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PART IINarrative Summary for October 1968

During October, MAG-16 flew mainly in support of the 1st MARDIV. Other commitments included support of III MAF, 3rd MARDIV, ROKMC, Special Forces and Navy units. MAG-16 aircraft participated in the following Operations: Victory Dragon III, Mameluke Thrust, Maui Peak, Burlington Trail, Henderson Hill and Wheeler/Wallowa.

Statistically MAG-16 flew 7,468.7 hours, accumulating 20,201 sorties, carrying 33,414 passengers and 3,542.4 tons of cargo. CH-53 aircraft lifted 16 downed helicopters to maintenance facilities. Six of these were recovered from the field. The CH-46s flew 1,790 hours primarily on re-supply and troop lift missions. The versatile UH-1Es flying gunship escort, firefly, airborne personnel detection, VIP, visual reconnaissance, and command and control missions amassed 2,274 hours.

Oct. 1st: A HMM-362 UH-34D attempting a hoist medevac pickup at coordinate AT911375 was destroyed as a result of enemy action, all crewmembers escaped without injury. (HMM-362 Command Chronology, Part IV 00936-68).

3rd: An engine failure caused one CH-46 from HMM-164 to land in a stream bed at coordinate ZC173834. Crew members were rescued without injury; however, the aircraft was considered unsalvageable due to location and the close proximity of enemy forces. (HMM-164 Command Chronology, Part III 00930-68).

5th: HML-167 gunships and an OV-10A from VMO-2 joined forces to rescue an Air Force pilot who had ejected from an F-4. The pilot located on Charlie Ridge, an area heavily populated by enemy troops reported he was under fire from the West. Captain JEFFRIES maneuvered his UH-1E into a hover and the Air Force pilot was hauled aboard by the crew chief and the gunner as Captain JEFFRIES lifted the helicopter from the confined zone. (HML-167 Command Chronology, 0924-68). Though the second UH-1E provided suppressive fire, the rescue aircraft was hit by several bursts of A/W fire.

8th: A MAG-16 Civic Action vehicle was destroyed by a satchel charge, wounding the driver, PFC D. H. SICHER who lost his left forearm. The attack took place while MABS-16 Medical Team was on a MEDCAP Mission at Hoa Long Village dispensary. (Civic Action Command Chronology, Item E).

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9th: Marine combat artist Major Albert LEAHY flew in a VMO-2 OV-10A to photograph and sketch the 1st MARDIV TAOR. (VMO-2 Command Chronology, Part IV 0925-68).

10th: A HMM-165 CH-46 was shot down while attempting a reconnaissance team insertion. The crew sustained minor injuries and the aircraft was destroyed by fire. Another CH-46 in the flight picked up the crew and troops. (HMM-165 Command Chronology, 0935-68).

11th: A CH-46 from HMM-265 and a UH-34 from HMM-362 collided in the air over coordinate AT793545. All occupants of the aircraft were killed. (HMM-362 Command Chronology, 00936-68 Part II and VMO-2 Command Chronology, Part IV 0925-68).

22nd: At approximately 1005H a VMO-2 OV-10A was shot down and crashed at coordinate AT992554 while in a target marking run. A VMO-2 gunship landed immediately and recovered the pilot's remains. A reaction force was lifted to the area and after an extensive search found the body of the Aerial Observer. (VMO-2 Command Chronology, Part IV 0925-68).

29th: HMM-463 was presented the U.S. Navy Meritorious Unit Award by LtGen L. W. WALT. The award was presented for squadron performance during the period 15 September 1967 to 31 October 1967 in support of Operation KING FISH at Con Thien. (HMM-463 Command Chronology, Part IV 0927-68).

30th: The throttle control cable on a HMM-362 UH-34D was shot away on lift off from a medevac zone, the crew chief receiving minor shrapnel wounds. The aircraft was flown to An Hoa and a full autorotative landing was safely accomplished. (HMM-362 Command Chronology, Part IV 0936-68).

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5. Civic Action. (MAG-16 Civic Action Command Chronology)

a. Medical/Dental. During the month of October 1968, doctors and corpsman from MAG-16 assisted at the Stella Maris Dispensary/Orphanage, and the Hoa Long Village Dispensary. In their continuing effort to win the trust and confidence of the local populace, the medical department treated 1754 patients and gave checkups to MAG-16 Vietnamese employees. One hundred and seventy-nine villagers were given dental care during the month of October.

b. Education. The Civic Action Officer presented 9 "General Walt" Scholarships to students at the Hoa Long primary school. Seven (7) children whose parents work aboard Marble Mountain Air Facility also received funds.

c. Projects. On a long-term project a Vietnamese girl from Nui Kim Son hamlet worked at MAG-16's dispensary as a nurses aid. The MAG-16 medical staff provided training in proper medical practices and procedures so that eventually the girl will be able to assist her own people in Nui Kim Son.

