PART II~~SECRET~~NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During the month of March, MAG-16 aircraft flew 23,268 sorties and 7,602 flight hours in support of the tactical units in ICTZ. The majority of these sorties were flown in support of the First Marine Division with the remainder divided between the Third Marine Division (Operations Scotland II, Maine Craig, Purple Martin, Kentucky Jumper, Kentucky, and Dewey Canyon), III MAF, US Army Special Forces, the ROK Marine Corps 2nd Brigade (Operation Victory Dragon IX), ARVN units, the Danang Naval Support Activity, and SAR at Chu Lai Airfield. The Heavy Haulers of HMM-463 flew 1051 sorties in support of the Third Marine Division and Task Force Hotel lifting 1155.3 tons of cargo and 3352 troops.
2. In addition to the troop transport and logistic support provided during the month, MAG-16 aircraft flew many hours on visual reconnaissance, helicopter escort, tactical air coordination (airborne), artillery spotting, photo reconnaissance, medevac escort, APD (Airborne Personnel Detection), naval gunfire spot, VIP, night illumination, command and control, admin/liaison, SAR and suppressive fire missions for units in contact.
3. Operation Taylor Common was completed on 8 March after several weeks of successful operations by Task Force Yankee in the area west of An Hoa. MAG-16 aircraft provided the majority of the rotary wing air support during this operation with CH-46's, CH-53's and UH-1E gunships. The OV-10A with pilot and AO was always overhead controlling fixed wing attack aircraft, providing visual reconnaissance for ground troop maneuvers, photographing advanced firebases, adjusting artillery and providing fire suppression for troops or transport helicopters. The retrograde movement from LZ Tomahawk and LZ Maxwell, the only remaining fire bases, commenced on 5 March. The extraction was hampered by marginal weather and heavy enemy fire during most of the lift. The retrograde was completed with all men and equipment deposited safely at An Hoa.
4. Suppressive fire missions flown by the UH-1E gunships of VMO-2 and HML-167 and the OV-10A's of VMO-2 accounted for 41 KBA (Confirmed), 6 KBA (Probable), 18 structures destroyed and 6 structures damaged.
5. The weather in the Da Nang area was generally favorable for flight operations throughout the month of March. Early morning fog and haze delayed operations on several occasions, but the missions were usually completed later in the day. Low ceilings and fog severely hindered operations in Quang Tri Province during the first half of the month, limiting operations during that period.

## 6. The following occurrences are listed by date:

8 March 69 One 122 MM rocket impacted on the parking apron between the H&MS-16 and HMM-263 flight lines damaging three aircraft. One CH-46 received substantial damage and one CH-46 and one UH-34D sustained limited damage. Four rockets impacted 20 to 100 yards from the shore line in the South China Sea.

19 March 69 Two HMM-263 CH-46's were shot down while on medevac missions at coordinates AT 895702. Five crew members received minor wounds and the two aircraft received minor damage. The second aircraft was attempting to pick up the crew and medevacs of the first aircraft when it was shot down.

An Hoa Airfield had one 122 MM rocket impact on the southwest corner of the parking apron substantially damaging two CH-46's. One Marine pilot received minor injuries.

5. Civic Action. (MAG-16 Civic Action & Chaplain's Command Chronologies)

a. Medical/Dental. MAG-16 Corpsmen and doctors assisted the Hoa Long Dispensary and Catholic Orphanage. Medical treatment was rendered to 2,126 persons and dental treatment was given to 83 villagers and orphans during March.

b. Education. 8,000\$VN was distributed through the General Walt Scholarship Program during March.

c. Projects

(1) MAG-16 CA Personnel constructed a barbed wire barricade around the Hoa Long Dispensary for MEDCAP protection.

(2) One-hundred pounds of clothing were delivered to the China Beach Orphanage and another 800 pounds of clothing and food were delivered to the Sacred Heart Nursery through the efforts of the MAG-16 Chaplain.

(3) The fund drive to send a blind orphan, Nguyen thi Cong, to the United States for a cornea transplant operation was successful. She will leave with a Missionary Escort early in April.

d. Material Assistance

(1) MAG-16 is prompting village officials to use GVN channels of assistance. MAG-16 CA will supplement GVN aid as needed.

6. Intelligence/Counter-intelligence. (MAG-16 S-2 Command Chronology)

a. A total of 243 Fire Incidents were reported during March, down 139 from February. Fifty-one of these resulted in aircraft hits, a reduction of 45 from February. Enemy ground fire resulted in the following casualties: 9 USMC WIA (minor), 3 USMC WIA (major) and 1 passenger WIA.

