MAG-16 continued its support of Free World Military Assistance Forces in the I Corps Tactical Zone. MAG-16 flew a total of 6,606.9 hours and 23,545 sorties while supporting the First Marine Division, First Marine Aircraft Wing, the United States Army, the Republic of Korea Marines and the Army of the Republic of Viet Nam.

Two squadrons had change of command ceremonies in March. Maj D. N. ANDERSON replaced LtCol L. K. KECK as Commanding Officer of HMM-263, and LtCol T. S. REAP replaced LtCol R. R. LEISY as CO of HMM-463. There were also three changes among Staff Officers. Capt C. H. PEASELMAN replaced Capt W. J. STEFFAN as Adjutant. LtCol REAP relinquished control of the S-1 shop to Maj J. A. BARTY and the S-4 shop was taken over by LtCol LEISY after LtCol W. R. FAILS rotated.

PART IIISequential Listing of Significant Events

1. Awards. One Distinguished Flying Cross, three Purple Hearts, one Good Conduct Medal and 711 Strike/Flight Air Medals were awarded during the month of March.

2. Enemy Casualties and Damage Inflicted. MAC-16 inflicted 16 KBMA (Confirmed), 30 KBMA (Probable), 55 Hootches destroyed, 6 Bunkers destroyed, 4 Bunkers damaged, 1 Cave destroyed, 1 Fishtrap destroyed and 1 Secondary explosion.

3. Intelligence. 13 Aircrew spot reports of intelligence value were received from aircrews and other sources. This is 16 fewer than reported for the previous month.

4. Sequential Listing of Significant Events by Date.

- 1 March 1971: While on mission 80 for the 5th Marines, two Cobras from HML-367 were credited with two (2) WIA, one (1) KBMA (probable), four (4) Hootches, one (1) Bunker, and one (1) Cave all destroyed.
- 4 March 1971: One AH-1G and one AH-1J from HML-367 while on mission 52, were credited with destroying two (2) Hootches.
- 7 March 1971: On a re-supply for the ARVN two Cobras from HML-367 destroyed twenty-two (22) Hootches and were also credited with one (1) Secondary explosion.
- 11 March 1971: On a strike mission for the 1st Marine Division, HMM-262 was credited with four (4) KBMA (probable).
- 12 March 1971: On a visual reconnaissance mission, HMM-262 was credited with one (1) KBMA (confirmed).
- 12 March 1971: On mission 83 for the 1st Marine Division, 3 AH-1G's and one AH-1J were credited with one (1) KBMA (confirmed).
- 13 March 1971: During mission 70, three UH-1E's from HML-167 were credited with destroying two (2) Hootches.
- 14 March 1971: Three UH-1E's from HML-167 were credited with destroying three (3) Bunkers during mission 70.

- 30 March 1971: While conducting an Emergency Medevac, a CH-46 of HMM-262 was blown in half by a command detonated mine. The entire crew sustained injuries resulting in one fatality.
- 30 March 1971: While hovering in the zone during an Emergency Medevac, a CH-46D from HMM-262 received fire and burst into flames. None of the crew were seriously injured.
- 31 March 1971: During mission 80, two Cobras from HML-367 were credited with four (4) KBMA (confirmed) and one (1) KBMA (probable).

(b) There was a 35% decrease in enroute fire incidents and 63% fewer hits as a result of a repeated decrease in flight operations this month.

1. In accordance with reference (a), significant events within the logistics field for the period of 1 March through 31 March were as follows:


- a. On 10 March 1971, LtCol R. R. LEISY relieved LtCol W. R. FAILS as "The Fabulous Four".

- c. Several meetings were held with Philco-Ford concerning the water supply aboard MMAF and getting new pumps for our wells.
- d. A water conservation program was initiated and IRO briefed all housemaids.
- e. On 20 March, published a lessons learned paper regarding HMM-364's mountout.
- f. On 22 March, briefed and gave a tour of MMAF for a team of MACV/USAID/GVN officials interested in long range Republic of Vietnam civilian programs.
- g. On 27 March, a joint USA/USMC meeting was held aboard MMAF concerning the transfer of MMAF to the Army.
- h. Published Group Bulletin 4400 of 15 March 1971 regarding the turn-in of garrison property.
- i. On 29 March, established a reporting system for embarkation peculiar consumables.
- j. On 30 March, as Battle Damage Officer, ensured the coordination and reporting requirements were met regarding the rocket attack of 29 March 1971.

k. On 30 March, briefed and toured the base for the new prospective single manager of MMAF, Col HAMLET, USA, Commanding Officer of the 11th Combat Aviation Group.