On 25 October 1968, the MAG-16 Civic Action officer in conjunction with HMH-463 Commanding Officer, distributed twenty-one (21) boxes of assorted school supplies to the Hoa Long school and to refugee children. These supplies were made available through the Captain DEETZ Memorial Fund.

Captain DEETZ was a pilot in HMH-463 and was killed in the spring of 1968 when his aircraft crashed into a mountain while returning to MAG-16 from Phu Bai.

6. Intelligence/Counterintelligence. (MAG-16 S-2 Command Chronology)
During the month of October 1968, 295 fire incidents were reported to MAG-16 S-2 by pilots returning from combat operations. The October figure represents a decrease of thirty-five (35) fire incidents reported from September's figure of 330. Seventy (70) of the 295 reports indicated that the aircraft had been hit by enemy fire. This was an increase of six (6) aircraft hit from the month of September.

Enemy small arms, 30 caliber and 50 caliber ground fire was credited with wounding six (6) crewmen and five (5) passengers (3 U.S., 2 ARVN) in MAG-16 aircraft. There was strong suspicion that ground fire also killed one pilot whose aircraft crashed. However, due to the condition of the body upon recovery, the autopsy performed was unable to determine the exact cause of death.

a. Flight hours per fire incident: 25.3, up .7 from September.

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b. Flight hours per aircraft hit: 106.5, down 20.2 from September.

c. Flight hours per aircrew spot report: 94.3 down 58.8 from September
 Ordnance fired by MAG-16 aircraft resulted in fifteen (15) confirmed KBA;
 ten (10) structures destroyed and three (3) structures damaged.

9. Special Operations. (MAG-16 S-3 Records)

a. Operation VICTORY DRAGON III was supported by MAG-16 based aircraft on 1-13, 15 and 16-31 October for a total of 661.1 hours; and 3,369 passengers/troops and 439.9 tons of cargo were carried. This was accomplished in 2,556 sorties.

b. Operation MAMELUKE THRUST was supported by helicopters from Marine Aircraft Group 16 on 3, 5, 20, 22-26 October. During this period, MAG-16 aircraft carried 1468 passengers/troops, 191.6 tons of cargo and made 677 sorties. This was accomplished in 132.8 hours.

c. During the month of October, MAUI PEAK was supported on 8 thru 11 and 17 thru 21 October. MAG-16 aircraft flew a total of 628 sorties, for 184.0 hours while carrying 1,391 passengers/troops and 145.1 tons of cargo.

d. MAG-16 aircraft supported the U.S. Army in Operation BURLINGTON TRAIL on 21 October. They flew 6 sorties and carried 3 passengers, carried 0.3 tons of cargo and flew 2.6 hours.

e. Operation HENDERSON HILL was supported on the 25th, 27th and 31st of October. MAG-16 aircraft flew 108.6 hours logging 553 sorties, carrying 1291 troops/passengers and 81.1 tons of cargo.

f. Operation WHEELER/WALLOWA was supported on the 17th and 19th of October by MAG-16 aircraft for a total of 12.3 hours logging 36 sorties and lifting 15.5 tons of cargo.

10. Ground Defense. (MABS-16 Command Chronology)

a. In October, additional bunkers were built and defense positions were improved throughout MAG-16's area. The installation of perimeter observation towers was completed. Ground defense platoons were mustered and trained to maintain MAG-16's Quick-Reaction defense capability.

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11. Logistics. (MAG-16 S-4 Command Chronology)

- a. The joint Marine/Army ammunition storage area is 90% completed.
- b. Work continues on the crosswind runway which is 80% completed.

12. Communications. A radio relay link was established between An Hoa Airfield and MAG-16, via Wing, creating a direct phone communications circuit. At the same time a radio net (Helicopter Liaison Net) was established between the 5th and 7th Marine Regiments and the COC Bunker at MAG-16 for closer ground-air coordination.



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



COMMUNICATIONS: Personnel gains kept pace with personnel losses during this period. Currently a shortage exists of Communications Center and Wire personnel; however, by cross-training personnel from the Radio Section, the Message Center and Wire Section continue to operate efficiently. Total volume of messages handled by the MAG-16 Communications Center was 8,348, an increase of 1,665 from the previous period. 100 hours of down time was experienced during the month due to faulty equipment.