9. Special Operations

a. Operation Taylor Common, conducted in the area west of An Hoa was terminated on 8 March 1969. During this eight day period, MAG-16 aircraft flew 2,884 sorties in 922.2 flight hours carrying 4,241 Troops/ passengers and 478.8 tons of cargo.

b. The "Heavy Haulers" of HMH-463 supported Operations Kentucky Jumper, Scotland II, Dewey Canyon, Purple Martin and Maine Craig in the Northern I Corps Tactical Zone. The "Heavy Haulers" flew 94 sorties in 34.0 flight hours in support of Kentucky Jumper, 117 sorties in 40.9 hours in support of Scotland II, 477 sorties in 192.5 hours in support of Purple Martin and 257 sorties in 90.3 flight hours in support of Operation Maine Craig.

c. The combined efforts of the squadrons of MAG-16 resulted in a total of 2,974 sorties in 621.4 flight hours flown in support of Operation Victory Dragon IX for the 2nd ROK Marine Corps Brigade in their TAOR. A total of 4,120 troops/passengers and 431 tons of cargo were carried. VMO-2 provided visual reconnaissance and controlled air strikes for the ROK Marines.

d. Operation Oklahoma Hills was initiated on 31 March 1969 with the "White Knights" of HMM-165, the "Purple Foxes" of HMM-364, the "Gophers" of HMM-263 and the "Heavy Haulers" of HMH-463 providing 527 sorties and 172.8 flight hours for the troop insert and subsequent resupply. These MAG-16 squadrons carried 1733 troops and 93.7 tons of cargo. HML-167 and VMO-2 provided continuous gunship escort throughout the day's operations. The landings were unopposed after an extensive fixed wing landing zone prep controlled by TAC(A)'s from VMO-2.

e. The OV-10's of VMO-2 provided visual reconnaissance, channel guidance and fire suppression while escorting the Swift Boats and Junk Landing Force of the Danang Naval Support Activity.

10. Ground Defense. (MABS-16 Command Chronology)

a. The four platoons of Zulu Provisional Rifle Company continued to rebuild and refurbish existing structures. Particular emphasis was directed on the relocation of the majority of the bunkers along the western perimeter. Approximately 800 meters of new tactical wire was laid on the western and southwestern perimeter.

11. Logistics. (MAG-16 S-4 Command Chronology)

a. On 8 March, one rocket impacted on the parking apron between the HMM-263 and H&MS-16 parking areas. One CH-46 sustained substantial damage, one CH-46 and one UH-34D sustained limited damages. Fifty feet of fuel discharge hose was punctured and eight square feet of asphalt apron was damaged and thereafter replaced.

b. On 20 March, MMAF received three mortar rounds. Two rounds impacted on the west perimeter fence and the third round impacted on the west perimeter road. The crater in the road was repaired immediately. Public Works crews repaired the perimeter fence.

c. The HMH-463 hangar is now 99% complete. MCB-12 completed work on 16 aircraft revetments and 25,000 square yards of additional parking area on the west side of the facility, and started construction on the helicopter hover pad. RMK-BRJ resumed construction on the cross wind runway and access taxiway.

1. In accordance with reference (a), significant events within the Logistics field for the period 1 through 31 March 1969 are as follows:

a. On 4 March 1969 the fourth quarter FY-69 Base Development Conference was held at First Marine Aircraft Wing to update and establish the Minor New Construction priority listings. MAG-16 submitted thirty (30) projects for consolidation. All MAG-16 projects were approved and submitted to III MAF for ICTZ integration. Four (4) of these projects are presently under construction.

b. Military Construction at MMAF continued during March as the HMM-463 hangar reached 99% completion and the HMM-165 hangar status rose from 65% to 80% complete. RMK - BRJ resumed construction on the cross wind runway access taxiway and additional taxiway designs are presently being considered and reviewed by COMNAVFORV Da Nang. Mobile Construction Battalion Twelve completed 25,000 additional square yards of aircraft parking apron and taxiway on the west side of the facility and constructed sixteen (16) new aircraft revetments. On 20 March, upon completing the above project MCB-12 started construction on the helicopter hover pad. During March Public Works connected the Base Operations building to the permanent sewer system, conducted a much needed electrical distribution survey of the air facility, repaired rocket and mortor damages as they occured and expedited repairs to MAG-16's water system.

c. Self-help and MABS-16 personnel were tasked with many varied tasks throughout March. MABS-16 heavy equipment expanded into the old motor transport area and the ROK Marine detachment was provided with a PSP/membraned recreational area. Fill and grading of the football/softball area continued and the forms for a new basketball court were constructed. Several heads were re-located and two water heaters were installed in the enlisted shower buildings. One (1) S.E.A. hut was re-located to the HML-167 S-1 area and several S.E.A. huts were re-located at the new motor transport area.

d. Although MAG-16 set condition I several times during March, the air facility itself only sustained combat damages on 8 and 20 March.


