



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
NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- 1. April was another big month for MAG-16 with heavy commitments in support of III MAF, the First Marine Division and various units in I Corps Tactical Zone. MAG-16 aircraft flew 23,690 sorties and 8,469.9 flight hours in support of the following operations: OKLAHOMA HILLS, VICTORY DRAGON IX and X, MAINE CRAIG, PURPLE MARTIN, MUSKOGEE MEADOWS, FREDERICK HILL and other administrative and small unit operations. MAG-16 supported the First Marine Division with 14,750 sorties and 4,494 flight hours; III MAF with 6,208 sorties and 3,306 flight hours. The remaining 2,732 sorties were divided among the Third Marine Division, Task Force Hotel, US Army Special Forces, the ROK Marine Corps 2nd Brigade, ARVN units, the Danang Naval Support Activity, and SAR at the Chu Lai Airfield.
- 2. The transport squadrons of MAG-16 lifted 3,440.5 tons of cargo and 31,197 passengers in support of various units in I Gorps. The majority of this support was for the First Marine Division in Operation OKLAHOMA HILLS and the ROK Marine Brigade in Operation VICTORY DRAGON X. In addition to the troop transport and logistic support, MAG-16 aircraft flew many hours of visual reconnaissance, helicopter escort, tactical air coordinator (airborne), artillery spotting, photo reconnaissance, night illumination, medevac escort, APD (Airborne Personnel Detection), naval gunfire spot, VIP, command and control, administrative/liaison, SAR, and suppressive fire missions.
- 3. Operation OKLAHOMA HILLS in the area around "Charlie Ridge" was conducted by the Seventh Marines and other units requiring continuous air support throughout the month of April. MAG-16 aircraft flew 1,707 hours and 5551 sorties in support of this operation consisting of visual reconnaissance, resupply, retrograde movements for small units, medevac, helicopter escort and tactical air coordination. The transport squadrons with CH-46's and CH-53's transported 7687 passengers and 1,916 tons of cargo for the operation and the UH-1E's of HML-167 and VMO-2 provided escort coverage.
- 4. The AH-1G "Huey Cobra" was introduced into MAG-16 on 10 April 1969. The first week of operations in the Cobra was primarily training and testing with the first combat mission being flown on 18 April. Throughout the remainder of the month the Cobra was used for medevac helicopter escort and for training additional crews. The Cobra accumulated a total of 132 combat sorties and 30 familiarization/training sorties during April.
- 5. The helicopter escort and fire suppression missions flown by the UH-1E

gunships of HML-167 and VMO-2 and the OV-10A "Bronco" of VMO-2 accounted for 34 KBA (confirmed) and 10 KBA (possible). Several structures and sampans were also destroyed or damaged during the month.

- 6. The weather in the Danang area was generally favorable for flight operations during the month with occasional low ceilings temporarily hampering operations in the mountainous areas. The warmer temperatures and corresponding higher density altitudes have dictated a more restricted range of load carrying capabilities.
- 7. The following occurrences are listed by date:
- 1 April 1969 A CH-46 from HMM-263 was shot down while attempting to insert a reconnaissance team south of An Hoa airfield. The pilot and co-pilot were killed in the ensuing crash.
- 8 April 1969 An CV-10A from VMO-2 was shot down by small arms fire at BT 045556. The pilot and aerial observer ejected safely with the pilot sustaining minor injuries.
- 11 April 1969 One CH-46 from HM-364 broke up in flight and crashed when a forward rotor blade separated from the aircraft. The crew of four was killed in the crash.
- 14 April 1969 A CH-46 from HM-364 crashed on "Charlie Ridge" after taking heavy small arms fire while on a medevac mission. The pilot was hovering over dense foliage to pick up a wounded Marine. Three crewmembers were killed and three wounded.
- 19 April 1969 The medevac aircraft from HMM-263 sustained an unknown number of hits while attempting a medevac pickup on "Charlie Ridge". The aircraft went out of control and crashed killing the crew of six.
- 20 April 1969 Five 122MM rockets impacted at Marble Mountain Air Facility. Two rounds impacted in the vicinity of the Sergeants' Club resulting in 2 KIA, 32 WIA (evac) and 14 WIA (minor). The Building sustained minor damage.
- 23/24 April 1969 An Hoa airfield sustained a combined rocket and mortar attack causing minor damage to one AH-1G Cobra and wounding five MAG-16 personnel.

