2. General Summary

The wet monsoon curtailed flight operations frequently throughout the month, although every effort was made to accomplish missions in which lives were in jeopardy in spite of the weather. There were many occasions when mission accomplishment depended solely upon the extra effort of determined pilots, such as the resupply and eventual retraction of the combined Army/ARVN unit operating in the mountains near As Hau, and the two retractions of friendly forces caught in flash floods.

The Group was spread across the northern I Corps area, with detachments or units of varying sizes at Khe Sanh, Dong Ha, and Phu Bai, as well as Marble Mountain. Additionally, the TAOR observation commitment for Chu Lai was flown by MAG-16 throughout the month. Spread out as it was, the Group was often faced with extremely limited assets with which to accomplish the support roles requested by the ground forces in the different TAOR's.

MAG-16 received additional support from MAG-36 and the U. S. Army in the form of aircraft and crews, to assist in the fulfillment of our tasks. Army gunship support to our Dong Ha commitment was excellent until 28 November, when it was withdrawn. We could not have recorded the impressive results for the month were it not for the contribution of MAG-36's complement of UH-34's, CH-46's, and UH-1E's.

3. Chronological Summary

1 November - HMM-161, assisted by HMM-265, off-loaded from the USS Iwo Jima due to a change in sailing orders. In the Danang area all flights were of a routine nature. Weather held flight operations to a minimum in the Dong Ha area.

2 November - Operations were routine in our three TAOR's, with the sole significant occurrence being the heavy automatic weapons fire received by the Danang TAOR's medevac UH-34. The aircraft took a single hit, and no casualties, on its approach to the medevac zone.

3 November - Three CH-46's from HMM-164 were scrambled to Phu Bai, where they joined the Sparrow Hawk section prepositioned there. They lifted a company of Marines from 1/4 into an area reported to contain a large number of VC, but the landing was unopposed.

In a separate operation twenty miles southeast of Phu Bai, our O-1C's netted two confirmed and twenty-five probable VC KBA in air strikes.

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The co-pilot in the WMO-6 gunship escort for the Phu Bai medevac was wounded in the leg by enemy fire on a mission ten miles east of Dong Ha.

4 November - The Danang Sparrow Hawk CH-46's launched twice on emergency recon team extractions and were unopposed on both missions, while on a routine extraction, enemy fire was received without incident.

Dong Ha operations were strictly routine resupply missions for 2/5, 3/3, and 3/4.

MAG-16 was called upon to provide CH-46 support to the Air Force SAR North commitment at Quang Tri for an indefinite period of time.

5 November - Three plane divisions of CH-46's from HMM-265 and HMM-164 backloaded 2/2 aboard the USS Valley Forge from Phu Bai.

Although aircraft on missions in the Danang TAOR reported several fire incidents only one hit was received. The medevac UH-34 from HMM-263 drew a hit thirty miles south of Danang and further fire was suppressed by the TH-1E gunship escort. An O-1C on a routine TAOR sweep responded to small arms fire from VC in caves by calling in fixed wing strikes, the results of which are unknown.

6 November - Two WMO-2 UH-1E's carried COMUSMACV to the Third Division CP in the Phu Bai area.

HMM-164 performed an aerial delivery resupply mission in support of I Corps Operation Longstreet.

HMM-265, WMO-2, WMO-6, and the O-1C Detachment pooled efforts in a strike for 3/1 in the Danang TAOR. Light opposition accounted for one hit from small arms fire in one of the landing zones, with no casualties.

In support of a classified US Army operation, Project "D", HMM-265 CH-46's lifted a combined US/ARVN force into a strike zone, and returned five POW's to Khe Sanh.

7 November - The Danang medevac team received hits on two of seven fire incidents, resulting in simultaneous wounding of the WMO-6 escort gunship's pilot and co-pilot. Nearly all fire incidents were in the area of a small pocket of hostile activity about ten miles due south of Danang. An emergency ammunition resupply to the Marine unit in the area was required in the afternoon.

8 November - The Danang medevac team of HMM-263 and WMO-6 delivered a total of over 21,000 rounds of 7.62 and 36 2.75 inch rockets in suppressing enemy fire on nine separate occasions, all of which were in the same general locale ten miles south of Danang. The 263 medevac gunner was wounded in one such incident, and the aircraft received hits on three occasions.

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9 November - Two HMM-163 pilots were wounded on a recon extraction in the Phu Bai area in one of three hit incidents for the squadron. In the Danang area, fire was received on several occasions by aircraft operating near the hot area that developed over the preceding two days. HMM-263 aircraft picked up two hits on medevac and admin flights. Dong Ha operations were normal.

