service in civilian communities to dependents and immediate family members of military personnel living there.

You may be curious as to what services the Field Directors office can provide you while you are assigned. Briefly, there are five (5) major services provided: counseling, communications, health and welfare reporting, emergency leave verification and financial assistance.

The Red Cross physical "set up" serving MAG-13 is the Field Director's Office located at Task Force X-Ray. This office serves the total Chu Lai military complex and can be reached through your Group Chaplain.

One point we can't stress strong enough during family emergencies is for the family to contact the Red Cross in their area. Give the nature of the emergency, your name, rank, serial number, unit and station. This procedure will save many hours in getting the word to you and the military authorities for verification. A suggestion to you now, write your families and instruct them to call the local Red Cross Chapter and report the facts of emergency situations that occur.

It is also very important that you keep your family notified of your current and correct military address. This is quite a common item that you servicemen forget when changing units due to re-cycling, etc. "Keep the troops at home informed."

LIFE OF THE MARINE SERVING WITH III MAF

DANANG

CHU LAI

PHU BAI

A Marine assigned to duty with the III Marine Amphibious Force can expect to be located in one of the bases indicated above. Regardless of where he is assigned, as a Marine in a combat area, he will be called upon to put forth a great effort.

On 8 March 1965, there were 500 Marines in Vietnam. One year later, there were approximately 50,000. The original task of defending the Danang airfield is but one small part of the present day mission. Today, the nature of Marine operations is essentially offensive. At the time of the Marines' arrival, Viet Cong main force units roamed the countryside and struck government out-posts almost at will. However, the greatest threat came from the Viet Cong guerrillas who, over the ten preceding years, had deeply penetrated the daily life of the people through their network of terrorism, brutality, threat and extortion. Governmental influence was rare beyond the outskirts of the cities and usually consisted on nothing more than a passing military unit which was of little benefit to the people. Law and order had deteriorated and the thousands of people who craved protection found no one to whom they could turn. The result was a frightened and disorganized population slipping gradually under Communist domination.

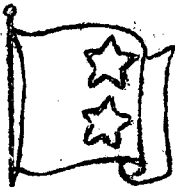
It was clear from the beginning that in this region, the battlefield lay among the people. It was concluded that the best way to fulfill the task of airfield security was by continuous action, ranging at long distances from the airfields themselves, designed to weed out the Viet Cong guerrilla infestation from the population and, at the same time, seeking out any enemy main force units that could be locked in combat. And, through it all, to establish a relationship with the people which would cause them to voluntarily support the U. S. and the Vietnamese and correspondingly, to withhold support from the Viet Cong.

LIFE OF THE MARINE SERVING WITH III MAF (Contd)

This job is being done by three types of offensive action; large unit operations, counter guerrilla operations, and pacification/civic action. The large unit operations are conducted against the main force units and generally consist of multi-battalion force. These operations are familiar to most of us as they usually receive wide recognition in the newspapers. Less spectacular and little publicized are the day-to-day patrols and ambushes conducted by the fire teams, squads and platoons. These are what eventually route out the guerrilla and deny him access to the populace, the mainstay of his existence. In earlier days, it was said that the day belonged to the ARVN and the night belonged to the Viet Cong. This is no longer the case as the Marines conduct about half of their operations during the night and are achieving considerable success.

To the individual Marine serving with III MAF, the large unit operations and anti-guerrilla operations form much of his job, but these would be much less effective if it were not for the other type of offensive action; pacification/civic action. This means putting the people back on their feet and showing them that we are truly their friends. It takes on many faces; providing protection against Viet Cong attacks, giving medical assistance, helping re-establish the local government, providing food and other forms of assistance. The objective is to bring the people to a state of self-sufficiency and re-establish the local authority as in the final analysis it must be the people themselves who finally beat the Viet Cong.

The Marines have had a successful year in Viet. Heavy blows have been dealt the main force units and through diligent patrolling, the guerrillas no longer move freely about. The civic action program is reaping positive results, but there is still much more to be done. Each Marine assigned to duty in Vietnam must approach his new job with a sense of responsibility and the knowledge that the hopes of the free world rest with him.



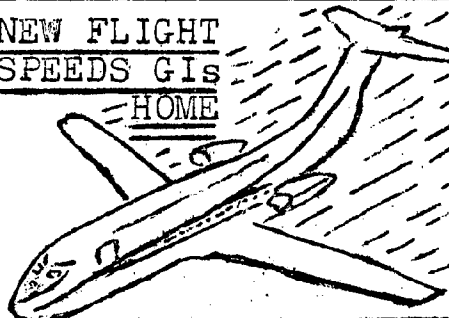

The Naval Support Activity, Da Nang recently began a new Military Airlift Command (MAC) Channel Flight between Da Nang and Norton AFB, Calif., to speed up and simplify the rotation of Navymen and Marines from Vietnam.