8. Special Operations

a. Operation OKLAHOMA HILLS, conducted southwest of Danang, was supported by transport squadrons HMM-165, HMM-263, HMM-364 and the "Heavy Haulers" of HMH-463, lifting 1,916 tons of cargo and transporting 7,687 troops. The three medium helicopter squadrons provided 24 hour medevac





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support and were escorted by the UH-1E and AH-1G gunships of VMO-2 and the UH-1E's of HML-167. The OV-10A's of VMO-2 provided visual reconnaissance, TAC(A) and artillery spotting. The combined efforts of all the squadrons resulted in 1,707 flight hours and 5,551 sorties being flown in support of this operation.

- b. Operation VICTORY DRAGON X of the ROK Marine Corps 2nd Brigade required heavy support from MAG-16. MAG-16 aircraft flew 2,702 sorties in 549 flight hours transporting 5,517 passengers and 404 tons of cargo. HML-167 and VMO-2 provided gunship coverage for helicopter escort. VMO-2 flew visual reconnaissance and TAC(A) missions in the ROK Marine TAOR.
- c. The OV-10A's of VMO-2 provided visual reconnaissance, channel guidance and fire suppression missions while escorting the Swift Boats and Junk Landing Force of the Danang Naval Support Activity.

- 5. Civic Action. (MAG-16 Civic Action and Chaplain's Command Chronologies)
- a. <u>Medical/Dental</u>. Doctors and corpsmen of MAG-16 aided the Hoa Long Dispensary and the Catholic Orphanage. Medical treatment was rendered to 1,147 persons. An additional 56 villagers and orphans received dental treatment.
- b. <u>Education</u>. 800\$VN was distributed through the General Walt Scholarship program during April 1969.

c. Projects

- (1) A two room annex to the Hoa Long village school was completed. Building materials were supplied by GVN. MAG-16 Civic Action paid 34,000\$VN to cover the cost of labor.
- (2) HMM-263 Civic Action personnel are starting an English language class at the Hoa Long village school.
- (3) Nguyen-thi-Cong, a blind orphan girl, departed Danang for the United States on 7 April 1969. On 11 April 1969, Dr. Max FINE performed a cornea transplant operation on her right eye at Mount Zion Hospital, San Francisco. The operation is considered a success at this time and another transplant operation on the left eye is planned.
- (4) On 16 April 1969, Nguyen-thi-Than-Phuong returned to her village of Tam Toa after undergoing open heart surgery in the United States. She should now be able to lead a normal life.
- 6. <u>Intelligence/Counter-intelligence</u>. (MAG-16 S-2 Command Chronology)
- a. A total of 235 fire incidents were reported during the month of April. Seventy of these incidents resulted in aircraft hits, an increase of 19 aircraft hits over the number reported for March 1969. A total of 109 aircrew spot reports were reported in April, 35 less than reported in March 1969.

9. Ground Defense. (MABS-16 Command Chronology)

a. On 20 April 1969 5 122MM Rocket rounds impacted in the MAG-16 area. Two rounds impacted near the Sergeants' Club causing minor damage to the building, 2 KIA, 32 WIA (Evac), and 14 WIA (minor). Work continued on the replacement and refurbishing of perimeter bunkers.

10. Logistics. (MAG-16 S-4 Command Chronology)

- a. On 20 April 1969 5 122MM Rocket rounds impacted in the MAG-16 area. Two rounds impacted near the Sergeants' Club causing minor damage to the building, 2 KIA, 32 WIA (Evac), and 14 WIA (Minor). The damage was repaired by Public Works crews on 21 April.
- b. Military construction continued during April. RMK/BRJ completed work on the crash crew building access road, HMH-463 hangar, access taxiway to the crosswind runway, dispensary parking area, parking area and driveway at the Commanding Officer's quarters, connecting road south of the Officers' Club between parking areas. Navy Public Works completed work on the fenced open storage area for Group Supply. Work on the helicopter hover pad reached 45% of completion. The installation of new communication equipment in the control tower and Base Operations radio room by COMNAVSEACT technicians and Public Works personnel is 65% complete.
- c. The Marble Mountain Air Facility Air Freight section processed 813 passengers and 6891 cubic feet (62.2 Tons) of cargo during April. The tactical air fuel dispensing system personnel dispensed 59,748 gallons of AVGAS and 802,184 gallons of JP-4 at Marble Mountain Air Facility. Distribution at An Hoa Airfield was 5,436 gallons of AVGAS and 139,456 gallons of JP-4. At Hill, 55 230,120 gallons of JP-4 were dispensed. The Motor Transport section travelled 76,525 miles during April; carrying 27,505 passengers, 496 short tons of cargo, 216,000 gallons of water, 17,959 gallons of MOGAS, 15,777 gallons of diesel fuel and 128,691 gallons of JP-4.





