2. General Summary

22 MAG-16 supported operations in all TAOR's with the heaviest emphasis being placed in the Dong Ha and Phu Bai areas.

b. During July, HMM-265 replaced HMM-164 on the SLF with HMM-164 assuming the CH-46 role at Phu Bai. HMM-361 replaced HMM-363 at Dong Ha, and HMM-363 assumed the UH-34 role at Marble Mountain Air Facility.

3. Chronological Summary

1 July - Operations were normal in all TAOR's.

2 July - Two armed UH-1E's from VMO-2 suffered battle damage and one crewman was WIA in the Dong Ha operating area. Operations in all other TAOR's were normal.

3 July - Dong Ha came under mortar/artillery attack at 0500H. Three (3) armed UH-1E's, three (3) UH-34's damaged, two (2) WIA, eleven (11) injured. Operations in all TAOR's were normal after the attack.

4 July - One (1) CH-53A from HMM-463 was hit by enemy fire, twelve (12) miles south of Danang, no injuries. Operations in the Dong Ha and Phu Bai areas were normal.

5 July - Dong Ha received a short artillery attack at 0330H. No damage to MAG-16 area. Dong Ha was hit again between 1750H and 1830H. No damage to MAG-16 assets. Operations in other TAOR's normal.

6 July - Dong Ha came under mortar/artillery fire at 1740H. No damage. Dong Ha came under fire again at 2005H, 2115H, 2125H and 2250H. No damage to MAG-16 assets. SAM sightings were reported. Two VMO-2 armed UH-1E's were hit by enemy fire nine (9) miles northwest of Dong Ha, one crewmember WIA. The HMM-361 medevac H-34 was hit by enemy fire four (4) miles southwest of Danang, one crewmember WIA. A VMO-2 UH-1E was hit by enemy fire 25 miles southwest of Danang, no casualties. Operations in the Phu Bai area were normal.

7 July - An O-1C was hit by enemy fire eight (8) miles northwest of Dong Ha, no injuries. Operations in the Danang and Phu Bai areas were normal.

8 July - Dong Ha came under mortar/artillery attack at 1330H. Three (3) UH-1E's, ten (10) UH-34's, APS antenna, fuel bags and hoses damaged, one WIA. Dong Ha came under fire again at 1730H - no damage. A HMM-361 UH-34 received enemy fire in the Nong Son area - no casualties. Operations in the Phu Bai area were normal.

9 July - Operations were normal in all TAOR's. VMO-2 UH-1E'S participated in the Secretary of Defense party tour of I Corps.

10 July - Dong Ha came under attack at 0150H, three (3) UH-34's damaged, two (2) WIA. A VMO-3 armed UH-1E was hit by enemy fire five (5) miles northwest of Phu Bai, one crewmember WIA. Operations in the Danang area were normal.

11 July - A HMM-163 UH-34 was hit by enemy fire four (4) miles north of Phu Bai, no casualties. Operations in all TAOR's were normal.

12 July - HMM-265 replaced HMM-164 on the SLF with HMM-164 assuming the CH-46 role at Phu Bai. Operations were normal in all TAOR's.

13 July - Operations were normal in all TAOR's.

14 July - A HMM-163 CH-53 was hit by enemy fire while climbing out from Khe Sanh. One passenger WIA. Operations in all TAOR's were normal.

15 July - Danang AB came under rocket attack at 0025H. MAG-16 furnished medevac helicopters and placed armed UH-1E's on alert for possible reaction. Operations in all TAOR's were normal during the rest of the day.

16 July - Operations were normal in all TAOR's.

17 July - A HMM-361 UH-34 was hit by enemy fire ten (10) miles south of Danang, no casualties. Operations were normal in all TAOR's.

18 July - Operations in all TAOR's were normal.

19 July - A HMM-361 UH-34 was hit by enemy fire nine (9) miles southwest of Danang, no casualties. MAG-16 units based at Phu Bai dispersed four (4) CH-46's, five (5) UH-1E's, twelve (12) UH-34's to MMAF overnight due to increased state of alert at Phu Bai.

20 July - Three (3) VMO-3 UH-1E's, two (2) HMM-164 CH-46's were hit by enemy fire while supporting an ARVN troop lift along the "Street Without Joy" - two (2) crewmembers WIA. Operations in the Dong Ha and Danang areas were normal. Dispersal of aircraft from Phu Bai took place overnight again.

21 July - HMM-361 relieved HMM-363 at Dong Ha, with HMM-363 assuming the UH-34 role at MMAF. One (1) HMM-164 CH-46 was hit by enemy fire five (5) miles northeast of Khe Sanh, no casualties. Three HMM-164 CH-46's and one (1) VMO-3 UH-1E were hit by enemy fire approximately 25 miles northwest of Phu Bai, no casualties. A VMO-2 UH-1E was hit by enemy fire seven (7) miles south of Danang, no casualties.