There are no more worries of being stranded in some transient barracks somewhere between Da Nang and the States. It now takes only about 16 hours to get from Da Nang to the States via MAC Channel Flight with only one stopover of about 1½ hours on Okinawa.

The flight is made in splendor aboard a Continental Airlines 707 Golden Jet. Several forms of entertainment are available to pass the time. Immediately after the takeoff four lovely stewardesses give a graceful demonstration of how to struggle into a life vest. This show is brought back for an encore after the takeoff from Okinawa.

To make further travel arrangements, there are facilities at Norton to purchase air, rail or bus tickets to the returnee's ultimate destination. There is bus transportation at a small charge to Los Angeles International Airport, train and bus stations.

Another interesting aspect of the flight is the fact that a returnee arrives at Norton before leaving Da Nang. Sound Strange? As a result of crossing the International Date Line the plane will arrive on the same day it left.

With her, on the trip from home came an aged grandmother, a crippled brother and several other residents of their hamlet.

They were fleeing the Viet Cong who days before had entered their small group of thatched huts and demanded food and shelter. This was not new to the hamlet residents for the Viet Cong had made many such demands from them in the past. They knew no force other than the Cong. Then came the word that U. S. Marines were waiting to take them to safety.

That was almost ten days ago. Now she chats with other children and helps prepare the evening meal of rice over a community fire. She wears a new dress and sports her first school book which is never laid down even for the cooking duties. Her weight has changed and she even looks taller. The almond eyes no longer have that scared look of a person ten times her age. They sparkle as a little girls's eyes should.

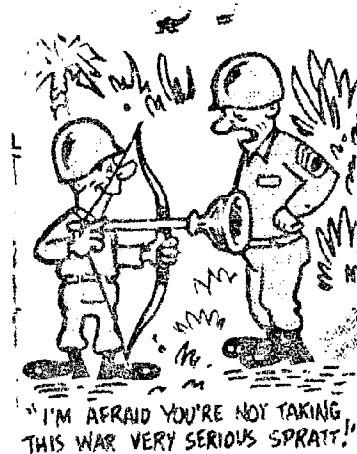

Recently Communists have been killed in our TAOR wearing green, khaki and camouflaged uniforms and black pajamas, with steel helmets, pith helmets, flak jackets and Marine ponchos.

A 10-year old boy reported children in the Communist Youth Front will receive access to the "April Youth Festival," (location to be announced!) if they bring in one item (any kind) of American military clothing or equipment. They could thus equip a squad or platoon to look like us, as the Germans did at Bastogne, in World War II. Also, canteens, etc. work just as well for "Charlie" as they do for us.

On 31 January, 6 nautical miles southeast of M.G-13, an infantry platoon saw a man firing a BAR at an F4B aircraft approaching Chu Lai to land. When they searched the area, only "innocent farmers" were found. The sniper had succeeded in hiding his weapon and the villagers were too afraid to give him away. This is a common occurrence, but recently, the results of Civic Action and Psychological Warfare are showing up. A Vietnamese woman brought three children into one of our "MedCaps". They had been wounded by a VC booby trap. She led Marines to seven other traps.

Two VC platoons were observed south of Chu Lai in an "Intramural Firefight", by one of our recon teams..... SORRY 'BOUT THAT!

The Commanding General, 3d Marine Division, said that from now on the infantry will call a helicopter landing zone "secure" only, "If friendly infantry are standing upright and moving about in the zone without regard to cover."

On 30 January, in Binh Dinh Province, in the II Corps area, we captured a message from the Commanding General, 3rd North Vietnamese Division saying the 18th North Vietnamese Regiment had many problems with defections. One squad tried to defect en masse. All political cadres were directed to check out all people from the squad leader on up. Our psychological warfare leaflets and broadcasts are effective, the message said.

In the five days preceding 2 February, three sightings of "two figures" were made at various points outside the MAG-13 wire. Ten shots were fired at one of our dog teams.

In our TAOR Marines found documents on a dead VC which showed him to be a squad leader in Headquarters, Military Region 5, which controls the 12 northern provinces. This group of 650 men is apparently still in the general vicinity of Chu Lai. It has been here since 1960, moving every few days.

