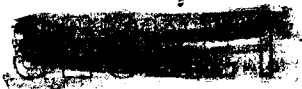

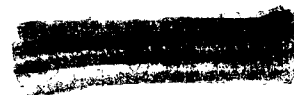

4. Important Visitors to the Command

On 25 December 1968, Admiral John S. McCain, USN, Commander in Chief Pacific toured the MAG-13 area during a visit to the Chu Lai Air Base complex. Accompanying Admiral McCain were Lieutenant General CUSHMAN, CG III MAF and Rear Admiral RINDSZOPF, USN.

On 11 December 1968, Major General QUILTER, CG 1st MAW attended Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 323's change of command in which LtCol Ira L. BORGAN relieved LtCol Don J. SLEE.

Archbishop COOKE, Military Ordinariate, visited Chu Lai area on 26 December.

PART TWO: NARRATIVE SUMMARY

Marine Aircraft Group-13 continued its support of III MAF and all other free world Armed Forces in the I Corps, Commando Hunt and Gulf of Tonkin areas. Operations supported were SCOTLAND II, TAYLOR COMMON, VERNON LAKE, FAYETTE CANYON, NEVADA EAGLE, DAWSON RIVER, KENTUCKY, VICTORY DRAGON VI, HENDERSON HILL, MEADE RIVER, NAPOLEAN SALINE II, AND MARSHALL MOUNTAIN. Flying a wide variety of missions, MAG-13 aircraft provided support for the First and Third Marine Divisions, Task Force Hotel, U.S. Army, Republic of Korea Marines, ARVN Forces, Task Force 77, and the 7th Air Force in the Commando Hunt area.

MAG-13's air effort accounted for 117 bunkers destroyed, 102 structures destroyed, 42 confirmed KBA, 913 meters of trench line and an assortment of sampans, gun positions, automatic weapons sites and trucks destroyed or damaged.

Flying around the clock Barrier Cap, MAG-13 Phantoms logged 219 fighter sorties over the waters off North Vietnam in support of air operations in the Gulf of Tonkin. During the same period 11 MIG CAP and 18 fighter escort sorties were provided for B-52 Arc Light missions with negative MIG encounters.

MAG-13 lost one aircraft during the month of December. The F4B was destroyed as a direct result of enemy action and the crew members are listed as Missing in Action.

Chu Lai Air Base came under rocket or mortar attack three times during the reporting period. The rocket attack on the 21st of December 1968 produced minor damage in the MAG-13 supply area, 8 KIA and 5 WIA.

PART THREE: SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. Personnel

During the month of December, Marine Aircraft Group-13 had a loss of 15 Officers and 87 Enlisted personnel due to rotation and transfers. During this same period, 14 Officers and 155 Enlisted reported to this Group for duty.

4. Civic Action

a. 1-2 December: Conducted MEDCAP in Long Phu II to a good turnout with VMFA-323 and VMFA-115 assisting. Sixty CARE school kits were distributed to the Long Phu II school with VMFA-115 assisting. A volley ball set was also donated and ISO coverage was provided by Lt. COLLINS. Evening classes at the Chu Lai New Life hamlet school for English instruction began with district education office approval.

b. 3-6 December: Donated two beds to the local Vietnamese hospital now nearing the completion of its new addition. Donated waterpumps to the Chu Lai New Life hamlet livestock farm to facilitate the watering of the animals. Discussed plans with two representatives from Ky Lien Village for a trip to visit the experimental farms in the Danang area.

c. 8 December: MAG-13 motor transport organized a civic action team and has commenced the repair of the Chu Lai New Life School.

d. 9 December: MABS-13 is doing an outstanding job on road construction between Long Phu and Long Phu II. This work is in conjunction with the combined U. S. and Vietnamese pacification and renewal projects. One week has seen the completion of over one mile of road through the hamlet.

e. 10 December: LtCol D'ANGELO attended an open house with the civic action team in AnTan. At the invitation of the Vietnamese, LtCol D'ANGELO represented the MAG-13 Command.

f. 15-21 December: Weekly MEDCAP treated fifty-seven patients. Four Vietnamese were MedEvac to U. S. hospitals. Civic Action Officer met with the newly installed Vietnamese District Chief. CAO attended monthly Wing Civic Action meeting. Civic Action emphasis is on using the Vietnamese political system whenever possible in order to try to show the populace that its government can work for them.

g. 22 December: MAG-13 Civic Action Team held a Christmas Party for the children of Long Phu II. The Staff Club hosted 15 children from that hamlet to a party on base.

h. 23 December: Donated 200 toys to the Village Chief for distribution to a refugee hamlet.

i. 24 December: Civic Action Team hosted a Christmas party at the Chu Lai New Life hamlet for 500 children. The Americal Band presented a Christmas show in An Tan for the surrounding area.

j. 27-31 December: The Civic Action Team met with the principal and teachers of the Chu Lai school to discuss the new school building addition. A project request was submitted to Vietnamese Officials for approval. Weekly MEDCAP treated 42 patients. Three civilians in Ky Lien Village have been given materials for home repairs.

5. Intelligence

a. Continued Intelligence Operations, Briefing and Debriefing of assigned aircrews, and orientation to insure that assigned units receive maximum familiarity with combat conditions in the republic of Vietnam.

b. A general intelligence brief is given each Thursday by the Group Intelligence Officer at 1530 for the Officers and SNCO's of H&MS-13 and MABS-13. Officers and SNCO's of the tactical squadrons are also welcome.

c. The information and materials for intelligence briefs for all ranks of the tactical squadrons is provided by the Group Intelligence Section and is given by the Tactical squadrons Intelligence Officer each week.

d. Intelligence briefs are presented to the Commanding Officer, staff, and Squadron Commanders at the weekly CO's conference.

e. On-the-job training for all intelligence personnel of the Group was conducted on a continuous basis during the entire period.

f. An in country "For Official Use Only" written Intelligence/Counterintelligence briefing for all ranks continued.

g. Classified files were maintained in accordance with OPNAVINST 5510.10 and current applicable directives.

h. Personnel security clearances were processed in accordance with current directives.
