1. This report covers the period 1-30 June 1967. During this period IABS-16 continued to support the facilities at Marble Mountain, Phu Bai, Dong Ma and Mhe Sanh. New construction and improvements to existing facilities are continually in progress at each of the four sites.

3. Civic Action. The Med-Cap held a total of 18 sick calls between the Catholic Orphanage, The Catholic Dispensary and Son Thuy Village. The following number of patients were treated.

- h. Ground Defense. Command posts and bunkers have been rebuilt and repositioned. Additional concerting wire has been strung along the perimeter at IMAF. Defense positions are constantly being worked on and improved on at Phu Bai, Khe Sanh and Dong Fa. Khe Sanh made (3) three contacts with the enemy, no other contacts were made during the month of June.
- 5. Sumply/Materiel. This section continued to support the airfields at 11MF, Khe Sanh, Dong Ha and Phu Bai.
- 6. Notor Transport. The section traveled 95,669 riles during the month of June. The section hauled 1,093,300 gallons of water, 76,600 gallons of diesel fuel, hi,h00 gallons of mogas and 56,69h gallons of JP-h fuel working on an around the clock schedule. There were 25 vehicles deadlined at the end of this period.
- 7. TATES. During the month of June 1967, this section supported operations Crockett, Cimarron, Choctaw, Bear Bite, Union II, Cumberland, Colgate, Butler, Arizona, Adair, Calhoun and Beacon Torch.

- 8. Base Operations. Base Operations continued to support tengent' Squadrons and visiting aircraft utilizing IAG-16 Airfields at Khe Sanh, Dong Ha, Phu Bai, An Hoa and Marble Mountain. Facilities at Marble Mountain were improved by striping the runway and taxiways, sand bagging shoulders of taxiways to prevent erosion from rotar wash, and building revitments for aircraft. On June 9th, Base Operations moved into a permanent building from various temporary structures. This consolidation of the section heads proved most beneficial to efficient running of the airfield.
- a. The NATCI-60 Detachment at MAF recorded 15,276 operations for the month; at An Hoa the detachment recorded 3,971 operations up until 22 June when NAG-36 took over responsibility for the field.

d. The Weather Section supported operations at all MAG-16 Airfields and also sumplied winds aloft information to **b**evastate Delta at Dong Ha. These winds were supplied four times daily by the Weather Section Radiosonde Tear.

9. Food Services.


- a. ITAT. There were approximately 205,800 meals fed at the ITAF messball during the reporting period. Bakery Products utilized approximately 22,500 lbs of flour. Both storcrooms have been completed. Fuch needed sewage system including additional drains throughout messball is now under way.
- b. Phu Bai. There were approximately 82,000 A-ration reals and 8,000 B-ration reals served at the Phu Bai Messball. Bakery Products utilized approximately 2,050 lbs of flour. Ming Food Service Team spent seven days at this resshall offering suggestions and giving instructions to increase efficiency and improve semitation.
- c. <u>Dong Ha</u>. There were approximately 25,650 A-ration meals and 35,600 B-ration meals served at the Pong Va Nesshall. Bakery Products utilized 1100 lbs of flour and 37 cases of cake mix. During the month of June, an office was constructed, the bakeshop was remodeled and table cloths placed throughout the messhall.
- 10. Utility Section, Base Development. During the month 2 now men were joined. This section currently has 3 officers and 11% enlisted personnel assigned.
- a. <u>Mater Point</u>. The Mater Point processed 1,061,650 gallons of potable water and 31,250 gallons of nonnotable water during the routh of June. The various ground units were issued 6,200 gallons of potable water during this period. The Mater Point has produced about 500,000 gallons of water more this month due to the warmer weather. A third well was placed into operation and is

producing around 120 gallons per minute.

- b. Paint Shop. During the month of June the Point Shop personnel completed some fourteen (1) projects. Many of these required much time and skill. A total of about sixty-five (65) signs were painted during the month of June. In addition to this, one Utility Section personnel's name was painted on each of twenty (20) baby cribs that were built for the local Catholic Ornhanage.
- c. Electric Shop. The Electric Shop personnel completed thirty-eight (38) projects and trouble calls during the month of June.
- d. Plumbing Shop. The Plumbing Shop completed (8) eight projects and numerous trouble calls during the month of June.
- e. <u>Pefrigeration Shop</u>. The Pefrigeration Shop personnel answered eleven (11) trouble calls during the month of June. A close watch was kept on each of the units operating in the messhall.
- f. Generator Shop. During the month of June the Generator Shop personnel performed all first and second echelon maintenance with a minimum arount of breakdown.
- g. Carpenter Shop. Furing the month of June the Carpenter Shop personnel completed some seventy-six (76) trouble calls and work assignments. During the month the Carpenter Shop personnel completed the new V.I.P. Peach House. The new Melding Shop at Heavy Equipment Section was completed. The 20' F 60' storage building for the mosshall was completed. A cement floor was poured in the Yeavy Equipment Maintenance Building. The Zulu Company Shower was modified to provide proper ventilation. Forty-seven (h7) boxes were built for the Group Supply Officer. A shelter was built for arming and de-arming aircraft for WPO-2. A locker was built in the Communications Section to store a radio and tele-type. A wire cage was installed in the armory to provide security. Three (3) cradles were built for CH-b6A helicopters. One (1) shelter 25' X 20' X 10' was constructed for the Communications Section.
- h. Laundry. During the month of June the Base Laundry processed 20,203 pounds of clothing and collected organizational gear to turn over to the civilian laundry service.

i. Progress Report for Dong Ha.

- a. The Carpenter Shor personnel constructed an enlisted club with ber and storeroom. A water tower was built for the Officers' Shower and one was also built for the Staff MCO Shower. An added storeroom was built onto the present messhall. All heads and uringle were rescreened.
- b. The Plumbing Shop personnel added shower heads and hose bibs to the Officers' Shower. A new 6" drain line was installed from messhall. A new hot water heater was installed in the Officers' Mess. The messhall drain lines and trans were repaired. A water supply line was run to the G. I. Mouse.



j. Progress Report for Phu Bai.

- a. During the month of June the Phu Bai Utilities Section maintained and operated a total of six (6) generators with a minimum of breakdowns. The carpenters were kept busy mostly on repair of huts, but also built fourteen (14) large boxes of various sizes. Six (6) power poles were built for the Communications Section. Three (3) heads were constructed and the messhall was rescreened. Refrigeration gear was operated with minimum trouble.
- 11. Exchange. During the month of June 1967 the exchange sales were \$61,568.05. The sales of James S. LTE were \$2,50.60. The sales for Saehan Photo Service were \$1,095.15.
