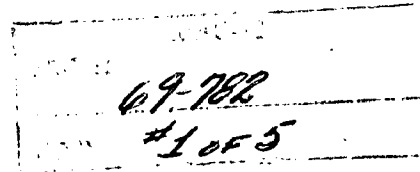

PART TWO: Narrative Summary

Marine Aircraft Group 13 continued its support of III MAF and all other free world Armed Forces in the I Corps Tactical Zone, Laos and the Gulf of Tonkin. Operations supported were Virginia Ridge, Pipestone Canyon, Kentucky Jumper, Lamar Plain, Iron Mountain, Harkimer Mountain, Fredrick Hill, Victory Dragon, Geneva Park, Utah Mesa, Montgomery Rendezvous, Cameron Falls, Forsyth Grove, Iroquois Grove, Apache Snow and Massachusetts Bay. Flying a wide variety of missions, MAG-13 aircraft provided support for the First and Third Marine Divisions, Task Force 77, Attack Force Alpha, Republic of Korea Marines, ARVN forces, 7th Air Force, 5th and 7th Special Landing Force, 101st Airborne Division, Americal Division and other U.S. Army units.

Air-to-ground strikes, consisting of 2,521 sorties, resulted in 985 bunkers destroyed, 162 bunkers damaged, 499 structures destroyed, 100 structures damaged, 5 bridges destroyed, 158 secondary fires, 5 tractors destroyed, 120 KBMA, 124 secondary explosions, 10 50 cal weapons sites destroyed, 9 road cuts, 3 trucks destroyed, 3 trucks damaged, 8 Sampans sunk, 1 dam destroyed, 19 rocket positions destroyed, 18 rockets destroyed and 4 rafts with approximately 1 ton of supplies on board, were sunk.

Fightertown Phantoms logged 114 fighter sorties over the waters off North Vietnam as a Barrier CAP in support of air operations in the Gulf of Tonkin. There were no engagements with enemy aircraft. B-52 escorts accounted for 8 additional sorties during the reporting period.

The 1st MAW missile shoot continued during the month of June with a total of 22 MAG-13 aircraft participating. A total of 17 AIM9B Sidewinders and 4 AIM7E Sparrows were expended.

PART THREE: Significant Events

1. Personnel

During the month of June, Marine Aircraft Group 13 had a loss of nineteen officers and 170 enlisted personnel due to rotation and transfers. During the same period, 34 officers and 190 enlisted personnel reported to this Group for duty.

4. Civic Action

a. A very successful MEDCAP was held in Binh Sa village. All medical work was carried out by Vietnamese doctors and nurses. Transportation and security were supplied by MAG-13. Approximately 325 people were vaccinated or treated.

b. Preparations were made for the MAG-13 Personal Response School to be held in July.

5. Intelligence

a. The S-2 section continued it's mission of briefing and de-briefing all aircrew members.

b. During the month of June 1969, the Chu Lai Air Base came under attack a total of four times, with the MAG-13 Cantonment receiving negative incoming. The first attack took place on 8 June at 0545H. The attack consisted of 5 - 122mm rockets. One round impacted in a ward of the 312th Evac Hospital, resulting in one nurse KIA. This was the first female nurse to be killed in action in Vietnam. Another round impacted in the open, near the USO with negative damage. The remaining three rounds impacted near the USN LOX plant, also with negative damage or casualties. The second attack occurred on 14 June at 1110H, with 8 - 122mm rockets impacting in the following locations: One round near MAG-12, one round near the runway on the MAG-12 flight line, three rounds near the North end of the west runway, one round near position 724, and 2 rounds that could not be located. The third attack, consisting of 3 - 122mm rockets, took place on 20 June at 1600H. Two rounds impacted near MAG-12 and one round that could not be located. The fourth, and most devastating attack, took place on 21 June at 0645H, when 2 - 122mm rockets impacted. One rocket hit the Americal Combat Town Dispensary resulting in 7 KIA's and 14 WIA's. The other round hit the old ammo storage area with negative casualties or damage reported.