The following transactions were effected by the Repair Section:

1. 232 items of equipment processed.
2. 219 items of equipment returned to sections.
3. 8 items of equipment evacuated to higher echelon of maintenance.
4. 5 items of equipment were returned from higher echelon of maintenance.
5. 43 requisitions processed by supply.

A radio relay link was established between AN HOA airfield and MAG-16, via Wing, creating a direct phone communications circuit. At the same time a radio net (Helicopter Liaison Net) was established between the 5TH and 7TH Marine Regiments and the COC bunker at MAG-16 for closer Infantry-Air coordination.

1. In accordance with reference (a), the following statistics represent civic action accomplishments by MAG-16 during the period 10001H to 312400H October, 1968.

A. Medical/Dental Treatment

(1) The doctors and corpsmen of MAG-16 assisted the following dispensaries and orphanages during this reporting period:

- (a) Stella Maris dispensary/orphanage
- (b) Hoa Long dispensary

(2) Medical treatment was rendered to 1,754 persons during October.

(3) One hundred and seventy-nine (179) villagers were given dental aid.

(4) MEDCAP at the Hoa Long Dispensary continues to win the support of the people. Since 3rd Amtrac Bn. no longer gives assistance at the dispensary, MAG-16 has been having an increase of patients on Tuesdays and Saturdays.

B. Education

(1) The Civic Action Officer presented nine (9) General Walt Scholarships to students at the Hoa Long primary school. Seven (7) children whose parents work aboard Marble Mountain Air Facility also received funds. Each of these children are excellent students but lack the funds to sufficiently complete their education. 1st Marine Aircraft Wing allocates \$8,000 VN per month, with each child receiving \$500 VN per month.

C. Projects

- (1) During this reporting period, a combination of bad weather and a lack of villager's sincerity and honesty resulted in damage to one of the Hoa Long village schoolrooms. The entire roof was stripped of its wood and tin. Civic Action is assisting in reconstruction of this project by giving needed materials.
- (2) A long-term project has been started recently by Civic Action. A Vietnamese girl from Mui Kim Son hamlet is working at the MAG-16 dispensary as a nurses aid. She will be trained by the MAG-16 medical staff in proper medical practices and procedures so that eventually she will be able to assist her own people in the village.

D. Distribution of Commodities

- (1) On 5 October 1968, MAG-16 participated in the Hoa Long village primary school's Mid-Autumn Festival. Approximately 320 children from the school and refugee area were presented assorted cookies, candy, and gifts. The primary school principal presented gifts to Civic Action personnel for their support.
- (2) On 6 October 1968, gifts, toys, and candy were distributed to 100 children in My-Thi hamlet in celebration of the Mid-Autumn Festival.
- (3) On 25 October 1968, the MAG-16 Civic Action Officer in conjunction with MMH-463 Commanding Officer, distributed 21 boxes of assorted school supplies to the Hoa Long school and refugee children. These supplies were made available through the Captain Deets Memorial Fund c/o Operation H.O.P.E.
- (4) The below listed commodities were distributed to Hoa Long village to support reconstruction of the school.
 - (a) Fifty (50) sheets of tin
 - (b) Five (5) 4 x 4's
 - (c) Twenty-six (26) assorted 2 x 6's and 2x 4's
 - (d) 10 bags of cement
 - (e) 20 cans of spray paint

(5) The below listed commodities were distributed to various villagers through the village chief:

- (a) 10 pounds of clothing
- (b) 5 pounds of soap
- (c) Agricultural equipment
- (d) Chequer sets
- (e) One (1) rice thresher

E. Summary

(1) One serious incident occurred recently in Hoa Long village. On October 8, 1968, during MEDCAP at Hoa Long village dispensary, a MAG-16 Civic Action vehicle was destroyed by an enemy satchel charge. One (1) Marine in Civic Action was injured, resulting in the loss of his left forearm. It is fairly evident that this charge was placed on the vehicle by a child from the nearby Nui Kim Son refugee Camp.

(2) Even though a vehicle was destroyed causing injury, there were definite advances this month in civic action. The Viet Cong failed to achieve their goal of persuading the local populace into refusing medical treatment at MEDCAP. In reality, they hindered themselves, as the number of people requesting treatment has gradually increased since this incident. By continuing MEDCAP in the Hoa Long village, the VC have been dealt a psychological and moral defeat.
