1. Marine Air Base Squadron 13 continued its support of Marine Aircraft Group 13 and the Air Base at Chu Lai, RVN

PART THREE: SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. Personnel. Fifty-two enlisted and four officers were joined while thirty-one enlisted and two officers were transferred.

2. Administration. There were thirty-eight enlisted persons promoted during this period.

3. Awards. One Meritorious Mast.

4. Casualties. None
5. Morale. Morale remains at a high level.
6. Informational Services. 85 Fleet Home Town News Releases were submitted during June 1968.
7. Ground Defense. The Alert Platoons continued to muster daily. The Perimeter Platoon is still used on the perimeter at night.
8. Training. On the job training is continued in all sections. GIST and technical training programs are being implemented in all sections.
9. Logistics. TAFDS received 3,961,134 gallons and issued 3,899,230 gallons of JP-4 fuel while refueling 2,039 aircraft.
10. Motor Transport.
 - a. The Maintenance Section completed 139 work orders yielding 549 hours of work.
 - b. Licensing Section conducted driver licensing school for 29 students, and gave 29 road tests; issued 29 new license; issued 9 renewal licenses and 11 Heavy Equipment licenses during this period.
 - c. Operations Section compiled the following while traveling 67,891 miles.
 - Cargo Hauled - 1,232 tons
 - Passengers Hauled - 42,774
 - Total runs - 2,230
 - d. Refuelers Section totaled 2,792 miles traveled in delivery the following:
 - Fuel - 553,373 gals
 - Water - 82,000 gals
 - Oil - 2,352 gals
11. Base Development. The Water Point produced 2,110,000 gallons of potable water. Laundry Section washed 30,000 pounds of laundry.
12. Communications. Installation has begun on the new Torn 20 Inter-communication hot line between squadron work centers and the 3M Expediter at Group Supply. The MAG-13 Communication Center handled over 20,000 messages during this period.
