4. Important Visitors to the Command

On 15 September 1969, the MAG-13 Change of Command was attended by Major General W. G. THRASH, Major General G. S. BOWMAN, Brigadier General W. G. JOHNSON, Brigadier General R. H. SPANGER and Brigadier General J. ROBERTS.

Part Two: Narrative Summary

a. Marine Aircraft Group 13 continued its support of III MAF and all other free world armed forces in the I Corps Tactical Zone, Laos and the Gulf of Tonkin.

b. On 7 September VMFA-122 "Red Devils" were relieved by the VMFA-122 "Crusaders".

c. Highlighting the month of September, MAG-13 changed command on 15 September 1969 with Colonel R. S. RASH being relieved by Lieutenant Colonel T. E. MURPHREE. The ceremony held on the MAG-13 flight line was attended by many distinguished guests.

d. On 19 September an F-4B from VMFA-122 received strike damage while attempting a night landing on a wet runway. The RIO ejected and required MEDEVAC while the pilot received minor injuries.

e. On 20 September, an F-4B from VMFA-314, while returning from a combat mission, crashed with both crew members reported KIA. In addition, the crew reported MIA in August 1969, was declared KIA.

Part Three: Significant Events1. Personnel

During the month of September, Marine Aircraft Group 13 had a loss of 19 officers and 218 enlisted personnel due to rotation and transfers. During the same period, 18 officers and 134 enlisted personnel reported to this Group for duty. The VMFA-232 deployment to MCAS Iwakuni included 47 officers and 280 enlisted personnel.

4. Civic Action

- a. A Personal Response School was held at the MAG-13 Special Services building. The lecture included history, religion, customs and communication of attitudes. Approximately seventy-five people attended.

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b. During the week of 19 September, MAG-13 Marines helped in resettling a group of orphans. They had been initially settled north of Chu Lai Base, and were then moved into one of the empty MAG-13 Beach Barracks.

c. On 26 September, the Mid-Autumn Festival was celebrated in the hamlets of Trung An, Vinh An and Hai Ninh. Cookies, candy and Toot-Did were supplied by MAG-13 and propaganda pamphlets were passed out to adults.

5. Morale and Welfare Programs

a. There are presently two Chaplins assigned to MAG-13. They have additional duties of coordinating Chaplin coverage for all Combined Action Platoons in Combined Action Group-1; Episcopal Coverage for Americal Headquarters and Catholic coverage for the Naval Support Activity.

6. Intelligence

a. The S-2 section continued to accomplish its mission of supporting MAG-13 with intelligence information by preparing daily briefs and de-briefs for aircrews.