1. In accordance with reference (a), significant events within the logistics field for the period 1 through 30 April 1969 are as follows:

- a. Military construction at Marble Mountain Air Facility continued throughout April and several much needed areas were asphalted and completed. RMK/ERJ completed project # S-226/12 which included the new crash crew building access road, an access road to the Avionics Complex Vans, a connecting road south of the Officers Club with adjoining parking areas, a parking area and driveway to the Commanding Officers quarters and a parking area in front of the proposed MAG-16 dispensary. They also completed the access taxiway from the crosswind runway and improved the shoulders along this runway. Construction on the HMH-463 hangar was completed except for minor electrical discrepancies that cannot be completed until the proper materials arrive. The HMM-165 hangar reached 90% completion during April.
- b. On 20 April MCB-12 was relieved by MCB-4, however Seabee projects at MAG-16 continued at a steady pace. The Helo Hover Pad project reached 45% completion and the drainage project on the western side of the facility was started. On 29 April, MCB-4 commenced pouring concrete for the basketball court and the Commanding Officer's patio. MABS-16 personnel assisted on this project.
- c. Navy Public Works personnel completed Minor New Construction project M-16-1-68 which is an open storage area for Group Supply with 750 feet of chain link fence. They also ran culverts under the eastern taxiways to house airfield SATS lights lines and they repaired several breaks in the perimeter fence. Many deteriorated and eroded areas of asphalt roads were also repaired. Public Works personnel further assisted COMNAVSEACT technicians in the installation and preparation of the communications room in the Base Operations building and control tower. The antenna tower for this project was completed during April and the total project status is now 65% complete.
- d. Self-help personnel and MABS-16 utilities personnel were utilized for many projects throughout the month. Emphasis was primarily given to the replacement and repair of billeting cantonment protective walls and bunkers. Ten (10) S.E.A. huts were transported at night from MWSG-17 to MAG-16 and these huts were positioned throughout the facility. Many required major repairs. The out door theater was relocated and a complete remodeling and air-conditioning of the Group S-1 and Disbursing offices was completed.

- e. The logistics section was involved in several miscellaneous projects throughout April. Coordination and personal liaison was established with several area engineers and definative drawings and designs are now in progress for the OV-10 aircraft engine test stand, forty-four (144) hand-covered aircraft revetments and an adequate drainage system for the enlisted mess hall reefer bank. All S-4 personnel participated in or assisted in the preparation of the awards ceremony parade for Lt. Gen. BUSE, Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force Pacific on 25 April. A complete base air conditioner survey was conducted and forwarded to Wing and a request for relocating HML-167 and VMO-2 to the western side of the field is being reviewed.
- f. On 30 April a Seaboard World DC-8 jetliner landed at Marble Mountain Air Facility. All passengers were debarked and transported to the China Beach R & R center. Upon take-off the northern overrun of the duty runway was damaged from jet blast and Public Works emergency crews were called in to repair it.
- g. On 20 April five (5) rockets impacted at Marble Mountain Air Facility resulting in two (2) KIAs and thirty-two (32) WIAs. Minor damage was sustained at the sergeants (E-5) club. This damage was repaired by Public Works emergency crews by 21 April. On the 23rd and 24th of April a combined rocket and mortar attack was sustained at an An Hoa airfield causing minor damage to one (1) AH-1G aircraft wounding five (5) MAG-16 personnel.
- h. During the month of April the Marble Mountain Air Facility Air Freight section processed 813 passengers and 6981 cubic feet of cargo weighing 134,456 pounds. The tactical air fuel dispensing system personnel dispensed 65,184 gallons of 115/145 AVGAS and 1,171,760 gallons of JP-4 fuel. Marble Mountain Air Facility utilized 59,748 gallons of this AVGAS and An Hoa airfield utilized the remaining 5436 gallons. The JP-4 utilization was divided between Marble Mountain Air Facility 802,184 gallons, An Hoa 139,456 gallons and Hill 55 230, 120 gallons.
- i. The Motor Transport section travelled 76,525 miles transporting 27,505 passengers, 496 short tons of cargo, 216,00 gallons of water, 17,959 gallons of MOGAS, 15,777 gallons of diesel fuel, and 128,691 gallons of JP-4 fuel.

