14 June 1969PART IINARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. MAG-16 completed another month of heavy commitments in support of the various units in ICTZ with the majority in support of III MAF, the First Marine Division and the 2nd ROK Marine Brigade. MAG-16 aircraft flew 23,929 sorties and 8062 flight hours in support of the following operations: OKLAHOMA HILLS, PIPESTONE CANYON, VICTORY DRAGON XI, DARING REBEL, VIRGINIA RIDGE, PURPLE MARTIN, APACHE SNOW and other administrative and small unit operations. MAG-16 supported the First Marine Division with 15,187 sorties and 4599 flight hours, III MAF with 4548 sorties and 1378 flight hours, and the 2nd ROK Marine Brigade with 2330 sorties and 517 flight hours. The remaining 1864 sorties were in support of the Third Marine Division, Task Force Hotel, U.S. Army Special Forces, ARVN units, ~~the~~ Danang Naval Support Activity and SAR at Chu Lai Airfield.
2. The transport squadrons of MAG-16 lifted 3417 tons of cargo and set a new record with 32,801 passengers in support of the units in I Corps. The majority of this support was for the First Marine Division in Operation OKLAHOMA HILLS and the 2nd ROK Marine Brigade in Operation VICTORY DRAGON XI. In addition to the troop transport and logistic support, MAG-16 aircraft flew many hours of visual reconnaissance, helicopter escort, tactical air coordination (Airborne), artillery and naval gunfire spotting, photo reconnaissance, reconnaissance team inserts/extracts, night illumination, medevac escort, DCP (Detection Concealed Personnel), VIP, command and control, administrative/liaison, SAR, suppressive fire mission, convoy escort and personnel sensor emplacement.
3. Operation OKLAHOMA HILLS was terminated on 29 May 1969. The retrograde operations were accomplished without incident and all men, guns and material were safely deposited in the permanent facilities at Hill 10, 55, and 37. MAG-16 flew 4016 sorties and 1100 hours during the month in support of Operation OKLAHOMA HILLS lifting 7716 passengers and 1364 tons of cargo. In addition to logistic support, MAG-16 provided many hours of visual reconnaissance, medevac, helicopter escort and tactical air coordination.
4. The "White Knights" of HMM-165 were assigned the responsibility of training crews and delivering personnel sensors as part of First Marine Air Wing Operation Plan 405-68. The training and aircraft reconfiguring was accomplished with little difficulty, and the "White Knights" were ready for the emplacements within a few days after receiving the commitment.
5. HMH-463 began receiving CH-53D's to replace the present CH-53A models. The CH-53D will enable HMH-463 to provide better logistical support since the "D" model can lift considerably more than the CH-53A. The CH-53D also gives MAG-16 an integral TAR (Tactical Aircraft Recovery) capability.

6. The AH-1G "Huey Cobra" has been used very successfully since its introduction into MAG-16 in late April. The increased ordnance load combined with the accuracy with which it can be employed has proven invaluable. The "Cobra" was used on all gunship missions, but was employed primarily on those escort and fire suppressive missions that generally receive the most enemy fire.

7. The helicopter escort and fire suppressive missions flown by the gunships of HML-167 and VMO-2 and the OV-10A "Bronco" of VMO-2 accounted for 47 KBA (Confirmed), 4 boats (sampans) and 8 structures destroyed during the month of May.

8. The weather in the Danang area was generally favorable for flight operations during the month with low ceiling and restricted visibility in the numerous thunderstorms occurring in the afternoon.

9. The following occurrences are listed by date:

18 May 1969 - Marble Mountain Air Facility received several mortar rounds causing substantial damage to a UH-1 of the 212th Combat Support Aviation Battalion.

