1. This report covers the period 1-30 September 1970. During this period MABS-16 continued to support the facilities at Marble Mountain Air Facility, and LZ Baldy.

Significant Events

1. Administration

- Personnel. Eight (8) Navy Enlisted dropped and eight (8) Navy Enlisted joined. Seven (7) Marine Officers dropped and five (5) Marine Officers joined. Sixty-nine (69) Marine Enlisted dropped and eighty-one (81) Marine Enlisted joined.
- b. There were the following promotions: One (1) to First Lieutenant, Twenty-eight (28) to Sergeant, Ten (10) to Corporal, Thirty-five (35) to Lance Corporal, and Two (2) to Private First Class.
- c. There were the following reductions in rank: One (1) to Private and Six (6) to Private First Class.

e. Casualties

- (1) Sgt Robert G. MILBY 193 78 97. 3/4" laceration left thumb, slicing bread on meat slicer when thumb hit blade.
- (2) LCpl Jesus N. EUSTAGUIO 230 28 47. 12" abrasion left shoulder, he was on his way to his houtch when he was jumped by four or five individuals.
- (3) LCpl Willard A. BCONE 249 59 18, Multiple minor lacerations forearms and right side of face, was in the Zulu Co. head when he was jumped by four or five individuals who beat him up.
- (4) LCpl Glenn R. MARGENICH 253 15 67. 1" laceration medial joint left finger, he was cutting wire with electrician's knife, it slipped and cut his finger.
- (5) LCpl William L. RUSH 260 41 17. Thoraco Muscle Sprain, was a passenger in a truck that was involved in an accident.
- (6) LCpl Jesus M. EUSTAQUIO 230 28 47. Multiple abrasions to chest, abdoman and both arms, harness slipped when he was climbing a pole and slid to the ground.
- (7) LCpl Michael R. DAVIDSON 259 98 34. Laceration left elbow, he was riding in a truck that was involved in an accident.
- (8) Sgt John P. RIDLEY. Contusion to right side of face, bruses on left leg, he was a passenger in a truck that was envolved in an accident.
- (9) LCpl Dwain M. LAWRENCE. 1st and 2nd degree burns on chin, neck, and upper sternum, he overfilled his lighter and it exploded.
- (10) SSgt Robert W. BARNETT. 1" laceration, medial aspect, medial knuckle and left 2nd finger, hexwas sawing and saw slipped.
- (11) LCpl James R. FRITZ. Laceration to left wrist, he was scrapping paint with a putty knife and the knife slipped.
- (12) Cpl Michael D. GRIFFIN. Sprained right ankle, he was playing football and was hit during play.
- (13) PFC William B. BUTTS. Laceration right wrist, fell down and cut himself on unknown object, patient intoxicated and can't remember clearly what happened.

2. Base Operations

a. Installed 20,000 gallon capacity TAFDS on Hill 65 for emergency use only. Two TAFDS personnel assigned to operate this system.

b. Need for reperma-prime of berms at MMAF. Perma-prime was not thick enough on first application. Berms are severely eroded.

4. Civic Action

- a. Medical. Med-Caps were held in Son Thuy, My Da, and Binh Ky hamlets during the month of September. A total of 1321 patients were treated.
- b. Education. 5760 cens of chocolate milk were distributed at the Buddist School in Son Thuy as part of our milk program. 400 school kits were distributed at Hoa Long School.
- c. Social Welfare. During the 14th, 15th, and 16th of September, the Vietnamese celebrated their Mid-Autumn Festival. We participated in various ceremonies and provided over 3000 cans of chilled chocolate milk and 2000 doughnuts as refreshments.
- d. Refugee Support. We rebuilt a home in Binh Ky Hamlet which had been destroyed by an illumination flare.
- e. Solatium Payments. A total of 25,000 %VN was paid in ll solatiums as a result of an accident involving an Industrial Relations vehicle on 13 September 1970.

5. Heavy Equipment

a. Operations section participated in the redeployment of Marine Aircraft Group 11, 7th Marine Regiment, Marine Aircraft Group 13, 5th Comm Bn., and a portion of Recon from 7th Marine Regiment. The following is a breakdown of our equipment status:
