4. Important Visitors to the Command

On the 21 February Major General THRASH visited MAG-13. Also a visitor to MAG-13, was Major General BOWEN Jr. who was on hand on February 23 to witness VMFA-115 complete their 10,000th accident free flying hour.

Part Two: Narrative Summary

a. Marine Aircraft Group-13 continued its support of III MAF and all other free world forces in the I Corps Tactical Zone, Laos and the Gulf of Tonkin.

b. On the 6th of February, VMFA-314 lead aircraft, on a flight dropping napalm, received numerous small arms hits, igniting the remaining ordnance and rendering the aircraft uncontrollable. The aircrew ejected with only a minor leg injury being sustained by the pilot.

c. On the night of the 17th of February, an aircraft from VMFA-314 crashed on take-off while making an instrument departure, due to a port engine failure. Both crewmembers ejected safely.

d. On the 12th of February, VMFA-122 was flying a section TPQ with Quang Tri Azrat. When the second aircraft attempted to get into position, it descended into an overcast and contact was lost. The pilot and his radar intercept officer have been declared M. I. A.

e. On the 20th of February, VMFA 314, was flying a night scramble mission under an overcast in the Hoi An Valley. The lead aircraft dropped two napalm cans and immediately the remaining napalm ignited under the aircraft. Both crewmembers ejected safely.

f. On 26 February 1970 an aircraft from VMA-311 was hit by ground fire while attacking a target on a close air support mission. The pilot subsequently was forced to eject, receiving minor injuries.

SECRETPart Three: Significant Events1. Personnel

During the month of February, Marine Aircraft Group-13 had a loss of 6 officers and 119 enlisted personnel due to rotation and transfers. During the same period, 36 officers and 365 enlisted personnel reported to this Group for duty. The VMA-311 change over from Marine Aircraft Group 12 to Marine Aircraft Group-13 included 27 officers and 174 enlisted personnel.

4. Civic Action

a. During the second week of February, the Civil Affairs Team went to Binh Sa Village to deliver three bags of cement which were to be used for rebuilding the hamlet office, which had been extensively damaged earlier by the VC.

b. During the third week of February, the Civil Affairs Team coordinated efforts with Americal PSYOPS and showed two movies concerning sanitation in the hamlets of Vinh-An and Trug-An. After the movies, bars of soap to all children and adults who had attended were handed out.

5. Morale and Welfare Programs

a. There are presently two Chaplains assigned to MAG-13. They have additional duties of coordinating Chaplain coverage of all Combined Action Platoons in Combined Action Group-1; Episcopal coverage for Americal Headquarters and Catholic coverage for the Naval Support Activity. Chaplain PAGE relieved Chaplain CLEVELAND as Group Chaplain on 1 February 1970. Chaplain CARY reported for duty as Group Catholic Chaplain on 18 February 1970.

6. Intelligence

a. The S-2 section continued to accomplish its mission of supporting MAG-13 with intelligence information by preparing daily briefs for air-crews as well as for the Commanding Officer and Executive Officer. All incoming flight personnel received their in-country brief from the SERE Officer. During the month of February a total of seventeen newly arrived crew members were briefed by the S-2 Officer. In addition there were four up-date briefs given to the Security Guard and two indoctrination briefs presented to newly arrived personnel.

b. During the month of February the Chu Lai Air Base perimeter was probed four times with negative results or casualties.