20 May 1969 - Two 122mm rocket rounds impacted at MMAF with negative damage.

10. Special Operations

a. Operation OKLAHOMA HILLS, conducted on "Charlie Ridge" southwest of Danang, was supported by transport squadrons HMM-165, 263 and 364 and the "Heavy Haulers" of HMH-463 lifting 1364 tons of cargo and transporting 7716 troops. The three medium helicopter squadrons provided 24 hour medevac support and were escorted by the gunships of HML-167 and VMO-2. The OV-10A's of VMO-2 provided visual reconnaissance, TAC(A), artillery spotting and fire suppression.

b. Operation VICTORY DRAGON XI of the ROK Marine Corps 2nd Brigade required heavy support from MAG-16. MAG-16 aircraft flew 2330 sorties in 517 flight hours transporting 3605 passengers and 253 tons of cargo. HML-167 and VMO-2 provided gunship escort for the transport helicopters.

c. VMO-2 provided visual reconnaissance, channel guidance, fire suppression and TAC(A) while escorting the Swift Boats and Junk Landing Force of the Danang Naval Support Activity.

a. Medical/Dental. Doctors and Corpsmen from MAG-16 aided the Hoa Long Dispensary and Catholic Orphanage. Medical treatment was rendered to 1,152 villagers and orphans. Eighty villagers and orphans received dental treatment.

b. Education. 8000VN\$ in General Walt Scholarships was distributed by the MAG-16 Civic Action during May 1969.

c. Projects. Milk and clothing were given to the Sacred Heart Nursery through the cooperation of the MAG-16 Chaplain and Mr. Don HALL, a North American Aviation Tech Rep. Seven hundred-fifty pounds of clothing and more than 1400 pounds of food were given to the China Beach Orphanage.

6. Intelligence/Counter-intelligence. (MAG-16 S-2 Command Chronology)

a. A total of 171 fire incidents were reported during May 1969, 64 less than during April. Thirty-seven of these incidents resulted in aircraft hits, 33 less than during April 1969. Eighty-nine Aircrrew Spot Reports of intelligence value were reported during May 1969.

9. Ground Defense. (MABS-16 Command Chronology)

a. Contact with VC/NVA during the month of May 1969 was one mortar attack on 18 May which caused negative damage or casualties. On 20 May two 122mm rocket rounds impacted in an unoccupied sandy area causing no damage or casualties. Construction on a new command post bunker for the Third Platoon of Zulu Provisional Rifle Company has begun.

10. Logistics. (MAG-16 S-4 Command Chronology)

a. Military construction continued during May 1969. RMK-BRJ completed work on two maintenance hangars and the access taxiway to the crosswind runway. Navy Public Works personnel will paint and mark the runway. An

inspection team from COMNAVFORV visited MAG-16 on 16 May. Photographs of the base were taken to support requests for Fiscal Year 1971 projects. Emphasis was placed upon improving the enlisted living areas, construction of an adequate dispensary and a post office building. The installation of new equipment in the Air Traffic Control Tower was completed and in operation on 31 May.

b. Marble Mountain Air Freight processed 622 passengers and 60.3 tons of cargo. TAFDS personnel dispensed 42,372 gallons of AVGAS and 859,594 gallons of JP-4 at MMAF; 11,484 gallons of AVGAS and 196,373 gallons of JP-4 at An Hoa Airfield; and 177,663 gallons of JP-4 at Hill 55. The Motor Transport section travelled 83,903 miles carrying 25,924 passengers, 483 short tons of cargo, 105,400 gallons of water, 21,239 gallons of MOGAS, 19,250 gallons of diesel fuel and 100,334 gallons of JP-4.

1. In accordance with reference (a), significant events within the logistics field for the period 1 through 31 May 1969 are as follows:

a. Military construction by RMK-BRJ on two maintenance hangars was completed during May and acceptance inspections were scheduled for 4 June. They further completed the access taxiway to the crosswind runway and it was accepted by the Naval Support Activity Da Nang on 9 May. The Naval Public Works Department was tasked to paint and mark this runway and operational procedures for its utilization are now being formulated.

b. On 16 May a team of civilian inspectors from COMNAVFORV Base Development Office, Da Nang visited MAG-16 to photograph and inspect all FY-71 projects requested by this Command. Photograph emphasis was given to the unsatisfactory conditions of existing facilities. These facilities/projects include the upgrading of all enlisted quarters, showers and heads, the completion of an adequate dispensary and a post office building.