Part II. Narrative Summary of Significant Highlights:

During the month of April MAG-16 chaplains provided Sunday and weekday worship services. Bible study and discussion classes were held on Sunday, Tuesday, and Thursday.

A statistical summary is included in Part IV, Supporting Documents.

Part III. Significant Events:

Administration:

It is the considered opinion of both chaplains of MAG-16 that the month of April has been the low point of morale in the group since the arrival of both chaplains. There has been a much greater increase of personnel coming for counsel in regard to stress situations. More men have come with requests for emergency leave, job transfers, emergency phone and MARS calls, and personal counseling on family matters. One reason, for some squadrons, has been the high aircraft and personnel loss during this past month. For the mest part the reasons behind their requests are transparent rationalizations in attempt to ease their emotions. Little thought is given to the rational basis of the case they present for emergency leave.

This increased "emotional stress" counseling includes both officer and enlisted. One case in point is a more senior officer who requested an emergency phone call because he had not heard from his wife in aix days.

It is assumed that if there is command concern for this situation we will be asked to give our interpretation of why this situation exists, which is too lengthy for this report.

2. Civic Action:

- a. Project to send blind orphan, Nguyen-thi-Cong, to the United States for cornea transplants: Money was raised from MAQ-16 personnel to cover all expenses. Lt. Col. F. K. Fulton, C.O. MAQ-16, presented the money to Rev. Gordon Smith, Director, China Beach Orphanage, on 3 April. On 7 April the little girl departed Danang for the United States. The operation was performed on 11 April by Dr. Max Fine, at Mt. Zion Hospital, San Francisco, California. At this date the operation is reported as successful on the right eye, and a cornea transplant is planned for the left eye in the near future.
- b. On 16 April, at 1430, the little Vietnamese girl who was sent to the United States for open heart surgery returned to her village of Tam Tea, near Danang. On Sunday, 20 April, the village held a party at which Colonel Fris, Dr. Hennings (MACG-18), and Chaplain Schumacher were the honored guests. Speeches were made by the child's father and the village chief, giving thanks for saving little Nguyen-thi-Than-Phuong's life. The child should new live a normal life. Case closed.
- c. Presented 1,360 lbs. of clothing, medicine, and toys to Sacred Heart Nursery and China Beach Orphanage; courtesy of North American Tech. Rep., Mr. Donald Hall.

CONTINUEDATIONS: A personnel shortage continues to exist in the Communications Center (EOS 2542). The personnel shortage within the Radio Section (EOS 2531/2533) continues to approach critical level, we are currently operating at 54% of H/L strength in this area; However, all acctions continue to operate efficiently.

A total of 6364 messages were processed by the HAG-15 Communications Center, an increase of 123 over the previous month. Mineteen (19) hours of circuit outage was experienced during the month due to faulty equipment.

The following transactions were effected by the Repair Unit:

- 1. 102 pieces turned in for repair.
- 2. 104 pieces repaired.
- 3. 8 pieces evacuated to higher echelon.
- 4. 7 pieces returned from higher echelon.
- 5. 11 requisitions processed by supply.

The Mire Section continues to repair, replace and maintain the extensive wire system supporting MAG-16. A 100 pair cable was installed between MaG-16 Switchland the Officers area improving Telephone Communications throughout that area.

1. In accordance with reference (a), the following statistics represent Civic Action accomplishments by MAG-16 during the period 010001H April to 302400H April 1969.

A. Medical/Dental Treatment

- (1) The doctors and corponen of MAG-16 assisted the following dispensaries and orphanages during this reporting period:
 - (a) Hoa Long Dispensary (b) Catholic Orphanage
- (2) Medical Treatment was rendered to 1147 persons during April.

(Dental treatment was given to 56 villagers and ofphans.

(4) The Black Death rapped at Hoal long Village during this reporting period. Five persons have succumbed and several are in the hospital with symptoms. CORDS reacted by having the Preventive Medicine Unit at NSA Hospital innoculate the villagers and dust the living quarters with raticide. MAG-16 CA medevaced three villagers.

B. Education