10 November - Over 1300 troops were lifted by our Dong Ha contingent in support of I Corps operation Lam Son on this Marine Corps birthday. In the Danang TAOR missions were back to normal in comparison to the past few days, with no aircraft hit in five fire incidents.

11 November - Our CH-46's at Dong Ha continued support to I Corps operation Lam Son, lifting over 700 ARVN troops on two strikes and a retraction. In the Danang TAOR an armed Huey was used as a TAC(A) to control fixed wing strikes on enemy positions, while a helicopter resupply was in progress. Two H-34's were hit, with the medevac aircraft taking seven hits while waiting in the pickup zone. No injuries were sustained.

12 November - All MAG-16 operations were kept to a minimum due to inclement weather. A small strike force was inserted in the Dong Ha area by HMM-164, and HMM-163 performed an emergency troop retraction when a squad was stranded on a rapidly flooding sandbar.

13 November - Routine operations prevailed in all three TAOR's with the Danang O-1C netting three VC KBA when its rockets struck a VC boat on the SONG VU GIA river.

14 November - On a medevac mission into a zone ten miles south of Danang, where for several days last week our aircraft and crews suffered a number of casualties, the HMM-263 med evac aircraft was downed by hostile fire. A second UH-34 went into the zone immediately to rescue the crew, wounded pilot, and medevacs, and escaped with hits but no injuries while under the protective cover of WMO-2 gunship fire suppression. A third aircraft was sent into the zone for more medevacs after Huey gunships and fixed wing had attempted to neutralize the area, but this aircraft also was hit. Still later in the day another UH-34 was sent to a nearby zone to insert a maintenance team. Fire was taken, and the WMO-6 gunship, in returning the fire, was hit on a gunnery run and crashed in flames. Three of the four crewmembers were killed either by the enemy fire or the crash. The fourth crewmember, Colonel Kenneth L. REUSSER, MAG-16 CO, was rescued by a Marine from a nearby patrol. Colonel REUSSER was taken from the zone to Hill 55 by an armored vehicle, then to the Naval Hospital by helicopter. In the meantime, an H-34 from HMM-163 experienced engine failure south of Phu Bai. All occupants escaped injury as the aircraft crashed into shallow water.

15 November - Operations were curtailed in all TAOR's due to adverse weather conditions. In the Danang area, the medevac received hostile fire on six separate occasions when it was forced to fly at minimum altitude.

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because of lowering ceilings. An HMM-163 crew effected a spectacular rescue of the crew from a sunken swift boat near Phu Bai when one of the helicopter crewmen went into the water to assist the struggling sailors.

16 November - On separate medevac missions, two HMM-163 UH-1H's were hit by enemy fire. The co-pilot and crew chief in the first aircraft both sustained injuries, and the second aircraft sustained strike damage when shot down, however all crew and passengers of this aircraft escaped uninjured. Weather kept MAC-16 flight operations to a minimum.

17 November - Routine operations were curtailed by weather. CINCPACFLT was given a tour of the Operation Prairie area in VMO-2 Hueys.

18 November - Weather again held operations to a minimum. Two CH-46's took hits in the Danang TAOR, the first being within the Danang City limits. The second hit occurred six miles south of Danang, and the aircraft was forced down in a secure landing zone.

19 November - Normal operations were curtailed by weather.

20 November - Normal operations were curtailed by weather. Two CH-46's carried 30,000 pounds of cargo for the ARVN's at Que Son in support of I Corps.

21 November - Extremely bad weather kept flight operations to a minimum, with one notable exception. A large combined force of U. S. Army and Vietnamese troops had been engaged in a classified operation in the mountains west of Phu Bai, and for several days had gone without food and badly needed medical supplies. Finally a weather break was reported over their position, and Lt. Col Warren C. WATSON led a flight of HMM-164 CH-46's to the scene. The resupply was completed in spite of continual harassment from enemy sniper fire, with only one aircraft being hit.

22 November - Routine operations were curtailed by weather.

23 November - Twelve CH-46's from HMM-164 and HMM-265 retracted the combined U. S. Army/ARVN unit operating approximately 25 miles west of Phu Bai to bring Operation Longstreet to a close. There were no incidents in the retraction. In the Danang TAOR, VMO-2 gunships put down effective suppressive fire to neutralize small arms harassing an emergency recon extraction.

24 November - Routine operations were conducted.

25 November - Routine operations were curtailed by weather.

26 November - No operations, due to inclement weather.

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27 November - Weather again held operations to a minimum, however two emergency retractions were performed. The first of these was the evacuation of thirty-four Marines of 1/1 caught in a flash flood on the Hoi An River. HMM-164's CH-46's got the troops off a small sand bar, but were forced to leave two mechanical mules behind, as the river threatened to sweep away the Marines. HMM-263 penetrated instrument weather to snatch a twelve man recon team from a zone in the Nong Song Valley, and returned IFR to Danang without incident.

28 November - Flight operations in the Dong Ha and Phu Bai areas were routine. A break in the Danang area weather permitted the retraction of three recon teams which had been forced to stay in the field several extra days by the recent period of bad weather. The CH-37 Detachment (SU#1) set a record for cargo lifted in a single day. They transported 102,250 pounds of miscellaneous combat equipment, more than on any other day since the Sub Unit has been in Viet Nam.

29 November - At mid-morning, Operation Mississippi kicked off in Antenna Valley south of An Hoa. H&MS-16 O-1C Detachment spotter planes controlled fixed wing strikes to prepare the landing zones, and VMO-23MC-6 Huey gunships escorted waves of CH-46's from HMM-164 and HMM-265 as they carried in assault troops of 3/7 and 2/5. The lift was harrassed throughout by enemy snipers, and the weather prevented effective use of fixed wing for fire suppression. One of the CH-46 crewmen was slightly injured when his aircraft was hit by sniper fire, and one of the assault troops was seriously wounded in the same aircraft.

30 November - Operation Mississippi support continued in spite of lowering ceilings which produced an increased number of fire incidents, but no hits. Air support for the operation was largely routine, as it was for units operating throughout the other TAOR's.

5. Civic Action.

a. Medical. Eighteen scheduled sickcalls were held in Son Thuy and at the Catholic Dispensary. There were three thousand six hundred and twenty six people treated. Four Vietnamese civilians are now being trained as rural health workers. The Naval Hospital had fifty Vietnamese patients, thirty-one of these were for major surgery. They now have sixty-seven Vietnamese out-patients. Medcap patrols are continuing in the hamlets of Hoa Long Village, and the preventive medicine section has sprayed the Catholic complex three times for fly control. MCB-5 has given one hundred and fifty immunizations in My Thi Hamlet, and MCB-6's dispensary in Son Thuy-1 has treated one thousand nine hundred and eighty-four medical patients and nine dental patients. MCB-5's dispensary in My Thi Hamlet has two thousand two hundred and thirty-two medical patients and twenty-five dental patients. MCB-5 referred three Vietnamese to the Naval Hospital for major surgery. There have been seven thousand nine hundred and fifty-four medical patients treated and thirty-four dental patients treated this month in Hoa Long Village.

b. Education. Fifth Comm distributed text books to the school in Da Man Hamlet. MAG-16's doctor and the school teacher lectured the school children of Son Thuy-2 on personal hygiene and sanitation. MCB-5 held fifty-six hours of English classes, with five hundred and ninety-one students. MCB-6 held thirty-three hours of English classes, with eight students. MCB-5 contributed twenty pounds of paper to the school in My Thi Hamlet.

c. Projects. MAG-16 provided twelve gallons of paint to the Catholic complex to paint the new addition to the orphanage. A combined working party of Vietnamese and Marines from MAG-16 painted and hung doors and shutters on the sickcall building in Son Thuy-2. MCB-5 has completed the

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new three room school in My Thi Hamlet. MCB-6 has completed the construction of a grist mill in Song Thuy-1. Fifth Comm and the people of Da Man Hamlet are repairing and painting the hamlet school.

d. Government. Mr. Hoa is still working as the acting Village Chief of Hoa Long Village. District Headquarters has not yet appointed a new Village Chief.

e. Population Control. The refugees who had been living in the Marble Mountain area have moved to the refugee center at BT051789, at the request of the Village Chief. This was necessary due to the lack of security and control where they had been living.

f. Give Away Program. MAG-16 gave two hundred pounds of children's clothing to the Catholic Orphanage. Forty pounds of soap was distributed to the people of Son Thuy-2. MCB-6 distributed sixty bars of soap, seventeen pounds of candy, and seventy-five pounds of clothing to the people of Son Thuy-1. MCB-5 distributed one hundred and twenty-one bars of soap to the people of My Thi Hamlet.

g. Civic Action Area. On 28 November a meeting was held with the Civic Action Officers of MAG-16, First Marine Aircraft Wing, and First Division. Colonel MOORE represented the First Division, Colonel JOHNSON and Major MORLEY represented the First Marine Aircraft Wing. This meeting was to decide who would be responsible for the Son Thuy area. It was decided that MAG-16 will retain Son Thuy due to continuity of presence in the area.

h. MAG-16 Chaplain's Civic Action Programs:

(1) Work on the "Boys Town" school resumed, and MAG-16 Chaplains donated 400 bags of cement, 400 sheets of tin, three cartons of roofing nails, and occasionally, a truck to help construction. A donation of 11,800 Piasters was made also.

(2) Bishop Chi received \$100 to help purchase a 16mm projector for the Seminary.

(3) Six cases of clothing were given to the Catholic Orphanage.

(4) The Vietnamese Education Scholarship Board met to plan expanded work, and gave out 24 more scholarships at Hoi An.

## c. General

## 1. Dong Ha and Phu Bai

Chaplain GRAMM is covering activities at Phu Bai. In addition he helps out with services at FLSU 2. Division Chaplains are providing services at Dong Ha.

## 2. Chapel

A full schedule of services is under way in the new chapel, though it is not finished. Both clerks are working nearly full time on the chapel to help finish it for dedication next month. Chairs and pews have arrived. Trips to Okinawa and Hong Kong have provided many necessities: piano, lights, carpeting, sound system, plastic sheets, etc..

3. Attendance at all services has shown a steady increase since moving to the new chapel. Several services have been added, including Sunday School, daily prayer group, and Sunday Evening Fellowship.

7. Intelligence/Counter Intelligence.

a. The S-2 officer participated in the planning of a two company heliborne assault with 3rd Bn, 1st Marines, which went off smoothly. Credit must be given to the joint air/ground planning.

b. The S-2 Officer participated in Wing-level Helicopter Vulnerability Study.

c. On 8 November a Navy expert on escape and evasion procedures, Lt. SCHLAFF, presented a most informative briefing on current procedures to Group staff and Squadron officers.

d. The Intelligence section was inspected by G-2, and performed A&M inspections of F4M-164.

e. The Intelligence section participation in Operation Mississippi.

f. Enemy initiated ground incidents and attacks were at an unusually low level in I Corps during the month, but fire incidents against MAC-16 aircraft remained at a fairly high level. Relevant statistics are presented below:

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SECRET9. Air Control.

a. On 29 November, MATCU-68 moved PAR radar to Dong Ha and Khe Sanh. In two days, both facilities were in operation and awaiting flight checks.

b. MATCU-68 personnel, augmented by MABS-16 personnel, continued to assume responsibility for the MAG-16 compound at Hue Phu Bai.

c. The units at Marble Mountain, Hue Phu Bai, Dong Ha, and Khe Sanh conducted 12,541; 11,456; 15,398; and 3,223 operations respectively. Of these conducted at Hue Phu Bai, 2,145 were instrument operations and 504 GCI's.

10. Ground Defense. No probes were experienced during the month. A revision of the ground defense organization was effected on 17 November 1966. A ground defense officer for the Marble Mountain Air Facility has been assigned as a special staff officer. He will coordinate ground defense functions for the air facility and advise the single manager, Marble Mountain Air Facility concerning ground defense problems. A provisional rifle company and an internal security section provides the ground defense requirements for the air facility under the staff of the ground defense officer. Continued emphasis has been placed upon the coordination between ground defense and the construction program.

11. Motor Transport. Support was provided in the form of road improvement, transportation of water, men and materials and for command and administrative liaison for a combined total of 39,315 miles. Twenty-five vehicles are deployed at the outlying sites and a total of ten vehicles are presently on deadline.

12. TAFDS. Continued to support Operation Prairie.

13. Crash Crew. Three enlisted were TAD to this section from Marine Air Base Squadron 11, for Khe Sanh, five enlisted were assigned to Phu Bai Airport, and five enlisted were assigned to Dong Ha Airport. Because of the widespread commitments, additional personnel have been requested. Equipment assigned during the period consisted of seven MB-5 crash fire trucks (two of which were down for engines and one of which was down for survey) one M-530B structural fire truck, and two dry chemical airlift (Ansul) units mounted on M-35A1 trucks. Distribution of these vehicles was:

(1) Marble Mountain Air Facility: Four MB-5 trucks (two operational) and one M-530B truck.

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(2) Phu Bai Airport: Two MB-5 trucks (one operational).

(3) Dong Ha Airport: One MB-5 truck and one ansul unit, M-35A1 mounted.

(4) Khe Sanh: One ansul unit, M-35A1 mounted.