c. Minor New Construction Projects continued to progress during May and on 31 May 1969 the ATC tower project # 14-2235D installation was turned over to operating personnel. Final acceptance of this project is pending receipt of as-built drawings. This was MAG-16's M.N.C. Project # M-16-44-69. Although MCB-4 construction crews were called off the job for a III MAF higher priority project, they still were able to continue, on a reduced basis, the construction of the helo hover pad. This project is now 75% complete. Minor New Construction Project M-16-36-69 was started in May. This project is another 750 LF of chain link fence for supply storage.

d. During May MABS-16 self-help crews, working in conjunction with MCB-4 and Navy Public Works, completed many projects. Concrete slabs were completed at the CO's quarters, the basketball court and the enlisted mess hall. A new air conditioned Med-Evac facility was completed and a generator shed at H&MS Avionics was constructed. Materials furnished through TSFC channels were picked up at Red Beach and a 12 foot high revetment was constructed around the new communications room in the Base Operations building.


e. Repair crews from Public Works and the logistics section placed primary emphasis on electrical and erosion problems throughout the month. Increased electrical demands created many power outages and repair crews had to redistribute electrical loads throughout the air facility. A new Group Order establishing air conditioner procedures was published and an automatic Public Works air conditioner P.M. schedule was established. Runway and taxiway erosion problems were reviewed and repair crews were called in to correct these problems where necessary. Extensive repairs were made on the west fuel pit area.

f. On 18 May 1969 MMAF received several mortar rounds. Marine Aircraft Group 16 sustained negative damage, however the Army 212th Combat Support Aviation Battalion on the west side of the field received substantial damage to UH-1E aircraft. Again on 20 May MMAF went to condition one as two 122mm rocket rounds impacted inside the compound. Both rounds came to rest in uninhabited sandy areas resulting in negative damage.

g. On 2 May 1969 the logistics section activated the new Vietnamese garbage contract and service began on that date.

h. During the month of May the MMAF Air Freight section processed 622 passengers and 6522 cubic feet of cargo weighing 120,664 pounds. The tactical air fuel dispensing system personnel dispensed 53,856 gallons of 115/145 AVGAS and 1,233,630 gallons of JP-4 fuel. MMAF utilized 42,372 gallons of this AVGAS and An Hoa Airfield utilized the remaining 11,484 gallons. The JP-4 utilization was divided between MMAF 859,594 gallons, An Hoa 196,373 gallons and Hill Fifty-five 177,663 gallons.

i. The Motor Transport Section travelled 83,903 miles, transporting 25,924 passengers, 483 short tons of cargo, 105,400 gallons of water, 21,239 gallons of MOGAS, 19250 gallons of diesel fuel and 100,334 gallons of JP-4 fuel.

COMMUNICATIONS:

A personnel shortage continues to exist in the Radio Section (MOS 2531/2533) we are currently operating at 64% of M/L strength in this area; However, all sections continue to operate efficiently.

A total of 4856 messages were processed by the MAG-16 Communications Center, a decrease of 1508 over the previous month. Twenty one (21) hours of circuit outage was experienced during the month due to faulty equipment.

The following transactions were effected by the Repair Unit:

1. 91 pieces turned in for repair
2. 74 pieces repaired
3. 16 pieces evacuated to higher echelon
4. 12 pieces returned from higher echelon
5. 24 requisitions processed by supply

The Wire Section continues to repair, replace and maintain the extensive Wire System supporting MAG-16. A line was installed between the Command Bunker and new Medevac Pad improving telephone communications to that area.

I. In accordance with reference (a), the following statistics represent Civic Action accomplishments by MAG-I6 during the period 010001H May 1 to 312400 May 1 1969.

A. Medical/Dental Treatment

(1) The doctors and corpsmen of MAG-I6 assisted the following dispensaries and orphanages during this reporting period:

- (a) Hoa Long Dispensary
- (b) Catholic Orphanage

(2) Medical treatment was rendered to 1152 persons during May.

(3) Dental treatment was given to 80 villagers and orphans.