22-24 July - Operations were normal in all TAOR's.

25 July - Two (2) HMM-363 UH-34's were hit by enemy fire approximately 18 miles southeast of Danang. There were no casualties. Operations in all other TAOR's were normal.

25 July - A HMM-361 UH-34 was hit by moderate small arms fire five (5) miles northwest of Dong Ha, the pilot was WIA. Dong Ha came under an artillery attack at 1910H. Six (6) rounds were received with no damage or personnel casualties to MAG-16. Operations in the Phu Bai area were normal. A HMM-363 UH-34 was hit by enemy fire four (4) miles southeast of Danang, no casualties.

27 July - Dong Ha came under artillery attack at 0330H, 1115H, 1705H and 2235H. One (1) UH-1E and one (1) UH-34 received minor shrapnel damage. There were no casualties among MAG-16 personnel. Operations in the Phu Bai area were normal. A VMO-2 UH-1E was hit by enemy fire three (3) miles south of Danang, no casualties.

28 July - Dong Ha came under artillery attack at 0200H and 0645H, no damage or casualties. A VMO-3 UH-1E was hit by heavy enemy fire northwest of Dong Ha, the AO was WIA. A HMM-164 CH-46 crashed and burned shortly after take-off from Phu Bai. The crew of four and one passenger escaped with minor injuries. The aircraft was destroyed. Operations in the Danang area were normal.

29 July - In the Dong Ha area, four (4) VMO-3 UH-1E's were hit by enemy fire approximately 11 miles northwest of Dong Ha, one gunner WIA. An O-1C was hit by .50Cal in the same area, no injuries. Operations in the Phu Bai area were normal. A HMM-363 UH-34 hit a tree in a medevac pickup zone approximately 13 miles southwest of Danang just before midnight. No injuries, and damage was limited to the rotor blades.

30 July - At approximately 0130H a HMM-363 UH-34 crashed into trees while attempting take-off from a medevac pickup zone 13 miles southwest of Danang. There were no injuries, but the aircraft was a strike. Operations in the Phu Bai area were normal. A HMM-164 CH-46 crashed and burned 11½ miles northwest of Dong Ha, the crew of four KIA.

31 July - Operations were normal in all TAOR's

4. Civic Action

a. Medical. A total of 13 sick calls were held by MAG-16 corpsmen, treating 547 patients. 5th Comm Bn corpsmen held 4 sick calls, treating 595 patients. Doctors and corpsmen from MCB-7 treated 389 patients. MCB-133 medical personnel treated 788 medical patients and 47 dental patients.

At station hospital, 82 Vietnamese civilians were admitted as beneficiaries of the Civic Action Program, 49 were major surgery cases. An additional 175 received out-patient treatment. Sick call was held on Monday morning at the dispensary provided by Stella Maris Convent, treating 1070 patients. The neuro-surgeon and ENT section personnel held consultations at Danang Civilian Hospital.

A team composed of two (2) volunteer corpsmen treated 18,772 civilians in various hamlets south of Danang.

The rodent control program and insecticide fogging program are continuing.

Dental sick call was held on Monday and Thursday mornings, treating 193 civilians.

b. Education. MAG-16 held 4 hours of English instruction for 477 students. MCB-7 held 14 hours of English instruction for 256 students. One hour of Vietnamese language instruction was given to the men of MCB-7.

c. Projects. A meeting was held at MAG-16 to discuss plans for the leper colony to be established at Marble Mountain. MAG-16 has been using 30 local villagers to fill sandbags and build bunkers at MMAF. There are plans to convert an old bunker in My Thi hamlet for MedCap use.

MCB-7 started a foot care program for 130 children. This project is being run with the cooperation of a US manufacturer and a Stateside Civic Group. A birth control program is awaiting approval from the Danang government authorities.

MCB-133 continued construction of a new Civic Action building in their area. One man repaired a vehicle belonging to the local Baptist Mission. MCB-133 has hired one full-time and two part-time Civic Action workers.

d. Giveaway. MAG-16 donated 3000\$VN to the family of a health worker killed by the VC. 5th Comm Bn donated 15 gallons of Myathline to aid in worm control. They also donated 50 gallons of gasoline to Sacred Heart Convent/Orphanage for the school generator.

MCB-7 donated 3000\$VN each to the schoolmaster and teacher to supplement their June and July salaries. It is planned to supplement each teachers salary by 1500\$VN monthly, the money to come from the chapel fund. The old sick bay in My Thi was donated to the village for use as a library and religious affairs office. Book donations are planned. Six loads of scrap lumber were donated to the poorest village families.

