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

8. Utilities

- a. Personnel. On 1 April 1971, the Utilities Section was comprised of fifty-eight (58) personnel which included three (3) officers and fifty-five (55) enlisted persons. During the period covered this section has lost six (6) men and joined eight (8).
- b. Electric Shop. During the period of 1 April to 14 April 1971, the Electric Shop completed a total of 114 minor and major work requests. This shop was responsible for the electrical renivation of seventeen (17) sea huts in the old 263, 364, and 367 ares.