B. Education

(1) This command's Civic Action gave out 8000VN\$ in Gen. Walt Scholarships to worthy students of Hoa Long Village School and to dependents of employees on board.

(2) MAG-I6 CA purchased school supplies that were awarded to scholastically outstanding Hoa Long school students, CA personnel participated in the awards ceremonies which marked the end of the school year.

(2) CA requested fifty Vietnamese-English textbooks for use in teaching English at Hoa Long school. Personnel from HMM 263 and this section have already made arrangements with the school principal.

(4) MAG-I6 CA sponsored a picnic to Tram Nam O Hamlet for the students and teachers of Hoa Long Village School. CA also reports that a C-4 Coke-can charge was left on one of the vehicles used to transport the students. Since only the blasting device exploded and not the C-4, there was neither property damage nor casualties. Also during this reporting period, MAG-I6 CA supplied the lime and the village contractor white-washed the Hoa-Long School. There was no charge since CA had already paid the contractor \$34,000 for the construction of two schoolrooms.

C. U.S./ Vietnamese Conflicts

(1) A Navy Swift Boat sank five boats and their nets from Xom Son Thuy Hamlet while they were fishing in authorized waters. Due to a change of command at Tien Sha, the Navy at the Swift-boat level was unaware of the fishermen's authorization. Representatives from 3rd. LVT's and GVN are presently negotiating with the Navy for another temporary permit. Meanwhile, III MAF G-5 funded the purchase of nets and boats for the fishermen. In another incident involving Xom Son Thuy hamlet, U.S. Forces fired upon two fishermen, one died and the other remains in the hospital. MAG-I6 investigated these incidents and is making sure proper justice is meted out to all concerned.

(2) MAG-I6 CA inquired ^{into} complaints of three female detainees as to alleged misconduct of U.S. interrogation team. CA also inquired into a complaint by villagers and Buddhist leaders of Khue Bac concerning misdemeanor of a 1st MP Bn. patrol. All parties involved are well aware of the harmful effects of these actions and a sincere effort is being made to insure the same does not happen again.

D. General

(1) Swimmers caused a dam to rupture in Son Thuy Hamlet. Some brackish water polluted the fresh water used to irrigate the rice paddies during the dry season. MAG-I6 made arrangements with a nearby watch-tower unit to have the dam mended. And to determine the salinity and usability of the polluted water, CA had water samples taken at five different points south of the ruptured dam. CA handed the samplings to Wing Civic Action.

n (2) CA is negotiating with NSA Security for passes that would allow the Hoa Long Village Chief to get used lumber from the NSA dump. CA hopes this will make the villagers rely on themselves for building materials rather than relying on Civic Action.

(3) Civic Action took tin, lumber, and cement to Xom Son Thuy Hamlet Chief for construction of a temple. Already the zealous villagers have erected the sides and roof and are about to lay the cement floor.

(4) MAG-I6 Civic Action arranged for MR. Eddie Chin (CORDS Agricultural Advisor) to visit Hoa Long Village farmlands. He talked with interested farmers about non-native crops and improved farming methods. One of the farmers volunteered a portion of his land for Mr. Chin's production. And Mr. Chin is confident that his model garden will over the farmers to his methods and crops. win

(5) On May 4, MAG-I6 Civic Action sponsored a human-interest tour of Danang City for eighteen marines on board. The first stop was the Danang railroad yard and train station where the group saw old locomotives and was on hand to wave goodbye to the fearless passengers departing for Hue. To gain entrance to the next stop, a Cao Dai temple, everyone had to remove their shoes. Once inside, the marines were fascinated to learn that the Cao Dai Religion was a harmonious mixture of the world's major religions. Next on the itinerary was the Cham Museum. It contains artifacts of the Chams (a Hindu-type civilization) left behind when the Vietnamese drove them out. The final stop was the Danang market. Looking for refreshments, the marines soon discovered that the oranges and Cokes were fifty piastres each, and so naturally everyone settled on two-piastre popsicles. MAG-I6 also conducted two tours to Marble Mountain and plans to supplement its Personal Response orientation with these revealing tours.