(1) On 8 March 1969 one rocket impacted on the asphalt parking apron between the H&MS-16 and HMM-263 flight lines inducing combat damages to three (3) aircraft and puncturing 50 feet of fuel discharge hose. One (1) CH-46 sustained substantial damage and one (1) CH-46 and one (1) UH-34 sustained limited damages. Eight square feet of asphalt apron was also replaced. Four (4) rockets were observed impacting in the South China Sea approximately 20 to 100 yards from the shore line by perimeter defense personnel.

(2) On 20 March 1969 MMAF received three (3) mortor rounds. One (1) round impacted at the top of the west perimeter fence, in the vicinity of guard tower # 2, resulting in one (1) Marine WIA (very minor) and causing a 1 1/2 foot by 1 foot tear in the fence. The second round hit the bottom of the west perimeter fence adjacent to guard tower # 3 resulting in a 1 1/2 foot by 1 foot tear in the fence. The third round hit the west perimeter road inducing one (1) small crater which was repaired immediately. Public Works crews repaired the perimeter fence.

(3) In addition to the above, An Hoa airfield sustained combat damages on 19 March 1969. One (1) rocket round impacted on the southwest corner of the aircraft parking apron. As a result of this impact two (2) CH-46 aircraft sustained substantial damages, one (1) Marine pilot received minor injuries and a sizeable crater was induced in the parking apron.

e. During the month of March the MMAF air freight section processed 739 passengers and 9757 cubic feet of cargo weighing 198,401 pounds. The tactical air fuel dispensing system personnel dispensed 62,473 gallons of 115/145 AVGAS and 988,003 gallons of JP-4 fuel. Marble Mountain Air Facility utilized 60,214 gallons of this AVGAS and An Hoa airfield utilized the remaining 2,259 gallons. The JP-4 utilization was divided between MMAF 737,406 gallons, An Hoa 208,877 gallons and Hill 55 41,720 gallons.

f. The motor transport section travelled 78,592 miles transporting 49,571 passengers, 589 short tons of cargo, 207,000 gallons of water, 23,191 gallons of MOGAS, 18,101 gallons of diesel fuel, 245 gallons of AVOIL and 145,514 gallons of JP-4 fuel.



COMMUNICATIONS: A personnel shortage continues to exist in the Communications Center (MOS 2542). The personnel shortage within the Radio Section (MOS 2531/2533) continues to approach critical level, we are currently operating at 66% of N/L Strength in this area; However, all sections continue to operate efficiently.

A total of 6241 messages were processed by the MAG-16 Communications Center, an increase of 226 over the previous month. 28 1/2 hours of circuit outage was experienced during the month due to faulty equipment.

The following transactions were effected by the Repair Unit:

1. 94 pieces turned in for repair.
2. 91 pieces repaired.
3. 10 pieces evacuated to higher echelon.
4. 10 pieces returned from higher echelon.
5. 32 pieces requisitions processed by supply.

The Wire Section continues to repair, replace and maintain the extensive wire system supporting MAG-16.

1. In accordance with reference (a), the following statistics represent Civic Action accomplishments by MAG-16 during the period 010001H March to 312400H March 1969.

*31-Block 15-2*

A. Medical/Dental Treatment

(1) The doctors and corpsmen of MAG-16 assisted the following dispensaries and orphanages during this reporting period:

- (a) Hoa Long Dispensary
- (b) Catholic Orphanage

(2) Medical treatment was rendered to 2126 persons during March.

(3) Dental treatment was given to 83 villagers and orphans.

(4) This command MedEvaced five villagers to different civilian and military hospitals.

B. Education

(1) This command's Civic Action gave out 8000\$VN in Gen. Walt Scholarships to worthy students of Hoa Long Village school and to independents of employees on board.

## C. Projects

- (1) To help ward off any saboteurs during MEDCAPS and to keep out trespassers, MAG-16 constructed a barb-wire and stone barrier around the village dispensary. CA also mended the dispensary's screen windows and lockers and plan to white-wash the walls.
- (2) While the Vietnamese Government provided building materials for a two-room annexation to the Neu Long village school, MAG-16 CA is paying 34,000VN for the labor. The structure is now half completed.

## D. Distribution of Commodities

- (1) CA gave four sheets of plywood for school desks and fifteen rolls of toilet paper for the school head.

## E. General

- (1) MAG-16 CA is prompting village officials to use GVN channels of assistance. CA gave the village chief GVN request forms for building materials. If necessary, CA will supplement GVN aid. Special attention need be given to alleviating the wretched living conditions in the village refugee area.
- (2) With the new fence around the dispensary, it is easy for CA personnel to provide adequate security during MEDCAPS. For this reason, Julie Company no longer accompanies this command's MEDCAPS.