Apparently Marine installations and aircraft are still prime Communist targets. Squad-sized attacks against the airfield complex at Danang continued during the past two weeks. Thanks to the "grunts" on our perimeters, these attacks were all repulsed.

The 40th Company, 409th Sapper Battalion is believed to be in the Chu Lai vicinity. They could employ 60, 82 and 120mm mortars, satchel charges, grenades, and possibly 57mm recoilless rifles against us. "IT PAYS TO BE - AND STAY ALERT" "THE LIFE YOU SAVE - MAY BE YOUR OWN"

In Operation CLAY, in the northern Chu Lai TAOR, a CH-46 helicopter landed on 3 grenade-and-mine booby traps. 3 Marines WIA, 126 holes in the aircraft.

HIGHLIGHTS OF MAG-13 WITHIN THE PAST WEEK"THE TIGERS"

Two aircraft on a close air support mission south of Chu Lai in Quang Ngai Province expended 24 rockets. The damage assessment was:

- 9 structures destroyed
- 6 structures damaged
- 1 secondary explosion

"THE SNAKES"

Two F4B's on a mission south of Danang in Quang Tin Province expended 24 bombs. Results:

- 12 structures destroyed
- 10 structures damaged
- 1 secondary explosion - 1,000 feet high resembling white phosphorous

"THE BLACK KNIGHTS"

Two Phantoms on a scramble mission southwest of Chu Lai in Quang Ngai Province expended 6 bombs and 750 rounds of 20mm cannon. Tally:

- 15 VC KBA (Killed by air) - confirmed

These are just three incidents where it has been shown that "The Marines have landed and the situation is well in hand."

We of the "Intelligence Paper" wish to extend our "Well Done" to each and every man that made these "typical Marine" accomplishments another "routine mission." It takes a well-oiled machine to do this - and that is what all of you are.

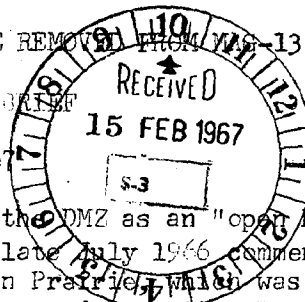

MAG-13 S-2 TACTICAL BRIEF

AS OF 12 Feb 1967



To forestall "Uncle Ho's" efforts to use the DMZ as an "open highway" into South Vietnam, U.S. Marine elements, in late July 1966, commenced Operation Hastings, later to continue as Operation Prairie, which was an extended aggressive patrol operation and just lately renamed Operation Prairie II. This operation is a continuous patrol type operation and also consists of securing and maintaining combat outposts on prominent terrain, such as "The Rockpile", in the area immediately south of the DMZ to deny those infiltrating forces the free use of the DMZ/Panhandle area as a route, free of resistance, to move south. This operation has been supported by a great many sorties from MAG-13.

Another operation supported by MAG-13 is Operation Desoto, which commenced in late January. This operation is a Marine operation just south of Quang Ngai City, about 50 miles southeast of Chu Lai. This could very well become another Operation Prairie. Operation Desoto is in an area that, up until the present time, was VC dominated, and produces 90% of the salt for Northern RVN. 60% of the proceeds go to the Cong.

During January there were 658 Communists killed by U.S. Marines in the Chu Lai TAOR. These were confirmed kills and do not include any that may have been carried off or buried and will never be found.

As you all know, TET, the official Vietnamese New Year, is over. The ceasefire called for by the VC's ended officially at 0700 on 12 February. In spite of the big scare and rumors, Chu Lai came through without ever being the recipient of the anticipated and much talked about, large-scale attack. This, however, is no reason for us to let our guard down. Even though large unit attacks "might not" be probable, small unit attacks can take place at almost any time. For example, on 11 Feb 70 Communist troops in khakis and hard hats, with one COMM mortar and one .30 Cal MG, were observed 5½ miles north-west of MAG-13 "TACAN".

The latest "unofficial" word from our Psychological Warfare and Counter-intelligence Departments is that some 70% of all Viet Cong and 20% of all North Vietnamese Regulars KIA have a safe conduct pass on them. These figures are compiled from the KLA's that are confirmed by a physical body count. This shows that these personnel would surrender to the South Vietnamese or American or allied forces if they had an opportunity and/or would use the passes for better treatment when capture is imminent. It is also an indication of the state of morale of the Insurgent Forces in South Vietnam that these troops would consider that tactic.

Have you ever seen the abbreviation?
"FWMAF"

Do you know what it means?

It is a new phrase that the war in Vietnam has given the military. It means:
"Free World Multiple Allied Forces"