MCB-133 distributed 20 pounds of food, 185 pounds of clothing, 20 bars of soap, 40 tooth brushes and tubes of tooth paste to members of Son Thuy II village.

e. Government. A meeting of all unit Civic Action Officers and local village Chiefs was held at MMAF.

f. Summary. The AWC, 1stMAW, conducted a walk-through of the MAG-16 Civic Action area. The Vietnamese residing in the various hamlets visited by the General seemed to be pleased by the visit.

6. Intelligence/Counterintelligence. During the month of July, MAG-16 flew 10,764.7 hours and experienced the usual amount of fire incidents and resulting damage to aircraft. 208 fire incidents were reported, 22.1% of which were hits. On the average, MAG-16 flew 51.8 hours per fire incident and 234.2 hours per hit. Aircraft crews submitted 272 spot reports for 39.6 flight hours per report.

10. Motor Transport. The Marble Mountain section travelled 77,739 miles during the month, hauled 1,242,200 gallons of water, 33,600 gallons of Mogas, 75,600 gallons of diesel fuel, 57,451 passengers, 3,325 gallons of aircraft oil and 74,732 gallons of JP-4. The Phu Bai/Dong Ha section travelled 21,189 miles, hauled 613,700 gallons of water, 8,000 gallons of diesel fuel and 4,500 gallons of aircraft oil.

* On the morning of 15 July one MB-5 truck with a crew of six (6) men was sent to Danang AB to aid in extinguishing aircraft fires started by the rocket attack. The crew assisted in putting out ten (10) fires. The truck and crew remained at Danang Air Force Crash-Rescue Unit until 19 July when Air Force replacements arrived.

13. Base Operations. Base Operations continued to support tenant squadrons and visiting aircraft utilizing the airfields at MMAF, Phu Bai, Dong Ha and Khe Sanh. The new Control Tower was put into operation at MMAF.

14. Weather Service. The weather section supported all flight operations of MAG-16 aircraft in the I Corps area during July.

15. Food Services

a. MMAF. There were approximately 215,000 meals fed at the MMAF messhall during the reporting period. Bakery products utilized approximately 24,000 pounds of flour. The sewage system has been completed.

b. Phu Bai. There were approximately 77,800 A-ration meals and 7,350 B-ration meals served at the Phu Bai messhall. Bakery products utilized approximately 3,600 pounds of flour.

c. Dong Ha. There were approximately 26,450 A-ration meals and 3,700 B-ration meals served at the Dong Ha messhall. Bakery products utilized approximately 2,400 pounds of flour.

16. Base Development/Utilities

a. Water Point. The water point personnel processed 1,210,065 gallons of potable water and 32,135 gallons of non-potable water during the month of July. Other various units were issued 72,900 gallons of water during this period.

b. Paint Shop. A total of forty-nine (49) signs were painted during the month of July. In addition the paint shop personnel repainted the Utility Sections building and are currently repainting the messhall.

c. Electric Shop. The Electric Shop completed seventeen (17) projects and numerous trouble calls during the month of July.

d. Plumbing Shop. During the month of July two (2) work requests and numerous trouble calls were completed.

e. Refrigeration Shop. Refrigeration personnel answered eight (8) trouble calls during the month of July. A close watch was held on units located at sick bay and the messhall.

f. Generator Shop. During the month of July the generator shop performed all first and second echelon maintenance with a minimum of breakdown.

g. Carpenter Shop. Approximately sixty-six (66) trouble calls and work assignments were completed by the carpenter shop personnel.

h. Laundry. During the month of July the laundry processed approximately 26,000 pounds of clothing.

i. Progress Report for Phu Bai and Dong Ha. The Utility Sections at both Phu Bai and Dong Ha were supported and supplied by Marble Mountain. Continuous improvement and development of both airfields prevailed.

17. Exchange. During the month of July, the Exchange sales were \$64,321.25. Sales for James S. Lee were \$2,457.55. Sales for Seahan Photo Service were \$1,788.95. Sales for the newly acquired Kim Young portrait section of the exchange were \$173.00

18. Logistics. Air Freight processed the following from MMAF during July:

19. Communications

a. The new control tower was wired and put into operation. Wire Section laid 1500 feet of messenger cable in preparation for the installation of overhead cable at MMAF. Eleven (11) pairs of cable were laid in the MMAF area. These cable pairs replaced the radio relay to 1stMAW.

b. Radio communications remained good. Radio personnel were utilized by H&MS-16 for aircraft recovery team operations on two (2) occasions.

c. Total volume of messages processed was 7685, of which 1567 were originated by MAG-16. Down time in the message center increased due to non-availability of spare parts.