Again due to the widespread commitments, additional vehicles and equipment have been requested. There were six minor incidents involving aircraft mishaps and two minor vehicle/structural fires. There were no **injuries** to personnel or serious damage to equipment or property.

14. Base Operations/Weather: Continued to provide weather service at three sites. A teletype machine was installed at Phu Bai. Plans were made to provide weather service at Khe Sanh early in December 1966.

15. Food Services: The Marble Mountain Air Facility Mess served approximately 171,000 regular and 11,250 night ration meals. Early chow hours averaged 0300 to 0530 and late chow hours averaged 1900 to 2030. At the Marble Mountain Mess the ceiling was completed, six new ice machines, seven cast iron ranges, and four refrigerated salad lines were received. Taped music is now played over the sound system. Three cooks were detached and fourteen cooks joined. The 500 man mess hall at Dong Ha is scheduled to open on 9 December 1966. Plans have been made and construction started to expand the Phu Bai Mess to accommodate 500 men.

16. Base Development/Utilities:

a. Generator Shop. The generator shop serviced and made minor and major repairs on the generators to maintain 470KW output for the Group, with little down time or power loss in any area. Lack of spare or back up generators necessitates the transfer of a generator from a less critical area to an area of higher priority when a generator does go down.

b. Laundry. The laundry processed 27,950 pounds of clothing during this period. Correspondence was initiated requesting a washer to immediately replace the washer which may break down at any time.

c. Water Point. The water point purified 703,180 gallons of potable water during the month.

d. Refrigeration Shop. During the month of November the refrigeration shop made minor repairs, conducted preventive maintenance and serviced various refrigeration units within the Group. The Ice House produced 24,400 pounds of ice during the month.

e. Sign Shop. The sign shop made and painted 111 signs of various sizes for use in the four contonements. The Group Commander's hut and the Barber Shop were also painted during this period.

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f. Plumbing Shop. Plumbing shop pumped leach beds and ran the shower unit daily for 28 days, answered 4 trouble calls and completed 13 work orders, and ran new sewage lines and put plumbing in Officers/Staff shower and new Barber Shop. The Mess Hall leach beds have been condemned by the MMAF Medical Officer but 30th NCR cannot and will not upgrade our priority for constructing new leach beds. As an interim measure, sludge is being pumped by sand hog through approximately 200 yards of salvaged TAFDS hose out into the South China Sea.

g. Electric Shop. There were 50 trouble calls of various descriptions answered throughout the MMAF cantonment. Rewiring of the Officers Shower, Barber Shop, Air Freight, Marine Supply, Special Services, CH-37C Motor Transport, Communication Officers Office, 15 living quarters, and wiring of the Chapel was started. New panel boards were installed at the Officers/Staff generators and CH-37C Det.

h. Carpenter Shop. Throughout November numerous partitions, doors, and steps were manufactured and installed. There were fifteen office items constructed. The following structures were constructed or re-modeled: Barber Shop, Group Commanding Officers living quarters, Officers shower, five tin huts, water tower and runway tower, gate house, extension on Special Services, and forms for extension on Officers Club. Three huts were relocated and converted to tin. Construction continued on Base Chapel.

17. Exchange. Gross sales at the exchange totaled \$44,066.75. The concessionaire, James S. LEE Tailor's gross sales totaled \$4,107.15. Consolidating the enlisted and officer's barber shops doubled the size of the concessionaire's sales room.

#### 18. Logistics

(a) The fourth and last wall has been completed.

(b) Air freight processed by organic aircraft during the period was as follows:

#### 19. Communications:

a. The wire section installed an alert/interphone system for Group Supply, going from the Navy Supply Office to each Squadron Material section.

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b. Switch Boards were relocated in the Jamesway shelter in order to make room for a central telephone mainframe to be installed in December.

c. Telephone service to the west apron, G-4 Hospital, and Naval Construction Battalions was disrupted from 18-21 November when the 112 pair cable servicing that area was inadvertently destroyed in the construction of the runway extension. The wire section aided by the "Flamingo" Air Force detachment and a backhoe bulldozer from MCB-5 relaid the cable and restored service in four days with little or no sleep. Over 1000 feet of 50 pair cable was laid both under and above ground. Five telephone poles were set for the overhead span.

d. Message traffic for the month decreased slightly to 3,500 messages. Approximately 1100 of these were outgoing.

e. The following transactions were affected by the Repair Section:

- (1) 138 pieces of equipment
- (2) 4 pieces to higher echelon maintenance
- (3) 3 pieces returned from higher echelon maintenance
- (4) 105 pieces returned to sections
- (5) 166 requisitions processed
